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Wind Symphony Spectacle in Kollen Park Climaxed by Fireworks

Gala Bicentennial Program Thrills Thousands

From 12,000 to 15,000 persons converged on Kollen Park Monday for Holland's Bicentennial climax, a spectacular program by the American Wind Symphony of Western Pennsylvania. And everybody loved it.

This musical organization, which is visiting 76 cities along inland waterways during the Bicentennial year, had something for everyone. Mostly there was music, everything from classical favorites to contemporary to popular selections, and at times a touch of the rock beat.

Along with the music was a sing-along with the Community Chorus leading off in such old-time favorites as Campdown Races, Oh Susanna, Clementine, When the Saints Go Marching In, Sweet Adeline and Yankee Doodle Dandy.

Dances by talented company members ran to square dance, tap, interpretive and the old time Charleston.

A display of fireworks, shot from the area of the gravel docks around the curve at Kollen park, climaxed the program to the tune of Handel's Music for the Royal Fireworks. A contrasting selection by the wind symphony, was "Morpheus," by Jerzy Sapieyevsky, a Polish composer-in-residence with the company.

Conductor Robert Boudreau's opening fanfare was most effective. It was played as the stage "opened up" against a setting sun which striped the sky with pink, almost to the eastern horizon.

At the conclusion of an entertainment-packed evening, the symphony's closing "Stars and Stripes Forever," a rousing Sousa march, brought the thousands of spectators to their feet in a long, sustained ovation.

The conductor proved to be an able and witty master of ceremonies, interspersing musical selections with stories of the barge's visits along the waterways starting April 30 in Biloxi, Miss., and traveling the Florida peninsula and eastern coast into Pennsylvania and New York along the St. Lawrence seaway and into Michigan. From here, the Point Counter Point II (name of the floating art center) goes to Utica, Ill., and down the Mississippi, then up the Ohio and back to Pittsburgh its home.

Only the conductor, his wife and four children and the barge crew travel on the floating barge. Company members travel by color coordinated vans in overland travel and meet the barge for the appearances. Company members are hosted in local homes.

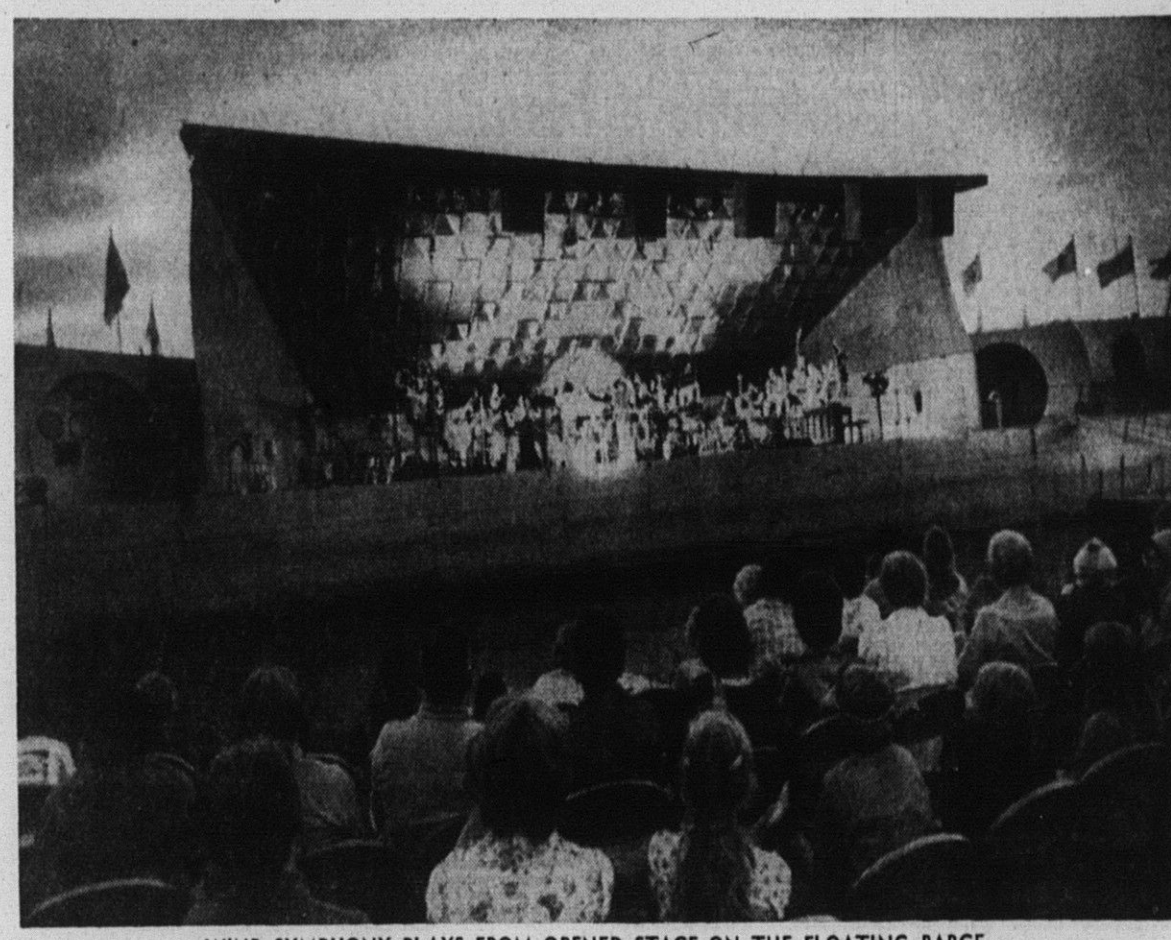
Conductor Boudreau who is interested in improving the environment spoke of the many efforts being done in America to clean up rivers and inland waters. He described the dramatic improvements in Lake Erie, the clear blue waters of upper Lake Huron and was impressed by the bathing beaches of Lake Michigan. But while much had been done, there is much still to be done if future generations are to enjoy these natural gifts, he said.

Judie Zylman, chairman of the Bicentennial Commission, and Diana Van Kolken, her co-chairman for the Wind Symphony program, expressed heartfelt appreciation today to the many persons assisting in plans for the barge visit. Among the chairmen were Cal Langejans, director of the Community Chorus who headed housing and arranged seminars; Fran Siems, backyard concerts; Soren Wolff, assistant city manager who coordinated grounds, police and Board of Public Works, and Willard C. Wichers who headed the committee for an unusually effective musical service in First Reformed Church assisted by many, many others.

The visit of the Wind Symphony is regarded as the climax of Holland's Bicentennial celebration which started April 13, 1975, with Paul Revere's Ride in which four horsemen carried Mayor Lou Hallacy's proclamation to four townships.

The Bicentennial has served as the theme for just about every activity throughout the year, and the colors, red, white and blue, have been most effective in park plantings and in the downtown. Tulip Time this year carried the Bicentennial theme. Other leading events were two highly successful concerts by the Grand Rapids Metropolitan Choir of Praise, and the July 4 events which listed an all-day picnic at Kollen Park with evening concert and fireworks at the Holland Country Club.

Another leading event will be a "Hands Across Holland" Sunday, Sept. 5, at Holland Park, a community project for all faiths. Plans call for formation of a huge cross, with the theme on Van Raalte Ave., followed by community singing in the band shell.

Two-Car Collision Kills Zeeland Man

Injured Cyclist Found By Friend

HUDSONVILLE — A motorcyclist who lay injured along trails near his home in Jamestown township 18 hours Wednesday night and Thursday before he was found by a friend was in "critical" condition Friday in a Grand Rapids hospital.

Ottawa County deputies said Dale Cotts, 23, of 2703 Perry St., suffered a concussion, broken collar bone, possible internal injuries and cuts and bruises when the motorcycle he was operating went out of control Wednesday night at about 7:30.

Cotts was found Thursday afternoon shortly before 2 p.m. by Richard Young of 2360 Perry St., who was called to search for Cotts. Cotts was found about 100 feet from his overturned cycle.

Young's wife said Cotts apparently lost control of the motorcycle on a jump along trails near their homes. She said Young believed Cotts may have been working on the jump and was trying it out when the accident occurred.

Cotts was semi-conscious when found and may have crawled a short distance before he was found, Mrs. Young said.

Tracking Dog's Sniffer Works

GRAND HAVEN — A tracking dog sniffed his way to a subject wanted in connection with a break-in reported in progress at a home in Tallmadge township Tuesday night.

Ottawa County deputies said an alert neighbor called them at 10:01 p.m. to report a break-in at the Ernest Herman residence, 538 Lincoln, Marne, and deputies found a car in the driveway with two juvenile females inside.

Neighbors said a third subject, a male, was involved and deputies brought in Gus, the tracking dog. He sniffed his way to the home of a juvenile male subject where the youth was taken into custody.

Deputies said the three juveniles were referred to their parents and probate court. Recovered were a cash box and a coin bank taken from the house in the break-in.

Final Plans Set to Save Beach Area

A final environmental statement concerning a project to control shore damage attributed to the breakwaters and pier at Holland Harbor has been completed and comments should be filed with the Corps of Engineers in Detroit before Sept. 16.

The statement discusses creation of a "feeder beach" on the south side of the harbor entrance at Macatawa. It would begin 1,200 feet south of the south breakwater and extend 3,300 feet in a southerly direction.

The program would be completed under provisions of the River and Harbor Act of 1963. Plans call for 170,000 cubic yards of unpolluted sand to be dredged from the mouth of Holland Harbor and placed on the beach area in the first year and 61,000 cubic yards of additional sand in each of the following five years.

The dredging would be done by the dredge Hains which now maintains the harbor entrance with annual dredging of the sand which now is dumped in a deep part of Lake Michigan.

A section of permanent pipe would be installed along the length of the south breakwater and temporary pipeline would run onto the Macatawa beach area to bring the sand from the dredge to shore.

The sand would be moved on the shore by bulldozers.

The work would be done in the spring of the year and creation of the feeder beach during the first year could take 30 to 40 days.

Total estimated cost of the project the first year is \$600,000 and the annual dredging and sand replacement in each of the next five years was estimated at \$115,000.

B. Stegink Dies After Auto Crash

Nine Others Injured; Car Hit Broadside At 120th Ave., Riley

One person was killed and nine others injured in a two-car collision at 120th Ave. and Riley St. Tuesday at 8:05 p.m.

Fatally injured was Benjamin Stegink, 76, a resident of the Haven Park Nursing Home in Zeeland since June, 1975. He died in Holland Hospital about ten minutes after arrival in the emergency room where he was being treated for head injuries.

Ottawa County deputies said Stegink was a passenger in a car driven by Egbert Stegink, 74, of 334 West 19th St. He was listed in "fair" condition today in Holland Hospital with fractured ribs and scalp lacerations.

Sena Stegink, 84, of 628 Graafschap Rd., was in "fair" condition in Holland Hospital with a fractured left knee and chest and back injuries.

Gertrude Arens, 79, of 1033 Graafschap Rd., another passenger in the Stegink car, was in "critical" condition in Holland Hospital with multiple fractures of both legs.

Henry Stegink, 72, of 151 West 20th St., was treated in Holland Hospital for facial lacerations and released.

The second car was driven by Richard Dalman, 29, of 11306 Polk St., and he was listed in "fair" condition in Holland Hospital with multiple lacerations and possible internal injuries.

His son, Todd, 7, was in "good" condition with back and leg injuries. Other passengers in the Dalman car were his wife Sue, 26, and daughters Dena, 5, and Deborah, 9. They were treated in the hospital and released.

Deputies said the Dalman car was northbound on 120th Ave. and the Stegink auto was eastbound on Riley. The Stegink car apparently failed to obey a stop sign at the intersection and was struck broadside by the Dalman car.

The death brings the Ottawa County traffic fatality count to 13 this year, the same number of deaths reported a year ago.

Stegink, formerly of 81 West 17th St., was a member of the Maple Ave. Christian Reformed church and a former employee of West Michigan Furniture Co.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Marvin (Greta) Veldhoff of Holland; a son, Donald of Chicago; five grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; two brothers, Egbert and Henry, both of Holland; two sisters, Mrs. Edward (Gertrude) Arens and Mrs. William (Sena) Hoogstrate and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Clarence (Sena) Stegink, all of Holland.

Allegan Sets Special Study On Complaint

ALLEGAN — Allegan Circuit Court Judge George R. Corsiglia has named a special prosecutor to study a taxpayer's complaint regarding \$2,500 paid the county commission chairman for additional duties as county building coordinator.

Named to investigate the charges is Holland attorney John R. Marquis.

The complaint was lodged July 20 by David S. Carlson of Otsego township, an unsuccessful candidate for the Republican nomination for commissioner from District 10.

Carlson charged that the board acted illegally in giving commission chairman Jerry Lohman an additional \$2,500 per year to oversee construction and remodeling of county buildings.

Carlson claims state law prohibits a commissioner from being appointed or employed in any capacity by any officer, board or committee and that any taxpayer may sue to recover the wages paid.

Allegan Prosecutor Rick Hunter said Carlson may present his evidence to the special prosecutor and Marquis will determine whether the board erred in giving Lohman additional duties and salary.

Should Marquis feel there has been a violation he could bring civil suit to recover the extra salary, ask for a criminal warrant or both, Hunter said.

Tickets Remain at \$2 and \$1.50 Local Ox Roast Slated Sept. 25

The 11th annual community ox roast sponsored by the city of Holland and Hope College will be held a little later than usual this year — Saturday, Sept. 25, at Windmill Island.

Plans call for the format of previous years — attending the opening game of the Hope College home football season at nearby Riverview Park, a visit to Windmill Island, and refreshments consisting of prime roast beef on buns and all the fixings.

Schedules are slightly changed this year with the football game starting at 1:30 p.m. instead of 2 p.m. Serving hours at Windmill Island also are set a half hour earlier, spanning 1:30 to 6 p.m. The schedule was changed to encourage choices of late lunch, mid-afternoon snack or supper.

Hope this year will play Indiana Central College of Indianapolis.

Despite rising costs, tickets will remain the same as last year, \$2 for adults and \$1.50 for children and senior citizens.

Tickets will be available on or after Sept. 8 at Chamber of Commerce headquarters, the city treasurer's office in City Hall, Hope College in Van Raalte Hall, First Michigan Bank and branches, First National Bank and branches, Peoples State Bank and branches, Ottawa Savings and Loan, Windmill Island and Herriek Public Library.

Ticket limit will be 4,000. Senior citizen tickets will be available only at the city treasurer's office. Adult and children's tickets will be available at all listed places.

Trucker Uses CB Radio To Call Help

GRAND HAVEN — A Canadian truck driver used his CB radio to summon aid after a fuel tank exploded while he was investing a missing fuel cap at 4 a.m. today.

Ottawa County deputies said Eldon McGill, 33, of London, Ont., was traveling with his son, Steven, 6, along I-196 at 32nd Ave. near Hudsonville when he noticed the fuel cap was missing and fuel was leaking. He stopped the truck and got out to investigate.

But deputies said McGill carried a lit cigarette as he approached the open fuel tank and fumes exploded. He suffered second degree burns of the face, head, hands and shoulder.

McGill used his CB radio to summon aid and the distress call was heard by another trucker, Dirk Piersma of Grand Rapids, who stopped and headed toward Grand Rapids with McGill and his son.

Piersma then began using his CB radio to call for additional assistance and he was met at the I-196 and Chicago Dr. interchange at Jenison by the Ottawa County E unit.

E unit members administered emergency aid and McGill was taken to St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids by ambulance. He was listed in satisfactory condition today in the hospital. The son was not injured.

Motorists Ignore Crosswalk Signs

Stop signs at pedestrian crosswalks between the blocks along Eighth St. in the downtown area are being ignored by motorists, Holland police said Monday.

Officers said some motorists believe they do not have to stop for the crosswalks between River and Central Aves. and Central and College Aves. unless pedestrians are crossing.

But traffic squad Sgt. Ken Gebben said the stop signs posted at the crosswalks means just that — a full stop regardless of whether pedestrians are crossing the street.

Gebben urged motorists traveling along Eighth St. in the downtown area to observe the stop signs at the crosswalks and do as they say. Come to a complete stop.

The state department evaluated 47 Michigan counties and ranked the Ottawa County food sanitation program third. The evaluation was done to determine how well the program complies with the law.

The state commended the county sanitation staff for its ability to interpret and relate the rules and regulations to the owners of food service establishments, for the ability to maintain good records and persistence in follow-up inspections.

At a special council meeting Thursday the low bid of \$35,209.80 from West Shore Construction was accepted for resurfacing portions of McKinley, Garfield, Colonial, Michigan, Ottawa, Madison and Oak and the intersection of Roosevelt and State.

GRAND RAPIDS — Gerrit Bronkhorst, 40, of 4300 47th St., Holland, was bound to Kent County Circuit Court for arraignment Friday on charges in connection with a double fatality traffic accident Aug. 8 in Kent County.

Bronkhorst appeared in 63rd District Court Tuesday on two counts of manslaughter and one count of leaving the scene of a personal injury accident. Total bond of \$55,000 was continued.

Killed in the three-car collision along US-131 near 76th St., were Paul Hoos, 25, of Muskegon, and Maria Dahlia Rodriguez, 26, of Kalamazoo, drivers of the other two vehicles.

Authorities said Bronkhorst was traveling south along US-131 and struck the rear of the Rodriguez car forcing it across the median and into the path of the northbound Hoos auto.

Authorities said Bronkhorst left the accident scene but reported to Holland police later in the day that his car was stolen and then referred to Kent County authorities.

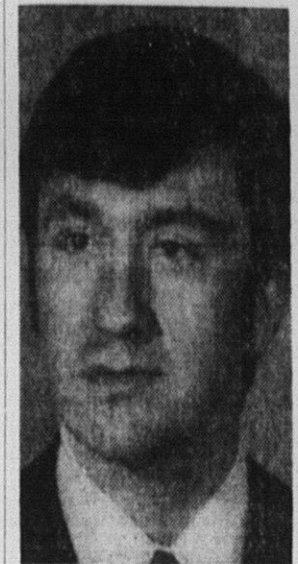

Even today, measurements in Europe vary from one country to another, he said.

Kromann said that George Washington established the decimal system in this country. England changed to the metric system in 1965, he said, and pointed to the advantages of the metric system in international trade. He advised the audience to "think metric" for easier learning of the system.

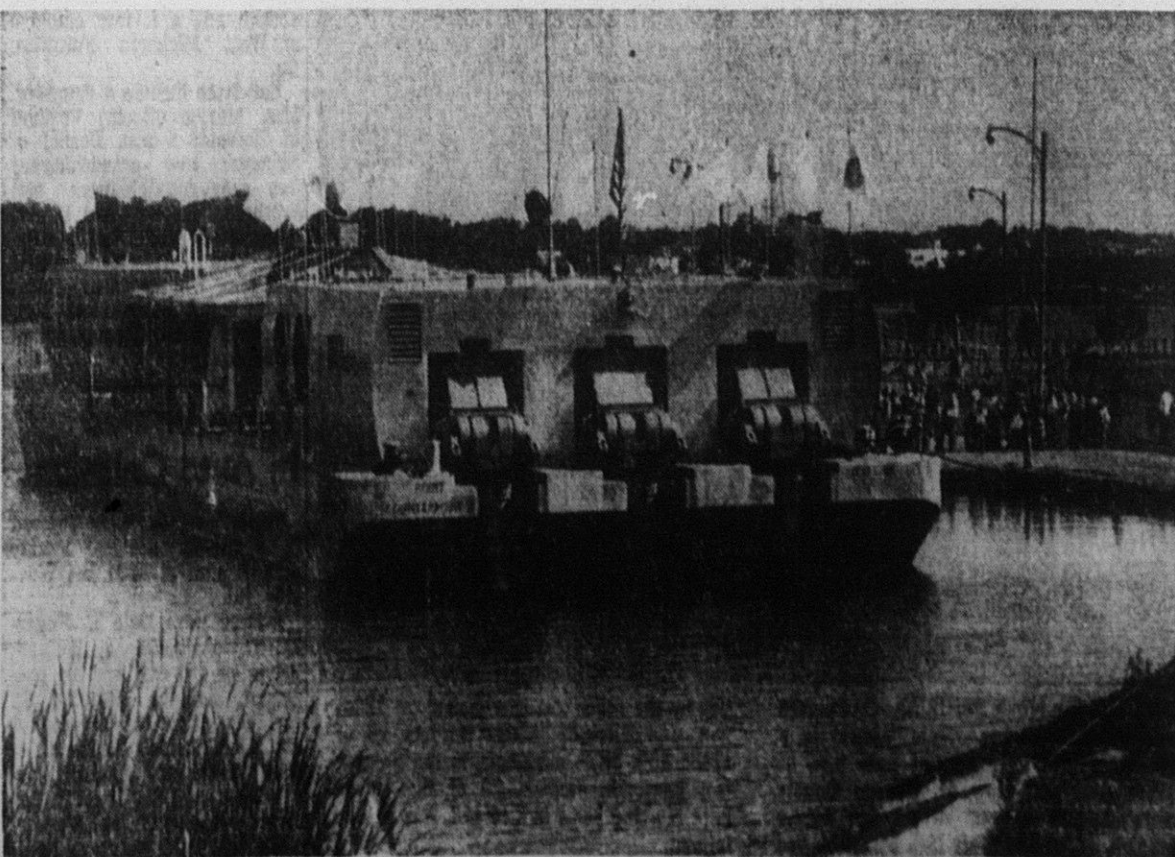

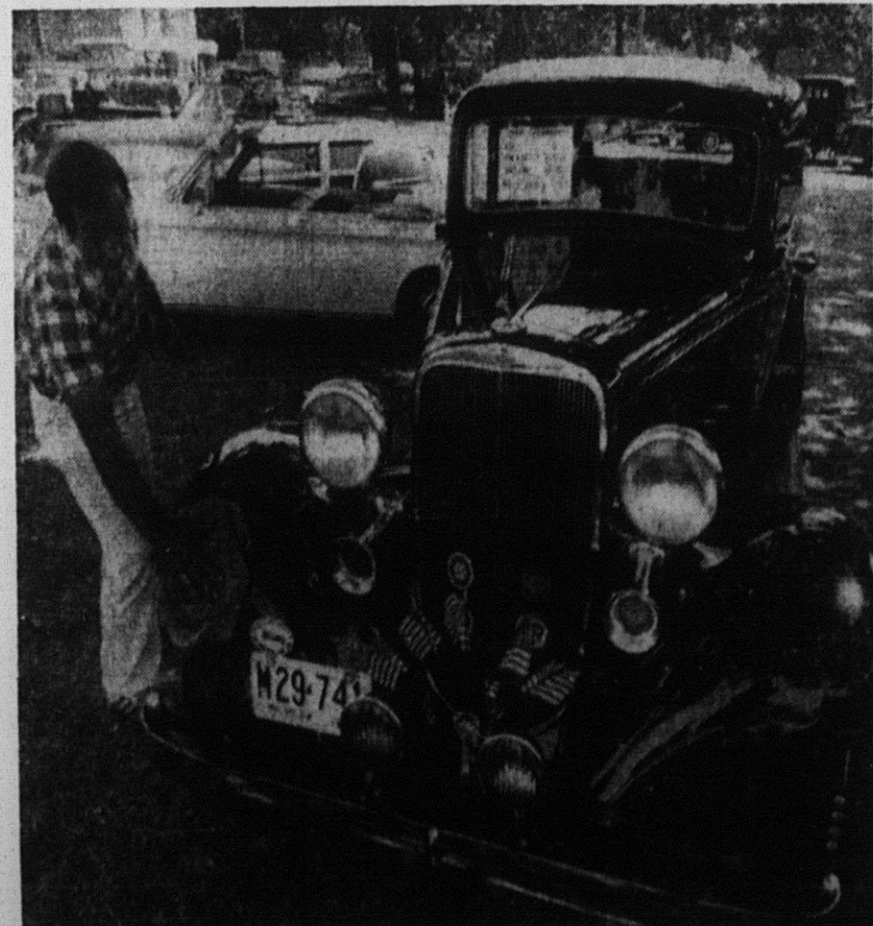

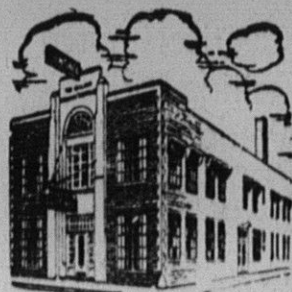

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DO AS YOU PLEASE

Detroit has finally reached
the point where it must either
take strong action to reclaim
its city or accept the fact that
gangs have taken over and are
in charge. Either the city will
insist on law and order or
there will be the rule of the
jungle.

If we go back to the 1960's
with a permissiveness that in-
sulted both human rights and
property rights, and take note
that the social and psychological
bent was to allow people to do
pretty well as they pleased, then
we have at least some answer
to the present problem.

One can't allow people to do
as they please and then suddenly
turn off that kind of permissi-
veness, at least not without some
very serious problems. And
Detroit has reached that point.

If we can take at face value
the descriptions of businessmen
in Detroit, and the complaints
of senior citizens, and we see
no reason why we can't, then
the job of restoring law and
order, is actually a job in get-
ting some civilization into the
community.

What is very disturbing is the
recurring theme that the home
authority has disintegrated. And
this will make the task even
more difficult. As one council-
man put it, "We can't take the
city back until parents take
their homes back." And with all
the attacks on the home, this
may be a futile hope. At least
the crisis is pointing up the
problem.

Joe will officially retire at the end of the summer season. He and his wife are planning some vacations, too, probably in Florida. Their family includes their two sons, a daughter, Mrs. John (Linda) Willet, and 10 grandchildren — eight boys and two girls.

That corner of South Shore Dr. won't be quite the same without Helen and Joe. But the employees expect them back — at least as shoppers — on the other side of the counter.

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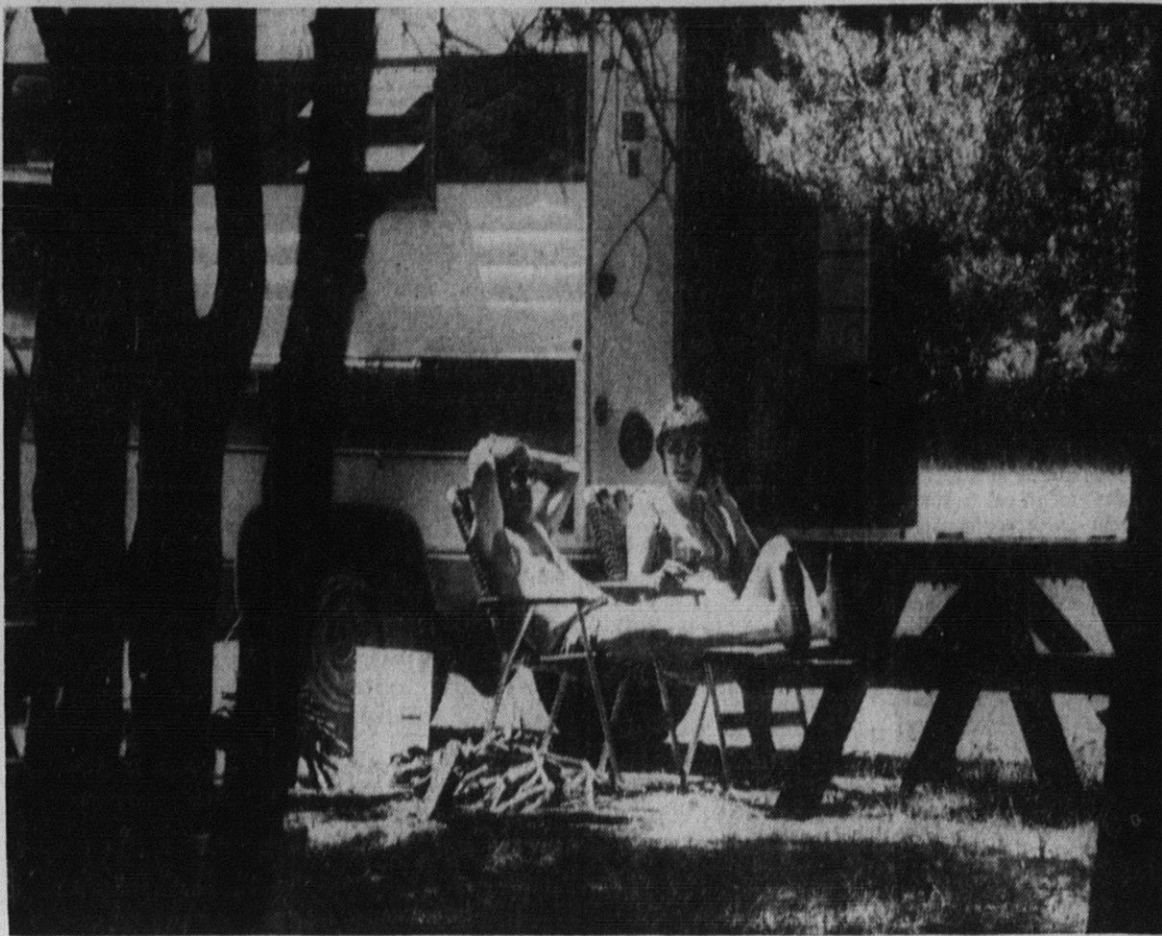
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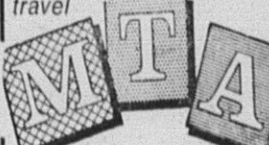
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
