Crews of the State Highway Department and the Ottawa County Road Commission removed the construction barricades at the new intersection of US-31 and M-21 east of Holland Friday, opening the interchange to traffic.

Project engineer John Vandenberg of the Highway Department said all work on the new junction has been completed, except for sodding, guard rails and a sealing treatment for the shoulders. The semi-cloverleaf design permits all traffic entering US-31 from M-21 to use turnoff ramps which join the highway in gradually merging traffic streams. Northbound US-31 traffic can also merge with eastbound M-21.

Traffic meets at right angles in two places. Southbound US-31 cars will use a ramp which intersects with M-21 just west of the overpass to go west into Holland or east toward Grand Rapids. To go east, these cars must cross the westbound M-21 lane.

East of the overpass, northbound motorists who wish to enter Holland from the east rather than at the south entrance to the city, may use a fork in the ramp from US-31 to M-21 which crosses the eastbound lane of M-21. All signs have now been set in place, marking the routes clearly for traffic.

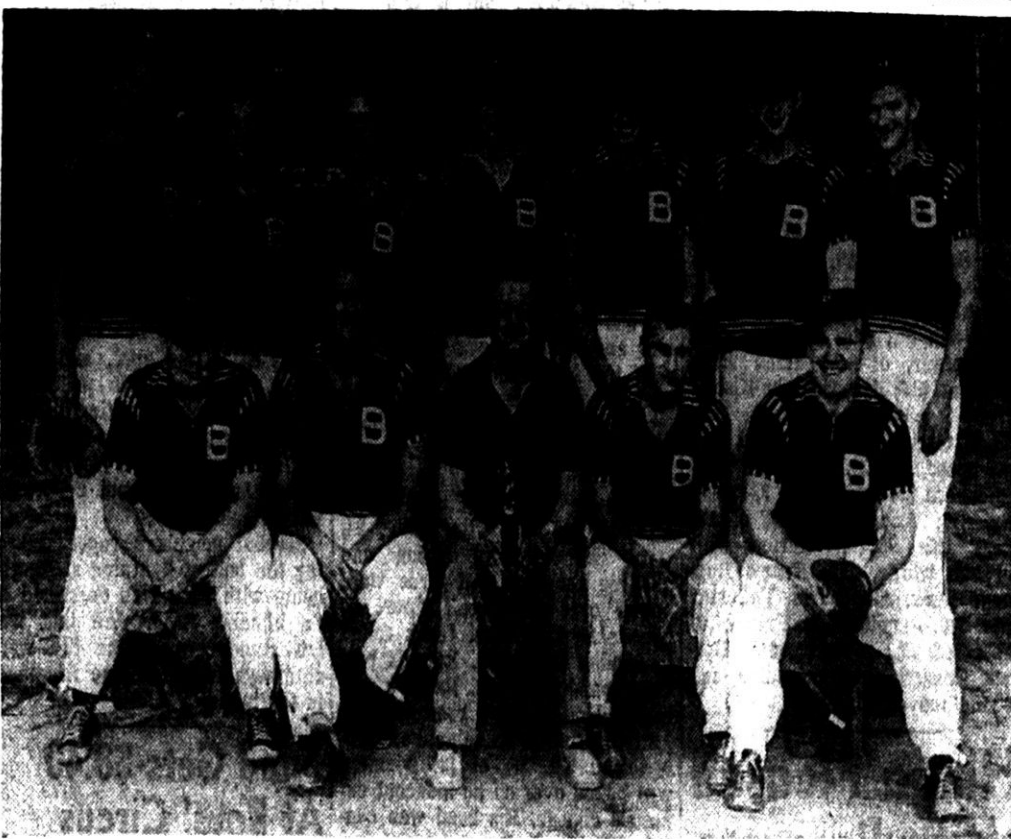

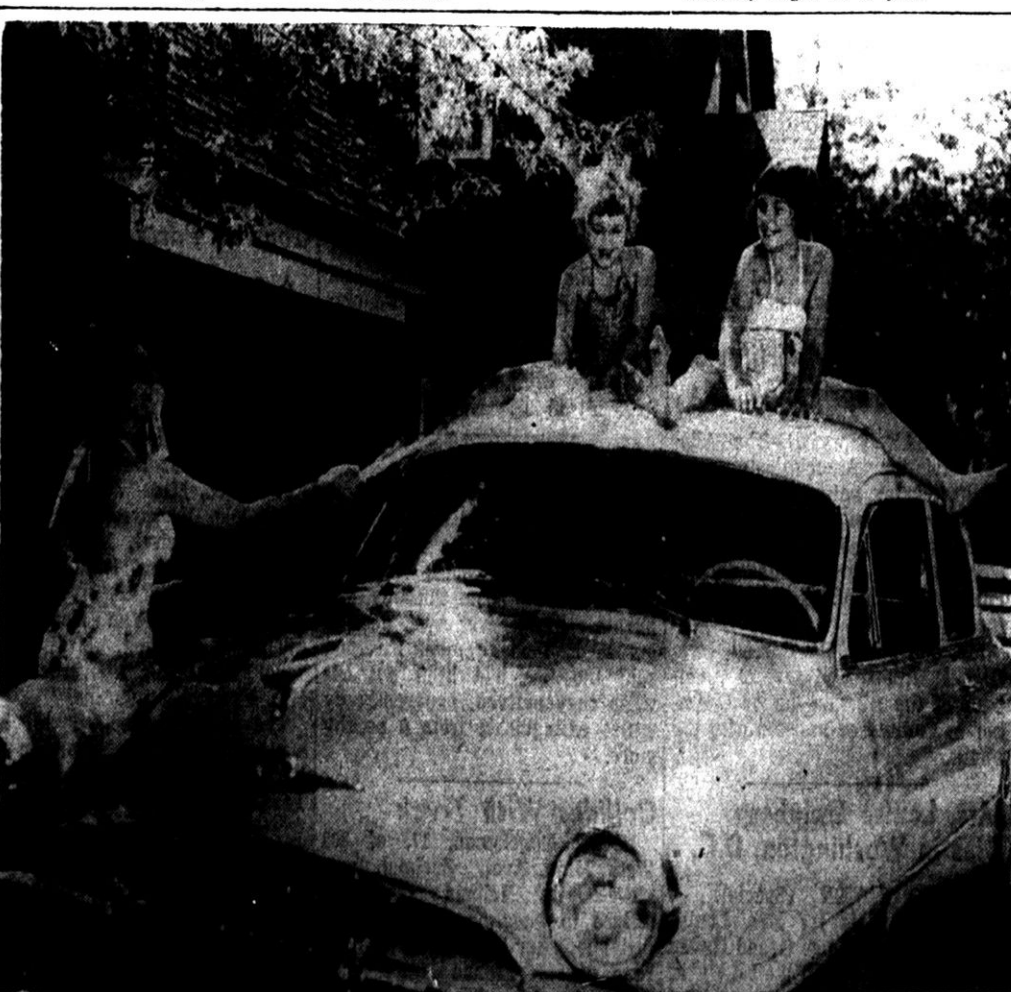

Hope Students in Vienna Combine Fun and Study

VIENNA — Fifty-nine American music students from Hope College, Holland, Michigan and 18 other institutions are participating in a two month summer school course in this musical capital.

The summer school is under the direction of Dr. Paul G. Fried, associate professor of history at Hope College.

The chief aim of the summer school is to combine the pleasures of touring Europe with intensive study.

Hope College Vienna Summer School, on an experimental basis in 1956, pioneered the development of a program which provides all the most important aspects of European travel, study and living.

Dr. Fried conceived his plan for a summer school in Europe while teaching at Mexico City College as a guest professor in 1954.

"The student who goes abroad for the first time, he points out," should see something, but he should not spend all of his time merely sightseeing."

The main features of the study tour are six weeks residence in Vienna for a full academic summer session, and a period of independent travel prior to the student's return to America.

The students this year have visited SHAPE headquarters near Paris, the headquarters of the European Common Market in Brussels and the headquarters of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's West German Christian Democratic Party.

The group was also received in the Bavarian country home of Arch-Duke Otto von Hapsburg, pretender to the Austrian throne.

The students were "impressed by the modern approach to world affairs" by Hapsburg, scion of one of Europe's oldest families. Radio Free Europe in Munich, Germany was also on the list of sights for the group.

Students in the summer school have a choice of nine different courses, including art, German, history, literature, and music. The staff includes seven European professors, as well as guest lecturers and four members of Hope College staff.

One of the highlights of the summer's course is a series of lectures by the famous Dutch ethnologist, Rolf Itzinger on modern African history.

The Summer School, in its fourth year in Vienna, has established quite a reputation. Its arrival was announced by the daily newspapers, radio and television programs.

Students of the summer course live with Austrian families. "The extended residence of our students in European families can become one more strand in the weaving of international friendship ties," said Dr. Fried.

The Summer School combined the Fourth of July celebration with a welcome party in the hugh ballroom of a beautiful old Baroque palace.

The strains of Viennese waltzes mingled with modern American music illustrating the aims of the summer course: to learn to appreciate the cultural heritage of Europe without forgetting American traditions.

In Vienna the students have already seen performances at the State Opera, and concerts and recitals given in various music halls and palaces. This has been in addition to the usual round of museums, churches and palaces.

Wearing colorful lederhosen (leather shorts for boys) and dirndls (Austrian national dress with full skirt, tight low cut bodice and small apron) the students have already been taken for natives by some picture snapping tourists.

Dr. Fried, a native of Leipzig,

Germany, entered the United States in 1939 and became a citizen in 1943. He holds a B.A. degree from Hope College, an M.A. from Harvard, and received his Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Erlangen, Germany.

Serving as chaperones for the group are Mr. and Mrs. Milton L. Hinga. Hinga is Dean of Students at Hope College and a teacher of European History.

Jay Formsma Addresses Rotary Club

Jay Formsma, principal of Holland High School, presented an information program on the modern high school Thursday noon to the Holland Rotary Club.

Formsma reviewed the high school curriculum of 1959 and gave an advanced look towards 1990. He pointed out the differences between the 1900 high school and the 1959 high school.

Today's program consists of three important developments, he said, the first of which is the guidance of both students and parents, the second maintaining the quality of teachers and instructors, and the third the school library, which has become a most important factor in modern education.

The guidance program was divided into three parts by Formsma. The first was helping the child help himself, the second to direct them as to what they plan to do in the future, and the third to direct them in the best means of obtaining the goals.

Today's high school program is divided into two tracts, the first being the academic, and the second the vocational.

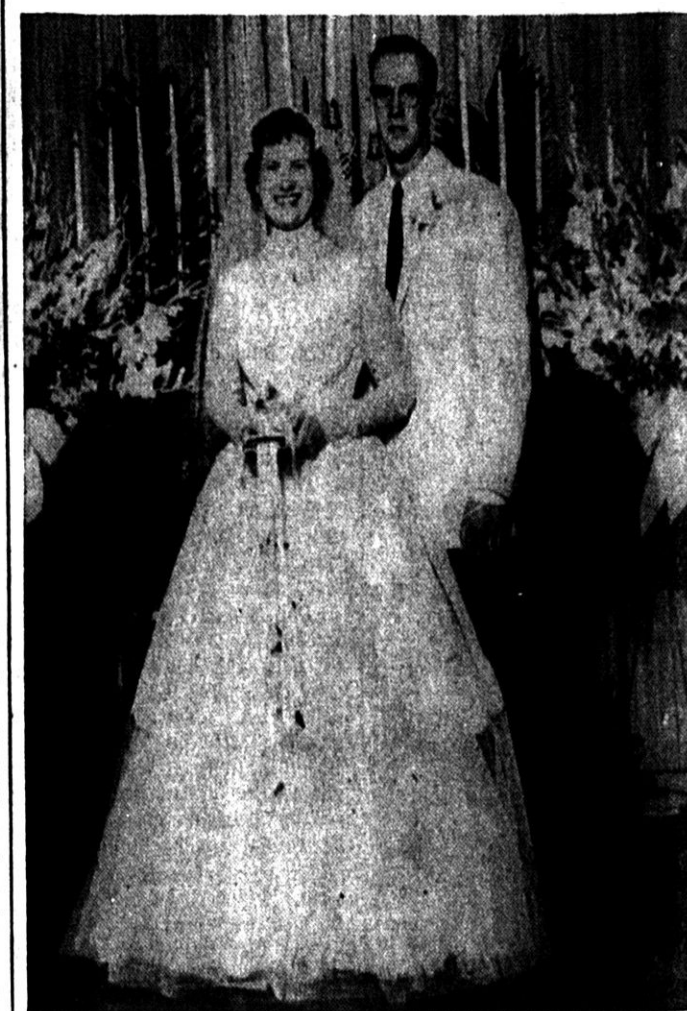
Formsma pointed out several instances where experiments are being conducted. He mentioned incidents where both larger classes and more individual help is being given the students, and that possibly this is the type of instruction students can expect within the next 30 years.

Formsma answered many questions following the address. The meeting was conducted by President Charles Cooper, and 12 visiting Rotarians were introduced along with guests.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 6
Working Against God
(The Book of Obadiah)
By C. P. Dame

(Based on copyrighted outlines produced by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. and used by permission.)

We divide the prophetic books of the Bible into two groups—the major and the minor prophets. Our lesson text is taken from the book of Obadiah, one of the minor prophets, the shortest book in the Old Testament. We know not anything about Obadiah the man—his name means "servant of Jehovah." The book deals with the sin of pride.

I. God is against the proud and therefore the proud will eventually fall. Esau and Jacob were twins. Some twins are much alike and others much unlike. Jacob and Esau never got along very well together. In Genesis we read that "the children struggled within her"—in Rebekah, their mother. The Israelites were the descendants of Jacob while the Edomites sprang from Esau. When the Israelites were on their way to Canaan, they asked for permission to pass through Edom and they were refused (Numbers 20: 14-21). Ever since that refusal hatred existed between the two nations. Obadiah reveals this animosity in his little book. Jeremiah, Isaiah, Ezekiel also spoke with severity regarding Edom.

In one respect Edom differed from all the other nations of that time. The nation did not acknowledge any god. The other nations were idolatrous. Esau is called "that profane person" meaning that he was outside the temple. His descendants were like that too. The nation felt no need of God. Edom stands for godlessness. Jacob stands for the spiritual. The two nations had conflicting principles. Edom was small but rich and considered itself impregnable. It commanded several trade routes. It was proud and felt secure. But the nation that said, "Who shall bring me down to the ground?" was overcome by a federation of nations which God brought about.

II. Pride often expresses itself in heartlessness. When Nebuchadnezzar took Jerusalem in 586 B.C. the Edomites rejoiced in the downfall of the city. Sometimes we are tempted to do something like that. When we read about disasters and crop failures in China are we saddened thereby or do we secretly rejoice? Edom was not grieved at the downfall of Jerusalem but it rejoiced. When Jerusalem was captured Edom even encouraged the demolishing of the city and took part in the looting and even plundered people and when some citizens of Jerusalem tried to escape from the Chaldeans, the Edomites intercepted them at the forks of the roads and at the passes of the mountains and delivered them up to their enemies. One thing the Hebrews remembered vividly in Babylon was the bad treatment they had received from Edom.

III. God punishes the proud. History makes that clear. Edom was punished on account of its pride. Nebuchadnezzar's pride was his undoing. Some of us remember how proud Hitler was for a time when things were going his way. This is a moral universe. Evil has a way of striking back. What we sow—what nations, corporations, union labor, families sow that they will in time reap. Those who hurt others also hurt themselves. No one lives unto himself. Nations often forget that they are responsible to God. God knows what attitude one nation assumes towards other nations—whether it is one of helpfulness or one of indifference and heartlessness.

Christian High Makes Changes

Several noteworthy changes have been made in the Holland Christian High School schedule and curriculum for the new school year. Principal Raymond Holwerda reported today. The changes will go into effect when high school classes begin of Sept. 9.

One of the biggest switches will be the changeover from a six-period day to a seven period schedule for all students. For the past years, Holland Christian High School has been operating on a six-one hour-per day schedule. This year classes will operate on three 55 minute periods and four 40 minute periods. The long periods are necessary to fulfill time requirements in the laboratory classes. Holwerda announced.

Another switch will be the offering of a third year of a foreign language instead of two years. Other changes include a rescheduling of band and choir to meet during different hours of the day so that a student might possibly elect both if he or she wishes.

A final change involves the school's recommendation of a student to go to college. Holwerda said that in the future Holland Christian High School requires of all students wishing the school's recommendation for college that they have an average grade of not less than "C"; they complete two major and three minor sequences; one year of chemistry; work in the direction of 19 credits for graduation.

All of the above recommendations and changes were made by the faculty curriculum committee and adopted by the board of trustees, Holwerda said.

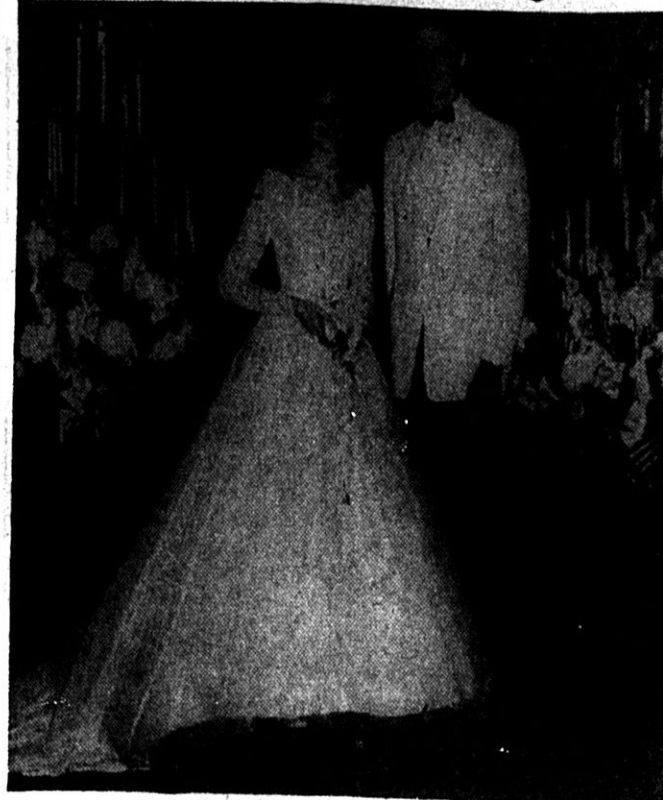

New Bridge Building Method Used on US-131 Expressway

ALLEGAN (Special) — A unique bridge building technique is being used for the first time in West Michigan by Carl Goodwin and Sons, of Allegan, contractors for the new US-131 Expressway.

The new bridge building technique is being used on the \$3 million Martin to Plainwell section of the expressway, where two bridges, over the Kalamazoo and Gun Rivers, are being built. The new technique has attracted the attention of engineers and bridge builders all over the United States.

In conventional bridge building, individual cofferdams are built around each separate bridge supporting structure. Pumps are used to keep the cofferdam clear of water while work is in progress.

However, in the new technique, a three-sided dike, using the river bank as a fourth side, is thrown up around the entire area in which

the bridge is to be built. Then 10-inch pipe with huge pumps is laid around the inside of the dike. The pipe is connected to a large number of well points, of the type used for farm and home wells, driven to a depth of 20 feet. On the Kalamazoo River bridge, two miles north of Plainwell 132 well points were driven to keep the diked area dry.

Work on the six-mile Martin to Plainwell stretch will be finished late, October, 1960, provided the steel strike doesn't deprive the contractors of steel. Work has already started on the M-89 interchange just west of Plainwell. A stretch of pavement has been poured south from the M-118 interchange at Martin.

The Wayland to Martin section of the expressway will be open to traffic Sept. 3, in time for the heavy Labor Day Weekend traffic.

The critical cash shortage confronting Michigan schools has varying effects on school districts in the local area, a check among school superintendents revealed Friday.

Because of summer tax collections, both Holland and Zeeland school districts are in fairly comfortable circumstances. Supt. Walter W. Scott of Holland estimated funds on hand at present would be sufficient to carry the system through the first semester. Cash on hand as of Aug. 27 was \$655,366.06. Scott credited Holland's adequate tax base as a factor in the school financial picture.

Zeeland also has summer tax collections on hand and anticipates no immediate financial problem and is making no plans to borrow money.

West Ottawa district is more concerned over finances since it has no summer tax collections, but school officials figure there is enough cash on hand to carry half way through the fall season, or at least meeting a few payrolls.

The West Ottawa district which consists of 13 former school districts is proceeding with plans for opening all schools on Sept. 10 with teachers' conferences and building meetings on Sept. 8 and 9. Details are being worked out on transportation, policies for buildings and custodians, school purchases and the like.

The first set was close throughout with Japinga gaining a 4-3 lead and then taking the next two games to win the set. In the second set, Plagenhoef won the first two games and then the cool Japinga won the next six.

Although Japinga won every game in the final set, several of the games were lengthy including one game which had duce six times and another game which had duce four times.

Plagenhoef was also troubled with double faulting on his serves and lost several points this way in the match.

Joe Moran, who developed both players at Holland High, was the scorekeeper for the final match. Both Plagenhoef and Japinga worked in the City Recreation program this summer. Plagenhoef has been directing the summer program since Ken Van Wieren left for a new post in Chicago. Japinga is presently working on a summer job in the shipping department at H.J. Heinz Co.

Japinga and Plagenhoef teamed to win the Men's doubles championship a few days ago with a 9-7, 6-3 win over Burton Wiersma and Jack Damsen.

Road Commission Engineer Donald Rategan said the tanker was used to transport brine used to water down streets. He said the brine came from area oil and gas wells and that a residuum of crude oil and natural gas that apparently collected in the tanker after repeated use touched off the explosion.

The staff of 22 teachers will teach a full academic program plus shop, art, home economics, typing, driver education and music. It will operate on a six-hour day. The hot lunch program will operate Friday on the first full day of high school.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte has announced that any high school student new in the district not already registered should do so this week with Principal Olin Walker in the Howard Ave. building.

With the Howard Ave. building taken over for the three upper grades, students formerly in this building have been transferred to other schools including Beechwood school No. 2 on Lakewood Blvd.

Elementary students will have a full day Thursday. Schools operating kindergarten through seventh grade are Ventura, West Crisp, Lakewood, Pine Creek and Beechwood No. 2. East Crisp school will not operate because of small enrollment and the necessity for extensive repairs to meet fire marshal requirements. These students will be accommodated in West Crisp building 1 1/4 miles away.

Waukazoo kindergarten will go to Lakewood school. North Holland, Waverly and Norderloos schools will operate as a combined unit. North Holland will have first, second and third grades; Norderloos, fourth and fifth; and Waverly, kindergarten, sixth and seventh. Robert and West Olive Schools also will operate as a combined unit with kindergarten, third, fourth and fifth grades in West Olive, and first, second, part of the fifth, sixth and seventh grades in Robert.

Harlem school will have grades one through seventh with kindergarten attending Pine Creek. Pine Creek will operate kindergarten through seventh, but kindergarten will meet in Rose Park Church.

School personnel have worked out bus schedules with 11 buses operating 37 runs. School owned buses will operate, plus a few runs by Holland City Bus Lines.

Anticipated enrollment in the entire district is 2,172. This is the first year that the district has as a consolidated unit. The 13 districts merged last Oct. 7. Full teaching staff numbers 88.

All elementary schools will open at 8:30 a.m. except Robert and West Olive schools which open at 8:45 a.m. and Waukazoo and Harlem schools at 9 a.m. High School will open at 8:10 a.m. Transportation schedules will be posted Friday near the front entrance of all elementary schools and at the high school.

The superintendent's office has notified virtually all students of shifts and changes. Those formerly attending Beechwood school not otherwise notified will attend Beechwood No. 2 school. Those with further questions may call the superintendent's office at EX 2-9701.

In accommodating a 10th grade for the first time, plus a large new kindergarten class, the district expects to care for 244 more students than last year.

Dr. Frank Womer of the University of Michigan will address West Ottawa teachers at the conference Tuesday which will be devoted largely to testing programs and workshops. On Wednesday, teachers will meet in various buildings with principals.

City Criticized, Commended For 1958 Safety Activities

A critical appraisal of Holland's safety program for 1958, based on national standards, highlighted the annual report compiled by the National Safety Council which was presented Thursday afternoon in City Hall. Explaining the report was Sgt. Edward McGarvey of the Michigan State Police.

Holland was both commended and criticized on several points. In view of two traffic fatalities within the city in 1958, Holland did not qualify for any special commendation. On the other hand, Holland's municipal judge was commended for a good record of performance for analysis and comment and the local newspaper and radio stations were far above the average in safety promotion. The city of Holland was commended for establishing a traffic and safety commission.

Sgt. McGarvey emphasized that a good safety program must have citizens' backing. He pointed to the National Safety Council's report that in 1958 the U.S. traffic death rate per mile traveled was brought down to an all-time low. This led to the cautiously optimistic view that at last the country was catching up with traffic safety needs faster than it was growing. But the early months of 1959 saw a reversal of this trend. Whether this reversal is just a temporary setback is not yet apparent.

On the basis of national urban experience, the National Safety Council estimates that traffic accidents involving Holland residents in and out of the city cost the community about \$800,000 annually. Included in this total are estimates of loss of earning power, medical and hospital expenses, cost of motor vehicle repair or replacement, and the cost of providing automobile insurance. The report pointed out that traffic accidents occurring within the limits of a city do not give a complete picture of the community. In 1958 there were two deaths from traffic accidents, but deaths of Holland residents in traffic accidents in and out of the city substantially exceeded this number. During the three years of 1955 through 1957 latest figures available there was an average of five resident deaths per year, according to the National Office of Vital Statistics.

Holland's traffic inventory was complicated somewhat through annexation programs in which the city tripled in size in 1958 and became even larger this year. However, most accidents and the two fatalities occurred within the original city, it was pointed out. The report on traffic engineering recommended that more time be spent on maintenance of traffic control devices, that 18 miles of paved streets be marked with center lines and that crosswalks at 67 intersections be indicated. Under police traffic supervision, the report recommended that the use of chemical tests be extended to cover all driver-intoxication suspects.

The report recommends more school traffic safety education and more project activity aimed at major local problems. It also recommends that efforts be made to encourage participation of more civic, official and professional groups and organizations in emphasis projects and that more safety films be shown to local groups. Use of traffic safety literature should be increased. Information for the traffic inventory was compiled by Garth Newman, public safety technician.

Yes, August Was Unusually Hot; 6.6 Degrees More!

Yes, August was a hot month! when the average temperature was more on 13 days during the month, the average temperature in Holland was 76.5 degrees or 6.6 degrees above normal, according to Weather Observer Charles Stekette at Hope College.

And with Holland escaping most of the rainstorms that hit Western Michigan, the rainfall totaled 1.85 inches or .85 inch below normal. Rain fell on 10 days, usually accompanied by thunder, which was noted on eight occasions. Early in the month, fog was reported three days in succession with particularly heavy night fog on Aug. 4 and 5.

August was even hotter than the recent record established in 1955 when the average temperature was 75.8 or 5.9 degrees above normal. The previous month, July of 1955, still holds a record of sorts with an average temperature of 78.3 or 6.6 degrees above normal. On that month the mercury hit 90 or better on 16 days, and the average maximum for the month was 90, compared with 90 in 1958, 91 in
