## All Ottawa Incumbents Nominated

GRAND HAVEN — All Ottawa county Republican incumbents were renominated in Tuesday's primary which attracted well over 20,000 voters, compared with about 13,000 two years ago.

The only county race was for sheriff, and incumbent Bernard Gysen took a better than 2 to 1 majority over his opponent, Laverne M. Boeve. Gysen received 12,990 and Boeve, 5,647 on the basis of unofficial returns.

Other Republican incumbents nominated were Prosecuting Attorney James W. Bussard, 12,659; County Clerk Harris Nieusma, 14,575; County Treasurer Fred Den Herder, 15,008; Register of Deeds Robert J. Kammeraad, 14,918, and County Surveyor Charles De Witt, 14,374.

Democratic nominees, none of whom were opposed, are Albert J. Russell, prosecuting attorney, 2,273; Burlie N. Dodge, sheriff, 2,264; county clerk, Dolores M. Hall, 2,265; register of deeds, Jay A. Wabeke, 2,274; Peter Van Eyck, 2,269; county surveyor, William J. Duga, 2,282.

Gov. George Romney led the county ticket, totaling 15,907 to 2,201 for his opponent, George Higgins. The unopposed Democrat nominee, Neil Staebler, received 2,488.

Ottawa voters were faithful to a native son, Edward A. Meany Jr. of Grand Haven, candidate for the Republican nomination for U. S. Senator. Meany polled 8,897 votes, to 3,567 for James F. O'Neill and 8,744 for Elly M. Peterson.

Ottawa voters also were loyal to Harold Volkema of Holland, candidate for the Republican nomination for state senator, who polled 10,395 to 5,543 for his opponent, incumbent Frederic Hilbert of Wayland.

The nonpartisan ballot for justices of the court of appeals was more evenly distributed. The unofficial Ottawa vote listed: Maurice Black, 4,058; Robert B. Burns, 4,935; Austin J. Doyle, 3,132; Fred W. Fitzgerald, 6,219; Donald E. Holbrook, 5,675; Robert G. Howlett, 4,512; Allan C. Miller, 4,592; Philip H. Mitchell, 4,369; Carlton H. Morris, 3,860; Andrew H. Wisti, 1,859.

## Laketown Vote Lively

Most Laketown township incumbents were renominated in Tuesday's primary election.

Supervisor John H. Scholten won over challenger Eugene Huyser, 349 to 276. Treasurer Fred Alterink polled 423 votes to 190 for his opponent, Herb Wiersma. Trustee William Ash won handily over its opponent, Jack Lamar, 368 to 248.

Unopposed were Clerk Don Blaauw who received 570 votes and justice of the peace Robert Lemson who received 536 votes.

Paul Drooger and Glen Elders led the race for constables with four to be nominated. Drooger received 456 and Elders 440. Others nominated were Richard Rhoda, 373, and Karl Slayer, 341. Constable Conrad Zeedyk who received 335 votes was defeated.

A special millage issue to improve gravel roads in the township won 215 to 105.

## Two Holland Hunters Receive Elk Licenses

LANSING — Cal Van Wieren and Ernest Overkamp both of Holland were among the 300 hunters who won licenses last week to hunt in Michigan's first elk season.

Van Wieren's permit is for Area One and Overkamp's permit is for Area Five. The five areas are located in north-central Michigan and the season is from Dec. 5-13.

The 300 were selected at random from 23,339 applicants. The others will start getting their \$25 back in about a week and the winners will get their licenses about Oct. 1.

## Three Cars Collide

Dennis Boeve, 15, of route 3, received a ticket from Holland police for disobeying a stop sign after his car was struck by another car driven by Michael Peerbolt, 19, of 312 West 19th St. at the intersection of Pine Ave. and 22nd St. at 8:17 p.m. The impact of the collision forced the Boeve car into the side of the third car parked along 22nd St. belonging to Gil Boerigter, route 1.

## Bulletin

Two Jackson Prison escapees were captured this afternoon east of Holland.

Richard Keenan, 25, Chicago, and Kenneth Arens, 24, Holland were taken into custody by local police assisted by Ottawa deputies and State Police.

Keenan was nabbed by Holland officer Russell Hopkins after a short chase on foot on Reed Ave. north of Eighth St. Arens was spotted a short time later, a few short blocks away, and captured.

The two men were in a car, reported stolen in Jackson Wednesday night, when they were observed speeding by Holland radar.

Hopkins and officers James Fairbanks gave chase. The escapees abandoned their car on Reed Ave., and both men jumped from their car and fled.

## Send Troopers To Saugatuck On Labor Day

ALLEGAN — Prosecuting Attorney E.L. Andrews said today that state and local law officers would be "ready to meet any situation" during the Labor Day weekend in Saugatuck.

In recent years the resort community has been the scene of near riots by college age youths on virtually every holiday from Memorial Day to the Labor Day week-end.

Announcing results of a meeting this week in Allegan of Saugatuck village officials and top state police officers of the fifth and sixth districts, Andrews said, "We expect no trouble, but if trouble should develop, officers will be prepared to end it... once and for all."

Saugatuck village president Lynn McGray, police chief Allen Wood, Captain Bion Hoag, commander of the State Police 5th District and his assistant, Lt. Fred O'Donnell, of Paw Paw, Captain Le Roy Hunt, Sixth District Commander, and Sergeant Fred Bushel, South Haven Post Commander, met with Andrews Monday to discuss measures to be taken during the weekend.

The group agreed to assign 60 uniformed state troopers, thirty patrol cars, all plain clothes officers in the two districts, and a mobile command post to Saugatuck to assist the villages part-time force of 8 uniformed officers.

Andrews said that steps to be taken to seal off the village at the first sign of trouble also were discussed.

## Four Persons Injured In Three-Car Collision

Four persons received minor injuries in a three-car collision at 17th St. and Ottawa Ave. Wednesday.

Dolores Meekhof, 24, of 37 East 10th St., and her children, Gary, 1, and Dorothy, 3, were taken to Holland Hospital for examination after the accident. The hospital found no serious injuries. Jack Emmons, 17, of Gobles, a passenger in another car, also reported minor injuries.

The four were injured when a car driven by Mrs. Meekhof struck another car driven by Harrison Hodge, 18, of Gobles. The Hodge car then veered into a third car owned by Jerald Soggers of 266 West 32nd St. which was parked near Ottawa Ave. Holland police gave Hodge a ticket for failing to yield the right of way.

## Albert Coster Dies in Hospital

Albert Coster, 56, of 284 Fairbanks Ave., died Friday at Holland Hospital. Mr. Coster had been in ill health for some time.

He was born in Holland and had lived here all his life. He formerly was a construction worker having worked for Building Contractors for 20 years and for the past four years he did maintenance work for Crampton Manufacturing Co. He was a member of the Eagle Lodge.

Two brothers, Bernard Coster and Walter Coster, both of Holland.

## Allegan Incumbents Victorious

ALLEGAN — All county incumbents won renomination in Tuesday's primary election, which saw the defeat of a special millage issue to provide a county medical facility.

The medical facility involved two votes. The vote to establish a sinking fund lost, 3,677 yes and 3,862 no. The vote to increase the millage lost 3,320 yes to 4,062 no. Both votes were for property owners only.

In the sheriff's race, Sheriff Robert J. Whitcomb of Allegan defeated Robert Schra of Holland, 5,658 to 3,663. Both are Republicans.

Prosecuting Attorney Erwin L. Andrews won over George A. Greig for the Republican nomination, 4,735 to 3,726. Drain Commissioner Oscar Zimmerman handily won over his opponent, Albert R. Reich, 5,918 to 2,447.

Democratic candidates had no opposition in the primary.

## City Gives Okay to Plan

City Council voted unanimously to vacate a portion of Dykema Ct. as requested in a petition from the Home Furnace Co., and also referred the problem of vehicle traffic on the court to City Manager Herb Holt for a report at "the earliest opportunity."

The petition to vacate the 13-foot wide strip between the Chesapeake and Ohio tracks and a point 258 feet west of Fairbanks Ave. had been tabled by council at their August 5 meeting following a heated public hearing.

As explained by Councilman Bertal Slaght on Wednesday night's debate the city had a three-part problem in relation to Dykema Ct. First, the Home Furnace Co. wanted to get the vacation to add to offices and build a parking lot for expanded operations.

At the same time residents of the area objected to the vacation because it eliminated a footpath which they and their children used to get to downtown Holland.

A third problem was that residents along the court objected to heavy traffic of the furnace company's trucks on the court.

Councilman Morris Peerbolt said during the discussion that although the interests of the residents of the area were of prime importance, he thought that the council should deal with one problem at a time. He moved that the vehicle traffic on the 15-foot wide court be considered in a report by the city manager, after the motion to vacate the court was approved.

Peerbolt suggested that the Home Furnace Co. might find some other exit for its trucks either to Seventh St. or directly to Fairbanks Ave.

The problem of pedestrian safety along Dykema Ct. and along Eighth St. in the eastern section of the city was referred to the Traffic and Safety Commission at the Aug. 5 meeting. Their report is expected at the next regular council meeting.

## Incumbent Root Defeats Lohman

ALLEGAN — State Rep. Edson V. Root of South Haven won renomination on the Republican ticket in the new 54th house district at Tuesday's primary. The 54th district consists of Allegan city and 12 Allegan county townships plus 18 townships in Van Buren county and South Haven.

Root received 4,620 votes, listing 3,489 in Van Buren county and 1,131 in Allegan county. Lohman, who formerly served Allegan county as state representative until two years ago, polled 3,759 votes, listing 953 votes in Van Buren county and 2,806 votes in Allegan county.

The Democratic candidate, Jules M. Servenski, received 1,709 votes with 1,107 in Van Buren county and 602 in Allegan county.

## Kazmir Potoski, 68, Succumbs at Home

Kazmir Potoski, 68, of 166 East Seventh St. died Thursday at his home. Mr. Potoski has been a Holland resident for the past 12 years.

## Park Township Elects Officers

Gordon Van Putten was elected justice of the peace and four constables were elected in Park Township in the primary election Monday while all of the other incumbents were returned to office.

Van Putten polled 367 votes for the four-year term while Marjorie De Feyter had 293 votes. Elected constables were incumbents Arnold De Feyter, 546 and Stanley Windemuller, 527. Also named constables were Carl Nies, 461 and John Mulder, 11. Also polling votes for constables were Gary Windemuller, 3 and Edwin Lake, 2.

Supervisor Herman Windemuller was re-elected as he polled 639 votes in the three precincts. Others re-elected were clerk, A. Drew Miles, 632; treasurer, Harvey Tinhoft, 649 and trustee, Warner De Leeuw, 610. All were elected to two-year terms.

A total of 436 votes were cast in the first precinct while 280 votes were cast in the second precinct and 264 in the third precinct.

## James J. Sturing Dies in Zeeland

Max Pine, 30, of Anderson, Ind., was driving the rig which belongs to the Dieckbrader Trucking Co. The truck rolled over about 12 feet from the road. He was treated and released for multiple bruises at Holland Hospital.

## Ask Windmill Be Shipped To Local Port

The efforts of the Windmill Committee to have Holland's new windmill brought into Holland Harbor instead of Muskegon took another stride toward success today.

Mayor Nelson Bosman has sent a letter to the Orange Lines in The Netherlands, pointing out that Holland Harbor is adequate and safe.

The mayor included documents attesting to channel depth and to the use of Holland Harbor by ships comparable in size to the Prins Willem which is bringing the mill from Rotterdam.

"As Mayor, I am taking the liberty of writing to you directly to emphasize the extreme importance to us, the community, and the program to have the mill unloaded in Holland," Bosman wrote to G. J. de Jonckheere of the Orange Lines in Rotterdam. "I'm sure the interest is such that we could have a great celebration with all the children and townspeople participating."

Assurances of channel depth were contained in a letter from the Army Corps of Engineers. The letter was obtained by Seymour K. Padnos who acted for the committee in determining the capability of Holland Harbor to dock the Prins Willem.

Bosman also sent Jonckheere a copy of a bill of lading which shows that a gravel carrier drawing in excess of 19 ft. was docked last July 6. Boats of this size dock regularly in Holland.

A reply to Bosman's letter announcing the decision of the Orange Line is expected shortly. The Prins Willem is scheduled to sail from Rotterdam with Holland's windmill next week.

## Two Given Prison Terms

ALLEGAN — Mrs. Walter Guscinski, 55-year-old former Allegan County social welfare director accused of embezzling over \$50,000 in county funds, and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Sue Baker, were given prison terms Tuesday.

Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith imposed a 2-to-10-year term on Mrs. Guscinski to the Detroit House of Correction.

Mrs. Sue Baker, 32, of Dowagiac, was ordered to serve 2-to-5-years in the House of Correction with the minimum term recommended. She had been accused of forging and cashing checks involved in the swindle by her mother-in-law.

Mrs. Guscinski was arrested July 14 and at the time said "she was tired of seeing welfare recipients cheat and simply decided to take some herself," according to Allegan County Prosecutor E. L. Andrews.

## Holland Township Nominates Constables

The only township race in Holland township in Tuesday's primary was for constable with six candidates seeking four positions.

Ronald Westenbroek led with 899 votes and Lester M. Timmer was second with 758, according to unofficial tallies. Also winning nomination were Norman Kamps, 679, and Norman Fynewer, 617. Other candidates were Robert W. Baker, 614, and Richard D. Hansen, 605.

## Council Sets Hearings

City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night authorized City Attorney Gordon Cunningham to draw up an amendment to the city ordinance to eliminate the necessity of council approval on moving a building from inside to outside of the city limits.

If approved this amendment would make it possible for moving buildings outside of Holland by simply getting a moving permit.

Public hearings on 11 special assessment rolls for water mains, 10 for sanitary sewers and on a special assessment role for Wildwood Drain were set for Sept. 23 at 7:30 p.m. in the council room. The council will review the rolls, and listen to objections to them at the hearings.

The council voted to have plans drawn up for the construction of a water main in 33rd St. from Columbia Ave. east to the end of the street, but referred another proposal for a water main in 16th St. to the Board of Public Works.

The board was instructed by council to work out a plan for the 16th St. water main with Harold Plaggenmeyer of route 3. Plaggenmeyer spoke against the proposed main which would run from Hope Ave. to Waverly Rd. at a public hearing on the proposal.

The council also approved a low bid of \$1,633.24 made by John Kortman and Son for construction of about 5,836 square feet of sidewalk to be laid in the city.

Approval was given by council on a resolution that installation of sanitary sewer stubs built by the city be charged completely to the property owners. The charge of the stubs which connect sewer lines to resident's sewer systems will be added to the fall city tax bills.

Council also approved two applications from the Don Brink Construction Co. One permits the company to move a garage from 29 East Ninth St. to M-40 outside of the city. The other, grants permission for the company to move an office display building from 960 East 24th St. to the rear of Kenwood Heights subdivision on East 32nd St.

A new plat known as the Bellwood Addition presented by John Keuning was approved by the council, and a request by the United Fund for permission to put up cardboard posters on light pole brackets and a 12-foot high thermometer was granted.

## Two Persons Escape Injury in Accident

Netta Brewer, 37, of West Ridge, Ark., and her daughter, Lande Brewer, 15, were released from Holland Hospital Friday afternoon after x-rays showed that they had received no serious injuries in an earlier auto accident.

They were taken to the hospital after a car in which they were riding was struck in the rear by another car driven by Dorothy Bennett, 55, of 168 South Division St. on River Ave. at its intersection with Pine Ave. at 12:56 p.m. Friday. Edgard Brewer, 42, of West Ridge, Ark., was the driver of the other car.

Holland police gave Mrs. Bennett a ticket for failing to maintain an assured clear distance.

## Red Cross Gray Ladies Assist at Grand Rapids

## Incumbent Van Til Defeated

One incumbent was renominated and two incumbents were defeated in state house and senate races affecting the local area in Tuesday's election.

State Rep. James S. Farnsworth of Plainwell won over State Rep. Riemer Van Til of



Holland in a spirited race in the 55th house district made up of parts of Ottawa, Allegan and Barry counties. Two others also were in the race for the Republican nomination.

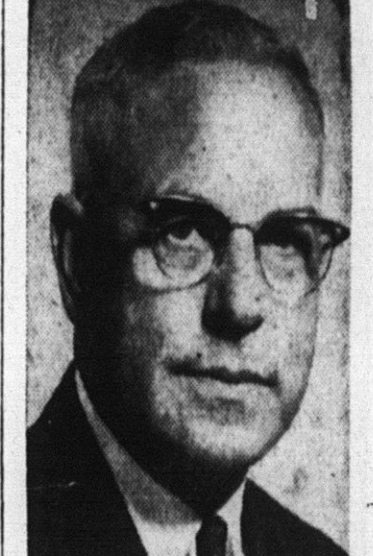
Harold J. Volkema, Holland councilman, defeated State Sen. Frederic Hilbert of Wayland for the Republican nomination in the 23rd district consisting of the counties of Ottawa, Allegan and Van Buren, plus one township in Barry county.

In the 95th state district in Ottawa county, Melvin De Stigter of Hudsonville emerged as leader in a field of five seeking the Republican nomination. The 95th district takes in all of Ottawa county except Holland city and the townships of Jamestown and Zeeland.

In the 55th district, Farnsworth polled 5,501 votes, listing 1,637 in Ottawa, 3,170 in Allegan and 694 in Barry.

Van Til received a total of 4,500 votes, listing 2,926 in Ottawa, 1,457 in Allegan and 117 in Barry county.

There were two other Republican candidates, Peter De Kraker receiving 943 votes, listing 521 in Ottawa, 393 in Allegan and 29 in Barry, and Raymond Wisniewski receiving 725, listing 131 in Ottawa, 280 in Allegan and 314 in Barry. The unopposed Democratic candi-



date, Ralph E. Richman of Holland, received 1,685 votes, listing 605 in Ottawa, 788 in Allegan and 292 in Barry.

Volkema polled 15,485 votes, listing 10,395 in Ottawa, 3,610 in Allegan, 1,460 in Van Buren and 20 in Barry. Sen. Hilbert received 12,933 votes, listing 5,543 in Ottawa, 4,941 in Allegan, 2,384 in Van Buren and 66 in Barry. The Democratic candidate, Charles C. Wickett who was unopposed received 4,658 votes, listing 2,148 in Ottawa, 1,403 in Allegan, 1,074 in Van Buren and 33 in Barry.

Red Barn Favorite Bruce Hall displayed his mastery of situation comedy as the urbane "older man" who could make the most of clever lines, pauses and gestures. Pretty Elizabeth Lee was an engaging Patty O'Neil and James Mitchell perhaps did his best role to date as the young architect. These talented younger members of the company have come a long way in developing their talents, but still have further to go to match Old Pro Bruce Hall. Burt Breazeale appeared briefly as the Irish cop father of Patty.

A welcome addition was the second act appearance of Arf, Bruce Hall's gorgeous Boxer. Arf threatened to steal the show, standing immobile in judgment of the hilarious situations developing among stupid humans far beneath him.

As is usual in a Dyas production, the action moved smoothly and the timing, particularly in the case of Bruce Hall, was superb. An attractive set of the architect's apartment was designed by James Jerkatis. Lighting by Dan Hungerford was effective.

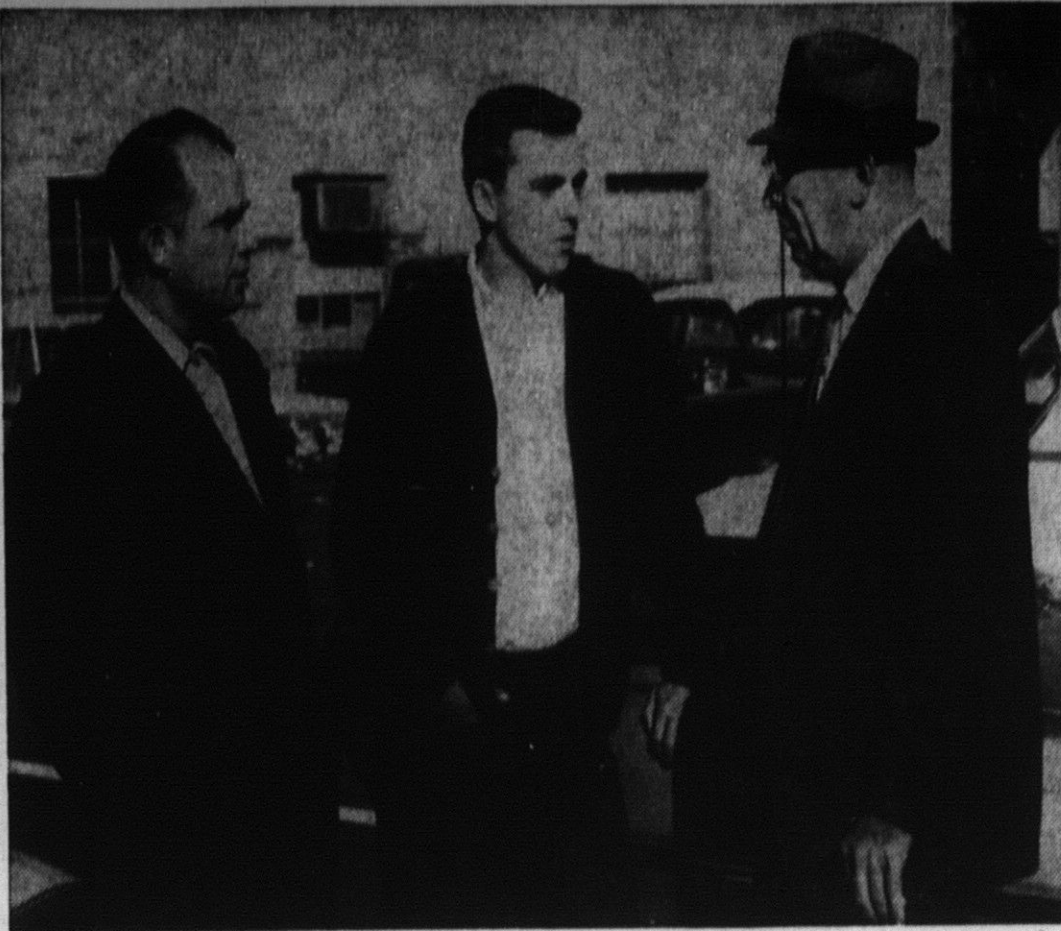

Recent figures received from the DHIA Center at MSU indicate that two good cows are worth far more than four poor cows. Cows producing at 8,600 lbs. produces: 8,600 lbs. milk, 328 lbs. fat, \$351 value of product, \$166 feed cost, \$185 returns over feed.

Cow producing at 13,800 lbs. milk produces: 13,800 lbs. milk, 519 lbs. fat, \$565 value of product, \$206 cost, \$360 returns over feed.

Four cows at 8,600 lbs. produces \$34,400 lbs. milk, 1,312 lbs. fat, \$1,404 value of product, \$664 feed cost \$740 returns over feed cost.

Two good cows produce 7,000 lbs. less milk, 300 lbs. less fat, but return as much over feed cost as four poor cows.

Good corn silage is made from corn that produces a high yield of grain. The crop should be ensiled when the grain has reached a hard-dough stage of maturity. Ensiling at the later stages of maturity results in the maximum yield of grain in the silage and produces a dryer silage. Cattle consume more dry matter and produce more milk from silages that contain more than 30 per cent dry matter.

Corn silage made at the hard-dough stage will contain about 33 per cent dry matter. Fine chopping is desirable to insure good packing and break the grain kernels. Silages harvested in the "Milky" soft-dough stage will contain about 25 per cent or less dry matter and result in excessive seepage from the silo and lower consumption by cattle.

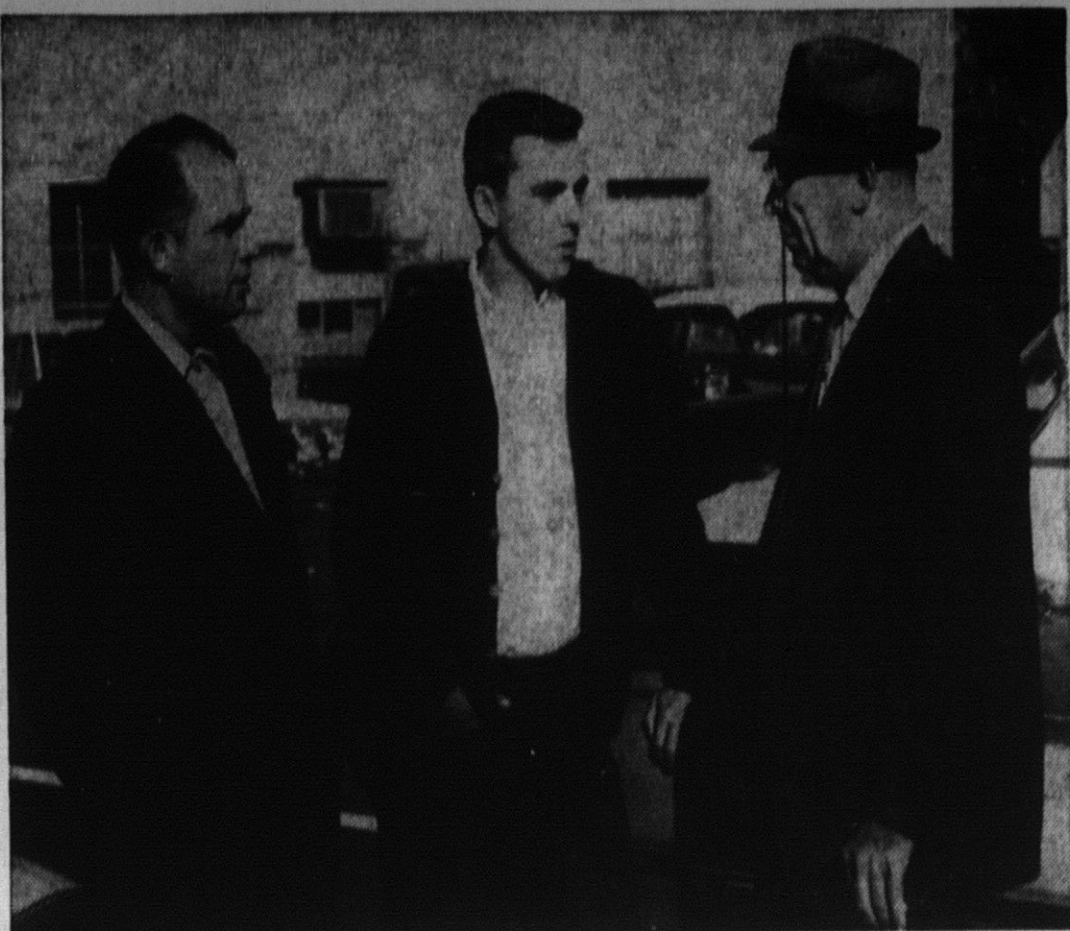

## Ottawa County Farm News

By Richard Machiele  
County Extension Director

This past week we had a real treat in having Forrest Strong spend a day with us in the county. Dr. Strong (now retired) served 40 years in the Michigan State University Plant Pathology Department and his experiences have dealt with shade tree diseases.

We made a number of calls regarding problem trees, particularly maples, and found verticillium wilt disease in a few cases, also dry soil conditions were very prevalent in tree root areas causing poor growth and defoliation, and many of the older maples had outgrown their environment and could no longer support vigorous growth because of insufficient moisture and soil nutrients.

In some cases there was packing of soil over the root area; severe damage to many trees because of snow removal salts, and the application of waste oil to driveways accounted for many conditions. Lawn mower scars caused injury to trunks of young trees and this result-

ed in poor vigor; the use of weed and brush killers caused dying of many trees.

We are pointing out these things because during the past season we have received a tremendous number of calls on the poor condition of shade trees. Some of these conditions can be remedied if care is used in application of salt, oil and weed killers. Some can be prevented by proper watering and lawn mowing where young trees are involved.

A good remedy for a tree not doing too well is to apply a lot of water, use a good nitrogen fertilizer during the growing season and use an application of fertilizer after leaf fall - preferably by applying it in holes punched about 2 feet apart, beneath the tree, and then soaking with water prior to winter.

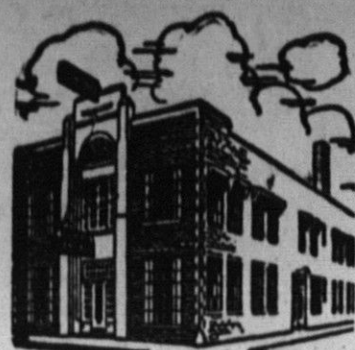

## "GO BACK TO SCHOOL"

This is the time of the year  
when a number of young people  
will have to make a decision  
whether or not to continue their  
work at the high school level.  
We don't think this is a decision  
that should be made lightly.  
It involves not just the immedi-  
ate years, but the whole of life.  
We checked some information  
that could cast some light on the  
problem.

The Department of Labor re-  
ports that of eighty-five jobs  
available to young people, sixty-  
two required a high school diplo-  
ma. This doesn't mean that  
employers expect that all their  
employees in these categories  
must have some academic or  
classical background, but it  
does mean something basic. If  
a student has been unable to  
adjust to his high school tasks,  
his teachers, and his fellow  
students, there is a real ques-  
tion whether or not he will be  
able to adjust to the demands  
of his employer. And the em-  
ployer isn't sure that he will  
want to place a risk on this kind  
of a young person.

In another report from the  
Department of Labor we are told  
that in the decade 1960-1970,  
which is almost one-half over,  
the opportunities for unskilled  
workers will remain static, that  
for farmers and farm workers  
will decrease by 17 per cent.  
On the other hand the greatest  
percentage increase will come  
in the category of professional  
and technical, clerical and sales,  
service workers, and skilled  
workers. The first four years  
of this decade have already in-  
dicated the correctness of these  
figures.

As we said at the beginning,  
hundreds of young people must  
make a decision at this time and  
it would be wise for them to  
take a good look at what the  
Department of Labor has to say  
about their chances for future  
employment.

Young people should give edu-  
cation a real priority in these  
formative years. The kind of  
employment that will be avail-  
able in their lifetime will in-  
sist on education.

Sunday School  
Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 6  
Leaders for Troubled Times  
Judges 2:11, 14-23  
By C. P. Dame

In this series of lessons we  
have but one lesson from the  
Book of Joshua and one from  
the Book of Judges. The death  
of Joshua left the nation with  
no great leader. Canaan was  
not wholly conquered. The  
people who remained were idol-  
aters who misled the Hebrews  
who often proved to be faith-  
less.

I. Faithlessness to God costs.  
God hates it.

The generation of Hebrews  
that had fought under Joshua  
and conquered the country, at  
least in part, died. The new  
generation "did not know the  
Lord or the work which He had  
done for Israel." They did not  
know God from personal expe-  
rience.

One generation suffers from  
a depression or a war and the  
following generation knows but  
little about them. "And the  
children of Israel did evil in the  
sight of the Lord and served  
the Baals." In short they for-  
sook the Lord who had brought  
them out of Egypt and wor-  
shipped and served idols.

This was contrary to the Law  
of God which they had prom-  
ised to obey. Baalim is the  
plural of Baal, the chief god of  
Canaan, the god of fertility, the  
male god, while Ashtaroth was  
the female goddess.

The Canaanite farmers wor-  
shipped these gods in order to  
get good crops. Various sex  
rites were involved in this  
worship. The worship of Baal  
was demoralizing.

The Lord gave the people  
over to "plunderers who plun-  
dered them." The results were  
bad for the Israelites and  
"they were in sore straits."  
Faithlessness to God proves ex-  
pensive to families, persons,  
nations.

Not a few church members  
are faithless to their vows.  
Why?

II. God calls leaders called  
judges. The nation's sin was  
followed by punishment and  
then repentance turned the na-  
tion to God who then delivered  
them by raising up judges for  
them. For a time, while the  
judges ruled, the people served  
the Lord in a measure, but af-  
ter the death of the judge the  
people fell for idolatry again.

When we look at the list of  
the judges we note that they  
were not all high-grade men.  
Evidently the Lord used the  
best He could get. The fact to  
remember is that God used  
them. And remember this too,  
God is still using sinners.

Strong leadership has made  
itself felt either for good or for  
evil. The Church and the Na-  
tion need strong godly men and  
women.

III. Faithlessness angers God.  
When God saw that His people  
were faithless and fickle He got  
angry at them. If faithlessness  
angered God in times past we  
can rest assured that faithless-  
ness angers Him today too.

The Israelites forgot the cov-  
enant they had made with God.  
There are covenant-breakers in  
our churches today. The Israel-  
ites should have taught the  
Canaanites the way of the Lord  
and how to live clean and hap-  
py lives. Instead of that, the  
Israelites yielded to the tempta-  
tions of the idolaters.

The Israelites had a superior  
religion but they yielded to the  
corrupt religion of the Canaan-  
ites and thus showed what were  
the desires of their hearts. The  
ungodly test the godly in more  
ways than one today.

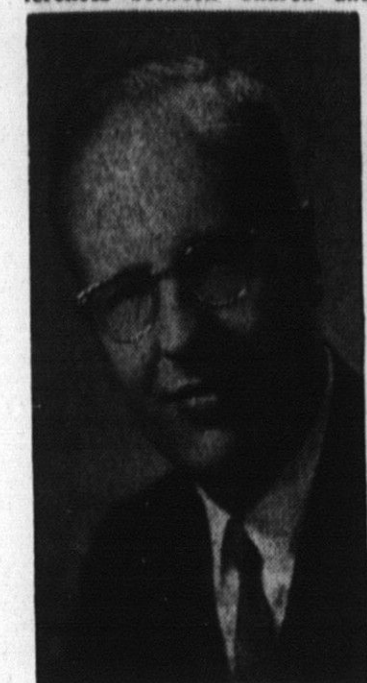
## Views From The Campus

Are Protestant Christians interested in higher education? Are they really determined to support it? These are live questions on any Church-related college campus today. We need to know the truth on this matter, for the very existence of the Church-related college is at stake.

How is it that, in the history of American education, institutions of higher learning established by the Church have tended to slip away from her interest and influence? Has it been because of theological differences between Church and

College? I think not. Rather, those institutions have come under the support of other agencies through a basic indifference of the Church toward education.

How can we account for that indifference? Shall we point to the "other-worldliness" of the Church, the tendency it may have to view the Gospel as merely an escape offered the faithful from the world we know to a better one we shall enter at death? Shall we point to ecclesiastical pre-occupation with the right ordering of doctrine to the exclusion of man's everyday practice in community, nation, and world? Or is the source of the Church's indifference to education the result of a pre-occupation with feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and providing a good program of community recreation?

One wonders whether the Church today has any appreciation for higher education. Let me emphasize that it is education I am writing about. Some Church-related colleges obtain support not by appealing to the values of education, but by assuring their constituency that the students in attendance at those colleges will receive a good, solid, sectarian indoctrination. Others obtain support by circumscribing their students' social life so strictly that it would be (theoretically) impossible for Jane and her friends to do at that college what they could easily do at the state university.

But neither of these approaches shows a genuine concern for education on the part of the Church. The one approach manifests concern for right belief in theological matters; the other bases its claim to Christian witness on the enforcement of a moral code.

Is education then irrelevant to the work and witness of the Church? It will not be, and should not be, unless the Church chooses to have it so.

Education is the process of human life itself, developing in breadth of interest, depth of understanding, and precision of analysis and technology. The college provides the means whereby that experience may be realized in depth and intensity. The Church in higher education need have no ulterior motives for its concern to aid Christians in providing them opportunity to understand their world. This is not the whole, or only, work of the Church to be sure; but it is a legitimate function.

Education is the experience of the vastness of the universe and the fullness of life. Does the Church want to separate itself from the distinctively human adventure? Does it want to increasingly narrow its sights? Or will it rather — and hopefully — participate in that venture which leads to the life abundant?

The Church-related college still offers students and faculty a unique experience in higher education. It is the opportunity for Christian community in an educational setting. That opportunity can be appropriated to the extent that two factors prevail: (1) That the Church make definite effort to establish such a community in higher education by encouraging its sons and daughters to attend the Church-related colleges; (2) That the faculties of such colleges be people of Christian commitment who feel no shame at admitting their

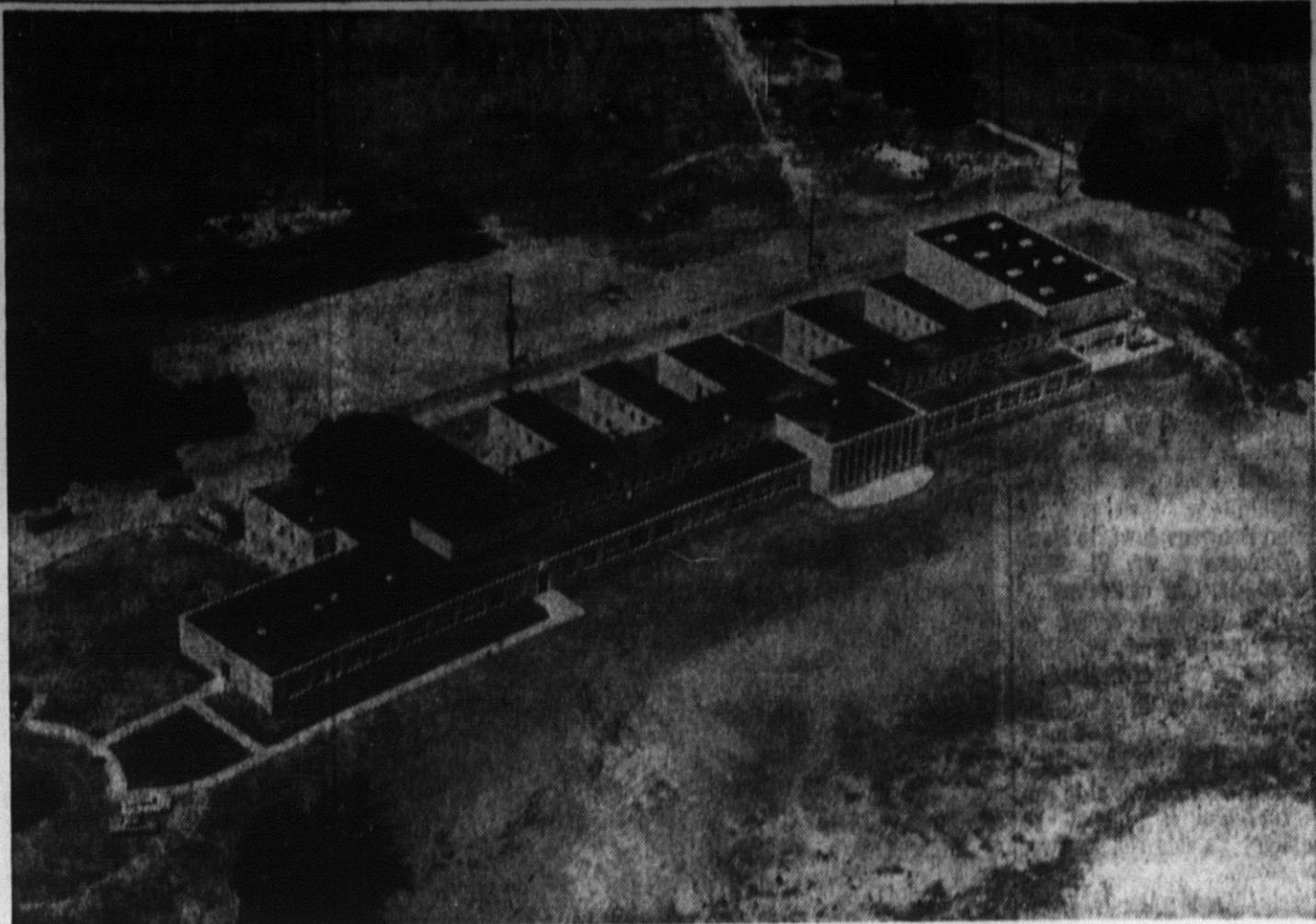

## New Runway Is Opened

Park Township Airport Tuesday officially opened its new 3,001-foot hardtop runway.

In ceremonies held at the airport this morning, Park Township Supervisor Herman Windemuller cut the ribbon officially opening the new runway. Within minutes after ribbon cutting, a twin-engine plane owned by Ray W. Herrick became the first plane to use the airport's new facility.

Attending today's ceremony were Herrick, one of the backers of the Park Township Airport improvement project, airport officials, Park and Holland Township officials, representatives of the Holland Chamber of Commerce, and Zeeland Mayor Frank Hoogland.

Officials explained that the runway improvement was only the first phase of projected airport improvements. It represents the greatest single improvement since the airport opened in 1939.

Plans also call for installing a

double row of medium intensity lights along the new runway.

Total cost of improvements is estimated at \$25,000. Park and Holland Township, and the city of Zeeland each contributed \$4,000 toward the cost of improvements. The remainder of the total cost came mainly from individuals and industries in the Holland area.

Herrick spoke briefly at the ceremony. Recalling the rapid strides in aviation during his own lifetime, Herrick said Park Township Airport would never be a busy airport handling commercial jets, but he said he envisioned an air taxi service in the near future linking Holland with nearby commercial fields.

Herrick praised the drive of township and airport officials in raising money for improvements and said, "I'm behind you all the way."

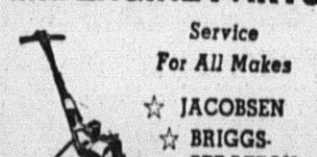

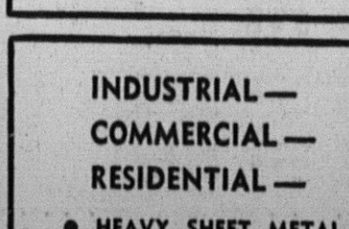
