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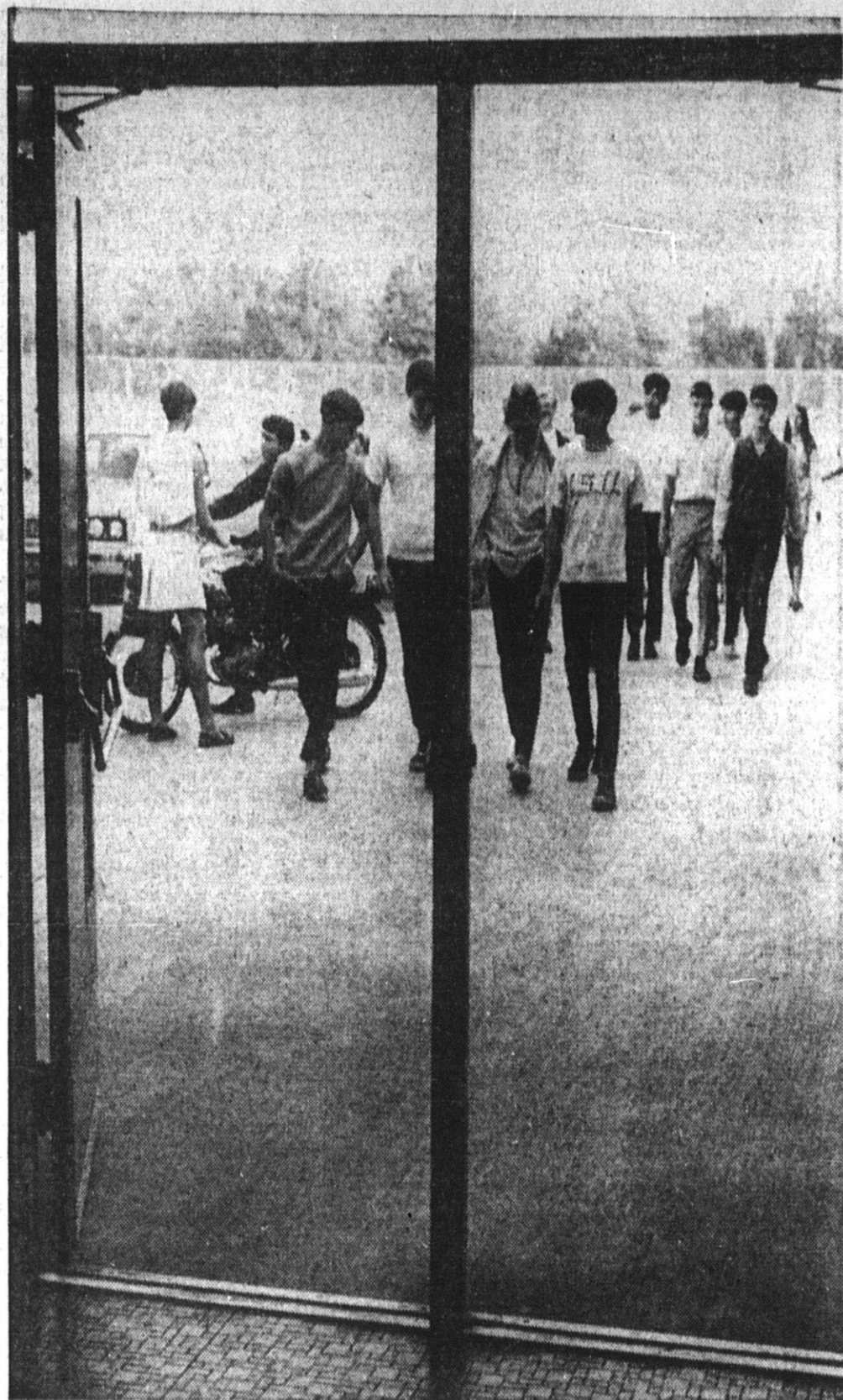

Holland Father of 14, One Son Killed in Crash

A Holland widower, the father of 14 children, and one of his sons were killed early Sunday when their car was struck head-on on the Blue Star Highway at 58th St. by another car while they were returning home from a drive-in movie at 1:16 a.m.

Killed were: Daniel Clark, 56, of 213 West 10th St., and his son, John, 14. Both died shortly after being transferred from Holland Hospital to St. Mary's

hospital, Grand Rapids. Death was due to head injuries.

Five other Clark children were injured, two critically. Most seriously injured was Michael, 12, who is in the intensive care unit at St. Mary's hospital, where he is listed in critical condition. He is suffering from head injuries.

Michael's sister, Ann Lisa, 15, is also in St. Mary's hospital. She is listed in fair condition, with head injuries.

Three other children, Deborah, 10, Julia, 11, and David, 8, are in Holland Hospital in satisfactory condition. Deborah received multiple fractures of the body and Julia suffered a severe blow to the chin causing her to lose a large number of teeth.

David is being held for observation of possible head injuries.

The crash left the surviving thirteen children parentless. Their mother died in 1960 after an illness.

Allegan sheriff's deputies who are investigating, said the Clark car was struck head-on by a car operated by Doris Mae Nordhoff, 38, of route 1, East Saugatuck.

Mrs. Nordhoff is in satisfactory condition at Holland Hospital with multiple abrasions, a severe laceration of the lower leg and a fractured right leg.

Mrs. Nordhoff, who was alone in her car, was headed south on the Blue Star highway and was in the process of turning onto 58th St., when her car collided head-on with the Clark car which was northbound on the Blue

Star highway, deputies said. Holland police assisted deputies in their investigation.

Mr. Clark was employed as a research chemist at Holland Suco Color Co.—for the past 25 years. His wife Mary died Oct. 4, 1960. He was a member of St. Francis de Sales Church and a Veteran of World War II.

Surviving are 13 children, Mrs. Roger (Mary Ellen) Zerbe of Chicago, Mrs. Daniel (Elsabeth) Wightman of Enid, Okla., Johanna, a member of the Peace Corp, Mrs. Richard (Kristin) Perry of Lansing, Lincoln R. of Enid, Okla., Margaret, Daniel E., Frances Irene, Anna Lisa, Michael I., Julianna, Debra L. and David J., all at home.

Also surviving are seven brothers and sisters, Mrs. John (Mary) Ford of Salem, N.H., John M., Julian A., David and Hamilton L. all of Chicago, Samuel I. of Kalamazoo, Mrs. Glenn (Elsabeth) Pierre of Arlington Heights, Ill.

John Dakin Clark would have been a ninth grader in E.E. Fell Junior High School this year. He was a member of St. Francis de Sales Church. Surviving are his brothers and sisters and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. John B. Dakin of Lansing.

West Ottawa Teachers Okay Master Contract

West Ottawa teachers have approved a master contract for the 1968-69 school year.

The vote taken at a special meeting Thursday night in West Ottawa High School was unanimous, according to Bruce E. Pearson, president of the West Ottawa Education Association and chief negotiator for the teachers.

Thursday's action culminates a series of negotiating sessions between the teachers' team and the Board of Education starting last February. The board approved the contract a week ago.

The new master contract calls for a salary schedule for teachers with bachelor's degrees starting at \$6,450 and ranging

in 12 steps to \$9,550, and master's degrees starting at \$6,900 mounting in 12 steps to \$10,000.

The contract also allows an additional \$110 per year per teacher, full or regular part-time, for insurance coverage.

The school year for West Ottawa district will start Tuesday, Sept. 3, with a conference day for teachers. Classes will meet Wednesday morning and building meetings are slated that afternoon. Thursday will be the first full day of school.

Parent-teacher conferences will be held in November, and the Christmas vacation starts Dec. 20 with classes resuming Jan. 6. Spring vacation will be held the week of March 31.

Holland's Oldest Citizen Dies at 101

John Hamilton Raven, 101, of 129 West 12th St., died at his home Tuesday evening. He would have been 102 next month.

Believed to be Holland's oldest citizen, Mr. Raven was born Oct. 1, 1866, in a log cabin near Hartford after his parents came from New York in an ox-drawn covered wagon to settle in the Michigan wilderness.

He came to Holland in 1890 and opened a jewelry store and for many years traveled throughout the United States as a jewelry salesman specializing in diamonds.

In 1892 as the new Holland City Bank (tower building) was nearing completion, Mr. Raven solicited donations totaling \$600 from public spirited citizens of Holland to purchase the original clock in the tower. He installed the clock and kept it in perfect running order for many years.

In 1920 Mr. Raven and his partner, the late John Kramer, built Colonial Theatre (now Park Theatre) and operated it for a number of years. Since 1928, he had been associated with his son, Lucien J. Raven, in the real estate business.

Mr. Raven was a member of Hope Reformed Church and was a former member of its men's club. He was a former member of the Realtor's Association and of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges.

7 Arraigned On Charges Of Narcotics

Arraignments were held Tuesday afternoon in Holland Municipal court for seven men arrested by Holland police and Federal narcotics agents in Holland in August.

Five of the men were bound over to appear in Ottawa Circuit court on Sept. 9. They are Greg Rios Jr., 21, of 88½ East 16th St., charged with illegal use of narcotics; Anthony Raffenaud, 22, of 118 West 15th St., sale of heroin; Manuel Sanceda, 30, of 403 West 22nd St., sale of marijuana; Hipolita Martinez, 38, of Grand Rapids, sale of narcotics; and David Gonzales, 40, of Rockford, sale of heroin.

Judge John Galien has taken a motion to dismiss charges against Sanceda and Norberto Puente, 28, of 168½ West 13th St., who are charged with conspiracy to violate narcotics laws.

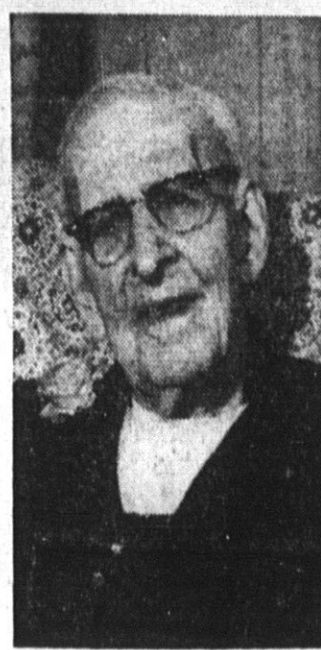
The hearing for Hector Ruiz, 31, of 144 East 21st St., charged with the sale of heroin was adjourned until a later date.

Three of the men, Raffenaud, Martinez and Sanceda were returned to the Ottawa County jail because they could not furnish bond. The other four men are released on bond.

Testimony in Tuesday's hearing revealed that a Federal agent working undercover had purchased heroin from members of the group. He also revealed that he was in the process of closing a deal for the purchase of \$1,000 worth of marijuana and cocaine, with one of the defendants, when his true identity was learned.

Bruce Van Voorst who heads the Newsweek bureau in Bonn, Germany, called his parents here by phone Thursday night after spending several days witnessing the Russian Invasion in Czechoslovakia.

Van Voorst and his wife, the former Marilyn Van Hekken of Holland, were in Moscow when the Czech invasion started and continued to Leningrad where they remained three days making connections to return home to Bonn.

Once at home, Van Voorst went immediately to the Czech border and on to Prague for several days. He managed to cross the border for home only a short time before it was closed. On a four-hour trip to the border he passed huge contingents of Russian tanks and equipment, he said.

It was the first word his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Van Voorst, received since the couple left for Russia two weeks ago.

Driver Killed In Car Crash In Spring Lake

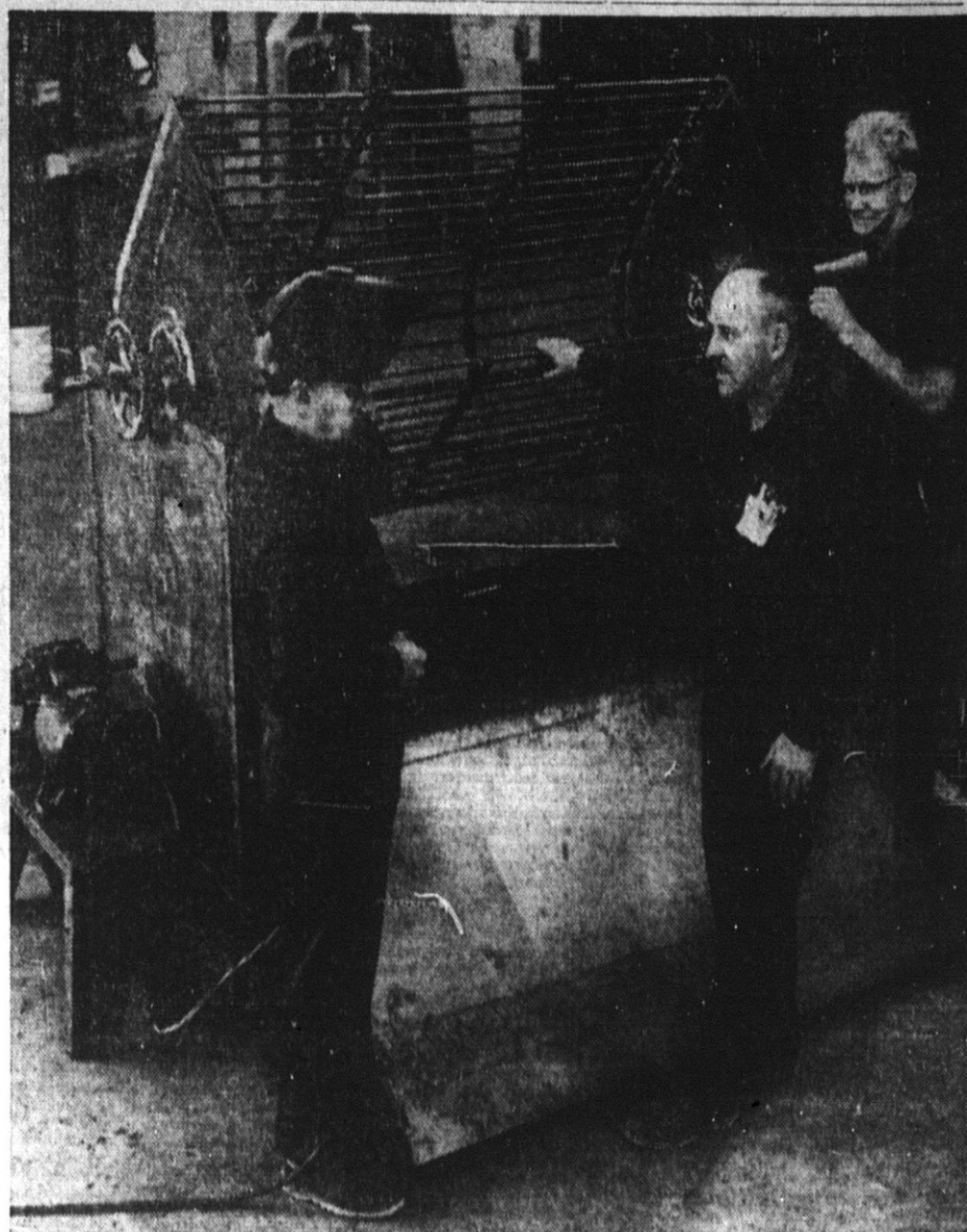
GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa county's 23rd traffic fatality of the year occurred at 3:10 a.m. Saturday when Peter Brown, 20, of 1512 Emerson St. NW, Grand Rapids, was fatally injured in a one-car crash on East Savidge St. in Spring Lake village.

It was the village's first traffic fatality since Oct. 6, 1964.

Police said the car in which Brown was riding alone crossed the centerline at an apparent high rate of speed, jumped the curb and traveled 67 feet before hitting a tree and overturning.

State police and a wrecking crew assisted Spring Lake village police in extricating the body which was pinned in the wreckage. Boss was dead on arrival at North Ottawa Community Hospital.

Rotisserie All Set For Big Ox Roast

Plans are progressing for Holland's third annual community ox roast a week from today city ox roast Saturday city salutes Hope College again emphasizing the friendly ties through the years.

For the first time in many years, a whole carcass of prime beef will be roasted to provide succulent sandwiches for supper to be served from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Dick Machiele, county extension agricultural agent for Ottawa county, who has supervised roasting operations at the previous two picnics, has exchanged the two calves which have grown up on Windmill Island this year for a 900-pound steer (prime beef) which dressed out at 500 pounds.

A huge cradle-like rotisserie has been assembled at the warehouse of the street department, large enough to hold the entire carcass. The beef (in the cradle) will be pre-cooked at Bil-Mar in Borculo for some 18 hours at 190 degrees before the charcoal finale at Windmill Island Saturday. Bil-Mar, operated by Bill and Marve De Witt, is a turkey processing plant.

The rotisserie was assembled and welded by a team of street department employees headed by City Engineer Harold Derks using metal provided by the Padnos company. The 500-pound carcass will be secured inside with a grate like contrivance of similar design. After pre-cooking operations, the rotisserie will be taken to Windmill Island a week hence for the final barbecue over charcoal.

Machiele has arranged for a barbecue sauce to be used in

the final roasting in which the huge beef will turn one revolution per minute by means of a ¾ horsepower reduction drive.

The food service department at Hope College will assist in food preparations. City councilmen in white jackets will help serve sandwiches. Mayor Nelson Bosman who heads the picnic committee also is arranging for a few local butchers to assist with carving.

Also on the menu are baked beans, cole slaw, celery and carrot sticks, brownies and beverage. The park department is arranging for picnic tables and a tent in the area east of the posthouse which is Windmill Island's reception center.

Persons attending the ox roast will exchange their tickets at the Windmill Island gatehouse for the traditional visa to "the land of enchantment" so that they may have the souvenir treasured by many a traveler. The visa will be punched at the food line to assure one trip only. Ox roast tickets allow admittance to Windmill Island on that day only.

The event next Saturday coincides with the arrival of freshmen to Hope College for their first year of college life. Many will be accompanied by their parents who also are invited to participate.

A total of 3,500 tickets have been printed which are available at City Hall, Hope College and some local banks.

Mayor Bosman is assisted by Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf, City Auditor John Fonger, City Manager Herb Holt, Robert De Young, Bill Boyer and David Van Dellen of Hope College, and Machiele.

Preparations On the Move For Ox Roast

More than 800 tickets have been sold for the third annual Community Ox Roast Saturday at Windmill Island in which the city salutes Hope College. A total of 3,500 tickets have been printed and attendance is limited to that number.

Mayor Nelson Bosman heads the arrangements committee and Dick Machiele, county agricultural agent, is supervising the roasting of prime beef for the event. An entire carcass is being pre-cooked at Bil-Mar prior to final roasting Saturday with charcoal and barbecue sauce in a special rotisserie designed by the engineering department. In addition, other beef is being roasted to provide a full 750 pounds of roasted prime beef.

Two butchers, Roy Past and Almer Tanis, will carve the carcass and City Councilmen will assist in further carving and serving from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Robert De Bruyn of Zeeland is furnishing all fresh produce and Heinz is providing pickles and relishes. The Hope College food service will have a crew of 30 to 40 to assist with food preparation and serving much like Village Square but without takeouts.

Holland-Suco is arranging for the 70 residents of Resthaven to attend the event and the Salvation Army is providing transportation.

Allegan Board Rejects Sunday Liquor Sales

ALLEGAN — By a 19-19 tie vote, Allegan county supervisors Tuesday again turned down Sunday liquor sales for Allegan county.

It was the second time, the measure had been turned down in a tie vote. The first time the vote was 17-17.

This was the last day such action could be taken by the board. It was pointed out that proponents of Sunday liquor sales can petition for a county-wide referendum.

Nab Trio for Sniffing Glue

GRAND HAVEN — Paul Neiberger, 18, Grand Rapids, paid \$10 fine and \$4.70 costs in Grand Haven Municipal Court Tuesday after pleading guilty to charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and glue sniffing.

Neiberger and a 15-year-old youth and a 13-year-old girl were apprehended by state police in Gand Haven state park Saturday night after the park manager called police in connection with a strange odor coming from a trailer in the park. Police confiscated seven tubes of glue and four paper bags.

A ten-day sentence was suspended for the Grand Rapids youth. The two minors were turned over to their parents.

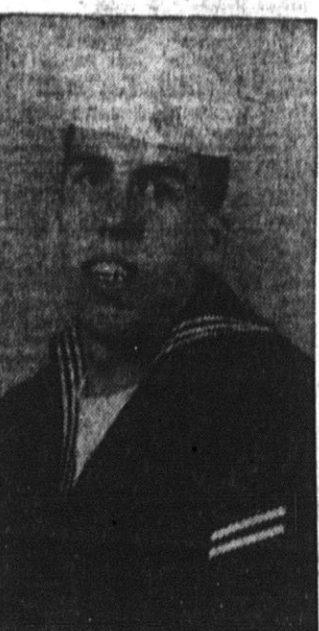

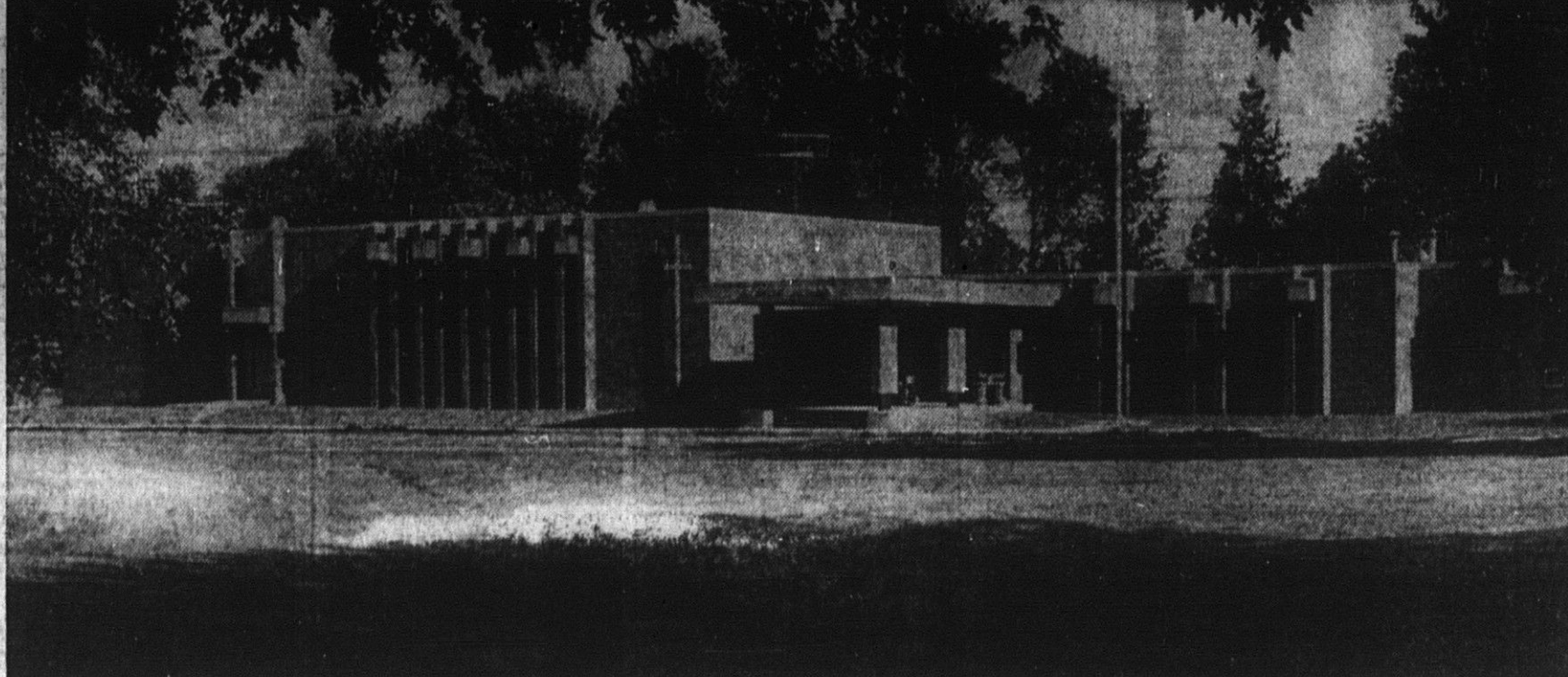

St. Peter's School Opens in Douglas

DOUGLAS — The new St. Peter's Catholic Elementary School in Douglas opened its doors to 115 students Wednesday.

Adjacent to St. Peter's Catholic Church on St. Peter's Dr., the \$400,000 complex of 12 classrooms, library, administrative offices, general purpose hall and kitchen replaces the old classroom building on Center St. in downtown Douglas. The cost for the new school includes all the furnishings.

The old school, built in 1951 to accommodate 90 students, will be used to house Nuns until sold, said the Rev. Leo Rosloniec, church pastor.

The new building, designed by Zeeland architect George Granged, was built on open land overlooking Kalamazoo Lake. Construction started dur-

ing July, 1967 and was unhampered by the carpenters strike.

Measuring 48 feet wide and 105 feet long including the kitchen area, the all purpose hall will be used for dinners, as a lunch room, for student activities and has provisions for a portable stage.

Staffed by Sister David Paul, principal and Sisters Dorothy and Marie, each will teach two of the grades one through six. The school operates its own busses and also uses public school busses to bring children in from Pullman, Ganges, Fennville, Glenn, Bravo, Saugatuck and Douglas.

Dyke and Son of Holland were the general contractors. De Fouw Electric Co. of Holland was the electrical contractor and Hertel of Grand Rapids was the plumbing contractor.

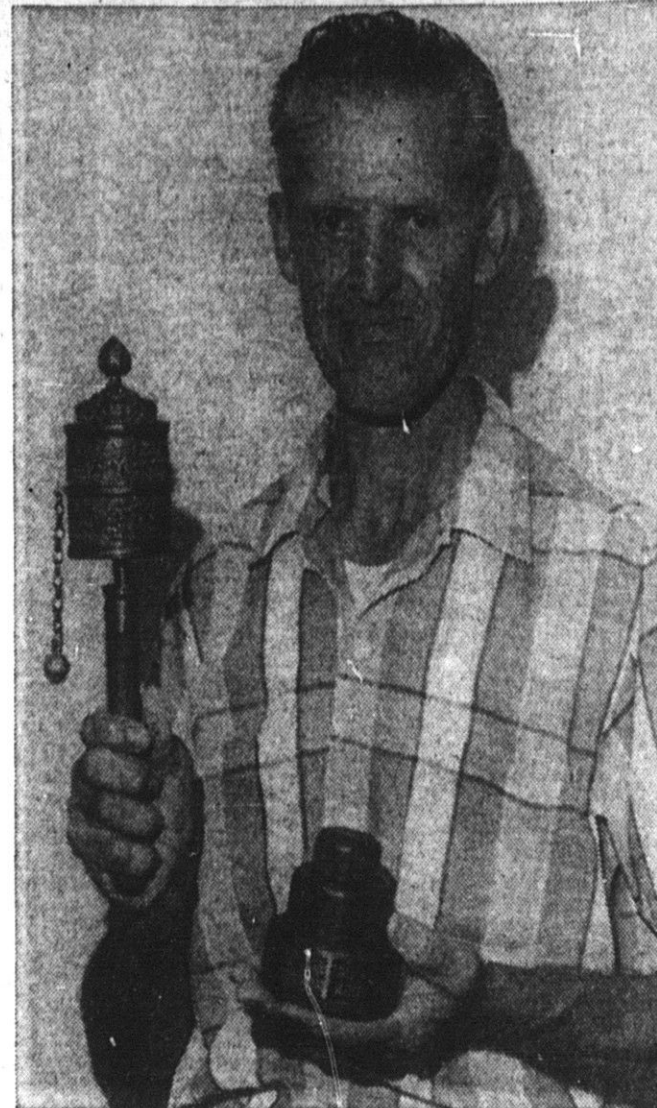

Joseph Lepo Gets Tibetan Prayer Wheel

After two years and several letters, Joseph S. Lepo of 495 Julius St., is now the proud owner of a Tibetan prayer wheel. After seeing a picture of a prayer wheel in the National Geographic magazine Lepo decided he would like one for himself but ran into great difficulty in his quest for one.

He began with a letter to the magazine but they could not help him locate a prayer wheel. He then discovered that such items can not cross the Tibet border, but learned that the Tibetan Refugee Self Help Center in Darjeeling, India, could produce a hand carved copper prayer wheel so Lepo immediately ordered one. Unfortunately, his order was lost in the mailing and Lepo was forced to reorder several months later.

He now has the wheel on a display stand in his home. The wheel is hand carved copper cylinder with a cover. Inside the cylinder is a roll of paper containing written prayers for Tibetan Buddhists. The entire thing is then mounted on a teak wood post handle and a chain and ball weight are attached to the cylinder.

When the prayer wheel is used in Tibet the Buddhist holds the handle and moves his wrist so that the ball and chain provide momentum to spin the cylinder. With each rotation of the wheel all the prayers on the roll inside have been offered to their god.

The Office of Tibet in New York City, in response to a letter from Lepo, said prayers on the roll may be such as "Hail, jewel of the Lotus" or "May the blessings of the body, speech and mind of all the saints and reincarnates (or gods) be received."

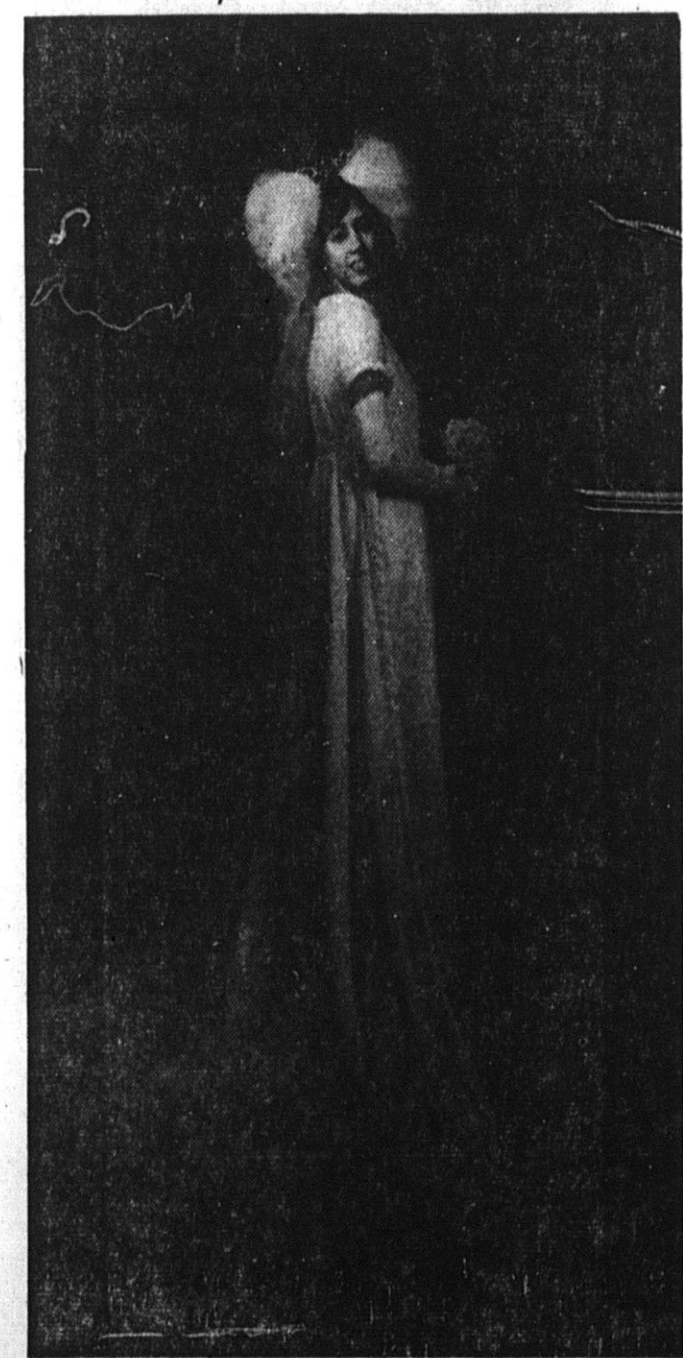

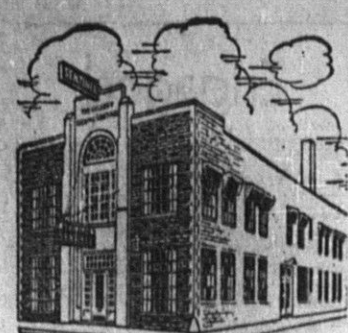

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THEY'RE OFF!

"They're off!" Now that the Democratic nominee is chosen, this traditional race-track cry could apply to the upcoming political horse race. We take our figure from the Republican nominee Mr. Nixon, who, after congratulating Humphrey, acknowledged to newsmen that Humphrey was a good campaigner and that the contest would be one "that goes down to the last wire."

As we sit in the stands surveying the scene, comparing Republican harmony with Democratic discord, some similarities with 1948 come to mind. Mr. Nixon is an "old pro" at politics, as was Gov. Dewey. As now, all appearances in 1948 indicated the country was ready for a change of administration. Gov. Dewey gave innocuous speeches with the air that the outcome was a foregone conclusion. Peppery Harry Truman kept plodding away until the last moment even in whistle-stop towns and, to the surprise of H. V. Kaltenborn and maybe even to himself, came under the wire first. Many dissident Democratic conventioners at the close of the convention averred the party had practically elected Mr. Nixon.

Whatever else one may think of Hubert Humphrey, one must acknowledge that he is never at a loss for words, and an extremely articulate and energetic campaigner. Whether or not in the short time remaining he can heal the deep divisions in his party is problematical. The one-line pledge in his acceptance speech indicating he will initiate new policies on Vietnam may give the pre-convention opponents and their supporters some hope for returning to the Democratic stables.

If 1968 is not to be a re-run of 1948, the Republicans of today will have to run hard all the way and the Democrats will need very soon to make some urgent repairs.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 8
Confession and Covenant
Nehemiah 8:1, 8; 9:32-38
By C. P. Dame

Many people feel that the church needs a renewal. It does, but mergers, church unions will not do it but the study of God's Word and confession of sin will get results. This lesson gives us pointers.

I. Our times need the knowledge of God's law. "And all the people gathered as one man into the street that was before the water gate." The crowd was composed of Jewish parents and children, who had gathered to hear the law of Moses read by Ezra the scribe and priest. This law they accepted as divine and deserving of obedience. It was read from early morning until midday. The law was most likely the book of Deuteronomy. Since it was written in Hebrew and the people spoke Aramaic, which the people had learned in Babylon, there was some translating to do.

The reading of the law stirred the consciences of the people for the people mourned and wept. The leaders told them to rejoice and eat and drink and share. When they learned that they had neglected keeping the Feast of the Tabernacles they observed it and reinstituted it into national life.

This was a feast of thanksgiving for the harvest and celebration of God's deliverance of the nation from the Egyptian bondage. The reading of the law got action. We as a nation need to be taught again that God wants His law to be obeyed.

II. Confession of sin is beneficial. Chapter 9 contains a long prayer of Ezra in which he tells how God blessed His people who were disobedient again and again. Ezra calls God "great and mighty and terrible," a phrase we seldom use but ought to recover. God had kept His part of the covenant but the people had acted wickedly and deserved punishment.

Ezra painted the situation in which the nation was at that time—they were slaves, dependent, paying taxes to a foreign power, which they hated to do, all on account of the nation's sins. They realized this and confessed their sins. Ezra was a leader for the times.

III. Rededication is helpful. Since the people realized that they had broken God's covenant they made a new one and "entered into a curse, and into an oath, to walk in God's law" (10:29) and each one said, "May I be cursed if I do not keep this oath."

Rededication is sometimes indefinite but in this instance the people pledged to some specific things: (1) to keep the law of Moses; (2) to stop intermarrying with the heathen; (3) to keep the sabbath; (4) to observe the sabbatical year every seventh year; (5) to pay the Temple tax and support its worship services which involved making the yearly offering of money and bringing in the first fruits as offerings and paying tithes to the Levites to put in the store-house of the Temple.

Confession of sin must be followed by action and a rededication is worthless if it does not lead to a greater obedience to God's law.

Dr. Lampen Witnesses Czech Invasion

An eye-witness report of the Russian invasion of Czechoslovakia last week is given in a letter to relatives in Holland from Dr. J. Oliver Lampen of Rutgers University who was attending a three-day Second International Symposium on Yeast Protoplasm at Brno, Czechoslovakia, located about 150 miles southeast of Prague near the Austrian border.

Dr. Lampen, former Holland man who is director of the Institute of Microbiology at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N. J., arrived in Prague and then in Brno Monday evening, Aug. 19, with no idea anything was brewing.

After a busy first-day conference on Tuesday he went to bed and was awakened at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday by a line of tanks and trucks with soldiers driving past the hotel.

He wrote: "I dressed and came downstairs to find a couple of hundred people standing around and watching tv which was actually showing some of the events in Prague. People were weeping, signing petitions supporting the government, and singing the National Anthem."

"The streets were crowded with people standing around with a dazed look. There also were two parades of people with Czech flags shouting 'Russians, go home!' As we went into the building for our meeting we heard shots — three young boys were killed in the nearby square. Also tanks charged a crowd and ran over several people."

"The meeting went on although everyone was distracted by what was going on. At noon the 'Free Radio' (which was still running from secret quarters even when we left Thurs-

day) had asked for one minute of silence as a protest. Most of the Czechs stood there with tears running down their cheeks."

"By noon today (Thursday) most of the meeting had been finished — they were pushing ahead of schedule — and Dr. Falcone of Austria decided to try to drive to Vienna. The border had been closed all day Wednesday but reopened Thursday morning. A number of cars had gone through and the Czechs advised us to leave."

"This morning about 20 of us from the meeting talked about 15 minutes with a member of the Brno central Communist committee who happened to be in the building. He said the committee had just met and voted a general strike for the next day as a protest against the Russians. Also many of the workers in Brno are apparently

around and there is a fair possibility of serious trouble there Friday."

"We had to drive out of town past some large Russian tanks and several bodies of troops. Falcone had a camera with telephoto lens and we managed to photograph some tanks. We reached the border which was guarded only by Czech and were let through with a very friendly greeting—and not even searched. Russian tanks had held the crossing during the morning but had moved to a nearby woods. It was a genuine relief to be in Austria."

Dr. Lampen who wrote the letter Thursday, Aug. 22, from a hotel in Wien, Austria, is the son of the late Prof. and Mrs. A. E. Lampen of Holland. A sister, Barbara, and a brother, Edgar, live in Holland. Dr. Lampen's family lives in Edison, N. J., near New Brunswick.

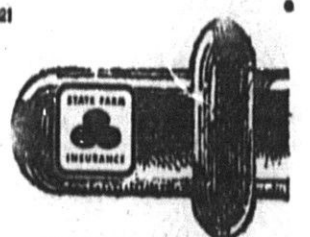

Lievense Says Record Catches Of Coho Seen

Record catches of coho and chinook salmon from the Great Lakes were forecast for Holland Rotary Club members Thursday noon when they held their regular meeting at the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club.

The predictions were made by Stanley Lievense, associated with the Special Services Division of the Michigan State Department of Conservation.

Lievense, a former Holland resident, said the present record weight for coho is approximately 30 lbs., and at the rate that coho are thriving in Great Lakes waters this record may be easily surpassed in the next year or two.

He also predicted chinook weighing from 50 to 100 pounds, may be taken from the Great Lakes in a relatively short time.

"What you have seen with the salmon program in the Great Lakes so far is just a scratch on the surface," he said. Wisconsin, Minnesota, New York, Ohio and Ontario are all planning coho planting programs in their Great Lakes waters, and salmon populations running well into the millions are foreseen.

As support for this program Lievense urged a favorable vote on the bonding program for Gov. George Romney's "clean water" conservation program which will appear on the ballot in the fall election.

Lievense showed a film account on the coho planting in Lake Michigan, starting with the arrival of a box of fish eggs from Oregon and following through to the first catches.

He said from this initial planting of fewer than 1,000,000 young fish, more than 300,000 adult fish were accounted for. He termed this a fantastic survival rate which promises the spectacular growth of the coho population.

Lievense was introduced by James Townsend. C. J. Skeetee presided.

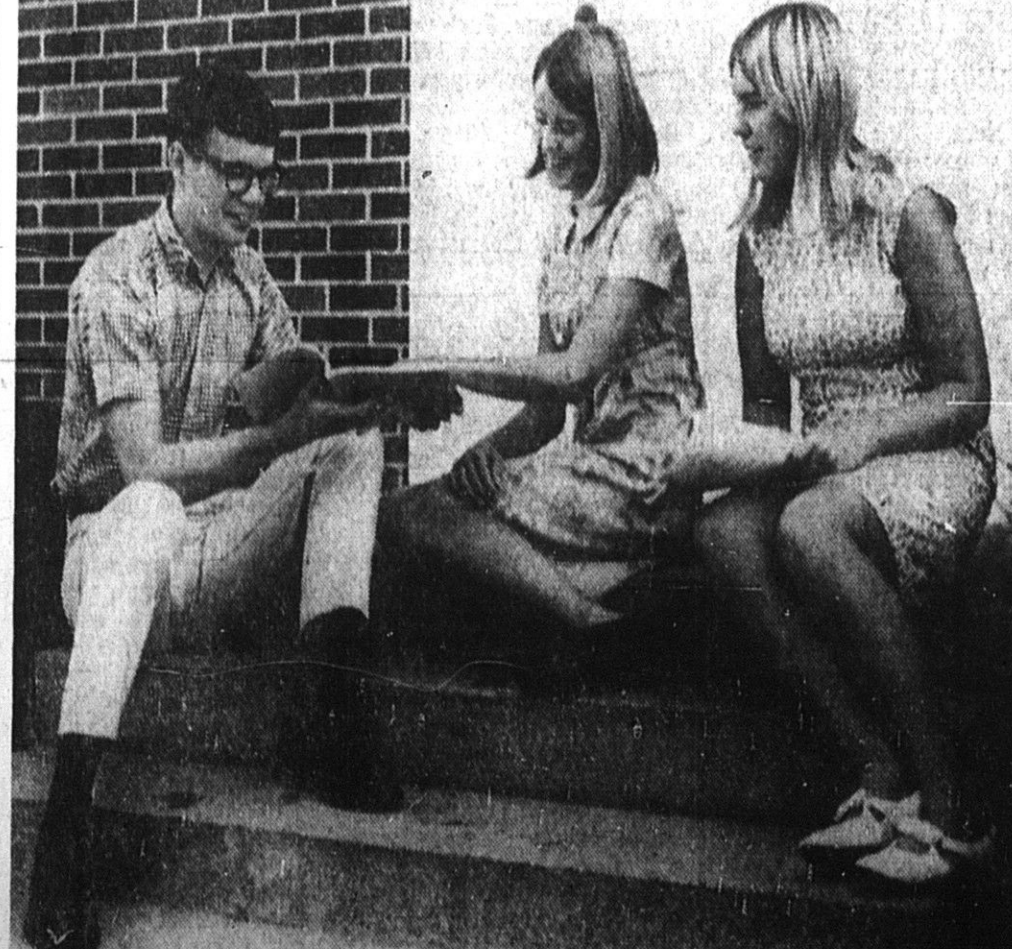

Hallacy Appointed To Council

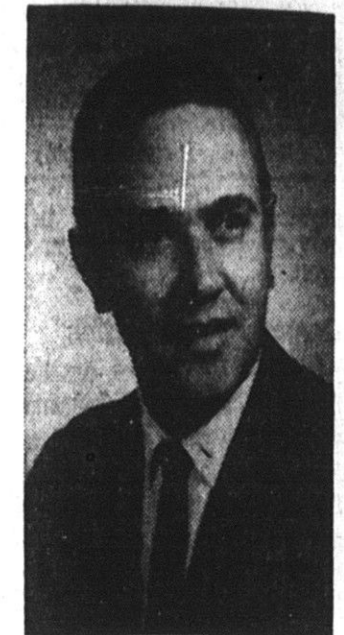
Lou Hallacy was appointed first ward councilman to succeed the late Bertal H. Slagh at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

Mayor Bosman presided at the brief meeting. Councilman Dykstra gave the invocation. All Councilmen were present.

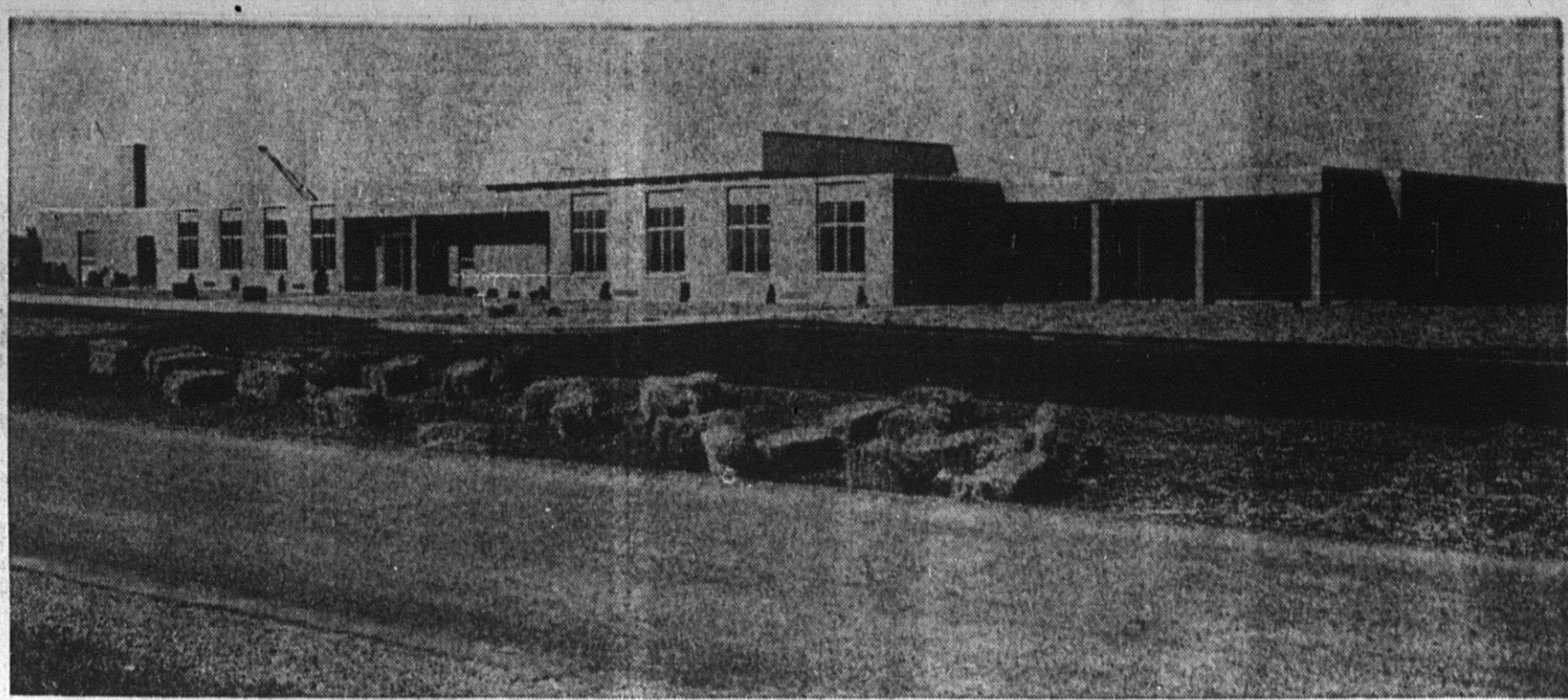

Blue Star Elementary Nearing Completion

Mrs. Glenn Albers, Hamilton elementary school coordinator, announced Wednesday that construction at Blue Star Elementary School will be completed so that school will start Monday, Sept. 9, at 1 p.m.

The school is located on Blue Star Highway near 59th St. Students may expect buses on approximately the same schedule as last spring.

The kindergarten will begin on Tuesday with the morning session from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and the afternoon session from 12:45 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. Kindergarten children will ride on regular buses in the morning and evening. However, there will be a special bus to take them home after the morning session and one to pick up afternoon kindergartners to take them to school. Approximately 290 students will be attending the school.

Other Hamilton schools in the Hamilton system opened Tuesday.

The new building has 11 classrooms, a library, teachers lounge, all-purpose room, kitchen, audio-visual room, health room and two offices.

The spacious kindergarten has a carpeted reading area with a fixed bench arrange-

ment to minimize distractions from scuffling feet and moving furniture. It also has an outside porch so that children may play outside during inclement weather.

The all-purpose room will be used for general meetings, assemblies and the gym program. Visible on the roof in the center of the building is a raised roof area with skylights over the all-purpose room.

Serving an area south to 132nd St., north to 146th St., west to the Harrington and Saugatuck school boundaries and east to 54th St., the new building will take care of children previously attending the rural Sunnyside, Westview and Elmwood schools and the overflow from those who attended Hamilton Elementary School.

Hamilton School system buses will be used to transport the children to and from the new facility, newest of five elementary schools in the Hamilton system.

LaMar Construction Co. of Holland was the general contractor for construction of the school building which began last fall.

Calvin Hoogstra, principal of Blue Star, and a staff of 10 will teach the kindergarten through sixth graders.

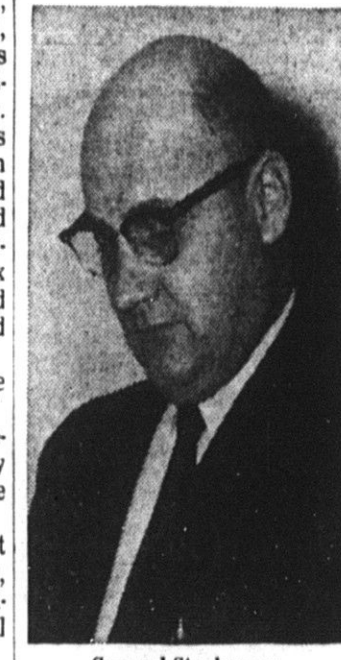

Liquor Issue Okayed After All in Allegan

Allegan — It was on again in Allegan as far as Sunday liquor sales were concerned when the issue came before the Allegan County Board of Supervisors at a special meeting Tuesday.

The proposal had been defeated Aug. 13 on a 17-12 tie vote. Later 14 board members petitioned for a special meeting to reconsider the question. Tuesday was the last time the board could act on the matter under new state law and at the morning session it was counted out again by a another tie vote, this time 19 to 19.

After the session, however, John L. Gurney of Wayland voiced the opinion that his yes vote had been recorded as a no. This proved to be the fact so board Chairman Milton Timmerman ruled that the original proposal to reconsider the board's Aug. 13 had been approved 20 to 18.

When the board reconvened in the afternoon the vote was on the original resolution which in accordance with the new state law will allow private clubs, hotels and restaurants to sell liquor by the glass on Sunday provided it is not prohibited by local, city or Township ordinance.

At the afternoon session, 39 of the 40 board members were present, one more than answered the roll in the morning, and the final vote was 20 to 19. One member, Walter Morris of Cheshire, had voted to reconsider the question in the morning, but voted against the resolution in the afternoon.

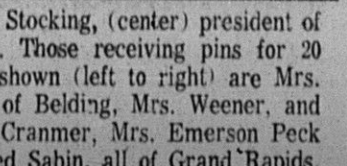
