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Grysen Blasts Reduced Charges, Light Sentences

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Sheriff Bud Grysen Thursday leveled a blast at certain practices in this county which he says have been leading to reduction of charges, special considerations and light sentences on the law enforcement front.

His statement follows:
"The purpose of the founding fathers in forming our nation can be seen in the preamble to the Constitution where it says in part that, 'we, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice . . . and secure the blessings of liberty.'"

"It is imperative that we maintain this balance between the rights of the individual and the just protection of society."

"This justice is not one which applies only to a governmental decree. It applies instead to a nation of individuals. Each respective individual must expect to receive both the benefits and just punishment merited by all those actions for which he or she is responsible."

"Inherent within our concept of justice is the requirement that all representatives of all levels of government consider every citizen as equal before the law. Any treatment which a citizen receives which is outside of this requirement is a distortion of law and shows an unlawful regard for justice. If treatment of the individual before the law is dependent upon his race, nationality, social position or extent of powers held by family or friends, the foundations of our country and Christian justice are being shaken."

"This community, this country, has stood strong for many years because of its peoples' commitment and faith to that which is right and just."

"As sheriff, an apparent trend of reduction of charges, special considerations and light sentences has alarmed myself as well as others associated with law enforcement."

"Fellow officers, prosecutors and judges, let not one of us fail in our duties in rejecting the purpose of our founding fathers to maintain justice and secure liberty fairly!"

It Was Cool, Quite Dry In August

An average temperature of 66.9 and a total rainfall of 1.87 inches marked the weather in Holland during August, a check of the records by Weather Observer Lynn P. Wheaton revealed today.

The average was 1.3 degrees lower than the overall average for Holland and the precipitation was 1.24 inches below normal. Total rainfall during July was 5.17 inches or 2.11 inches above normal. Greatest precipitation for a 24-hour period in August was .53 inch Aug. 29.

Maximum temperature was 87, compared with 92 in 1969, 90 in 1968, 83 in 1967 and 84 in 1966. Minimum was 42, compared with 45 in 1969, 39 in 1968, 41 in 1967 and 42 in 1966.

The average compared with 70.4 in 1969, 70.2 in 1968, 63.8 in 1967 and 66.5 in 1966.

The average maximum was 80.2 in 1970, 81.6 in 1969, 81 in 1968, 75.7 in 1967 and 77.5 in 1966. The average minimum was 56.7 in 1970, 59.1 in 1969, 59.5 in 1968, 51.8 in 1967 and 55.4 in 1966.

Precipitation totaled 1.87 in 1970, 1.17 in 1969, 3.38 inches in 1968, 2.05 inches in 1967 and 2.85 inches in 1966. Precipitation fell on 8 days in 1970, 5 days in 1969, 8 days in 1968, 11 days in 1967 and 11 days in 1966.

Fog was noted on several occasions early in the month and haze was noted three days in mid-month.

Light rain the first two days of August was followed by a dry spell which was broken by a .42 inch rainfall Aug. 16.

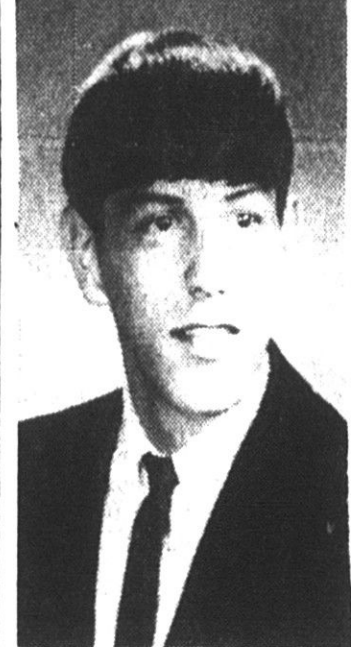
Police who were called at 2:45 p.m. said the building was located on the east side of Maple

Mediator, HEA and Board Meet

An arbitration meeting over unresolved contract differences between the Holland Education Association and the Board of Education has been scheduled Wednesday, Sept. 9, at 4 p.m. by Robert Mason of the State Labor Mediation Service who has been assigned to serve as negotiator in the Holland school dispute.

Roger Plagenhoef, HEA president, stated Tuesday following an HEA meeting, that teachers will report for classes this week but if contract differences are not resolved by Tuesday, Sept. 8, teachers will withhold services. The four major areas of disagreement, he said, are teacher-pupil ratio in junior high school, binding arbitration, agency shop and leaves.

The Board of Education in a

position paper dated Aug. 25 states seven new teachers have been added to the junior high staff, that academic teachers will teach five classes instead of six, and that a complete eighth grade science program has been set up in three mobile classrooms, already installed on 15th St. between the schools. The junior high program was a primary issue in the special vote early this summer for an additional 3.75 mills which was approved by the district.

The position paper also states the board of offering 11 sick leave days per year instead of 10, with permission to accumulate 120 sick leave days instead of 100. This is in lieu of a personal leave day.

On grievances, the board has proposed appointment of a

three-member team of residents of the school district to mediate a dispute, one to be selected by the HEA, one by the board and one to be selected jointly. On agency shop, the board believes each teacher should be free to join a professional organization as a matter of individual choice.

On the junior high front, Plagenhoef said the teachers feel that students are not being allowed quality education because teachers give too many assignments.

He said junior high teachers have had an extra work load ever since the austerity program in the early 1960's.

Don Rohlick is chief negotiator for the negotiation team. Rohlick, Plagenhoef and the HEA executive committee were consulting today on latest developments.

Early Birds Hear Talk On Compensation

Employer apathy more than anything else is responsible for the trend towards a welfare program in unemployment compensation, Colin M. Smith, executive director of the Employers Unemployment Compensation Council, told Chamber of Commerce Early Birds at breakfast Tuesday in Hotel Warm Friend.

What was intended strictly as an insurance program in 1937 under Franklin Delano Roosevelt's administration has undergone many changes in more recent years, caused mainly (in Smith's opinion) through lack of interest on the part of employers to maintain close association with their state and federal legislators.

But employers are waking up, mainly because of the proposed elimination of the waiting week and the proposed 66 2/3 per cent of statewide averages in net pay which would amount to \$75 to \$80 a week in many cases. Smith opined the latter was largely promoted by would-be office seekers concerned with garnering votes. The latter also have made a point of paying compensation to strikers.

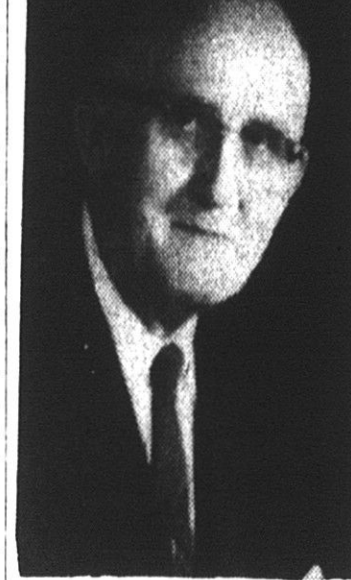
Although he made a big point of lack of interest on the part of the small employer, Smith also was sympathetic with the problems of the small employer since processing forms usually falls to a bookkeeper or other overworked people on the office staff. But he urged all employers to be as helpful as possible to persons laid off, with emphasis on helping them find other jobs.

The comments from the departing spectators was generally favorable with no one saying "I won't wear the new fashions." At least they will try the fall styles and decide for themselves what length they will wear.

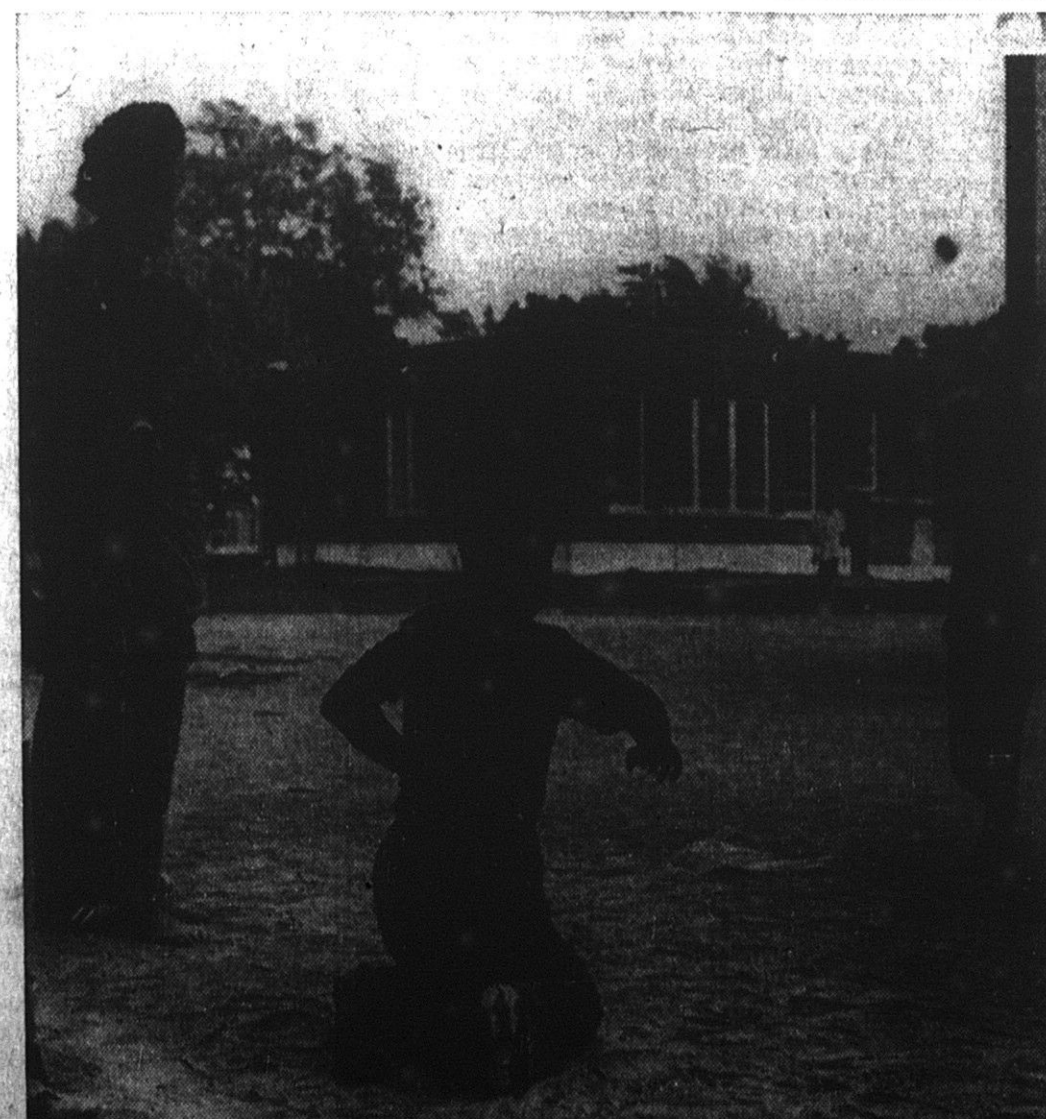

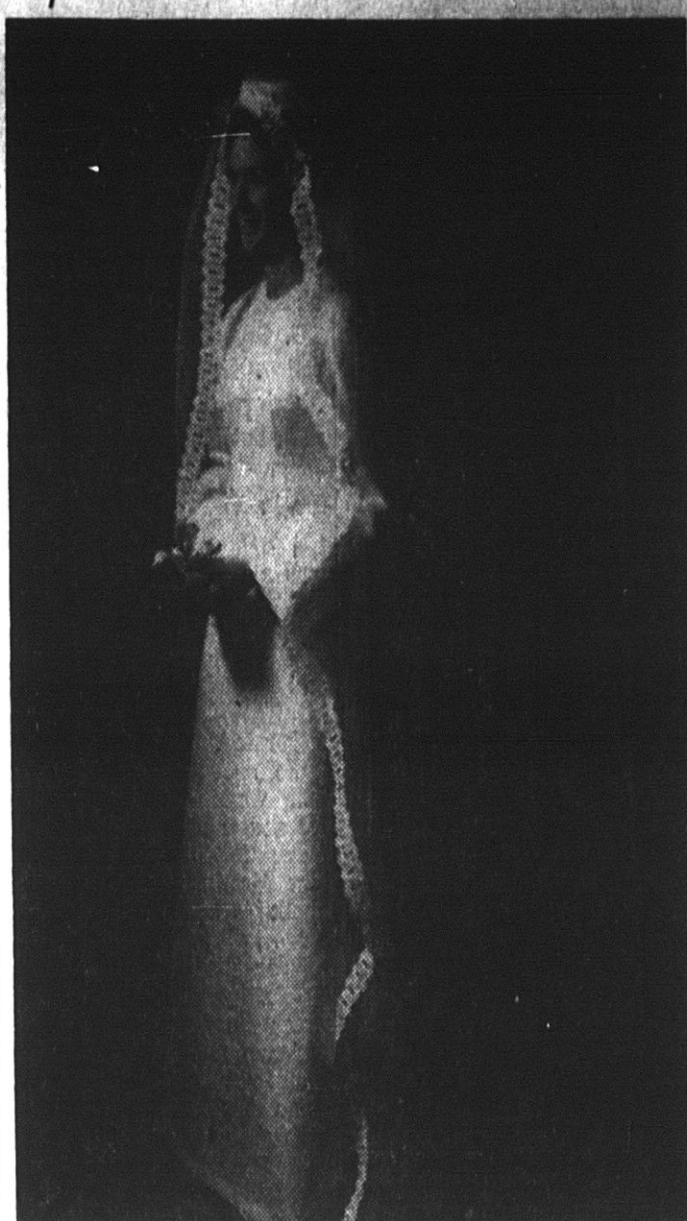
Fire Damages Bushes

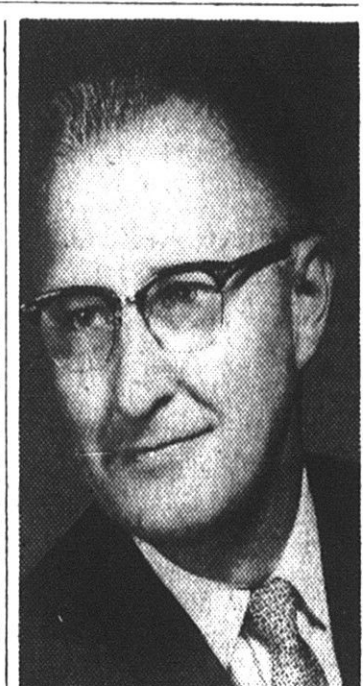

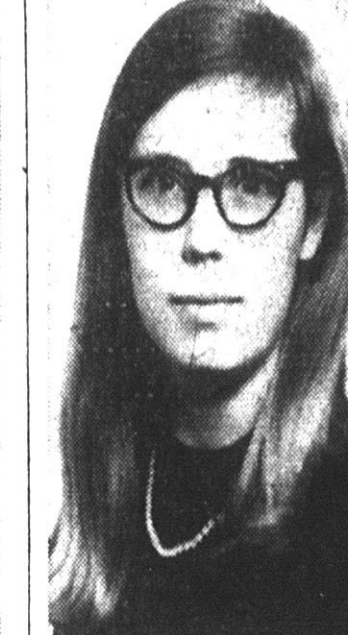
She is the mother of three sons, David with the Army at Washington D. C., Terry in the Navy at Norfolk, Va., and Paul a junior at Hope College.

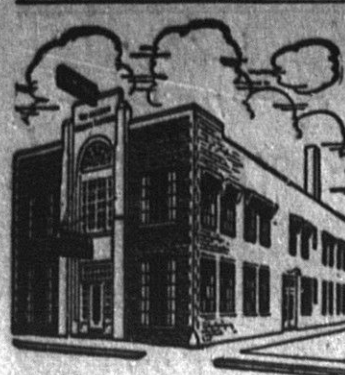
In September Miss van Reken will begin work as assistant professor of psychology at Erskine College, Due West, S.C.

But we hope that the excitement of being involved in a new movement will not obscure their good judgment when it comes to the selection of objectives and means of obtaining them.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 6
A Way of Peace
Genesis 26: 17-29
By C. P. Dame

Peace is much talked about today but conflicts in families, in communities and between nations, abound. The topic is timely, for the world yearns for peace. This lesson tells about one way.

I. Greed often leads to quarreling. Isaac was the son of Abraham. He was not a great man but he did love peace and was willing to make sacrifices for it. Few great fathers have great sons or daughters. Isaac was a mediocre person, he belonged to the group of people which does the most work.

A famine came in Canaan and Isaac moved in the region of Gerar, over which Abimelech ruled. In Gerar, Isaac told a lie about his beautiful wife and when the heathen king learned about it he rebuked Isaac for doing this. Recall that Abraham also told a lie about his wife. Abimelech asked Isaac to leave to avoid conflict.

After the death of Abraham the Philistines stopped the wells which his servants had dug. If Abraham had been alive they would not have dared to do it. Isaac dug again the wells of his father and "gave them the names which his father had given them," thus honoring his father. The best way to honor our parents is to maintain the good customs and to hold on to the Christian convictions which they had.

When Isaac's herdsmen dug wells and found water the herdsmen of Gerar claimed them. Instead of fighting, Isaac withdrew and had another well dug, which was also claimed. Once more Isaac moved and dug another well and no quarrel followed. Yielding is better than retaliating. Recall the words of Jesus found in Matthew 5:41. Isaac did not let greed mould his conduct.

II. God's promises encourage. From Rehoboth, "broad places" is the meaning of the name, Isaac moved to Beersheba, where Abraham once lived. Here God appeared to Isaac and promised three things to him, the same things which He had promised to Abraham. "And he built an altar there," thus following his father's example. Note the three interesting things verse 25 records. Isaac built an altar and called on God's name, pitched his tent, and had a well dug—worship, building a home, and work are important, but Isaac put worship first. Do you?

III. Cooperation gets results. The Philistines called on Isaac and talked about making a covenant with him for they saw that God was with him. Isaac consented and consequently peace prevailed instead of conflict. Isaac, by his peaceful attitude, won out, and avoided hard feelings, conflicts and losses.

The gospel brings about peace. People must first become reconciled to God and then they will seek to live in peace with their fellow men. As long as people are at odds with God, so long will they be at odds with each other.

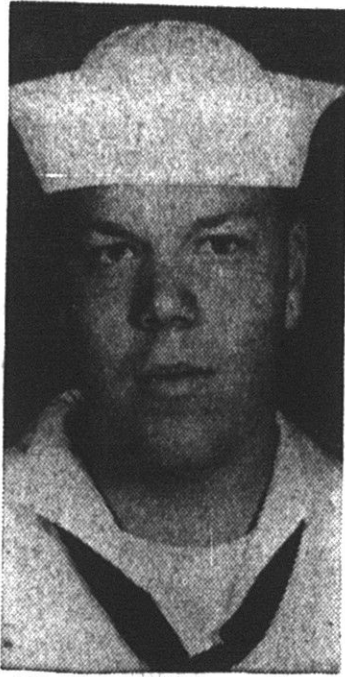

Noel Coward's 40-year-old comedy "Private Lives," which opened Monday night as the last production of Saugatuck's Red Barn Theater season, proved to be almost as timely today as the day it was written.

What might have been a bit risqué in this sophisticated comedy back in 1930 might appear a trifle dull in today's ever-changing theatrical standards.

Longtime Professionals Bruce Hall and Dorothy Lee Tompkins as leads in this adult comedy matched brilliant lines in a well paced production but Monday's production lacked some of the groovy spontaneity of last week's rib-tickling "My Daughter, Your Son" which saw the Red Barn company rolling at its best. But it moved well since pacing is always a hallmark of Producer-Director James Dyas.

"Private Lives" starring Noel Coward and the late Gertrude Lawrence brought a new trend to sophistication to theater, and many of the lines, let alone athletic fights, sparkle brilliantly after 40 years. The plot deals with a divorced and choose the same hotel for their respective honeymoons. The fires of the old romance are rekindled leading to situations which were unique to say the least 40 years ago, and still "unusual" today.

Kathy Dyas, real life daughter of the leading lady, and William Tost had their share of sparkling lines as spouses of the leading couple. Their final "curtain" fight was almost as good as the carefully staged fisticuffs of Hall and Miss Tompkins in the second act.

Karen Elfert rounded out the cast as the French maid afflicted with sniffls.

Effective costumes bridging high style of the 1930's and today were by Kathy Dyas with scenic and lighting design by Geoffrey D. Fishburn, production stage manager.

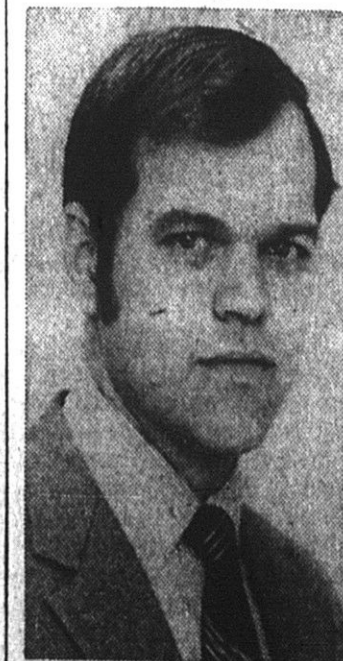

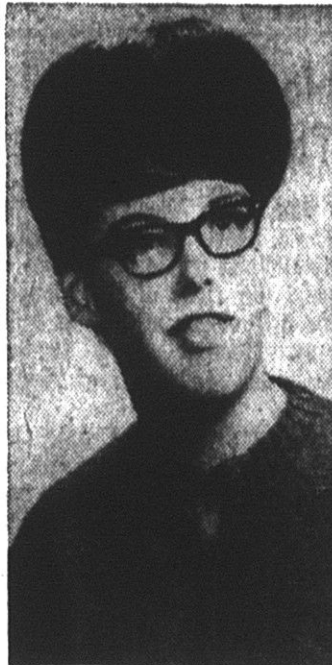

Windmill Art Show Attracts 1,500 Visitors

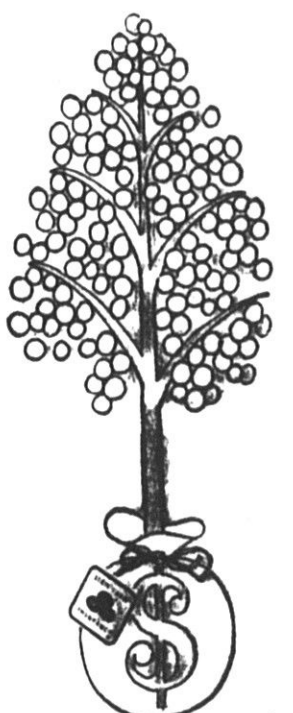

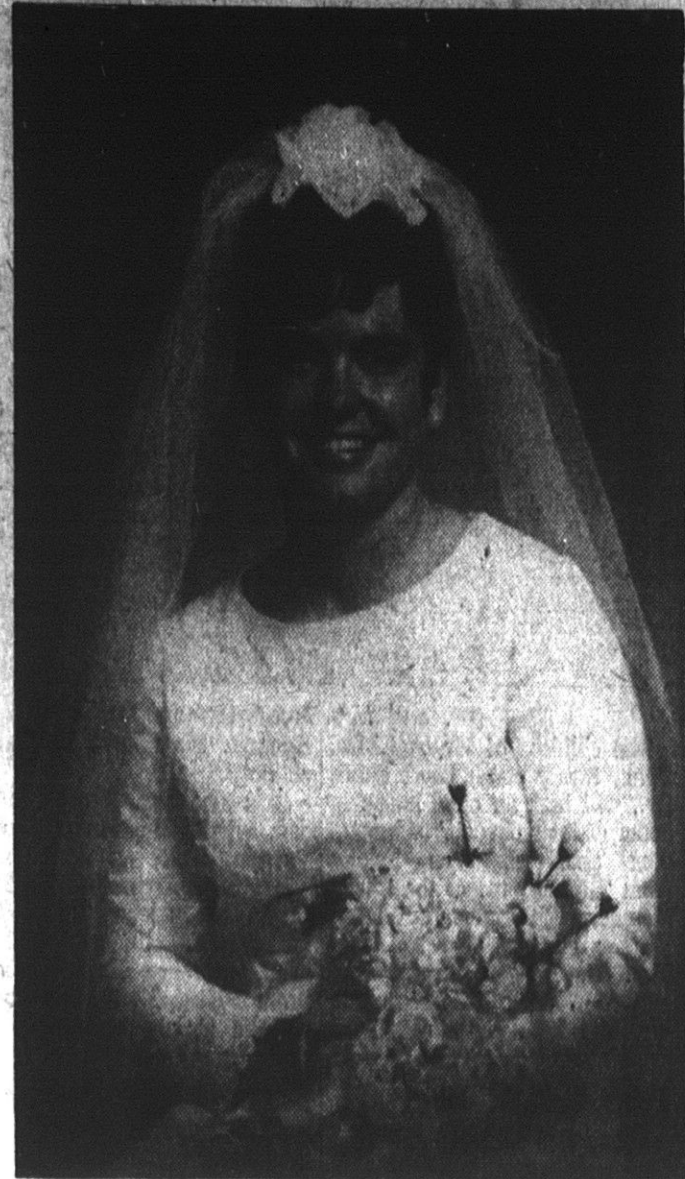

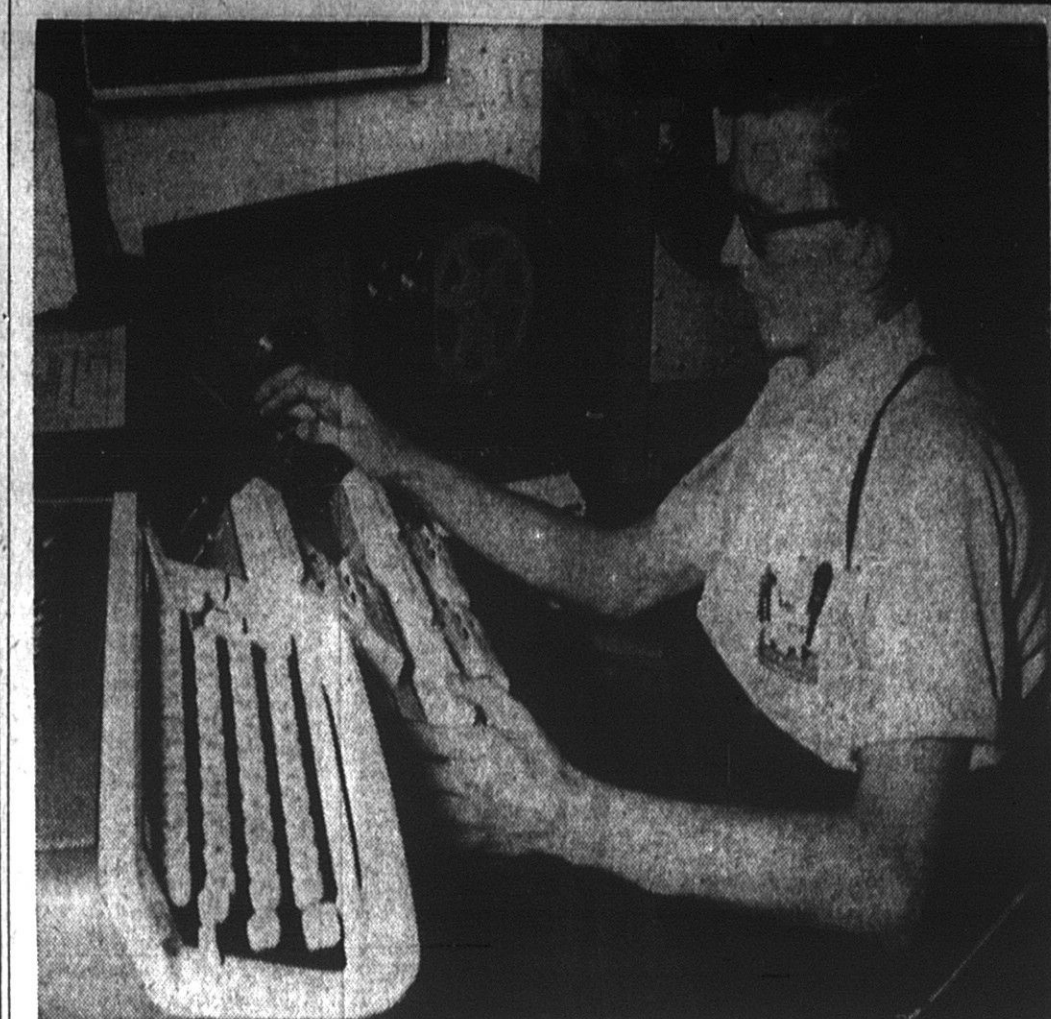

It is largely a hand operation for this young man in his 20's, a victim of cerebral palsy. He duplicates tapes in many different languages, mostly for mission fields in South America and Africa. He also works on assembling the recording equipment for the tapes. These are battery operated machines, sturdy yet delicate, and specially designed for use in jungle areas or rough terrain.

Zwiep's plight was brought to the public by Theodore Huisman of Grand Rapids, coordinator in the division of vocational rehabilitation for the State Department of Education. Zwiep was hired last June by Ronald Beery of Holland who has operated Portable Recording Ministries Inc. here for three years. Zwiep works almost full time, depending on the demands of

the tapes. These are battery operated machines, sturdy yet delicate, and specially designed for use in jungle areas or rough terrain.

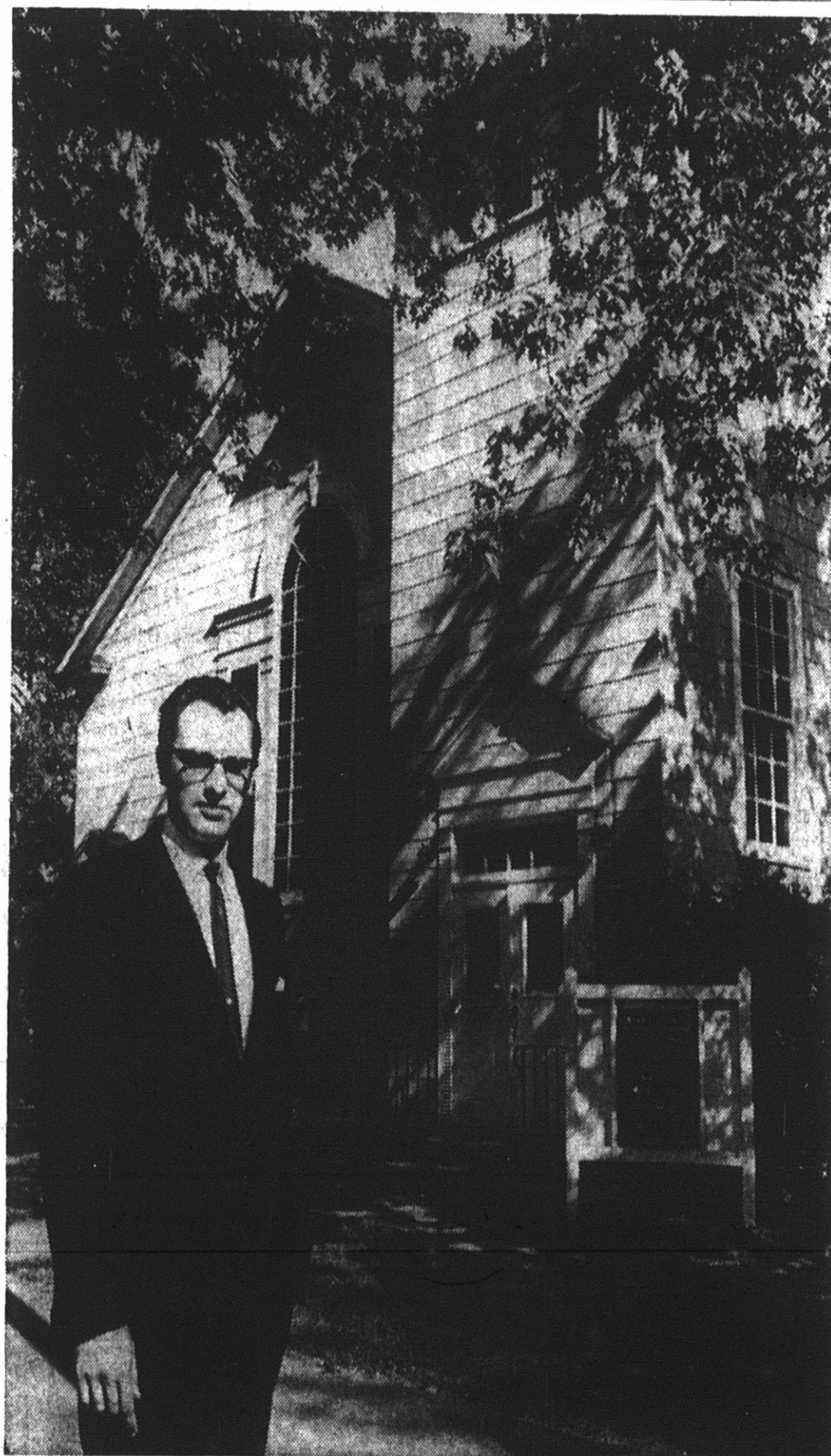

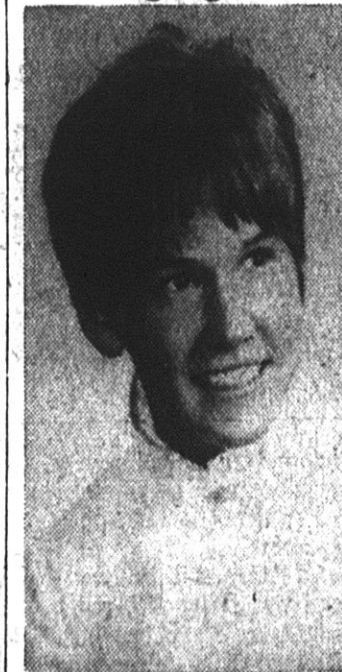
