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Launching Ramp Bid Approved

A launching ramp at the expanded Kollen Park facilities is expected to be ready for the 1972 season, following action by City Council Wednesday night in awarding a contract to L. W. Lamb Co., low bidder.

Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. abstained from voting on what was a unanimous decision.

The Lamb bid listed \$73,300 which was \$13,300 in excess of the \$60,000 previously allocated by the Department of Natural Resources and City Council.

Council met this problem by deleting parking lot construction, storm sewer and other items on a unit price basis, cutting out \$15,375 from the bid, putting the total at \$57,925.

Then Council approved application of a \$27,000 additional grant from the Department of Natural Resources to complete the entire project.

Council approved an agreement with William Vogelzang, 879 Central Ave., for enclosing a culvert across his property, with Vogelzang paying approximately \$1,520. The entire culvert project will cost approximately \$8,000.

Council approved an alternate proposal for the extension of Grandridge Ct. as requested by Harrison Gregg, locating the cul de sac in the vicinity of the southwest corner of the property near Lugers Rd. Letters from neighbors supporting the alternate proposal also were presented.

Bids on the 1971-72 winter supply of rock salt and flake calcium chloride were approved by Council, the rock salt as best bid from Diamond Crystal Salt Co. for \$14 a ton and the low bid of Dow Chemical Co. for flake calcium chloride in 100-pound bags at \$54.40 a ton.

Two applications for rezoning were referred to the Planning Commission for recommendation. One was from Ed Vos seeking to rezone the west 1/2 of lot 17 in block 47 from residential to commercial, and the other from L. Thomas Blackburn to rezone lot 16 and the east half of lot 15, block 35, from B-2 apartment to commercial.

Claims against the city from Richard H. Jones, 28 East 25th St.; Harry Estell, 1728 Main St.; and J. A. Lubbers, 628 State St., were referred to the city's insurance carrier.

Council accepted quit claim deeds concerning an additional 17 feet of right of way on the north side of 16th St. immediately east of Waverly Rd. involving properties of Harold Plaggenmeyer, Russell Homkes and Bastian Bouman, all subject to recent rezoning action by Council.

Council will participate again in the Michigan Good Roads Federation involving a remittance of \$26 for 1971 membership.

Council approved transfer of \$3,000 in the Board of Public Works budget for installing a telephone system in the new BPW offices on the second floor of City Hall.

The city manager advised that \$2,500 will be needed to repair fire damage in Centennial Park restrooms and Council authorized the expenditure. Should insurance provide payment, the fund will be reimbursed.

Council approved an agreement with Holland township and Peter Botsis regarding the disposal of wastewater from Botsis' laundry located on Lakewood Blvd. and River Ave. The agreement calls for construction of a holding tank on DNR specifications regulated by the Ottawa County Health Department, allowing Botsis to deliver and unload laundry water at the city's sewage disposal plant. All costs will be assumed by Botsis, the agreement continuing until such time as sewage treatment is available in the township.

Two communications on storm drains were referred to the city manager for study and report. One was from John Van Wieren, 543 South Shore Dr., calling attention to problems at his driveway caused when a creek which is a storm drain overflows. The other came from Mr. and Mrs. George De Weerd, 470 West 18th St., and Mrs. Violet Schut, 470 West 18th St., requesting tiling of a city storm drain on their property at no expense to them.

A Hospital Board report announced receipt of eight chairs for patients' rooms valued at \$284 from the Children's Guild, two from the Rens Boven Guild and four from the Martha Kollen Guild. They were accepted with thanks to the donors.

Another Hospital Board report submitting for approval a policy on severance pay for hospital employees was tabled for 30 days.

Mayor Lamb presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and three-quarters. All Councilmen were present. The invocation was given by Dr. J. J. De Valois, retired missionary.

Seek to Correct Dumping Sewage Into Storm Drain

City Manager William L. Bopf told City Council Wednesday night that evidence of at least three connections dumping raw sewage into the Wildwood storm drain was discovered in connection with an inspection resulting from an explosion in the sewer some weeks ago.

He said there was no correlation between sewage and the explosion and said it is possible some citizens discharging into the drain are unaware of these connections.

The illegal discharges were confirmed by samples taken by the Department of Environmental Health and processed by the Michigan Health Department.

To correct the situation, the city is empowered to seal off the connections, but before doing so will insert a public notice in the Sentinel on two occasions warning residents in the vicinity of Wildwood Drain which runs from Lake Macatawa to 40th St. in the general vicinity of Ottawa Ave. Date for sealing connections will be Sept. 25.

Residents not knowing whether they discharge into the storm drainage system may contact the Department of Environmental Health or the city manager's office to have a dye test conducted to confirm the connection.

The report was accepted as information.

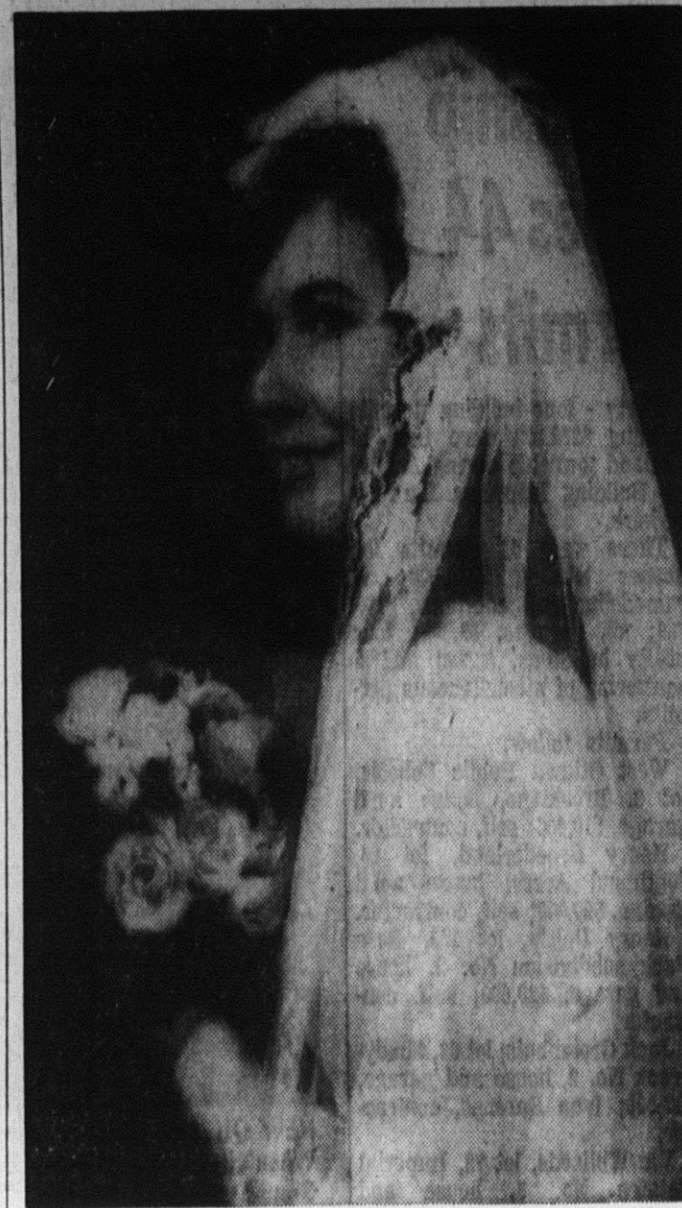

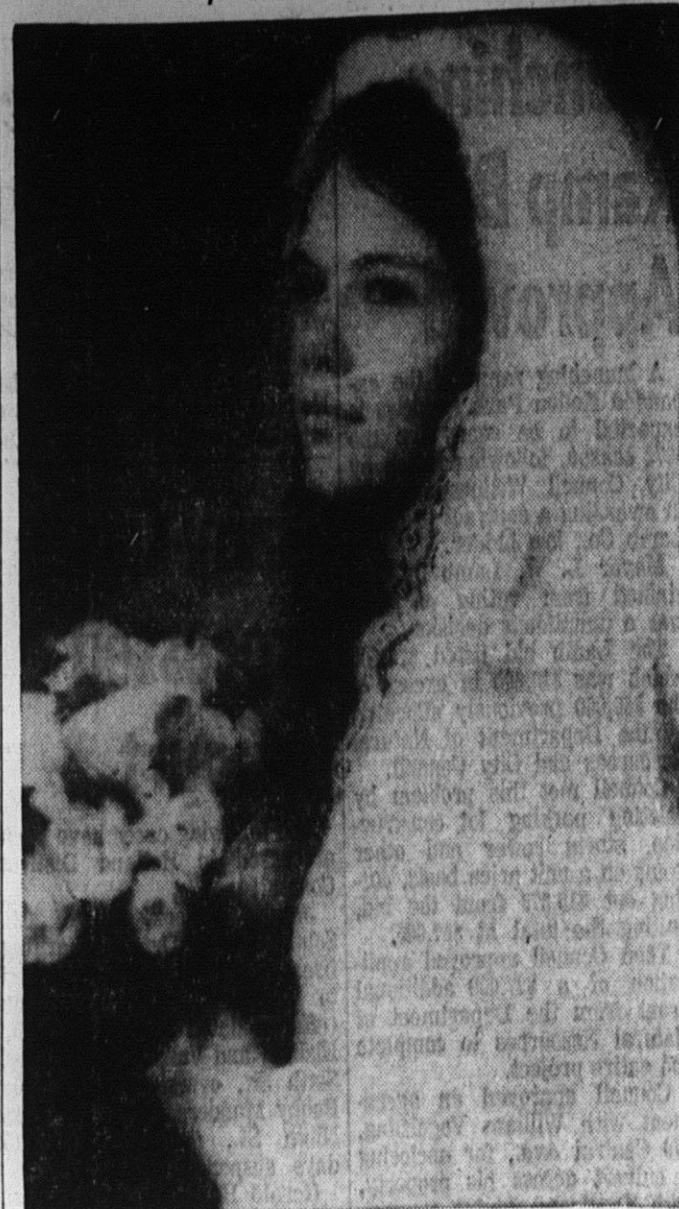

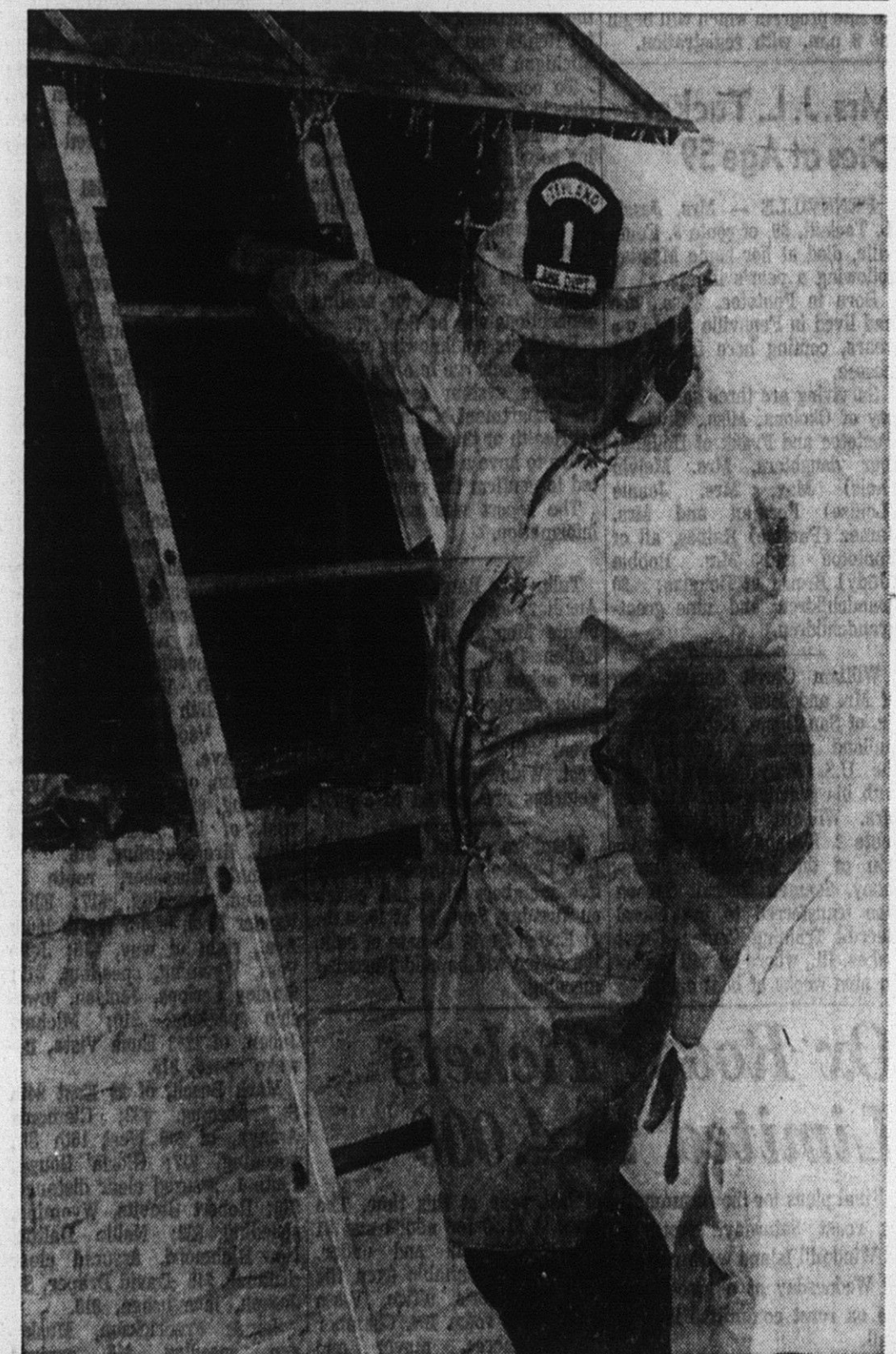

Operations at the plant were interrupted Wednesday according to plant manager John Curnick. The plant produces a variety of products of infant and adult use.

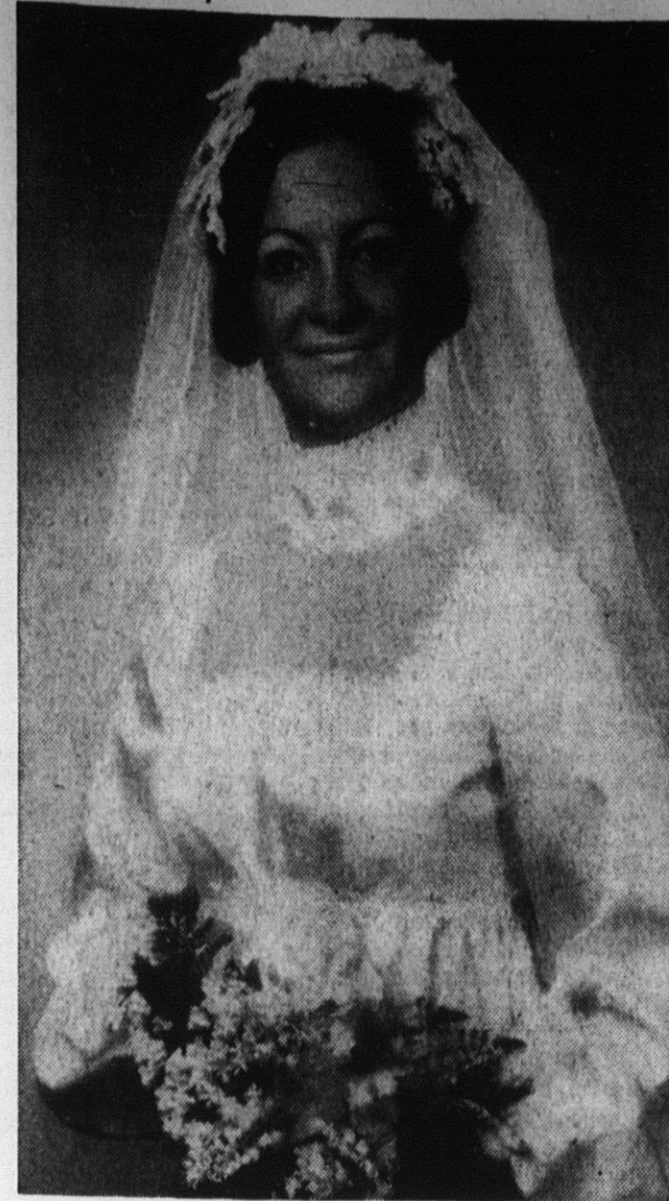
At the time of the fire a liquid was being dried into a powder used in infant formula.

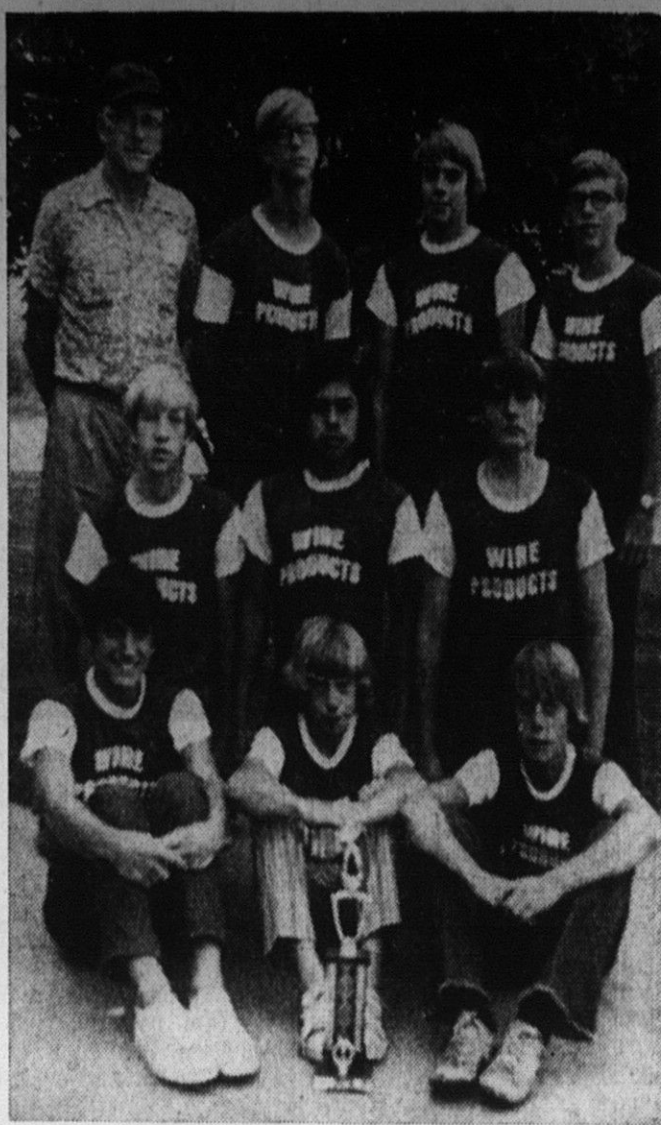

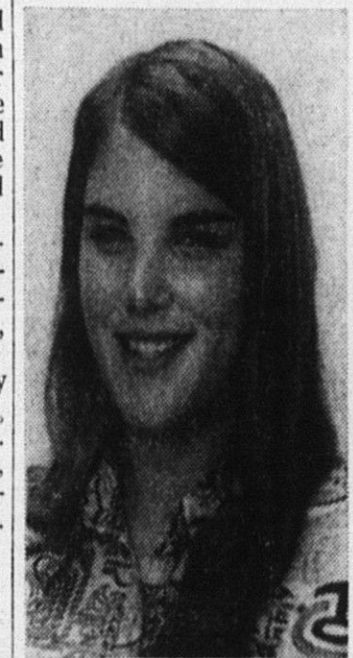

Officers said she had dropped off her boyfriend at about 1:30 a.m. and as she left a car reportedly containing two colored subjects followed her.

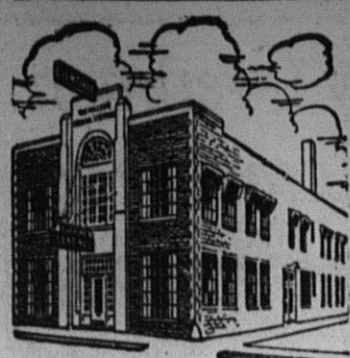
Police said Miss Shereton was sitting in her car when the shooting occurred. A slug was removed from the inside paneling of the right front door. Officers said the weapon was not recovered.

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THE GRAVEST THREAT

What is the greatest hurdle that American youth has to get over to enter adulthood? There are all kinds of dangers, of course, in our modern, complex civilization. But the one thing that poses the greatest threat to the kids outliving their teens is the youthful driver. The National Transportation Safety Board in a recent report says that youthful drivers have a way of killing themselves on the highway and of killing those who ride with them.

In 1969, the report shows, 31 per cent of the nation's highway deaths occurred to people between 15 and 25 years of age. The total number of deaths in this age bracket was 17,700. That was 7,400 more than occurred in the upper age brackets. Twenty-one per cent of the drivers are in the 15 to 25 age bracket and they were involved in 34 per cent of the year's fatal accidents.

These statistics merely confirm what has been happening during the past 17 years—rates of death for this group are steadily rising. Nothing seems to correct the situation. Drivers training courses seem unable to stem the tide. Perhaps, the Safety Board reasons, it will be necessary to place young drivers on a two-year probationary period and revoke licenses of those who seem incapable before they kill themselves and some one else.

The board suggests various reasons for the continual climb in fatal statistics: More kids begin to drive as soon as they are old enough, more kids have their own cars and thus are driving more, there is a general decline in respect for law which results in recklessness, and there is an increased use of drugs and alcohol among people of this age group. These influences have fatal effects.

We get quite excited over the deaths in Vietnam, as we should. But we seem to be able to bear these statistics with great equanimity. If the trend continues as it has for the last 17 years, this year's fatal toll will be even higher and we are giving more and more privileges to youngsters in the affected age group. With the 18-year-old vote, which gives youngsters the right to drink legally, we shrink to think what will happen to these figures in years to come. Someone is going to have to come up with a reasonable solution to the problem if we are to save 20,000 youths per year from death on our highways.

School Board Will Share In Program

GRAND HAVEN—The Board of Education voted at a special meeting Wednesday night to take part in the Emergency Employment Act program in Ottawa County, which was outlined at a county board of commissioners meeting Tuesday at Grand Haven.

Dr. William Bocks, superintendent of schools, reported that 80 to 90 jobs will be available under the county-wide program and more than \$747,000 may be allocated in the county. Deadline for school boards, hospitals, municipalities and county offices to submit applications is Saturday of this week.

The local school board authorized Dr. Bocks to apply for five or more "slots" in the program, which can be teachers or other district employees. Twenty-five positions have been allocated to county schools, to be administered through the county area intermediate education office.

Receipt of funds from the federal program will not solve the overall financial position of the local district, Board Member Don De Gloppe pointed out.

Insulator Is Damaged

An insulator damaged by gunfire led to a power outage during a storm Sunday, affecting an estimated 4,000 customers north of Holland for about 90 minutes, Consumers Power Co. officials said.

The blackout stretched from Zeeland to Lake Michigan and north.

A spokesman said a 46,000 volt line failed during the storm because an insulator on a pole south of the Wyoming water station had been shot out.

The power failure occurred at about 4:50 p.m. Sunday.

The Ottawa county sheriff's department radio was out of service during the power failure and calls were relayed to sheriff's cars via the Holland police department radio dispatcher. The two departments operate on the same radio frequency.

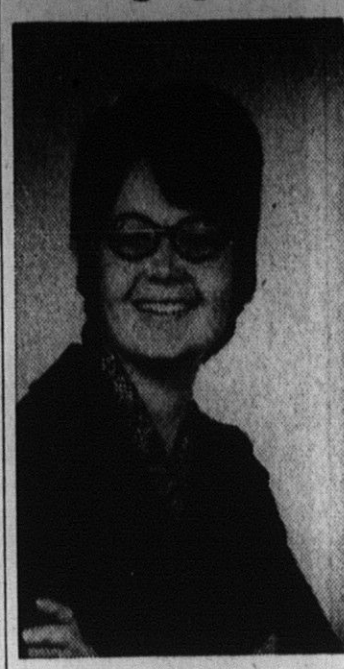

Early Birds Hear Talk On Traffic Safety

A downward trend in traffic fatalities the past year in Michigan coupled with a decrease in the severity of accidents provided a note of cautious encouragement in a talk before Chamber of Commerce Early Birds Tuesday by Robert B. Cullen Sr. of the safety and traffic engineering division of the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Continuing investigation and research by the Automobile Club placed more emphasis on how accidents happen, and Cullen said possibly two per cent could be caused by vehicle defects and possibly nine per cent by engineering mistakes, leaving 89 per cent caused by drivers themselves. Michigan had 2,177 traffic fatalities in 1970, he said.

He spoke of case histories by problem drivers, mostly drinkers or young irresponsible drivers. One study involved 279 drivers who survived fatal accidents with regard to voting and criminal records, driving habits, marriage and divorce, revealed that most of these persons had never voted. One example, not the worst, revealed 75 points in 14 years, listing six reckless driving tickets, one drunk driving and one running a stop sign. Another had 11 speeding tickets in three years.

Cullen said state law provides that an operator's license may be revoked after 12 points, and even when revoked the driver has recourse to a hearing before a license appeal board. If the state action is upheld, the driver may appeal to circuit court which may restore the license or modify the restriction.

Cullen quoted statistics on drinking drivers, emphasizing that triple-A is not a temperance organization but wants drivers to know their limitation and drive within them. He said 310 fewer persons were killed in traffic accidents last year than in 1969, crediting some of the improvements to new safety features in cars, selective enforcement, and hopefully a general awareness of driving more sensibly. He repeated the now-famous conviction that most fatal accidents occur within 25 miles from home.

The 1971 Holland High Dutch football team has the horses in the backfield.

But Coach Dave Kempker has a major overhaul job to build a front line to open the holes for the backs.

Star halfback Randy Kuipers and end Jim Lorence are the only two lettermen back on offense that started last year. However, senior quarterback Larry Horn and fullback Craig Kuipers should give Holland's backfield a strong look in 1971.

Horn was a starting defensive halfback last year and has the inside track to winning the key quarterback spot. Other quarterback candidates are juniors Kirby Howard and Dick Wood. Wood is also competing as a running back.

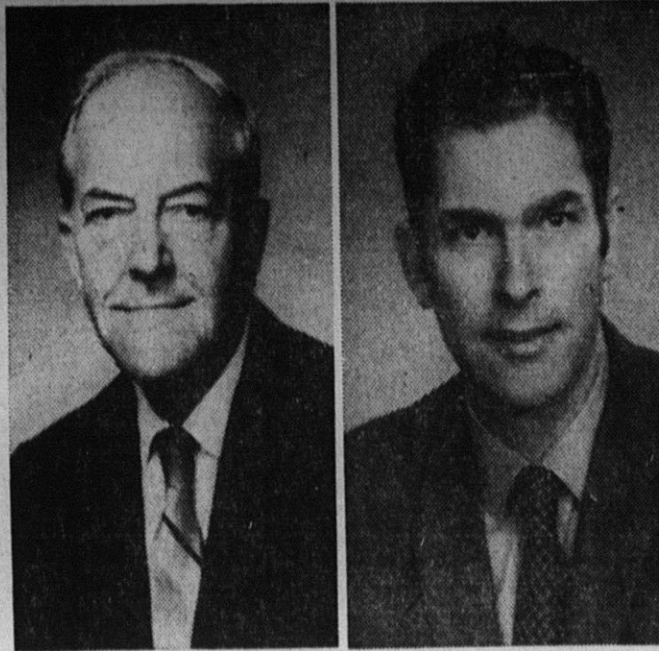

License Bureau At Police Station Ends

A tradition ended Tuesday at the Holland police station.

The last road test and last license application were handled Tuesday from the second floor drivers license bureau.

Wednesday the license bureau moved to new offices at 186 River Ave., a stone's throw from the police station. Next week functions of issuing drivers licenses and road tests will be assumed by the Secretary of State's office.

For years license examinations and road tests were issued through the red brick police station by officers at the desk and then by a staff of examiners in the bureau on the second floor.

Recently the cost of operating the licensing bureau was not met by reimbursements from the state. The state takes over the responsibilities Monday.

Marvin Nyman, manager of the Secretary of State's regional office in Grand Rapids, said new office hours go into effect Monday. The office will be open Mondays from 10 a.m. until 6:30 p.m. and 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.

Nyman said Willard Ten Have, now with the licensing bureau in Grand Rapids and a former police chief in Hudsonville, will become office manager at Holland. Another staffer will transfer to Holland to administer road tests.

Two of the staffers at the police department licensing bureau will continue in the new office, Nyman said.

Equipment from the police station office was moved into the River Ave. office Wednesday morning. The office is expected to be open for the hours and will continue under its present schedule Thursday regular Wednesday afternoon and Friday.

Licensing personnel in Hol-

land said road tests will not be given until the state assumes control of the office on Monday.

The final road test administered by police station personnel was this afternoon.

In June, the Holland bureau processed 1,939 applications and Nyman said the load averaged about 1,000 to 1,500 applications a month recently.
