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## Man Pulled From Lake Dies Later

Robert J. Osterink, 59, of Grand Rapids, pulled from the rough waters of Lake Michigan at Macatawa Park Friday afternoon and saved from drowning, died Friday night in Holland Hospital.

An autopsy determined the cause of death as drowning. Ottawa County deputies said Osterink, a Grand Rapids building contractor, was bathing alone in the rough waters of Lake Michigan about 200 feet offshore when he began calling for help.

A relative, Jack Knott, 29, of Berkeley, Calif., vacationing at Macatawa, and a man identified as Bud Gauss of Dundee, entered the water and attempted to rescue Osterink but Gauss returned to shore suffering from fatigue.

Knott managed to bring Osterink to shore and a Dr. Lindemann was administering mouth to mouth aid when members of the Holland-Park township E unit arrived. They received the call at 4:40 p.m.

Members of the Ottawa County marine patrol and the Holland Coast Guard also assisted at the scene.

Osterink was taken to Holland Hospital by ambulance and admitted in "critical" condition. He was pronounced dead at 11:30 p.m.

Deputies said witnesses reported Osterink may have been in the water about 10 minutes before being rescued.

## Will Increase Speed Limits On US-31 BR

City Council was informed Wednesday night that the Michigan Department of State Highways & Transportation will shortly revise the posted speed limits on Michigan and River Aves. as follows:

9th to 21st St.: increase from 25 mph to 30 mph.

21st to 32nd Sts.: increase from 30 mph to 35 mph; except, during the hours school is in session, the speed limit shall be 25 mph between the 14th and 17th St. intersections.

The 14th to 17th St. restriction affects traffic at E. E. Fell Junior High School, and Councilman Al Kleis Jr. asked that similar consideration be given Christian Middle School at 19th and 20th St.

City Manager Terry Hofmeyer said the matter had come up, but state representatives had decided against it because most Christian Middle Schoolers are bused in.

The city manager was instructed to communicate with state officials asking that limits be enforced to 21st St. during school hours.

At the time the proposed revisions were under consideration last year, the Highway Department indicated the plan would be implemented on a 60-day trial period, including the posting of curve signs with advisory speed panels at the junction of Michigan and River Aves.

Following the trial period, another study will be conducted and if the 85 per centile speeds have increased, the limits will revert to previous postings. If the study reveals the speeds have not increased, the revised limits will be retained and the Highway Department will consider installing special school speed limit signs on River Ave. for the 15th and 16th St. school crossings.

## Zeeland Man, 82, Dragged by Car; Dies From Injuries

ZEELAND — Henry De Jonge, 82, of 10935 88th Ave., died Monday in Zeeland Community Hospital of injuries he suffered when the car he was repairing dragged him 60 feet.

Ottawa County deputies said he had been working underneath the car with the motor running, and the transmission suddenly engaged and he was dragged along the pavement until the car came to a halt. He died of severe internal injuries two hours after the mishap.

Surviving are his wife, Jennie; four sons, Lester of West Olive, Derwin of Zeeland and Harold and Robert of Allendale; a daughter, Mrs. Jim (Helen) Van Laar of Zeeland; 21 grandchildren; one great-grandchild; three sisters, Mrs. Ada Vanden Berge, Mrs. Lena Veen, both of Grand Rapids and Mrs. Josie Zienstra of Zeeland and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Hatti De Jonge of Kalamazoo.

## City Council Covers Many Subjects

City Council processed a host of varying subjects at a regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

It denied a recommendation to prohibit parking on the south side of 22nd St. from Van Raalte to Washington Aves. after a petition bearing 26 signatures representing 20 addresses asked that parking on both sides of the street be retained. The subject had been tabled from the previous meeting.

Council extended the Dial-a-Ride service area to include the new location of the Holland outpatient clinic of the Ottawa County Mental Health department which is moving from 549 West 18th St. to 222 West Lakewood Blvd. The new location is not far from other areas in the DART service area.

Also approved was a plan for the Holland Police Department to hold a public auction the morning of Saturday, Sept. 11, in the basement of the police building to dispose of recovered stolen property, unclaimed evidence and excess items. In addition, it is proposed to sell 28 bicycles and various bicycle parts that have remained unclaimed for at least 45 days.

Council voted no change in the name of Waverly Rd. following a request of Mrs. Susie Artz to rename Waverly Rd. to 120th Ave. Reasons given were the historical significance of the name, plus the fact that east-west streets in the city have numbers and north-south streets have names. Waverly Rd. is a north-south street.

Appointment of City Auditor John W. Fonger as officer delegate and D. W. Schipper as alternate was approved by Council to attend the annual meeting of the Municipal Employees Retirement System Oct. 14 in Boyne Falls. The city clerk was instructed to conduct an election by employees for an employee delegate and alternate.

Council denied a request of William A. Botsis for a new SDM liquor license at 755 Michigan Ave.

Council confirmed a certification from Councilman James Vande Poel for recent purchases by the Recreation Department from Superior Sport Store totaling \$990.22.

A claim against the city from Hawkeye Security Insurance Co. was referred to the city attorney and city insurance carrier.

A communication from the Liquor Control Commission concerning a new SDM license from Herbert and Patricia Kammeraad to be located at 494 East 32nd St. was referred to the city manager for report.

Mothers of World War II was granted a license to solicit funds on the streets Oct. 8 and 9, with rain dates of Oct. 15 and 16.

The oath of office of William Jordan as a member of the Human Relations Commission was filed.

A card of thanks from Councilman Van Kampen for the terrarium sent him while he was in the hospital was filed.

## BPW Recognized For Outstanding Safety Record

The Holland Board of Public Works has received national recognition for an outstanding safety record in the water department during 1975. Holland's water department was named runner-up by the American Water Works Association for the 1975 Safety Award in Class Size II, Butte Water Company, Butte, Mont., was chosen by the AWWA Accident Prevention Committee as the winner in this class.

Holland was one of the 12 water utilities in the United States considered for the Class Size II safety award. This class size represents water utilities with 100 or less employees. In its citation the AWWA commends Holland for being one of this highly select group of water utilities with outstanding performance in accident prevention.

The award was based on the safety record of the entire water department, including treatment plant, construction work, distribution crews and administrative personnel and having worked the entire 1975 year without a lost time accident.

Earlier this year an "Award of Merit" was presented to the water department by the Michigan section of the AWWA for having operated the past ten years with 414,000 consecutive manhours without a lost-time accident.

## Opposes Proposed Truck Route in City

### Holland Neighborhood Association Organized

Retaining a perimeter truck route for Holland with possibly some changes from the present route is the initial effort of a newly formed organization called the Holland Neighborhood Association.

The association is the result of a public hearing before City Council Aug. 4 on a proposed plan to utilize major streets in Holland as truck routes which would be in addition to the current perimeter route.

Serving on the steering committee are Robert Ferguson, Mrs. Martha Kaiser, Thomas H. Beyer, Dr. Douglas Heerema, Dr. Elton Bruins and Mrs. Etta Hesselink. Further information may be obtained by calling Beyer, Mrs. Kaiser or Ferguson.

Following the truck route public hearing, Council tabled the matter for further study. The truck route recommendation also provided for a traffic signal at 32nd St., Lincoln Ave. and State St., and redesigning the intersection for a four-way signal.

The new neighborhood organization is advocating support for perimeter truck routing with an overall aim of preserving the "fine quality of life that its members feel is unique and outstanding in the city of Holland."

HNA believes that the only acceptable plan for preserving safety and acceptable noise and air pollution levels for the majority of residents in the current truck route, modified in particularly difficult-to-negotiate places, and routing trucks away from schools, homes and churches.

According to HNA, Holland is in an excellent position to adhere to high, and even ideal, standards of traffic safety by

## Truck Route Petitions Hit City Council

There was little or no discussion about Holland's proposed new truck routes at the regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night, but communications to Council spoke rather eloquently that the subject is far from settled.

First, there were letters from the following objecting to the proposed route: Beth Pankic, 866 East 24th St.; David G. Myers, 891 East 10th St.; Jacqueline King Donnelly, 151 West 13th St.; Mrs. Etta Hesselink, 98 West 12th St., and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Brinks, 239 Waverly Rd.

Next was a petition with 39 signatures from residents of Waverly Rd. objecting to the proposed use of Waverly Rd. as a truck route.

A petition with 52 signatures objected to 24th St. as a truck route.

All were referred to the city manager.

There were several visitors at the Council meeting, but none chose to speak when the agenda called for communications from the audience.

Mayor Lou Hallacy later asked if they were there for truck route purposes (which they were) and then explained that City Council is studying the entire plans as well as studying all the communications, and hopes to make a decision in the future that will be in the best interests of the city.

There was no direct communication from the newly organized Holland Neighborhood Association announced in Wednesday's Sentinel, but the new association did send messages to each Councilman.

All Councilmen except Bea Westrate and Elmer Wissink were present at the 45-minute session. The invocation was given by Pastor Larry Johnson of the City Mission.

## General Phone Offers Life Line

General Telephone is now offering a special limited one-party residential telephone service called "Life Line" in Hamilton according to John VerBeek, Division Manager for General Telephone Co. in South Haven.

The new service is designed for those who make very limited use of their telephone service but who want basic service available because of security, emergency or other generally limited uses.

Life Line is a one-party service limited to 30 calls per month at a rate \$2.00 less than the regular one-party service rate in an exchange.

In the Hamilton exchange, one-party service costs \$9.20 per month and the Life Line rate is \$7.20 per month. Additional local calls over 30 will cost Life Line customers 10 cents for each.

Cars operated by Marcia Jean Rutgers, 37, of 249 Leisure Lane, and Edward Peter Lysnicki, 32, of 300 Fallen Leaf, collided Tuesday at 1:26 p.m. at Ninth and College. Both cars were traveling east when Lysnicki attempted a left turn from the center lane.

## BPW Cites Water Rate Increases

The Holland Board of Public Works Thursday sounded the need for higher water rates to keep the water plant afloat and blamed water conservation for a \$100,000 annual operating deficit.

Board member Stuart Padnos emphasized the need for as much as a 20 per cent rate increase in 1977 to stop operating losses and not to finance a proposed water pipeline crossing Lake Macatawa.

Padnos said the rate increase would stop a drain on the water department reserves, allow funds for the BPW's share of the lake crossing and prepare for future bonding for water transmission line expansion in the city.

But he added that a rate hike would be necessary even if the lake crossing project was not started.

BPW general manager Frank Whitney said the board asked council for a 30 per cent rate increase last year and was granted a ten per cent hike. He said the additional 20 per cent increase still was needed.

The operating loss was blamed on water conservation by customers, primarily the larger industrial users. But a wet summer in 1975 cut water uses by residential customers, too, Whitney said.

Water uses this month exceed the uses a year ago by five million gallons and the dry weather conditions contributed to increase, officials said.

The BPW discussed the lake crossing project which would be a joint venture with the townships of Park and Laketown and called for a study session with council before making a final recommendation.

The lake crossing is the first phase of a projected three-phase project to expand water transmission lines into Holland.

Whitney said the BPW should decide whether they wanted a backup supply line for the city and if they did the crossing should be completed with the two townships. The single supply line now crosses the lake at the River Ave. bridge.

The townships, he said, were ready to construct their own lake crossing without the BPW and it would be more costly for the BPW to install its separate pipeline crossing at a future date.

Whitney estimated the BPW's share of the lake crossing project at \$584,105. The transmission line would tap into the city's water line at Perry St. and 168th Ave. and follow 168th to Ottawa Beach Rd. then west to near the Holland State Park entrance and across Lake Macatawa to Point West and then to Ottagan and 66th St.

Phases two and three would extend the transmission line into the city for connection with the existing distribution system in future years.

## Visitor From The Netherlands Recovers Loss

A visitor from The Netherlands received happy confirmation of the honesty of the people of Holland recently.

Mrs. Martin (Coby) Ver Hoevan and her husband were visiting her sister, Jantina Van Zeel of West 22nd St., and on a shopping trip downtown, Mrs. Ver Hoevan lost her purse.

After retracing her steps, and finding no trace of the lost handbag, she stopped in at the Holland Police department to report the loss for insurance purposes. While she was describing her loss, one of the policemen brought out her lost purse, which had been turned in to the police department by a woman who did not leave her name.

The Ver Hoevans will attest that there are "still honest people in Holland."

## Fire Causes \$5,500 Damage

A chicken coop and garage on the Louis Culver residence, 4234 136th Ave., in Holland Township, were destroyed by fire at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

Fire started in the 20 by 40 foot chicken coop and spread to the 20 by 48 foot garage.

Loss was estimated at \$5,500 but cause of the fire was not determined.

Holland Township and fire department and the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department responded to the fire.

## Wheelchair Hit by Car, Man Killed

ZEELAND — David Van Ommen, 80, a resident of Haven Park Nursing Home, died in Blodgett Memorial Hospital in Grand Rapids early Saturday of injuries suffered when struck by a car while in a wheel chair in the nursing home parking lot Thursday.

Zeeland police said Van Ommen was in the wheel chair pushed by his wife when struck by the car in the parking lot. His wife was not injured. Police said the driver of the car, an elderly woman, apparently panicked when she spotted the wheel chair and hit the gas pedal instead of the brake.

The accident was reported Thursday at 4:10 p.m. and Van Ommen was taken first to Zeeland Community Hospital and then transferred to the Grand Rapids hospital.

The name of the driver was not released pending further investigation, police said.

Van Ommen had been ill for more than a year and had been a patient at the rest home.

He was a member of the Second Reformed Church, Zeeland, and a veteran of World War I serving overseas as a lieutenant in France and Germany. He was a member of the Gilbert D. Karsten Post, American Legion and was a former Zeeland City Council member, former member of the Zeeland Board of Education, former president of Zeeland Lion's Club, former president of Zeeland-Holland Hatchery Men's Association, a pioneer hatchery man in Zeeland, life member of the Masonic Blue Lodge in Holland, Saladin Temple Grand Rapids.

Surviving are his wife, Mildred; two sons, Dr. Ray A. Van Ommen of Cleveland and Jay of Scottsdale, Ariz.; seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He is the last survivor of a family of 11 children.

Funeral services were held Monday at 1:30 p.m. at the Second Reformed Church with the Rev. Kenneth Eriks and the Rev. J. I. Ernisse officiating. Burial will be in Zeeland Cemetery.

## Firemen Respond To Grass, Electrical Fires

Holland firemen responded to three calls on Tuesday, two of which were for grass fire.

At 9:33 a.m. a grass fire along railroad tracks south of M-40 for one-half mile was extinguished and at 8:44 p.m. a grass fire at 20th St. near the tracks was extinguished.

Firemen were called to Yiff's Food Farm at Eighth St. and Paw Paw Dr. to extinguish a small fire caused by an electrical short in the freezer.

Damage was confined to the freezer and wall and do damage estimate has been made.

## City Given Ice Storm Federal Aid

Holland has received approval from the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration Program for \$29,897 for damage received in a major ice storm which swept Holland area and other portions of the state last March 2. City Council was informed Wednesday night.

After the city of Holland was declared a disaster area, both the general city and the Board of Public Works submitted requests in April for reimbursement of storm-related costs.

Of the \$29,897 approved, the Board of Public Works will receive \$9,298 for costs of labor, equipment rental and materials used in repairs to the electrical distribution, and \$20,599 will be reimbursed to the Parks and Streets Departments for work in clearing debris.

Included in the latter figure is \$4,800 for removal of an estimated 4,700 cubic yards of brush, tree trunks and branches currently stored on cemetery land.

Council approved low bid of \$4,800 for this work from Shively Associates Inc. for clearing the debris within two weeks. It was the lowest of four bids ranging to over \$10,000. The vote was 6-1 with Councilman Hazen Van Kampen dissenting.

Several other bids also were let at Wednesday's meeting.

West Shore Construction Co. was low bidder for joint development of parking facilities for downtown businesses and the existing District Court building, and for paving a small parking area on city-owned property adjacent to Bouws Recreation Pool in Smallerburg Park. The downtown parking lot was listed at \$18,039.25 and the swimming pool lot at \$7,618.70 for a total of \$25,657.95. Ottawa county's share of the joint downtown lot is approximately \$9,500. The West Shore bid was the lower of two bids submitted.

On bids submitted for demolition of structures at 16 North River Ave. and 173 East Fifth St., Council rejected bids for the North River Ave. structure since the new owner wishes to handle the demolition himself and has taken out a permit to do so.

Council approved low bid of Houting and Meeusen Wrecking of \$720 for demolition of the structure at 173 East Fifth St.

Council approved low bid of Gordon Bouma Contractors for two sanitary sewer projects for a total of \$49,053.50. One is in Dartmouth Ave. and the other in Maple Ave. from 34th to 35th Sts. Three bids had been submitted.

The city assessor prepared a special assessment roll for the Maple Ave. sewer at an estimated cost of \$13,820 with \$7,780.92 to be assessed and the city's share at \$6,039.06. A hearing was scheduled Sept. 15.

Council did not approve a plan to pave a drive on cemetery property tabled from last meeting. One Councilman felt a more thorough study of all cemetery drives should be made with an aim to complete paving. Another was of the opinion that paving is needed in many sections of the city first.

An application of Richard Deitz for a permit to move a garage from 177 West 25th St. to 271 West 24th St. was approved.

A letter from Boyd Berends regarding a permit to move a garage from 588 Maple Ave. to a location outside the city met with changes during the moving process, and the garage is now at 449 West 32nd St., the same location where the house was moved to. The garage move had followed the same route prescribed in the permit. Council approved the change.

Approval was given a Board of Public Works report submitting final contract documents with Hennes Erecting Co. in the amount of \$549,641.70 for general construction work on the electrostatic precipitator for unit 4 of the light plant.

Approval also was given a Hospital Security and Fire Alarm agreement with the police department as well as two leases of hospital laboratory equipment: Beckman System 1 for three years at a yearly expense of \$4,028, and a Helena Auto-Scanner Electrophoresis machine for three years at a yearly cost of \$3,029.76.

Gifts to Herrick Public Library, mostly memorial books, were acknowledged.

West Shore Construction Co. was low bidder for paving a portion of Paw Paw Dr. to Waverly Rd. at a cost of \$1,639.80.

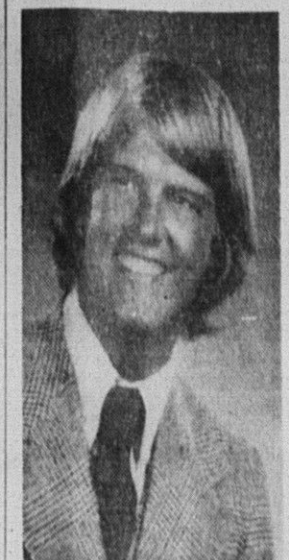

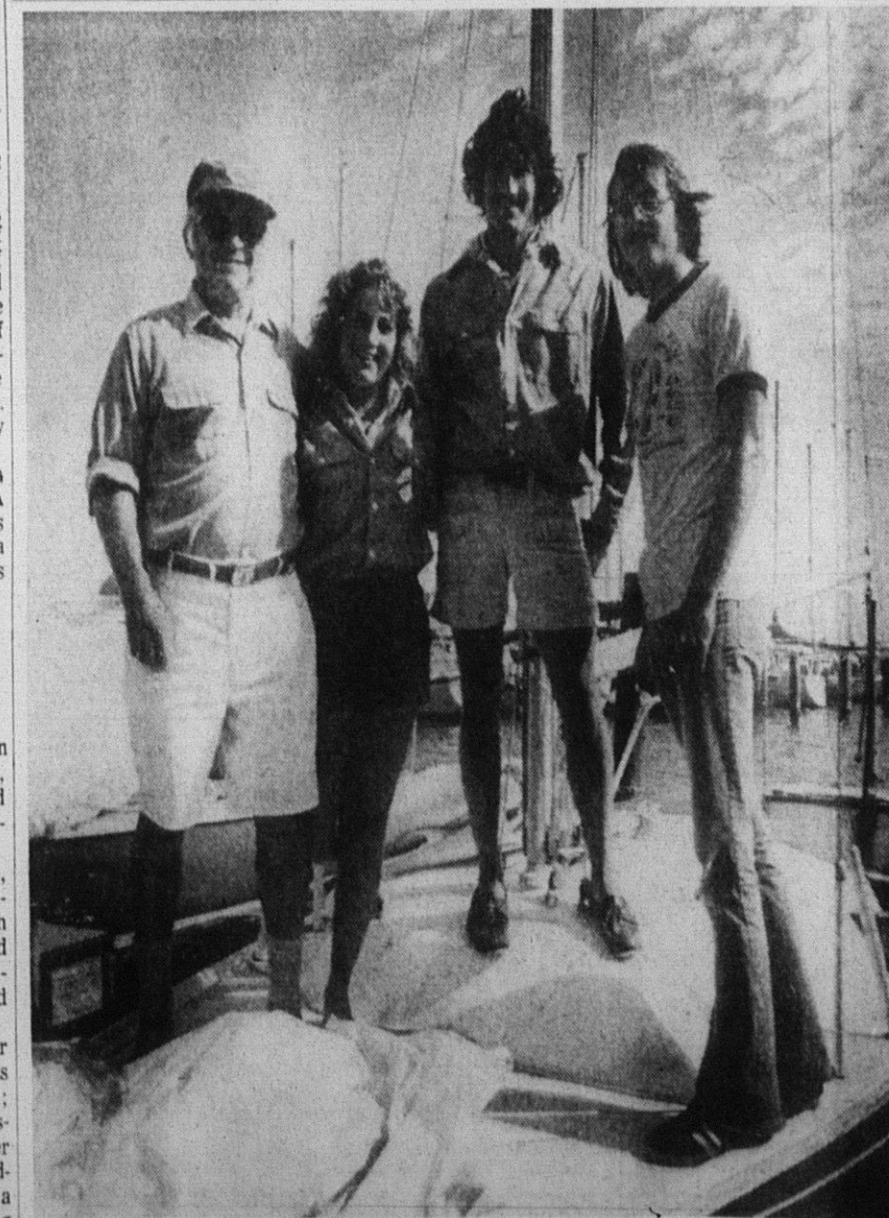
