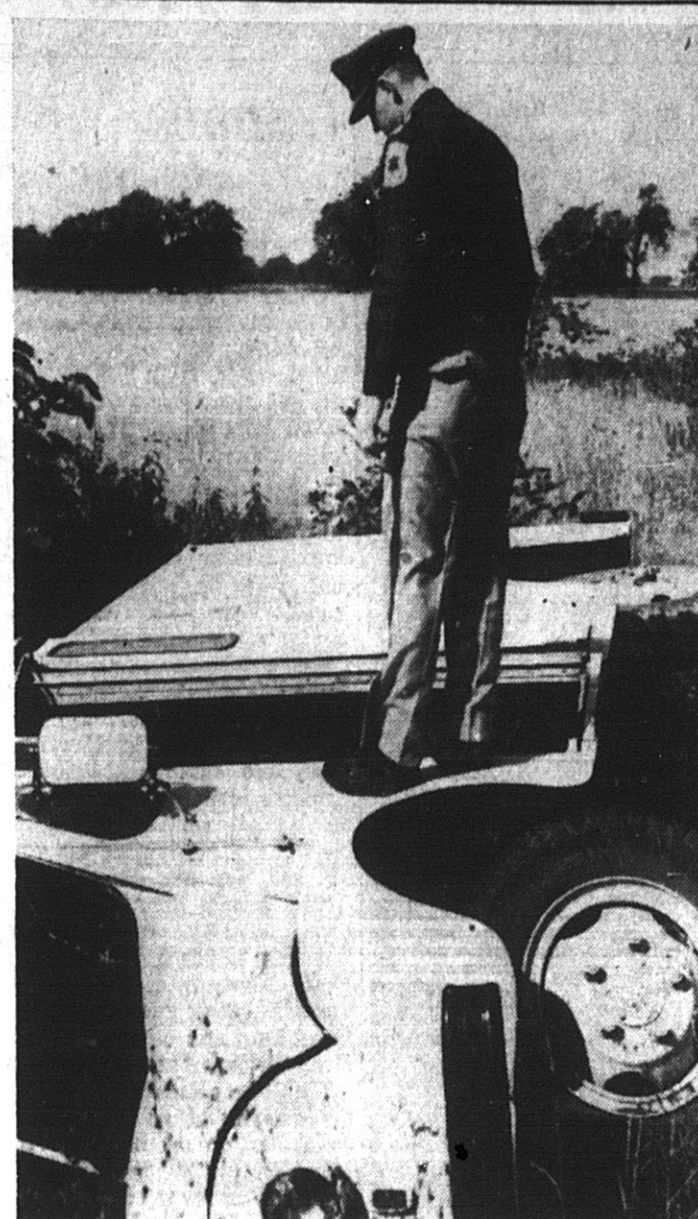

City Labor Groups Meet

The recently reactivated labor committee of City Council met with representatives of certain city employees Monday night in City Hall for a meeting arranged by the State Mediation Board. Another meeting is scheduled Sept. 26.

The meetings are a continuation of similar gatherings held the last few years. Union-affiliated City employees are mainly with the Board of Public Works. On July 1, 1959, the city put all BPW employees on a 40-hour week, adjusting hourly rates to compensate for take home pay.

Since some of these hourly rates are above the prevailing rates in the community, the Council committee feels cost-of-living increases are not justified at present.

Proposals involve payment of unused sick leave, voluntary deduction of union dues, three weeks of paid vacations after 10 years of service, longevity pay of a \$100 increase per annum for each five years of service to the city, a general 5 per cent increase, and overtime pay of a day and a half for the sixth day and double time for the seventh day worked.

In general, the Council committee feels that sick leave is not an earned benefit and objects to full payment of accumulated sick leave on death or retirement. It also is opposed to deduction of union dues, and feels three weeks vacation after 10 years of service is above the norm in the community.

Serving on Council's committee are John Van Eerden, chairman, Ernest Phillips, John Beltman and Henry Steffens. Ed Dulyea, a chairman for union employees, is also present.

Seminary Head Given D.D. Degree

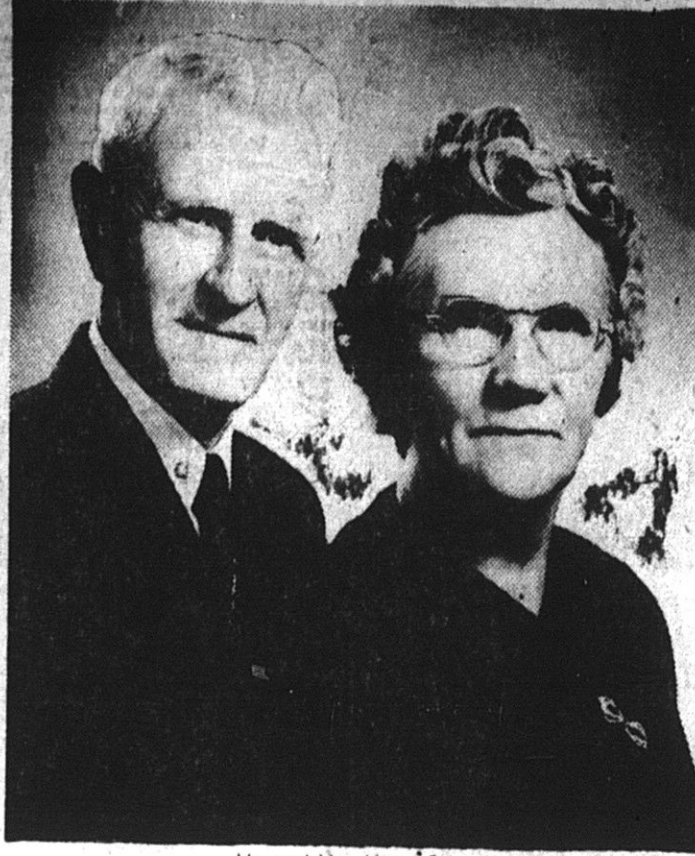

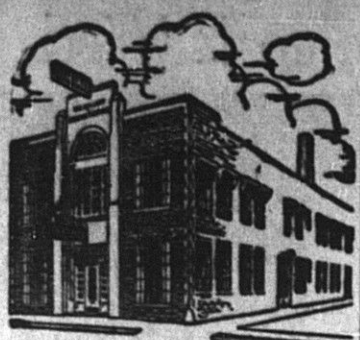

We have been reading and lis-
tening to a great number of peo-
ple talking about the trip that Mr.
Khrushchev is making to the
United Nations. Great numbers of
people need to be reminded that
the United Nations buildings and
grounds, while they are on the
island of Manhattan, for all in-
tents and purposes are not con-
sidered a part of our country.

We like a number of the people
with whom we talk and listen
sometimes wonder about the United
Nations. Then we stop and re-
view just how the United Nations

ber of people from over the world

the many world problems and then
we are well aware that we can
do a lot of talking with people
from all parts or most all parts
of the world, talk is much better
and cheaper than hot war.

Sunday School
Lesson

False Leadership Brings Ruin
Micah 3:1-6; Micah 3:9-12
By C. P. Dame

This lesson and the one follow-
ing will be devoted to the study
of the prophet Micah. This prophet
possessed a moral earnestness
which both the leaders and fol-
lowers in the church and state
need today.

1. Some leaders mislead. We do
not know much about the man
Micah. He was a native of the
small village Moresheth-Gath, lo-
cated near the Philistine border
about 20 miles from Jerusalem.
Tekoa, the home of Amos was
about 47 miles to the east. On the
great international highway from
Assyria to Egypt, which passed
near the village, travelled the mer-
chants and diplomats and marched
the armies either of Egypt or of
Assyria.

Micah got in contact with the
world of his day. Being a small
town man Micah looked with sus-
picion upon the big cities. Micah
preached during the days of Jot-
ham, Ahaz and Hezekiah, from
738 B.C. to 696 B.C. during the
last part of the famous eighth cen-
tury when Isaiah, Hosea and Amos
preached. From his book we gath-
er that Micah was familiar with
the social and political conditions
of the nation and its leaders.

Leaders have great responsibil-
ities. Micah criticized the leaders
of Samaria and of Jerusalem. Note
the words, "Hear, I pray you, O
heads of Jacob, and ye princes of
the house of Israel." They should
know and practice justice but they
did not do it. They hated the
good, and loved the evil and plun-
dered the people. The prophet said
that they "pluck off their skin from
off their bones," and robbed God's
people. The leaders who did this
were religious. The prophet speak-
ing for God, said that God would
not hear their prayers. The pray-
ers of God's people who disobey
him are not heard. What kind of
sins hinder the prayers of church
people today?

II. False prophets make people
to err. There always have been
true and false prophets. The false
prophets in Micah's day sold their
services for money. They would
say nice things to people who paid
them well but they would "de-
clare war against" those who did
not pay them. The false prophet
told the people smooth things but
God's prophets told the people
about their sins and called upon
them to repent.

The leaders of the nation were
money mad. Their craze for money
made them "abhor judgment and
pervert equity." They resorted to
violence and dishonesty in order to
get money. Some modern church
members are great lovers of
money. The older some of them get
the more they cling to what they
gathered, whether it is much or
little. Money still blinds eyes and
hardens hearts.

III. God punishes sin - he did
this centuries ago and still does.
Mark the fact that the prophet
said that because of the sins of
the leaders, therefore Zion shall
"be plowed as a field, and Jeru-
salem shall become heaps, and the
mountain of the house as high
places of the forest." The doom
came upon the nation and city in
722 B.C. when Nebuchadnezzar car-
ried the nation into captivity. Jeru-
salem, who prophesied later and
foretold the destruction of Jeru-
salem, was defended by some of
the elders who quoted the words
of Micah about Jerusalem's de-
struction.

Our nation will be called upon to
choose leaders. A people get the
kind of leaders they want. Much
depends upon the kind of leaders
a nation or community selects.
Christians should pray before they
vote. Religious leadership is im-
portant. Church members, the
young and the adults, who are
chosen to positions of leadership
in a congregation have a weighty
responsibility. Weak and lax
leadership hurts but strong leader-
ship builds up. When leaders set
a bad example they fail but those
who show moral earnestness bless
others.

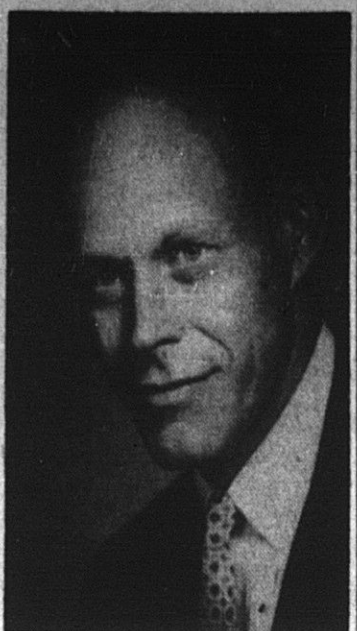

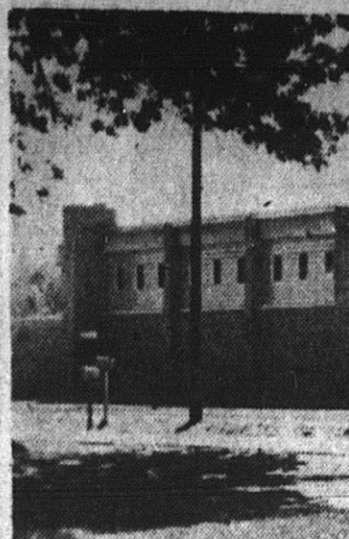
West Ottawa's football team held its first scrimmage Friday night against Grand Rapids Rogers at Rogers Field.

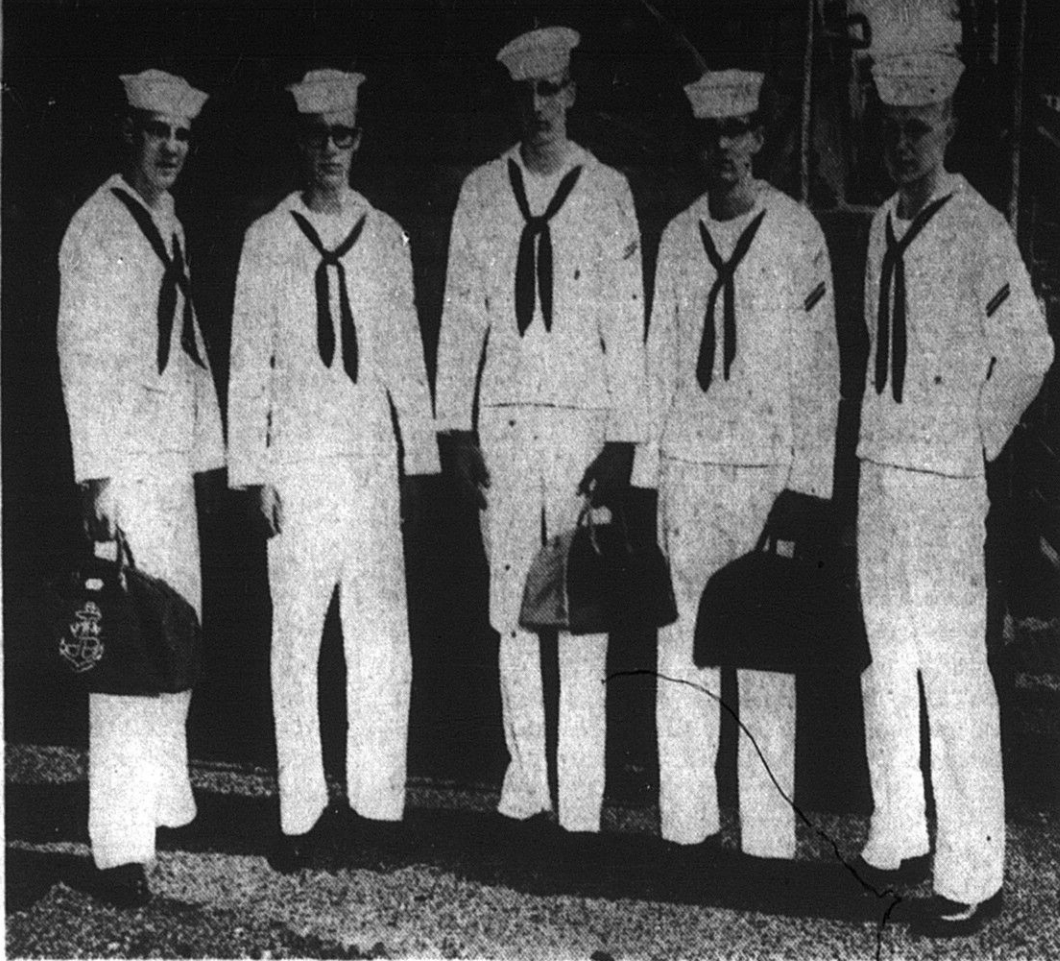

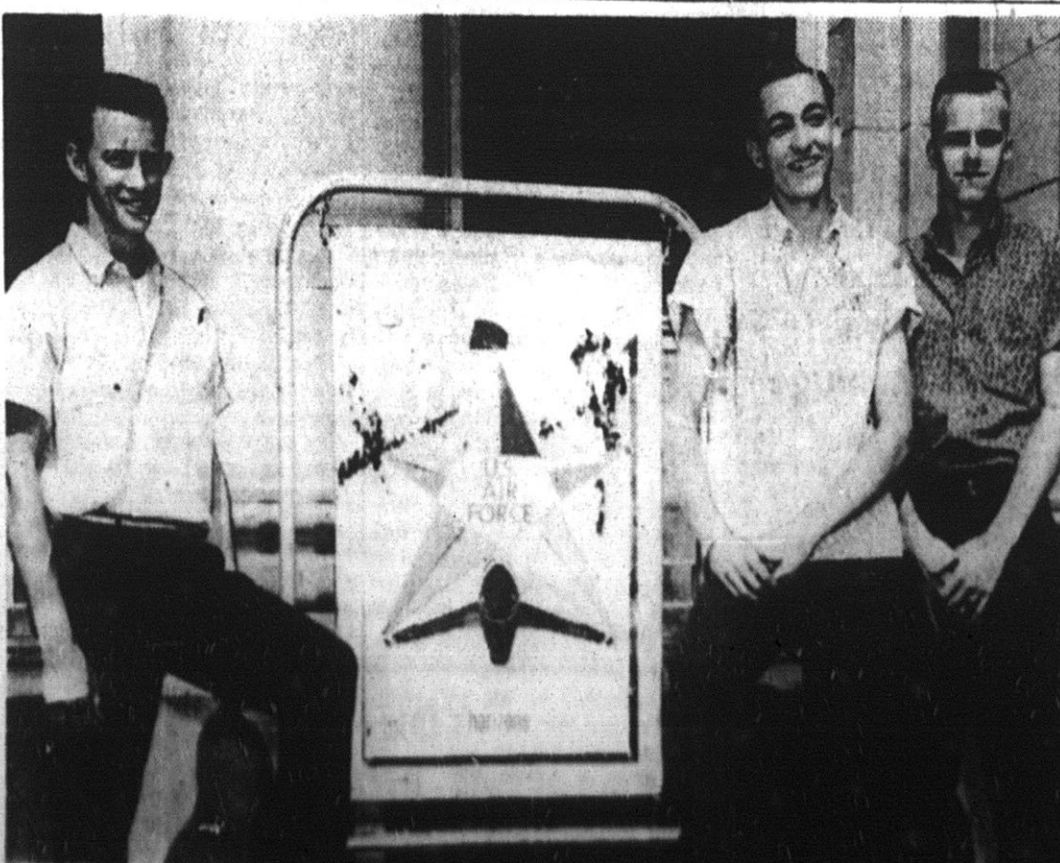

Big Increase Seen in City Housing Units

On April 1, 1960, there were 7,681 housing units in the city of Holland, according to a preliminary report of the U. S. Census Bureau. The figure includes both occupied and vacant units.

The Census Bureau reports that this is a 56-per cent increase over the 4,930 units reported in the 1950 Census of Housing.

Grand Haven, with 3,868 units, has increased by 17 per cent over the 3,298 units listed in the 1950 census.

Grand Rapids had a seven per cent increase over 1950 with 59,447 units from 55,362 in 1950.

Muskegon posted only a one per cent increase in housing units since 1950, jumping from 15,626 to 15,728 units.

The state increase in housing units was 30 per cent. There are 2,538,369 units in Michigan today.

The Census Bureau warns that these figures may differ from the counts included in the final reports, but said that they will probably differ very little.

Library Landscaper Speaks to Garden Club

The Holland Garden Club enjoyed a well illustrated lecture on "New Trends in Landscape Design" Thursday evening in the Herrick Library auditorium. Carl Gerlach, landscape architect and professor from Michigan State University showed that the large formal gardens of the past have become prohibitive in expense and labor.

The contemporary garden he called a "pocket garden" that uses a small space, often paved, accented with pots or planters of flowers or textured foliage. Paving materials of stained concrete, brick chips or stone are used in combination to vary the design intended.

He recommended treated cypress strips to be used between concrete segments that will add interest as well as provide for expansion. Michigan communities have been slow to adapt fencing for privacy in gardens, he said, but the small modern garden for outdoor living depends on fences for design and family use.

The popularity of the swimming pool has increased this need. Rather than copying the redwood fences of the far west, Mr. Gerlach mentioned white cedar which is readily available in Michigan. The lecture ended with the thought that today's garden should be kept simple for enjoyment and easy maintenance.

Mrs. J. J. Brower was chairman of the meeting which was open to the public. Cut samples of all the materials that Mr. Gerlach had used in the landscaping of the library were displayed. Also, a large table was filled with books, which the library has now on its shelves to help Holland gardeners.

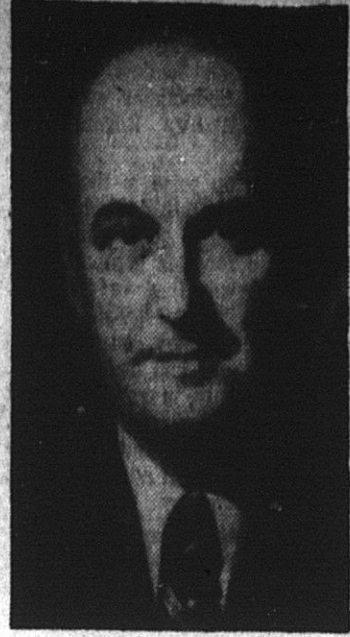

Enrollment, New School Discussed

Further plans for Holland's new high school and a review of current but as yet unofficial enrollment figures claimed most of the attention of the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night in the E. E. Fell Junior High School. It was the shortest meeting in many months, lasting only 33 minutes.

Enrollment in the seven elementary schools and junior and senior high schools falls short of the 4,000 figure, listing a total of 3,974 or 42 more than last year's total of 3,932.

By schools, enrollments are: Apple Avenue, 87; Thomas Jefferson, 368; Lincoln, 368; Longfellow, 376; Montello Park, 221; Van Raalte, 323; Washington, 601; total, 2,044; junior high, 934; high school, 996; grand total, 2,974.

By grades, the breakdown follows: kindergarten, 308; first, 315; second, 289; third, 278; fourth, 253; fifth, 250; sixth, 247; seventh, 310; eighth, 350; ninth, 286; 10th, 265; 11th, 295; 12th, 416; special education, 92; total, 3,974.

Reports of a previous informal meeting established the basis for agreement on several items for the new high school where site grading and earth compaction is nearly complete at 24th St. and Van Raalte Ave. Plans call for opening bids early in October with separate contracts offered for general trades (heating, ventilating and plumbing), electrical, planting and special treatment, structural steel, structural wood, precast concrete joists, special walls and siding, roofing and sheet metal, floor covering and ceramic tile, glass and glazing, acoustical, and hardware.

An opportunity will be afforded for contractors and school representatives to discuss general and special conditions at a meeting about the middle of September. It has been agreed that contracts will be awarded on the basis of the lowest bid without prejudice to location of the contractor. The Board of Education, however, has indicated common agreement on the need of a statement of pre-qualifications for prime contractors, with school plans going only to those contractors qualified by virtue of experience, size of organization, bonding capacity and quality of work performed.

Arrangements have been made with the Bos Tobacco and Candy Co. and Maple Grove Dairy to operate a snack bar for junior and senior high students on school days offering sandwiches, salads, drinks, soup, chili, beans and franks, and beef stew. The food service is on a trial basis and the experience gained may be a guide to the kind of service suitable for the new high school.

The board approved recommendations of the finance committee to equalize total deposits of all school district funds between Peoples State Bank and First National Bank of Holland. Inasmuch as the general operating fund of the district has a cash account of slightly over \$700,000, decision was made to invest \$75,000 in 30-day treasury bills, \$250,000 in 60-day bills, and \$250,000 in 90-day bills. The 30-day bills would yield approximately 2.24 per cent and fall due on Oct. 13, the 60-day bills 2.48 per cent and fall due on Nov. 10 and the 90-day bills about 2.52 per cent and fall due on Dec. 8. The approximate yield on the \$755,000 would be about \$2,800.

Invoices due this month total \$135,057 of which \$90,508.69 is for teachers' salaries.

Secretary James Hallan reported three payments on state aid as follows: Aug. 8, \$8,197.65; Aug. 10, \$20,884.20; Aug. 29, \$68,424.

President Harry Frisell, Treasurer Bernard Arendshorst and Secretary Hallan left early this morning for Chicago to sign bonds for approximately \$3½ million to finance the new high school. They also planned to refund insofar as possible the outstanding bonds on the Apple Avenue and Montello Park bond issues.

President Frisell presided at the meeting. All members were present except Carl Andersen. Vern Schipper of the faculty gave the invocation.

Aluminum Story Told at Meet Of Exchangeites

Mr. Cudlipp and J. H. Mitchell of the Alcoa Aluminum Company of America presented the company's new film "Products of Imagination" to the members of the Holland Exchange Club Monday noon. After the presentation of the film they answered many questions asked by the members.

Noon Optimists Hear Recording

Through the courtesy of Al Lucas the Noon Optimists, at their luncheon on Monday at Cumerford's Restaurant, listened to a tape on communist brainwashing of American soldiers. This was the second half of a recording of a speech made by William E. Mayer, Army Psychiatrist at Searcy, Ark. on April 15, 1957. Mayer had interviewed thousands of American servicemen released from Chinese prison camps in Korea.

Mayer stated that armed forces exist almost solely today because of communism. Four out of 10 people of the world lived under a communist dictatorship in 1957. Only a small percentage, however, in communist-dominated countries are active communists, most of them merely being acquiescers.

The education of American troops who were captured by communists took the form of tested principles of psychiatry used backward to devalue basic human relationships, the speaker said. These methods were pre-Czarist in origin and were adapted for use by the Chinese. Their evaluation of our soldiers showed our troops to have hazy concepts of loyalty to other soldiers and America, and poor knowledge about our country and why and how it operated. Four out of ten soldiers in captivity died during the first six months with the development of a "dog-eat-dog" attitude. We do not talk politics to our youngsters in America, but as the communists proved, youngsters are interested, and the Chinese gave our soldiers every chance to learn their viewpoint.

Every phase of the life and activities of our soldiers taken captive by communists, whether in games, arts, the theatre, the newspaper, was saturated with communist propaganda, the recording continued. Tons of such propaganda have been circulated in many countries. Our boys were taught to inform on each other because of rewards. In the Code of Conduct for our American service men they are told, if captured, to do nothing to hurt their fellow Americans.
