All Schools Hold Short Sessions

Local schools were abuzz with activity Wednesday as a good share of the children in the local area reported to classes.

Public schools had their second afternoon of activity following an opening session Tuesday afternoon. Teachers gathered for coffee Wednesday morning and an official welcome from the board president, Harvey J. Buter, and the new superintendent, Donald Ihman. On Tuesday morning, teachers held building meetings.

Christian schools opened Wednesday for abbreviated classes. The system operates a high school, two junior high buildings and six elementary schools including the new East View Christian Elementary which occupies the old Van Raalte school building on East 16th St. which has been improved inside and outside.

Because of crowded conditions in the high school, about 980 high school students gathered in Trinity Reformed Church for the opening convocation which featured a talk by Dr. Dick Van Halsema, pastor of Central Avenue Christian Reformed Church. Principal Raymond Holwerda presided.

West Ottawa schools also opened Wednesday, holding abbreviated classes with dismissals before noon. Kindergarten and special education classes have scheduled later openings.

There appeared to be a minimum of mixups in a complicated bus schedule.

All three systems started full-day sessions Thursday. Although enrollment figures were not available immediately, there appeared to be increases in all systems.

At the meeting of public school teachers Wednesday, Steven Van Grouw, president of the Holland MEA district, gave the welcome and Dr. Bernard Brunsting of First Reformed Church led devotions. Councilman Eugene Vande Vusse gave the welcome for the city. Supt. Ihman introduced principals who in turn introduced new staff members.

Mrs. Kenneth De Pree, local representative to the NEA convention in Seattle, Wash., the past summer, reported on the convention.

550 Visit X-Ray Unit

A total of 550 persons took advantage of the free chest clinics at the mobile unit of the Michigan Department of Health Wednesday outside Civic Center. Of this number, 490 gave blood samples for diabetes tests. Samples are not taken from known diabetics.

Up to noon today, 150 persons had visited the clinic. Registrations are taken inside Civic Center where blood samples also are taken. Chest x-rays for the detection of tuberculosis, heart ailments, etc., are taken inside the mobile unit. No undressing is necessary.

The service is open to all persons over 30 years of age.

The clinic operates today until 6 p.m. and Friday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 4 p.m. It will continue operations five days next week.

The clinics are sponsored by the Ottawa County Health Department, Ottawa County Medical Society, Michigan Diabetes Detection Project, Michigan Department of Health and Michigan Tuberculosis Association.

3 Civil Suits Filed in Court

GRAND HAVEN — Three damage suits were started in Ottawa Circuit Court Wednesday.

A \$15,000 suit was started by John Harold Vriesman of Ottawa county against Jacquelyn Ross, 17, Cleveland, Ohio, the result of an accident on US-31 in Berrien county Feb. 2, 1963.

Plaintiff claims that a car owned jointly by the defendant and Helen Ross, deceased, struck a car driven by the plaintiff, resulting in damages for injuries.

June Perry of Spring Lake seeks \$12,500 damages to herself and her car as the result of a traffic accident April 28, 1963, on M-104 at the outlet of Spring Lake. John M. Dennis, Spring Lake, was named defendant. Plaintiff claims her car was struck by a car operated by a son of the defendant, a minor, John D. Dennis.

Rook Transfer Lines, Holland, today started suit for \$1,523.59, claimed due from the Potchen Panels, Inc., of Marne, the amount due for shipment of goods in 1964.

The Coopersville State bank was awarded a default judgment Wednesday against Russell and Mary Margaret Griffis of Nunica. The bank claims \$1,119.71 is due on a note the couple executed in December, 1963.

Judge Raymond L. Smith Wednesday issued an opinion in connection with the arrest of E. H. Picard of Marne, who operates a fireworks and pyrotechnic supply store. He was arrested June 22, 1962, for allegedly passing and selling fireworks not exempted from possession in Michigan under the state law.

The Marne resident pleaded innocent in justice court here and Judge Smith was asked to rule on whether Picard may possess those fireworks in his store for sale to persons holding legal permits.

The court ruled that he may possess such merchandise. Judge Smith said Wednesday the law allows the sale of such fireworks, so it must follow that the dealer may have "in his possession that which he

Wants Windmill Sent Directly to Holland

Holland Chamber of Commerce sent a telegram to the Oranje Lijn in Rotterdam, the Netherlands, supporting Mayor Nelson Bosman's request that the ship carrying the windmill De Zwaan dock at Holland Harbor.

Roscoe Giles, executive vice president, is asking all local exporting firms to communicate with the Oranje Lijn to back the mayor's request, emphasizing that messages be sent immediately since the ship carrying the windmill is scheduled to leave Rotterdam Sept. 10.

The old mill De Zwaan (The Swan) has been dismantled in Vinkel, the Netherlands, and will be shipped via the St. Lawrence Seaway. The restored mill will be placed in the Black River delta in a garden setting. It is scheduled to be ready for Tulip Time in 1965.

Girl Admits Snapping Seven Maple Trees

ALLEDALE — A 16-year-old Alleendale girl has admitted to sheriff's officers she is responsible for the destruction of seven small maple trees recently planted along the drive into the campus of Grand Valley State College in Alleendale.

Deputies discovered horse hoofprints at the scene and followed them three miles to the home of the girl where she admitting snapping off the trees while riding.

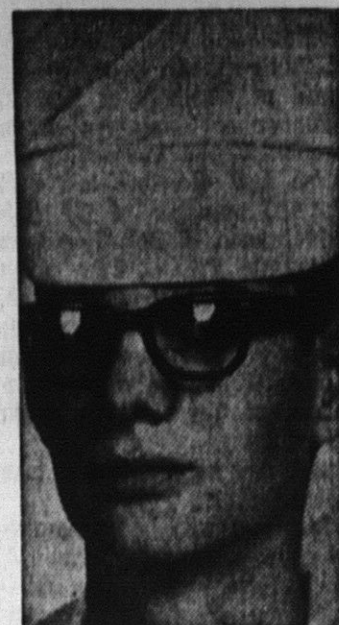

Ship Cannot Land Mill In Holland

Officials of the Oranje Lijn of the Netherlands reiterated today that the Dutch ship carrying the windmill to Holland cannot dock in Holland but must dock at Muskegon.

But the cablegram to Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Information Service pointed to the possibility of taking aboard a Holland delegation outside Holland Harbor, weather permitting, and proceeding to Muskegon where the ship will dock and the windmill will be unloaded.

According to G. J. de Jonchere, managing director of the Oranje Lijn, the 462-foot Prins Willem cannot turn properly in the 600-foot basin in Holland Harbor. He said such a maneuver would be much too risky and quite impossible in case of side winds because of high superstructure, even if tugboats were available locally.

He said all possibilities had been restudied following urgent telegrams from Roscoe Giles of the Holland Chamber of Commerce, Charles Conrad of Conrad Inc., and the Big Dutchman Poultry and Livestock Co., and that it was with greatest regret that the decision was made not to dock at Holland, Mich.

Wichers' office said it expected the Prins Willem would dock first at Chicago and then go to Muskegon, stopping outside Holland Harbor if weather permits.

Three Men Vandalize Cabin of Farm Worker

Gordon Breuker, owner of the G and B Blueberry farm, 16000 New Holland St., reported to Ottawa County sheriff's deputies that a cabin on his farm occupied by Clyde Smith of Bruce, Miss., was vandalized by three persons at about 3:30 p.m. Tuesday.

65 Hired In Nursing Personnel

A total of 65 new employees in nursing personnel at Holland Hospital is scheduled this season, according to H. A. MacKinnon, director of nursing services.

Three registered nurses started work Aug. 27 and seven registered nurses and eight practical nurses started work Wednesday. Fourteen more practical nurses are starting later in the month, and 33 co-op students from the three high schools in the community also are slated for service as pinks. The latter already have completed two weeks of classroom training under the direction of Mrs. Jennie Wouda, a registered nurse who conducts both classroom work and supervises the work of the pinks on the floors.

MacKinnon said the new employees constitute about one-third of the hospital nursing personnel. The greater share of new registered nurses and practical nurses will work 40-hour weeks. Pinks will work 15 hours a week and the expanded pinkie program is arranged so that the high school girls will work on different shifts throughout the season.

Previously, the Christian High School girls worked only in late afternoon and evenings, and the new program calls for them to serve some shifts on Saturday morning for greater experience.

The hospital administration is hopeful that the enlarged pinkie program will attract more girls into the nursing profession to help allay a long felt shortage.

Three Are Hurt When Car Crashes Into Tree

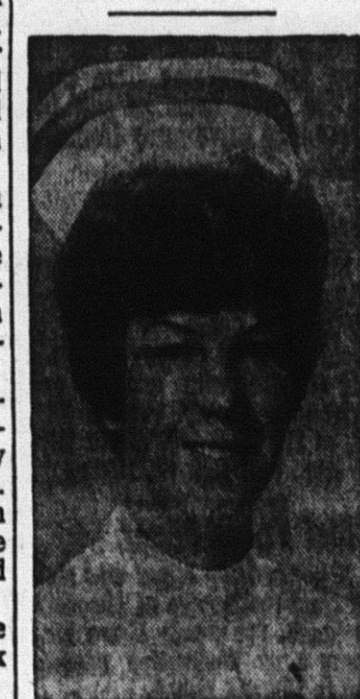

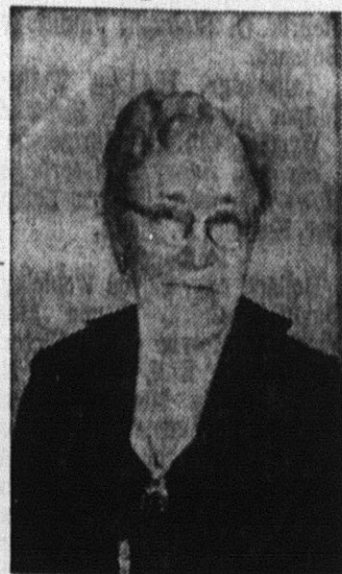

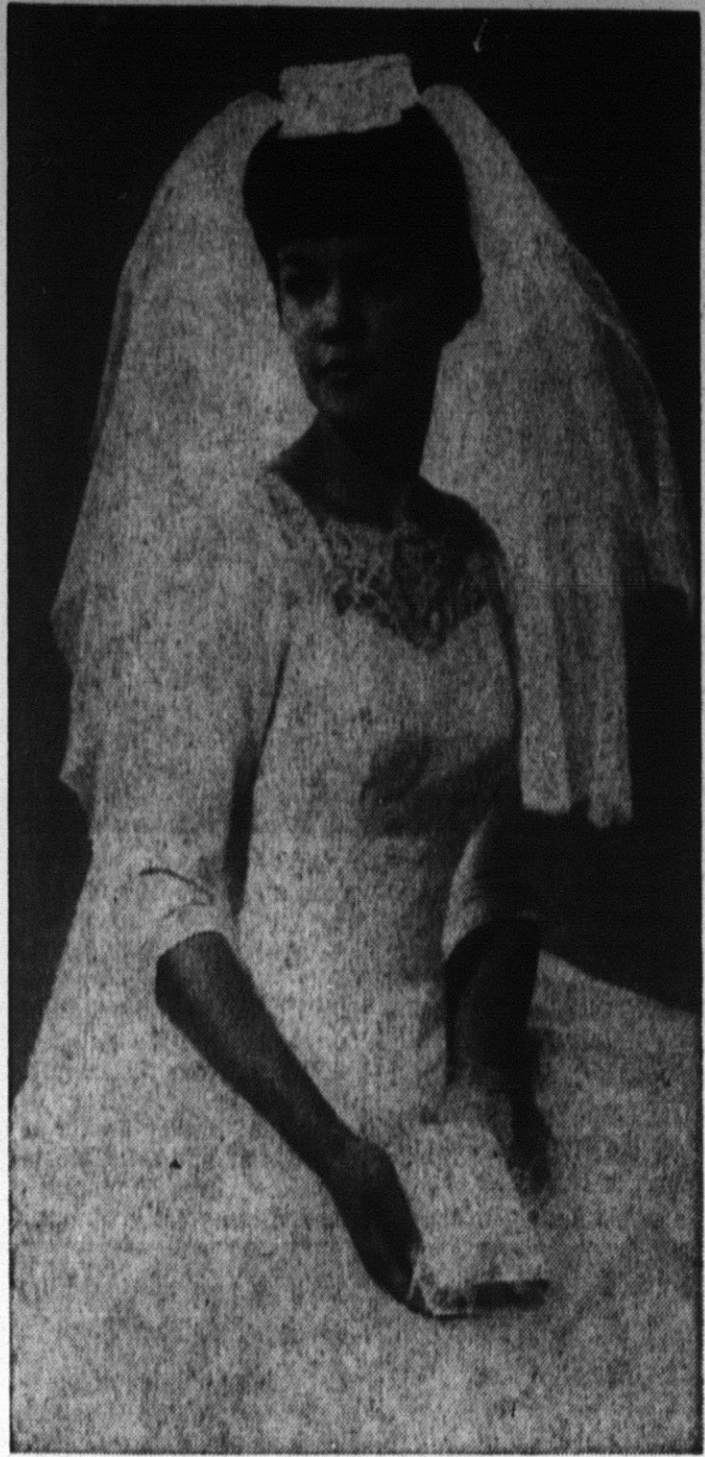

R. Machiele Speaks at Meet Of Rotary Club

Wheat and rye are the two commodities that offer U. S. farms their greatest chance for a larger share of the European Common Market, according to Richard Machiele, Ottawa County Agricultural Agent.

Speaking to Holland Rotary Club Thursday noon, Machiele said the United States now sells about \$1 billion in agricultural products to this market yearly. The U. S. Department of Agriculture hopes to increase this to \$5 billion.

Wheat is currently selling in the European Common Market at about twice the U. S. price which includes government subsidies. In addition to feed grains, eggs and poultry also offer a limited market, Machiele said. He pointed out that despite recent embargoes, Marve DeWitt of Borculo is selling substantial quantities of poultry parts abroad.

Machiele said he did not believe U. S. farmers would ever organize solidly into unions, despite recent activities of the NFO in withholding beef from the market in an effort to obtain better prices.

"The answer to our farm problem is in a program of growing better products and marketing them properly," he said. "In the last few years, celery and blueberry growers in Ottawa County have shown it can be done."

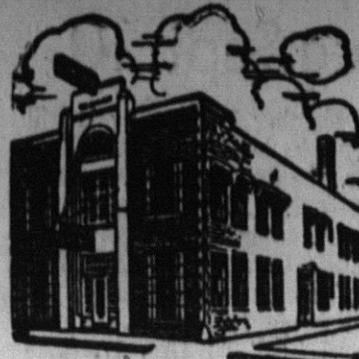

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EDUCATION

This is the time of the year when millions of people are very busy making plans for the return of their children to school. We have just received this information from the people who publish World Book Encyclopedia:

Time was when "back to school" meant getting only little Johnny out from under and back into teacher's hands. But this year almost half the nation will be involved in some kind of schooling.

While more than 37 million children will go back to the public schools, some 4.5 million youngsters will be attending colleges and universities. In addition, according to World Book Encyclopedia, there are about 50 million Americans who take part in some kind of adult education.

Of course, it may be just a course in good grooming or flower arranging, but it's still a long way from the days when only a handful of privileged young men could sit around gabbing with a Socrates or a Zeno.

As the numbers of those involved in education have risen, so have the costs. Back in 1880, it cost an average of \$7.91 a year to educate a child. By the turn of the century, it was \$13.87. In 1940 the cost was about \$91.64. And today, the United States spends an average of more than \$400 a year for each child.

Where does the money come from? More than half the cost — 56 per cent — is borne by the local school district. The state contributes about 40 per cent, and the federal government, about 4 per cent.

The cost of education continues to increase. This is only one of the problems that face us today. Plans should be made to use the school facilities every month of the year. Sunday School Lesson

A Spokesman for God
I Samuel 2:19-20; 7:5-6; 10-17
C.P. Dame

Some people live a rich, full life and make a contribution to their generation and nation. Samuel belongs to that class. He was a prophet, a priest, and a judge and he filled every position in a praiseworthy manner. He spoke for and lived for God all through his life.

I. Our background counts. Samuel was born in answer to prayer. His mother was for a time a disappointed wife—she longed to become a mother but she had to pray and wait. She promised God that if he would give her a son she would give him to Him for service.

When God answered her prayers she fulfilled her promise and brought the little lad to the tabernacle to serve there under the priest Eli. In the tabernacle Samuel had a definite religious experience—God spoke to him one night. Today some people scoff at a religious experience.

The Bible and history to tell us that several great men's lives made a deep impact upon their day because of the religious experiences they had. Samuel's experience effected his whole life.

"And Samuel grew"—he grew spiritually. Some church members grow and some do not. Every one of us ought to keep on growing spiritually. God was with Samuel. And the people knew that "Samuel was established to be a prophet of the Lord." People recognized him as being God's man.

II. God's spokesmen must be leaders. The spiritual condition of Israel was tragic. The priest, Eli, was a good but a weak spiritual leader and father. The sons of Eli were greedy and immoral. When Eli heard that the Philistines had captured the Lord's ark he died from the shock.

The nation was ready for strong leadership. Samuel summoned the nation to meet at Mizpah. There he told the people to put away their idols and serve the living God. The nation "drew water, and poured it out before the Lord, and fasted." The pouring forth of the water symbolized penitence.

It is a great day when a nation confesses its sins.

The Philistines considered the assembly of the Israelites dangerous and so they prepared battle. The Israelites were frightened and asked Samuel to pray for them.

God heard the prophet's prayer and "thundered with a great thunder on that day upon the Philistines, and discomfited them; and they were smitten before Israel."

God used nature, which he controls to defeat the Philistines. "Then Samuel took a stone and set it between Mizpah and Shiloh and called the name of it Eben-ezer, saying, Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." He wanted to impress upon the nation that God had given them the victory.

Samuel was a leader of the nation for forty years. He was a judge who travelled about the country. People came to him to settle family quarrels and disputes between neighbors and to counsel. In every way Samuel was a blessing to his nation. He was a servant of God who sought God's glory and the people's welfare.

The nations of our world need leaders like Samuel.

Saugatuck Has Quiet Weekend

SAUGATUCK — The village of Saugatuck returned to normal Tuesday following a busy but relatively quiet Labor Day weekend.

Police, bolstered by the addition of 60 state troopers assigned to special patrols in the Saugatuck area, kept vandalism to a bare minimum during the long holiday weekend.

Some 183 persons were arrested during the holiday period and appeared before Saugatuck Justice of the Peace Erv Kasten Sr. More than half of the arrests were for liquor violations, which totaled 96.

Another 69 arrests were made for traffic violations. Kasten said that none of the arrests was for vandalism or malicious destruction of property.

Persons arrested on liquor violations were sent to the Allegan County jail at Allegan. All but eight or 10 had been released on bond by today.

Kasten said the high number of arrests during the last big holiday weekend of the summer was surprising in view of the number of policemen on duty in Saugatuck. More than 240 persons were arrested during the Fourth of July weekend when there were fewer police patrolling the area.

However, Kasten said the number of police in Saugatuck last weekend didn't give potential vandals a chance to cause a disturbance.

The village was not completely free of vandalism, however. A goal post at the high school athletic field was torn down, and a brick marker was wrecked by vandals who stole a bronze plaque bearing the name "Jarvis Memorial Field."

Vandals also tried to break into a shed at the athletic field but were unsuccessful. A metal door on the shed was bent.

State troopers who had been assigned to the special Saugatuck detail early Friday pulled out Monday. All 60 troopers were quartered at the Holland Armory during the long weekend.

State Police set up a communications van in Douglas and maintained radio contact with the armory and all local enforcement agencies during the four-day period. Troopers worked 12-hour shifts during the weekend.

National Guard officials at the armory said some squads of troopers left Sunday and that the police radio hookup at the armory was also taken out Sunday.

By noon Monday all but a couple squads of troopers had left.

All troopers assigned to the area had had special riot training. They were commanded by Capt. LeRoy R. Hunt, commander of the sixth district headquartered at Rockford.

Village President Lynn McCray said the people of Saugatuck were highly in favor of bringing the state troopers into the town. He said residents were not against having the college youth in town as long as they behaved well.

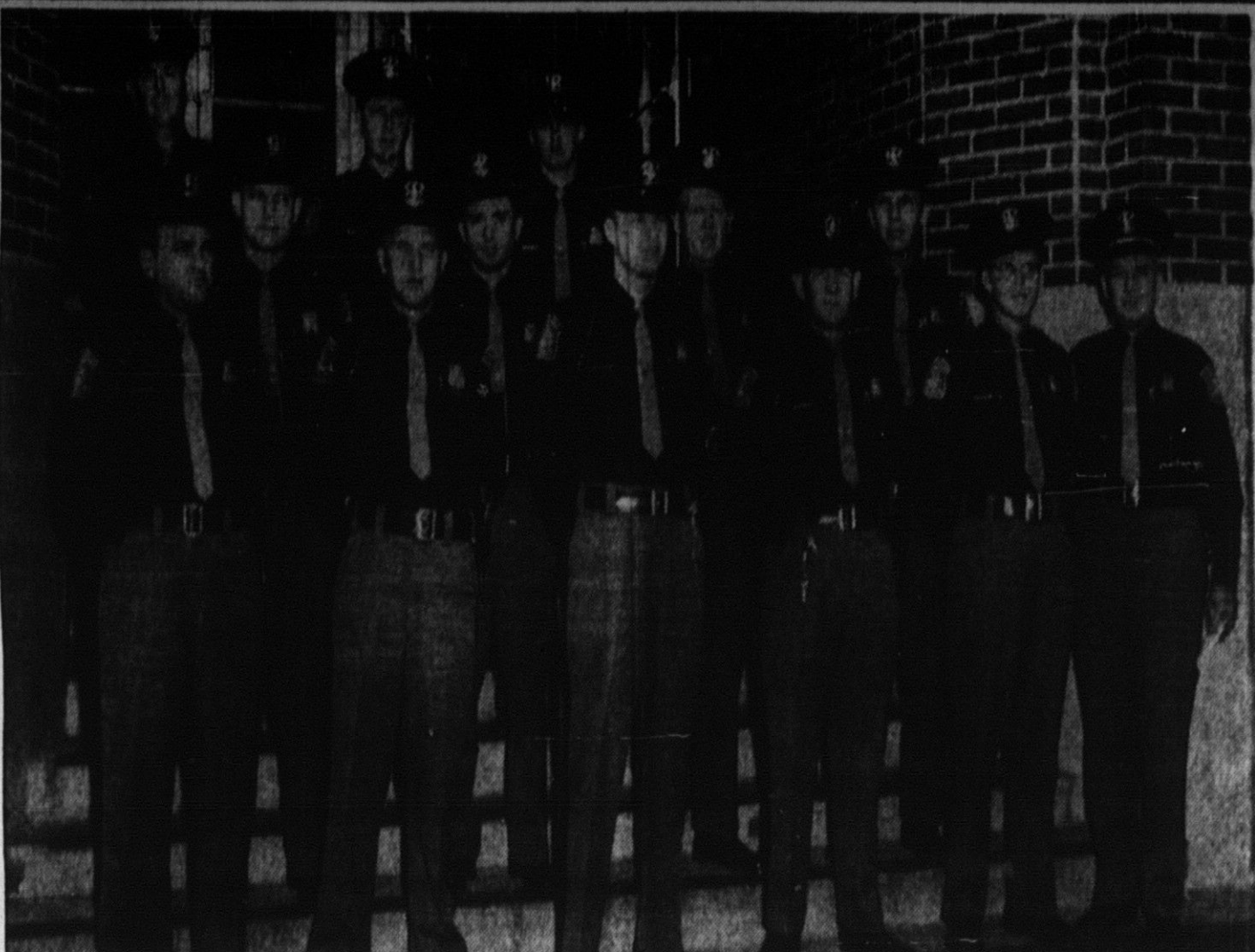

ALLEGAN (UPI) — Former U.S. Congressman Clare Hoffman, who never lost at the polls but yielded to a crippling illness, observes his 89th birthday at his home here today.

Hoffman, known as the "Lone Wolf" in Congress, served 14 terms from the fourth district before he suffered strokes in 1961 and early in 1962. He has since been confined to a wheelchair and to a passive role in politics.

His son, Atty. Leo Hoffman, said the family would hold a quiet celebration which would be attended by the ex-congressman's 11 grandchildren. The affair will include a big cake for the former U.S. Representative.

Hoffman keeps abreast of the presidential race and was an ardent Barry Goldwater fan even before the Arizona senator's nomination. The former congressman was known as a conservative and a rugged individualist who survived Democratic landslide and kept being re-elected to term after term.

"He voted by absentee ballot in the primary and will vote a straight Republican ticket by absentee ballot in the November election," his son said.

The Republican ex-congressman was a paradox in modern politics before he was stricken. He had no machine or organization behind him and during one campaign was even bucked by a GOP county group in his own district. He was outspoken, blunt, and a perennial target of Democratic labor groups.

As a "Lone Wolf" he realized no important piece of legislation bearing his name, but he played a large part in drafting the Armed Forces Unification Act and the Taft-Hartley labor law. He received personal citations from ex-presidents Eisenhower and Hoover for his work in drafting and supporting government reorganization bills which resulted from the work of the Hoover Commission.

But otherwise, he was known as an "overwhelming minority," who voted in Congress against Republican bills and Democratic bills alike if they were against his principles.

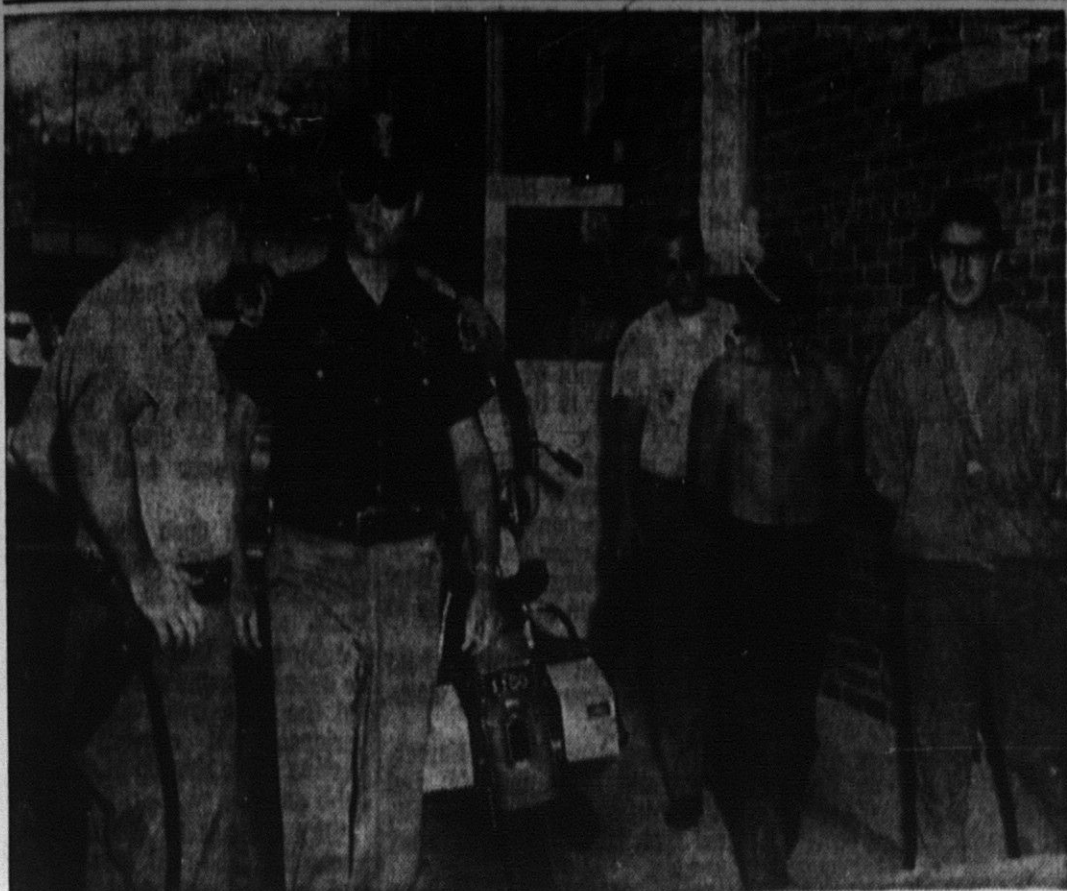

Two Escapees Back in Prison

Two Jackson prison farm escapees, captured east of Holland Thursday afternoon, were returned to Jackson about noon Friday.

The two, Richard Keenan, 25, of Chicago, and Kenneth Arens, 24, of Holland, were picked up by Jackson authorities at the Ottawa County jail in Grand Haven where they were taken shortly after their capture.

The two men were captured in the Federal District, east of Holland, after their car, driven by Arens, sped past a Holland police radar patrol car at 14th St. and Fairbanks Ave. about 12:15 p.m. Thursday.

Officers James Fairbanks, in the radar car, and Russel Hopkins, working the chase car, pursued the two north on Fairbanks Ave. to Eighth St. The pair then drove east on Eighth St. to Reed Ave. and turned north.

They had gone about one-half block down Reed Ave. when their car struck a bicycle lying on the edge of the roadway and stopped. The two men fled on foot.

Arens fled west between two houses and Keenan continued to run north on Reed Ave. Officer Hopkins chased Keenan and caught him after about four blocks.

Ottawa County deputies and state police joined the search for Arens. Holland police officer Gene Geib spotted Arens and gave chase but reported that he lost sight of him in the vicinity of Sixth St. and Chicago Dr.

Later a tip from a man working in a factory on Chicago Dr. reported seeing Arens enter a house on Clover Ave. Officers surrounded the house and Arens was taken without a struggle about 2 p.m.

Arens, who was not wearing shoes, had cut his foot during the chase and was taken to Holland Hospital for treatment

prior to the pair's transfer to the county jail at Grand Haven. Both men had been serving 2 to 15 year terms for breaking and entering in the nighttime.

The two men had left the prison farm, located three or four miles from Southern Michigan State Prison, about 9 p.m. Wednesday. Keenan said they headed into Jackson where they stole a 1967 model automobile just two blocks from the prison.

With a full tank of gas in the car, the two headed out of Jackson on I-94 past the state prison.

The first time they would have been missed, Keenan said, would have been at 10 p.m. when all prisoners were to be in bed and a bed check was held by the one night guard.

Keenan said he and Arens headed straight for Holland and arrived here about 3 or 4 a.m. Thursday. He said they drove around until they found a safe place to park the car and sleep. Keenan said he didn't know where they parked, but he said he could see a large number of boats around.

At the time of their capture, Keenan said they were looking for a place to ditch the car, and each was planning to go his own way. "He (Arens) is a guy who likes to drive fast," Keenan said, "and that's what got us."

Keenan, who had been at the prison farm since March, said he had been there longer than Arens and that he hadn't known Arens very well until they had decided to break out.

Keenan said he would have been eligible for a parole hearing in another seven months. He had been sentenced in March for a break-in at a Vandalia sporting goods store.

Arens was also convicted on a charge of breaking and entering, involving a grocery store east of Holland.

Hope Hurler Selected To Make Trip to Japan

George (Joey) Bosworth, Hope College's all-MIAA pitcher, Friday was named to the 20-member United States Amateur Baseball team which will play in Japan during the Olympic Games next month.

Coach Rod DeDeaux, baseball coach at the University of Southern California, announced Bosworth's selection to the team that will tour Japan on a goodwill tour during the Olympic Games.

DeDeaux reported the baseball team is being sent to Japan in answer to the request from the Japanese. The host country for the Olympics se-

lects a demonstration sport to be staged in conjunction with the Games, DeDeaux said, and the Japanese suggested U. S. baseball.

Because of Bosworth's selection to the U. S. team, the 19-year-old right hander has decided to return to Hope College

and will pitch for the Flying Dutchmen next spring. Bosworth, who had impressed Wake Forest coach Jack Stallings while playing in the Basin League this summer, had been given a full baseball scholarship to Wake Forest.

The tour will take most of the month of October and the Palos Heights, Ill., junior has decided to drop out of school for the fall semester. He will return for the spring semester and will be eligible to pitch, Hope officials said.

Working with the U. S. Baseball Federation, funds which will total \$50,000 were raised to send the U. S. team. Colleges and individuals contributed to the fund. Proceeds from Hope College's doubleheader with Central Michigan in May were sent to the fund.

DeDeaux said Bosworth's selection was made following recommendations from Hope College Daryl Siedentop, MIAA coaches, the Memphis State coach, (one of Hope's foes on the southern trip last spring), a report from Guy Wellman, Los Angeles Dodgers scout and on Bosworth's performance in the Basin League this summer. DeDeaux has been working for the past eight months selecting the team.

The team will assemble Sept. 21 in Los Angeles and will fly to Honolulu, Hawaii to train from Sept. 25 to Oct. 2, playing service teams. The team leaves Hawaii by plane for Tokyo Oct. 3, arriving on Oct. 4.

Sightseeing and practice is scheduled until Oct. 11 when the first game will be played in conjunction with opening ceremonies of the Olympics. The U. S. team will play the Japanese College all-stars in the

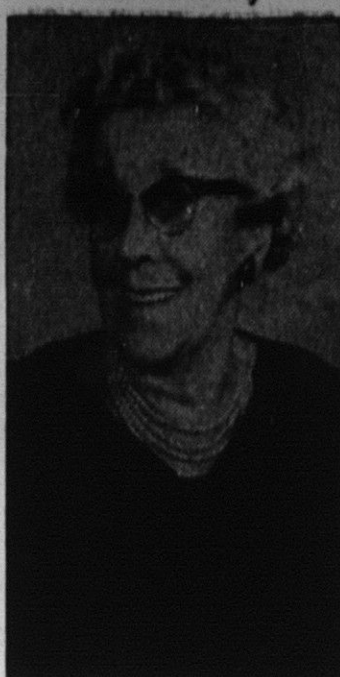

Views From The Campus

(Dr. Eugene Jekel is assistant professor of chemistry at Hope College. A 1952 Hope alumnus, Jekel received his M.S. from Purdue in 1955, and received his Ph.D. from that institution this past spring. He joined the Hope faculty in 1955 and from 1961 to 1963 attended Purdue on a leave of absence. This summer he served as director of the National Science Foundation Summer Institute for High School Teachers of Second Year and Advanced Placement Chemistry which was held on Hope's campus from June 21 to August 22. Editor's note.)

During the present summer Hope College was privileged to conduct a nine-week Summer Institute for chemistry teachers co-sponsored with the National Science Foundation.

Chemical educators of national reputation were invited to serve as weekly guest lecturers, each developing a topic in depth, so that during the course of the summer nine basic concepts of chemistry were considered. The institute experience has greatly increased the knowledge of chemistry and competence of the teachers. They benefited from the opportunity to study

with and learn to know personally outstanding chemical educators from all over the country. The 53 teachers, who were selected to attend the Summer Institute at Hope College, present an advanced placement or second year high school chemistry course, or plan to do so in the near future. The advanced placement high school chemistry course often enables the student to be exempt from the freshman college-level general chemistry course.

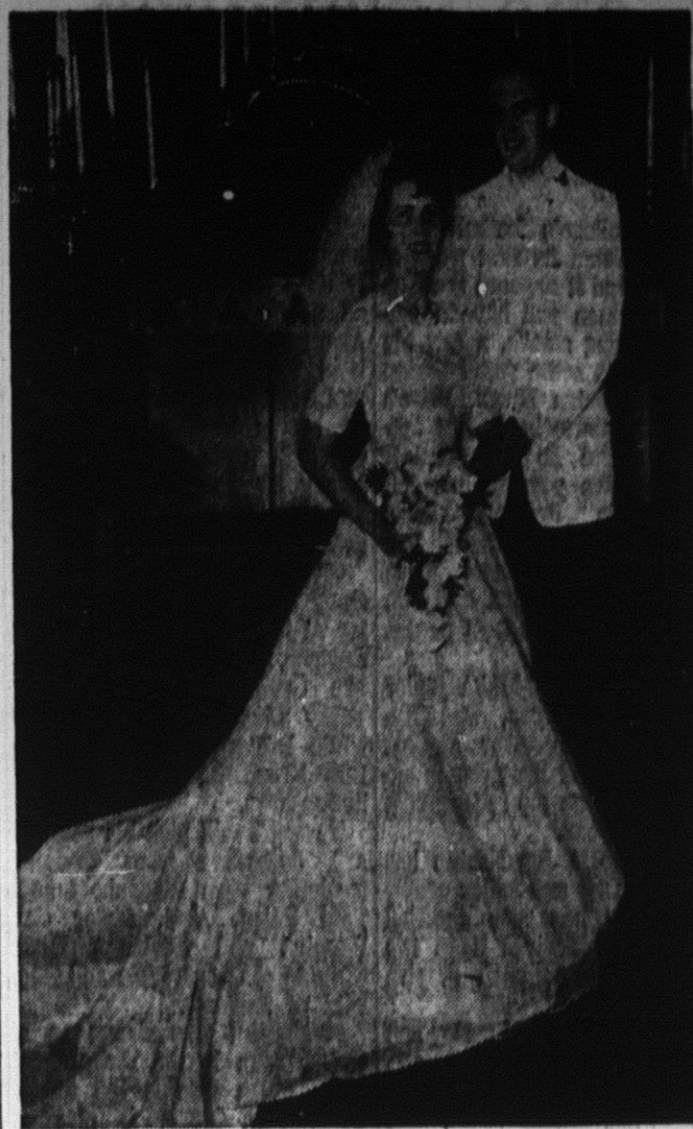
Appropriate national tests are prepared and administered each year by the Educational Testing Service and College Entrance Examination Board.

The results of these tests, along with the recommendations from teachers and advanced placement officers, determines the eligibility of the student to by-pass a college course. Subject areas in the advanced placement program include American History, Biology, Chemistry, English, European History, French, German, Latin, Mathematics, Physics, and Spanish.

Many advanced placement chemistry teachers are finding it increasingly difficult to know what they are to present in the second year course. The content of general chemistry courses differ so widely among the colleges over the country, that it is almost impossible for the high school teacher to present a course which the colleges would universally accept. In this institute we have developed a model course that focuses itself on nine basic concepts in chemistry.

In answer to the problem of the varied approaches on the college level, it is our belief that a firm grasp of fundamental principles in chemistry will justify the student's omission of the introductory college course. The basic concepts in

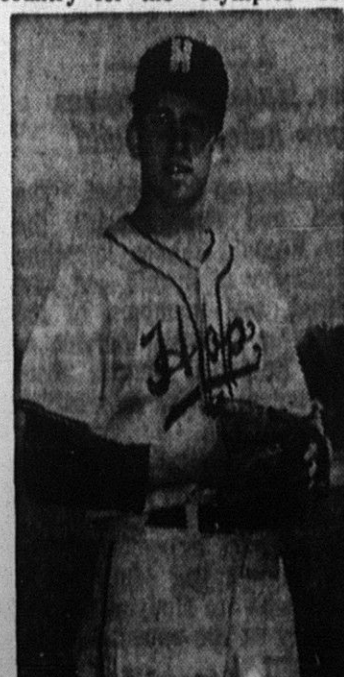

Hope College's football team has completed its first week of practice and it appears the Flying Dutchmen will have a pinpoint passing attack, a few big linemen and some small backs.

Junior Harlan Hyink, Hope's all-MIAA quarterback, has taken up where he left off last year and his passing has impressed in opening drills. Against Grand Rapids JC last Saturday, Hyink threw three touchdown passes and had two other possible touchdown passes dropped.

Bill Hultgren, all-MIAA junior end from Dearborn, was Hyink's favorite receiver against the Raiders and Hultgren is expected to be the top receptionist again this year.

Senior tackle Jon Norton has reported at 240 and junior center Bill Barger has also checked in at 240. This gives Hope two of the biggest linemen they've ever had.

John Stam, Holland senior and a 215-pounder, also provide size at tackle but a painful boil on his arm has sidelined him. Also counted on but out with a leg injury is sophomore 200-pound Carl Van Wyk.

Coach Russ De Vette has Norton going both ways at tackle while Barger, who played as a freshman at Union College in New York and spent last year at Muskegon Community College, is playing defensive tackle and offensive center. Barger is from North Muskegon.

Ken Postema and Paul Bast both looked strong in the scrimmage and will handle the offensive guards while Grandville junior Bruce Menning is running with Hultgren.

Max Schipper of Coopersville is the other offensive tackle while veteran senior Tom Cousineau and sophomore Ken Teusink are working with Barger at center.

Juniors Bill Keur and Tom De Kuiper are playing halfback and fullback while senior Jim Bekker is the other halfback. De Kuiper, who played halfback last year, has been switched to fullback. De Vette said he has three or four strings of the halfbacks but they are all small, mostly under 5'10".

De Vette has no depth at fullback and Capt. Rog Abel, usually used solely on defense, opened at the post against GRJC. Also running at fullback are Holland freshmen Steve Piersma and Paul Wassenaar. Abel showed his prowess defensively in the drill while Piersma looked strong at linebacker. Wassenaar has been slowed with a groin injury.

On defense, De Vette has Gary Holvick and Ken Carpenter at the ends with Norton and Barger at tackle. The guards are Grand Haven sophomores Terry Carlson and Cousineau while Postema, Zeeland junior Rog Kroodsmas and Bast play linebackers.

De Vette will pick his secondary defenders from Holland freshmen Vern Plagenhoef and Tom Pelon, Abel, senior Cal Poppink and freshmen Dick Holman of Coopersville and Ken Fiat of Saginaw.

Plagenhoef was strong as a corner man in the scrimmage while Pelon also looked tough defensively. Pelon is playing end on offense.

Freshman Randy Talman of Ottawa Hills and Plagenhoef are backing up Hyink while Zeeland freshman Don Kroodsmas is working at end.

Hope concludes this week with an inter-squad scrimmage Saturday. De Vette regarded Saturday's workout as a "good scrimmage but both teams were ragged." Hope used 45 players.

Besides the scholastic ineligibility which sidelined end Joe Kusak and fullback Chuck Langeland, a few other Hope players counted on this year aren't in the fold.

Sophomore tackle Menno Sytma decided to attend school in California while quarterback Bob Schantz didn't return to school. Zeeland tackle Bob Schrottenboer decided not to play and center Jim Ehrlich and halfback Glenn Gouwens didn't report.

Hope opens the season Saturday, Sept. 19, against Findlay College of Findlay, Ohio at 7:30 p.m. in Riverview Park. Hope scrimmages under the lights at Riverview Park on Sept. 16.

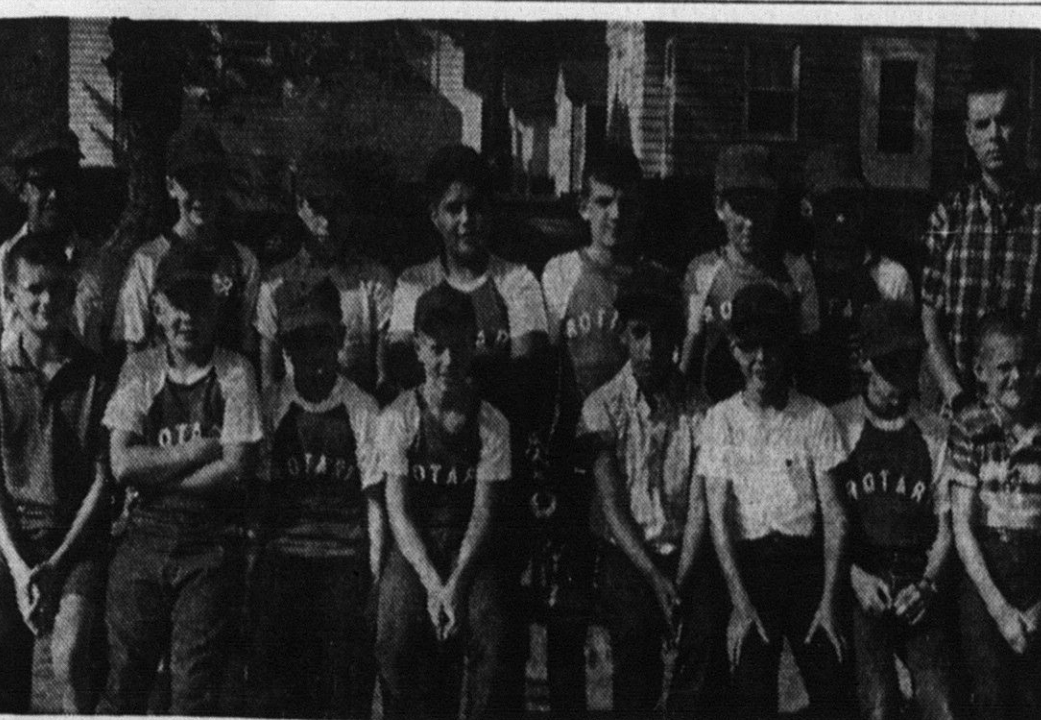
