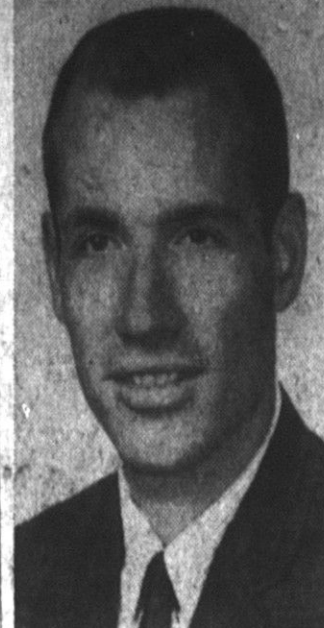

A heavy rainstorm about 5:30 p.m. Monday dumped large quantities of rain on the Holland area.

Many streets were temporarily covered with large pools of water as the drainage system was unable to cope with the heavy downpour.

A total of 1.15 inches of rain fell during the storm and later during the night according to Lynn Wheaton, official weather observer.

Damage to a street light regulator that kept 40 street lights from going on in an area bounded by Washington Ave., 32nd St., Ottawa Ave., and 27th St. may have been caused by the rainstorm, according to Guy Bell, superintendent of public utilities.

The damage to the regulator has not been determined. Bell said the regulator was repaired Tuesday and street lights operated Tuesday night.

Frank Kelley Will Speak At Breakfast

Michigan Attorney General Frank J. Kelley will discuss a new campaign against consumer fraud at the Holland Chamber of Commerce early bird breakfast in the Tulip Room of the Hotel Warm Friend Tuesday, Oct. 5.

Kelley's speech is one of a series he is making throughout the state to alert the public to the problem of consumer fraud. The attorney general's program is based on the creation of voluntary joint-action forces composed of law enforcement officials, representatives of business groups and representatives of consumer organizations.

The first phase of Kelley's program involves forming these local action groups in Michigan's 15 most populous counties and several other selected counties. These groups will be the beginning of a coordinated state-wide network of local groups aimed at thwarting the multi-million dollar fraud activities in the state.

A "hot line" communication system now being established will link the local groups with the attorney general's office. Under this system information about the consumer fraud activities will be called into a special telephone number in the attorney general's office. It will then be relayed to other county units.

Kelley will also discuss several other recent developments in prevention of consumer fraud. Among them are the provisions of the Michigan Home Improvement Finance Act recently passed by the state legislature. This act is designed to eradicate fraudulent operators in selling.

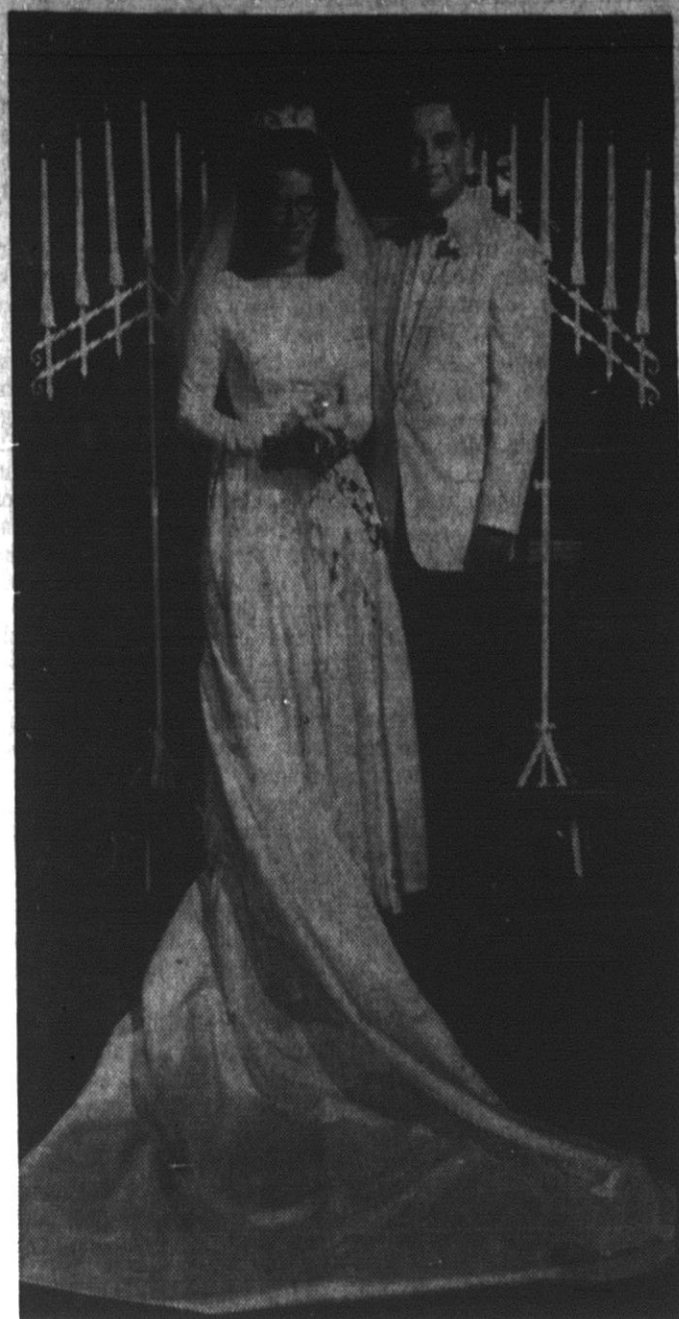

School Board Reaffirms Prayer Ban

The West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night reaffirmed a decision last week that to continue devotions in the schools would be direct violation of the law.

The board had received many letters protesting discontinuance of devotions. This action was taken following a meeting of superintendent and principals in connection with an attorney general's opinion Sept. 10 prohibiting religious exercises in public schools, based on a Supreme Court opinion.

"We do not condone civil disobedience," the board said. "If we were to continue devotions, we would knowingly be permitting an illegal act and would be sanctioning the disregard of the United States law, telling our children, 'If you don't like the law, don't obey it.'"

The board reaffirmed its policy of making school buildings available to church groups outside school hours without cost to the taxpayers.

Supt. Van Raalte was instructed to work towards a solution of the problem and to continue to study the situation to see if a suitable program can fit into the framework of the law.

Donald L. Ihrman, superintendent of Holland public schools, said today he has written Lansing for a copy of the attorney general's Sept. 10 opinion. When it arrives, the board will study the opinion and its ramifications. The Zeeland Board of Education expects to discuss the question at its October meeting.

In other business, the West Ottawa board approved contracts for four teachers. Mrs. Lois Klomparsen is engaged as fulltime kindergarten teacher; Mrs. Wanda Rider, elementary music two days a week; Mrs. Ruth Burkholder, vocal music part time, and John Schoon, high school Bible. Schoon, presently attending Western Theological Seminary after teaching a year in Japan, will conduct the elective Bible course one hour a day at West Ottawa. Dr. John Piet of the seminary is his advisor.

West Ottawa Enrollment Hits 3,563

A total of 3,563 are enrolled in West Ottawa schools, Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte informed the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night.

The breakdown follows: kindergarten, 325; pre-first grade, 15; first, 290; second, 281; third, 268; fourth, 273; fifth, 260; sixth, 255; seventh, 283; eighth, 309; ninth, 271; 10th, 237; 11th, 244; 12th, 207; special education, 45; total, 3,563.

Van Raalte said the system has 224 tuition students, 141 from Harrington district and 81 from Federal district. He also informed the board that the county reorganization committee is recommending that Harrington and Federal districts become a part of Holland district and such a shift might leave West Ottawa overstaffed in teachers since the \$105,090 in tuition and state aid for non-resident students is the equivalent of 12 fulltime teachers.

Van Raalte said the county recommendations are sent to the State Department of Public Instruction which takes final action.

The board acknowledged a letter from the Society for Christian Education expressing sincere appreciation for indispensable help in bus transportation, willingness to include fourth graders in the swimming program, permission to utilize Ventura school facilities and many other acts of helpfulness. The letter was signed by Hil Buurma, secretary.

Dan Paul of the teaching staff presented a report on the new pre-first grade venture in which a special reading book developed by Mrs. Joy Muehlenbeck, reading consultant for the district, is being used. The class of 15 pupils is taught by Mrs. Fran Baron. The class is designed to bring students up to grade level.

A letter from Peter Roon, assistant high school principal and administrative coordinator for the district, explained plans for an adult reading program associated with the adult educational program whereby high school credit will be offered. If successful, other courses will be added, leading to credits for a high school diploma. Already 11 non-graduates have expressed interest.

The board approved purchase of 300 chairs at a cost of \$3,325 for the three new elementary schools and other furniture at a

cost of \$6,783.55. Draperies for rooms in the three schools will be purchased from Raphael Infinity Fabrics at a cost of \$4,131.78.

Supt. Van Raalte reported on progress at the three schools. The Central elementary school is in complete use. The new north and east schools opened Sept. 13 for some classes.

Van Raalte also reported on the new auto mechanics class taught by Donald Prins in Waverly school. Enrolled are 80 students from West Ottawa and Holland districts, attending three two-hour courses. Van Raalte said the new course is progressing "very satisfactorily" and added it was desperately needed in the local area.

Louis Van Slooten of the buildings and grounds committee described plans for sprinkling installation at the three new elementary schools. In putting in lawns, high school students will be hired to work with the school grounds department.

Van Raalte also presented the annual statistical and financial report for the 1964-65 year, stating the district was solvent and ended the year in the black.

President Harvey Knoll presided and gave the invocation. All members were present with the exception of Harvey De Vree who was attending a reorganization meeting involving the former Connell school district.

Heart Attack Fatal To Iweaux F. Millar

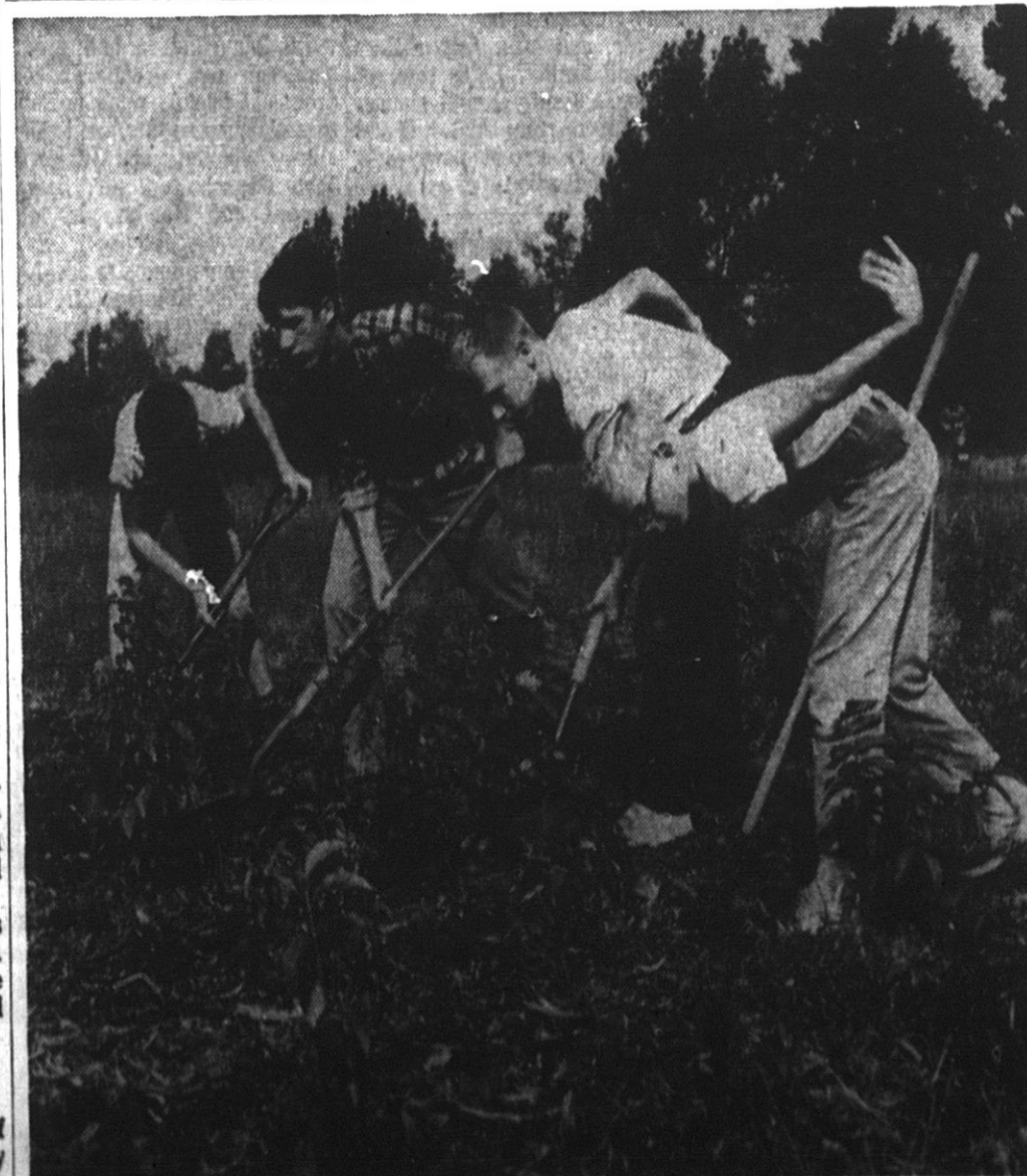

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 26
Growing in Christian Love
I John 4:7-21

By C. P. Dame

The last lesson of this quarter is on the subject of love—the greatest of all Christian virtues. In order to be a Christian a person must believe in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord and in addition practice Christian love. Christians ought to grow in love.

I. God expressed His love to us. The lesson text is taken from one of John's epistles. The apostle John is known as the apostle of love. The first word of the lesson text is, "beloved." This shows the people to whom this word was addressed were loved by God. Since they were loved, they should love each other. The person who loves shows that he is born of God. Who is the source of all life. Three times the words, "God is love" appear in our lesson text. The loved know God, the Lover.

God showed love in the sending of His Son that we might live through Him. God first loved us. He took the initiative. God's love obligates us to love one another. The more we realize this obligation, the more we show love. Often we are too slow to reveal our love for each other.

II. God also gives us the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit puts faith in the hearts of people. He is the author of our belief. He exalts Jesus Christ and makes it possible for us to appreciate and love Him. Important it therefore is that we let the Spirit control us. Those who are controlled by the Spirit recognize that the Father sent the Son into the world. We are living in an ecumenical age. The ecumenical leaders always claim to be guided by the Spirit but in many instances they are not concerned much about doctrine. The Holy Spirit is, for He is concerned about the honor of Jesus Christ.

III. Christians love God and their fellow believers. The love John writes about first gives confidence toward God—"that we may have boldness in the day of judgement." The godless fear God, have a dread for Him, the godly have reverence for God which keeps them from sinning and prompts them to live uprightly.

The second result of having this divine love is charity towards the brethren. When John uses the word "brother" he thinks of a fellow-believer. There are two brotherhoods. We are all members of the human race and therefore brothers according to the flesh. However, there is also a brotherhood of the spirit. This is the result of the new creation. The man who says that he loves God but hates his Christian brother is a liar and a hypocrite.

Today there is much discussion of social sins. Many are concerned about the injustices which mar society. John teaches Christians to love each other. Experience teaches that the more Christians love each other the more they will love their fellow men regardless of their creed and color. Usually Christian people are the first to give and to help when disasters overtake a community or a nation. Love for God stirs us to love our fellow men. And that means that we seek the good of our fellow men and guard them against evil.

Senate action is expected during this session of Congress. It seems difficult to find valid arguments against this measure.

Here again we, the taxpaying public, will be expected to come up with the necessary cash to make the program possible. Where will it all end?

Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corp., said, "In honoring these semifinalists, we should remember that other have contributed significantly to their success by encouraging the characteristics which produce high achievement, including energy and hard work. These semifinalists bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers and their communities."

Names of Merit Scholars chosen from among the finalists will be announced about April 27, 1966. The exact number will depend on the extent of sponsor support coming from over 280 corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, professional associations, organizations and individuals. In 1965, over 2,000 Merit Scholarships were awarded.

Each Merit Scholarship is a four-year award covering the undergraduate college years. The winner's stipend is tailored to his need, up to a maximum of \$6,000 for the four years in most cases. For the student already financially able to attend the college of his choice, the award is \$400 over the four years.

More than 11,000 students won Merit Scholarships in the first decade of the program which was founded in 1955 with grants from the Ford Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation of New York. Views From The Campus

(The following report was written by Dr. John Hollenbach, Vice President of Hope College, during the final week of his participation in the Yugoslav-American Seminar in Domzale, Slovenia. The Seminar, in which Mrs. Hollenbach and two Hope students, Robert Donia and Edward Huntington also participated, was a unique experiment in inter-cultural dialogue worked out by the Great Lakes Colleges Association and the University of Ljubljana, with the active support of the U.S. State Department and the Yugoslav government, and additional financial support from the Johnson Foundation. Editor's note.)

By Dr. John Hollenbach
Many observers of the current Yugoslav scene have marvelled at the fact that a country with such sharp diversities of cultur-

corresponding suspicion of and even scorn for the abilities, the wisdom and even the integrity of the people of other republics. Language differences of the various cultural groups makes it difficult to break down the barrier of separatism.

Under the principal of decentralization of authority, each republic makes its own decisions concerning educational patterns. So the Republic of Slovenia has re-emphasized Slovene language and literature, and too little effort is given to the total cultural heritage of all Yugoslavia. Slovenia music lovers are indifferent to the thought of encouraging Slovene youth to learn and sing the music of Serbia and Bosnia. "This music is not in the soul of us Slovenes," said one of the student members of our seminar.

Said one of the Yugoslav professors, "The biggest obstacle to achieving our general objectives in history." This generalization contains a large element of truth, for decisions made by groups of human beings are conditioned by the cultural values, the patterns and the prejudices that people growing up in a specific region can hardly escape. The difficulties of getting the people of a distinct cultural heritage to transcend their "history" and to act from motives that are grounded in more universal principles are clearly demonstrated in this country.

The greatest single value for us who have taken part in this experience in a socialist country may well be the new awareness of these dual truths. In this respect at least the members of our seminar feel that the Yugoslav adventure has helped us to become better citizens of the world, and thus of the United States of America.

Houghton on the other hand is located far up in the Keweenaw peninsula of upper Michigan which thrusts into Lake Superior. It is well removed from the beaten path."

The Houghton mine attempts to overcome that disadvantage by use of profuse signs along Michigan highways, inviting tourists to visit and to go underground in what was once a genuine copper mine.

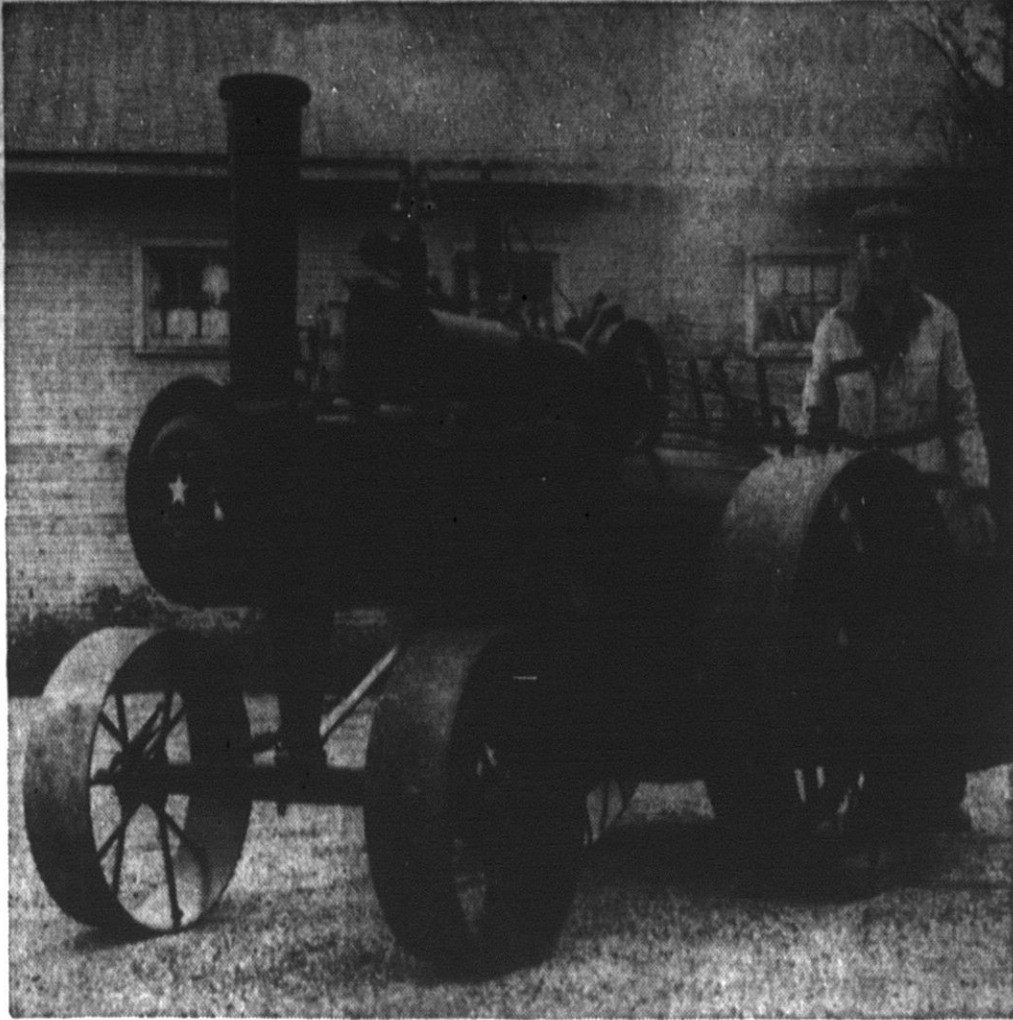

Holland Man Builds Model Of Steam Traction Engine

With a puff of white smoke and a hiss of steam the small black engine chugs along the byways of Holland at a 2½ mile per hour clip.

It's an authentic half-scale model of a steam traction engine like those that were used in threshing, hay bailing and silo filling in the Holland area in the early 1920's. The steam traction engine preceded the tractor for pulling farm machinery.

The proud owner of the model engine, John Diekema of 410 East Eighth St., spent about 3½ years building it. Diekema made the engine from all new materials.

The engine is 10 feet long, 4½ feet wide and weighs about 1½ tons. The cylindrical boiler is 7½ feet long and 16 inches in diameter.

The model has a single-cylinder steam engine which develops 150 pounds of steam and six horsepower. The engine runs on wood and coal. Two large tanks supply water to the boiler, and it takes about an hour to build up the steam.

Diekema who will be 68 years old next month used to work with steam traction engines in farms in the Holland area.

"I was practically raised on the back of one of these engines," he quipped.

He used to travel from farm to farm helping harvest with the traction engine.

Later, Diekema worked as a garage mechanic, and operated his own garage in Holland for many years.

The steam traction engine is a retirement project. Diekema belongs to two steam clubs, and got the idea for the engine at reunions and exhibitions put on by the clubs.

Diekema made up drawings for the engine from old catalog diagrams of a 20-horsepower engine. He then made patterns for the parts from his drawings.

The boiler and other large sections of the engine were cast at a foundry in Dubuque, Iowa. Diekema's brother, Henry, a retired machinist, bored out the cylinders and did other work on the engine. Diekema also had help in some of the welding.

Other than that Diekema did all of the work on the engine in his garage and basement.

He plans to take the model engine to steam club reunions in Wauseon, Ohio, and Mt. Pleasant, Iowa. He has no special plans for the engine other than these exhibitions.

Diekema said he enjoyed every thing about making the steam engine, but would never make one again.

"It's too much work," he said.

5 Fumbles, Interceptions Hurt Dutch

LIMA, Ohio — Fumbles and intercepted passes provided a frustrating evening for Hope College's football team here Saturday night and the Flying Dutchmen dropped a 30-0 opening game decision to Ohio Northern before 3,500 fans in Lima Stadium.

Hope lost the ball five times on fumbles and three on interceptions. The Polar Bears were able to cash in four times and add a field goal.

Because of the inability to hold on to the ball, Hope never got its offense rolling and Coach Russ De Vette never did get a look at a sustained drive.

Only once, late in the third quarter and early in the final period, did Hope put any kind of an offense together. This drive advanced to the Northern 10-yard line but the Flying Dutchmen failed to make the final "big" yard and lost the ball on downs. The fourth down play was short by a yard.

In the drive, one of the first downs came on a pass from Harlan Hyink to Keith Abel while most of the rushing yardage was picked up by Charlie Langeland, freshman Dennis Wilder and Tom De Kuiper. The pass, one of three Hope completed in the second half, was erased in Hope's passing yardage because the other completions were for negative yardage.

Hope's troubles started early as they got the ball on the Ohio 11-yard-line and moved to the two but failed to make the first down. Vern Plagenhoef gave Hope brief life a few plays later as he intercepted a pass but he fumbled when tackled and Northern recovered.

Northern intercepted a Hyink to Bill Hultgren pass late in the first quarter and a few plays later Danny Yocheim scored on a seven-yard off tackle smash. Later in the period, Hope fumbled on fourth down and the winners grabbed it.

A two-yard bootleg around end by Mike Kobilarcsik produced the score. Still in the second quarter, Northern grabbed another Hope pass and got to the 12-yard line where Paul Levine converted a fourth down field goal. They had also kicked the extra points and led 17-0 at the half.

Two more third quarter fumbles provided the final two touchdowns. Freshman Gary Frens fumbled a handoff on a punt return on his own two and Northern recovered. Ray Loissele scored and Levine converted.

Frens fumbled on his own 25 later in the quarter and Northern was there. A seven-yard pass to Yocheim scored the touchdown.

De Vette thought his defense was "adequate under the circumstances." Those "circumstances" included five boys playing both ways and they were slowed by the heat plus Northern had the ball "so often for a four down category," the defenders didn't get a rest.

Hope also had to use inexperienced players in some spots and the lack of depth was costly. Freshman Paul Oakes and Paul Wassenaar received minor leg injuries.

Capt. Rog Kroodma and Mark Menning were commended for their defense. "But with the fumbles and interceptions we couldn't get a look at our offense," De Vette said. Hyink started at quarterback but De Vette started Plagenhoef in the second half followed by Frens.

Hope opens the home season Saturday at 2 p.m. against Wheaton at Riverview Park.

Addition in Fennville

Licensing Of Drivers Is Approved

ZEELAND — City Council Monday night approved the re-establishing of a driver's license bureau in the Zeeland City Hall.

The project was approved by officials of the Michigan Secretary of State office last week. The color camera and other equipment will be set up in the police quarters on a temporary basis Wednesday.

The council voted to hire an architect to study City Hall to find a permanent location for the licensing bureau and for expansion of police quarters.

A contract for a 300-foot extension of Centennial St. was awarded by the council to Holsteg and De Haan. The company's bid of \$123,035 was the lowest of three bids submitted. Under an agreement approved by the council at their last meeting, the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce and the Acme Box and Pallet Co. will each pay one-third of the cost of building the road.

The council also approved a proposal for building an interceptor sewer to serve the Roosevelt Elementary School and Middle School on Roosevelt Ave. The project was referred to Moore and Bruggink, consulting engineers, for consideration.

Tony Rozeboom, owner of the Zeeland Iron and Metal Co., 212 Harrison Ave., discussed problems of smoke and other nuisances caused by his business. He told council that he is working to eliminate obstructions to traffic caused by his materials stored in or near the street, and will build a fence to improve the appearance of his plant.

Rozeboom also plans to build a burner with a 45-foot high chimney to eliminate the smoke nuisance in the area of his plant.

The council at their last meeting voted to keep Rozeboom from burning or storing materials in the street. The action was taken after ten residents in the area petitioned council to stop the nuisances.

The council warned Rozeboom that he should not burn materials unless he can eliminate the smoke nuisance. Rozeboom hopes to do this with his burner.

Estate Will Get \$15,000

GRAND HAVEN — The First National Bank and Trust Co., administrator for the estate of the late Adrian Van Koeveering, former owner of the Zeeland Record, was awarded a judgment of \$15,000 in Ottawa circuit court Monday, against Van Koeveering's son, Corey, of Zeeland.

The judgment was granted in an opinion filed by Judge Raymond L. Smith, who also granted a judgment for \$3,800 to Corey Van Koeveering, for work he had done in connection with the publishing of books authored by Adrian Van Koeveering.

The plaintiff claimed that on July 15, 1960, Adrian Van Koeveering was owner of 50 percent of the stock of the Zeeland Record Co. and Corey also owned stock in the firm. The son continued to manage the firm and the bank asked for an accounting of the books. The bank also asked for a judgment of \$15,000 for a note executed before Adrian Van Koeveering's death.

Later the plaintiff asked that the defendant's ownership in the firm be transferred to the plaintiff because of the defendant's failure to perform a contract, agreed on May 1, 1946, and the plaintiff also requested that books authored by Adrian Van Koeveering be delivered to the plaintiff.

H. J. Windolph Fishes In Canadian Wilderness

GREAT BEAR LAKE, N. W. T., Canada — Herman J. Windolph of Holland recently returned home from a fishing trip to Canada's largest lake, Great Bear Lake.

During one two-hour period of fishing on the lake, Windolph and a companion, Edgar H. Miller of Grand Rapids, caught 26 lake trout weighing from eight to 30 pounds. Averaging 15 pounds each, the fish weighed a total of 390 pounds. All the fish were returned to the lake.

The lake is the only major glacial lake on the North American continent that has never been fished commercially. The lake is located in a remote area of the Northwest Territories, 350 miles north of the nearest highway or railroad, just 90 miles south of the Arctic Ocean and 2,000 miles northwest of Holland.

Great Bear Lake's waters cover 11 times more area than the state of Rhode Island and it is as deep as 1,500 feet. The lake is bisected by the Arctic Ocean.

Windolph made the trip with Miller and while the two were at the lodge, another visitor, Ron Lindell of Lansing caught a 51-pound lake trout.

Great Bear Lodge is the hub of the lake's activities because of its runways capable of landing airliners. The lodge was built by a South Dakota physician when he learned in 1961 that commercial nets had never touched the lake.

Windolph also joined an exploration trip to Minto Bay, located on Victoria Island 450 miles north of the Arctic Circle.

Windolph termed the trip to the Arctic Ocean more an adventure than a fishing trip, but the group caught a number of char, rarest member of the trout family. The ocean at Minto Bay was full of ice and Windolph reports sleeping in an abandoned mission building, within 200 feet of a 100-foot iceberg.

There are no trees north of the Arctic Circle, but the countryside is beautiful, according to Windolph. He said the land bore scars of moving glaciers and there were fields of flowers in bloom.

Windolph reports sighting thousands of schools of char in a river which empties into Minto Bay and catching char weighing from five to 12 pounds. The char are similar to Florida bone fish in that they too put up a big fight for their size.

During the char fishing, Windolph said, a seal popped up just 10 feet from him.

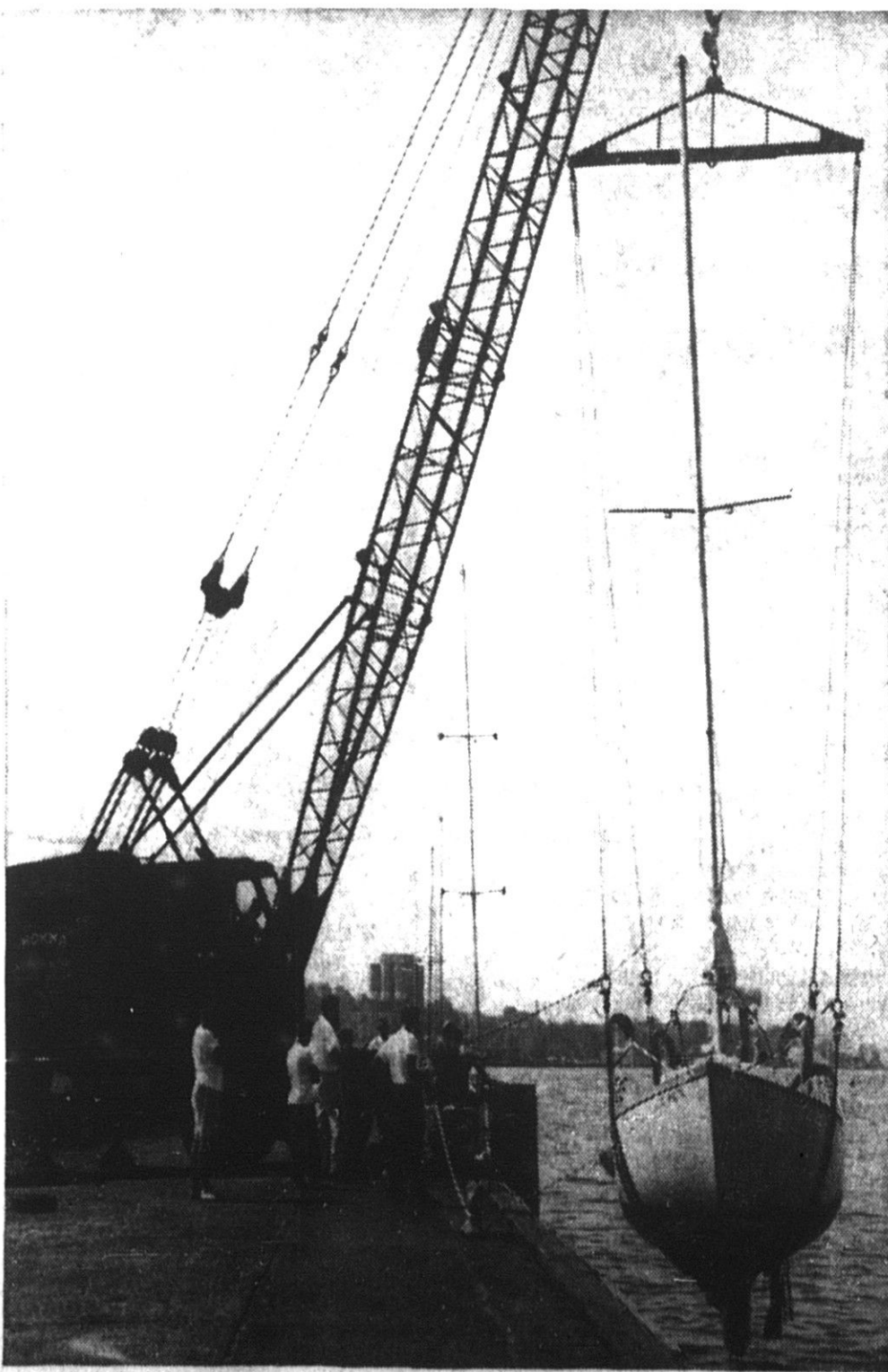
