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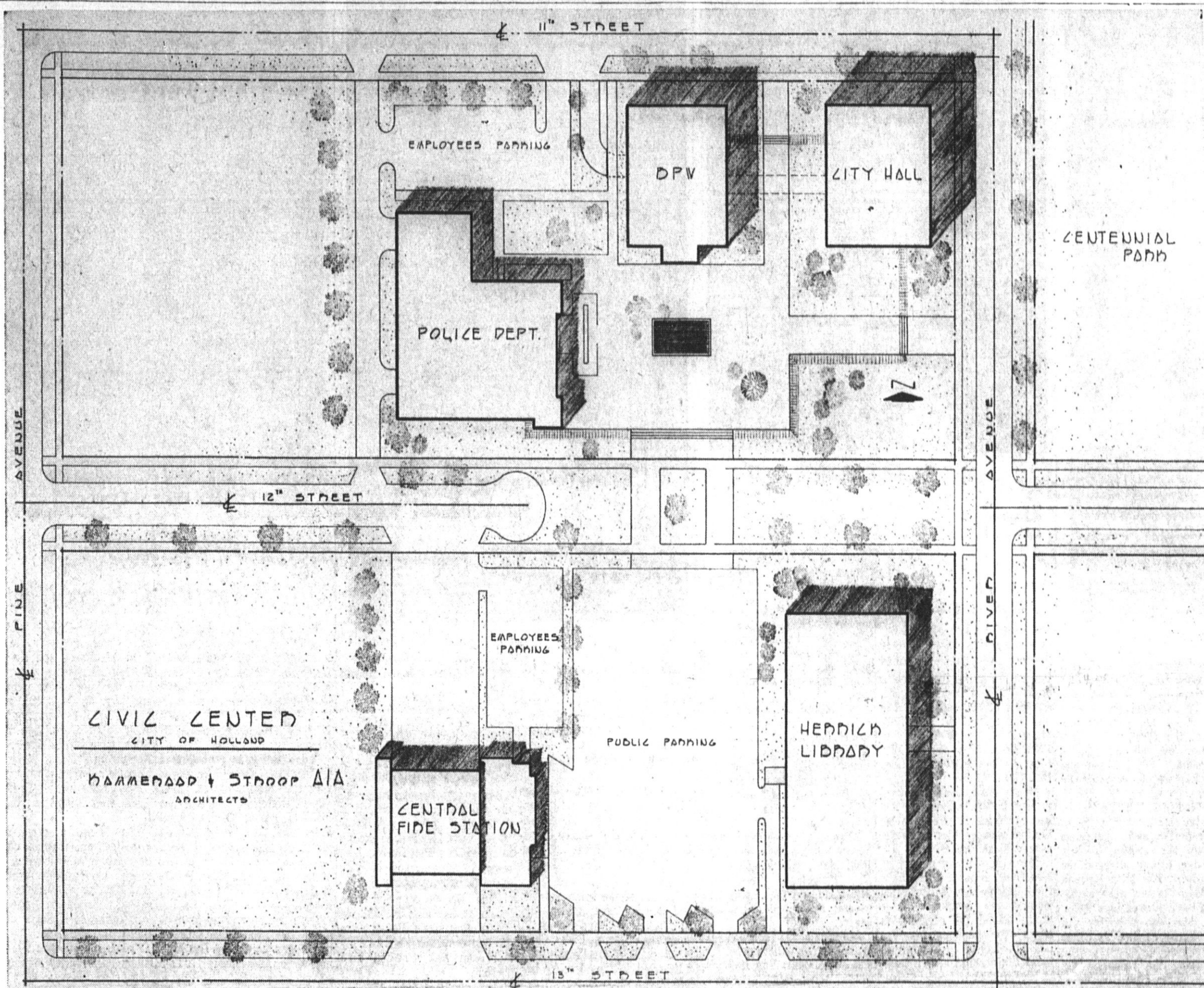
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Public Building Complex Envisioned for Holland



City Hall Area Would Be Expanded

Program Also Lists Suburban Fire Station, Park Dept. Warehouse

Development of a public building complex in the area of City Hall has been under study for several years by City Council and more recently by Architects Kammeraad and Stroop who were authorized early this year to draft plans.

Property owners in Holland city and their spouses will vote Nov. 5 on three separate bonding issues calling for a central police station and central fire station in the area of Holland City Hall, a suburban fire station near Holland's industrial park, and a warehouse for Park and Recreation departments near the present street department garage on Fairbanks Ave. A Board of Public Works building in the City Hall complex will be financed through BPW revenues.

The \$2,125,000 is broken down into three issues as follows: \$1,130,000 for a police station, \$702,000 for two fire stations, and \$293,000 for the park and recreation warehouse.

According to the architects, the new police station of contemporary design would contain offices for police officers, the detective bureau, licensing, a pistol range, vehicle storage and new detention facilities. The building calls for 36,200 square feet with a basement and first floor. Central dispatching of all vehicles would be accomplished from this unit, with plans to incorporate one telephone number for all emergency calls. Movable partitions would be used throughout except in detention area.

The central fire station and suburban station would also be of contemporary design. The central station would provide space for an aerial truck, two pumps, a service vehicle, inspector's car and the fire chief's vehicle. Also in the unit would be a training room, dormitory for 16 firemen, lounge, dining facilities, fire prevention office and fire chief's office. The station would have an area of 15,100 square feet.

The suburban fire station would have an area of 6,800 square feet and would house an aerial truck pumper and tanker. It would be of brick construction and contain a dormitory for eight firemen, plus living quarters, with a basement room designed for community use.

The Park and Recreation warehouse would be of masonry block construction containing 241,492 square feet and housing 12 Park department vehicles and three recreation department vehicles. There would be provisions for a report-in room, toilets, showers and lockers, mower storage and maintenance space, bench and table storage, recreation facilities storage, bulb storage, and a paint shop. Voting machines also would be stored here.

The BPW building to be built immediately west of City Hall would have a connection with the present City Hall. The exterior would be of Indiana limestone and interior partitions would be relocatable. This unit would provide offices for the Board of Public Works and city inspection agencies. The design incorporates a demonstration room, conference rooms, central collection facilities with a drive-up window, and engineering offices. A basement level is scheduled to house vehicles used by the BPW and other agencies.

New Trial Sought in Kidnaping

GRAND HAVEN — Attorneys for four Holland men found guilty of kidnaping a Hope College coed in Holland April 21, today filed a motion for a new trial, claiming insufficient legal evidence had been presented.

Three attorneys representing the four men are seeking either a new trial or a judgment, notwithstanding the verdict rendered Aug. 15 following a two-day trial in Ottawa Circuit Court. The jury deliberated 55 minutes. Charged in the kidnaping are Oscar Ramirez, 17, Frank Martinez, 22, Pedro Vigil, 19, and Celestino Garza, 20, all of Holland. They also face rape charges in Allegan Circuit Court.

Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith has taken the matter under advisement.

Council Places Three Bond Issues on Ballot

Three bonding propositions for new city government buildings will be on the Nov. 5 ballot. City Council decided Wednesday night.

The propositions totaling \$2,125,000 for a central police department, a central fire station, a suburban fire station and a park and recreation department garage and storage building. (See public building complex sketch on page 6.)

The plans, as drawn by Kammeraad and Stroop, local architects, call for the central police and fire stations to be developed in a public building complex in the area of City Hall, the suburban fire station in the vicinity of 40th St. and the US-31 bypass to serve Holland's industrial park and that area of the city, and the park and recreational department warehouse on Fairbanks Ave. in the vicinity of the street department garage.

The three propositions, limited to property owners in Holland city and their spouses at the Nov. 5 election, follow:

1. \$1,130,000 for the central police station.
2. \$702,000 for the two fire stations.
3. \$293,000 for the park and recreational department warehouse.

The total bond issue would call for approximately 1.75 mills for 20 years.

Not included in the bonding program is a building at the City Hall complex for the Board of Public Works which also will house the engineering department and possibly some other city functions. This building will be financed by BPW revenues was part of the area rented to other departments. This building would have its own drive-in payment window for persons paying utility bills.

The existing City Hall would remain in use as would Herrick Public Library. The complex would cover the greater share of the two-block area west of these two buildings and the new buildings would be of Indiana limestone to match the library building.

The program for updating city buildings in the City Hall area stems from an initial report on existing police and fire facilities issued by Kammeraad and Stroop published in 1964 and a

published by Space Utilization Analysts of California in September, 1966.

These reports indicated the great need for replacing both police and fire stations on Eighth St. which are over 90 years old and have become obsolete and grossly overcrowded.

Vander Kooy Accepts New Position

Donald Vander Kooy, the executive director of the Family Service and Michigan Children's Aid Society, Holland, has accepted the position of executive director of the Kalamazoo branch of the Michigan Children's Aid Society.

The program in Kalamazoo will be similar to the one in Holland, offering adoption, counseling with unwed mothers, and foster care for children.

Vander Kooy has been the director for the member agency of the greater Holland-Zeeland Community Fund, for the past 3 1/2 years. He attended Kalamazoo Christian High School and Western Michigan University.

He received an A.B. degree from Calvin College in Grand Rapids and a master's degree in social work from the University of Michigan, and was employed by the Kalamazoo branch of the Society before coming to Holland.

Development of this civic complex also is designed to concur with the area master plan of Holland published by the Planning Commission in 1953. A Council directive early this year authorized preliminary planning leading to frequent meetings of architects with Council and department heads, all of whom have been directly involved in the planning process.

Of the design concept, architects said, "The design developed from the need to centralize the various departments of the city government to promote efficiency in their internal functioning with consequent saving in their operations. Thus the police agency will be near the district court rooms in City Hall, police and fire department personnel near the personnel office in City Hall, and so on.

"A further consideration is to complement the design of the existing Herrick Public Library and City Hall, with the added buildings in a plaza as a natural extension of our uniquely beautiful Centennial Park. This type of arrangement follows a trend in municipal architecture across the nation.

"Thus a government area will develop to the west of Centennial Park while a cultural area develops to the east of the park in the form of continuing enlargement of the Hope College campus; and a commercial area develops to the north of the park in the form of a shopping plaza on Eighth St. with general upgrading and beautification of facilities and area. The next decade should see a framework which allows for beauty and visual enjoyment for the people of Holland."

Fair Housing Ordinance Introduced

City Council accepted for first reading Wednesday night a fair housing ordinance for Holland based on ordinances passed by seven metropolitan centers so far in the state of Michigan.

David Clark, chairman of the Human Relations Commission, said the ordinance would allow the local commission to investigate housing complaints and to attempt to work toward settlement without going to the courts or to the Michigan Civil Rights Commission.

The ordinance provides an investigative procedure in which complaints are taken in writing, under oath, setting forth facts. It has been under study by the local commission for nine months.

Policy of the fair housing ordinance calls for the protection of the public safety, health and general welfare, for the maintenance of business and good government, and for the promotion of the city's trade, commerce and manufacture, to assure equal opportunity to all persons to live in adequate housing facilities, regardless of race, color, religion, ancestry or national origin, and to that end prohibit discrimination in housing.

Exempted from the ordinance are rental of a housing accommodation in a building which contains housing accommodations for not more than two families living independently of each other, if the owner or lessor or a member of his family resides in one of the housing accommodations, and to rental of a room or rooms in a single family dwelling by the owner or lessor if he or a member of his family resides therein.

At the start of the meeting Lou Hallacy II was sworn in as the new councilman of the first ward, succeeding the late Bert Slagh.

On a petition for sanitary sewer in Sunrise and Sunset Drs. presented at last week's meeting, the city manager reported the petition contained signatures of nine property owners but that a subsequent petition contained five property owners, representing 38 per cent of said ownership. The city

manager was instructed to submit the necessary reports on the improvement.

A letter from Arnold W. Hertel asked whether Council would be interested in purchasing property at 50 East Seventh St. presently used for metered parking. Council indicated it has every intention of maintaining the property as a parking lot.

Mothers of World War II were granted permission to sell pointsettias on city streets Sept. 27 and 28.

A public hearing was scheduled Oct. 2 at 7:30 p.m. on 20 special assessment rolls presented by the city assessor covering street, utilities and parking lots.

Certifications were confirmed for Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho Service, city engineer, \$2,920; Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolt's Inc., Civic Center, \$4,050; Councilman Lamb, Lamb's Inc., fire, engineering, park and cemetery departments, \$1,241.50.

Mayor Nelson Bosman was reappointed to a three-year term on the Tulip Time Board and Lew Hartzell was appointed to the Board of Review to succeed Elmer J. Rowder who has moved from the city. Rowder's term expires January, 1969.

"The city manager reported on a communication from the Georgian Bay Co. on the city's option to purchase the dock property at Montello Park for \$90,000, stating the company was not interested in removing the docks at a cost of approximately \$40,000 and asked the city to release its option before the Oct. 5 expiration date. The matter was referred to the city manager with power to act.

A suggestion from Councilman William Lamb for a magic square at the Washington school playground was referred to the city manager to report later.

The city manager informed Council he will be absent from the city Sept. 17, 18 and 19 attending the Michigan Municipal League Conference in Lansing and designating City Engineer Harold Derks to act as city manager during that period.

Old Post Office To Be Torn Down In Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — The old historic post office building in downtown Grand Haven, erected in 1905, is coming down.

Security First Bank and Trust Co. purchased the building from the federal government Feb. 15, 1967, for \$57,000 following a public auction, and the property, adjacent to the bank's main office at Grand Haven, is a part of the firm's long range expansion program.

The bank will soon open a new drive-in facility at Columbus and Second Sts. near the main office, and also plans a new bank at Ferrysburg. Security First also has branches in Ravenna, the Airport Plaza at Muskegon and Fruitport.

Houting and Meusen, Holland contractors, will start razing the old building next week. A fence will be erected around the site to protect pedestrians as the corner is the city's busiest intersection.

The building was purchased by the bank after the post office was moved to its present new facility at Fourth and Washington in June of 1967.

Court Denies Injunction

GRAND HAVEN — Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith ruled late Friday that Ottawa Circuit Court has no jurisdiction in a case brought by Holland Die Casting Co., Inc., seeking an injunction restraining picketing at the Holland plant by local 257 of the Dohler-Jervis Co. of Grand Rapids which started picketing the Holland plant while the Grand Rapids plant is on strike.

The Ottawa court has issued a temporary injunction restraining picketing Aug. 14. In dissolving the temporary injunction, the court stated that jurisdiction in such matters is preempted by the NLRB.

The opinion stated that the Holland plant has a contract with local 672 (AFL-CIO) and that evidence indicated only peaceful picketing was done by defendants, stating further that the Holland plant was working on castings for the Chrysler Corp. normally done by the Grand Rapids company.

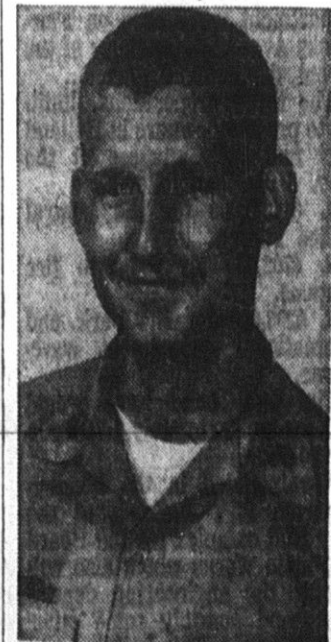

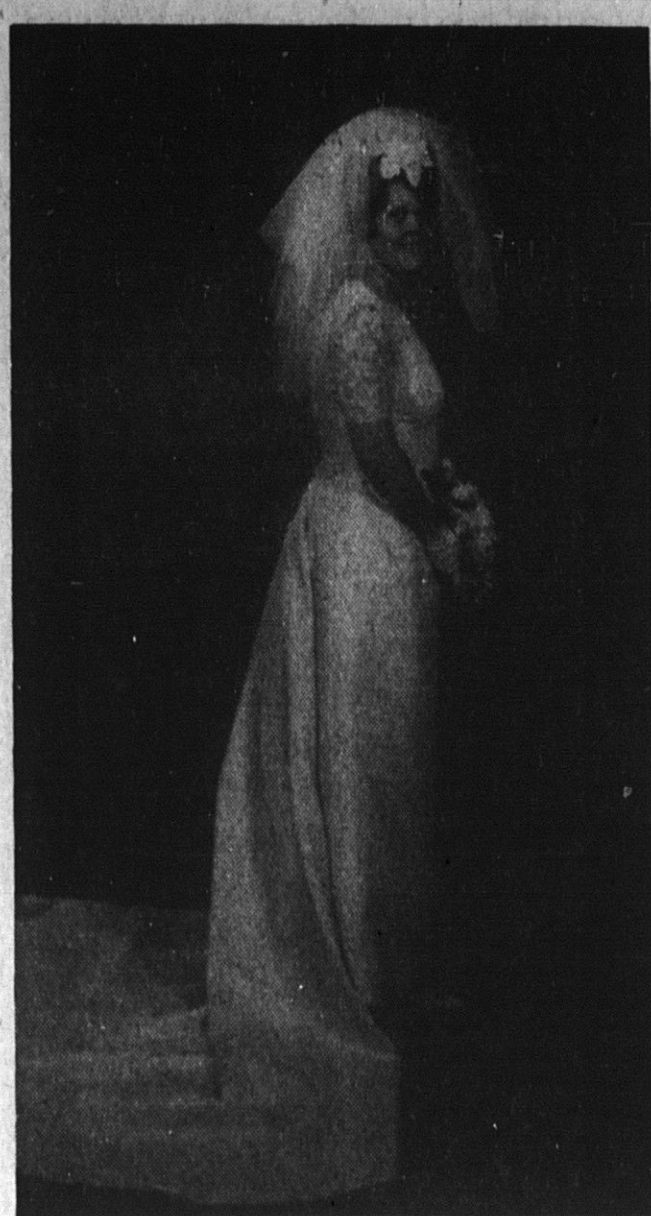

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 15
Esther Saves Her People
Esther 4:8, 13-16; 7:1-7
By C. P. Dame

God's name is not mentioned in the book of Esther but the providence of God is clearly taught. This truth needs to be put in the foreground in these troublesome times.

I. God puts some people in strategic positions. This involves a responsibility. We do not know who wrote the book of Esther but we do know that the writer was familiar with Persian life. The book covers a period between 485 and 464 B. C. Take a look at the characters in this dramatic book. Ahasuerus, the Persian king, ruled from India to Ethiopia. Most scholars think that was the Xerxes who tried to invade Europe, but was stopped by the Greeks. Mordecai, a Jew and a Benjamite, was a high official at the court. He had reared Esther, his cousin, after the death of her parents. Esthers' Hebrew name was Hadassah, which means "myrtle"; Esther, a Persian name, means "a star." Haman, a vain, conceited man, was prime minister for whom Mordecai would not bow, which angered him to such a degree that he hated him and all the Jews. Vashti, the queen, lost her position because she refused to obey her husband's command to appear before a drunken group of officials to show off her beauty. Vashti made herself immortal by saying "No," and made Esther immortal also, for if it had not been for Vashti's refusal we would not have heard of Esther.

After Vashti had been deposed as queen, Esther was selected at a beauty contest to become the queen. The Bible says she "was beautiful and lovely" and that she "found favor in the eyes of all who saw her." Suddenly this young woman became famous and won a position of prestige. II. Opportunity involves a responsibility. Haman got permission from the king to put all the Jews to death. Mordecai heard about the decree and reported it to Esther and implored upon her mind that she had a duty to her nation. He said to her, "Who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this," and she answered that she would speak to the king, "though it is against the law; and if I perish, I perish." These words reveal a fine spirit.

Esther made plans to present her case to the king. She got permission to see the king and she invited the king and Haman to a special banquet and both came and there she asked that both would come again the next day which they did. During the night between the banquets the king learned that Mordecai had revealed a plot to assassinate him and when he learned that he had not been rewarded, he ordered Haman to lead Mordecai on horseback through the streets and acclaim him, which humiliated him deeply.

At the second banquet the queen told of Haman's plot and begged for her life and that of her people. To counteract the decree, the Jews were given permission by the king to defend themselves. Through Mordecai and Esther God saved the Jews from destruction. Unfortunately the Jews manifested a spirit of revenge which deserves censure.

Note a few facts. A peevish king and a conceited and angered prime minister's actions were overruled by a sovereign God. Overlook not the truth that the law of retribution still operates. The story of Haman reveals this plainly. And note too that team work often gets results - Mordecai and Esther cooperated.

2,808 Students Are Enrolled in Christian Schools

The superintendent said the new enrollment showed a drop of 12 students from last September. 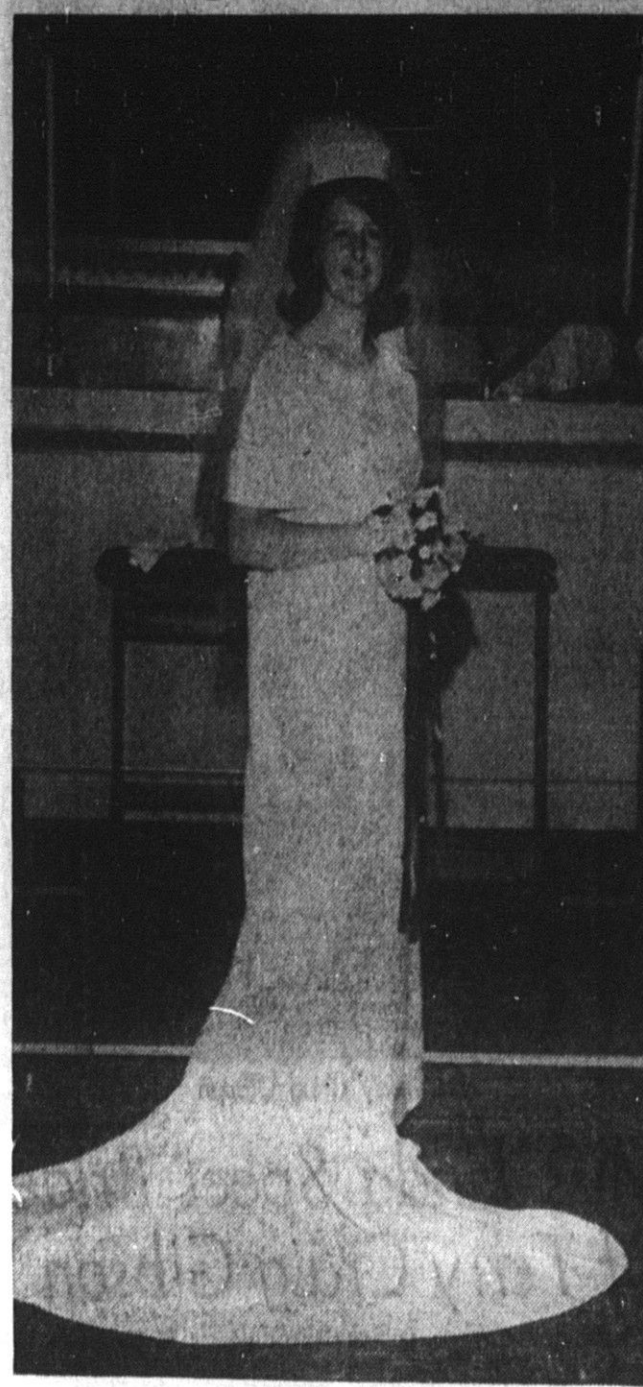
Although there was an overall drop, Vander Ark noted that the kindergarten enrollment had jumped 34 students over last year to a 186 figure.

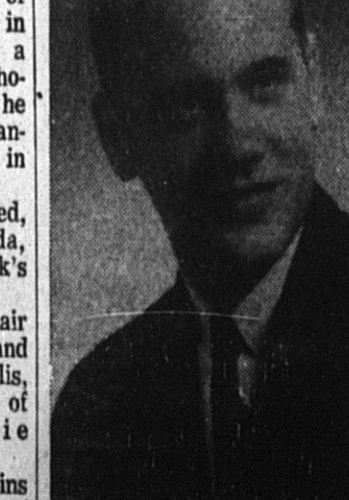

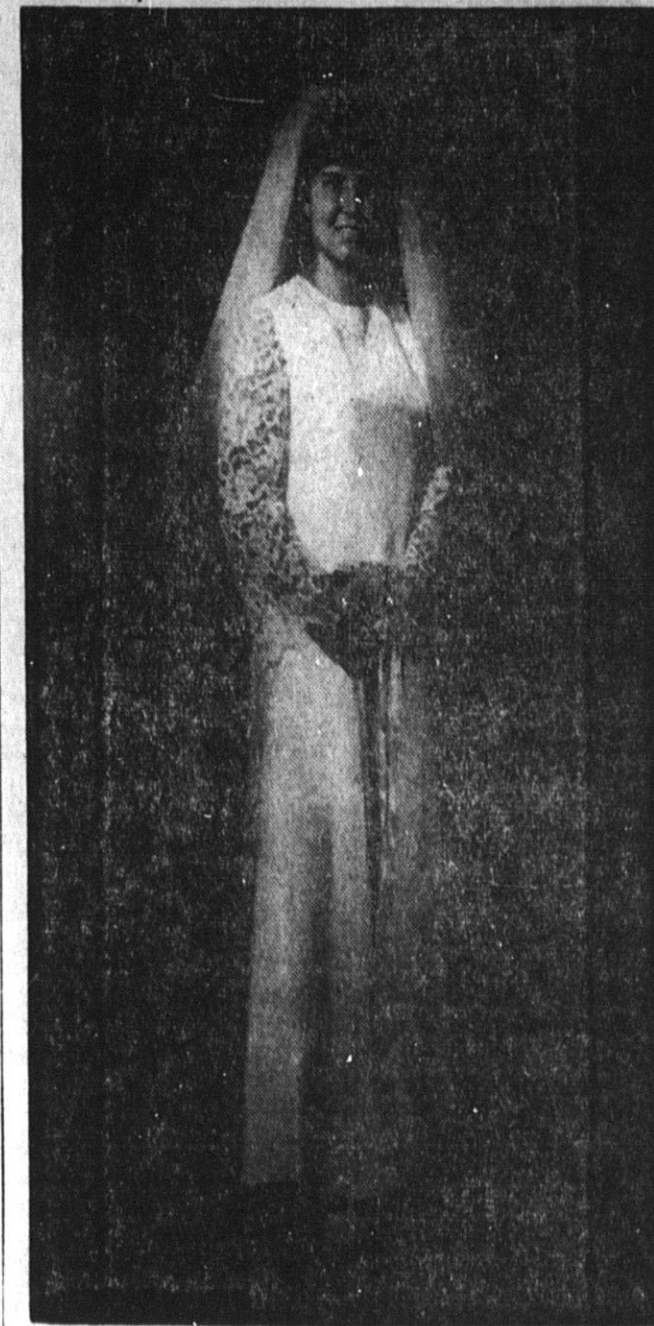

GRAND HAVEN — An Ottawa County man is being held in the county jail on an attempted murder charge following a stabbing and shooting incident early Sunday morning.

Sergio Rivera Sanchez, 38, who is living at Bill and Marv's Turkey farm on 96th Ave., near Borculo, was charged by Ottawa sheriff's deputies with stabbing Martin Arreaga, 37, of Grand Rapids.

Arreaga is in the intensive care unit at St. Mary's hospital, Grand Rapids, where is in fair condition with a stap wound in the lower abdomen.

Deputies received a report of the incident from Grand Rapids police, who were called to the hospital when Arreaga sought treatment.

Upon investigation, deputies learned that Jack De Witt, and his cousin, William De Witt Jr., had stopped at the farm early Sunday morning to get gasoline for their car. When they arrived they were informed of

some trouble by one of the employees.

Deputies said William Jr., told them that he saw a man with a gun and when he hit the man's hand the gun discharged, striking the leg of Jose Cortes Natal, who also lives on the farm.

After the gun discharged, the man fled taking Arreaga with him. The De Witt's then bandaged Natal's leg, which was grazed by the bullet and went home. Deputies said the De Witt's did not report the incident to authorities.

Following their investigation, deputies charged Juan Hernandez, 26, of Grand Rapids, with careless use of fire arms in connection with the shooting. He pleaded not guilty and was released to await trial.

The incidents surrounding the shooting still remain scrambled, deputies said, but they believe it stemmed from an argument over a gambling debt at the farm.

School Board Reiterates Transportation Policies

The Board of Education reiterated its policies on school transportation when confronted by a group of Harrington and Federal district parents at the monthly meeting Monday night in Holland High School.

What had promised to be a short meeting stretched into an hour and 40 minutes when questions came from an audience of some 30 persons, starting first with book rental charges and then going into transportation questions, aggravated by the fact that some Harrington buses are idle since the district came into the Holland district.

With final reorganization of the Holland district still unresolved because of litigation in the Court of Appeals questioning the entire Ottawa Area School District and more specifically Holland district reorganization, the Holland Board of Education withdrew its scheduled transportation millage issue from the Aug. 6 primary until such a time as the reorganization question is settled.

This, Board President James O. Lamb said, was on advice of the best legal counsel available, as well as clearing with the State Department of Instruction and the Attorney General's department. Although both departments had instructed the Holland Board of Education to proceed with operating Federal and Harrington districts this year, there was no assurance that the case would be heard promptly in the appellate court or what the outcome would be.

Meanwhile, after some four special meetings, the Holland board adhered to its past policy in not providing general public transportation of students of the enlarged school district, but decided that the millage proposal would be placed on the ballot as soon as possible following final court decision affirming reorganization of the district.

The board, however, did make provision for individual hardship cases affecting elementary students in kindergarten to sixth grade.

The criteria, adopted at a special session Aug. 28, follows:

1. Exceptional hazard where high speed traffic is involved. (Students who must cross M-21 or US-31 bypass)

2. The physical condition of a child; unusual health consideration.

3. Elementary students residing beyond 1½ miles from the school they attend.

4. Kindergarten students residing beyond one mile from the school they attended.

Frances Johnson asked whether a temporary program of transportation could be worked out and Lamb said this is being considered along with the hardship cases.

Mrs. Johnson said, "You have professed to be very concerned and very interested, yet you vote against transportation, you boost taxes and charge book rentals. I would hope you could review the program."

Rudy Foltik, one of the persons appealing the reorganization, made it clear he has no arguments with the Holland board and that his court question involved only the county reorganization. But he wondered how he could explain the increased taxes to Federal residents next December. He was assured Holland residents too are concerned over tax boosts, yet have voted on additional 10 mills for five years to assure a good school program, and all property owners in the enlarged district will be paying the same rate.

Harvey Butler explained the book rental fees which have been in effect for several years and said these funds were put into a revolving fund to help provide up-to-date text books whose copyrights are under five years. He said some districts not far from Holland had been using books 14-15 years old, and such outdated books do not answer today's needs, particularly in science and math. Some of the funds also go for supplies.

The Harrington and Federal parents were assured that, should final accounting deter-

mine particular assets in cash and buses, the equivalent would be earmarked for the districts for future improvements.

School Supt. Donald L. Ihman said the Holland district also is studying long range planning with professional services during the 1968-69 school year to prepare best for the needs of the schools in the district. This study involves sites for new schools, expansion plans, and many other facets of education.

Harrington and Federal parents were informed of methods other outlying districts have developed in providing transportation, mainly PTA groups contracting with private bus operators for the service.

Dr. Joseph Zsiros Feted By Faculty on Retirement

Members of the Hope College faculty Thursday night paid tribute to Dr. Joseph Zsiros who is retiring from his post as Professor of Greek to accept the pastorate of the Hungarian Reformed Church of Kalamazoo.

Tribute was paid Dr. Zsiros by the Rev. Eugene Osterhaven, Professor of Systematic Theology at Western Theological Seminary, and Hope College President Calvin A. Vander Werf during the faculty's annual opening banquet.

Dr. Zsiros was rector and professor of Old Testament on the theological faculty of Sarospatk College in Sarospatk, Hungary when he accepted an invitation in 1947 to serve for one year as a visiting lecturer at Hope College.

When the Communist take over of Hungary made it impossible for him to return in 1948, Dr. Zsiros continued on the Hope faculty until 1950 when he accepted a pastorate in the Hungarian Reformed Church in Racine, Wisconsin and later Toledo, Ohio. He returned to the Hope faculty in 1956.

After World War II the students of Hope College adopted Sarospatk College and with the aid of the Holland-Zeeland communities provided tons of food, books and equipment to the war devastated institution.

Sarospatk was founded in 1531 as the first evangelical school in that part of Europe. The Reformed Church in Hungary celebrated her 400th anniversary in 1967.

Rev. Osterhaven, who was a member of the Hope faculty at that time, was to have spent a year at Sarospatk College while Dr. Zsiros was in the United States, but he was unable to do so because of the Hungarian Revolution.

Dr. Zsiros was born in upper Hungary near the present Czech border. He studied at the Universities of Berlin; Debrecen in Hungary and Pennsylvania in the United States before joining the faculty of Sarospatk College.

"The movement of Dr. Zsiros between school and church shows his profound interest in both institutions," said Rev. Osterhaven, "Blessed with an excellent mind and educational advantages to none, Dr. Zsiros first loyalty has been to Jesus Christ and his church. With mind and heart Joseph has served God and man."

Dr. Zsiros and his wife Irene have one son, Alexander, who resides in Gary, Ind.

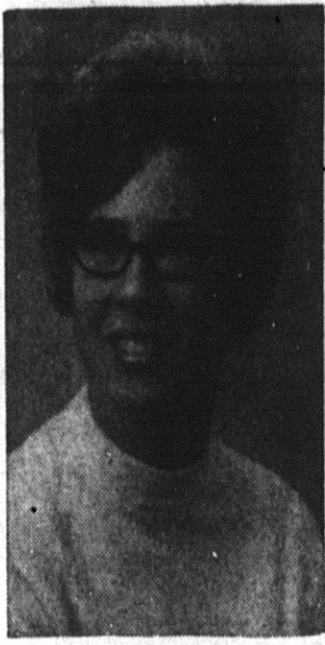

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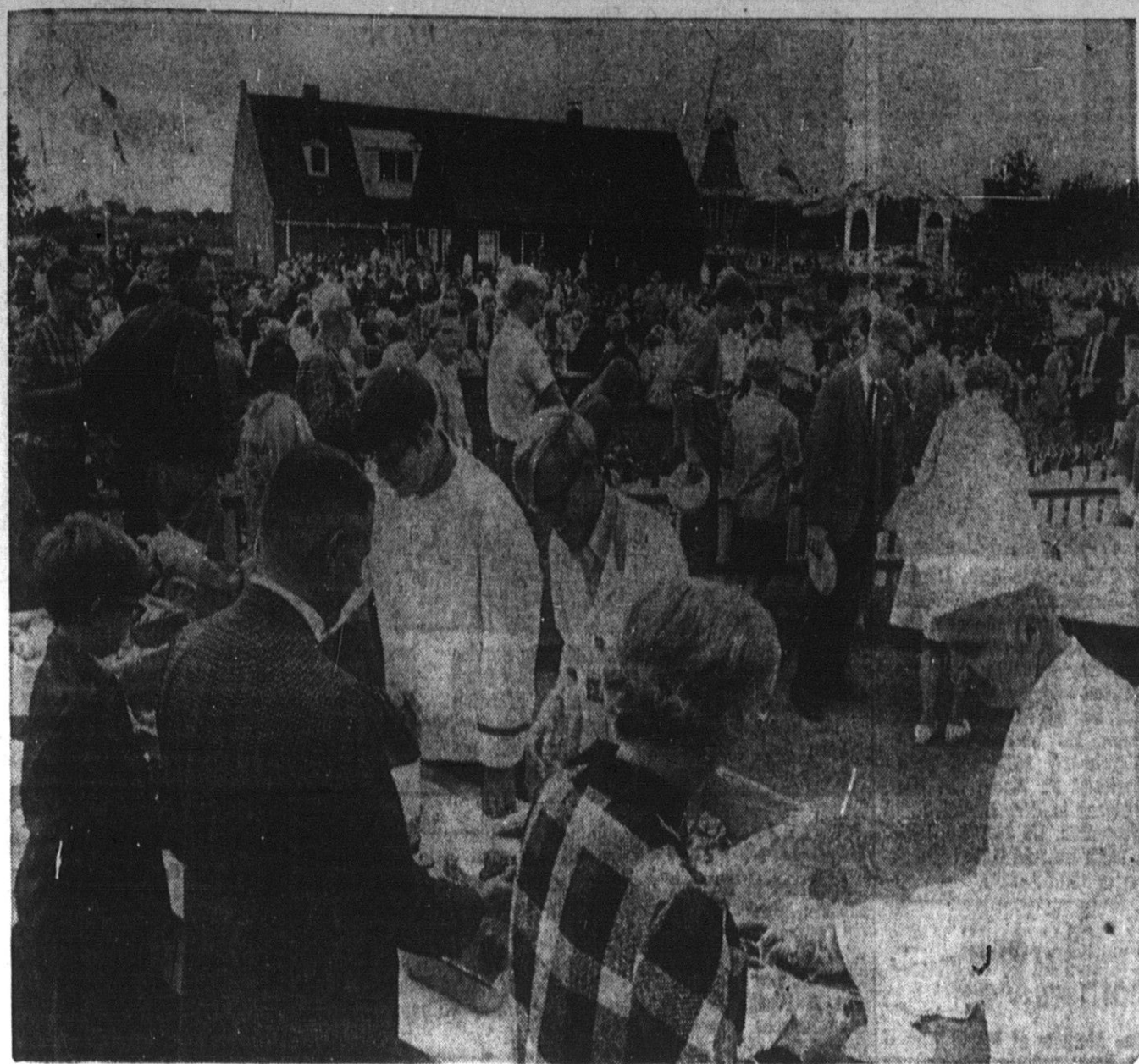

Food service for the crowds was well organized by Bill Boyer and Dave Van Dellen of the Hope College food service, who had a crew of 35 to 40 workers from the college. Mayor Bosman and councilmen assisted in serving, as well as two butchers who carved the carcass.

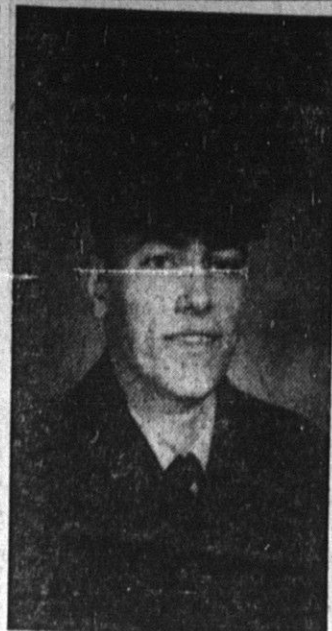
