Enrollment Of Schools At 5,262

An hour-long meeting of the Holland Board of Education Monday night saw action on a number of matters as well as a brief review of the opening of the fall semester which Supt. Donald L. Thirman said was one of the smoothest he had ever experienced. He credited much of this to advance planning, some in new programs geared to meeting the needs of the children of the community.

Total enrollment in the district's 12 elementary schools, secondary schools and special education is 5,262, or 47 less than a year ago. Thirman said the officials' membership is taken the fourth Friday after Labor Day and he expects this summer will be revised upward.

Enrollment in the elementary schools totals 2,869, in junior high 1,223, and in senior high, 1,170. The program includes some shifts, such as kindergarten and first grades of Apple Ave. School to Holland Heights, and other shifts in Lakeview, Federal and Jefferson.

The lunch program in elementary schools will start Sept. 17 and elementary principals were meeting today to finalize the program.

The board approved two new staff appointments. Victoria Lantz, a 1965 graduate of Michigan State University with five years' experience, will teach junior high reading, and Dale Mattis, a 1973 graduate of Northern Michigan University, will teach junior high vocal music. The board also approved tenure for Gwendolyn Maatman, first grade teacher at Lakeview School.

Dr. Philip Schoo, curriculum director, outlined plans for a study of bilingual, bicultural education in Holland. A committee will be appointed and plans call for study to continue until May when a report should be ready. Dr. Schoo also submitted appointments of department chairmen, vice chairmen and elementary representatives to the Instructional Council for the 1973-74 school year.

Building Supt. Edward Prins reviewed the summer maintenance program, listing considerable outdoor and interior painting, window repair, painting of playground equipment, storage cabinets, lighting improvements, drainage at Holland Heights, fence repair, floor coverings, and expected arrival of three new buses.

Prins also said grounds were improved, many schools served summer functions and inspections had been made for fire safety, boilers, elevators and sanitation.

Building and Grounds Chairman John Weeber said the property at 144 West 10th St. east of Washington school playground is available for purchase. The committee will study appraisals and report to the board.

Mrs. Dorothy Arens appeared before the board calling attention to a Reader's Digest article about help for hyperactive children, suggesting that perhaps a room could be set aside in each building to aid such children. Dr. Schoo said studies were being made with a view toward special resource rooms starting in two elementary schools and one in junior high for this purpose under the special ed program. He said the program covers many types other than mentally retarded.

Board President James O. Lamb presided at the meeting. All members were present. John Weeber gave the invocation.

Fair Features Country Music

Highlight of today's activities at the Allegan County Fair will be a country and western show at 8:15 p.m. at the grandstand featuring Clay Hart, Lois Johnson, Ronnie Sessions, and Don Silver and the Band.

Preceding the grandstand show at 7 p.m. will be a parade of all county bands, queens, floats and government officials, who will be introduced to the grandstand crowd.

Activities on Friday begin with lightweight horse pulling at 9 a.m. followed with harness racing at 1 p.m. featuring the Wolverine Futurity with an estimated purse of \$50,000. The grandstand shows at 7 and 9 p.m. will feature Bobby Vinton and a 15-piece band with music in Ted Weems manner.

Attendance for the fair which concludes on Saturday is running 10 to 15 per cent ahead of last year, fair officials report.

Survivors include the parents; two brothers, Keith and Richard, at home; a sister, Mrs. David (Sally) Serran of Holland; grandparents Mr. and Mrs. William Van Oosterhout and Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Ketchum, all of Holland, and several aunts, uncles and cousins.

A requiem will be held Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. at Grace Episcopal Church with the Rev. William O'Brien officiating. Cremation will be at Graceland Memorial Park, Grand Rapids.

Arrangements were being made by Dykstra Funeral Homes. Friends and relatives may meet the family at the church following the requiem Tuesday. There will be no visitation at the funeral home.

Board Limits Landfill Uses At Pigeon Creek

GRAND HAVEN—The Northwest County Refuse Disposal Center near Pigeon Creek in Olive township will be permanently closed at the end of a six-month period unless progress has been shown in alternate sites and in methods of disposing, the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners decided in a 6-4 vote Monday.

William Kennedy of Allendale, former board chairman, introduced the proposal which will hold in abeyance the action to lease operations to a private contractor, Paul Machiele of Haven Garbage. Machiele was to begin operations at the landfill next week.

The Ottawa County Road Commission will continue to operate the landfill for an additional six months on a Saturday-only basis.

Other points in Kennedy's motion, seconded by Kenneth Northouse of Jenison, provided for a study by the health board on solid wastes, as well as returning the landfill area to its natural state.

Files for Waste Treatment Grant

BPW Sets Water Plant Expansion

The Holland Board of Public Works Monday took additional steps toward expansion of the filtration plant and filed application for a \$10 million federal and state matching grant for improvements to the waste treatment plant.

The board reaffirmed its authorization of superintendent Ronald Rainsford to seek council approval to expand the Lake Michigan water plant capacity by 50 per cent and to finance the expansion through General Obligation bonds to be repaid through revenues.

The \$2,352,000 expansion program would boost the water capacity 7,000,000 gallons a day from the present 14,000,000 gallons to 21,000,000 gallons.

Rainsford said a state construction permit has been obtained and plans are "99 per cent completed." If council approves the proposals, Rainsford said he expected to request bids this fall with construction to begin next spring.

The expansion would include additional pumps and a settling basin, new filters and modification of the transmission system. The intake in Lake Michigan is adequate for the expansion, Rainsford said.

The BPW filed application with the state for a \$10,703,000 grant for improvements to the waste treatment plant. The grant would be on a matching basis with federal and state funds providing 80 per cent with the local share 20 per cent. The funds through the Environmental Protection Agency would cover the costs of necessary surveys of the

sanitary sewer system, engineering, rehabilitation of the sewer system, equipment and possible expansion of the treatment plant.

Rainsford said the grant is designed to provide a study of the present treatment system and its capacities and to determine whether an expansion is necessary to improve the efficiency of the existing plant which meets current EPA standards.

The board endorsed a policy of working with the Zeeland Board of Public Works in areas of mutual interest such as equipment purchases and electrical interchange.

The two most requested manuals are "Motor's Auto Repair Manual" and "Chilton's Automobile Repair Manual." Both volumes give complete information on what to do on every repair job, from a simple carburetor adjustment to a full-scale engine overhaul.

General books which cover fundamentals are "Automobile Guide," by Frederick Bricker, "The Car Owners Handbook," by Ray Stapley, "Auto Repairs You Can Make," by Paul Weisler, "Car Care," by the editors of Mechanics Illustrated.

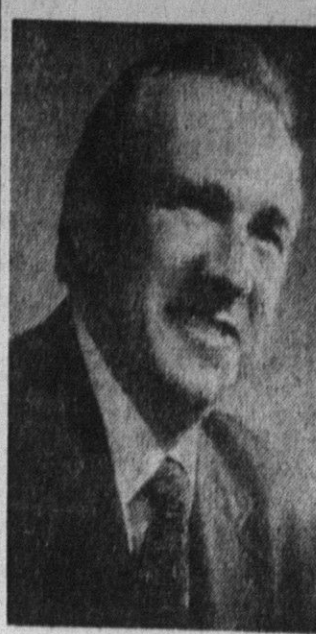

Revenue Funds Are Earmarked

GRAND HAVEN—Disposition of federal revenue sharing funds for July 1, 1973, through June 30, 1974, estimated at \$550,537 was approved by the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners Monday.

The divisions: bridges, \$212,300; computerization of records, \$34,000; mapping, \$70,000; Community Haven, \$20,000; sheriff, \$14,000; accounting machines, \$50,000; buildings, \$150,237.

Robert Pickup, executive director of Executives Research Council, appeared in support of Senate Bill 229 which would give counties a "styling point" for meeting the duties placed upon them. "There is a growing need for county reorganization," Pickup said. Last May, Commissioner James Dressel of Holland had suggested the board study various types of county management. A report will be given in October.

Franklin St. residents in Grand Haven expressed concern in the purchase of a house at 732 Franklin for Heritage Homes Inc. of Holland, providing a supervised living arrangement for six mentally retarded adults.

Spokesmen said they were informed that four houses had been turned down in Holland. Dr. Floyd Westendorp of the Ottawa County Mental Health department submitted a proposed budget for mental health totaling \$1,444,448. He is seeking \$60,000 from the county.

A report of the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Planning Commission revealed difficulties in communication among the seven governmental units of northwest Ottawa county. An advisory group will be established to implement communications.

A request from the city of Holland for bicycle paths throughout the county was referred to the county development committee. James Dressel was appointed bicycle path coordinator to work with the Road Commission and various committees.

Zeeland Bank Wins Bond Sale

ZEELAND—The Board of Education Monday night awarded the sale of \$570,000 worth of bonds to finance additions to two schools to low bidder First Michigan Bank & Trust Co. of Zeeland. The effective net interest rate was 4.624269 per cent.

The low bid was one of nine bids received for the bond sale and the highest interest rate was 5.077747. Other bids were received from institutions in Chicago and Detroit and the Old Kent Bank & Trust Co. of Grand Rapids.

The bonds will finance a six-room addition to the New Groningen school and a four-room addition to the Roosevelt school.

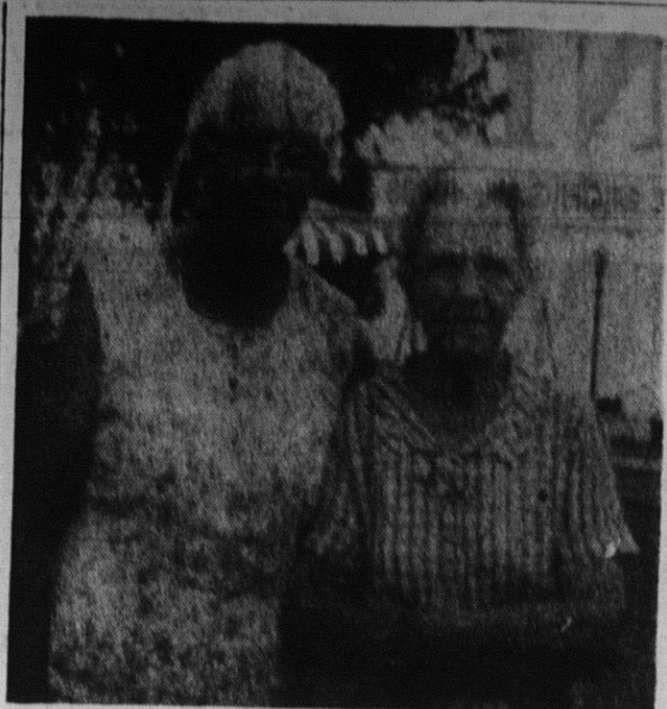

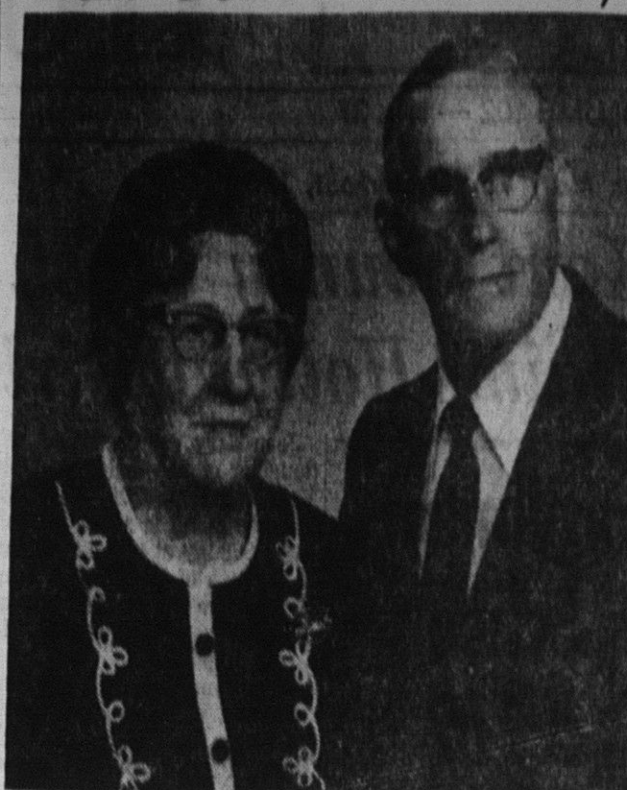

Dr. Hoepfinger Receives Grant

Dr. Lynn M. Hoepfinger, associate professor of chemistry at Hope College, has been awarded a \$14,700 grant from the U.S. Public Health Service entitled "Isolation and Properties of Bovine Kidney Urokinase."

The project will involve the extraction of the enzyme urokinase from animal kidney tissue, a substance which can be used clinically to remove blood clots in humans. It is currently used to remove clots in pulmonary arteries but it is not used extensively because of its limited supply, high cost (\$1,000 per patient), and difficulty of isolation.

Two Hope students are currently beginning the isolation procedure. Tom Kapral from Philadelphia, Pa. will do the isolation while Dale Rice from Rochester, N.Y. will determine enzyme purity.

The project will continue for two years and provide research experience for two students working full time during the summers.

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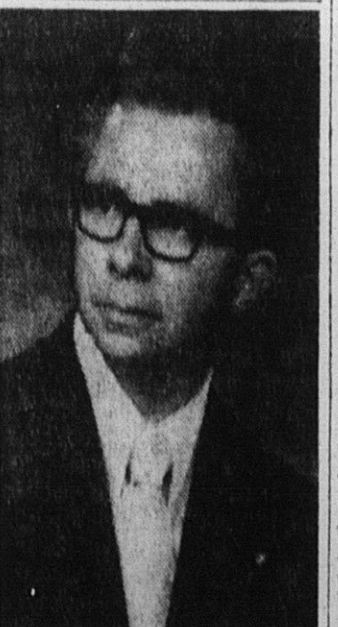

With all the talk on the metric system, John Karsten, 680 Paw Paw Dr., says some people make temperature readings unnecessarily difficult.

It's much simpler, he says, just to remember that water boils at 100 degrees Centigrade and freezes at zero Centigrade. After that, it's fairly simple. Of course, air pressure must be normal.

John came here in 1957 from the Netherlands where the metric system is a way of life. Temperatures, distances (kilometers instead of miles) and other measurements fall into neat patterns in the metric system.

Peter Kromann, 682 Central Ave., was in his native Denmark when that country adopted the metric system many years ago. He has addressed many local service clubs and other organizations on the metric system the last several years and a paper he prepared for the Social Progress Club was printed in the Congressional Record Dec. 13, 1971.

Pete has a system of determining the difference in Fahrenheit and Centigrade readings. It involves subtracting the 32 degrees for freezing and other determinations. Once a point is determined, every time the Fahrenheit thermometer moves up or down nine degrees, the Centigrade thermometer moves five degrees.

Temperature reading in Europe are on Centigrade and the traveler soon learns that 68 degrees Fahrenheit is 20 degrees Centigrade.

Pete says 77 Fahrenheit is 25 Centigrade, an easy thing to remember since it involves 2 sevens and the sum of 2 and 5 also is seven.

Pete has no illusions that the change to the metric system will be easy. It involves retooling, new weights and measures, kilometers instead of miles and lots more. It took Denmark a decade or two, and it won't be any easier for the United States, he says.

On a flight from Moscow to Copenhagen, the distinguished looking gentleman in the seat next to me remarked it had been very hot when he left China — 50 degrees.

What was that Fahrenheit? About 95, he said. And the humidity was 96 per cent.

Pete Kromann confirmed the figures. It indeed was 95 Fahrenheit.

Said gentleman said he was in diplomatic work. It turned out he was the Norwegian ambassador to Peking glad to be heading for the cooling breezes of Oslo.

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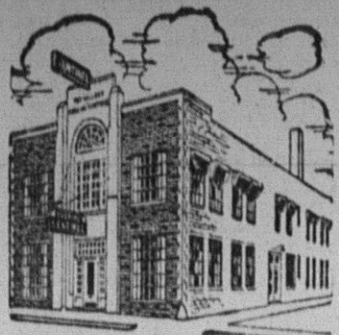

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\$20 MILLION IN FRILLS

There are some of us who insist that governmental expenses can be cut, and that it isn't too much of a problem to do so. We have a good example to substantiate our thesis in what has happened at the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Caspar Weinberger, in an order: has made a saving of \$20 million. That's a princely sum. He simply ordered the department to cut out its publicity material, including some 1,100 internal and external publications. Imagine the army of people pounding out all that publicity material. If it were worth anything reputable news-men would pick it up free of charge.

Even Weinberger called the stuff "puffery," which isn't quite a description of something of value. If this can be done with a swish of the pen, imagine what could be done if Mr. Weinberger and his aides did a thorough job that would insure efficiency. He has only touched the frills that are obvious.

If we could get into every area of government with some efficiency, the savings could be billions. But the taxpayer is long-suffering and he puts up with a great deal. Sometimes he doesn't seem to realize that it is his tax dollars that keep this "puffery" going. The government has become so used to big sums that the millions don't seem to count. And this is true all the way down, even to the point that we get fewer and fewer students in our colleges and universities, the costs go up.

We have a hunch we could even get a publication from the government explaining why it is valuable to carry on the waste. We think it is time for some changes. So write your government people that represent you and tell them so.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday School Lesson
for Sunday, Sept. 16
Unity at the Lord's Table
1 Corinthians 11:17 - 26

There is much disunity in our world. Christians do not agree on all matters of belief and behaviour. The Lord's Supper both unites and disunites believers. It was instituted by Jesus for the spiritual benefit of his followers who, remembering the Lord's death, would realize the cost of their salvation.

Churches are imperfect. A man looking for a perfect church, soon learned there was none and so he worked harder in his own. The Corinthian church had problems. Now problems challenge. Paul heard about the divisions in the church at Corinth and this he deplored. In Corinth the church had a supper called the Agape in connection with the celebration of the Lord's Supper. At this supper the factional spirit appeared. The rich brought much food and ate it together, the poor brought little and did not eat much. Greed and drunkenness disgraced the meals. Instead of the gathering promoting spirituality it fostered ill feeling.

Every modern church has its strong points and its shortcomings. What about your church? A study will most likely point out things and cause improvements. If there are things worthy of praise let us give praise, if some things are blameworthy let there be change.

II. The Lord's Supper is of divine origin. After Jesus and the apostles had celebrated the Passover feast together and had thus recalled how Israel had been delivered from Egyptian bondage, the Lord took the bread and broke it and shared the cup with them. "Do this in remembrance of me," so the Lord commanded and his followers have obeyed.

The sacrament points to the death of Jesus by which salvation was won and to his promised return. Some churches celebrate the Lord's Supper every Sunday, some do it once a month, others several times a year. The number of times is not important, the spirit in which it is celebrated is. The Christian Church is divided in several branches but the Lord's Supper is celebrated everywhere by all believers, who hold different views of the sacrament but all agree that its purpose is to fix the mind and heart upon Jesus the Saviour and Lord and thus gain more faith in him. Remembering the cross-bearing Jesus makes for better discipleship.

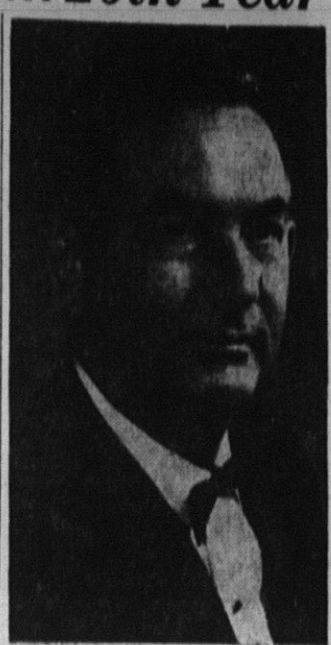

The rehearsal dinner was hosted by the groom's parents at the Hotel Warm Friend.

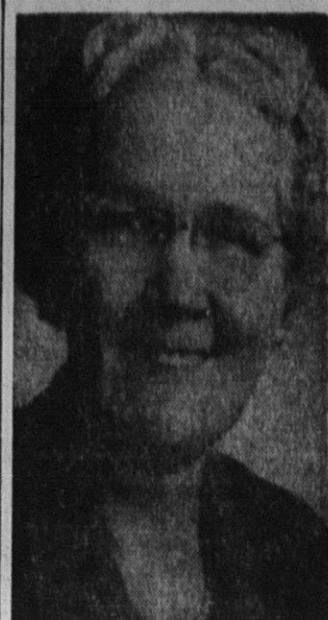

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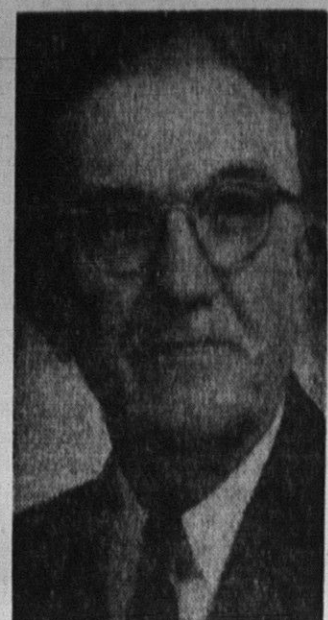
