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Fund Drive Shifts Into High Gear

## Pasadena Firm To Build Float

A float company of Pasadena, Calif., has been selected to design and construct Holland's entry in the 1976 Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena next Jan. 1.

The Holland Rose Parade Float Committee has signed a contract with Herrin-Preston Parade Floats, Inc. which has had such clients as Eastman Kodak, Atlantic Richfield, Knott's Berry Farm and the province of Quebec. This company with Wayne Herrin and Don Preston as partners has accumulated 26 trophies in the last six years including the Grand Prize and the coveted Sweepstakes.

Work on the final float design for Holland is currently progressing.

In conjunction with the committee's "Tip Toe to Pasadena" fund drive, approximately 900 requests for donations

were mailed today to area businesses, industries and professionals. This mailing represents the major fund raising effort in these three categories.

A Celebrity Swim has been scheduled Saturday, Sept. 13, at the Community Pool. Holland City Council and Rose Parade floats committee members will be among those swimming for pledges, with proceeds going to the "Tip Toe to Pasadena" fund.

A community-wide garage sale also is being planned to coincide with Downtown Holland's "Get Acquainted Month." The event will feature the sale of space to area residents with second-hand items to sell. Sale of space will benefit the float drive fund.

Plans call for all designs submitted to the float committee will be on display at the Community OX Road Sept. 20 at Windmill Island.

## \$5,000 State Grant Boosts Float Fund

A \$5,000 grant from the Michigan Bicentennial Commission today boosted Holland's Rose Bowl float fund to \$22,000.

Although no official word was received in City Hall up to noon today, the Holland grant was among \$79,025 in grants for 32 bicentennial projects throughout the state, at a meeting of the commission Monday in Lansing.

The budget for Holland's float in the Tournament of Roses Parade Jan. 1 is \$37,500, leaving \$15,500 yet to be raised.

Monday's allocations boosts the total number of funded projects in Michigan to 103, with some \$437,000 in state funds involved.

Letters were sent Friday to local businesses, industries and professional people, soliciting support on a "one-time float" basis, according to Mayor Lou Hallacy.

## Three Injured In Tractor, Car Crash

ZEELAND — Three persons were injured in a collision involving a farm tractor and two cars Tuesday at 8:30 p.m. at 88th Ave. and Port Sheldon St. in Blendon township. The injured were treated in Zeeland Community Hospital and released.

Ottawa County deputies said the farm tractor was operated by Alan Weaver, 21, of 6440 Pine Crest, Zeeland, and was eastbound along Port Sheldon.

A car operated by Bernard J. Hoeve, 17, of 80th Ave. and Port Sheldon, also eastbound, apparently failed to see the tractor which was lit with a flashlight and swerved to go around, striking the left rear tire. The Hoeve car bounced into the westbound traffic lane and collided with the oncoming car operated by James Stacey Swanezy, 27, of 2504 Miles Standish Dr., Holland.

Hoeve, Swanezy and Swanezy's wife, Jacquilyn, 24, were injured. Alan Weaver and his brother, Brian, 15, were not injured.

## Holland Hospital Upgrading Urged

GRAND HAVEN — Holland Hospital would be upgraded to become a regional facility serving smaller hospitals in the south Ottawa area under emergency medical service plans developed by the West Michigan Comprehensive Health Planning Unit.

Robert Briem, health planner for the 12-county West Michigan area, submitted a report to Ottawa County Commissioners Tuesday. The plan involved 2½ years of study by subcommittees.

The report suggests Holland Hospital obtain equipment to provide telemetry and radio communications with ambulances and police vehicles and other hospitals in the state and to include angiography equipment in the x-ray department.

Briem said the two were considered priority items for Holyland Hospital and for the planning unit in relation to the

### Skill Center Vote Slated For Sept. 29

On September 29, residents in Ottawa Intermediate School District will vote on establishing an Area Vocational Center.

The Michigan State Board of Education at its June 4 meeting approved a federal grant of \$1,600,000 which will pay for 50 per cent of the cost of constructing the Vocational Center if the vote is favorable.

The method of financing the Area Center, to be located at US-31 and Port Sheldon St., would be through the \$1,600,000 federal grant and a millage election for 1.2 mills. The first three years revenue from the 1.2 mills assessed together with federal funds will pay for the cost of construction and equipment. From that point the 1.2 mills will be used for operation.

The approval by the people will provide the opportunity for young people to learn a skill needed to qualify for an entry job in the world of work. The Area Center program is an extension of the curriculum in all local high schools which will provide education and training in skills. It will ultimately benefit business and industry by providing them with a source of trained workers.

The Area Center will provide approximately 29 occupational training programs for 1,300 junior and senior students from the 13 public and non-public schools in the intermediate district.

Each high school will be able to send students to the center for training, but the student will continue to be a member of his home high school for regular classes and extra-curricular activities. Selection of students to attend the Center will be determined by each high school. The Area Center will be available for retraining, upgrading and apprentice programs for adults.

Ronald William Boneck, 23, of 289 Garfield Ave., was fatally injured Saturday when the motorcycle he was operating south along Butternut Dr. ran off the west side of the road and struck a post a half mile north of Van Buren St. in Port Sheldon township.

Ottawa County deputies said Boneck sustained multiple head injuries and was reported dead at the scene. He was the 16th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year compared with the 24 a year ago.

Deputies said the accident was reported at 12:06 a.m. Sunday by a resident who found a damaged cycle near a driveway at 5991 Butternut Dr. Boneck's body was found 32 feet away.

Deputies said the accident could have occurred as long as two hours before Boneck's body was discovered. The accident remains under investigation.

Boneck was employed at Lear Siegler in Zeeland and was a veteran of the Vietnam era stationed in Germany. He had attended Faith Temple.

Survivors include the wife, Linda; his parents Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Boneck, all of Holland; a sister, Mrs. Larry (Delores) Harbinson of Borculo; a brother, David, and his mother and father-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Junior Kok, all of Holland, and several aunts, uncles, nieces and cousins.

## Hang Glider Falls Into Oak Tree

Russel Six Spends 3 Hours in Tree; Rescued By Duane Kloet

Russel Six, 26, of 184 Franklin, who has been hang gliding since January, plans to continue the sport despite the three hours he spent caught in the top of an oak tree at Laketown township park Saturday.

"I had some good northwest wind," said Six today, "and went up and up and up to about 400 feet and then stalled. The winds pushed me back into the trees after I dropped about 200 feet."

Six, who was hang gliding with two companions from the dunes at the township park, found himself and his glider entangled in the oak tree about 35 feet above ground at 4:10 p.m. Saturday.

Three hours later he was back on the ground without injuries.

It took the combined efforts of the Board of Public Works, the rescue unit from the Holland Fire Department, Dykstra's ambulance, the Coast Guard and the Allegan Sheriff's department to bring him back to earth.

The tree was about 60 feet from the Lake Michigan shore line and not accessible by BPW or fire department trucks.

The area is located near 144th Ave. and 66th St. in Allegan County.

Duane Kloet, 38, of 2568 112th St., a lineman with the BPW five years, put on his climbing spikes used to scale utility poles and climbed to Six with a light weight line.

Six pulled up a heavier line and a safety belt and rescue persons on the ground helped lower him and his glider.

Six said the leading edge of the glider was damaged but he intended to have it repaired and return to the dunes for more gliding. This was his second accident in the ninth months he has been gliding.

The married man and father of two children said he crashed once before in the same area when he again stalled in the wind. That time he came down along the beach.

Stoltz was reporting on the need to repair adhesive joints in the porcelain facia of the County Building while workmen were repainting the exterior steel framework.

Commissioners broke up but gave their approval and before they could calm down, Stoltz tossed another zinger at them, saying the county jail needed a new meat grinder to replace the second-hand grinder which just wore out.

Whitney, a consulting engineer with United Engineers & Constructors, Inc., of Boston, begins his new duties Oct. 1 at a salary of \$28,000.

The appointment was announced by Charles J. Cooper, president of the BPW.

Whitney is a graduate of Brown University and holds a Masters degree in business administration from Northeastern University. He has been a senior consultant with Ebasco Services, Inc., of New York where he did cost of service analysis for electric utilities.

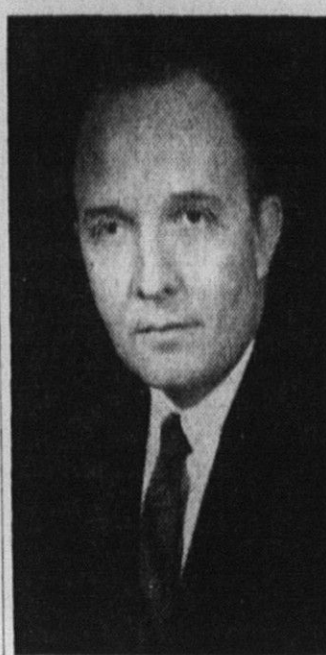

In other action Monday, the BPW voted three to one, with Stuart Padnos dissenting, to cancel two shipments of coal this season for the power plant at a savings of \$600,000.

The BPW agreed to an insurance settlement in connection with the boiler explosion

earlier this year in the power plant. Damage to the boiler was set at \$624,000 while additional operating costs to supply power lost by the damaged boiler ran another \$309,000. Of the total \$933,000 insurance coverage amounted to \$558,000.

## Penalty for Taxes Unpaid Goes Up

Holland city taxes unpaid since the Aug. 15 deadline have carried a two per cent penalty but after Wednesday the unpaid taxes will be subject to a six per cent penalty.

City treasurer Jack Leenhouts said today collections for the summer taxes amounted to 92 per cent of the total levy of \$7,567,327.33 or \$6,960,269.42.

Leenhouts added that 275 senior citizens have taken deferments for summer taxes to be paid Feb. 15 amounting to \$100,000. The deadline for applying for the deferred tax payments is Sept. 15 in the treasurer's office.

## Zeeland Schools Await Word on Suit

ZEELAND — School officials Wednesday waited for official word from U. S. District Court concerning a suit filed by a group opposed to the practice of handing out Bibles at the Zeeland High School graduation exercises.

Supt. Dr. Ray Lokers said his board could say nothing until the court contacts them concerning the suit filed by Rev. Jay A. Wabeke, president of the Grand Rapids chapter of Americans United for Separation of Church and State.

Once the information is received, Lokers said the board would have to react and make a decision on plans to carry it out.

## Hamilton Schools Complete Staffing

HAMILTON — The teaching staff for the Hamilton School District was completed formally Monday night with the addition of a high school art instructor. The board of education approved the contract for Diann Scripsma of Grandville who graduated from Western Michigan University in 1975.

In other action the board accepted the bid of People's State Bank for a \$430,000, 4.49 per cent interest loan against anticipated state aid revenues. The board also approved the adult education requirements meeting those of Jenison, Grandville and Hudsonville.

## Jay A. Wabeke Files Suit In Zeeland Bible Case

GRAND RAPIDS — A retired Congregational minister Tuesday filed suit in U. S. District Court to stop the Zeeland Public Schools from handing out Bibles at high school graduation.

The Rev. Jay A. Wabeke, president of the Grand Rapids chapter of Americans United for Separation of Church and State, said the practice is unconstitutional. He asked the court to order the Zeeland Board of Education to stop the practice and to repay public funds spent to buy the Bibles.

School officials at the traditionally conservative West Michigan community have approved the purchase and distribution of Bibles to graduating seniors since 1925.

"This action on the part of Americans United does not indicate and must not be interpreted as opposition to the Bible or the Christian religion,"

Wabeke said.

But if the state can use public funds to distribute Bibles, he said, "it would have the right to distribute Moslem, or Jewish, or Hindu literature as well. We feel that the state is not doing religion any favor when it tries to aid it in this way."

Wabeke threatened a law suit last spring when Zeeland school officials purchased some \$450 worth of Bibles and handed them out to 175 graduating seniors. He said school officials refused to meet with him "to settle the matter out of court."

"It therefore seems clear to us that we have no recourse but to settle this matter in a proper court of law," he said.

Wabeke, of Eastmanville, said although he does not live in the Zeeland school district he has "wide support" from Zeeland residents, even though Zeeland voters continue to

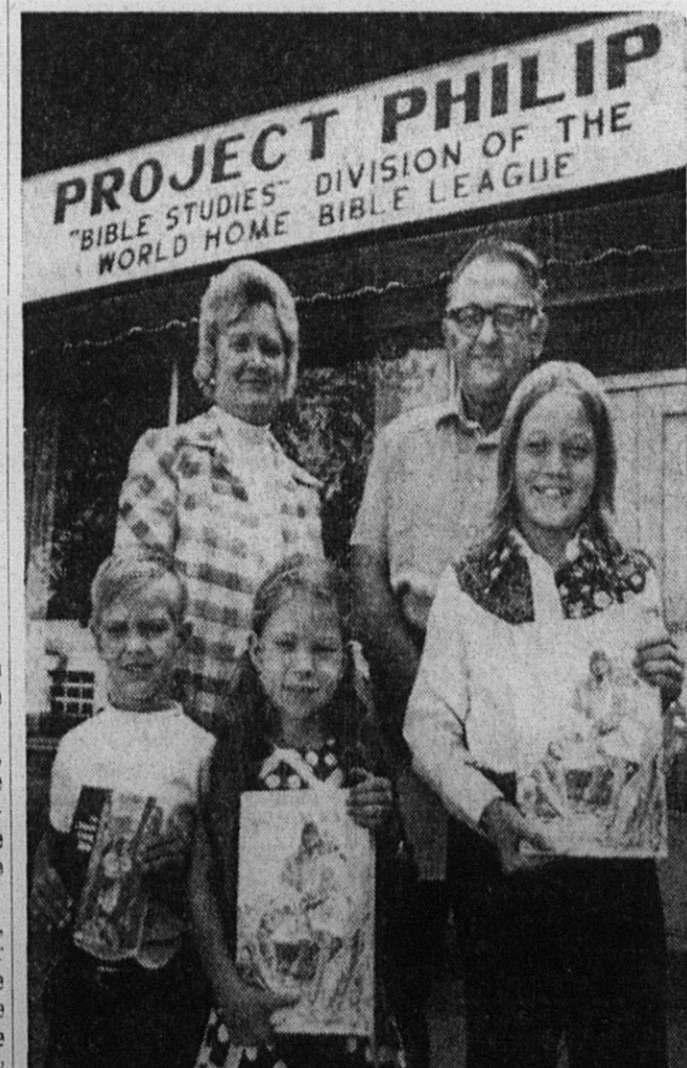
reelect school board members who have approved Bible distribution since 1925.

"As a taxpayer of this state, I have the right to raise these constitutional questions regardless of what the will of the community might be," Wabeke said.

"After all, Jesus said, 'Come, follow me.' He did not order Roman legions to force people to follow him. We believe we are performing a great service for religion and religious liberty by defending the constitutional principle of church-state separation."

Wabeke said his organization which he said has 125,000 members nationwide, is looking into similar practices at other Michigan schools and throughout the country.

"I expect this suit will flush out a great deal of this sort of thing throughout the country," he said.

## Smant Named To Vacancy On Board

GRAND HAVEN — Grand Haven city councilman Jack R. Smant, 41, who owns and operates a resort at Mears, was elected to a vacancy on the County Board of Commissioners Tuesday.

Smant succeeds William Kieft in District Four. Kieft resigned to take a position in Grand Haven township.

After Smant was sworn into office, he was informed that he no longer was on the Grand Haven city council since he could not hold two public offices at the same time.

Smant received five votes from commissioners while candidates Bernard Schultz and Paul Versepout each received two votes. Commissioner Donald Williams of Holland was absent.

Commissioners received and filed a letter from Wright township objecting the county's claim that costs involved in an equalization appeal should be paid by the township.

Commissioners said the matter involved the valuation of a "worthless piece of property" at \$2 million and commissioner Kenneth Northouse, a member of the finance committee, said it was the feeling of the committee that the action was a fraudulent move by the township.

A request from Chester township to establish the level of Crockery Lake was referred to the development committee for study and a report concerning procedures and costs involved in establishing a lake level.

Township officials and residents of Crockery Lake appealed to the county to join the township and the Department of Natural Resources in setting aside money to maintain a lake level which they claimed fluctuates with rainfall, creating some flooding of homes and cottages.

But commissioners feared a resolution of intent to share in the cost of the project might commit them to an unspecified sum of money and preferred to wait for engineering reports on the proposed project and cost estimates.

Commissioner Donald Stoltz reported on the cost of jail meals and said a shortage of funds was developing in the budget. Of the \$15,000 allocated for 1975, \$14,787 had been spent through July.

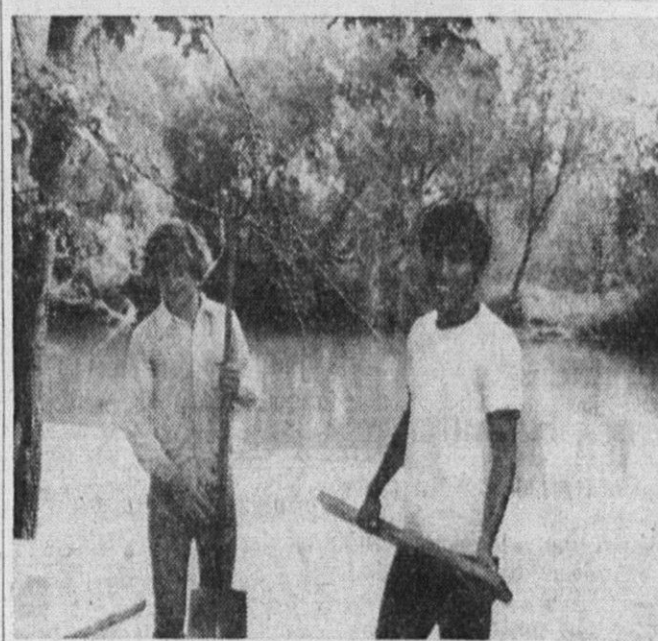

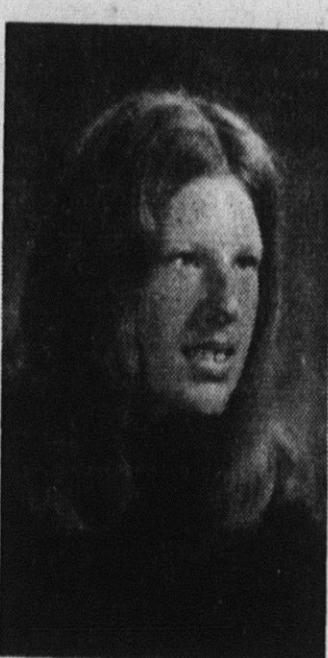

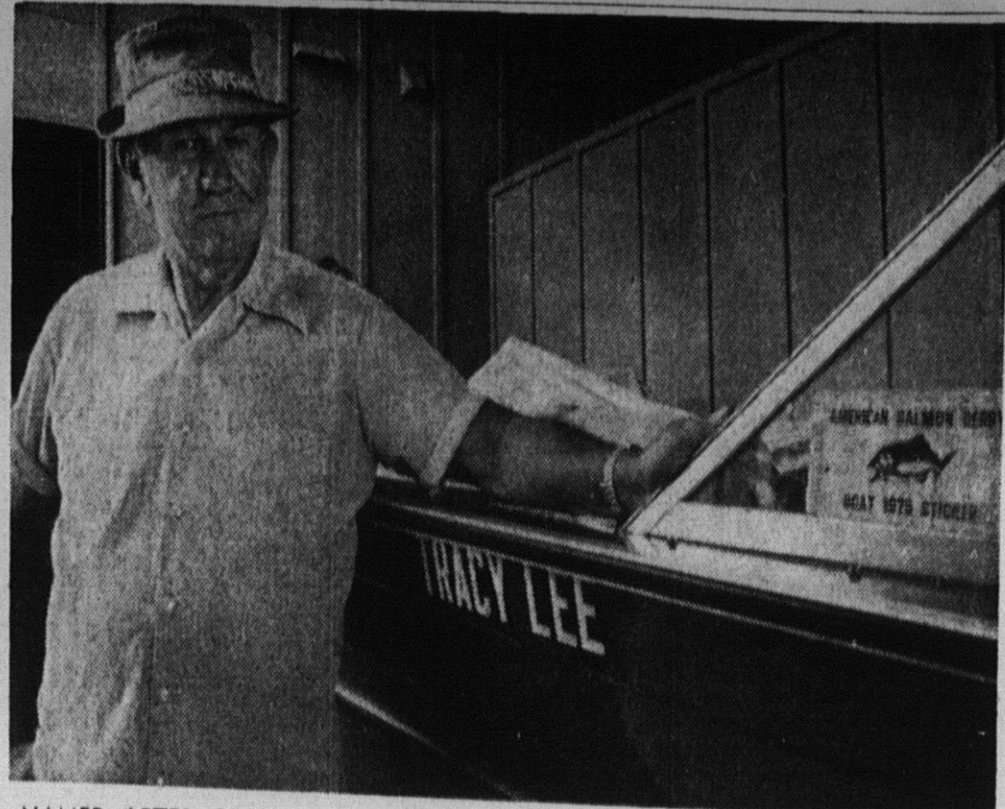

"This is just unreal," stated Ernest. "Every day it seems to get worse, as we were so close and yet so far."

The Flemings used a Charger No. 4 for the catch and were on the boat Tracy Lee.

The date of Sept. 1, 1975, will never be forgotten by the Flemings. And when you talk about sports heartbreakers, this has to rank with any of them.

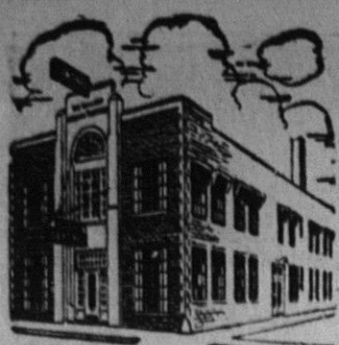

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## HECHLER'S FENCE-MENDING

Like his colleagues in the House of Representatives, Rep. Ken Hechler of West Virginia mended fences during the August congressional recess. Unlike most of his colleagues, he mended fences by doing a lot of the sort of daily work that needs to be done to keep society functioning.

He hauled garbage, waited on tables, served as a mental hospital orderly, mowed the grass at a settlement house, helped with a meals-on-wheels program, directed traffic, baled hay, held young pigs to be castrated, even "tried to build a porch for an old lady down at Princeton." It was work that hardened his muscles and sharpened his insight into how a lot of people earn a living, and what is on their minds in these difficult times.

What he learned in the course of his labors doubtless is not much different from what other congressmen learned from talks with their constituents. He found, for example, a widespread and deep frustration with the federal tax system: "The working people feel the system is unfair and unjust, that the very poor and the very rich escape while they must carry the load." Not by any means an uncommon complaint, almost anywhere in the country.

The important thing about Rep. Hechler's experience is that he came away with greatly heightened respect for the more or less ordinary people who perform more or less ordinary tasks: "I learned how to do a lot of useful things, and discovered the complexities of some jobs that on the surface appear to be very simple."

This congressman, in short, developed a closer empathy with the people in his district than he had before. Perhaps it would not be practicable for all members of Congress to undertake such a venture. Many of them could benefit, though, from thus getting the feel of how their constituents live and work. Besides, it's great for the waistline: Hechler had to cut a new notch in his belt.

## Sunday School Lesson

A Free, Yet Accountable Creature

Scripture: Genesis 3:1-12

By C. P. Dame

The attitude a person takes to Genesis 3 will determine his attitude to the whole Bible. The person who does not believe this chapter and its teaching is apt to question other parts of the sacred Book, while the person who accepts Genesis 3 accepts all of it. This lesson tells how man was given a choice either to obey or disobey God and by his disobedience the fall took place.

I. God gives choices. God created man to be different from all the rest of creation. In one way he was alike since he too is dependent, and responsible. God gave man orders. He told him to be fruitful and multiply. He put man in a garden and told him to guard and care for it. In addition, he permitted man to eat of the fruit of all the trees save one. God gave freedom with restrictions.

Take note of the contrast between conditions described in chapters 1 and 2 and the conditions portrayed in chapters 4 to 11. Chapter 3 gives the explanation. It was man's sin. The world's bad condition stems from man's first and continued disobedience.

II. Temptation allures. In chapters 2 and 3 two persons are cited, God and man. In chapter 3 three persons are cited, Satan, man and God. The Devil, disguised as a serpent, approached Eve — not Adam, and asked a question in regard to what God has said. Eve listened and responded — two mistakes she added, "neither shall we touch it." After getting attention Satan lied saying God was withholding something from her for he was jealous. The choice was, believe God or Satan. This temptation came from without, not from within.

First Satan made an appeal to the ear-gate, then the eye-gate. Eve looked at the fruit, it looked good for food, this she needed, and it appealed to the eye and it would give wisdom — know evil — she wanted experimental knowledge. She ate and gave to her husband. They wanted more than they had.

III. Choices have consequences. Both the good and the bad have. Both felt guilty and hid themselves from God who called them. Before yielding, they saw, coveted and took. After taking they saw again, but differently. Man by his disobedience separated himself from God, brought separation within himself, and separation between himself and others. Adam blamed his wife, she the serpent. In addition a separation between man and nature followed. Be sure to read Genesis 3:15 — the first Messianic promise.

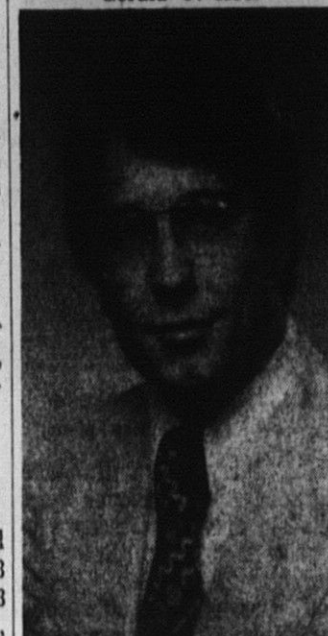

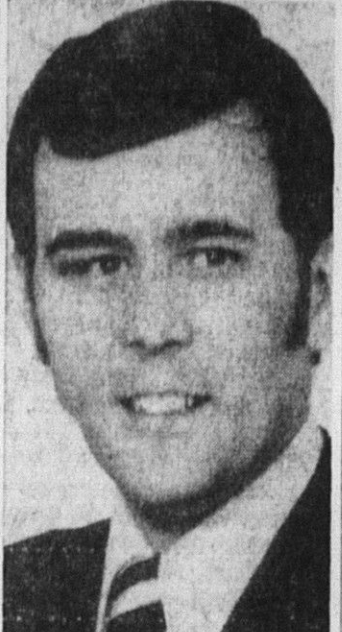

## Inventor Of Teletype Is 100

CANAAN, Conn. — A testimonial luncheon was held in nearby Salisbury, Conn., Tuesday honoring Dr. Edward Ernst Kleinschmidt, inventor of the teletype and holder of more than 100 U. S. patents in related fields, on the occasion of his 100th birthday anniversary.

Among the guests was Mrs. Mischa Thorogevsky of Holland, Mich., at whose home the Kleinschmidts visited in 1969. Both families have homes in Bal Harbor, Fla.

Back in 1928, Kleinschmidt, a native of Germany, obtained a patent for the teletypewriter, now standard for U. S. Services. One of his more recent inventions was the teleprinter, a communications device used in police cars, ambulances, etc., which operates with no static interference.

The centenarian, who came to America when he was nine years old, started out in an electric shop in New York City in 1898 and became president of the Kleinschmidt Electric Co. there in 1913. In 1925 he became vice president of the Morkum-Kleinschmidt Co., in Chicago, the company that received the patent for a printing telegraph apparatus which later became known as the teletypewriter. Early machines produced 60 words a minute and later 100 words a minute. Equipment today transmits many hundreds of words a minute.
