## Council Votes To Repair Grass, Lawns

ZEELAND — City Council in a five-hour meeting Tuesday agreed to hire a firm to repair lawns damaged by installation of sanitary sewer lines and granted a request to bury a time vault on city property.

Council authorized the hiring of a firm to rake, re-seed and fertilize lawns east of 100th St. in the southwest area of the city where street and sanitary improvements were made.

Council said several of the lawns had failed to establish themselves after two attempts and council pointed to tests indicating the failure was not due to any reason other than unfavorable weather conditions. Cost of the project was estimated at \$5,000.

The Zeeland Historical Society was granted permission to bury a time vault in one of the Van De Luyster square parks at Central and Church Sts.

The vault would contain artifacts and would be opened in 2076.

Petitions containing 350 signatures from residents of the State St. area were presented to council. They asked definite truck routes be studied and established and that the city complete construction of Roosevelt Rd. between Centennial and Fairview for use by heavy vehicles entering or leaving the industrial park area.

A contract was awarded West Shore Construction Co. to resurface the north public parking lot for \$23,151.25 and the city's share will be \$9,000 with remainder paid by the Chamber of Commerce and merchants.

Council authorized planning studies for the City of Zeeland and Zeeland Township for various sanitary sewer projects. Total cost is \$38,000 with per cent, pending Federal agreement.

A \$698.25 subsidy was approved for the Zeeland Softball Association for the Wednesday Junior League program and council approved a contract between the Zeeland Community Schools council and the Grand Rapids Public Schools for community education services in Zeeland in 1976 - 77.

## Holland Township Accepted Into Flood Insurance

Holland Charter Township has been accepted into the National Flood Insurance Program effective Tuesday, it was announced by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Under the program property owners are eligible to buy flood insurance protection at affordable federally - subsidized rates under an expanded program authorized by the 1973 Flood Disaster Protection Act.

The policies may be purchased from any licensed local property insurance agent or broker. The Insurance Company of North America in Detroit has been designated as the flood insurance servicing company for this area.

In becoming eligible for the program, the township had to submit an application in which it certified that it had adopted certain minimum flood plain management measures.

Under the expanded program, single-family homes may be insured up to \$35,000 with contents up to \$10,000 per unit. Other residential and non-residential buildings may be insured for up to \$100,000 and contents up to \$100,000 per unit.

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## Traffic Diverted Along Ottawa Beach Road

Work was expected to begin today on widening the final section of Ottawa Beach Rd. from Pine Creek west to 152nd Ave.

A detour route was scheduled to go into effect around the construction site between 144th Ave. and 152nd Ave.

Ottawa County Road Commission construction engineer Cliff Gordon said the project calls for widening Ottawa Beach Rd. to four lanes with curb and gutter and a bicycle path along the north side of the road.

Total cost of the project is \$296,751.41 and completion is scheduled for Nov. 1.

Park Township is to pay the \$19,138 cost of the bicycle path, Gordon said.

Ottawa Beach Rd. has been

widened from River Ave. west to the Pine Creek bridge. The final 7 mile of the project to 152nd Ave. is a continuation of the original plan.

In addition to widening of Ottawa Beach Rd., the road commission is to re-surface 152nd Ave. from Ottawa Beach Rd. south to Post Ave. for Park Township.

The detour around the construction zone will bring traffic along 144th Ave. to Lakewood Blvd. and then to 152nd Ave. and back to Ottawa Beach Rd. When the 152nd Ave. and Ottawa Beach Rd. intersection is to be re-constructed the detour will be extended west to 160th Ave. and Lakewood Blvd.

Construction crews have been dewatering the construction zone.

## Allegan Fair Opens On Friday

**Grandstand Events To Please Everyone; Harness Racing Slated**

The Allegan County Fair, which opens Friday, Sept. 10, holds a wealth of down-home fun and enjoyment in store for all who pass through its gates between noon this Friday and late Saturday night, Sept. 18.

The first event, starting at 8 p.m. Friday evening will be a demolition derby.

On Saturday, Sept. 11, the fair gates will open at noon. From then until 2 p.m., a child-F from then until 2 p.m., a children's program will be presented, featuring clowns, prizes and other entertainment. Harness racing and jockey-mounted running races start at the grandstand at 2 p.m. Saturday. The gala Harvest Queen contest and pageant will begin at 7:30. This will be followed by a gigantic fireworks display.

On Sunday, the Kingsmen, a religious singing group, will present two shows at the fair, beginning at 3 and 7:30 p.m.

Monday, Sept. 13, is Farmers' Day. A pony harness hitch contest will begin at 9:30 a.m., harness racing and colt stakes are scheduled to start at 1, and the tractor pulling contest begins at 5 p.m. and continues.

Harness racing is scheduled again for Tuesday, Sept. 14, at 1 p.m. It will be followed at 3 p.m. by the 4-H Livestock auction. The Castle 3-ring circus will present two shows Tuesday evening, one at 5 p.m., and another at 8.

Ladies and Senior citizen's day will be Sept. 15. Ladies day program registration will be held from 9 until 9:30 a.m., to be followed at 1 p.m. by more harness racing, and two more shows of the Castle circus at 5 and 8 p.m.

On Thursday, Sept. 16, Parade Day, a mule pulling contest is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. It will be followed by harness racing at 1 p.m., before the parade — this year bigger than ever and lead by Meredith Wilson — starts at 4 p.m. in downtown Allegan. The parade will also take a tour of the track in front of the grandstand audience at 4:30. Thursday evening the pageant of floats and bands begins in the grandstand at 7:30, and will be followed by a huge display of fireworks.

Lightweight horse pulling is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. Friday, Sept. 17. Harness racing will follow at 1 p.m., and a draft horse contest at 3. Grandstand entertainment Friday night, beginning at 7 and 9 p.m., will feature the Lawrence Welk stars Bobby and Cissy, and Tom Netherton. The Wayland Michigan Community Choir will also perform, and the entire show will be emceed by Mr. Sound Effects, Wes Harrison.

Heavyweight horse pulling will start the day Saturday at 9 a.m., and harness racing will again follow at 1 p.m. Draft horse racing is scheduled for 3. Two grandstand shows will be presented again Saturday night, featuring Loretta Lynn and the coal miners, as well as the Wayland Choir, and Wes Harrison.

## Record Numbers Predicted For Holland State Park

Attendance at Holland State Park pointed to a record year as the official summer season ended Labor Day. State Park officials said the park was nearly full with day campers Labor Day and the camp sites were full.

Statics through Sunday, not including Labor Day, showed daily use up 14.4 per cent from a year ago, camping permits up 6.2 per cent and annual motor vehicle sales up 6 per cent.

Attendance through Sunday reached 1,341,362 compared to the 1,187,874 for the same period last year. Camping permits for the same period this year amounted to 10,816 with 150,516 campers.

## Historic Zeeland Home Set for Tour

ZEELAND — A brick home closely associated with the early industrial growth of Zeeland will be open for public tours Saturday for the benefit of the Zeeland Historical Society.

The Veneklasen home on brickyard hill, 10283 Chicago Dr., was rebuilt in 1910 and included a small portion of the original home constructed in 1873.

Since 1848 the Veneklasens operated a brickyard in the Groningen area but when the clay supply dwindled they moved the operation to Zeeland and formally incorporated in 1892 as the Zeeland Brick Co.

The firm, with offices at the site of the present First Michigan Bank & Trust Co., owned and operated brickyards in Hamilton, Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids, and Cloverdale.

The firm produced both red brick and white or buff brick and many local homes and buildings were constructed of the bricks made by hand.

Approximately 100 of the homes and schools constructed with the Veneklasen brick still stand today. Artistic designs combining red and white bricks

at the roof line and windows are features unique in the Zeeland area.

The brickyards at Zeeland were opened the same years as the railroad linked Grand Rapids and Chicago and at its peak the brickyards produced 40 million bricks a year and employed 200 persons. The yards closed in 1924.

The tours of the Veneklasen home is the first major event of the fall season for the Historical Society.

Mrs. Bernard G. Veneklasen will open the entire home to visitors including the attic with family antiques, a bedroom used by a maid with its turn-of-the-century decor and other rooms bearing the personal touch of Mrs. Veneklasen.

Tours begin at 11 a.m. and continue until 6 p.m. and tickets will be sold at \$1.25 at De Pree's or by members of the society. No tickets will be sold at the Veneklasen home.

General chairmen are Mrs. Ben Sterken and Mrs. James Sterken with Mrs. Veneklasen and her daughter, Mrs. Preston Van Zoeren, assisting. The event is known as "Elsie: At Home."

Tully Daniel was granted a year's leave of absence because of the serious illness of his father in Jackson, Tenn.

The board also approved a contract for Larry Brigrance to teach in Thomas Jefferson School filling a vacancy caused by the resignation of Ella Iams who is moving to Washington, D. C.

Regret was expressed that so many changes took place so close to the opening of the new school term.

President Charles Bradford Jr. presided at the session. Absent were Carroll Norlin and Katherine MacKenzie.

## Detergent Kills Gold Fish In Centennial Park

Vandals dumped liquid dishwashing detergent into the main gold fish pond in Centennial Park during the weekend and killed off most of the fish and those transferred into another pond were not expected to live.

Police said one 61-ounce plastic bottle and seven 32-ounce plastic bottles of detergent were recovered from the pond Saturday morning after police were notified at 8:53 a.m.

Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf said between 100 and 125 gold fish were in the pond at the time and survivors were transferred to another pond in the park but many were not expected to live.

De Graaf said the main floral pond would be cleaned and drained and closed for the winter.

## You Registered to Vote? Oct. 4 Is the Deadline

Are you registered to vote? Since this is Presidential election year, more people than ever are interested in the Nov. 2 election.

Persons not already registered must register by Oct. 4 to be eligible to vote.

To qualify as a voter, a person must be a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old, and a resident of the city or township on or before Oct. 4. Persons must register with city or township clerks to establish voter rights.

Holland city residents may register at the city clerk's office on the second floor of City Hall any Monday through Friday during regular hours of 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m.

Beginning Monday, Sept. 13, the clerk's office also will be open during the noon hour to accommodate those who cannot

register during regular hours. In addition to regular hours, the clerk's office also will be open Saturday, Sept. 25, from 9 a.m. to noon; Friday, Oct. 1, from 6 to 9 p.m., as well as the last day Monday, Oct. 4, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

A person who will be 18 years old on or before Nov. 2 and meets other qualifications is entitled to register and vote in the Nov. 2 election, but he must register by Oct. 4.

Persons already registered need not register.

Michigan has a permanent system which continues the registration of any elector once registered who has not moved out of the city and township.

However, if a person moves from one city to another or to a township in Michigan, he must register by the deadline

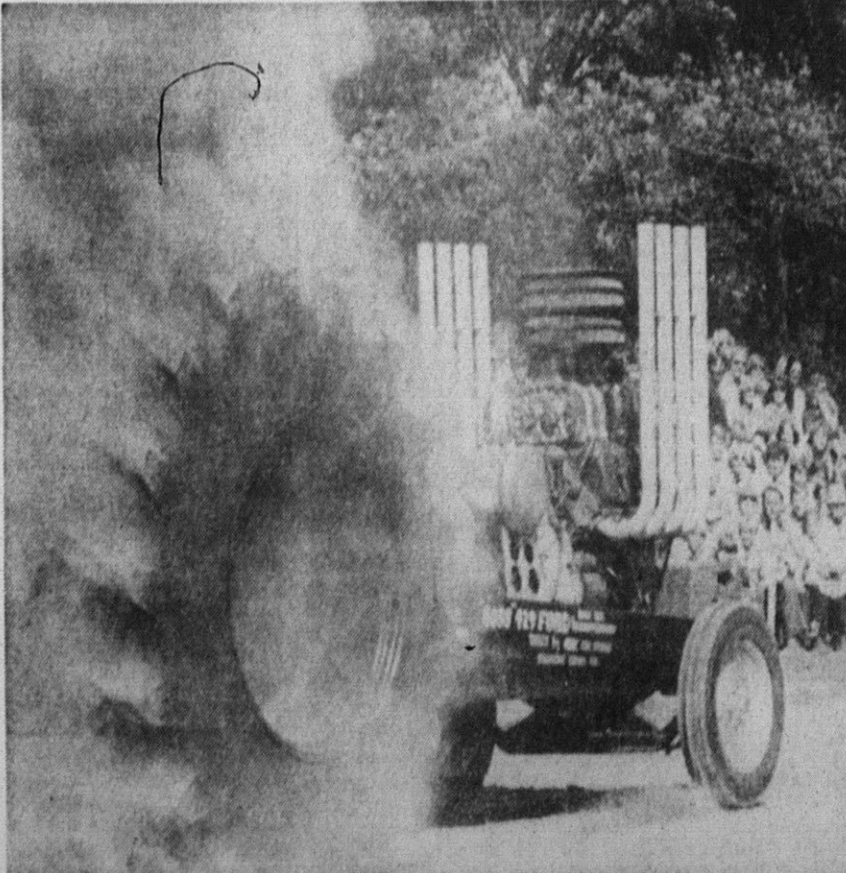
with his city or township clerk to be eligible to vote. He cannot transfer his registration. He must register when he moves.

Those who are registered and have moved within the same governmental unit, must record their change of address with the city or township clerk either in person or by mail by the Oct. 4 deadline.

If a person is in doubt about his registration status, he may call his city or township clerk to verify if he is still registered. Those not registered, who meet qualifications, are urged to register as early as possible with their city or township clerk.

And since there are always long lines on the last day, do so early, and avoid standing in line!

## Former Holland Couple Survives Canyon Flood

BIG THOMPSON CANYON, Colo.—A former Holland, Mich., woman glanced out of the window of her new home and pointed across the Big Thompson River to where the house of a neighbor once stood.

There was nothing left except an open patch of ground. Farther down the canyon, a 15-foot-high pile of debris stood near the river banks.

Mrs. Jacob Zuidema, the former Virginia Muller of Holland, said, "There was a home across the road before the flood. It belonged to a woman by the name of Marshall. During the half hour that the water came up July 31 and rose so fast, her home was completely swept away."

Mrs. Zuidema and her husband, Dr. J. J. Zuidema, also formerly of Holland, are back in the home they built and moved into when Dr. Zuidema retired July 1 after many years of practice in nearby Greeley. Dr. Zuidema is a son of Mrs. Jacob Zuidema, 95 West 15th St., and Mrs. Zuidema is a daughter of the late John Muller of Holland.

The mother in Holland, Mich., heard the first day that her son and daughter - in - law were safe, but it took nearly 10 days for word to come through that her granddaughter, Jana Zuidema, was safe.

Jana, who graduated this year from Greeley College, was in Estes Park where the terrific storm and flood hit first. She escaped with the clothes on her back. All her belongings were swept away. Jana plans a teaching career.

After initial evacuation by helicopter of survivors in the valley, the Zuidemas returned to their home. There still is no electricity and they use candles for light and cook their food on a Coleman stove.

"We're back to primitive living," Mrs. Zuidema said. "But this is our home and we couldn't see any point in leaving it. There is repair work to be done, and we like the challenge. I think the challenge to stay and take care of our home was greater than the desire to leave."

There was no telephone

service for close to a month. Only a few days ago, temporary service was installed and the Zuidemas could call their relatives in Michigan.

They have been able to install a hose from a spring which provides running water for their home. After electric service is restored, they expect to return to normal living.

Meanwhile, with no roads, bridges or other accommodations most people take for granted, the Zuidemas don't seem to mind their sequestered lot. There are 25 automobiles in the valley that can't go anywhere. But crews are working 12 hours a day restoring some kind of a road which will connect them once again with the workaday world.

Dr. Zuidema had designed the home far enough up the mountain slope to escape the flood. There were three other houses and a small cottage in the immediate area and one had three feet of water. Most yards were covered by two feet of sand and silt.

It has been more than a month since heavy rainfall over the Rockies sent a 19-foot wall of water roaring through Big Thompson Canyon, one of Colorado's most scenic areas. Cleanup crews have recovered 129 bodies from the debris. Officials believe the death toll may reach 156 and some bodies may never be found, according to United Press International.

Damage to real estate in the canyon was estimated at \$17 million, not including such losses as bridges and roads, cars, home furnishings and personal equipment. Total loss is believed to be more than \$30 million.

Meanwhile, the government is providing good security for persons who have ventured back into the valley. Mrs. Zuidema said. Passes are required for all persons.

The Zuidemas still can remember the night of the flood when they sought refuge in their garage and listened to the car radio. Their neighbor, Eulah Marshall, 77, of Wichita, Kan., was swept away in the flood. "We watched her home go first. The fireplace was still standing, then it was gone, too."

The Zuidemas have two other daughters, Mrs. Ray Waterman of Castle Rock, Colo., and Mrs. Don Bartlette of Great Falls, Mont.

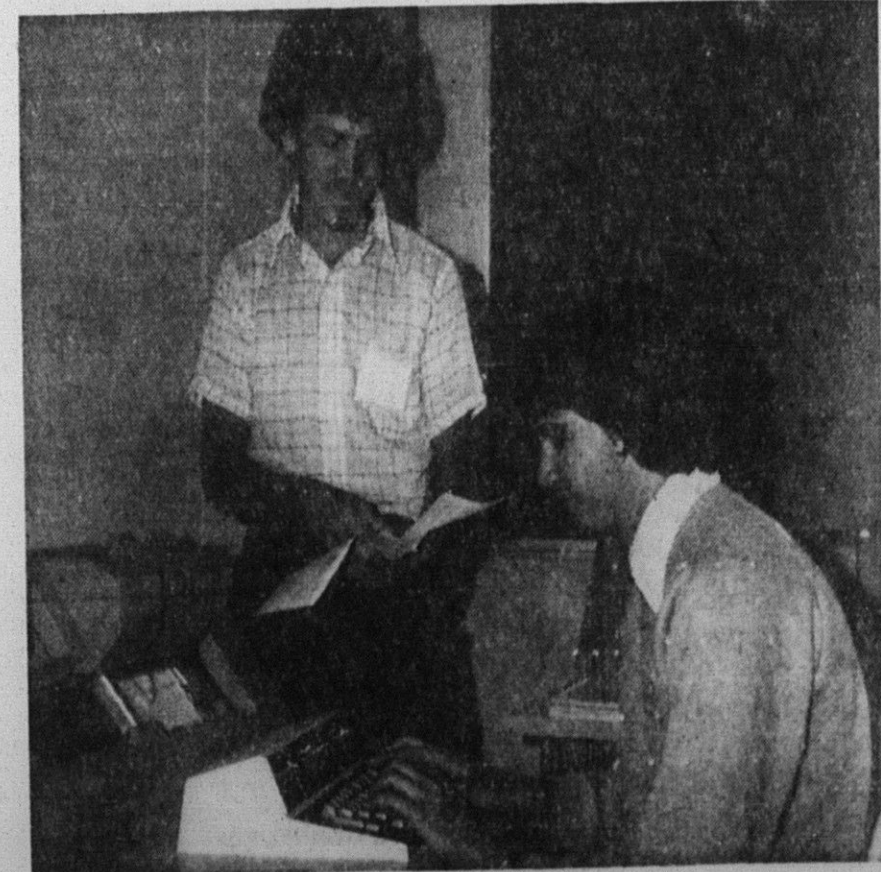

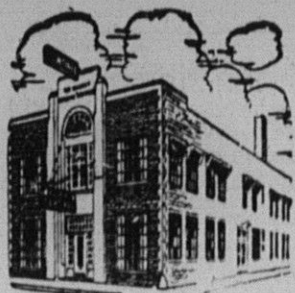

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#### INTERNATIONAL LITERACY DAY

Way back in 1965 UNESCO convened a congress of ministers of education for the purpose of recommending measures to be taken against illiteracy. The recommendations that were made by that congress were unanimously adopted by the General Conference of UNESCO in 1966 and the day of the convention of the congress was established as International Literacy Day. That day was Sept. 8. That's why today in Holland we are also celebrating this special day.

Despite years of effort to eradicate illiteracy, the inability to read and write still is a problem for millions of people throughout the world. In fact, the number of illiterates is growing although percentage-wise the figures are diminishing. In the 25 least developed countries of the world there is about an 80 per cent illiteracy. But developed countries also have the problem. Canada is paying special attention to the growth of illiteracy there and Great Britain is also becoming concerned. A University of Texas study shows that 54 per cent of those over 18 in this country have reading problems.

In this community the Holland Literacy Council tries to do something to ameliorate the problem. The Council has tutors trained in the famed Laubach method who will teach anyone interested in improving his reading skills at no expense whatsoever. All tutors have been trained at their own expense and serve the community without reimbursement. They may be contacted at the Good Samaritan Center, 21 West 16th St. It is not very comforting to know that in our own community there are over 400 people who are unable to help themselves when it comes to reading and writing. The influx of Vietnamese during the past months has constituted a challenge for the Holland Literacy Council which it has met with the organization of classes and a tutorial program.

Today the Good Samaritan Center will hold an open house in commemoration of International Literacy Day. We urge everyone to attend, either to see how they may assist in this important program or else to see how it may benefit them. Illiteracy is the worst kind of enslavement imaginable in today's complex and technical world. Those who can't read or write are easy victims of all sorts of manipulation and misinformation. The illiterates are easily victimized. In our country the ability to read and write is essential to good citizenship. The success of a democracy depends on an intelligent and informed electorate. Without the ability to read, such information is impossible to attain. For this reason every effort to eradicate illiteracy should attract everyone's cooperation. We hope this celebration of Literacy Day will help to that end.

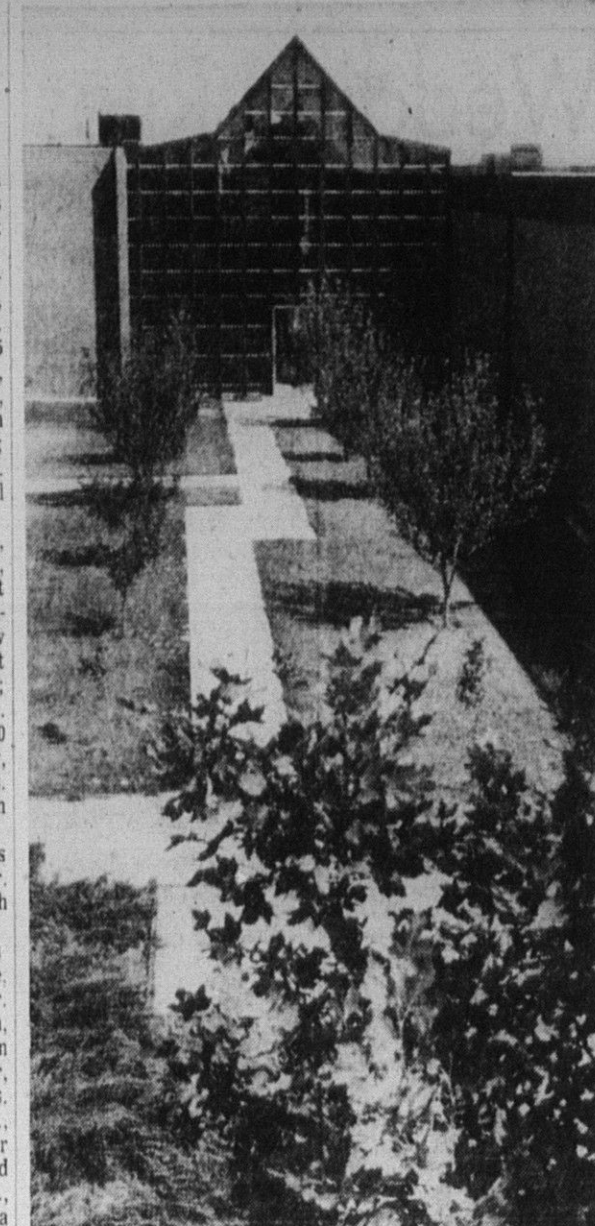

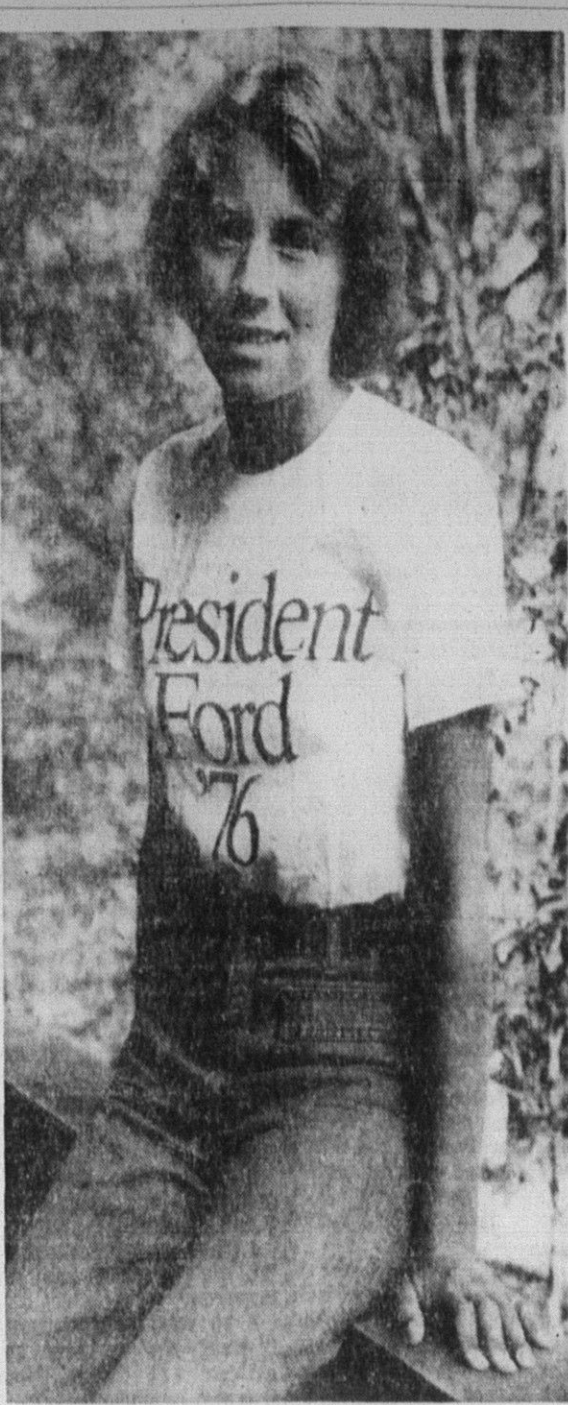

## Betsy Helps Cheer Ford Through in Kansas City

The delegates at the Republican National Convention last month were given most of the credit by the news media for the enthusiastic displays of support for the candidates in and around Kemper Arena in Kansas City.

Busting their campaign buttons with jumping, cheering, sign and flag waving, the smiling faces of delegates from all over the country were seen in newspapers, magazines and on television during the four days of the convention.

Though their support was finally registered in the form of those all-important votes, the delegates were by no means the only candidate rooters who went to Kansas City to work for and support their choice for the Republican presidential nomination.

Both President Ford and Ronald Reagan had invited large groups of supporters to the convention site to perform such tasks as passing out newsheets to keep delegates informed of the latest developments, campaigning, and generally keeping the Kansas City excitement level high.

Rogers Morton, who was chairman of the President Ford Committee, and Carolyn Booth, National Director of the committee, selected over 1,200 young people to participate in a program called "The Presidentials" for young supporters of President Ford at the convention.

Only 500 were expected in Kansas City, but the August spectacle of the American political system in action apparently proved irresistible, for over double that number actually arrived.

Betsy Prince, of 680 Marylane Dr., in Holland, was among those who flew to Kansas City to be close to the heartbeat of presidential hope during some of its most critical Republican moments.

As a freshman at Calvin College last year, Betsy had joined an organization called "Friends of the First Family," and campaigned with other "Friends" in the Indiana and Ohio primaries. Called "scatter blitzes," these campaign efforts exposed the group to national politics, and brought their names to the attention of the President Ford Committee.

Betsy's involvement in this aspect of the campaign eventually led to her participation in "The Presidentials."

Several workshops on campaign strategy and techniques were planned for "The Presidentials" during their stay in Kansas City, as well as speeches by Republican cabinet members, Vice President Rockefeller, and President Ford himself. "The Presidentials" also attended the evening sessions of the convention at least once, and as often as tickets could be obtained.

To be effective, "Presidentials" — power had to be well organized. The 1,200 or so young people were divided into geographic groups of 100, which were further broken down into squads which had 12 to 15 members. A traffic control center was established to keep track of each group and squad, and to disperse them to areas around Kansas City whenever necessary. According to Betsy, "anywhere there needed to be noise, there were always kids."

At one point, the Grand Rapids group was cheering in front of delegates at Ronald Reagan's headquarters. The Alameda Plaza Reagan supporters were outnumbered, and the governor reportedly would not leave his suite until reserve forces arrived. Other than such unplanned encounters, however, there was only minimal contact between the two "camps."

Another of the duties of "The Presidentials" in Kansas City, was to make early morning doorstep deliveries of newsletters to delegates, to keep them current on matters they might have to act on.

Hard as it may be to believe, free time, was plentiful for "The Presidentials," and Betsy says she never ran out of exciting and different ways to spend it. In addition to all the political hoopla going on, there were social gatherings at which noted Republicans and friends of the President himself were often present, as well as new friendships to pursue.

Not only did "The Presidentials" program give young people the opportunity to experience a political convention first hand, Betsy feels that the participants were appreciated for the enthusiasm they brought. Consider a brass tacks political convention dominated by "solid Republicans," and it's not hard to see why the Presidentials were popular around Kansas City.

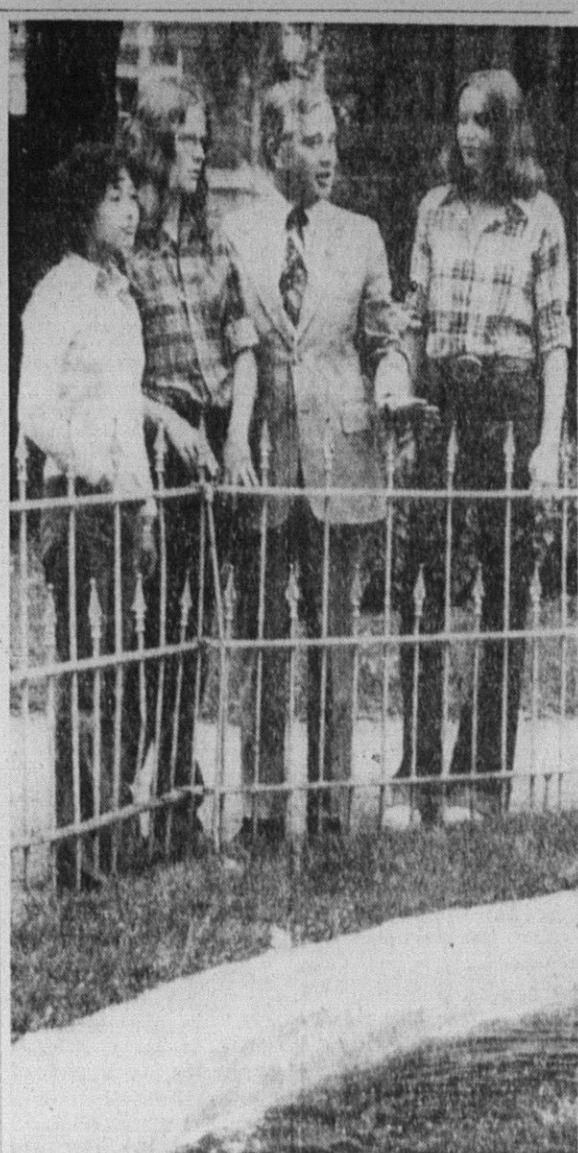

## Dr. Bruce M. Raymond, Civic Leader, Dies Here

Dr. Bruce M. Raymond, 78, of 182 West 11th St., longtime civic leader and educator, died Friday night in a local nursing home after a three months' illness. He had served as member of City Council for two terms around 1940, representing the old sixth ward.

A native of Nebraska, he came to Holland in 1925 and taught history at Hope College for 20 years, serving as head of the department. During the war years in 1943 he and Earnest C. Brooks went to Washington, D.C., to arrange for the Army Special Training Program for flight trainees at Hope College. The program remained in progress until 1944 when all such college programs were abandoned.

Later he took a position as chief of the training staff in Veterans Administration dealing with aid and GI education benefits for eligible veterans.

Always interested in government and politics, Dr. Raymond was a firm believer in bringing young people into active participation. He was well known throughout the state serving on various committees and commissions and had received appointments from Govs. Harry Kelly, Murray D. Van Wagoner, George Romney and William Milliken.

In 1963 he was named area secretary for U.S. Rep. Robert P. Griffin (now senator) and continued in that post for U.S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt. At the same time he operated the Red Cross blood program for Ottawa County until a few years ago.

Shortly after World War II he served as secretary to the Michigan Colleges Foundation when it was founded.

Dr. Raymond served on the Charter Study Commission which led to the present charter in the early 1950s. He was chairman of the Ottawa County Republican committee for two years, member of the Michigan State Central committee for six years and was a member of the Michigan Constitutional Revision Study Commission. He was a delegate from Michigan's 5th district to the Republican National Convention in 1948.

He was a member of Hope Reformed Church and had served on the consistory. He also was a member of the Century Club and Men's Professional Club of Holland.

He was born July 20, 1896, in Utica, Neb., and received bachelor, masters and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Nebraska. His doctoral dissertation was on "Nebraska's Constitu-

tion, An Historical Study."

He taught history in a Tulsa, Okla., high school for two years before coming to Hope College. In addition to his teaching, he served as business manager at the college from 1946 to 1949.

In 1924 he married Hesper Bell at Lincoln, Neb., and they

celebrated their golden wedding anniversary two years ago.

Surviving are the wife and two sons, Roderick of Grandville and Burke of Beaverton, Ore., and seven grandchildren.

It was Dr. Raymond's wish to be cremated. A memorial service will be held later in Hope Church.

## Guatemala Still Scene Of Suffering, Privation

It has been seven long months since that horrible earthquake struck Guatemala, Feb. 4, wreaking death and destruction.

Today, Guatemala City is still the scene of suffering and privation. Considerable work has been done to clear away the wreckage, but much more remains to be done.

And all the people made homeless in their mountain villages have descended on overcrowded Guatemala City.

A Dutch journalist, Jacob Mouissie, made these comments while in Holland Friday collecting material for a series of Bicentennial tv programs of the Dutch Evangelical Broadcasting Co. He had visited Guatemala one week after the earthquake last February, and again last week on a circuit of assignments in Curacao, Guatemala and the United States.

Mouissie said the Red Cross, the United Nations, Church World Service and several governments including the United States and Canada rushed in to aid the stricken nation, but the devastation and human suffering has been so chaotic it may take another 10 years for the small nation to return to normal.

Mouissie explained that Guatemala is about three-quarter the size of Michigan and has some 6,000,000 inhabitants, 1,000,000 of them living in Guatemala City. The tiny nation has little to distinguish itself economically, although growing tourism has been yielding considerable income.

The February earthquake struck Guatemala City and the mountain areas nearby, closing mountain roads and wiping out entire areas. The dead were first estimated at 24,000 but now the toll is reaching 28,000. Some 40,000 displaced people

destroyed in an earthquake in 1973.

The Feb. 4 quake registered 7.2 on the Richter scale. Many aftershocks were felt, some as recently as a few weeks ago. Mouissie has been in Holland previously collecting material for a series of four tv documentaries on what the Dutch did and are doing in America. He has visited New York City, Albany, Holland and Grand Rapids and Pella, Iowa. In Holland, the camera crews photographed woods and water scenes with a view to showing as much as possible what kind of country Dr. A. C. Van Raalte came to in 1847.

Other local scenes dealt with churches, Hope College, historical monuments and the like.
