## Grand Rapids Man Drowns; Find Body

Leonard Jacobusse, 85, Falls From Rowboat In Spring Lake Friday

SPRING LAKE — Leonard Jacobusse, 85, of Grand Rapids, temporarily residing in Ferrysburg, drowned while fishing from a rowboat Friday afternoon near the Yacht Club on Spring Lake, Ottawa County. Sheriff's officers reported.

The aged man, a retired Grand Rapids coal dealer, had been living with a son, Abraham, near Spring Lake and earlier Friday afternoon went fishing in his 15 foot aluminum boat which he anchored 50 yards off shore in 20 feet of water.

Officers reported he did not return at the usual time at 4 p.m. and the son started a search on the lake. He found the unoccupied boat about 500 yards east of the Yacht Club point and immediately called sheriff's department.

County officers, Coast Guardsmen and state troopers started dragging and diving at 4:15 p.m. and Sheriff Bernard Grysen recovered the body at 7:10 p.m. Police reported the man had either suffered a physical fall or accidentally fell from the boat. There were no witnesses.

The son of Mr. Jacobusse reported that the victim was very active for his age and recently had been approved for motor vehicle drivers license.

The body was taken to the Kinkema-Bartels Funeral Home in Grand Haven and was removed to the Hollebeek Funeral Home in Grand Rapids.

Surviving besides the son are two granddaughters, and one great grandchild.

HUDSONVILLE — Funeral services were held Monday for four-year-old Scott Alward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Alward, of 5557 Pleasant St., who was fatally injured Saturday noon when struck by a truck driven by Paul Geerlings, 19, Zeeland. The accident occurred in front of the child's home on Pleasant St. which lies south of M-21.

The child was dead on arrival at St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids. Cause of death was listed as internal injuries. Hudsonville police investigated. The driver was not held.

Surviving are the parents; two sisters, Debra and Lori; the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Alward of Hudsonville, and the maternal grandfather, Harvey Behrens of Grandville.

## Zeeland Campaign Leaders Hold Meet

ZEELAND — Top division leaders in the Zeeland United Fund-Red Cross drive met this noon in Van Raalte's restaurant to make further plans for the \$18,952 campaign in October.

Campaign director Robert S. De Bruyn pointed out that the goal this year is 40 per cent above last year's goal of \$13,500, but it includes two new agencies for the first time — Red Cross and a newly formed family counseling service under the Michigan Children's Aid society. The latter service will provide an additional trained caseworker in the branch office in Holland.

Bruce De Pree, industrial division chairman, reported that additional firms are joining the payroll payment plan, whereby employees may pledge over a period of time.

Hope College's football team has been blanked by Wheaton College in its two previous meetings and Saturday at 7:30 p.m. the Flying Dutchmen will try to reverse the tables in Hope's home opener in Riverview Park.

But Hope's task will be difficult because the Crusaders appear to have another fine team. Morley Fraser, Albion College coach, said this week "Wheaton is probably the best team we have faced in 11 years."

The Britons lost to Wheaton, 14-6 last Saturday in the season's opener for both teams. The Crusaders also had two touchdowns called back because of penalties.

Injuries to veteran backs have depleted the Hope offensive ranks and Coach Russ De Vette said today he doubted if regular half-back Bill Keur and his replacement Jim Bekker would play. Keur has been sidelined with a leg injury and Bekker has a back injury.

Fred Van Tatenhove, who continues to impress, will work at center while the guards are Paul Bast and Jim Van Dam. Jon Norton and John Stam will play the tackles and Joe Kusak and Bill Hultgren are the ends.

Memo Sysma, 6' 5", 210-pound freshman, will play defensive tackle with Ralph Jackson. Max Schipper will also see defensive tackle action.

Van Tatenhove will play middle linebacker flanked by Tom Cousineau and freshman Randy Meulman. Kusak and Capt. Ken Quakelaar are the defensive ends.

Zeeland sophomore Rog Kroodsmma has returned this week and will see action as a linebacker. Out with a leg injury, Kroodsmma missed the first two games.

De Kuiper, Rog Abel and Cal Poppink will be the defensive backfield spots.

## 'Y' Offers Family Type Program

A family type program of adult education, recreation and children's programs to be held one night a week for eight weeks in Holland High School has been arranged by the YMCA program committee of which Vernon Schipper is chairman.

The event will start Thursday, Oct. 10, and will run each Thursday thereafter for the eight-week period from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Classrooms, the fieldhouse, art center and shop space will be made available to the YMCA at a rental fee. The program will be open to non-members as well as members.

## Federal Kills Annexation 86 to 77

Holland City Voters Vote Down Pool, Okay Plan to Annex Area

Two issues — one to annex a portion of Federal district to Holland city and the other an outdoor swimming pool for the city — were both defeated in Tuesday's special election which attracted nearly 4,000 votes in Holland city and about 850 in Holland township.

The annexation issue was defeated in its own area by nine votes, thereby rendering ineffective accompanying votes in the city or township.

The swimming pool issue was defeated 2,255 to 1,716, an expression of the people informing City Council they did not want the city's improvement fund used for this purpose.

Holland city voted overwhelmingly in favor of the annexation issue, 2,959 to 971, but the issue was lost in the half-mile area which originally had petitioned for the merger. The vote in the area proposed for annexation was 77 yes and 86 no.

The remainder of Holland township overwhelmingly voted against annexation, 607 to 80.

Councilman Richard W. Smith, prime mover in putting the swimming pool issue on the ballot, today expressed regret that the measure lost and the fact that thousands of local youngsters will not have a pool to swim in next summer.

He added that Holland must now look to other needs of the city and cited some of them — a fire station for the east side, new fire trucks, improved police facilities, extension of sewer lines and possible aid for the industrial park.

All the city's 14 precincts favored the annexation issue on a better than 3-1 ratio, but only three precincts gave a plurality to the pool issue. These were two precincts in the sixth ward and one in the fifth ward.

Holland township's four precincts voted down annexation by a ratio of about 8-1.

Voting was slow all day, although it picked up considerably in late afternoon in all precincts.

The swimming pool issue had called for an outdoor pool for the city at a cost not to exceed \$125,000 and to be financed from funds ment fund, Prospect Park in the emnt fund, Prospect Park in the vicinity of 24th St. and Columbia Ave. had been recommended as a site, but no site was listed in the issue.

It evened Holland's record at 1-1 in LMCA play this season and

gave the Tigers an 0-2 record, 0-1 in the league. Muskegon Heights has now lost six straight LMCA games over two seasons.

A 34-yard run by Peter McLemore pushed the Dutch into action. Junior Ruiz, running across the field, overtook McLemore.

Prior to the run, which was stopped on the Holland 26, the Dutch defense had been tough but the offense had been stopped by two intercepted passes and two 15-yard penalties after twice moving to the Heights 20.

Holland stopped the Tigers on the Dutch 20 four plays after the run and then put a drive in action. It took 14 plays, with fullback Walt Van Oosterhout and halfback Jim De Neff doing most of the carrying. De Neff pounded through guard for the final 14 yards with 3:53 left in the second period.

Darrel Schuurman's kick was low but he made the extra points after the other three touchdowns.

Holland's second touchdown came on a 10-yard flat pass from quarterback Vern Plagenhoef to end Tom Pelon with four seconds remaining in the first half. It was Holland's four straight completions in five-play drive that started following a Muskegon Heights punt to the Tigers 48.

De Neff scored both of Holland's second half touchdowns. He cracked 13 yards off left guard with 6:41 left to culminate a six-play drive the first time Holland had the ball following a Tiger punt to the Dutch 45. Ruiz gained 28 yards on one play and Van Oosterhout picked up 20 on another.

Holland got the ball again at midfield after the Tigers were forced to punt. It took eight plays this time with De Neff diving off guard for the last nine yards with 2:55 seconds left in the period. A 28-yard pass play from Plagenhoef to Schuurman who lateraled to Ruiz highlighted the drive.

Dan Krueger passed to Frank Mitchell for the Tigers tally with 6:40 left in the game. The ball bounced off two Holland defenders into Mitchell's hands on the Dutch 35. The touchdown play covered 62 yards and Mel Terrell converted.

Holland's defense was at its best as the Dutch held the Tigers to only 13 yards in the first quarter and beside McLemore's run, only four in the second half. The Tigers made one first down in the first half.

The Dutch plugged every hole again in the third quarter and the Tigers gained only 12 yards. The Tigers picked up their first of three fourth quarter first downs against Holland's subs early in the fourth period.

Coach Jim Jebb praised his defensive team for "its real fine job." Tom Shashagay, Don Heeringa, Dan Hill, Paul Lubbers, Paul Wassenaar and Schuurman were the defenders up front while Ruiz and Mike Coney were the corner men while De Neff and Van Oosterhout the defensive backs.

The Tigers couldn't sweep the ends and they found the middle plugged as the alert defenders, quick to determine where the play was going, came in for the stop.

Because of the strong overall performance which saw 254 yards pounded out on the ground and 81 in the air on seven of 14 completions, Jebb and his aide Tom Carey were able to use the entire traveling team in the game.

Regular center Dick Martin sprained an ankle on Holland's final touchdown. The Dutch play next Friday night in Niles in a non-league game.

A series of "one minute reflections" proved particularly interesting and also highlighted a greater understanding of class differences in mission work, particularly the fact that all persons are individuals and cannot be regarded as classes.

Reporting on "inner city" experiences were Mr. and Mrs. George Beukema who worked in an all-Negro parish in Cleveland, Ohio; Jason Chen, spending his first summer in the United States and working with the Church of the Master in New York City; Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Verploeg who worked with Hope Church in Los Angeles, described as an integrated church in which some white persons drive 25 to 30 miles to attend; Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kruthof who worked with Mott Haven Reformed Church in the Harlem section of New York City; and Carl De Jong, who

worked at Lathrop Home in Chicago.

The Rev. Russell Vande Bunte, pastor of Third Church, advised a positive approach in bringing the story back to the churches at home, presenting the need, what is being done to meet the need, and effects of the program in lives for Christ and burdens lifted.

Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. J. H. Whelan and Miss Marie Schwartz, both of Chicago.





## SEPTEMBER AND FALL

September marks the coming of the beautiful changes in color in our great State of Michigan. There are as many color tints listed as there are hours of daylight.

The schools, colleges and universities are now in operation so that this is an appropriate time to mention the birth of William H. McGuffey—a name that has become almost a household word in America and associated with sound education and high morality. This month McGuffey would be 163 years old. The affection and respect with which he still is remembered stems from a series of school readers which he edited between 1836 and 1857. Millions of people remember reading McGuffey readers and the records indicate that there were 22 million copies sold before the replacement by other textbooks.

We live in a changing world. Many people become alarmed about the many problems with the young and the old. Many think that there is some deficiency in our training today both in and out of school. We should take a little time and many of us might find that the deficiencies may be in part due to the kind of taste and moral standards that were developed in former students by the McGuffey reader.

Certainly the emphasis of today's reading books has changed. The great objective is to develop skill in the mechanical process of reading so that today's citizen will not be overwhelmed by the avalanche of reading material that engulfs him. Therefore, today's pupils are provided with carefully graded exercises scientifically calculated to teach vocabulary and sentence patterns in the most efficient and effective way.

Today we have achieved a great breakthrough in the methods of teaching reading techniques. Some experts boast that they can teach children to read at the rate of over 10,000 words a minute. They are even beginning to doubt the book as an efficient way of presenting printed matter.

They fear that the necessity of turning pages will slow down the rapid modern reader. If this is so, there is no doubt a new format, perhaps an electronic scroll, that can be devised. But it still remains pretty clear that what people read is more important than how fast they read it. There is a good deal to be said for the old-fashioned approach of the old McGuffey reader.

Take a little of your spare time and try and keep up with the loads of books people must read today as they continue to attend school.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, September 29  
Heirs of The Promise  
Genesis 11:1-10  
By C. P. Dame

This is the last lesson of the third quarter. It tells us of a number of men who had faith and showed it by their deeds. The Church today needs members who have a great faith in God.

I. Faith is important. The Bible says much about faith because it is so valuable. And in addition it is not possible to please God without faith.

We do not know who wrote the Epistle to the Hebrews but we do know that it was the purpose of the writer to bolster the faith of Jewish Christians who were considering going back to Judaism.

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." The "things hoped for" are things we do not yet have but we are sure to get them; and "things not seen" are the invisible things we expect to see.

Hebrews 11 contains the names of a number of Old Testament characters who had a strong faith. They lived in different times but they all had one treasure—faith. It was their faith that gave them understanding of the worlds which they believed God had made. This faith led them to worship God and to serve Him.

Many in these times do not have this faith and their lives reveal it.

II. Faith expresses itself in action. Let us look at the men mentioned in the text, bearing in mind that faith reveals itself in obedience to God and a reliance upon His promises.

The story of Abel is first. "By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain" who had no faith.

Enoch is mentioned next. The Bible says that he "walked with God." We all remember him because he did not die—God took him. Enoch pleased God—note the words—"before his translation he had this testimony, that he pleased God."

In order to please God it is necessary to believe that He is, that He is alive and active, and that He is "a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him."

Noah was warned of God about the coming of the flood. He built an ark and preached 120 years without making any converts. It was by his faith that he "condemned the world," that is "put the whole world in the wrong" as a nice suit condemns a shabby one.

Abraham obeyed God's call to leave his own country and kin and go to a place God led him—"he went out, not knowing whither he went." Abraham, who lived in a tent in the land of promise, "looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God."

What are we looking for?

## Holland Exchange Club Hears Dr. Hollenbach

Big business has done a lot of research on efficiency problems which might be helpful to colleges and other institutions of higher education. Dr. John Hollenbach of Hope College told the Holland Exchange Club at their meeting Monday.

New faculty members of the several educational institutions in Holland were special guests at the meeting. The club represents Western Theological Seminary, Hope College, Holland High, West Ottawa and Holland Christian.

Hollenbach, who spoke on "The Impact of Business on Educational Institutions," says colleges should study businesses to see where greater efficiency could be obtained.

Greater use of the physical plant of the college, of space and equipment, he says, might be one way to increase efficiency. Courses that duplicate work could be cut from the curriculum. 

## Ski Resort Plans to Open December 1

"Construction work on the Carousal Mountain ski resort is progressing on schedule," says Norman Archer, co-sponsor of the resort, "and we should be open for skiing Dec. 1."

Major construction work, including the building of a dining and comfort lodge, clearing the slopes and installing towing equipment, should be completed by Oct. 30, Archer says, and November will be used for the "mopping up and grooming" operations prior to the resort's opening. Archer indicated a kitchen for the lodge would be installed during this phase of construction.

Carousel Mountain won't have to wait for the first snow after Dec. 1 to open for skiing either, Archer says. The ski resort will have a snow machine containing 2½ miles of four inch piping.

The million dollar planned year-round resort and recreation area is located west of the Castle Park Road and south of 147th Ave. in Laketown township in Allegan County. Archer and Donald Martin, two Detroit area businessmen are co-developers of the project.

Planned for the December opening are 10 to 12 ski runs ranging in length from 1,500 to 2,700 feet, Archer says. "The runs will accommodate 1,500 to 2,000 skiers without being overcrowded."

A variety of slopes for all skiers, beginning, intermediate and advanced will be available, Archer says, and the resort will offer ski instruction. Directing the ski school will be Fred Blissig from Switzerland.

One chair lift, two T-bar lifts and five double tow ropes will be on the runs, Archer notes, and ski rentals will be available.

The main lodge consists of three sections, a skiers cafeteria on the south wing, a main dining room for skiers and visitors on the north and a two-story lobby joining them. The main floor of the lobby will have a floor space of 2,500 feet.

The "maitre-d" of the main dining room is Jim Webster, former manager of the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club.

A decorative, carousel horse will stand in front of the lodge.

"We're still looking for a horse," Archer said, noting he had received several offers of merry-go-round ponies, but had not purchased one.

A carousel restaurant, 30 feet in diameter will be built on top of the mountain next spring, Archer continued. The all-glass restaurant will revolve similar to the one on top of the Space Needle at the 1962 World's Fair.

Also planned for next spring are a lighted, par-three golf course, a heated, outdoor swimming pool and tennis courts. Weather permitting, Archer says, this work should be completed by Tulip Time.

He estimated it would take six weeks to lay the golf course, but noted they could begin cutting trees by the end of March.

Plans also call for the construction of 25 apartments which should begin in about 30 days, Archer said.

Plans for a winter carnival in February are coming along fine, Archer says. Pro skiing races and races for amateurs of all classes will be held as well as an ice skating show and skijoring. The latter involves being towed on skis behind a horse.

Dog races and ice-bait racing on Lake Macatawa are also planned for the Winter Carnival.

## YMCA Plans Adult Evening Classes in High School

The Board of Education Monday afternoon unanimously approved a recommendation of the schools committee to allow the YMCA to use certain classrooms in the east and west units of the high school, the fieldhouse, the art center and shop for recreation and adult education purposes one night a week at a rental rate of \$50 per night.

Hours of use will be limited to 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. The term will run eight weeks and the YMCA will be responsible for breakage or damage to facilities in excess of normal wear.

The board recognized that the YMCA would be providing its own administrative and leadership personnel, exercising a type of responsibility not exacted in ordinary rentals. For this reason, the rates were set lower.

Richard Hofferbert, YMCA director, said it would take about a month to set up plans for an adult evening school. He expected fees would be \$8 per family and \$1 for Y families with the YMCA furnishing the other \$7.

Hofferbert said fees charged families for adult classes would pay only the rental and adult school promotion. The Y would provide the instructors.

A communication from the Maplewood Mothers Club asking some policy on lunch hour supervision was discussed at length and finally referred to a committee to meet with club representatives and work toward a solution. The communication pointed out that such supervision is provided to the junior high school and because of highway and traffic problems felt Maplewood School should receive consideration.

It was pointed out that after outlying school districts annexed to Holland school districts, all teachers were treated alike and no teachers in elementary schools were expected to give noon-hour supervision. Lakeview School, and Van Raalte School solved this by paying certain mothers \$1.50 a day to supervise the children in the lunch program. Representatives of these schools will be asked to meet with the committee too.

Supt. Walter W. Scott explained certain changes made in the teaching staff to equalize teaching loads. He said one teacher was added at Van Raalte and another transferred to Maplewood to relieve Principal Harold Ortmann now teaching half-days. He said a full-time physical therapist has not been hired but that Simon Dykstra, local licensed therapist, is working part-time with orthopedic children at Thomas Jefferson School. He said some changes currently are being worked out on class loads.

He said two instrumental music instructors were attempting to do the work previously covered by four, and that physical education has been taught in the elementary grades. He said some consideration must be given to libraries, vocal music and art in the elementary schools, and warmly seconded a suggestion that personnel and finance committees meet to discuss possibilities.

A question from Arthur Seddon on whether the addition of outlying districts to the core city school district changes the character of the entire district, and whether it might not be possible for different duties for teachers in outlying schools such as noon-hour supervision brought no ready solution.

Mrs. Dorothy Wolbert, president of the Holland MEA district, said one of the first questions would be whether there would be any extra compensation for such duties, or whether outlying teachers would be treated as country-cousins with assignments other than given those teachers in the core city.

Seddon also reported on attending a meeting for educators in Lansing and pointed to a report by State Supt. Lynn Bartlett that 25 per cent of a large sampling of school districts were operating at a deficit the past year and more than 20 per cent operating with curtailed programs. The report added that elections for operating millage were unsuccessful in many places, the failures almost doubling from two years ago. Seddon estimated that half of all districts in Michigan had voted special operating millage.

In answer to Seddon's question on why the wrestling program had been curtailed in the high school, Supt. Scott said the staff currently does not have anybody trained in wrestling. He expressed regret that gymnastics also had suffered a similar setback, due to austerity measures.

Expressing the belief that all elections are important, Scott called attention to today's special election urging a get-out-the-vote effort for both issues — annexation and swimming pool. He reiterated the board's policy on accepting students from Federal district upon payment of tuition.

He also called attention to the forthcoming visit from Gov. George Romney to Holland Wednesday, Oct. 2, to explain his tax reform program. The meeting is scheduled at 2:30 p.m. in the auditorium of Holland High School.

Scott also called attention to the great accomplishments of the Athletic Boosters, particularly in the new blazers for the players and results in increased season ticket sales, the highest in many years.

The board approved a building and grounds committee recommendation to purchase a used bus for orthopedic students from the Penfield school district for \$3,826 less accumulated interest. This bus has 20,000 and was considered a "good buy" by the committee. A new bus would cost \$5,500.
