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BPW Bond Ordinances Approved

City Accepts Offer Of Church to Purchase Street Right of Way

City Council Wednesday passed two ordinances providing for financing a new addition to the light plant as drawn up for the Board of Public Works. Both ordinances carried 7 to 1, with Councilman Henry Steffens dissenting.

One ordinance provided for transferring several BPW funds into an improvement fund which eventually will go into the construction fund. These funds totaled \$3,575,000 representing mostly the BPW share of electrical profits and a share of its depreciation fund.

The other ordinance provided for raising \$2,000,000 in revenue bonds in two issues, the first of \$1,500,000 and the second of \$500,000. The ordinance was set up in two issues in the hope that it might not be necessary to raise the \$500,000.

BPW Supt. Guy E. Bell explained that the expansion program is set up on estimates of \$5,575,000 for the total project. He expressed the hope that bids might come under this figure, plus the possibility that additional funds might be available later to pay off the obligation. The program as proposed calls for all bonds to be paid off in seven or eight years, a relatively short time for revenue bonds.

The bond ordinance, a lengthy document, was summarized to save time, and the entire meeting lasted 55 minutes. Mayor Pro Tem Bertal Slaght presided in the absence of Mayor Nelson Bosman who is a patient in Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids.

In other business, Council unanimously voted to accept an offer of Providence Christian Reformed Church to deed to the city a 66-foot roadway for extending Ottawa Ave. in the area of 23rd to 35th Sts. for \$5,600.

The church agrees not to contest reasonable special assessments which may be levied on property abutting either side of the church so long as the property remains in its possession, and the church also agreed to grant an immediate easement for installing a water main and power line on the premises. The latter are needed by the new Christian High School which is under construction at 40th St. and Ottawa Ave.

City Attorney Gordon Cunningham said according to state law, the congregation must vote on the sale of property. The easement can be accomplished by consistory action, and Supt. Bell of the Board of Public Works said work would start Monday on installing a water line. Installation on a power line will start a week or so later. Sewer services will not be needed until next summer, it was said.

In separate action later, Council instructed the city attorney to draft a resolution to proceed with condemnation in the case of the George Green property also along the right of way.

A proposed resolution drawn up by the Michigan State Highway Department calling for blocking Washington Ave. at the five corners at 32nd St. was referred to the Traffic and Safety Commission for study and report.

A communication from J. L. Hudson Co. of Detroit informing Council that a float depicting Holland will be shown in its annual Thanksgiving Day parade and requesting a contingent of 50 to 60 local residents to march in authentic Dutch costumes was referred to the Tulip Time board.

The letter said that the float would be in two parts connected by an arched bridge. There will be a large windmill, tulip gardens and Dutch skaters. The Holland High School band will march wearing wooden shoes.

A BPW report together with a letter from Dorcas Realty Co. in connection with the assessment for sewer service for Modern Partitions, Inc., at 545 East 32nd St. was accepted as information. The letter requested that the sewer line be extended an additional 290 feet to serve the entire property. The BPW report pointed out that the sewer would be extended if and when required at no additional cost to the property owner.

Council approved a change order in hospital addition construction substituting a different make curtain wall, window wall and entrances, resulting in a saving of \$3,320.

Council also acknowledged with thanks a gift of drapery material valued at \$11.13 from the Housekeeping Guild.

A city auditor report included a list of delinquent utility bills totaling approximately \$3,500 remaining unpaid as of July 31, 1966. Council approved placing unpaid bills on the fall tax

Lake Pollution Studied by City

Holland's Department of Environmental Health has started a new program to survey and combat pollution in Lake Macatawa.

Roger Stroh and Albert Reinink of the department said the program is designed to give a continuing survey of the problem.

Several questions they are seeking to answer are:

Is the pollution increasing, decreasing or remaining about the same?

Where is the pollution coming from?

What areas of the lake are the most polluted?

More than 250 water samples have been taken and analyzed since the new program started in May. One general finding, Stroh said, is that bacteria counts are higher in the spring and late summer and lower in mid-summer.

This is probably due in part to less rainfall in mid-summer, Stroh said. With less rain there is less runoff of soil and fertilizer in the Black River watershed. Thus, the bacteria count goes down, he said.

Stroh emphasized there is no single cause of the lake's pollution. The lake is polluted from several sources, and the new program is seeking to check on them.

Two principal pollutants, he said, are the runoff from land in the streams and river that feed the lake and improperly treated sewage.

Stroh and Reinink plan to continue the survey until October this year. In future years the department will monitor the lake from April to October.

To make the survey the two men set up 35 check points ranging from Lake Michigan to the Black River east of 120th Ave. They used navigational charts of the lake and personal observations to set up the

check points near where pollution sources dumped into the lake.

Each month a water sample is taken at the check points, and the samples are analyzed at the Michigan Department of Health laboratory in Grand Rapids.

Records of the bacteria counts at each check point are kept, and they can note the trends in pollution in the various areas of the lake, and in the lake as a whole.

If the bacteria count runs much higher at one check point, they can take extra water samples, and "track" the source of the pollution.

As a result of past surveys in Lake Macatawa many pollution sources have been eliminated, Stroh said.

In the past inadequate manpower in the Department of Environmental Health and the Michigan Water Resources Commission have prevented a thorough study of the pollution problem, Stroh said. Because of the increasing role of the state in milk inspection, the local department now has time to work on this program, he added.

Council Commends Care Center

Commendation for the work at the Child Care Center in Hope Church was given by City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

Ralph E. Richman, chairman of the interim executive committee of the Community Action Program Committee, Inc., of Ottawa county, explained that it is a requirement that any Office of Economic Opportunity program must be made known to the governing body of the municipality before grants are made, and he took this opportunity to appear before Council to explain the work of the Day Care Center which is requesting OEO aid.

Dale Van Lente, a member of the county committee, explained that the center has a \$39,000 budget for the coming year, of which some \$4,000 is contributed in rent and the like. The sum of \$35,000 is being requested through the Office of Economic Opportunity to continue the work which was started under the Michigan Migrant Opportunity Agency.

Mrs. James F. Brooks explained the operations of the Day Care Center which has been in operation since Feb. 14, 1966, serving pre-school children 2½ to 5 years old, recommended through the county social service agencies and the health department. She said most of the children have only one parent in the household, and that there are 200 such families in the local area. The center has cared for 30 children at a time, serving in all 48 since the program began.

Richman called attention to a public meeting in Grand Haven Thursday, Sept. 29, in which Kent County programs will be explained.


Council Approves Street Project

Millage Vote Set Nov. 8

School Board Seeking 5½ Mills for 1 Year; Pool Bids Opened

The Board of Education Thursday night adopted a resolution calling for a school millage election to be combined with the Nov. 8 general election.

The measure calls for 5½ mills for one year, replacing the 3 mill levy voted in 1964 which expires this year.

Based on the present state equalized valuation of the Holland school district of \$88,928,846, 5½ mills would bring \$489,108 for one year.

The action was taken in connection with the opening of bids for the community swimming pool. Holland voters approved a \$500,000 bond issue last Dec. 7 in connection with a \$1 million bond issue to improve elementary schools.

Apparent low bidders in the various divisions follow: Dell Construction Co. of Holland, general contract, \$336,880; Reimink Plumbing and Heating of Holland, mechanical contract, \$154,774; De Pree Electric of Holland, electrical contract, \$36,598; West Michigan Sound Co. of Muskegon, sound work, \$2,785.

These low bids, taken from 10 bids, total \$531,037, and the board referred them to architects Kammeraad and Stroop for study and report expected in a week or so.

Since the bids are in excess of the bond levy, it is expected the architects will work on alternatives and negotiate with the contractors, a practice which has become increasingly more common the past year.

In linking the school millage vote with the general election, the board is attempting to save dollars wherever possible.

James O. Lamb, board president, said the board has gone on record as being opposed to deficit spending. A careful study into school needs for the 1967-68 year was made in connection with budget study for the current year.

In this decision, the board follows policies of former boards of operating the school system within its income.

Conservation Services Aid Citizens in Water Problems

Is there a need for soil and water conservation in our cities and towns? Most people in Grand Haven, Spring Lake, Ferrysburg, Zeeland, Holland, Coopersville, and Hudsonville would reply a positive no. Most would say that it would be a waste of the tax payers' money. But this is not really true. All the cities in Ottawa County have some kind of soil and water problem that is causing them trouble. Why?

The basic reason is that everything we do is eventually related to the soil. Whether we build a house or church, a foundation is needed. Is the soil stable? Is there a high water table where the building is to be erected? If we are outside the city, will the septic tank work? This depends upon the texture of the soil? What about all of the sand that blows up from the beach and covers the nice lawns along Lake Michigan? The answers are to stabilize the sand with a beach grass planting. Quite quickly we can see that soil and water problems and their needed correction do exist within the city limits and urban areas in Ottawa County.

The West Ottawa Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service in Grand Haven between July 1, 1965 and June 30, 1966 helped more than 40 individuals or groups of people with soil and water problems and their solutions. A few examples of the type of service rendered are mentioned.

The Planning and Zoning Boards of Ferrysburg, Georgetown, and the Tri-Cities Industrial Committee have soil interpretation which will help them with the orderly development of respective areas. These reports keyed to soil maps rate the soils for various land uses.

Mary White School in Grand Haven under the direction of Frank Such and the teachers scheduled an outing where the children planted beach grass on the open sand dune and wildlife shrubs behind the school. Everyone enjoyed the outing in addition to stabilizing the active dune. Children in the school had a first hand experience in soil conservation.

Several people have asked the SCS to make soil suitability determinations before houses and churches are to be built. A high water table in an area can be a real problem when basements are planned. Often moving the house a few feet away to higher ground can help eliminate the problem. Drainage tile can be installed around the basement if an adequate outlet exists.

The village of Coopersville has requested assistance in the possibility of a parks and recreational development focused around a shallow water impoundment on Deer Creek. The Coopersville School has a plan on the school property where the Future Farmers of America Chapter can carry on its conservation activities. This plan





Tessiatore's Kicks Decide Game Here

Kicking specialist Tom Tessiatore soiled Hope College's 1966 season opener in Riverview Park Saturday night by booting a pair of field goals to give Augustana (Ill.) College a 6-0 non-conference football victory in the first athletic meeting of the two schools.

Tessiatore connected on a 25-yarder with three minutes, 47 second remaining in the first half to give the Vikings a 3-0 halftime advantage and then wrapped up the scoring with a 32-yard effort with 25 seconds remaining in the third period.

The Flying Dutchmen of coach Russ DeVette dominated final game statistics in nearly every category — except scoring. Hope held a whopping 16 to seven edge in first downs.

Sophomore quarterback Gary Frens, senior fullback Charlie Langeland, junior half back Keith Abel and a 15-yard roughing the kicker penalty led a Hope drive to the Augustana one-yard line in the first quarter.

However, after controlling the ball for 10 minutes on the drive, the Flying Dutchmen failed to score.

Langeland took a screen pass from Frens and rambled 22 yards to give Hope a first down on the one. Frens and center Ken Carpenter then failed to get together on two straight passes from center and Hope lost the ball on the second miscue after Frens fell on the first for no gain.

Following an exchange of punts, Viking punter Jim Ogan kicked only to the Hope 41. Hope, however, found itself faced with a third and 24 situation on their own 27 after slot back Walt Reed picked up a first down on a double reverse. Frens lost 16 yards attempting to pass and Hope was penalized 15 yards, nullifying Frens' 17-yard roll out run into Augustana territory.

Frens was trapped for a nine-yard loss and fumbled on the third and 24 play, setting up Tessiatore's first field goal.

Augustana halfback Ira Weisberg gained eight yards to the Hope 10 and six to the four on the next play. Langeland then "red dogged" from his line-backer spot to drive the Vikings back to the 10, but, two plays later, Tessiatore connected from the 15 for a 25-yard field goal. Abel then returned the ensuing kick off 31 yards to Hope's 49 and the Flying Dutchmen moved to the Augustana 22 before losing the ball on downs with 32 seconds left in the half.

The second half proved to be much the same with Hope losing the ball on downs twice inside the Augustana 35. Nearly 15 minutes after Tessiatore's second field goal, Hope took over possession on their own 47 and moved to the Viking 32 with 20 seconds remaining in the game.

Augustana defensive halfback Charles Bashaar then picked off his second Frens pass at his own seven and the Vikings easily ran out the clock for the 6-0 win.

Hope's defense sparked throughout the game, giving up 131 yards rushing and none passing as Augustana quarterback Tom O'Rourke failed to hit on any of his four passes.

Hope, on the other hand, righted for 108 yards and Frens connected on 10 of 24 passes for 94 yards — a total of 201 yards. Langeland led Hope's rushing with 58 yards in 12 carries.

Spearheaded by senior tackles Carl Van Wyk and John Huisman, along with Langeland, Hope's defense repeatedly stopped Augustana in key situations, forcing Ogan, who averaged nearly 40-yards per kick, to punt seven times.

Hope continues its non-conference schedule at Wheaton (Ill.) College Saturday before moving into MIAA action at home against Adrian Oct. 1.





Dutch Record Opening Tilt Win at Home

Holland High piled up an awesome 190 yards rushing Friday night in downing Valley Coast Conference rival Muskegon Heights, 26-13 in the opening game for both teams in Riverview Park.

The hard-hitting Dutch of coach Dave Kempker weren't headed after rebounding from an early 6-0 deficit with three first-half touchdowns.

Holland simply outthrew the Tigers. Kempker and line coach Ray Backus were liberal in their praise for the Dutch. They commended the offensive line for crisp blocking, the defense for excellent pursuit and the offensive backs for driving hard through the holes created by the line.

Senior halfback Lenny Fowler and junior halfback Phil Schaap combined for 122 yards on the ground — each had 61 yards in 11 carries — and Fowler accounted for two of the first-half touchdowns.

It looked like a wide-open contest after the Heights, coached by Del Fierme, moved in on its first touchdown on a 25-yard Jerry McCarty to Glenn Aubrey pass with six minutes, 37 seconds remaining in the opening period.

But the Dutch rebounded with a tally of their own less than four minutes later. Schaap returned the Heights kickoff to his own 44-yard line and seven plays later — aided by a pair of face mask violations against the Tigers — Holland moved in to score.

Senior quarterback Chip Millard flipped a screen pass to 190-pound halfback Randy Rogers who ran 14 yards into the end zone at 2:54 in the first quarter. Rogers kick for the extra point failed.

A poor Heights punt gave Holland the ball on the 50-yard line early in the second period and Millard wasted no time in moving to the Heights 20-yard line with a 30-yard pass to Randy Veenhoven.

Fowler then went through the middle for five yards to the 15, and fullback Dave Dick followed with nine-yard jaunt through right guard. Rogers moved the ball to the four and Fowler went from his right halfback position through left tackle four yards for the score to put Holland ahead 12-6 with 9:09 left in the half. Rogers kick was good, making the score 13-6.

The Dutch weren't through yet. They scored less than six minutes later when Fowler went through right guard and moved to the right sideline for a 39-yard scoring run. Rogers kick was wide and Holland led 19-6 with 3:26 remaining.

The Heights mustered something of a rally late in the half with McCarty and halfback Johnny Harris carrying to mid-field before Rogers picked off a Greg Garrans pass at his own 34 shortly before the end of the half.

Holland's stellar defense held the Tigers to a minus one yard in total offense in the third period and the Dutch coasted on to the win.

Late in the third period defensive end Steve Wassenaar blocked John Banks' punt in the Heights end zone and fell on the ball for a touchdown. Rogers converted to round out the Dutch scoring for the evening.

Muskegon Heights scored in the game's closing seconds when sophomore quarterback Bart Bartels snuck over from the three and threw to Jim Heidelberg for the extra point.

Holland limited the Heights to 80 yards in total offense through the first three periods before McCarty broke loose for 45 yards in six carries in the fourth stanza to lead the Tigers to their final tally.

The Holland defensive unit, praised by Backus, includes linebackers Bill Wich and Rogers, cornerbacks Dick and Mark Bonnette, halfbacks Veenhoven and Bob LaBarge and linemen Bob Venhuizen, Ken Essenburg, Gary Swierenga, Dave Bauman and Wassenaar.

The win was the first for Holland over the Heights since 1963 and puts the Dutch in excellent position to challenge

Grand Haven for the VCC title.
