The accident was not caused by Communist fire.

Nieboer had been in the service two years, four months and 29 days, a Navy spokesman said.

He completed naval training at Great Lakes, Ill., and had attended Holland High.

The ship was operating in the South China Sea about 68 miles east-southeast of Saigon. The vessel was steaming towards the Sulic Bay navy base in the Philippines and was expected to arrive there Sunday, the Navy said.

Nieboer's body will be returned to Holland.

United Fund To Request \$195,693

Sept. 28 to Oct. 10
Campaign Set; Supports
Nine Local Agencies

The Greater Holland United Fund's 1970 campaign goal is \$195,693, up 12 per cent from last year, it was announced Friday by campaign co-chairmen Roger MacLeod and James J. Jurries.

Dates for the campaign are Sept. 28 through Oct. 10.

The funds are used to support the work of 9 local agencies and 36 agencies of the Michigan United Fund.

Last year the request was for \$175,000.

In announcing the 1970 fund request, MacLeod said the increase was necessary to meet the human needs of a growing Holland area.

"The number of persons served by the United Fund agencies has increased," he said, "and the agencies have enlarged their services and areas of concern."

MacLeod said requests for \$218,475 had been made by the agencies supported by the United Fund and that review panels of the United Fund board studied the requests and arrived at "validated needs" totaling \$195,693.

"The United Fund was organized to bring a community's needs together in order to raise money at a minimum of cost and without duplication of effort," MacLeod added.

The validated needs have been approved by the United Fund board and accepted by business and industrial leaders in Holland, he said.

The needs include:
Boy Scouts, \$18,000; Camp Fire Girls, \$11,600; Family Service and Childrens Aid Society, \$21,000; Holland-Zeeland Family YMCA, \$11,000; Kandu Industries, \$12,500; Red Cross, \$33,000; Salvation Army, \$23,550.

Community Mental Health, \$6,000; Higher Horizons, \$12,500 and Michigan United Fund, \$21,793.

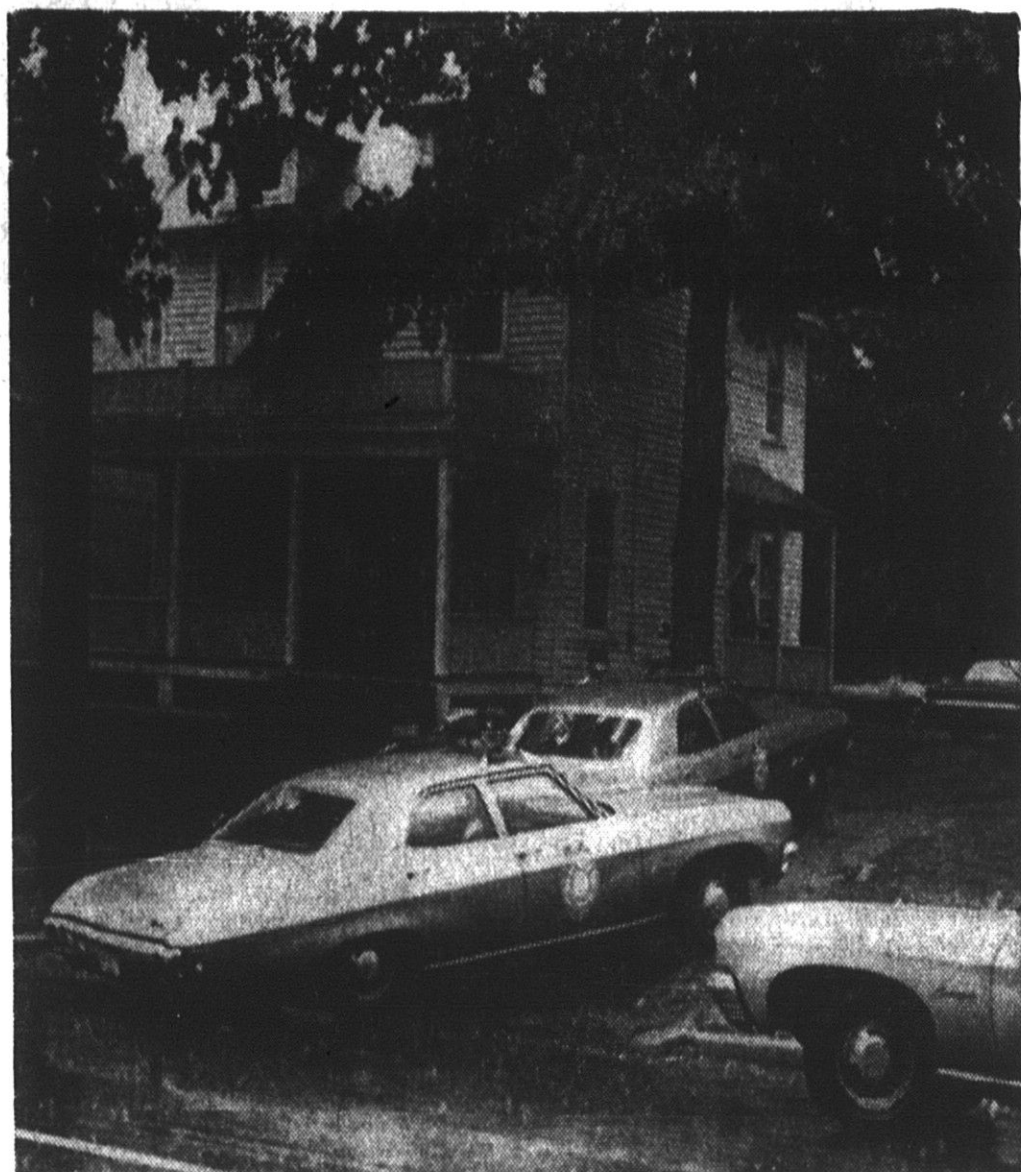

Young Bride Found Slain In Kitchen

Shelley Speet Mills
Repeatedly Stabbed;
No Suspects Held

GRAND RAPIDS — Police searched for more clues today in the slaying of an attractive former Holland girl married 2½ weeks whose partially clad body was found in the kitchen of her three-room ground floor apartment on the city's north-south side Tuesday.

Police said Mrs. William Mills, 19, the former Shelley Gay Speet and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Speet, 740 Columbia Ave., Holland, had been stabbed more than 20 times about the neck and throat.

A blood soaked sleeveless shell was found rolled above her neck. Police said a preliminary autopsy report showed she had not been sexually assaulted.

Police said Mrs. Mills had been slain about 8:30 a.m. and that there were no visible signs of a forced entry into the apartment. Officers said little signs of a struggle were found in the kitchen where the slaying was believed to have taken place. A murder weapon, believed a knife, was not recovered.

Police said the body was found by Mrs. Mills' mother who had stopped by shortly after noon to pick up her daughter and visit a grandmother. Officers said Mrs. Speet had stopped in front of the two-story wood frame house at 314 College Ave., N. E., and blew the car horn. When her daughter did not appear, Mrs. Speet went into the apartment where she found the body on the kitchen floor.

Mrs. Mills' husband, William, about 25, was summoned from Lowell High School where he is a music instructor.

The couple was married Aug. 29 at Third Reformed Church in Holland.

Police said nothing, including several expensive wedding gifts, appeared missing from the apartment.

Police had no suspects in the slaying.

Mrs. Mills was a 1969 graduate of Holland High School where she was an Athletic Sister, a Horizon Girl and a member of the Dutch Dance for three years.

She attended Culver Summer School for Girls, Ferris State College and Hope College where she was studying elementary education.

She had been a member of the Water Thrill Show in Grand Haven the past two summers and was a member of Third Reformed Church, Holland, where she was a former member of the RCYF and the Junior Choir.

Survivors include the husband, her parents, two brothers, Kirt and Tom of Holland; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Barton of Holland; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Albert Speet of Holland, and one nephew, Kirt Speet Jr., also of Holland.

Services are planned Friday at 2 p.m. at Third Reformed Church with the Rev. Henry Voogd and the Rev. Mark Walvoord officiating.

Relatives are asked to meet in the Fellowship Room at 1:45 p.m.

Ray, 57, who died April 12 after serving as circuit judge more than two years. Behind the judge is his son, Wendell A. Miles, who was appointed Ray's successor in the 20th judicial circuit.

Pictures of Late Judge Hung in Allegan Court

ALLEGAN — When cancer claimed the life of Circuit Judge Chester A. Ray last April 12, funeral services were conducted in accordance with his expressed desire that they be simple and without eulogies.

The eulogies came Tuesday afternoon when — in a ceremony that was intended to be brief and simple — the late judge's official portrait was hung in a place of honor on the courtroom wall.

Fifty seven at the time of his death, Ray had served as associate judge for the Allegan-Ottawa Circuit for more than three years but the memorial ceremony attracted representatives of the judiciary and the bar from throughout Michigan.

The Hon. John R. Dethmers, Justice of the Supreme Court of Michigan; Hon. Robert Burns, Michigan Court of Appeals; Austin Doyle, Deputy State Court Administrator; Archie McDonald, Hastings, recently retired as circuit judge for Barry and Eaton counties; Marjorie Luna, district judge for the city of Kalamazoo;

Dwight M. Cheever, Allegan county judge of probate; Stuart Hoffius and John Vander Wal, Kent county circuit Judges; and Frederick T. Miles, Ottawa county judge of probate, all were, on hand for the ceremony.

Raymond L. Smith, senior judge of the 20th Circuit, and Wendell A. Miles, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Judge Ray, shared the bench with Frederick T. Miles, Sr., of Holland, who served as the circuit's only judge from 1930 to 1947, during the ceremony.

The entire membership of the Allegan County Bar and a large contingent of Ottawa county attorneys were also present.

Allegan District Court Judge Elizabeth Ramsey, as president of the Allegan County Bar Association, served as mistress of ceremonies.

The official eulogy was delivered by Attorney Leo W. Hoffman, Allegan, who said that Judge Ray "knew how to live -- and how to die" recalling that he heard cases up to a few days

before his death and, in his final week, made arrangements to bequeath his body to the University of Michigan medical school.

"If we could all apply his standards to our place in life," Hoffman said, "the world would be a far better place."

Clem Rewa, chairman of the Allegan County board of Commissioners, read the memorial resolution passed by the board following Judge Ray's death.

Judge Hoffius read the memorial resolution passed by the Michigan Judges' Association.

State Supreme Court Justice Dethmers spoke briefly and announced that the resolution had been read into the record of the high court.

Judge Smith recalled his year's of association with Judge Ray, praising him for his record as a trail attorney, prosecutor and judge — and as a public spirited citizen as well.

Retired Judge Fred T. Miles, Sr., now 93, recalled some of his experiences both as an attorney and judge. He spoke briefly about many of the judges whose portraits now hang on the walls of the courtroom.

In addition to the newly portrait of Judge Ray, the gallery includes Judge Flavius J. Littlejohn, who served on the bench from 1858 to 1869 and, earlier, as a surveyor, helped to guide the original Dutch settlers to Holland; Judge Dan J. Arnold, 1875-92; Judge Phillip Padgham, 1893-1912; Judge Orien S. Cross, 1912-29; Judge Miles, 1930-47, and Judge Smith, who has been on the bench since 1947.

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GOOD MOVE

The preliminary report of the U.S. Census Bureau reveals the none-too-surprising information that Americans are moving out to the suburbs. It may be that this move is causing us some problems at the moment, but generally speaking this looks like a good move.

It may be that the cities are being left to fend for themselves as the more affluent of the erstwhile city dweller moves to the suburbs and becomes involved in his peculiar problems there. But the cities have pretty much proved themselves to be obsolete and unmanageable, and there's plenty of room outside.

We have always been somewhat skeptical of the mournful predictions of population experts who have predicted that in so many years there would be only standing room for multiplying humans or that by such a time the earth would be covered ten deep with squirming people. We have always felt that these folk hadn't traveled through the great plains or seen the vast extents of terrian throughout this country peacefully awaiting the arrival of inhabitants.

Be that as it may, there is a great deal of room in this country into which people can spread themselves and get away from the confines of the city. We have transportation facilities and communications of the kind that make being on the urban spot unnecessary for most businesses. We can spread out and carry on as well as, if not better than, if we all stayed cooped up in the big towns.

When we get used to the idea and begin to use our space more wisely, we may well turn out to be a country with fewer pressing social problems.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 20
A Spiritual Pilgrimage
Genesis 27:18-24
By C. P. Dame

For years Jacob lived a selfish life. Gradually he grew spiritually and in the end became a man of God. Selfish people may become spiritually minded — this truth is verified in this lesson.

I. Selfishness eventually leads to unhappiness. Jacob got the birthright from Esau. Isaac was getting old. One day he asked Esau to get him some venison and prepare it for him so "that I may eat" and "bless thee before I die." People believed then that a deathbed blessing had special meaning. Rebekah heard Isaac and plotted to nullify his plan and called Jacob and gave him orders which he with hesitation obeyed.

Mother and son had low ethical standards. Rebekah's first obligation was to her husband. She was determined that her favorite son should get the blessing and she planned to deceive her husband and make her son lie. The Rebekah who plotted was not the same romantic Rebekah of the past — she had changed. It is tragic when a mother and son plot together to deceive.

Jacob got the blessing and his brother's hatred which finally led to his leaving home under cover of the excuse that he should go to Padan-aram and marry a daughter of a kinsman living there. Jacob never saw his mother again. II. God remembers His covenant children. Jacob was a child of the covenant. In a dream God spoke to Jacob the cheater, lonely, homesick and troubled with a guilty conscience, and promised him that He would give to him and his descendants the land on which he was lying and He would be with him and bring him back again to the land from which he was going.

Jacob learned that God is everywhere present and that He is gracious and forgiving and concerned in an individual. No wonder Jacob was deeply moved by the dream and named the spot where he slept Bethel, meaning the "house of God."

III. Some learn the hard way. This was true of Jacob. In Haran Jacob fell in love with Rachel, was cheated by Laban, his mother's brother, and cheated him, became an unwilling husband of Leah, Rachel's sister, and ended up with two wives, and those two brought two other women in the picture, and hence Jacob had to contend with four women whose children were at times at odds with each other. At Peniel Jacob had another religious experience, which came about through the coming of Esau on the scene. The two brothers met and parted in peace.

The story of Joseph and his brothers brought both grief and gladness in Jacob's life. The unexpected and exciting story of Joseph's position in Egypt brightened Jacob's life. God told him to accept the offer to go to Egypt with his family and he obeyed and finally died there but was buried in Canaan, the land God had promised to him and his descendants.

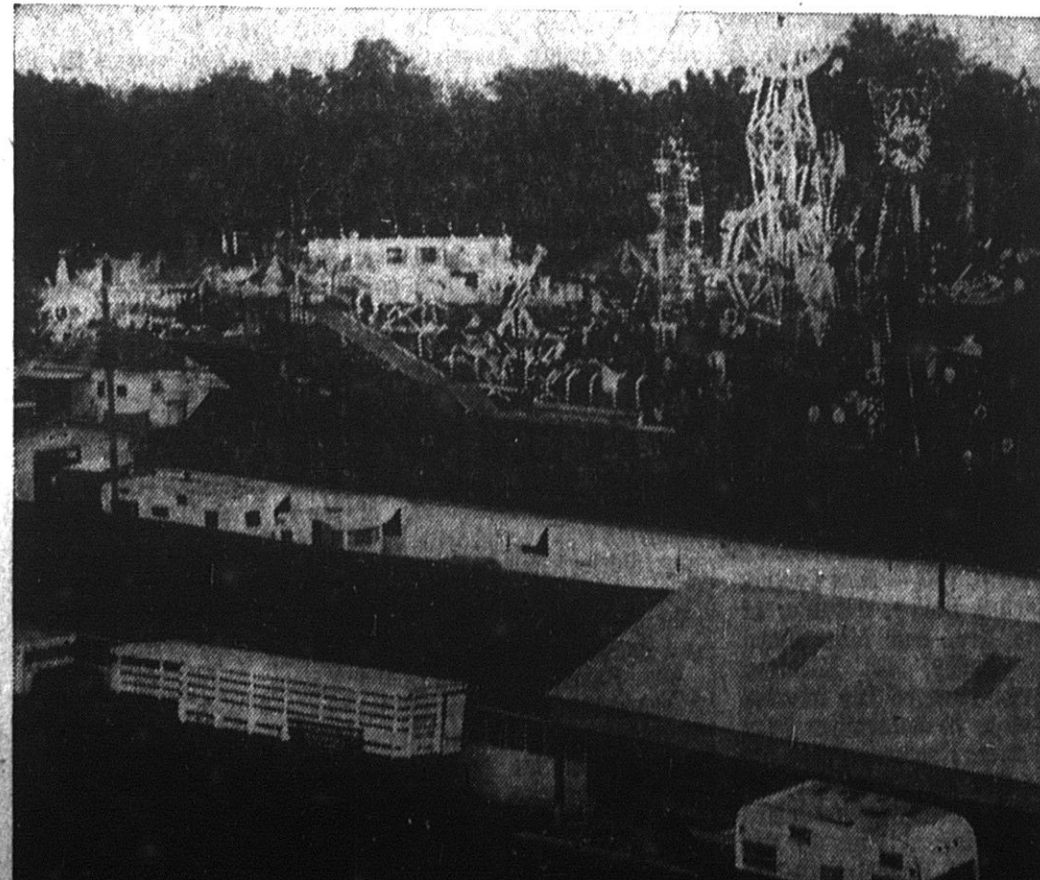
Jacob the selfish man became a spiritual man through the varied experiences of life.

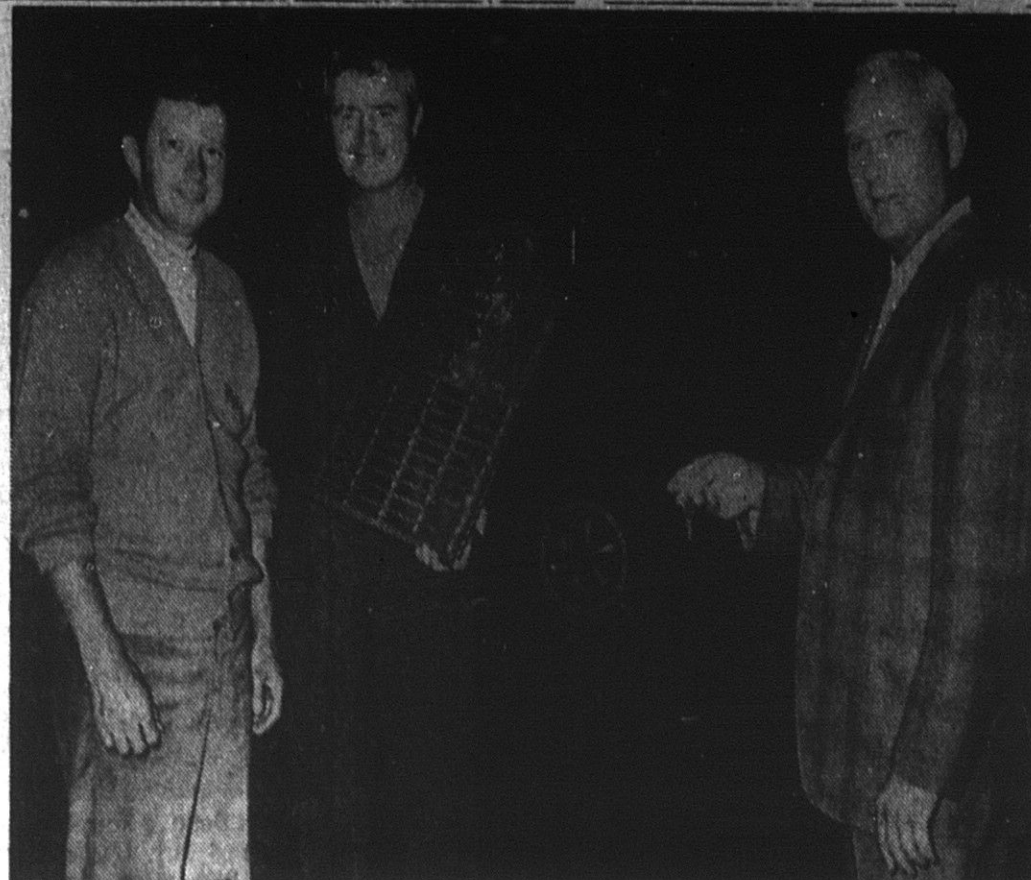

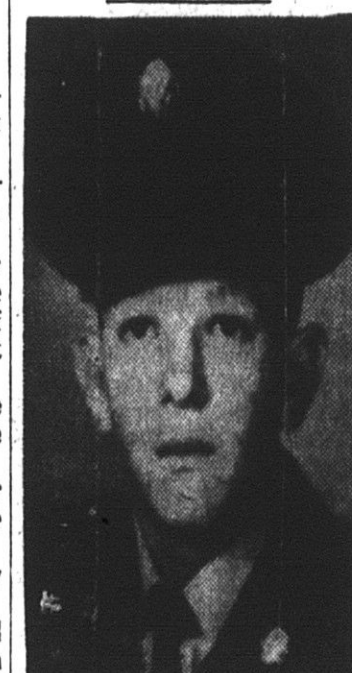

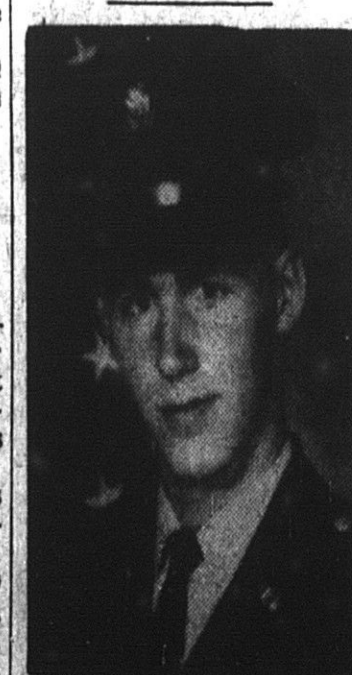

Dutchmen Lose Home Opener, 24-0

Powerful Defiance College spoiled the head coaching debut of Hope College's Ray Smith here Saturday night at Riverview Park before 3,400 fans as the Yellow Jackets took a 24-0 decision.

Defense-minded Defiance ran its two-year winning streak to 14-0 by blanking the Flying Dutchmen behind a quick and aggressive front wall led by 5'3" Tim Predieri.

"Naturally I was disappointed in the loss to Defiance but we are going to get much better before the season is over and we will be ready for Franklin College this Saturday," Smith said after the contest.

The Yellow Jackets have been practicing since Aug. 15 compared to the Dutchmen who have been only holding drills for 10 days.

"Defiance could be the best team we play all year and that includes teams in the MIAA and I can't believe we will face a tougher and quicker defense," stated Smith.

"I feel that our defense could be as good as anyone in the MIAA but we have to work on our offense," concluded Smith.

Hope was only able to enter Defiance territory once in the entire contest as the Dutchmen were limited to only five first downs compared to 14 for the winners. The Yellow Jackets ran 75 offensive plays to 40 for Hope.

A Groy Kaper fumble set up the first Defiance score late in the first quarter on Hope's 34 yard line. Three plays later quarterback Mike Wright hit end Ed Lapuh for a 19-yard scoring pass to give Defiance a 6-0 edge. Lapuh also kicked the extra point.

With Smith calling every play from the sidelines Hope marched down to Defiance's 21 in the second period behind the passing of Kaper and the pass receiving of end Jim Lamer of Zeeland who finished the evening by snagging five of Hope's six completed passes for 58 yards. The drive stalled as Mike Hinga's field goal attempt from the 33 was wide to the left.

Lapuh put Defiance on the board again in the third period as he booted a 28-yard field goal to make the score, 10-0.

Defiance went 63 yards in 10 plays to score its second TD on a three-yard run by John Dekker and added its final tally of the evening in the last minute of play when defensive back Mike Little intercepted a pass by Jon Constant of Grand Haven and returned it 12 yards for the score. Lapuh's third conversion made the final score 24-0.

Dekker paced Defiance in rushing with 95 yards in 19 carries while Bob Haveman led Hope with 30 yards in 13 rushes. Haveman's six yard jaunt in the second period was the longest mustered by a Dutchman runner in the game.

The Dutchmen will travel to Franklin, Ind. Saturday to play Franklin College in a non-league tilt slated to start at 2 p.m.

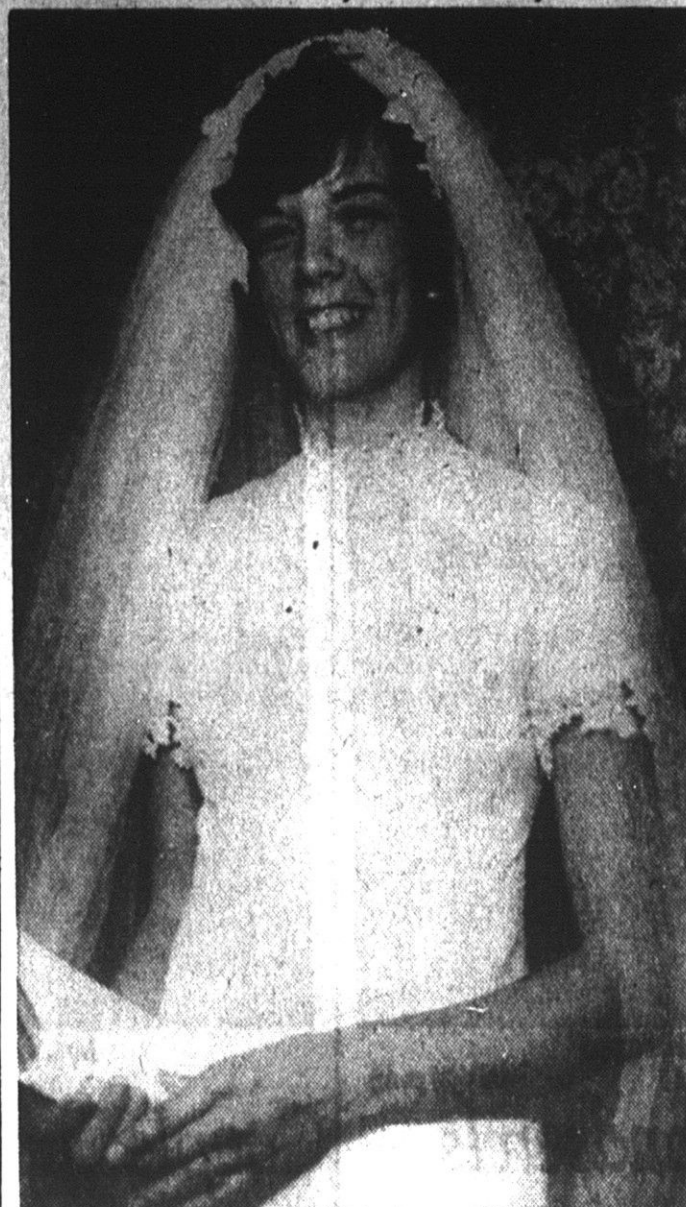

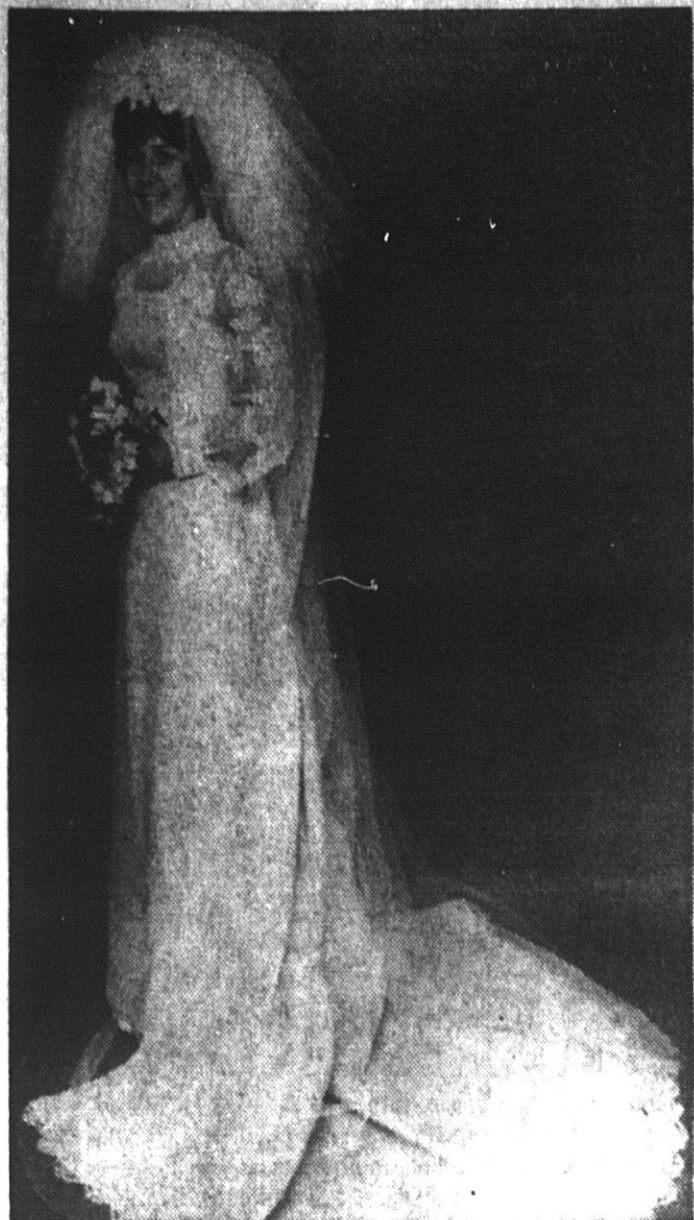

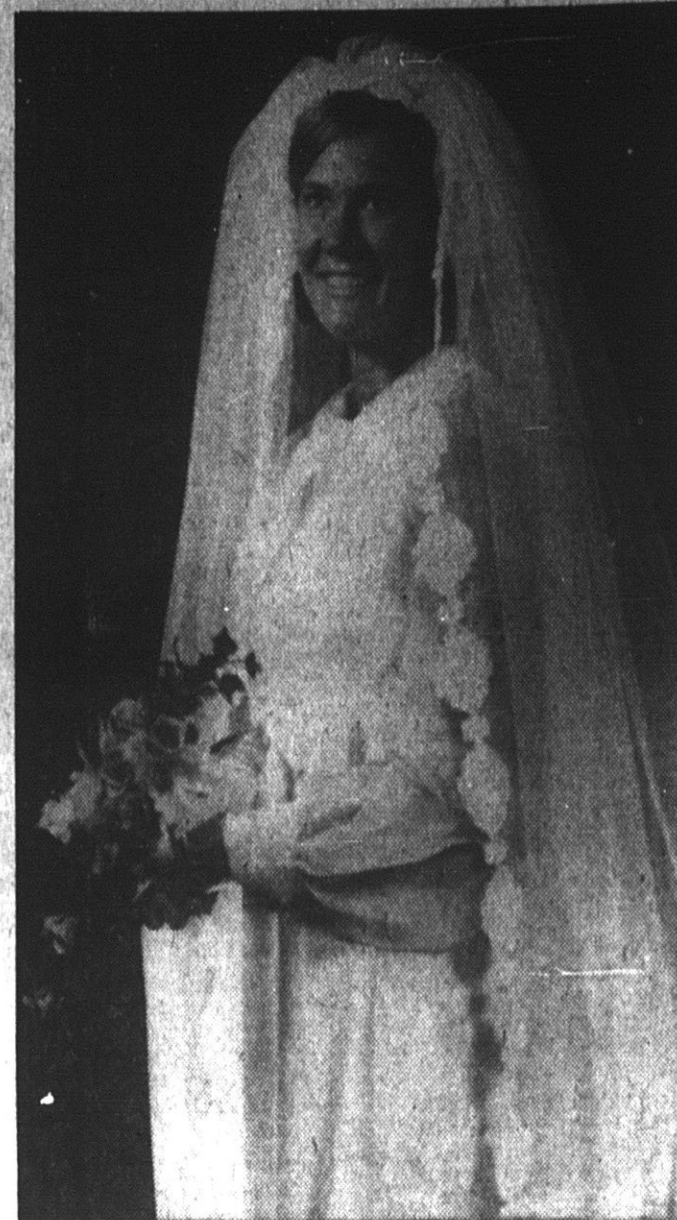

Attending the groom as best man was Jerry Dean Price.

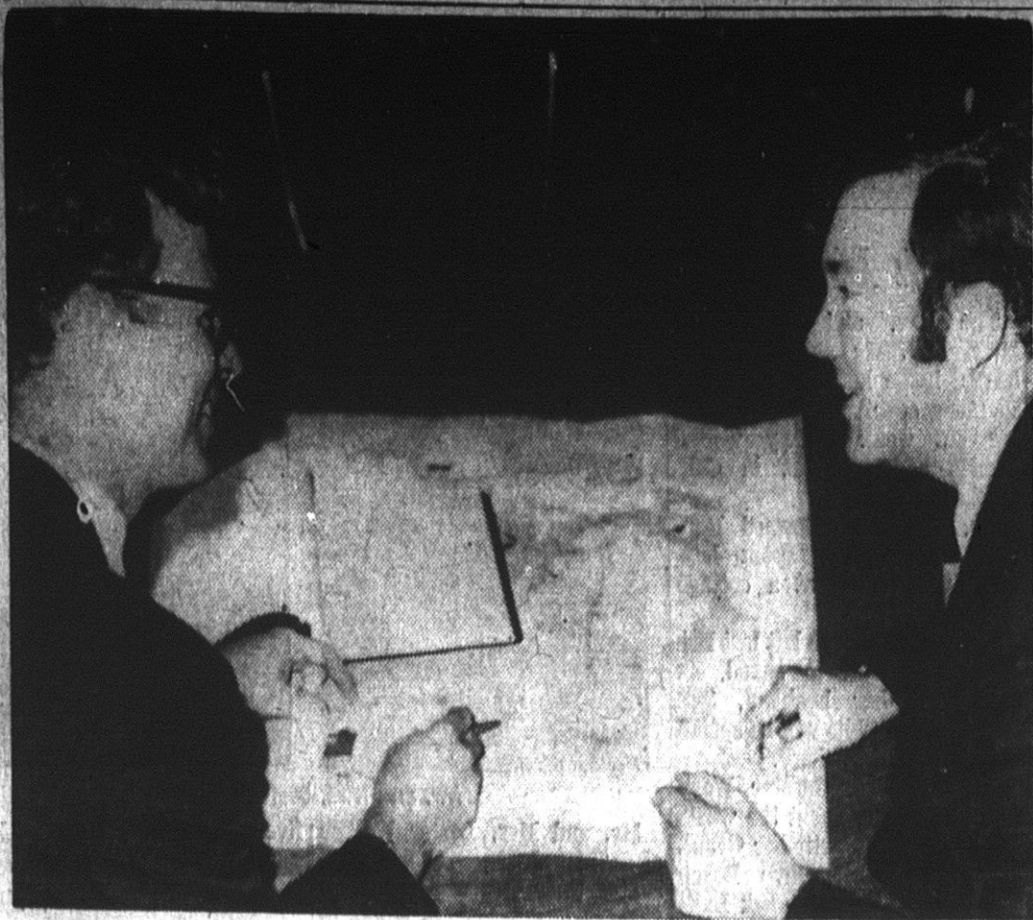

the Grand River basin area. The Grand River basin covers 5,570 square miles. The river also borders the 876-acre campus of the college near Allendale.

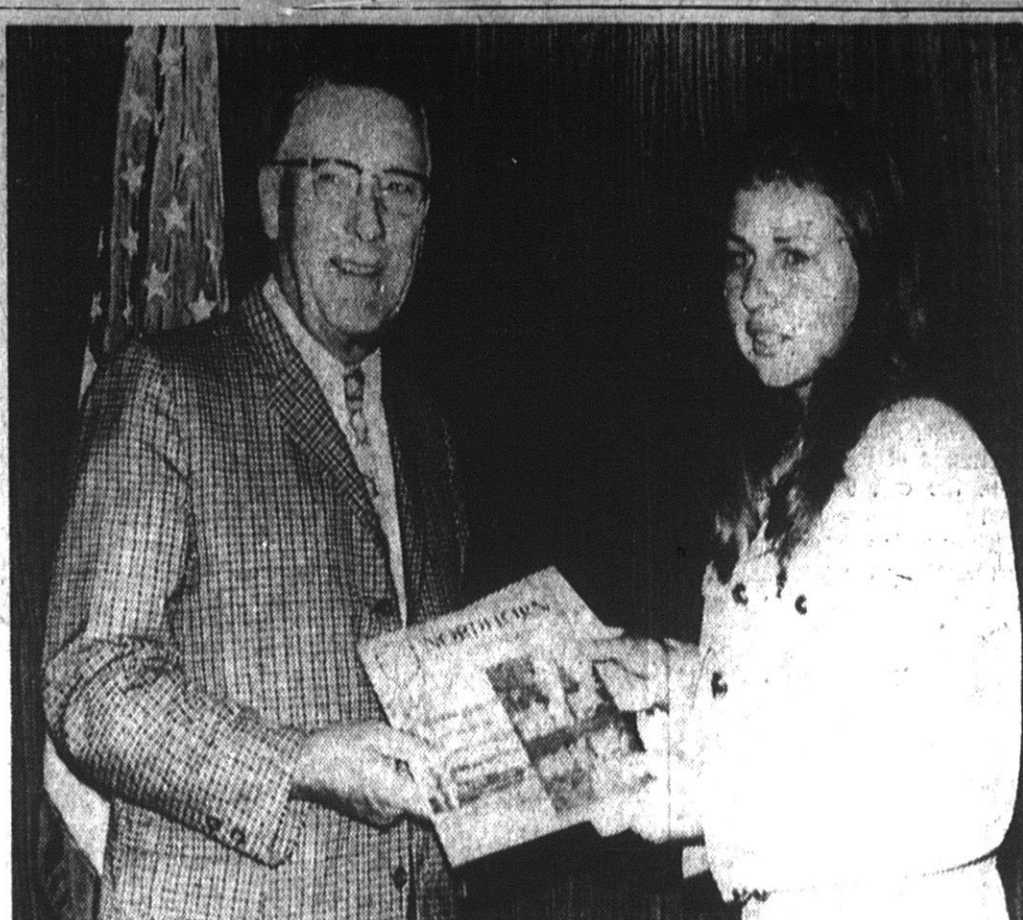

New Landfill Site Chosen For County

GRAND HAVEN — The north part of Ottawa County may soon have a sanitary landfill and dumping ground for rubbish in Olive township provided approval is received from state authorities.

This landfill would replace the former Tri-Cities dump on Harbor Island at Grand Haven.

A previous site in Spring Lake township cannot be used because of restrictions placed by the State Health Department, Ronald Bakker, manager of the Ottawa County road commission, told the Ottawa County Commission at its monthly meeting Monday afternoon.

The new site selected by the solid wastes committee and the road commission is county-owned land in Olive township, adjacent to Pigeon Creek Park. It is part of 270 acres of dune property in Olive township, and the site is located off Stanton St. three miles east of US-31.

Bakker said if the site is approved, the landfill will be open 2 1/2 days a week. Hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays would be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon. Same rates charged in the Park township landfill would apply.

Bakker said \$50,000 remains in a fund set aside by the county board last year. Plans call for fencing and a building at the new site. If approval is received, the landfill should be ready in three weeks, Bakker said.

He said final approval is contingent on engineering plans and an inspection by a state geologist to check location of monitor wells to guard against contamination of surface water.

Bakker also reported that the new lumberman's museum planned at Hager Hardwoods Park near Hudsonville will be open next spring.

New GVSC Institute Starts Grand River Basin Study

ALLEDALE — By the year 1980, on estimated 1.5 million people will live in the 5,570 square mile drainage basin of the Grand River. By the year 2000, the human population will have increased to an estimated 2.2 million. The inter-relationships of this natural basin and its people — their cities, farms, and industries — are the program bases of Grand Valley State College's new Environmental Studies Institute commencing this fall.

"With the Grand bounding the eastern border of its 876-acre campus and the R/V ANGUS as a 'floating laboratory' in Lake Michigan, Grand Valley's Environmental Studies Institute is strategically based for its objectives of coordinating environmental research, community service, and academic programs," states ESI director, Dr. Ronald Ward.

"Specifically in the area of coordination is a planned data center which will collect and supervise the use of relevant maps, charts, samples, reports and reprints. Seminars and conferences are planned which will serve the community in updating in-service teachers, engineers and administrators; assist in educating the non-professional to environmental problems, and focus attention on specific problems and possible solutions.

"Emphasis in the program will focus on student and faculty interdisciplinary approaches to the complex nature of environmental studies, in a coordinated effort with community citizens' groups, industrial concerns, governmental agencies, and other institutions.

"As background to this effort, a broad base exists at Grand Valley of established and constantly growing academic course offerings and research projects in the environmental field. This fall, the college also initiates environmental science as a major degree program leading to the Bachelor of Science.

Dr. Ward holds the ScD degree from Johns Hopkins University, and is associate professor of biology and chairman of the biology department at Grand Valley.

He and his family are Jenison residents.

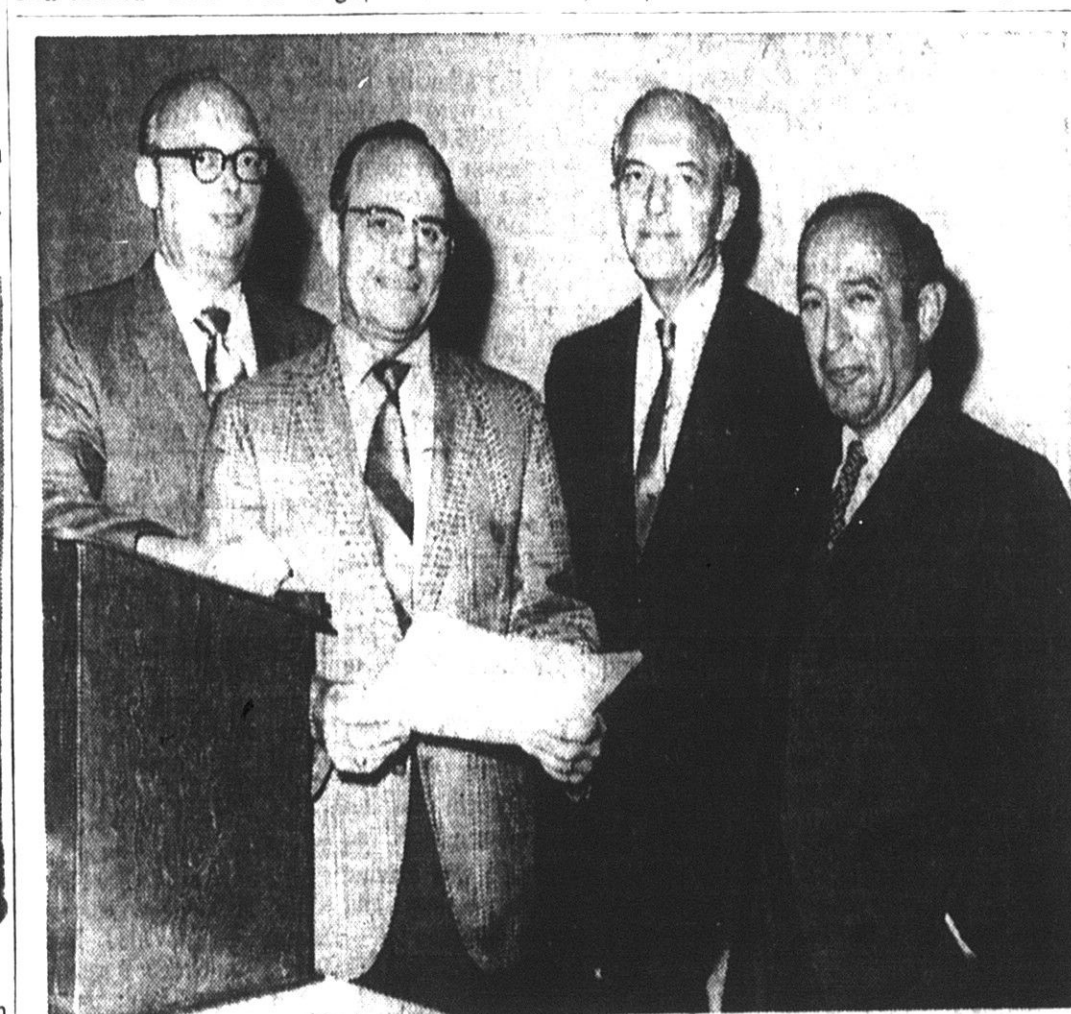

In one instance, money from the National Institute of Health was used for the experimental use of Amphetamines in Psychological Counseling techniques to tone down the activities of children in class, Mrs. Yntema said.

Plant May Emit Smoke, But It's Only Temporary

After operating virtually smoke-free the entire summer, the James De Young power plant is likely to be sending out smoke for the next several weeks, according to Board of Public Works officials.

Power plant Supt. Lester Overway said that a temporary change in operation is responsible for the smoking conditions which could exist at the plant.

Overway said an inspection is slated for the plant's newest turbo-generator unit which will be taken out of service. This is the largest unit at the city-owned plant and with it out of service it is necessary to return the plant's number three unit to service to meet the demand for electricity. The boiler of unit number three is coal fired, Overway explained, and is not equipped with an electrostatic precipitator to cut down on smoke emission such as the plant's newest unit does.

Turbine number five, the plant's newest unit, has been in operation since the early part of last year. Overway said it is customary after an initial period of operation of a year or two to make a thorough inspection of the generating unit. He said the inspection work will be done by the plant's maintenance personnel under the supervision of specialists from General Electric Company's turbine division which furnished the turbo-generator.

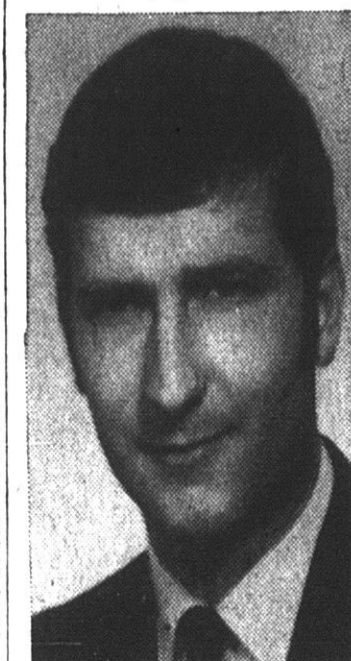
Work to be done includes checking the rotor, blading, valves, and auxiliary equipment, looking for dirt, wear and tear. A G. E. spokesman said four or five weeks would be needed to make the inspection and complete any repairs which might be necessary.
