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Council Gets BPW Water Plan

City Council Wednesday night heard a report from the Board of Public Works on plans to expand the city's water treatment plant from a capacity of 14 million gallons a day to 21 million gallons a day.

Charles Cooper, BPW president, said increasing demands point to the necessity of planning now and since the plant is designed for two 7-million gallon units, the most efficient addition would be a third 7-million gallon unit.

The report listed estimated costs for the addition at \$2,352,000. The board has accumulated sufficient depreciation to finance approximately a half million, reducing bond requirement to \$1,852,000.

The report, drawn up by Supt. of Utilities R. L. Rainson, listed two methods of financing the balance, either by a city general obligation bond at about 5½ per cent, or a revenue bond at approximately 6½ per cent. This would cost about \$155,000 a year on general obligation bonds or \$163,000 a year for revenue bonds over a 20-year period. Bonds would be retired from water department revenues.

Council gave preliminary approval to the program and instructed the city manager to prepare a study on bonding proposals to be presented in October.

In other business, Councilman Morris Peerbolt said construction on the outdoor swimming pool at Smallegan Park is progressing well and on schedule and that the main pool has been poured. A change order was approved.

A letter from M and R Land Co. concerning repair work to the sidewalk along the River Ave. side of the J. C. Penney building, asking that repairs be made in asphalt which the company contends would be a better job of preventing leakage. Council denied the request on the basis of uniformity for cement walks since many such repairs and replacements are being ordered on Eighth St. in connection with the downtown beautification program, and that upgrading must adhere to the present code. Stuart Boyd, representing the petitioner, said repairs probably won't be made if asphalt is not allowed. He explained that the walks had been replaced in 1954. Council's voice vote carried no dissents.

A city manager report on the question of turn lane at Eighth St. for northbound traffic on Fairbanks Ave. stated that a comprehensive study by the Ottawa County Road Commission determined there were only 3 to 11 vehicles per hour making a left turn at the intersection, and recommended no further action. Councilman Elmer Wissink requested a study with a view to eliminating left turns for northbound traffic, and other Councilmen felt a full study on all turns there should be made. Councilman Peerbolt suggested consideration be given to aerial movies or video tape in the study.

A city manager report proposing that parking be removed from the west side of Maple Ave. for a distance of 112 feet south of 25th St. and from the south side of 25th St. for a distance of 70 feet west of Maple Ave. was tabled for two weeks to give citizens an opportunity to express their concerns.

Received for first reading were five ordinances to amend existing revenue bond ordinances to provide that any one of the three area banks would be eligible to receive investment funds from the city. Final adoption is slated at the next meeting.

A suggested policy to standardize vehicles for snowplowing operations was referred back to the city manager for a more complete study assuring competitive bidding. The proposal suggests that trucks for snowplowing be standardized on the present International six-cylinder engine, with bids to be sought from all International dealers in the area, bids to be checked through the Michigan Public Purchasing Association of which the city is a charter member.

The recommendation to council called for advertising for five vehicles, two to be paid under this fiscal year's fund and the remaining three to be temporarily financed through revenue sharing funds.

Council unanimously approved a plat designated as Ken-Lane plat, filed by Kenneth Beelen consisting of five lots located on the north side of the terminus of 37th St. west of Pine Ave. The plat had previously been approved by the Planning Commission.

Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. presided at the meeting which lasted 1½ hours. Absent were Councilmen Hazen Van Kampen and Lou Hallacy. The invocation was given by Major Charles Duden of the Salvation Army.

Coopersville Woman Dies In Collision

COOPERSVILLE — Kathryn Jeanette Zoeller, 50, of 18169 80th Ave., Coopersville, was killed in a two-car head-on collision at 8:13 a.m. Monday along 68th Ave. a half mile south of Garfield in Polkton township.

Ottawa County deputies said she was pronounced dead at the scene of multiple injuries. Her death was the 28th fatality reported in the county this year compared with the 30 deaths last year at this time.

Deputies said the Zoeller woman was driving a car southbound along 68th while the other car, driven by Donald Bush, 21, of 8265 Hayes St., Coopersville, was northbound on 68th.

Officers said the two cars met head-on but were unable to say which car crossed the centerline. Both drivers were alone in their cars and were pinned in the wreckage.

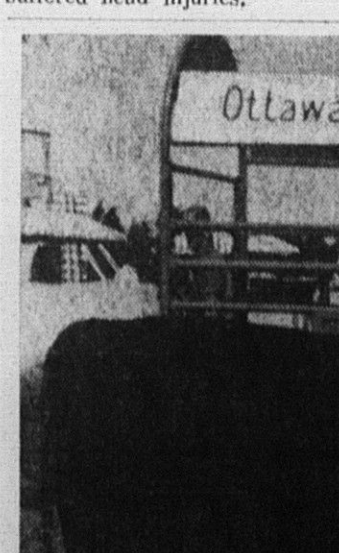
Bush was taken to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with a fractured left knee and bumps and bruises.

Cyclist Dies In Mishaps Near Marne

Marne — Gary A. Frye, 19, of 14th Ave., Marne, was fatally injured Thursday at 3:33 p.m. when the motorcycle he was riding went out of control along Luce St. and tossed him into a ditch. He died shortly after arrival at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids, Ottawa County deputies said.

Frye's death was the 27th fatality in Ottawa County this year compared with the 29 deaths a year ago.

Deputies said Frye was westbound in the 1,000 block of Luce St. south of Marne when he apparently lost control of the motorcycle while rounding a curve. The cycle flipped over into a ditch on the north side of the street. Deputies said Frye suffered head injuries.

Chris Godfrey Killed in Crash

Ernest Chris Godfrey, 44, of 1980 Driftwood Dr., was killed this morning when the car he was driving slammed into the rear of a parked semi-trailer truck along Douglas Ave. 300 feet west of Aniline Ave.

Godfrey was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital of a fractured neck and chest injuries. The accident occurred at 7:53 a.m. and his death was the 29th traffic fatality for Ottawa County this year compared with 30 deaths a year ago.

Ottawa County deputies said Godfrey was eastbound on Douglas and may have been temporarily blinded by the rising sun. The truck was parked on the traveled portion of the eastbound traffic lane near the curbing. Deputies said the flashing lights on the truck were believed activated.

Godfrey's car struck the left rear section of the parked truck. The truck was not occupied at the time. Godfrey was alone in the car.

A native of New Richmond, Godfrey lived all of his life in the Holland area. He was a member of Unity 191 F & AM, a member of the First United Methodist Church of Holland and was a veteran of the armed forces.

He was employed at Big Dutchman of Zeeland where he was head of billing and inventory control.

Survivors include the wife, Mariana; two sons, David and Loren, both of Holland; a daughter, Christeen, at home; his mother, Mrs. Leo Godfrey, of Kalamazoo; a brother, William, and a sister, Mrs. Harold Armstrong, both of Kalamazoo; a sister, Mrs. Harry Jacobs, of Santa Clara, Calif., and a sister, Mrs. Gerald Van Order of Phoenix, Ariz.; several nieces and nephews.

Services will be held Saturday at 1:30 p.m. from Dykstra Northwood Chapel with the Rev. Darwin Salisbury officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

Friends and relatives may meet the family at the chapel Friday from 7 to 9 p.m.

Carousel Sued In Ski Mishap

GRAND HAVEN — Dolores Wingard of Holland has filed a \$100,000 damage suit in Ottawa County Circuit Court against Carousel Recreational Properties, Inc., for alleged injuries suffered during a mishap on the slopes in 1972.

The plaintiff claims she was skiing at Carousel Mountain Ski Resort near Holland Feb. 24, 1972 when she fell and the rented bindings did not function properly and release her right ski from the boot. She claims she permanently injured her leg in the fall.

The suit charges the defendant company was under a duty to furnish her with safe equipment.

City Seeks Contractor Money

Urge Milliken To Intervene

Claiming the State Housing Development Authority and the general contractor for the Meadowlans townhouse complex might be "irresponsible" Holland council Wednesday appealed to Gov. William G. Milliken to intervene in a situation where subcontractors claim they have not been paid for work performed at the construction site.

The surprise resolution offered by Second Ward Councilman John Bloemendaal and adopted unanimously by council asks the governor to intervene "for the benefit of our local community and others in the state of Michigan which have or may experience similar relationships with the state agency."

Meanwhile attorneys for eight subcontractors who claim they have not been paid in recent months have filed suit against the Holland and Zeeland Area Housing Corp., Meadowlans

Limited Dividend Housing Association, and the Michigan State Housing Development Authority to secure payment for the subcontractor plaintiffs. Attorney Donald Hann, representing the subcontractors, said the suit filed in Allegan County Circuit Court Wednesday asks that a lien be placed on the Meadowlans property to guarantee payment to the plaintiffs. Hann said the plaintiffs had threatened to walk off the jobs or file mechanics liens against the contractor for lack of payments but delayed the action on alleged representations made by HAZAH and the State Housing Development Authority indicating payments would be forthcoming.

Hann said an original suit filed May 18 by nine subcontractors in Allegan Circuit Court alleges \$151,000 was owed the subcontractors by Lawrence and that regular payments from the contractor had not been received.

HAZAH president Ben Smith said HAZAH had been meeting with the State Housing Development Authority, Altman Management Co. of Lansing, a partner with HAZAH in the complex and representatives of the subcontractors to obtain money for work completed and said he was assured by the state funds were available.

Council's action Wednesday requested a meeting with Milliken, representatives of the City of Holland and "representatives of those financially burdened by the failure of the Michigan State Housing Development Authority to resolve this situation."

The resolution claims "repeated efforts and negotiations with the contractor and the Michigan State Housing Development Authority to obtain payments and resolve differences have been fruitless giving the impression that the contractor and the Michigan State Housing Development Authority are irresponsible, misleading the city, HAZAH and the local contractors."

HAZAH, or the Holland and Zeeland Area Housing Corp., spearheaded the project to construct 118 townhouse units for moderate income families on land southwest of 40th St. and Washington Ave., nearly two years ago.

Windmill Island and Football Game

Ox Roast Tickets Are Still Available

A fairly steady demand for ox roast tickets for the eighth annual community outing Saturday at Windmill Island has been noted the last few days. As of today, several hundred tickets were still available.

Because of last year's highly

successful ox roast, the ticket limit has been boosted to 4,500, compared with a sellout of 4,000 in 1972. Like last year, ox roast ticket holders may attend the first home football game of Hope College at 2 p.m. in nearby Riverview Park. Hope will play Concordia College of River Forest, Ill. Persons attending the game are asked to walk to Windmill Island and take advantage of shuttle buses near the entrance. The Sixth St. entrance will be open for pedestrians.

Ox roast tickets this year are \$2 for adults, \$1.50 for children under eight, and \$1.50 for senior citizens. Tickets for the latter are available only at the city treasurer's office in City Hall. The demand for senior citizen tickets has been heavy, and attendance is expected to exceed the 600 senior citizens last year.

Adults and children's tickets are available at City Hall, Chamber of Commerce, First National Bank and branches, Peoples State Bank and branches, First Michigan Bank and Trust Co. and branches, Ottawa Savings and Loan, Herrick Public Library, Van Raalte Hall at Hope College, and Windmill Island.

In case of rain, the ox roast will go on as scheduled at Windmill Island with box lunches as takeouts. The rain stub will enable further visits at Windmill Island during the 1973 season which will run into week-ends during October.

Serving lines will be in operation from 2 to 6 p.m. Some 75 officials of the city and Hope College will volunteer services in the lines. The annual ox roast is sponsored jointly by the city and Hope College.

Local police will assist with parking. Walkie-talkies will be used to keep abreast of the parking situation on the island and alert the shuttle buses.

Council Assured Of Improvements At M-21, State

ZEELAND — Improvements to the intersection of M-21 and State St. may be completed by the end of the year, the City Council was notified at its meeting Monday.

Council was told by the city superintendent that he had verbal commitments from the State Highway Department that a traffic signal will be installed at the intersection by the end of the year and left turn lanes might be completed by next summer.

Council has been requesting for such improvements the past ten years, clerk Leon Van Harn said. A number of serious accidents have been reported at the crossing.

Cost of installing the signals will be shared by the city and the highway department.

Council heard a request from the Zeeland Environmental Action Leadership (ZEAL) for funds to enable the non profit corporation of local businessmen to hire a professional planning consultant.

ZEAL seeks to work in all aspects of community planning. The request was tabled by council.

Dryer Fire Reported

Holland firemen were called to the self service laundry at 17th St. and Cleveland Ave. at 7:17 a.m. today where a fire was reported in a dryer. Firemen said the dryer apparently shorted out and some lint may have burned. No damage was listed.

HAZAH Works With Builders

Seeks Contractor Payments

Officials of the Holland and Zeeland Area Housing Authority (HAZAH), the organization which spearheaded the Meadowlans townhouse complex along South Washington Ave., said they have been aware of a slowness in paying subcontractors and have been working the past year with the general contractors to effect valid payments.

Ben Smith, president of the HAZAH board, said the board was not directly responsible for paying subcontractors for work performed but stepped into the situation after realizing the full extent of the money owed.

Smith said as long as last fall meetings were held with subcontractors who claimed they had not been paid. Subsequent meetings were held with the State Housing Authority, which granted funds for the project, and the Altman Management Co. of Lansing, with which HAZAH is aligning itself for management purposes. The general contractor is K. A. Lawrence Properties, Inc., of Flint.

The contractor is in charge of paying the subcontractors for satisfactory work, Smith said, and added that it was up

to the contractor to determine whether the work performed met specifications.

About \$300,000 worth of work is claimed as unpaid by as many as 15 subcontractors, many of them local firms, Smith said. He added that one local firm claimed he was owed \$30,000.

Some subcontractors in Holland say they have not received a payment from Lawrence in ten months nor have they heard from him concerning work completed. Smith said today he was confident the problem would be resolved soon, based on recent meetings with state officials and the management firm.

Smith said HAZAH compiled a list of alleged unpaid bills and consulted Lawrence for answers. In some cases the bills were not paid because Lawrence claimed the work was not properly completed, that additional work was needed to correctly finish the job or change orders were involved.

State Housing Authority codes say change orders are to be paid after the entire project is completed, Smith explained. Attempts to have the valid

Man Waives Extradition In Slaying

Dale Shupert To Return to Allegan On Murder Charge

ALLEGAN — Dale Shupert, 33, a carnival worker from Hot Springs, Ark., accused in the slaying early Friday of a fellow carnival worker at the Allegan County Fairgrounds, has waived extradition in Chicago and was expected to be returned to Allegan next week to face first degree murder charges, Allegan police chief William Brandt said Saturday.

Brandt said Shupert was accused in the shooting death of Stephen William Bailey, 22, of West Palm Beach, Fla., owner and operator of a penny arcade at the Allegan County Fair which ends today.

Bailey was shot through the heart by a slug from a .32-caliber revolver. Brandt said a weapon believed the murder gun was recovered on the fairgrounds. The shooting apparently climaxed an argument involving the two men, Brandt said.

Shupert was arrested by Chicago authorities Friday morning as he stepped from a plane that landed at O'Hare International Airport on a flight from Kalamazoo. Chicago police were notified by Michigan authorities after it was learned Shupert may have boarded a flight in Kalamazoo.

A car believed used by Shupert in fleeing the fairgrounds was found in Kalamazoo county.

Police said the Barkel car was stopped westbound on 32nd St. for the approaching train when his car was struck from behind by the Sturgeon auto and shoved into the train. The train was northbound on the tracks. Officers said Sturgeon told them he skidded on wet pavement.

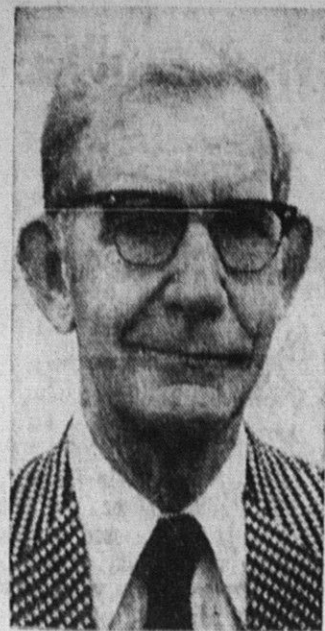
Two Injured In Auto Collision

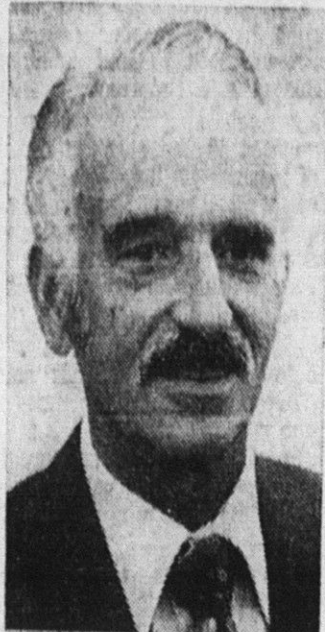
Klinge was admitted to Holland Hospital with multiple fractured ribs and was in "good" condition today. His wife was treated for contusions and released.

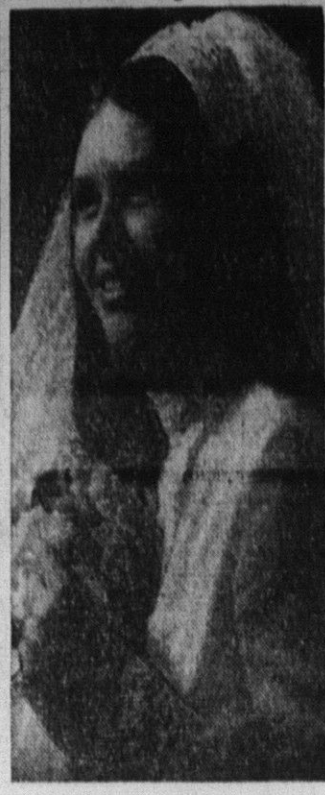

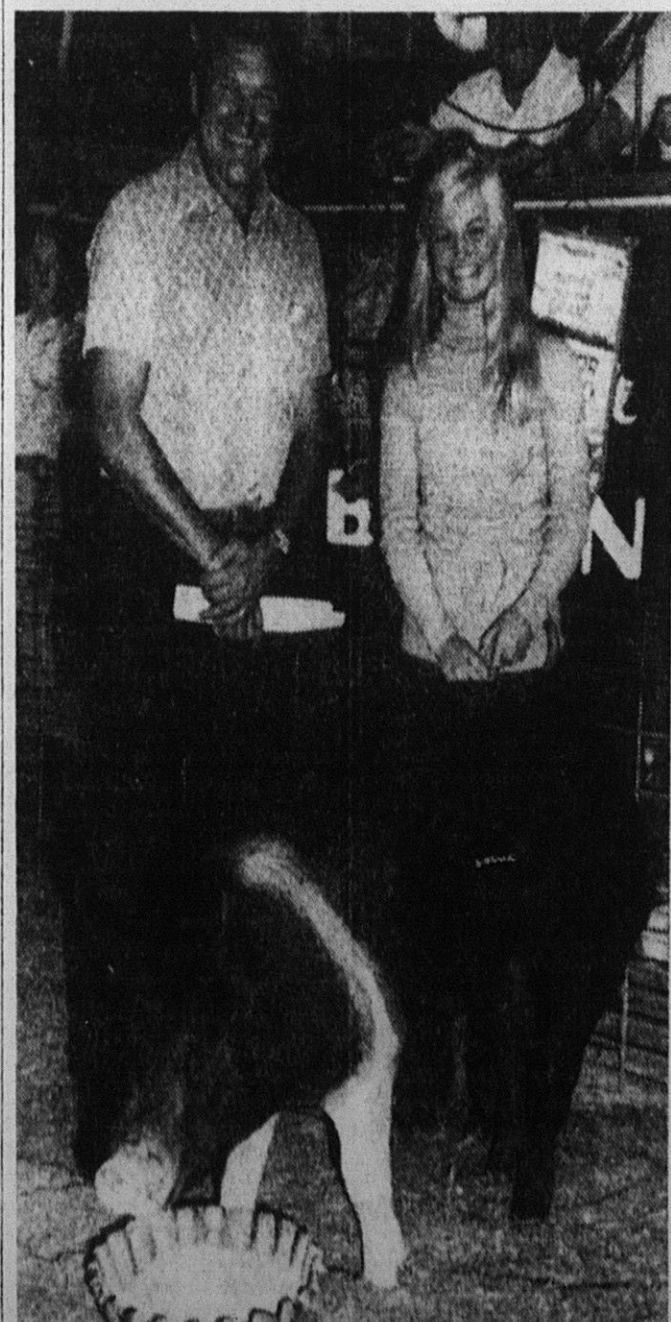

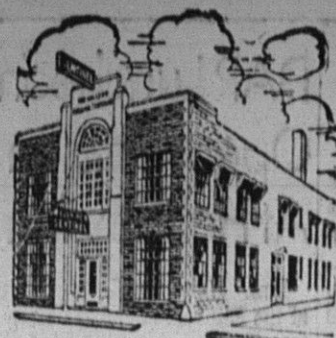

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NEW POLICY AGAINST ADDICTS

There is a new attitude emerging in the treatment of drug addicts. It is becoming evident, for instance, in the new, tough drug law that New York State has recently passed. It is also being professionally suggested that the only way to deal with the drug problem is by being tough.

Recently Dr. Charles Rohrs, medical director of Odyssey House, a five - state drug program, made it clear to the Michigan Judicial Conference meeting at Harbor Springs, that the best way—the only way to deal with drugs is with toughness. He said that drug addicts never, or very seldom, choose to be cured, and thus seldom choose to go into any kind of therapy. States that demand therapy for convicted addicts have much better luck with them than states that give the addicts a choice. Where there is choice there is always cop-out.

It strikes us as curious that many centuries ago an old Greek by the name of Homer put together a tale of the return of Odysseus from the Trojan wars. The long travels he endured to get back were called the odyssey of Odysseus. One of his stops on the way home was in the land of the Lotus eaters, people who were constantly strung out on the effects of the lotus plant.

The eaters, including Odysseus' men, lost all ambition and sense of purpose. They were willing to sit around and give up their chances of ever getting home. Odysseus found that he could not sweet - talk them into taking up the old challenge of finding their way home. He had to whip them into the ships.

It's pretty indicative that the old Greeks way back there, if they didn't have a word for it, at least had a method. It turns out that Odysseus' rather direct and forceful method of dealing with the addict is the one we are discovering to be the most effective.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 23
The Ministry of Reconciliation
II Corinthians 5:16
through 6:2
By C. P. Dame

The world is in great need of reconciliation for it is torn apart in a variety of ways. This lesson teaches that God has given the ministry of reconciliation to the Christian Church. This means that every Christian is called upon to be an agent of reconciliation, or to put it in another way, a reconciler.

I. A Christian is a changed person. This lesson text is from Paul's second epistle to the Corinthian church, written in Macedonia, about 57 A.D. This letter is more gentle than the first one. There is a time to be sharp and a time to be gentle. The members of the Corinthian church had once been non - Christians, but they had become Christians. Paul includes himself and that is why he uses the term "we." Once they did not know Christ aright, now they did. Their conversion gave them a new way of measuring Jesus and people. This continues to happen. A Christian is a changed person, a new creature, with new ideas about God and man.

A Christian is in Christ. Now a person is either in Christ or not, just as he is either in Michigan or not. The Holy Spirit plants new life in the heart—the old things move out, new principles, purposes, plans and goals take over gradually.

II. God is the reconciler. The word "reconciliation" implies a previous disagreement or separation. God took the first step. Sin caused the separation. By dying Christ removed the barrier of sin and reconciled the world to God. All who have accepted God's offer of reconciliation for themselves have become ambassadors for Christ. The American ambassador to England represents our government and speaks for it. An ambassador is a foreigner in a strange land, representing his own country. A Christian is a pilgrim here, belonging to another, a heavenly land, and he beseeches the unreconciled to yield their hearts to God now.

III. Christians have a responsibility. They have a message. Paul felt the burden upon him keenly. He wanted the Corinthians to become conscious of their duty. We are now living in crucial times but we are still living in the day of salvation. It is wrong for believers to be forgetful or directly or indirectly slothful about presenting the gospel. We have many ways of promoting the gospel today. It is sad when those who hear the gospel refuse to respond but it is tragic when Christians fail to seize the many opportunities of this hour. Reconciliation to God comes first, this is followed by becoming reconciled to each other.

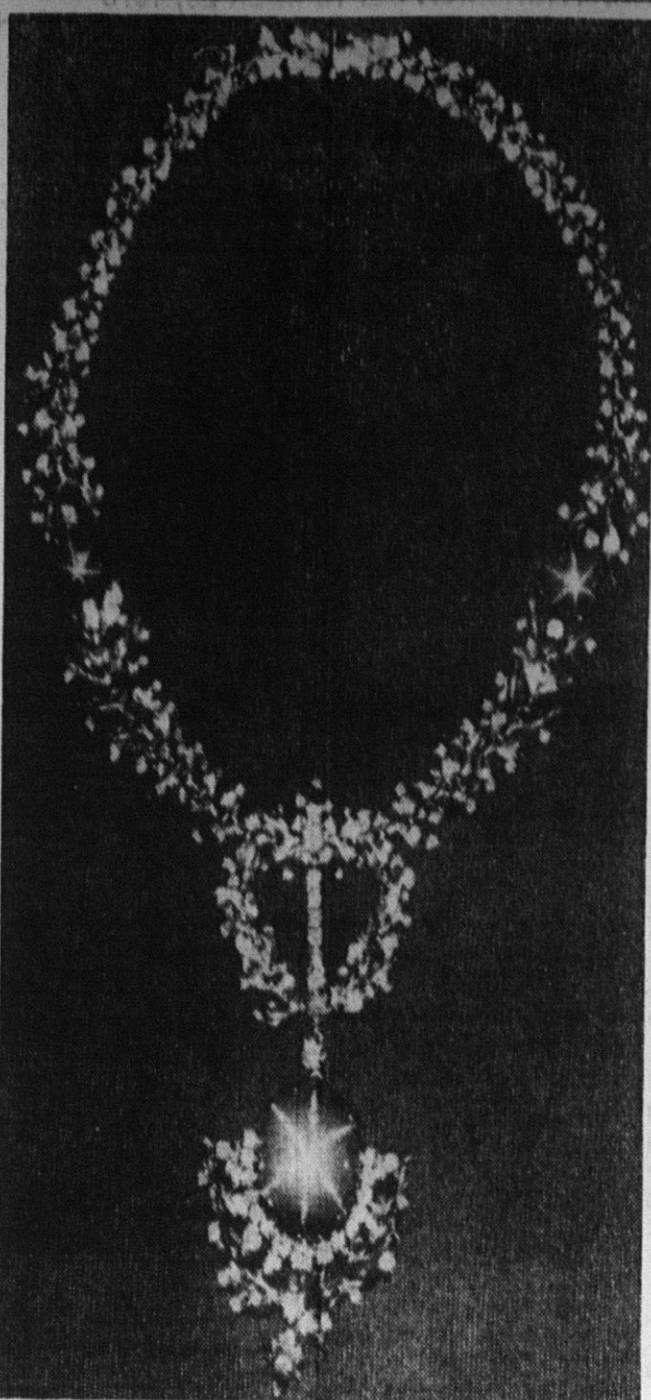
The business meeting was conducted by the new president, Eleanor Cotts. Evelyn Heffron, spiritual life secretary, led devotions.

ALLEDALE — Ex-Kalamazoo College standout Jim Harkema was just the right ingredient Grand Valley State College needed here Saturday, as the Lakers won their first varsity football game ever over the Hornets, 27-14.

The biggest crowd in the school's brief history (2,300) was on hand to watch the Lakers' two brilliant running backs John Mahan of Charlotte and Steve Brems of Grand Haven run at will against the favored Hornets.

Mahan broke his own and the school's single game rushing mark with 158 yards while Brems closely followed with a 129 total.

Going into Saturday's clash, the Lakers were winless under the direction of "Rip" Collins, ex-Hope College flash, but there never was a doubt who the best team on the field was this year. "We were confident all week that we would win," said the Lakers' new coach Coach Harkema. "In fact, I had to stop us from hitting early this week because we were afraid we would really bang ourselves up."

Ken Bailey gave the Lakers' crowd something to cheer about when he pounced on a Kalamazoo fumble of the opening kickoff deep into Hornet territory.

Mahan's 17-yard run put the ball on the five and three plays later quarterback Kerry Rawls took it over for the score but not after fumbling the snap from center. Paul Griffith's first of three extra point kicks gave the surprising Lakers a 7-0 lead.

Brems 11-yard dash put the Lakers up by a 14-0 margin early in the second quarter and Jim Kipp, public relations at GVSU commented in the new Grand Valley press box, "That's the first time in three years we were ever up by 14 points."

Two other fumbles cost GVSU scoring opportunities and when Dennis Kane went in from the two-yard line and also ran the PAT, Grand Valley fans saw visions of the last two years dancing in their heads.

However, that wasn't hardly the case, as tackle Randy Brinks, former Zeeland flash and Dennis Kermeyer from Tecumseh completely shut off the Hornets running attack the rest of the way, even though Kalamazoo managed to score on a seven-yard pass from Jay Gliva to Jeff Guinait with 1:29 left in the game.

Rasikas tallied his second touchdown from the two with 6:19 to play in the third period and Brems' second score in the final stanza closed out the Grand Valley scoring.

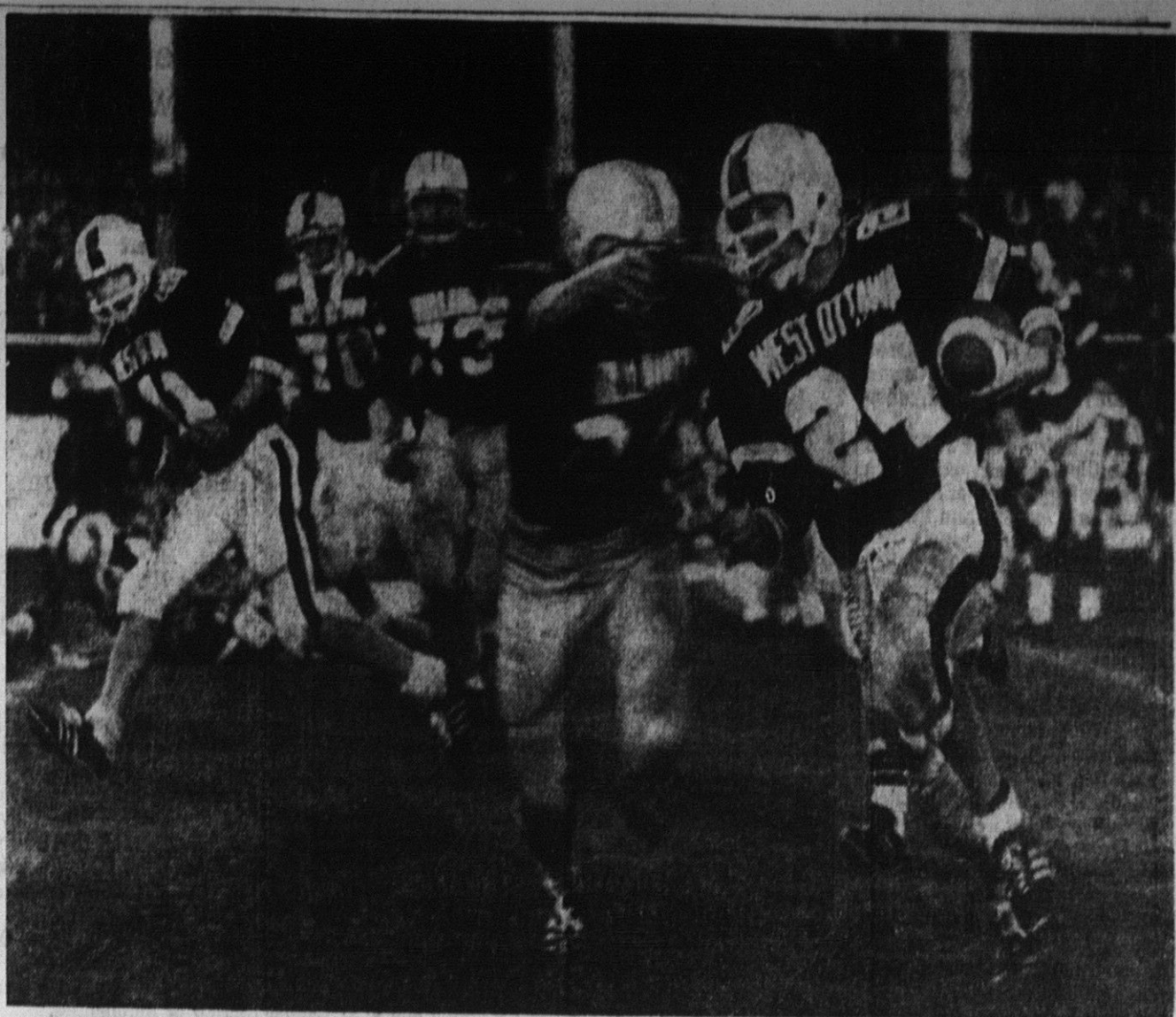

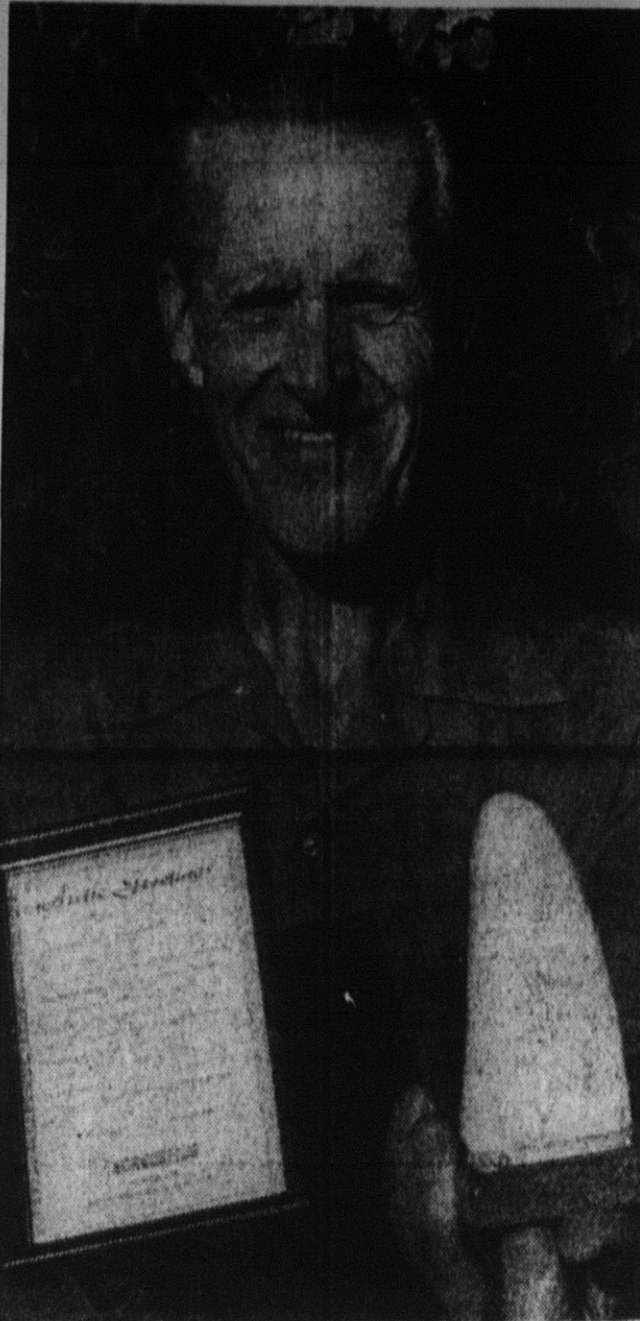
Leaving the capital, the group flew east to Vatnajökull, the largest glacier in Europe located on the southern coast of Iceland. The group was unable to see the latest volcanic eruptions on the Westman Islands due to bad weather.

Lepo noted the eastern part of Iceland has variable weather and the desolate area where the astronauts trained for the moon landing.

They then went to Lake Myvatn in the northeast section which is noted for its volcanoes, lava formations and hot springs and on to Akureyri, the northern capital which was beautiful with its trees, flowers and snowcapped mountains.

The western part, Lepo said, has more agriculture because of tillable soil. He also said Reykjavik, with its hot water heat in all the buildings, is pollution free.

He said the temperature ranges from 33 degrees in the winter to 60 degrees in the summer and the weather can be unfavorable with driving winds and rain. But that's forgotten when the sunny spells come and it's in a bright, sunny mood that we remember "our grand adventure tour of Iceland," Lepo concluded.

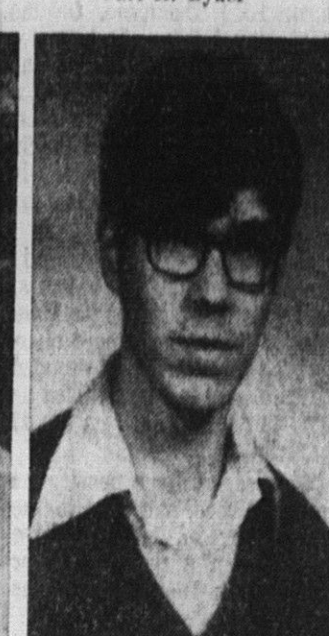

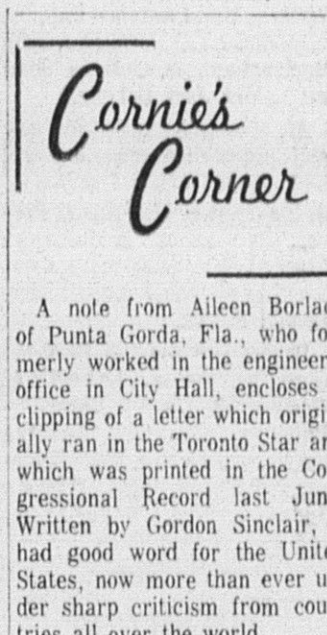

Cornie's Corner

A note from Aileen Borlace of Punta Gorda, Fla., who formerly worked in the engineer's office in City Hall, encloses a clipping of a letter which originally ran in the Toronto Star and which was printed in the Congressional Record last June. Written by Gordon Sinclair, it had good word for the United States, now more than ever under sharp criticism from countries all over the world.

In brief, he writes: "As long as 60 years ago when I first started to read newspapers, I read of floods on the Yellow River and the Yangtze. Who rushed in with men and money to help? The Americans did."

"They have helped control floods on the Nile, the Amazon, the Ganges and the Niger."

"Germany, Japan and to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy, were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave others billions in debts. None of those countries is today paying even interest on its remaining debts to the United States."

"When the franc was in danger of collapsing in 1956 it was the Americans who propped it up and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris."

"I was there. I saw it." "The Marshall Plan, the Truman Policy, all pumped billions upon billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent war-mongering Americans."

"You talk about Japanese technocracy and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy and you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy and you find men on the moon, not once, but several times... and safely home again."

"You talk about scandals and the Americans put theirs right in the store windows for everybody to look at. Even their draft dodgers are not pursued and hounded. They are here on our streets... and getting American dollars from Ma and Pa at home to spend here."

"When the Americans get out of this bind... as they will... who could blame them if they said 'the hell with the rest of the world.'"

"I can name you 5,000 times when the Americans raced to the help of other people in trouble. Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the help of other people in trouble?" "Our neighbors have faced it alone and I'm one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. 'I hope Canada is not one of these.'"

Mistakes Cost Hope In Opener; Spartans Win

NORTH MANCHESTER, Ind. — Mistakes, four fumbles and a pass interception, kept Hope College off balance Saturday as the Dutchmen dropped their football opener to Manchester College 7-0 despite dominating every offensive statistic.

The Dutchmen yielded a third quarter touchdown after fumbling the second half kickoff. The fumble started as a Manchester error. The ball squirmed off the Manchester kicker's foot, bounced away from Hope freshman Dave Teater and was recovered just before it rolled out-of-bounds by the winners' Rick Overfield on the Dutch 37 yard line.

Hope limited Manchester to a negative three yards on the first two plays before Spartan quarterback John Slotts connected on a 33 yard pass to fullback Todd Thompson. On the next play tailback Dan Taylor scampered seven yards into the end zone for the touchdown.

Hope wasn't without its scoring opportunities as the Dutchmen owned a 17-8 advantage in first downs and out-rushed the Spartans, 251-77.

Hope's biggest threat came in the final minute of the first half with first down at the Manchester three. Sophomore quarterback Tim Van Heest dropped back to pass but he fumbled as he was tackled back on the 17 yard line.

The deepest Hope penetration in the second half was to the Manchester 20, but the drive ended when a pass by junior quarterback Bob Carlson was intercepted.

Van Heest and Carlson were able to complete only three of 13 passes as the offensive slack was taken up by the running of senior tailback Ed Sanders, who gained 165 yards in 27 carries. His longest gain went for 19 yards while five others featured more than 10 yards.

Senior fullback Chuck Brooks gained 54 yards in 10 rushes while Carlson had 38 yards in six carries.

Hope's defensive unit limited Manchester to 77 yards rushing as middle guard Dave Yeiter and lineman Craig Van Tuinen led a rush that sacked the Manchester quarterback six times.

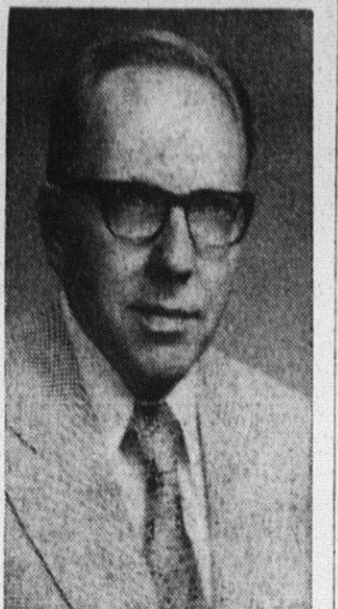

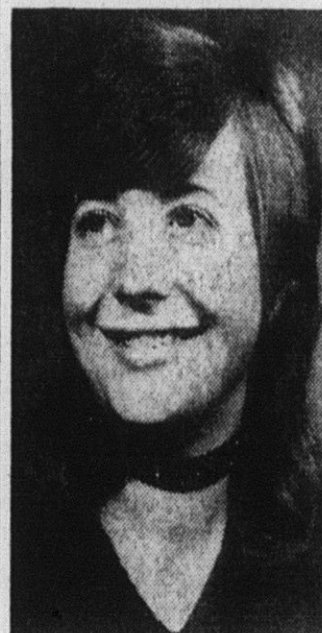

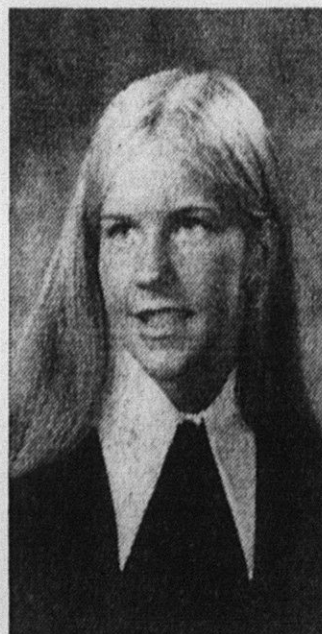

Miss Hagman, presented a lecture, illustrated by colored slides of 43 pictures painted by America's foremost artists of the 19th century.

In 1811 Thomas Scully had an exhibit of landscapes, which

was unheard of before this time. A group of painters known as the Hudson River School had Thomas Cole as a leader. They painted the beauty of American landscapes.

James Whistler is considered by some to be the greatest genius in American art. His portrait of his mother has been accepted as a true type of American motherhood. John Sargent's influence on American art was great, the speaker concluded.

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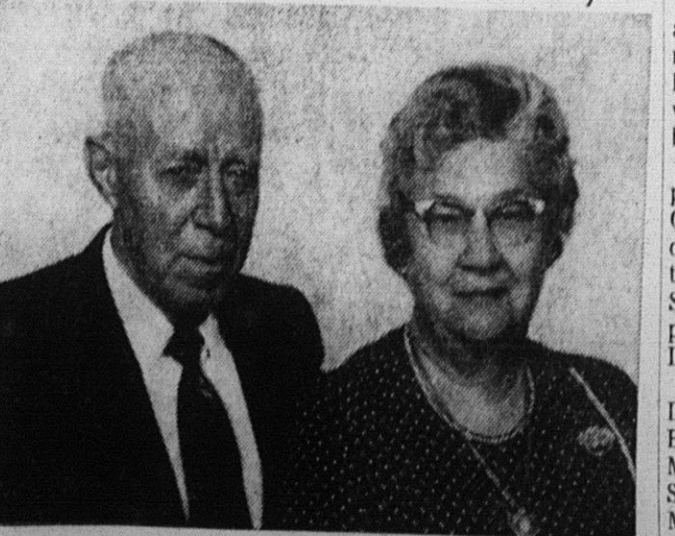
