The marriage banns of Albertus C. Van Raalte and Christina J. De Moen were announced by a town alderman in Amsterdam. Van Raalte as a divinity candidate is listed as living in Hattem.

10. Province of Holland, northern section, Amsterdam

I, the undersigned alderman, appointed as such by the honorable mayor according to Art. 95 of the town bylaws, declares hereby that the marriage proclamations of Albertus Christiaan Van Raalte, divinity candidate, living in Hattem, minor [minderjarige], son of Albertus Van Raalte, deceased and of Catrina Christina Harking, without occupation, living here, and Christina Johanna De Moen, without occupation, living in Leyden, adult [meerderjarige] daughter of Benjamin De Moen and Johanna Maria Wilhelmina Menzel, both deceased, have been properly stated publicly, on the Sundays of February 28 and March 7, without having received objections against it.

Amsterdam, March 9, 1836.
