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## 2 Welcome Signs to Be Placed Here

New Outdoor Posters Will Cite Industrial Advantages of Area

Two large signs welcoming visitors to Holland and pointing out industrial advantages soon will be placed on the south and east approaches to the city, City Council was informed Wednesday night.

Councilman Harold Volkema, chairman of a special sign committee, displayed sketches of the proposed 10 by 40-foot signs to be placed on two locations formerly occupied by Holland Furnace signs on US-31 and M-21. Cost involved would be \$50 a month for each sign, the cost to be shared equally with the Board of Public Works.

Councilman Henry Steffens reported for the special committee working out an agreement between the city and Laketown Township in connection with annexing three parcels to Holland city June 2, 1961. It was estimated that the parcels represented 5.124 per cent of the assessed valuation of the township. There are 139 persons in the area.

Steffens also reported for the special committee dealing with salaries and wages and recommended that no change be made at present in provisions for sick leave. The point in question had been payment of part or all unused sick leave when employment is terminated. Council adopted the recommendation and City Manager Herb Holt was instructed to contact labor organizations which had posed the proposal.

Council granted a request of Fillmore Township amending an existing fire hydrant agreement whereby the hydrant at Vandenberg Buick hereafter will be used instead of the hydrant at Washington and 2nd.

A petition from Wolverine Electric Cooperative requesting a permit for two road crossings for a three-inch gas pipeline at the east city limits on 24th St. was granted.

Also granted was a request from Arlyn Lanting and Kenneth LaGrand for extending fire district variance on their property stand at 533 West 17th St.

A petition for a sanitary sewer in Apple Ave. from 24th to 27th Sts., in 27th St. from Apple Ave. to Brookside Ave., in all of Brookside Ave., and in 26th St. from Brookside Ave. to Apple Ave. was referred to the city manager for study.

The Board of Public Works submitted a report together with an agreement from Holland public schools covering encroachment on a sewer easement on Harrison Ave. south of 24th St.

Council amended the parking ordinance to eliminate parking on both sides of US-31 business route from 32nd St. to the US-31 bypass. This highway will be widened soon. Action was taken on recommendation of the Traffic and Safety Commission.

The city auditor was authorized to exchange \$67,000 of cemetery perpetual care fund monies invested in 3 1/4 per cent U. S. Treasury notes for new 4 per cent U. S. Treasury bonds which will have an effective yield of 4.05 to 4.07 per cent.

Claims against the city from Cornelius J. Northuis, 175 West 10th St., and Michigan Claim Service for Kathryn Meeusen, were filed.

All Councilmen were present at the meeting over which Mayor Nelson Bosman presided. Capt. Eric Britcher of the Salvation Army gave the invocation. Council adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

Holland Furnace Co. started suit against E. J. Kumtwa, Holland, for \$2,500 in connection with leasing premises at 264 Lake Shore Drive, Holland.

The firm claims that on June 6, 1962, Mr. Kumtwa leased the property to the plaintiff for the period June 9 to Labor Day, and paid the rent, \$5,000.

On July 30 the plaintiff claims that the furnace company was denied possession of the property and was also denied use of the premises for the remaining period of the lease.

Holland Hotel Co. started suit against Benjamin J. Staal of Holland for \$1,105.79, the amount claimed to be due for the wedding reception for his daughter. The wedding occurred on August 1.

Staal said on advice of his attorney he has not made payment until final adjustments are made on money due and owing him from the Holland Furnace Co. which are in excess of this bill.

## Council Sets Oct. 10 for Special Meet

Public Hearings Slated on '62 Sewer And Water Projects

In reviewing special assessment rolls for work on water mains and sanitary sewers completed in 1962, City Council Wednesday night set a public hearing at a special meeting Oct. 10 at 7:30 p.m. Water and sewer projects the past year have amounted to some \$75,000.

Thus, City Council will be meeting successively four weeks, instead of its usual first and third Wednesdays. This week's meeting has been postponed from last week when several Councilmen and city officials were attending the Municipal League Convention in Detroit.

Next week, Council meets Tuesday night, Oct. 2, instead of Oct. 3 which is Prayer Day. The following week will be the special meeting for the public hearing on special assessment rolls, and the succeeding week will be the regular meeting.

While special assessments seemed pretty well in order for 1962, the work still continues, and four hearings on more sewers were held and projects okayed with little loss of time since here were no objections.

One proposed improvement is in 34th St. from Central to Pine Aves.; another in Crescent Dr. from 595 Crescent Dr. to Thomas St.; another from Thomas St. to South Shore Dr., and the last in 38th St. from Columbia Ave. West to the dead end.

A public hearing also was held on proposed zoning ordinance amendments with no objections voiced. Later in the meeting, Council went into the committee of the whole and then approved a new ordinance which transfers an area on US-31 bypass just east of 32nd St. from agricultural to highway commercial, and another area from 28th to 32nd St. on 120th Ave. east to the city limits from agricultural to A-A suburban residential.

Also passed was an ordinance transferring the work of plumbing inspection to the Department of Environmental Health.

Council granted a request of Charles Conrad to rent additional space at the so-called Roamer Boat building. The request was for an additional 3,000 square feet at a rental rate of \$125 a month.

Council accepted an easement across private property for a sanitary sewer between 33rd and 34th Sts. just west of Central Ave.

A petition for water service in 112th Ave. from American Legion Country Club driveway south to Harvard Dr. was referred to the city manager.

Petitions from residents requesting more adequate street lighting on Harvard and Hope Aves. in Holland Heights, also midblock on 22nd St. between Pine and Maple Aves., were referred to the city manager with power to act.

A letter was read from Harry Frissel, secretary of the Holland Board of Education, thanking City Council for waiving the regular fee for the use of Riverview Park this year by the Holland High football team.

Received without comment was a suggestion from Arthur Seddon for Council consideration on the public schools' financial plight this year, particularly with a view to tax-free Board of Public Works operations, which Seddon figured resulted in a loss to the school system of some \$20,000 to \$35,000 a year. He said he understood that compensation to the city consisted of some \$100,000 a year into the general fund, and he asked if some consideration could be made for the schools now carrying on an austerity program because of inadequate funds.

A letter from the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement Service announced an annual meeting in Lansing Oct. 25 and asked Council to certify two delegates, one an officer and the other a municipal employee to represent the city, also two alternates. Council appointed City Auditor John W. Fonger as officer delegate and Clerk D. W. Schipper as alternate, and authorized the clerk to conduct an election by the employees for an employee delegate and alternate.

Council granted permission to the Holland Band and Orchestra Boosters Club to conduct a sale of booster tags in Holland the night of Oct. 12 and on Oct. 13. Permission also was granted for a short parade in the downtown area Oct. 12.

Permission also was granted the Greater Holland United Fund to place a temporary banner on the front of the John Good building and to place cardboard posters on light pole brackets as well as erecting a 12-foot three-sided thermometer around the light pole in front of the Good building.

A letter from Elizabeth Van De in the name of the city of Holland Veere Boeks concerning a change was ordered filed.

## Group Reports On Assistance To Schools

Progress reports were given and discussed at a monthly meeting of the Committee on Educational Assistance Monday in Herrick Public Library.

Mrs. Paul McIlwain reported on work of the education committee in four areas—teaching principals, enrichment programs, practice teachers and the elementary school coordinator. The committee had proposed that all elementary principals teach part time, that qualified volunteers supplement the elementary school program during the financial emergency and that the coordinator be reinstated in the elementary schools.

Solution to these problems have been met in giving four principals half-day substitutes, and setting up volunteer programs in music, art, physical education and libraries. The practice teaching program has been reinstated with Hope College sharing financially to a greater degree.

Kenneth Kooker, reporting for the buildings and grounds committee, said objectives of the committee are to study buildings and grounds problems and to assist with securing professional help and advice wherever possible, also to gather facts and thereby answer questions brought up in the community.

Kooker discussed a study of water situations at the new high school and fieldhouse, and said the drainage should give no trouble during normal rainfall. In the future, the committee will review plans of new construction and meet with the school board on committee findings.

Robert Mills, reporting for the structures committee, said the group is studying the organizational structure of the school system and responsibilities of each administrative position with a view to recommending specific operating procedures for all levels of administration within the system.

Mills said progress to date includes formalizing the constitution and by-laws for the Committee on Educational Assistance, making original organization charts of the Board of Education and the Committee on Educational Assistance. The committee will send members to attend various committee meetings of the board.

The communications committee reported holding several meetings to review the general situation. There was no report from the finance committee.

## Christian Schools Okay Top Budget

Auditorium-Gymnasium Proposed as School Activities Center

The adoption of a record \$670,577 budget featured the business of the annual meeting of the Holland Christian School society held Monday night in the high school gymnasium.

The figure is approximately \$14,000 higher than the budget of last year, Russel Fredricks, chairman of the finance committee, reported. On the income side of the budget, the new figure calls for an expected \$466,000 from tuition and \$105,000 from the Sustaining Membership Plan. The rest of the anticipated income is expected from churches, school societies and other donating groups.

On the disbursement side of the budget, the biggest single item is the \$465,450 for instructional expense. Also included are \$33,700 for administration, \$39,000 for school plant operation, \$10,000 for maintenance of plants, \$27,327 for fixed charges and other smaller items. Again this year as in the last few years, \$65,000 is set aside for debt reduction.

Alvin Brouwer, general fund treasurer, gave the financial report for the past school year. He reported that \$679,384.90 had been collected during the past year, with \$462,898.07 coming from tuition. The SMP raised \$95,713.78. Various other incomes accounted for the complete receipts figure.

The largest disbursement item was \$444,838.33 for instructional expenses. Some of the other disbursement figures were \$29,675.01 for administration, \$56,890.69 for operation of plants and \$14,942.37 for maintenance of plants and \$65,000 debt reduction.

Gerald Appledorn gave the building fund report, showing receipts during the past year of \$92,854.32 and disbursements of \$85,931.31. The report showed a total indebtedness of the whole school system of \$354,555. Donald Blauw, chairman of the building committee reported, and the society gave approval to purchase a lot adjacent to the South Side school property for playground purposes.

In other action, the society approved a board resolution that a fund be established for the ultimate erection of an all School Activities Center. In addition to serving as a new auditorium-gymnasium, many other school activities were expected to benefit from the erection of such a building. William Vogelzang, chairman of the planning committee reported. It was pointed out in the resolution that the construction of the proposed center is to be considered when school indebtedness has been sufficiently reduced to warrant such an expenditure. It was also reported that the erection of the center would result from Society approval of a board proposal at such a time when the board felt it was desirable to proceed.

Some of the educational activities planned for the new center were high school chapel and assemblies; musical programs; elementary school programs; high school dramatics and forensics; physical education, intramural sports and practice facilities for school teams in many sports on all levels.

Uses for the present gymnasium were listed including lunch room space as well as storage of equipment and supplies.

Supt. Mark Vander Ark presented his first annual report which he read to the society. He grouped the report under five headings, educational, financial, planning, buildings and grounds and promotion. Under each heading, he listed accomplishments and objectives for the future.

Vander Ark reported on the emphasis of the school for two-way curriculum planning. The administration is organized to assure cooperation and uniformity in approach by the teachers of each grade level and division in the several schools. Under the leadership of subject-area specialists in the high school, the school system is in a position to analyze critically its offerings in each subject from primary through high school.

Vander Ark pointed out the increasing strength of financial support arising out of the Sustaining Membership Plan. By identifying membership in the School Society with a commitment for financial support, it is possible to keep compulsory tuition at a minimum.

"Long range planning for Holland Christian Schools," the superintendent reported, "shows an expected tapering off of the rapid elementary growth that has resulted during the past 15 years from new families coming in from the communities outside of Holland. The school must think of a possible central junior high school. An experiment in use of church facilities for the day school is being carried on presently at Holland Heights," he said.

He reported that the school now has its own addressograph to improve its mailing service. He observed that promotional activity is now handled by a separate committee of the board. He concluded by reminding the Society that though years come and go

## Council Hopes to Obtain Federal Aid for Windmill

### Time Running Short for Race Track

GRAND HAVEN—Time is running out for the promoters for the Nunica horse racing track to get in an application to the state in time for the harness racing season of 1963.

The application must be in by Nov. 1 and the state racing commissioner, Edgar Hayes, Detroit, said Monday that the two North Ottawans representing the Beacon Development Co. have not contacted Hayes.

"It takes a lot of financial backing to satisfy the state before a track license is approved," Hayes said. The last new track approved was in 1950.

The state's interest in financing a track is to assure that no gangster element is involved in the financing and that the financing is "sound."

Two licenses must be obtained to operate a pari-mutuel track in Michigan, one for operation of a track and the other for holding meets.

Weeks of investigation are held after an application for a license is made, he said. "It would be almost impossible," he said, "to complete these by Dec. 15, if an application is not received by the Nov. 1 deadline."

There has been much opposition to the establishment of a track at Nunica, mainly from church organizations in Ottawa County.

## Texan Stops In Holland On Bike Trip

A 59-year-old Texan bicyclist stopped Saturday at a Holland restaurant on the US-31 bypass while enroute from Sault Ste. Marie to Naples, Fla.

Complete with beard and tennison hat, Bazor started his trip from Amarillo, Texas and pedaled to the Soo. He plans to find work in Naples, Fla., located on US-41 on the west coast of southern Florida.

Bazor told persons at the restaurant where he stopped to eat and to visit the Wooden Shoe factory he was taking the trip on doctor's orders.

He said he had not ridden a bicycle since he was a boy. Bazor was born on a ranch outside Amarillo, Texas and will return to Texas next spring. He tends 2,000 cattle a year.

Bazor camps along the road and has a sleeping bag and small camp stove tied on to the bicycle. He said he averages 50 to 75 miles a day and seldom stops at restaurants because he has limited funds.

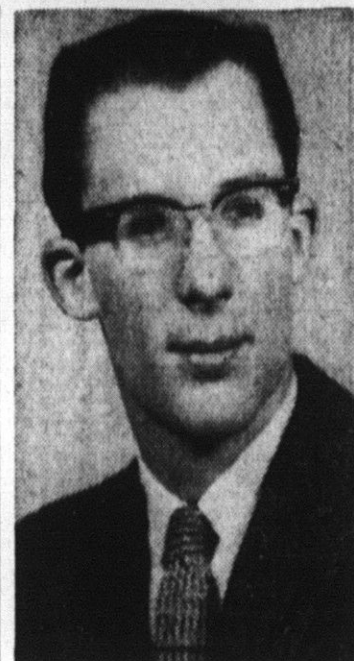

## Borculo Boy Struck Down Near Home

**Kalvin Haveman Dies Of Broken Neck; Set Confab With Prosecutor**

BORCULO — A six-year-old boy was dead on arrival at Zeeland Hospital Friday afternoon after he was struck by a car in front of his home on 96th Ave., just north of Borculo, at 3:40 p.m.

The victim was Calvin Dale Haveman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Haveman of 6659 96th Ave., route 1, Zeeland.

Officials at Zeeland Hospital said death was due to a broken neck and other fractures.

Ottawa County deputies identified the driver of the car as Jack L. de Witt, 19, of route 1, Zeeland.

Deputies said de Witt was driving south on 96th Ave., and the child was crossing 96th Ave. from east to west in front of his home. He was returning from the Borculo Christian School, where he was in the first grade.

Officers said skid marks at the scene measured 84 feet from the point where de Witt applied his brakes, and another 30 feet beyond the point of impact.

After striking the boy, the car swerved into the ditch on the west side of the road, and overturned end-over-end, landing on its top, deputies said. De Witt escaped injury in the crash, but the 1962 car was heavily damaged.

The child's body was thrown 81 feet from the point of impact, into the ditch on the west side of the road, deputies said. A lunch box the youngster had been carrying landed 31 feet from the collision point, near the middle of the road.

De Witt told officers he was traveling 35 miles per hour at the time of the accident. The posted speed limit in the area is 35.

Deputies said they would confer Monday with county prosecutor James W. Bussard, on possible charges against de Witt. They continued their investigation today.

With City Council adopting plans to seek federal aid in financing "Project Windmill" and approving a lease-option to purchase the so-called Hyma island in Black River, Holland's plan to obtain an authentic Dutch windmill on the shores of Black River seemed a big step nearer reality today.

A further encouraging note was the announcement to City Council Wednesday night by Henry S. Maentz, a member of the mayor's "Project Windmill" committee, that Willard C. Wichers, who has been spending close to two months in the Netherlands, has located three available windmills and is negotiating for one he thinks is suitable.

City Council approved plans to seek financial aid from the federal government which has authorized the Public Facilities Acceleration Act of 1962 which makes available up to \$90,000,000 for grants to eligible localities in Michigan for approved projects on a 50 per cent matching basis. The local area is eligible for such grants.

In explaining the availability of federal aid on a 50 per cent matching basis, City Manager Herb Holt's letter also revealed that the city is authorized by state law to sell revenue bonds to finance the matching portion of the project. These revenue bonds, if not purchased by individuals, can be purchased by the federal government at not more than 4 per cent. Thus, the possibility appears that the entire project can be financed through the use of existing and presently allocated federal funds, Holt's message read.

In working toward reality, Council approved the city manager's recommendation to retain the services of the architectural firm of Kammeraad and Stroop of Holland as prime consulting engineers for the windmill project and that the firm be authorized to proceed with the planning and engineering necessary

## Local Man Hosts Group Touring New Academy

(Editor's Note: This is the third part of a report on the "Educator Airlift," a tour of the U. S. Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, Colo., made by several educators from this and other areas of Michigan. From this area making the tour were Raymond Holwerda, principal of Holland Christian High School, Lloyd Van Raalte, superintendent of the West Ottawa Schools, Donald Gebrard, vocational director of Holland High School and Bill Butler Jr., representing The Sentinel.)

At the close of our morning briefing sessions, we were joined by Capt. Gerald J. Naber, Air Officer Commanding the 20th Cadet Squadron at the Academy. Capt. Naber, a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy, and a career officer, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arend Naber of Holland. Capt. Naber was once a student of principal Holwerda's so it was a student-teacher reunion.

Capt. Naber is also the brother of Sgts. Ray Naber and Roger Naber, full-time unit administrators for Holland's National Guard Company D.

We stepped outside and watched the cadets forming for the march to the mess hall. The thick cloud obscured everything in sight, and the marching cadets seemed like phantom soldiers.

Capt. Naber and his attractive wife Ruth, joined us for lunch at the Officers Club. A drizzling rain began to cause the cloud to move on, making parts of the Academy skyline visible for the first time. After lunch we returned to our tour bus and began an extensive inspection of the physical facilities of the Academy. Fairchild Hall, the academic building, was the first stop on our tour. We walked through several complexes of well-equipped classrooms and laboratories, and looked at their closed circuit television hookup which is used for reading and study improvement.

The classrooms are small, and class sections are maintained at a size convenient for discussion. Additional instruction help and tutorial assistance from instructors and cadets is available. About twenty per cent of the faculty have doctorates and 97 per cent have Masters degrees.

Faculty-student relationships are fostered through a program of informal after class activities where professors invite cadets to their homes, and cadets invite faculty to join them for meals.

Faculty members are chosen for their teaching ability and knowledge of the subject matter, integrity, motivation and character. Qualities of leadership are especially important as their actions serve as examples to cadets.

Next on our tour was a visit to the cadet gymnasium. Two swimming pools, several gyms, and intramural playing fields complete the complex. The Academy lacks an indoor track and field house, but these may be included in the facilities at a later date.

We also visited the visitors information center and Academy museum located near the south entrance to the Academy grounds. The museum contains historic exhibits and a gallery of distinguished Air Force leaders.

A quick look at the impressive cadet dining hall and a tour of Falcon stadium completed our Academy tour. Members of the Academy staff hosted the group at an Officers Club reception Thursday evening.

Build along the contours of a natural bowl, at 6,600 feet altitude is the Academy playing field in the sky, Falcon Stadium. Most recently completed, the new \$3.5 million, 40,000 seat stadium was filled to capacity for the first game last Saturday. The Air Force team trounced Colorado State University with a 34-0 victory to inaugurate the field.

Parking is on several levels, and no fan walks any more than 28 rows from the aisles. Little or no climbing is required to get to the entrances to the stadium at various levels. 30,000 of the stadium's 40,783 seats are on the west side. All have an unobstructed view of the entire playing field. There are a few seats behind the end zone, but none of these are level with the playing field.

The parking lots will accommodate 8,500 cars, 300 buses and there is a four lane highway leading to the stadium. The stadium was completely financed by public subscriptions, with \$2,186,248 coming from Air Force personnel.

We returned to our quarters in time for changing our shoes and proceeding on to the Officers Club reception before eating our evening meal in the cadet dining hall.

Our program of activities at the Academy was under the able direction of Major Philip S. Porter, Special Assistant to the Superintendent. Major Porter answered hundreds of questions, and always maintained a genial smile as he shepherded us on our way.

Arrangements for the Holland group to eat with the cadets were made by Capt. Naber, and we ate with cadets from his squadron. The large dining hall accommodates the entire Cadet Wing in one sitting. Food is efficiently served by stewards who have the first course waiting for cadets when they are seated.

The menu included chicken caecitose, spaghetti carrouso, an anti-pasto appetizer tray, green beans with mushrooms, plenty of milk, bread, and a chocolate apple cake for dessert. At this pace, cadets stow away some 5,000 calories per day, with an average of 35 minutes "contact with food" at each meal.

After dinner, we visited Vandenberg Hall the quarter-mile long cadet dormitory building. Cadets are housed two to a room in the 1,320 room building.

We also looked at the office which Capt. Naber maintains, with an assistant, in the dormitory, which serves as his headquarters for the squadron.

A brief tour of the commissary complex, which contains all of the conveniences of a shopping center for Air Force personnel completed our tour. We then visited with the Nabers in their pleasant quarters located in one of the nearby valleys, close to the Academy.

Our tour concluded in the morning, with a fast drive past the Academy buildings with time for picture stops, as the great cloud of fog had finally lifted.

The trip back to Grand Rapids, with a brief stop at Oufitt, Neb. for refueling was made in good time. We arrived in Grand Rapids about 7 p.m. EST, tired, but much impressed with one of the most exciting new educational institutions to be developed in this decade.

## Bid Opening Set On I-96 Freeway

LANSING — The State Highway Department will open bids Oct. 10 on 5.6 miles of 1-96 freeway in Holland city and south toward Saugatuck, all in Allegan county. This project includes an interchange on the present US-31 in the vicinity of the present business route junction, and overpasses on the north-south Graafschap Rd. and at 64th St., an east-west road near which the Howard Johnson restaurant is located.

The new freeway will connect with the four-lane highway which presently by-passes the core of Holland city to the east.

With this contract, 37 miles of the \$30 million Benton Harbor-to-Holland freeway will be under construction. The remaining five-mile gap at Saugatuck will be placed under contract later this year and the entire 42-mile freeway is scheduled to be opened to traffic in late 1963 or early 1964.

Other projects on which bids will be opened Oct. 10 follow:

—Preliminary work on the Edsel Ford freeway at 8-Mile Rd. in Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores.

—The first contract of US-25 (Gratiot Ave.) one-way street system in Mt. Clemens.

—Modernization of M-239 (LaPorte Rd.) near New Buffalo in Berrien County.

—Twelve miles of modernization on M-32 in Lenawee county.

—More than 32 miles of paving on other highways throughout the lower peninsula.

These projects will cost an estimated \$7.6 million. Right-of-way and engineering costs on the 11 projects will bring the total cost to \$8.5 million.

## Work Planned On Harbor

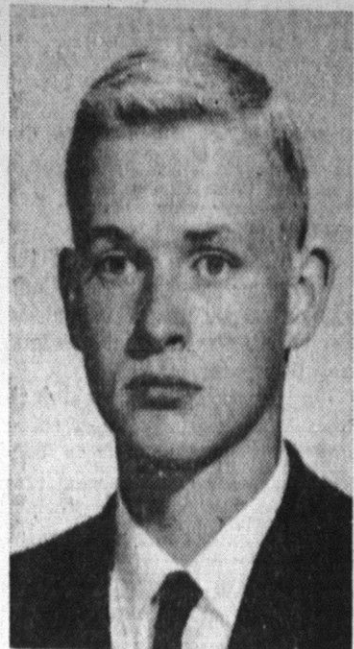

Last year Holland Christian had three enter the finalist stage with Esther Timmer being named a National Merit Scholar.

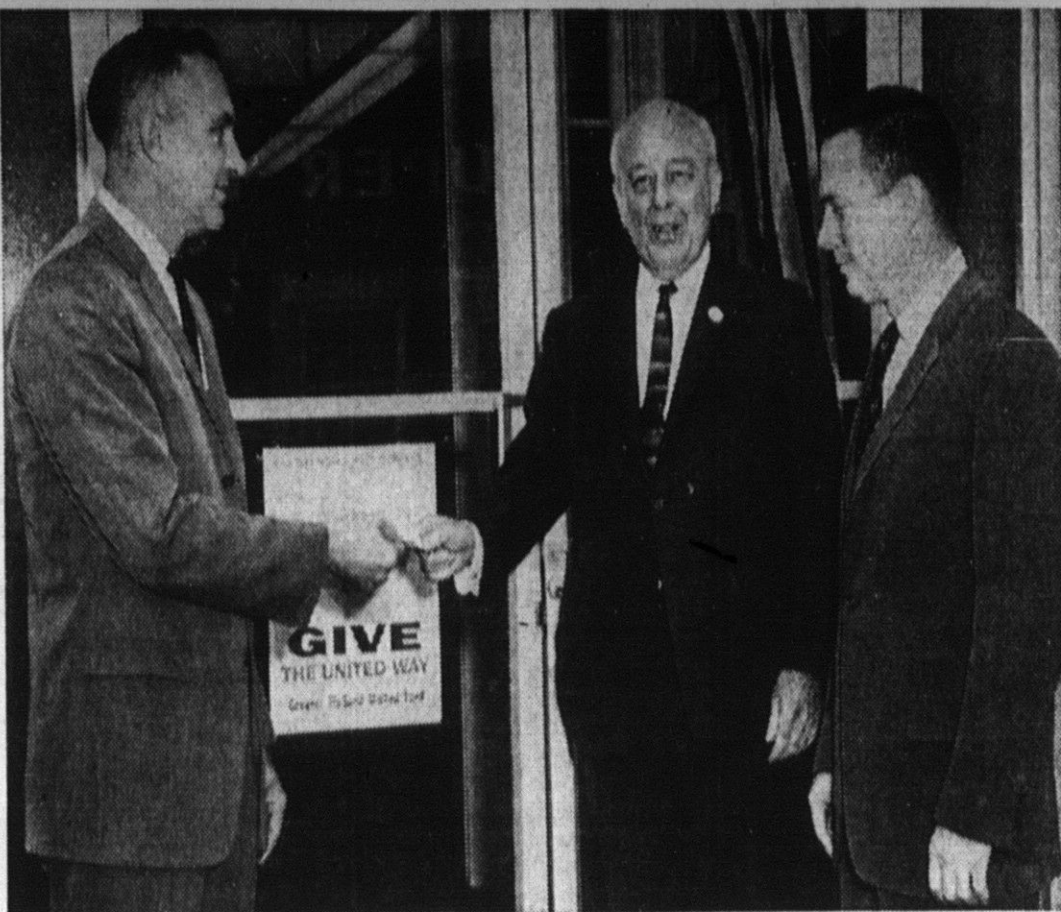

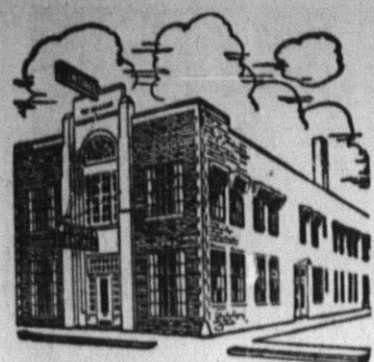

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, September 30  
John Heralds The Christ  
Luke 3:2-6, 15-18  
By C. P. Dame

This lesson on John the Baptist is the last of the quarter. It tells us about an Old Testament prophet whose ministry is told in the New Testament. For four hundred years no prophetic voice had been heard in the land. No wonder that the coming and preaching of John—all four gospels tell about him—evoked much talk and speculation.

I. God's Word stirs people to action. Luke the historian informs us when the word of the Lord came to John the Baptist and those who were the political and ecclesiastical leaders. In the eyes of people these leaders were the prominent people but God thought more of the Baptist the son of Zacharias, a priest and his wife Elizabeth who was from a priestly family. Both parents were "righteous before God, walking in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord, blameless." John came from a godly family. In addition to the family training he was also schooled in the wilderness.

The Bible tells us that God raised up prophets for a special time and need. This was true of the Baptist. After John had received a message from God he began to preach—to deliver the message he had received. All the prophets preached because they had received a message from God for their times. John preached "the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins." The prophets of the past stressed repentance constantly. John baptized people who repented. To repent means to change the mind.

II. Some people respond to God's call. John preached because he had received a message from God. Great numbers of people went into the wilderness to hear John preach. His preaching was the fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah 40:3-5. It was the mission of John to prepare the people for the coming of the Lord. The coming of the people revealed interest and concern. The people who came were religious but their religion did not please God. The Jews thought that since they were descendants of Abraham all was well. John demanded that the people bring forth fruits worthy of repentance. The people asked John "What shall we do then?" John had answer for every one. He told all who had enough to share with others to do so. To the tax collectors he said that they should collect no more than was appointed them and to the soldiers he said that they should rob no one, make no false accusation and be content with their wages. Note that all were to remain at their work but to be honest in it. Our age needs to hear this truth.

III. People easily forget the fact of God's judgment. Some of John's hearers wondered whether he was the Christ. He told them he was not. He pointed out the difference between the coming Messiah and him. He could only baptize with water but the Messiah would baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire and change human nature, which he could not do. Like all the prophets John spoke of the coming judgment. He used a rural figure of speech. In his day farmers threw chaff, straw and grain up in the air with a fork. The wind blew the chaff and straw away but the grain dropped to the threshing floor. God would separate the wicked from the righteous in the coming judgment.

We will remember John the Baptist for his holy living, for his stirring preaching, for heralding the coming of the Messiah and for his loyalty to God which cost him his life. Is preaching on repentance necessary today?

## Grand Haven Aims for New Junior High

GRAND HAVEN — The Grand Haven Community School District Board of Education Tuesday night set up a series of tentative target dates in connection with the proposed construction of a new junior high school building and other buildings.

The board has been studying the building program, including a junior high building with a capacity of 1,200 students, for the past two years with the aid of a large citizens advisory committee.

Several important steps were taken at the meeting, including the signing of contract with Vander Meiden and Koteles, Grand Haven architects, who will supervise the plans. The architects will meet with groups of teachers, administrators and board members in the near future.

In addition to the junior high unit, tentative plans call for the erection of a new elementary building on Robbins Rd., a new neighborhood elementary building on North Sixth St., an addition to Mary A. White School and remodeling of the present junior high school into an elementary building.

By Nov. 6 the board hopes to arrive at the settlement of the site location for the new junior high school. The site problem has been studied for two years by the board, the architects and the city planning commission.

The board plans to have other steps completed so that the bond program may be submitted to the voters in the district sometime next spring.

## Outside Land Sales Watched In Michigan

LANSING (UPI)—Sales of land in other states and counties will be watched closely by Michigan officials, Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley said today.

Kelley said his office and the Corporation and Securities Commission is joining "a nationwide war on interstate and international land fraud schemes."

The attorney general said incidents of improperly represented land sales have been on a constant increase in Michigan recently.

He cited the denial of a request for state license by the Cherokee Village Development Co., Inc., as an example of the activities considered improper by state officials.

The firm attempted to sell lots in Hardy, Ark., through a booth at the Iowa Free Fair last month although it had no license to sell real estate here.

Kelley said an investigation of the firm's booth activities disclosed a "free vacation" offer was not being given in the way it was represented.

The company asked persons to write their names on a slip of paper and insert it in a box. A free vacation to Hardy, Ark., was to be given to the persons whose names were drawn from the box.

Kelley said the box was constructed so an operator was able to sort out the names of persons he considered a good prospect for a land sale. Once the person took the "free vacation" to see the lot he had "won" he was pressured to purchase a more expensive lot because the first was in poor condition and undeveloped.

The attorney general said he planned to send a representative to San Francisco Oct. 1-2 to a national conference on interstate land sales. The purpose of the conference was to provide a joint effort by state officials to combat land fraud schemes.

## Crusaders Score Seven Touchdowns

Valparaiso University's football team smashed Hope College, 48-0 here Saturday night before 4,500 fans in Riverview Park.

It was Coach Russ De Vette's worst defeat in eight seasons as Hope coach. He lost to Muskingum College, 47-0 in 1960.

The Crusaders, featuring a balanced running and passing attack, scored in every quarter and took advantage of numerous Hope mistakes.

Two of the seven touchdowns were earned on drives while the other five were set up on gifts when the Flying Dutchmen made mistakes.

"One mistake such as a blocked kick, fumble or intercepted pass is enough to beat you in a game and we made them all in one game, some more than once," De Vette said.

A 41-yard pass play from Dave Pohlman to Howard Porchinsky capped a 91-yard nine-play drive in the first quarter for the initial tally. Pohlman ran a rollout for the two points.

End Jim Hefferman blocked his second punt of the game in the second period on the Hope 25 and downed the ball on the 10. Two plays later Porchinsky scooted around end six yards to score. Mike Sullivan converted.

Later in the period, Hope punter Ken Quakkelaar got the boot away but Rick Willer took a lateral on the play and scampered 55 yards to score as several Dutchmen slid off his hips. A bad pass from center prevented the conversion.

Valparaiso's second drive began on the Hope 44. Dave Laas sneaked the final yard 10 plays later. The drive was stymied three times by 15-yard penalties against the winners for holding, clipping and illegal use of the hands. A pass play failed and the Crusaders led 27-0 at half.

Andy Hendrickson recovered B1 Keur's fumble of a punt on the Hope and in six plays Pohlman was home, sneaking the final yard. Sullivan converted to make the score 34-0 at the third quarter's close.

Don Clausen intercepted a pass on the Hope 47 and returned to the Dutch 19 early in the fourth period. Harold Semrock cracked tackle for the final four yards four plays later and Sullivan converted.

Hope's Lynn Allen fumbled a Valparaiso punt on his own 16 in the closing seconds. The winners recovered and Pohlman pitched a 16-yard pass to Semrock. Sullivan converted.

The Flying Dutchmen were in Crusader territory only once and that was late in the fourth quarter when a brief drive put them on the 24 but they failed to make a first down.

Hope was held to a net three yards rushing and only the brief offensive spurt, that included a 20-yard run by Jim Bekkering, kept them away from negative yardage. The Dutchmen gained 88 yards in the air.

Led by Tyrone Smith, the Crusaders defense was outstanding. Offensively, the winners pounded out 420 yards, 231 rushing and 189 passing.

Hope, now 1-1, plays at Wheaton College next Saturday night. Valparaiso now is 1-0. Wheaton beat Illinois Wesleyan, 33-14 Saturday.

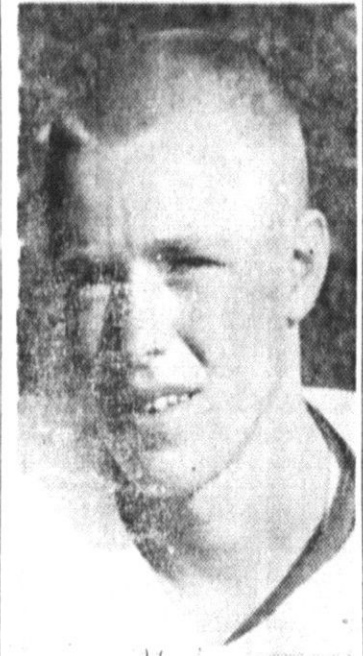
It marked Holland's initial win this season and its first in LMAC history since the Dutch dropped four league contests in 1961.

## Netherlands Diplomat Dies at 65

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands —Funeral services were held here Wednesday for Dr. J. B. V. M. J. van de Mortel, 65, Netherlands consul-general at Chicago from 1947 to 1958, who died Saturday in an Amsterdam hospital after a brief illness.

Dr. van de Mortel visited Holland, Mich., on many occasions during his Chicago assignment, often during Tulip Time and was photographed widely scrubbing Holland streets with Michigan's governor. He also was in Holland on the occasion of Her Majesty Queen Juliana's visit in 1952.

In 1958 he became consul-general of The Netherlands in Antwerp, Belgium, and was serving in that capacity at time of his death. Two years ago in 1960 he paid a personal visit to Willard C. Wich-



Dr. J. B. V. M. J. van de Mortel, midwestern director of the Netherlands Information Service, in Holland, Mich., and on that occasion Holland City Council passed a resolution expressing appreciation and friendship for Dr. van de Mortel.

He was an officer in the Order of Orange Nassau in which several Holland persons also hold membership.

Dr. van de Mortel was appointed burgomaster of Noordwijk in 1929 and served in that capacity until 1943 when he was forced to flee from the Germans. He returned to his post in Noordwijk in 1945 and entered the services of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1946 and was sent to Washington. Later the same year he became Netherlands consul-general at Chicago.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Vincent Brandt of Overveen, The Netherlands; a son, John Hein, first secretary of the Netherlands Embassy at Mexico City, and his mother, Mrs. Cecile van de Mortel of Middelbeers, The Netherlands.

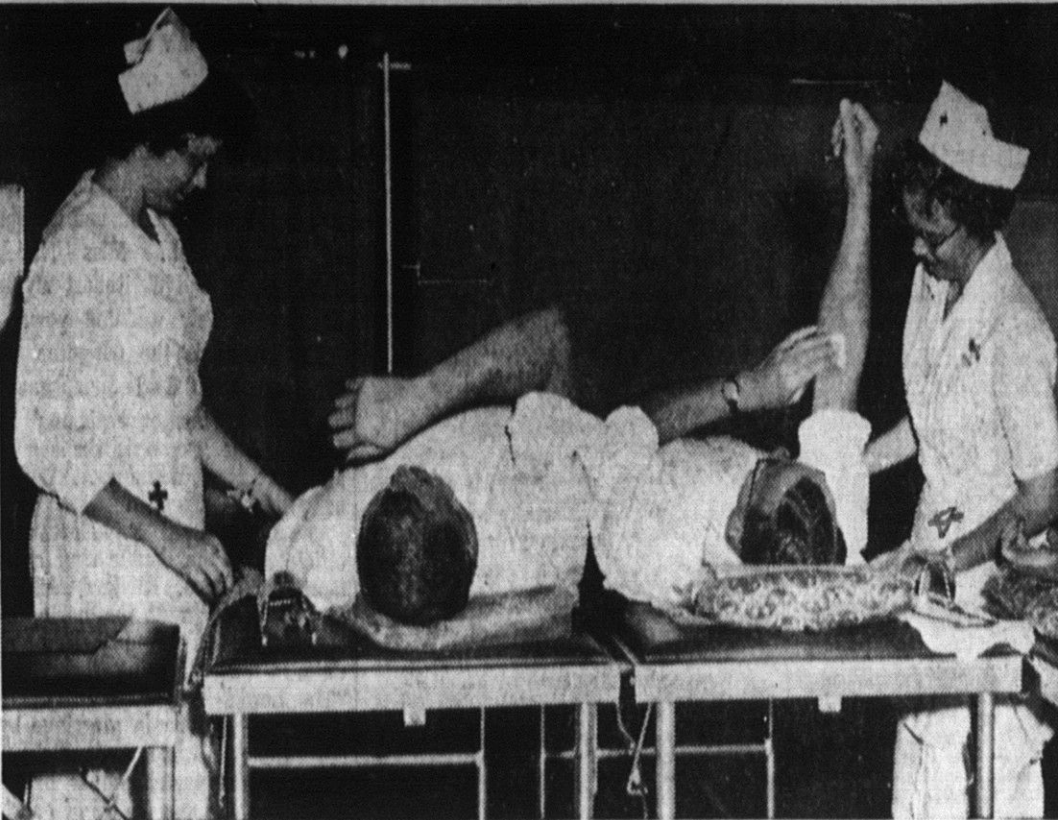

## Zeeland Working to Resolve Pipeline Issues in Township

ZEELAND—Zeeland City Council has been working with leaders of Holland Township in an effort to obtain township consent for laying a water pipeline across township property. Zeeland city has contracted with Holland City to purchase water at off-peak periods. Zeeland to pay all costs of laying the pipeline and operating its own distribution system.

Holland Township has refused permission to lay the pipe on the grounds Holland City had not fulfilled certain alleged commitments for the sale of water some years ago, and Zeeland Council is working with township leaders on an agreement whereby the pipeline project may proceed without further delay.

One of the main issues is a request for fire hydrants along the transmission line in the township, but Zeeland leaders have pointed out since it is purchasing water during off peak periods from 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. it could hardly assume responsibility for fire protection. However, if not too costly, Zeeland would be agreeable to include the hydrant installation.

Other questions concern water service to township residents currently supplied by Zeeland City, water rates and future policies. Zeeland has said it will continue to sell water to present township customers and that charter provisions will be followed in establishing uniform and reasonable rates. Future policies would conform to future amendments in the contract with Holland.

Meanwhile, the water committee of the Council and the water committee of the Board of Public Works are negotiating with the township board to resolve the issues.

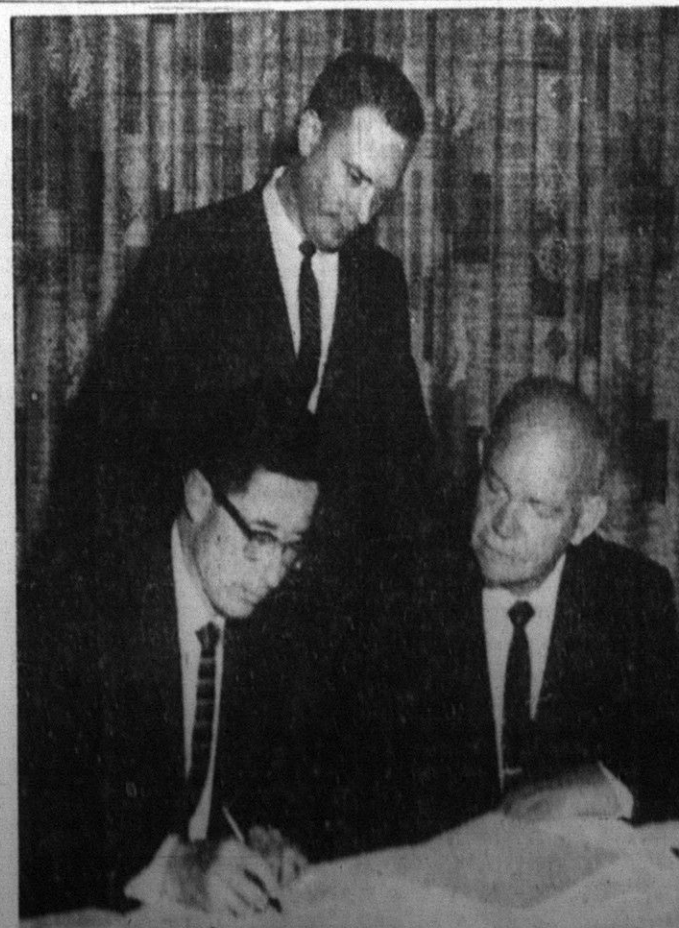
