## Walls Toppled By High Winds

Winds which gusted up to an estimated 45 miles per hour blew down a cement-block wall on a new addition at the Northern Fiber Products Co. plant at 233 West Washington Ave., Zeeland, between 8:30 and 9 p.m. Wednesday. Only light wind damage was reported elsewhere in the Holland area.

About 100 feet of the 180-foot wall being constructed for the company by Elzinga - Volkers Inc. was toppled. A spokesman for Elzinga-Volkers Inc. said that the 15-foot high wall fell down after the wall's backing was blown loose. No estimate of the damages was immediately available.

Ray Reidsma, manager of the Board of Public Works office, reported that two lines were blown down by wind gusts last night. A primary utility line in the Waukazoo area and a secondary line near Eighth St. and Central Ave. were knocked down about 8:30 p.m. BPW crews had the wires repaired in about a half hour.

Holland police reported that there were tree limbs down in the 100 block of 23rd St., near 35th St. and Columbia Ave. and on Van Raalte Ave. Ottawa County sheriff's deputies removed a branch from Lakeshore Dr. near the Consumer Power Plant in Port Sheldon.

Michigan Bell Telephone Co. reported a few service calls in the Port Sheldon area, and Consumers Power Co. reported no damages.

The Holland Coast guard station estimated that the winds gusted as high as 45 miles per hour.

## Red Cross Services Reviewed

Over 9,000 individuals in Ottawa County received one or more of the 17 different services provided by the county chapter of the American Red Cross last year. This fact was brought out at a discussion of the services and programs by Mrs. J. C. Van Valkenburgh, Red Cross executive director, at Monday noon's meeting of the Holland Optimists Club.

Mrs. Van Valkenburgh was introduced by the Rev. William C. Hillegonds, pastor of Hope Reformed Church and chairman of the speakers bureau of this fall's Greater Holland United Fund - Red Cross campaign.

Included in the services to over 9,000 individuals Mrs. Van Valkenburgh states that services were provided to 382 active service men or their families. Eight hundred veteran's claims and services were also processed.

Over 2,400 pints of blood were provided to a total of 718 persons residing in Ottawa County entirely on a free basis, the only charge being the hospital cost of processing and administering to the patient.

Water Safety and First Aid training and educational programs were participated in by more than 4,000 persons while 2,210 volunteers on a weekly basis actively participated in services provided by the Gray Ladies, nurses aids, disaster relief workers, and doctors and nurses through their time volunteered to the blood program.

Rev. Hillegonds pointed out that the UF speaker's bureau can provide speaker's for club and organization meetings as well as for individual firm employee's "kickoff" meetings. These programs can be limited to 15 minutes. A six minute sound film is also available.

## Group Loses Pipeline Case

GRAND HAVEN — Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith Thursday ruled against five Park Township property owners in Ottawa County who are opposing location of a lakeshore pumping station for the \$16 million Wyoming City - Lake Michigan water pipeline project.

The plaintiffs, whose properties are near the proposed pumping station location, have 20 days to appeal Smith's ruling.

The Wyoming City Commission this week sold general obligation and revenue bonds for the project.

The property owners objected and filed suit after the Park Township Board granted zoning approval for the pumping station. The plaintiffs contended the board exceeded its power in granting the permission to build the pumping station in the township since other locations might have been found.

## Enrollment At Zeeland Lists 1,587

ZEELAND — Although official enrollments will have to wait until the fourth Friday after Labor day, the enrollment of the two elementary schools and the Junior and Senior high schools stand at 1,587 or 103 more than the 1,484 recorded last year.

Enrollment by schools: Lincoln 438; Roosevelt, 268; totals for the elementary is 706 students. Junior High 183; Senior high 698.

Enrollment by grades follows: Kindergarten, 104; first grade, 99; second grade, 102; third grade, 115; fourth grade, 102; fifth grade, 86; sixth grade, 90; seventh grade, 90; eighth grade, 93; ninth grade, 180; tenth grade, 176; 11th grade, 162; 12th grade, 180; and special education 8; total, 1,587.

The high school enrollment is up by 49 students; junior high by 3; and the elementary by 51 students. This is from the recorded figures over last years enrollment.

The elementary schools have 26 teachers and the junior-senior high has 41 teachers. Julius Schipper is superintendent, LaVerne Lampen, Senior High principal; Raymond Brummel, Junior High principal; Cornelius Hoezee, Elementary principal.

The Zeeland Board of Education includes Richard Machiele, president; Dr. H. Russell Munro, vice president; Elmer Hartgerink, secretary; Dr. Alfred J. Vander Waas, treasurer; Melvin Baron, Hugh De Pree, and Marvin De Witt, trustee.

## Assessment Rolls Okayed By Council

City Council Wednesday night approved special assessment rolls for 11 water main projects completed this summer and 10 sanitary sewer projects, as well as a special assessment for a new Wildwood drain.

A few objections were voiced, but these situations were clarified, particularly for one person who sought a 30-day extension in paying the full bill. He was advised that interest does not accrue until Dec. 1, and payments in full could be made at any time until then.

There was more discussion on a report of a water main project in East 16th St. from Hope Ave. to Waverly Rd. This has been requested some five weeks ago but at the public hearing three weeks ago, a property owner with 1,000 feet of frontage voiced objections and the matter was referred to the Board of Public Works for study.

The board in a report recommended that the project be put in under the alternate procedure (no assessments paid until hookup) and that the project be installed next year. Another property owner protested that his need for water is critical and he needs help now. Council finally decided to instruct the Board of Public Works to work out some way, temporary or permanent, to solve this problem.

Ronald Dalman, representing the South Side Swimming Club, protested certain requirements of a proposed new zoning ordinance on open land athletic or recreational use and private swimming pools. Dalman felt that a five-acre requirement for such uses was more than needed, pointing to the 3.9 acres the South Side Club has, and also protested parking restrictions requiring one parking space for every two members. He said the club's parking area of 70 to 75 cars was adequate, whereas under the new ordinance it would require 90.

Dalman explained he was aware the existing club would not come under the new restrictions but he said the club would like to conform to city ordinances, and he said needs for more such areas are growing all the time.

Council referred both ordinances back to the Planning Commission for a additional study.

Another ordinance on allowing the city clerk to issue moving permits for buildings to be moved outside the city, provided he has approval of building inspector, city engineer, superintendent of utilities and park superintendent, was accepted for first reading.

A petition requesting sanitary sewer service in Maple Ave. from 33rd to 35th St., in 35th St. from Maple Ave. to Washington Ave., and on the east side of Washington Ave. from 35th to 40th Sts. was referred to the city manager for study.

William Mokma was granted a permit to move a garage from 430 West 32nd St. to the village of Graafschap. Don Brink Construction Co. was granted a permit to move a garage from Peoples State Bank parking lot to M-40 south of Holland.

Council appointed City Auditor John Fonger as delegate and City Clerk D. W. Schipper as alternate to the annual meeting of the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement system in Lansing Oct. 20. The city clerk also was delegated to conduct an election among city employees to select a municipal employee and an alternate to represent the city at the meeting.

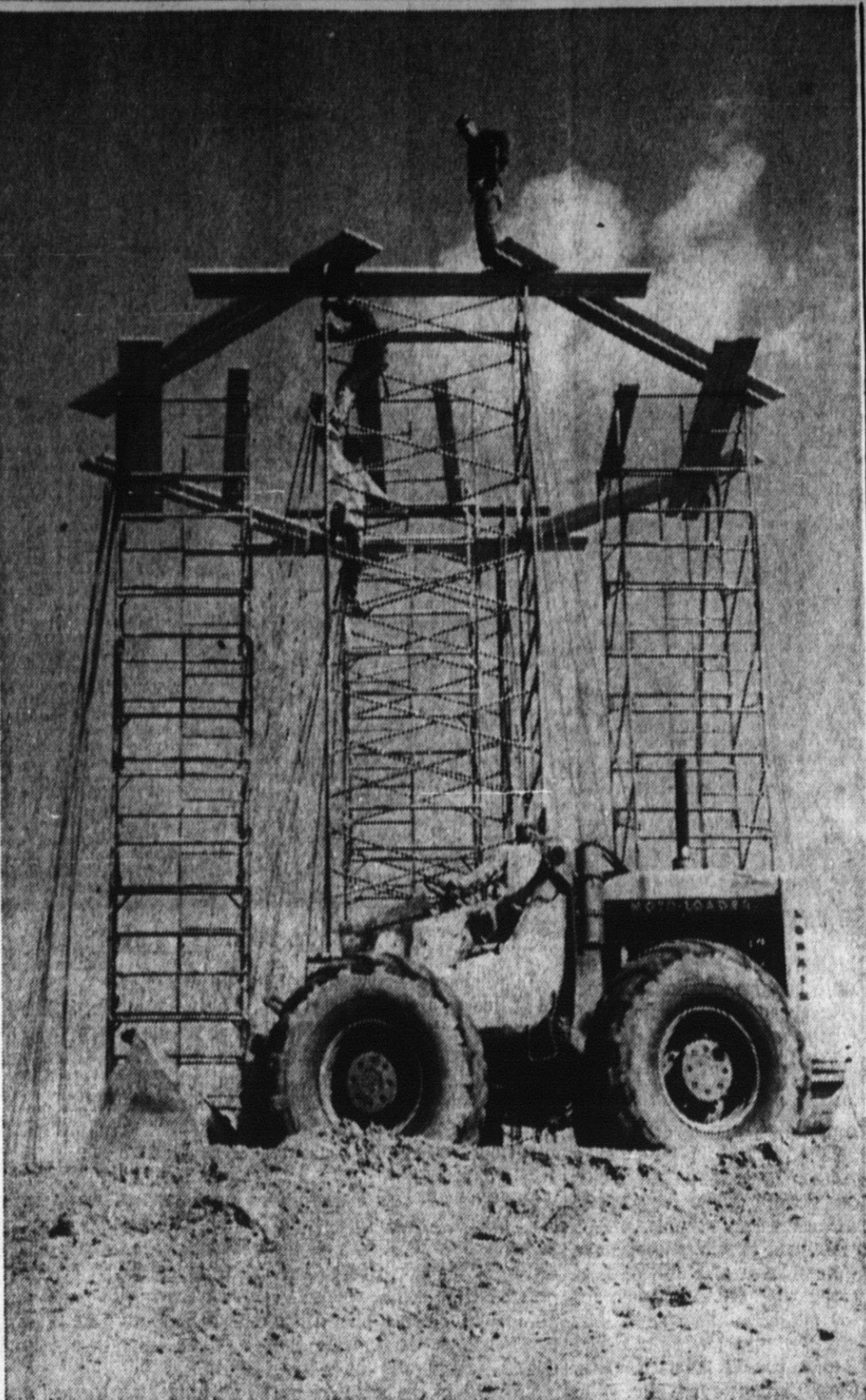
A letter from Disabled American Veterans thanked Council for granting a license to sell forget-me-nots on the street.

In a report on notifying property owners in connection with moving, the city manager recommended that the same procedure used in Board of Appeals public hearings be followed in notifying property owners within 300 feet of the parcel under consideration. Council approved.

Council approved final payment of \$6,034.23 to West Shore Construction Co. representing 15 per cent retained on the 1964 street improvement contract, subject to proper affidavit by contractor that all bills for labor and material have been paid.

Council approved a proposed culvert agreement between the city and Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Kuipers whereby the latter couple agrees to pay half of the cost up to a 36-inch pipe for

## 3,398 Are Enrolled at West Ottawa

Preliminary enrollment figures for West Ottawa school District were presented to the Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

A total of 3,398 students are enrolled from kindergarten through 12th grade, according to Junior High Principal Ed Roberts who reported in the absence of Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte. This includes 182 new students who have moved into the district and 321 kindergartners who are attending school within the district.

By schools the enrollment lists 332 in Beechwood, 294 in Glerum, 333 in Lakewood, 242 in Waukazoo, 286 in Pine Creek, 96 in Ventura, 74 in North Holland, 78 in Waverly, 81 in West Crisp, 60 in Robart, 56 in West Olive, 768 in junior high and 698 in senior high.

The official enrollment count which determines state aid reimbursement will be taken Friday, Oct. 2. After the official audit the final budget for the 1964-65 school year will be submitted by Supt. Van Raalte.

Two special board meetings were scheduled, one on Wednesday, Sept. 23, with Architect Guido Binda to approve plot plans for the proposed north and east elementary schools, and another Sept. 28 with Binda for an inspection and formal acceptance of the newly constructed four-room addition to Lakewood School.

Board President Howard Davis presented a progress report on the centrally located 14-room school under construction off James St. The entire project is on schedule.

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## Dismantled Windmill Has Many Parts

Dismantling a big windmill in the Netherlands involves a lot of parts.

Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Information Service office here received a cablegram from the Netherlands today outlining the size and weights of the dismantled Dutch windmill now in transit to Holland, Mich.

The total shipment amounts to about 60 tons and includes two metal wings 80 feet long weighing three tons each, eight millstones five feet in diameter weighing two tons each, an 18-foot millshaft weighing 4½ tons, 10 42-foot beams weighing 1,400 pounds each, and five 30-foot beams weighing about 1,000 pounds each.

Harvey Buter, chairman of the Holland Common Carriers (trucking firm) is calling a meeting of local carriers Monday noon to arrange for bringing the windmill to Holland from Muskegon where the Prins Willem of the Oranje Lijn will dock.

City Manager Herb Holt said Jan B. Medendorp of the Netherlands, an expert in windmill restoration, will come to Holland to supervise the entire project. He assisted with dismantling the windmill at Vinkel and supervised certain repairs there.

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## United Fund Drive Set In Zeeland

ZEELAND—Kenneth J. Folkertsma, longtime civic leader, will serve as chairman of the 1964 Zeeland United Fund-Red Cross campaign to be conducted here Oct. 12 through 30.

A campaign goal of \$18,991 has been set by the board of directors following a review of agency requests. The amount is slightly more than last year's first United-Red Cross campaign goal of \$18,952, but represents a 40 per cent increase over the 1962 Community goal of \$13,500.

Bruce De Pree, United Fund president, said the 1964 goal represents the needs of eight local agencies including the Ottawa county chapter of the American Red Cross for the second year, plus 37 state and national health and welfare agencies of the Michigan United Fund.

Folkertsma, who is affiliated with Mead Johnson and Co., has served as president and manager of the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce and as district governor of the Lions Club. He said efforts would continue this year to add additional firms to the growing list of those providing a payroll deduction plan for pledges of employees in industrial firms and business establishments.

Payment of pledges throughout the year or over a period of several pay days or months provides individuals the opportunity to subscribe larger amount to the campaign than would be possible from "out of pocket" money, Folkertsma said.

Folkertsma presently is a member of the board of directors of the Leader Dogs for the Blind, one of the 37 Michigan United Fund agencies.

The total includes the following: Boy Scouts, \$1,400; Girl Scouts, \$800; Child Guidance clinic, \$585; Zeeland Youth Center, \$1,400; Salvation Army, \$1,000; Family Service and Michigan Children's Aid Society, \$750; Zeeland Community Hospital, \$4,000; Red Cross, \$4,000; Michigan United Fund, \$3,256; administration and campaign expenses, \$1,000; contingency reserve for unanticipated needs, \$800.

## Rolling Billboards Promote Holland

Holland is receiving nationwide promotion these days through "rolling billboards" on trucks operated by Rooks Transfer Lines and Holland Motor Express.

Trailer ads, extending over 8 by 40-foot sides of the units, display a windmill and the words, "You'd Like it in Holland, Mich.; Wish You Were With Us." The design was developed by Marvin Lindeman and William Murdoch.

Both local trucking firms will have about six units painted in the manner as they arrive from the factory. Some of these units also will be seen on railroad lines when carried "piggy-back." These units will travel an estimated 3,500 miles a month or some 504,000 miles a year.

The idea has been enthusiastically approved by directors of the Holland Economic Development Corp. of which Rosecoe Giles is industrial coordinator.

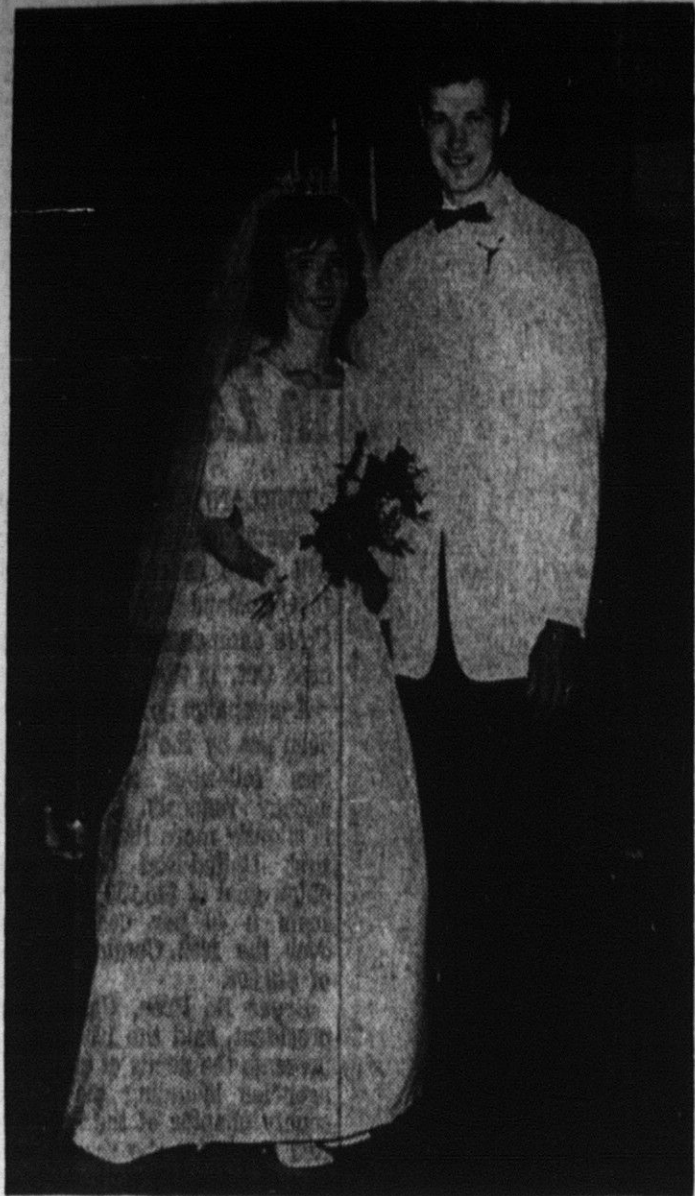
## Graveside Services Held For Burnside Infant

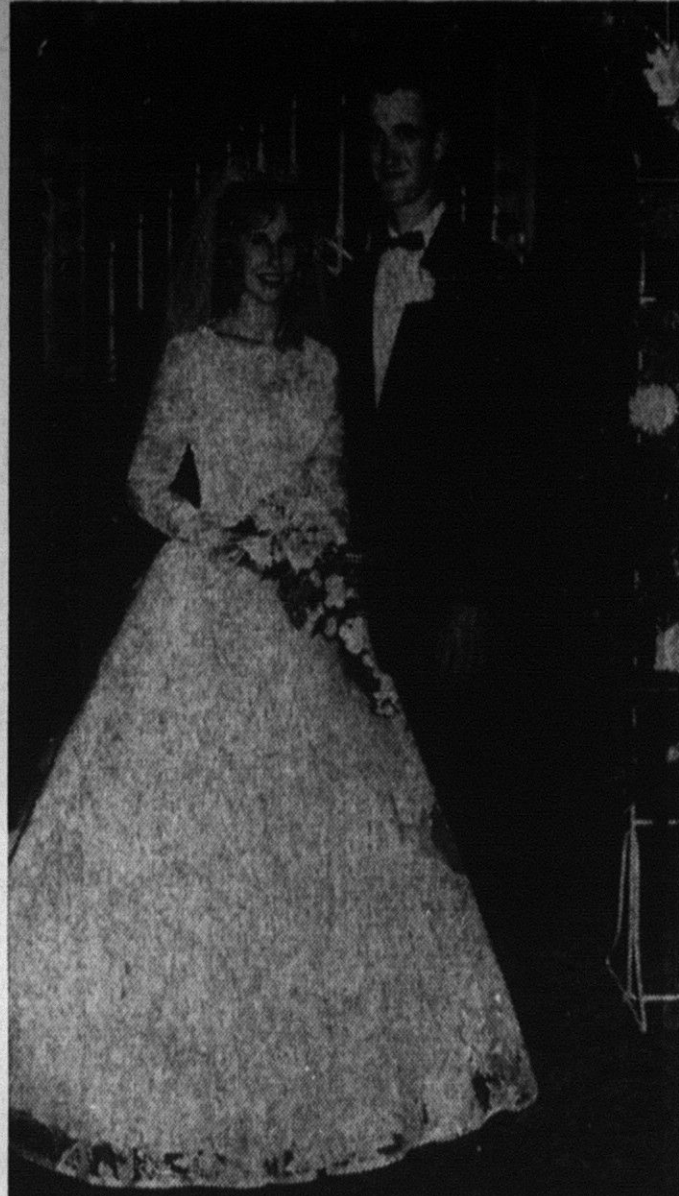

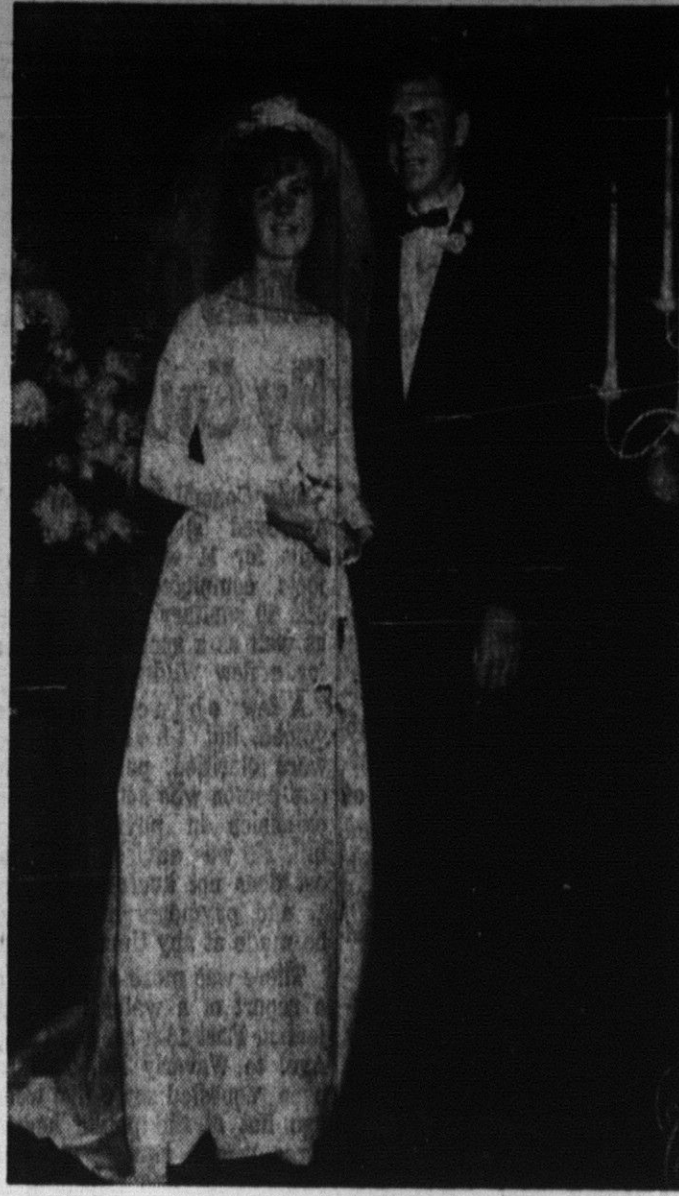

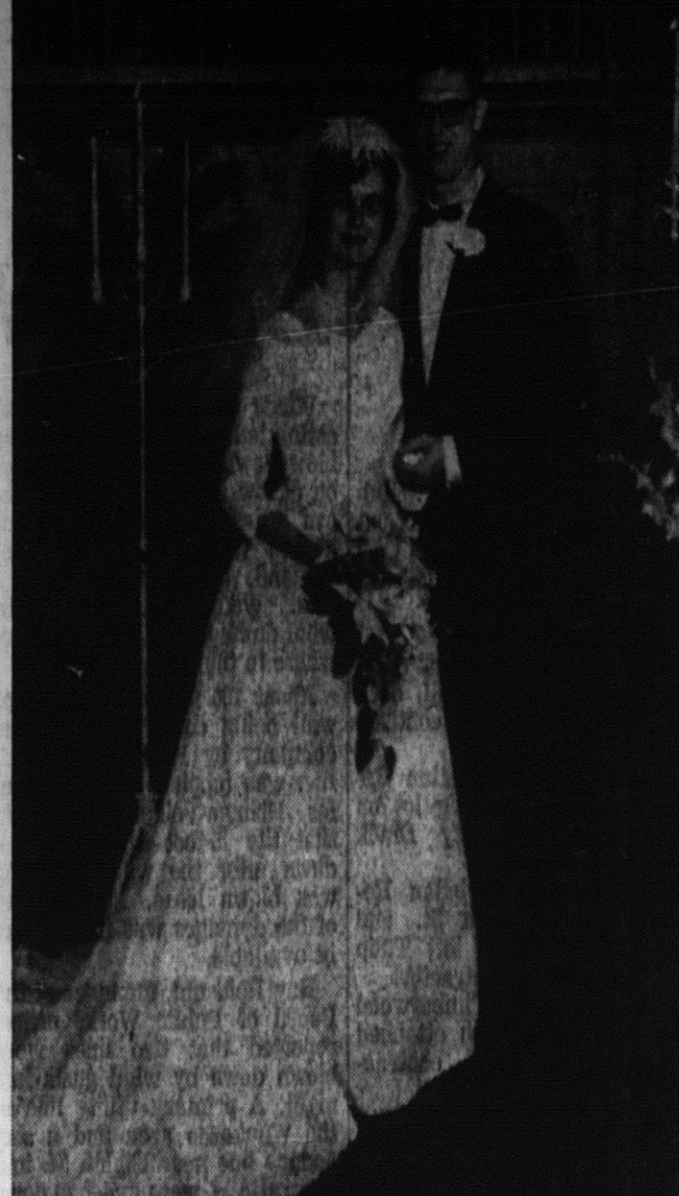

## Dr. De Young Speaks at Hope Convocation

This world with its huge problems requires not lilliputian minds but gigantic thinking," Hope alumnus Dr. Chris A. DeYoung stated in his address, "Man in Today's World," at the all-college Convocation held Thursday on the Hope College campus.

The modern world, Dr. DeYoung maintained, paradoxically combines old and new, large and small, divided and united aspects.

"History hangs heavily over many of the so-called 'old' civilizations whose birthplaces I have visited," he said. "Coming from a young nation I learned to have more patience with ancient countries whose problems have been compounded by centuries."

Problems of the Eastern world were brought into focus for Dr. DeYoung when, after graduation from Hope in 1920, he sailed to India as a Reformed Church missionary.

Although there are significant divisions in the world, especially between "Eastern," "Western," and "neutral" nations, the educator continued, an expanding population has caused "global shrinkage," forcing people to live more closely together and to familiarize themselves with foreign customs. He lauded Hope's Vienna Summer School and the efforts of missionaries as promoting union in the world.

The Hon. John R. Dethmers, Hope alumnus and justice of the Michigan Supreme Court, presented a Freedoms Foundation award to Dr. DeYoung at the convocation ceremony for his "Open Letter to American Youth," published earlier this year.

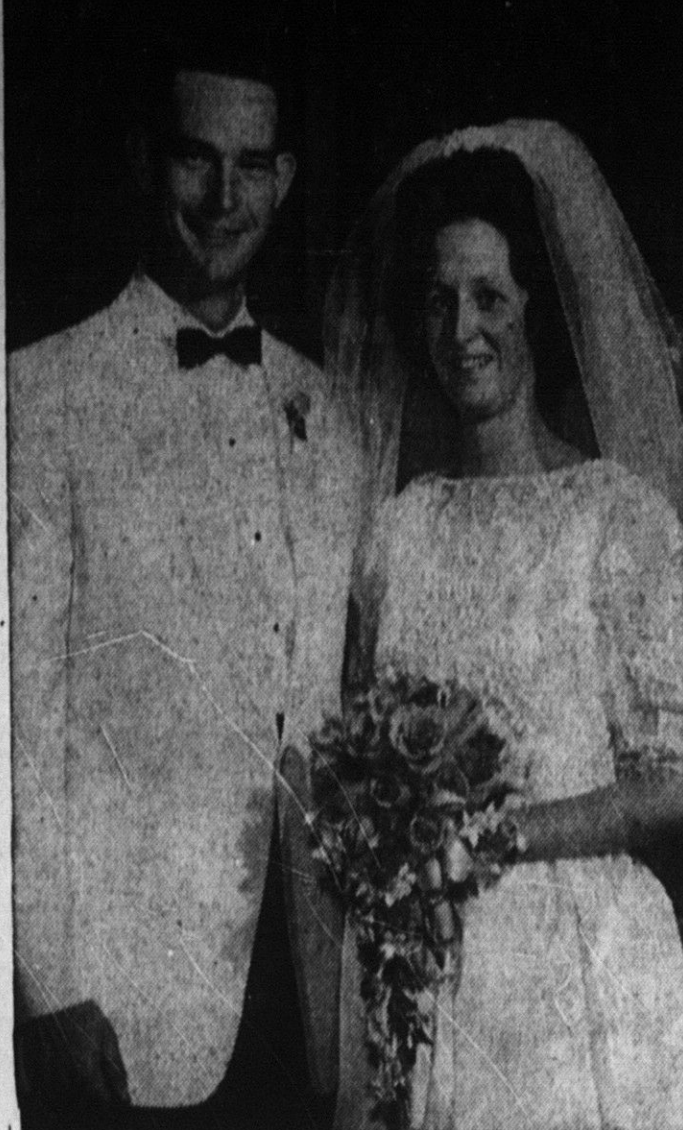

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THE MICHIGAN FARM  
BUREAU IS RIGHT

This paper recently reported the sharp disagreement which exists between the Michigan Farm Bureau and the National Farmer's Organization regarding the attempt to raise cattle prices through the collective action of withholding cattle from the market. We feel that the N.F.O. position is not defensible for three reasons.

In all successful governments, the powers of coercion are reserved for the state. Whenever groups of any kind bypass the constituted means of voting and the courts and resort to mass use of force, the framework of the American system is weakened. The destruction of property and loss of life resulting from the N.F.O.'s action is trying to prevent the operation of cattle auctions is intolerable.

Secondly, in a free enterprise system, the presence of low prices indicates an oversupply relative to demand and in fact is the means by over-production. Interference with the market mechanism cannot provide long range solutions to the problem of over-supply.

In the third place, the consumer is free to buy whatever he wishes and the prices charged for any commodity will often determine the amount he will choose to consume. If a rise in beef prices would cause consumers to switch from beef to pork or poultry, as is usually the case, the beef glut would become still larger. Here again, interference with the market mechanism cannot interfere successfully with the consumer's freedom to spend his money the way he wishes.

We commend the Michigan Farm Bureau for its logical opposition to the National Farmer's Organization's strategy in the beef price problem.

"The Saving Deeds of the Lord"  
I Samuel 12:6-15  
by C. P. Dame . . . .

This last lesson of this quarter can be used fittingly as a review lesson. We have studied how Israel came into Egypt, how God delivered the nation from Egypt and trained the people for forty years and finally led the nation into Canaan which was conquered under the leadership of Joshua. The period of the judges followed. This period was followed by the rule of the kings. Our lesson tells about the end and beginning of an era. I. A fine record counts. The first five verses of Chapter 12 tell us about Samuel's farewell address. Samuel, the judge and prophet, was old. Saul the new king was younger. As Samuel stood before the assembly of people he spoke of his record as a judge. It was spotless. No one could charge him with any wrongdoing. A blameless record is an asset. Some church members make a record of which they can be proud and some make a poor record. II. After speaking about himself Samuel reviewed the history of the nation. Our lesson text reports that Samuel credited God for Israel's favors. God gave the nation leaders—Moses and Aaron. When the nation was in trouble and oppressed and called to the Lord in penitence he responded and gave help. A person is at his best when he confesses his sin. This is also true of a nation. The people confessed their idolatry. They had forsaken God and worshipped Baalim and Ashtaroth—the gods of Canaan. God sent them leaders. Samuel reminded the nation of the judges whom God called.

God used Zerubbabel, Gideon, called Barak—read his story in Judges 4 and in Judges 11 the story of Jephthah is recorded. Samuel concludes his remarks by naming Nahash, king of Ammon, whose threat perhaps had something to do with the nation's request for a king. These leaders differed much in character but they were all used by God. God still uses all kinds of workers.

III. Nations and individuals must choose. Samuel told the nation that it would be well with them if they would serve God but if they were minded to rebel against him dire consequences would come. The choice was between obedience or rebellion. We either obey God or rebel against him dire consequences. The nation did not obey God and paid for it dearly.

Words such as "obedience" and "commandment" are not popular today. Many people today disobey God and care not about his law. Today many people question the authority of the moral law. And consequently they do as they please. It is high time that we as a nation recognize the wisdom and the authority of God's commandments which he has given to us for our welfare.

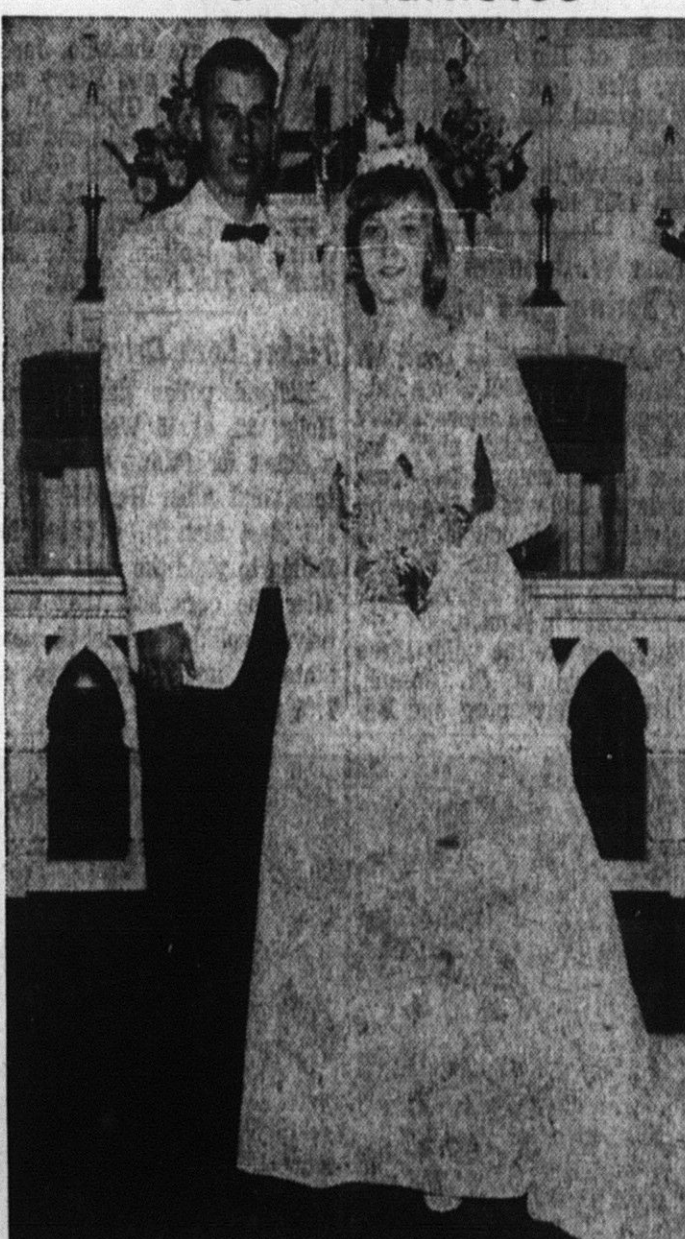

## Dutch Score 2 Touchdowns In 1st Period

Capitalizing on two East Grand Rapids errors in the first quarter and adding a fine offensive drive in the third period, Holland High's football team took a 20-7 opening season win Friday night in Riverview Park.

But Holland didn't have to wait long for another East error. This time it was a high pass from center and the punter had Rog Woltman pouncing on him on the East four.

On third down and Holland on the fave, junior quarterback Mike Bos connected on a leaping pass to Hill, who snatched the ball from a defender in the end zone. Cornelissen converted and 3:15 remained in the first period.

Holland's other touchdown showed its offense in gear. End Al Holleman grabbed the second half kickoff on his 25 and returned to the 43.

It took Holland 13 plays to score. Most of the plays were off tackles mashes and Woltman ran the final four to score. Woltman had carried five times and Cornelissen four with Cornelissen's eight-yard off tackle run, the longest of the drive. Cornelissen's kick was wide.

East scored with 2:24 left in the game on Tom Bigelow's one-yard smash to climax a 12-play 50-yard drive. Bob Binder converted. The Pioneers also found Holland's pass defense vulnerable in the closing seconds and hit two passes, one for 31 and another for 12, and the game ended with East on the Holland one-foot line.

In the second quarter the Pioneers also had a drive that bogged on the Dutch 14. But after a punt, East tried again and this time scored on a 15-yard pass that was called back because of an East 15-yard penalty.

The penalty was one of only three East received in the game. Holland was penalized 90 yards including three for 15 yards.

East tried 21 passes and completed only three. The Dutch defenders did a good job of putting on the pressure and knock-

ing down the receivers but work against long passes is one of Coach Jim Jebb's assignments this week.

Jebb felt the win was a "good effort" and felt for a "green" team they "played together." He complimented John Dziedzic, Morse and Tom Crace for their defensive work along with Coert Vanderhill and Woltman on offense.

Crace injured his knee and was replaced by Vanderhill while Rick Coleman was kicked in the stomach and Paul Lubbers and Coney suffered cramps.

Jebb planned to bolster the offense and iron out mistakes prior to Holland's LMAC opener with Muskegon Heights here next Friday. The Tigers stopped Godwin, 19-6 Friday.

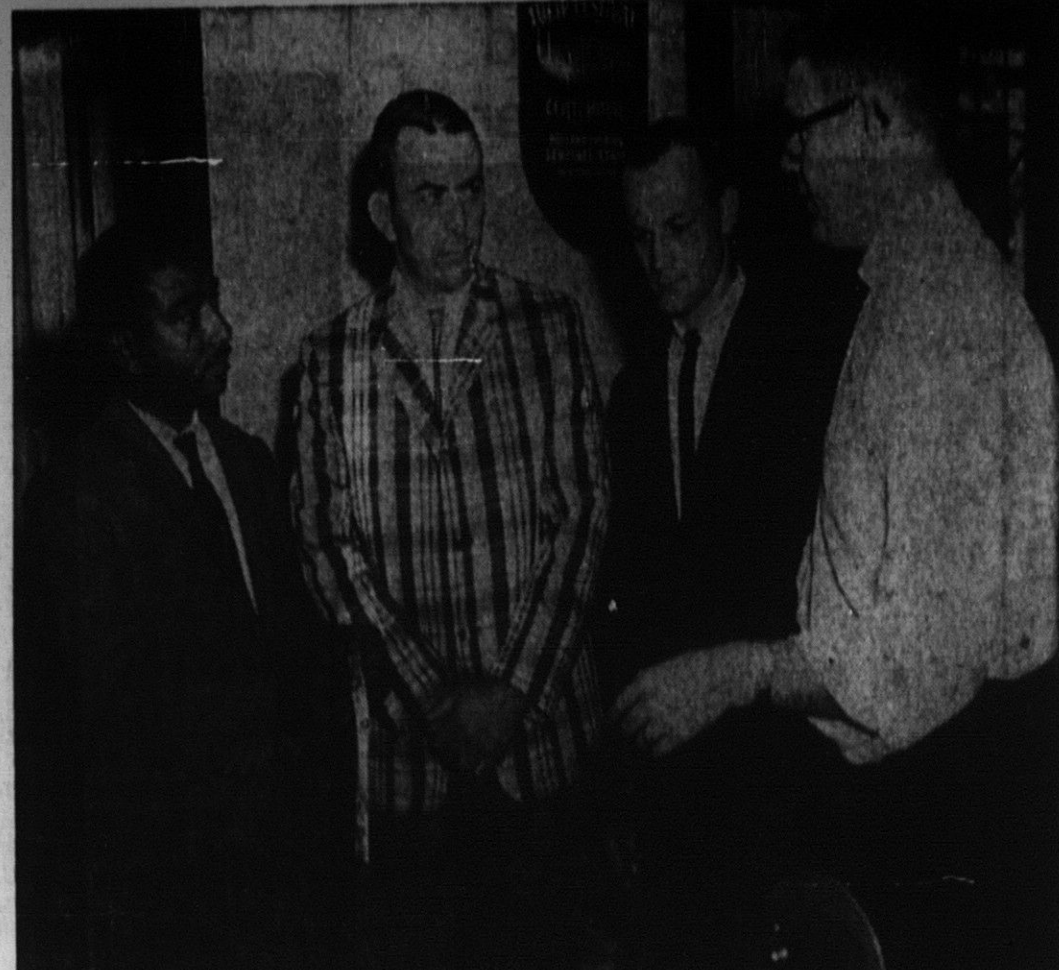

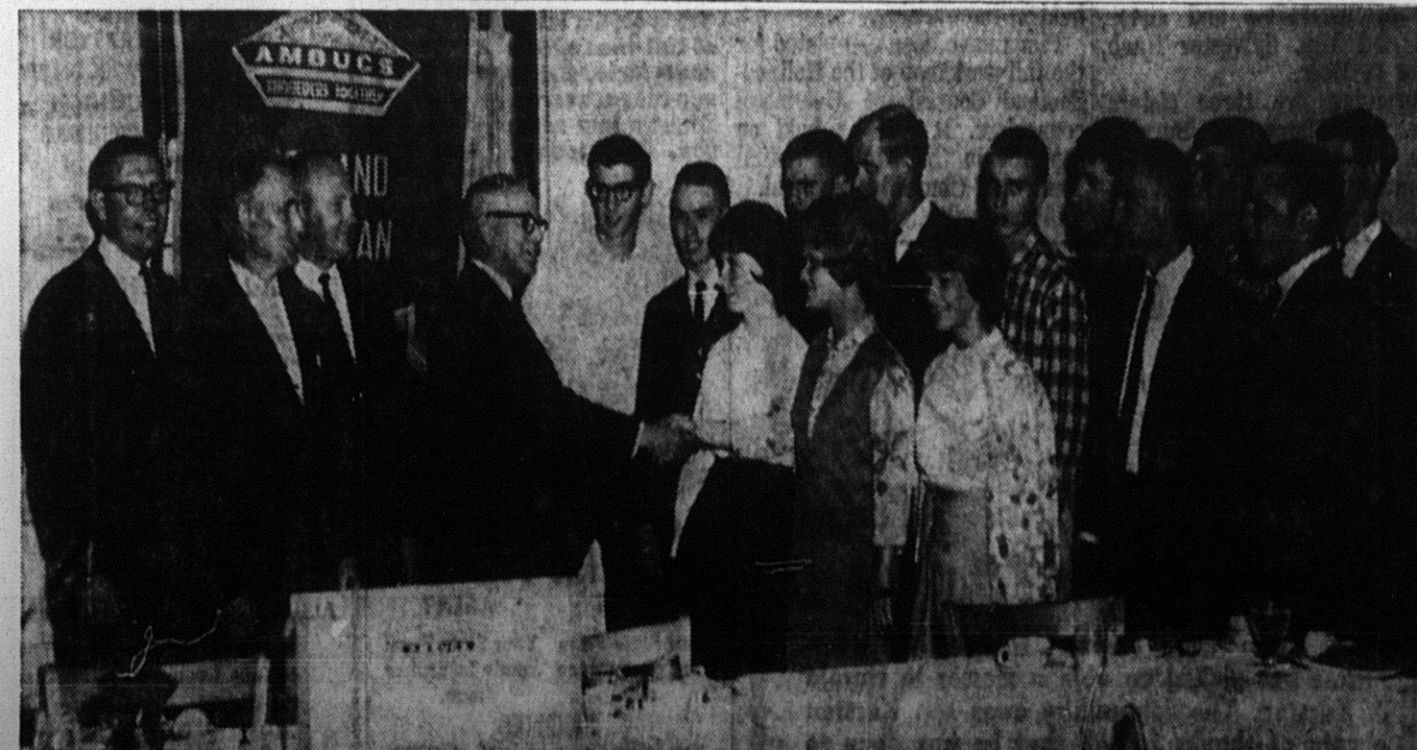

# Fast, Powerful Findlay Romps Over Hope, 37-0

## Dutch Drop First Game Of Season

A well-oiled Findlay College football machine rolled over Hope College, 37-0 Saturday night in the season's opener for the Flying Dutchmen before 2,400 fans in Riverview Park.

The Oilers, 34-12 victors over Hillsdale, featured a football team without a weak link. Demonstrating tremendous all-around balance, Findlay struck three times by land and another three times by air.

Findlay scored twice in the first half, each time after Hope had missed a scoring chance, and then turned the game into a rout with four second half touchdowns.

The winners combined this offensive power with a potent defense that allowed Hope only 87 yards rushing and 80 in passing. They didn't permit the Flying Dutchmen to get into Findlay territory in the second half.

With backs like Allen Smith and Jim Lane wheeling around ends on lighting legs and fullbacks Jim Morrison and Bob Culver pounding the middle, the Oilers gained 328 yards rushing.

This ground attack was interspersed by the lubricated arm of Martin Terry who hurled two touchdown passes and set up another touchdown with a 57-yard pass play. Another limber arm, belonging to Jim Culler, provided for the other passing tally.

Hope had a scoring chance the first time they had the ball. After taking a Findlay punt on the Oilers 47, the Flying Dutchmen tried the long "bomb" two plays later and Harlan Hyink connected with Bill Hultgren to the Findlay 14. But Hyink fumbled on the next play and Findlay recovered.

Terry sneaked two yards for the game's first touchdown 11 plays later after a heavy ground attack highlighted by sophomore speedster Smith's three dashes totaling 45 yards. The tally came with 6:52 left in the first period.

Early in the second period Findlay punted to the Hope 21 and the Flying Dutchmen began their best drive of the game. In 12 plays Hope drove to the Findlay 17 where a pass was intercepted in the end zone by Byron Morgan, son of the Findlay coach.

The drive had seen an 18-yard pass from Hyink to Hudsonville freshman Keith Abel along with hard running by Jim Bekker, Bill Keur, Abel and Tom De Kuiper.

Four plays after the interception Terry completed a 52-yard pass to Paul Riley. Both conversions were missed and the Oilers led 12-0 at half.

With 10:17 left in the third quarter, Lane broke between tackle and end for a 62-yard scamper. Six minutes later Smith raced 10 yards for the fourth touchdown after a Terry to Riley 57-yard aerial play set up the score. With 1:14 remaining in the period Terry completed a 20-yard scoring play to Riley.

Findlay's last touchdown came on a 52-yard pass play from Culler to Mickey Cottrell. Ken Curry converted for Findlay's lone extra point.

Coach Russ De Vette was disappointed with Hope's showing. "They are a better club but our mistakes caused them to score, like on the long passes and the long run," De Vette said.

Hope sophomore Phil Rauwerdink punted for the first time and booted eight for 259 yards and a 32.2 average. One kick was blocked and set up Findlay's fifth touchdown.

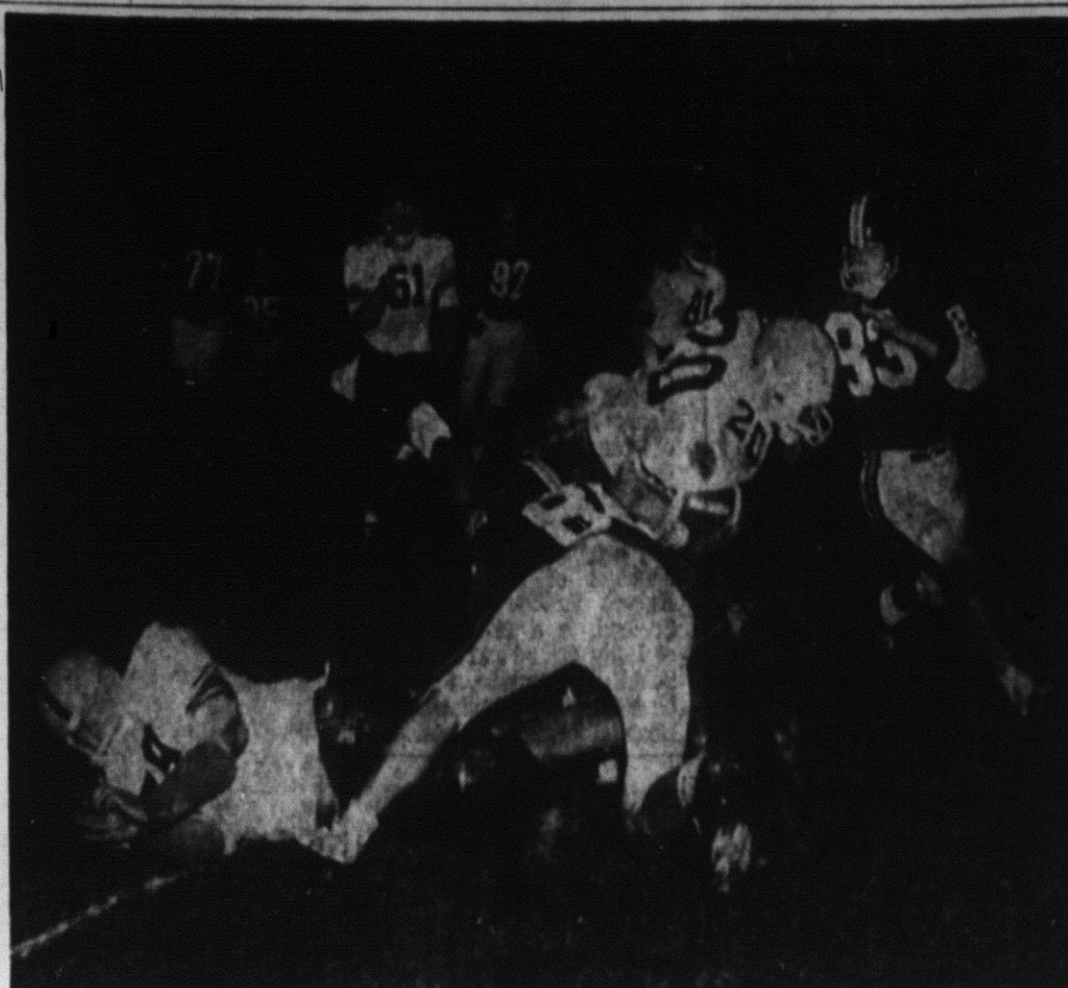

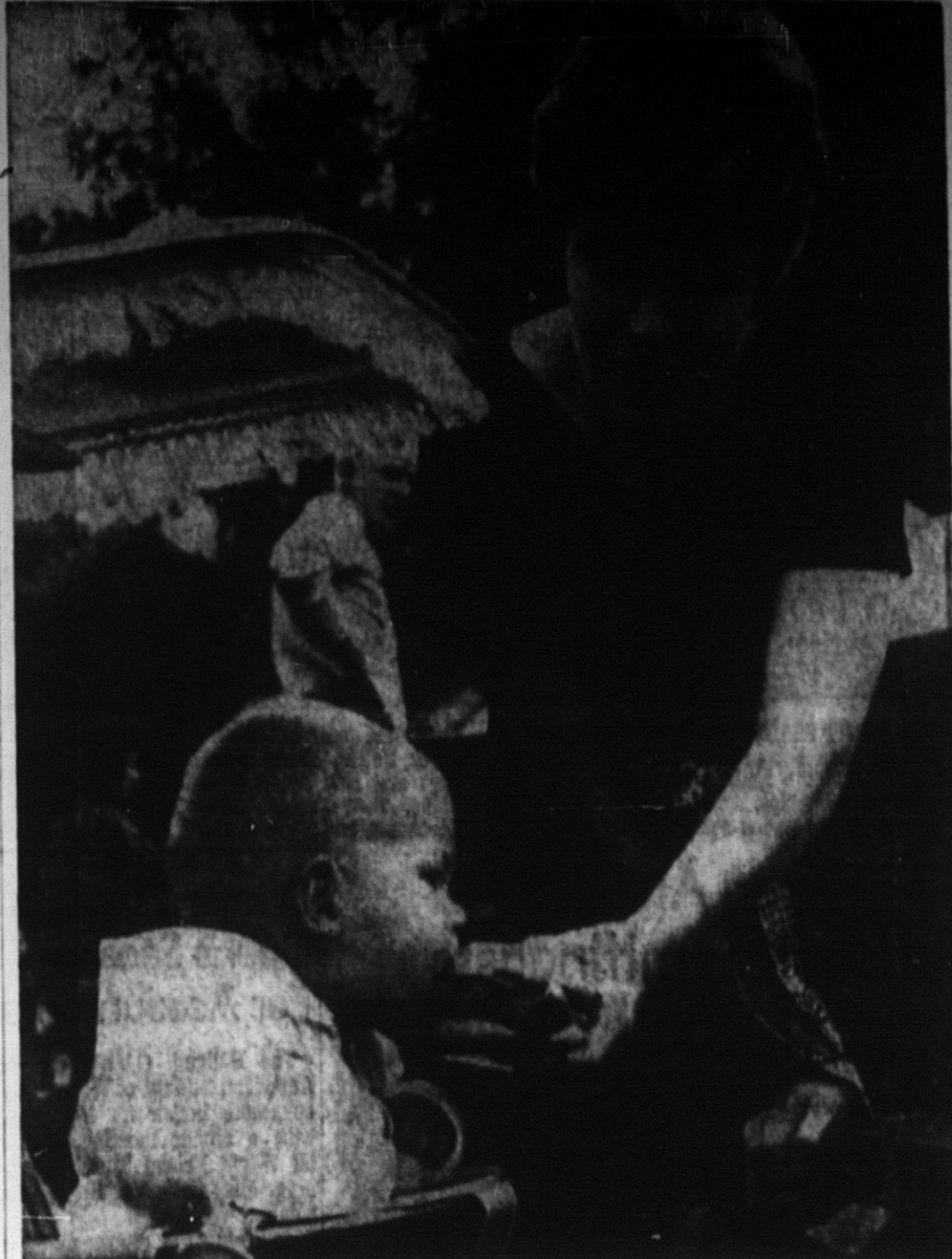

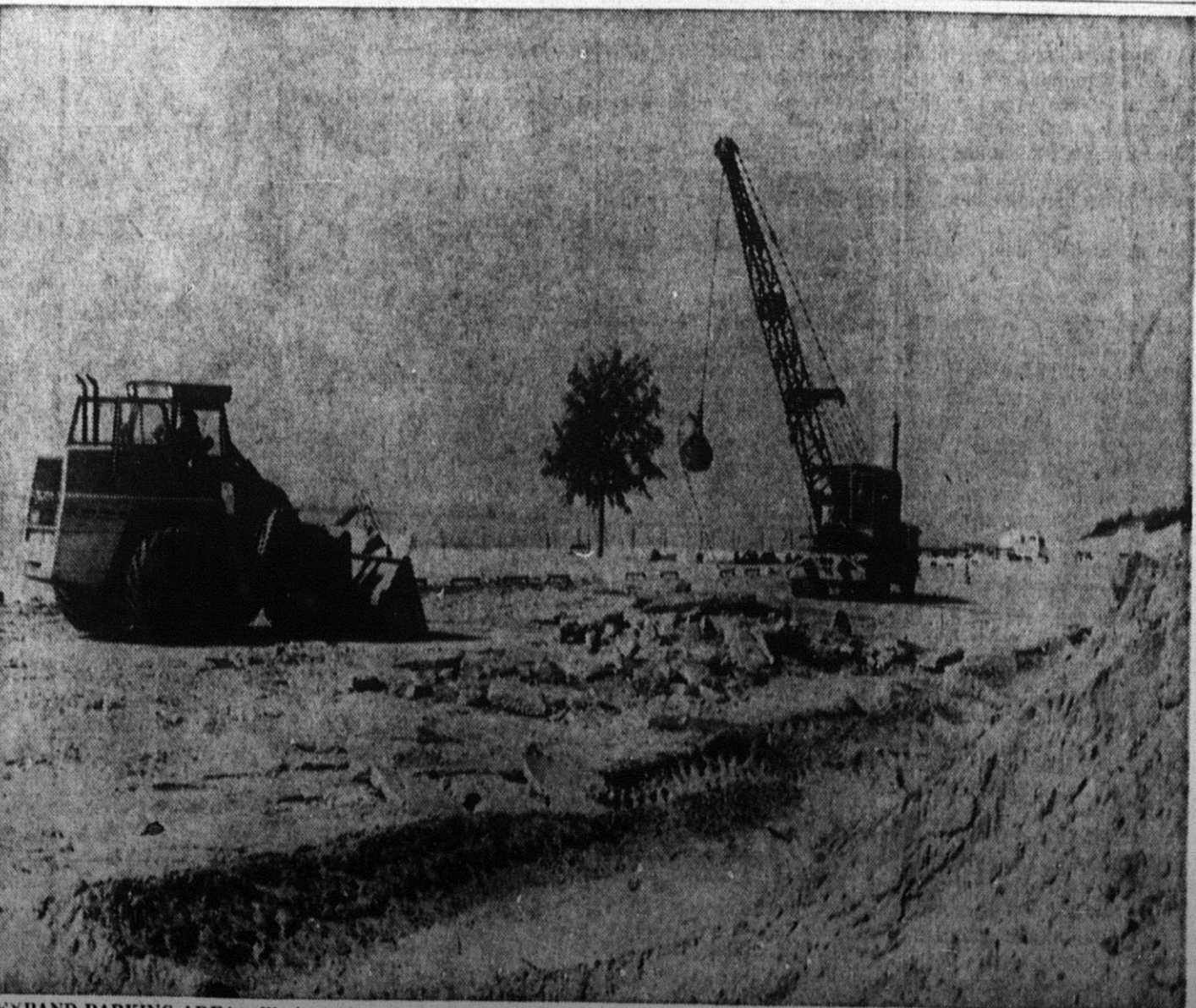

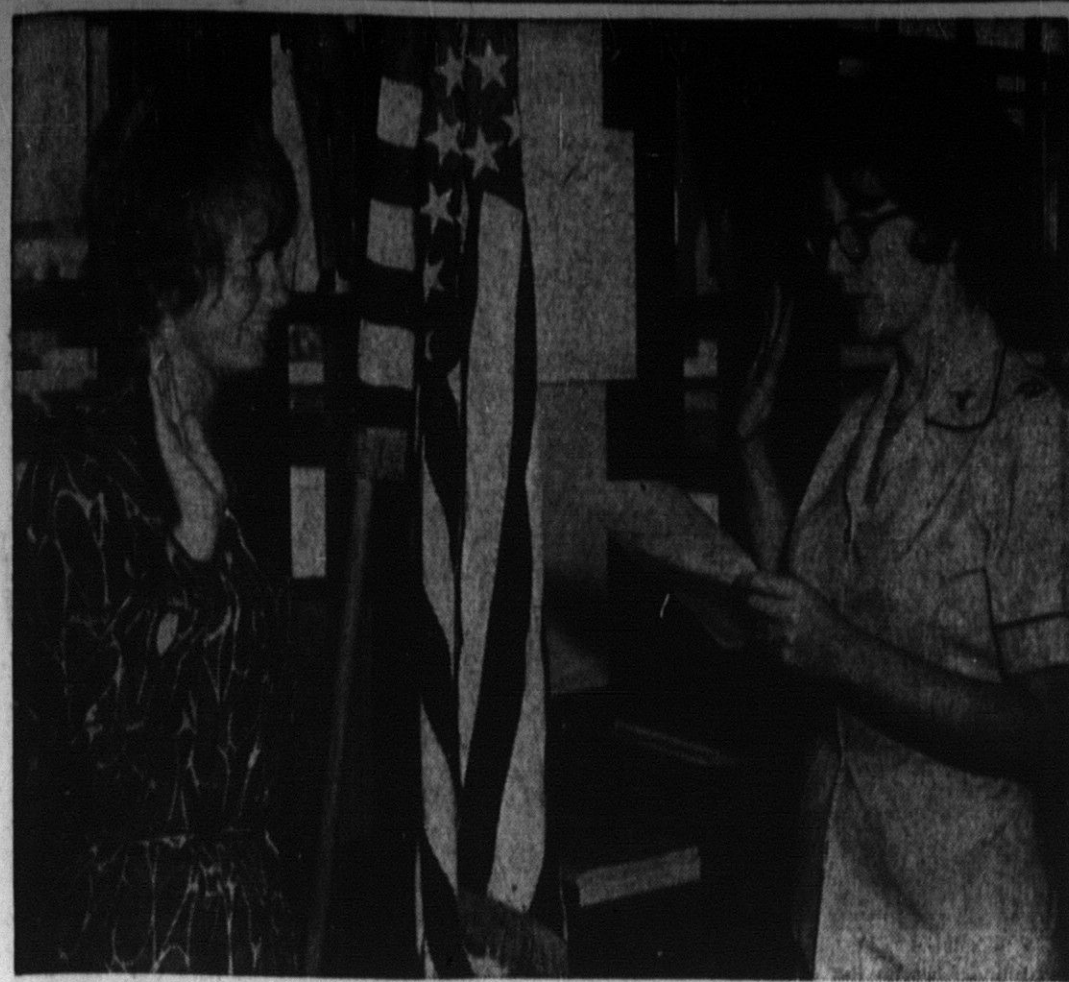

Most adults know the requirements of social living and have worked out their individual methods for meeting or evading them. Children, however, are in the process of learning these requirements. The help they receive from the home, church, school and community in mastering the formidable tasks of adjusting to life will often make the difference between good mental health and ill mental health when they reach maturity.

The early history of a human being is largely a record of the interactions between himself and the forces of nature and society. He is attracted to things that give him pleasure and learns most quickly to meet requirements that are made easy and pleasant. But many requirements conflict with his own pleasures, desires, or purposes. He may learn to meet them because he has been convinced that failure to do so will delay or block the coming of some greater good, or will seriously handicap his personal well-being. No one, child or adult, is able to accept completely and gracefully all the frustrations and inconveniences imposed upon him by the requirements of the society in which he lives. If a requirement is too severe, or interferes with his personal desires, he may seek ways of circumventing it.

Mental hygienists tell us that there are two main forms of evasion—attack and withdrawal. By attacking a natural force or social regulation that frustrates his desires or by finding ways to escape from it, the individual may avoid the necessity for accepting it or adjusting himself to it. The motive for both attacking and withdrawing behavior appears to be the same, and streaks of both are often found in the same individual. Some persons, however, learn to depend more upon one than upon the other.

Social and economic change has its roots in discontent with the existing order. And practically every individual has some unfavorable conditions in his own life which he must attack in order to get ahead. However, evasion by attack may be destructive if it keeps an individual from making inner peace with authority—with parents, teachers, employer and the forces of law and order. Of failure to achieve this inner peace, feeling of insecurity, resentment, hostility, and inferiority are born.

Evasion by escape also may result in productive activity. Many scientific achievements and many great musical, poetic, dramatic, artistic, and religious conceptions are the gifts of men and women who have been able to make constructive use of their habit of withdrawing at times from the outer "working-day world" into inner workshops of their own. For many others the consequences of flights from reality are unfortunate, sometimes tragic. Whenever may be at the bottom of their escapist pattern of behavior, they are more likely than the aggressors to be unhappy, dissatisfied with themselves, torn by warring emotions.

The roughing-in of both the attack and escape patterns begins in early childhood. The child comes up against authority at a very early age. He finds that there are all sorts of requirements to which he must submit, often against his own inclination. He is required to abandon the satisfaction of sucking for the cold comfort of spoon and cup; to undergo toilet training; to limit his explorations of the world about him when his safety is involved and to control overwhelming emotions like anger, rage, and grief.

In the formidable task of learning socially accepted forms of behavior, displays of temper are not uncommon. If the child gets satisfaction out of them either by winning his own way or by getting attention, even if it is an unpleasant form of attention, like a spanking or being held up to ridicule in school, he is on the way to learning that evasion of authority by attack succeeds. The habit of defiance is especially likely to become entrenched if parents or teachers counterattack, as they so often do, because they see in disobedience and other forms of aggressive behavior a challenge to their authority.

Withdrawal from situations that are too difficult to handle is a common method of eva-

sion. There is no one who has not found ways of escaping at times from the troubles and cares of everyday life. Daydreams, sleep, literature, music, and dreams, for example, provide natural and necessary channels of escape. But when deep-seated anxiety hinders anyone from meeting the requirements and responsibilities of social living, a retreat from reality may develop which may lead to some very serious forms of mental illness.

Many of the symptoms of emotional tension are familiar to us all. No one is so perfectly poised that he does not suffer at times from fears and anxieties. These symptoms are viewed as perfectly natural when the source of the emotional stimulus is known. But those individuals who do not know what is making them feel more or less constantly depressed, worried, nervous, confused, or ill without any apparent physical cause, find it very difficult to realize that some unresolved, underlying emotional conflict involving the interactions of evasion may be to blame. Often the cause of this conflict may be found in the individual's early childhood behavior. It is usually a great relief for these unhappy people to find that their nervous disorders have causes as real as physical illness.

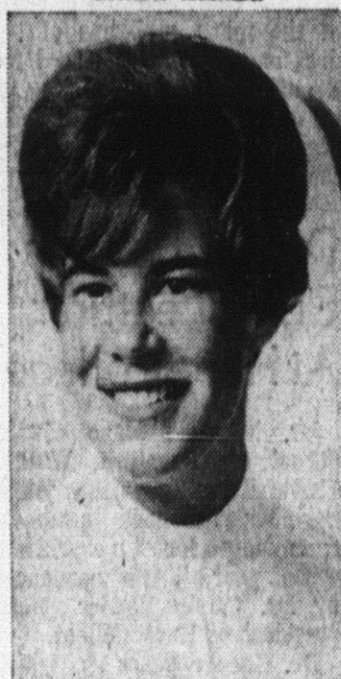
