West Michigan Tourist Group Ends 3-Day Session Here

A tour of Windmill Island, Netherlands Museum and other attractions of the Holland-Macatawa area today climaxed the three-day meeting of the West Michigan Tourist Association held here.

Over 200 persons attended the sessions of the 49th annual membership meeting of the Association staged in Point West and Carousal Mountain. Del Van Tongeren of Holland was chairman of the meeting which opened Tuesday with registration in Point West.

Today's afternoon tour followed the annual business meeting in Carousal Mountain and the board of directors meeting. Robert Webster, president, presided at the closing luncheon meeting at Point West and Ron Gamble addressed the group on "How's Your Image?"

The initial request would be for \$50,000 to establish the wing, equip it and hire the research analyst and a clerk. Funding of the new section would come from the state general fund as a part of the overall Tourist Council budget.

ZEELAND — Zeeland firemen answered a call Monday at Hub's West End Service station, 210 West Main Ave., after a spark from a cutting torch ignited a freshly applied coat of floor wax.

Attendants at the station had just applied a fresh coat of sealer to the floor of the service station while another man in an adjacent garage was using the cutting torch to cut a muffler off an automobile. Sparks landed on the fresh sealer, starting the blaze.

The fire was extinguished before firemen arrived at the scene. No estimate of damage was given.

13,000 Homes Lose Power

More than 13,000 homes between Zeeland and Wyoming were left without electrical power after a utility pole with a high-voltage transformer caught fire in a heavy rainstorm this morning.

A spokesman for Consumers Power Co. said the power went out at 6:01 a.m. Workmen rerouted the energy to other lines, and had the power restored to 9,600 customers in about 20 minutes. The power was restored to the rest of the homes in about 33 minutes.

The fire started when current leaked through a hairline crack in the 46,000-volt line on M-21 at School St. in Hudsonville.

Hudsonville firemen extinguished the blaze. Police and firemen rerouted traffic on M-21 away from area where the pole was burning to protect motorists in case the line fell.

The utility pole and transformer were to be repaired by this evening, according to Consumers Power.

Christian School Elects Six Trustees

General Fund Exceeds \$840,000; Building Finances Reviewed

Six new members were elected to the Holland Christian school board of trustees Monday night at the annual school society meeting held in the high school gymnasium.

Named to three year terms were Norman Artz, Robert De Nooyer, Konrad Marcus, Russel Michmerhuizen and the Rev. Charles Steenstra. Kenneth Vander Zwaag was elected to a one-year term.

Various financial reports were given by fund treasurers. Gerald Vande Vusse, chairman of the finance committee, reported that the general fund revenues amounted to \$841,254.88. He also reported that receipts from the Sustaining Membership fund totaled \$148,000.

Cornelius Westenbroek, business manager, reported on both the new high school building fund as well as the previous school building fund. He reported that the total amount of pledges amounted to \$765,644.58. This included \$21,000 from students and \$74,990 from local business and industry.

He said that total pledge receipts to date amounted to \$472,880.67. Other income, including \$226,000 in sale of notes listed \$37,318.08 making total receipts of \$850,698.75.

In reporting on the old building fund, Westenbroek said that total indebtedness totaled \$260,500.

Commenting on the pledge receipts for the new fund, Westenbroek showed that only 38 percent of the personal pledges remained outstanding.

Supt. Mark Vander Ark presented his annual report to the society listing a summary of the year's activity as it pertained to education, finances, planning and promotion. He spoke of the curriculum planning during the past year, the introduction of the austere tuition plan and some of the problems due to enrollment increases in the Rose Park area.

He spoke of the need of continued planning in several curricular areas during the next year and also presented some evaluations.

Hil Buurma, chairman of the planning committee, reported that the work on the new high school is "proceeding according to schedule." He said that the contractors expect to have a roof over the academic unit in the next two or three weeks.

Theodore Hoeksema, board president, served as chairman and conducted opening devotions. The Rev. Peter Huisman, pastor of the Pine Creek Christian Reformed Church, offered the closing prayer.

After the Society meeting, the school board met for reorganization and officers chosen for the 1966-67 year are Hoeksema, president; Dr. Robert De Haan, vice president; Buurma, secretary; Marcus, assistant secretary; Howard Johnson, treasurer and Paul Baker, assistant treasurer.

Mayor Planning Public Ox Roast For Centennial

City Manager Herb Holt and City Auditor John W. Fonger are helping him. The three conferred Wednesday at Bosman's home at 5 East 12th St.

The mayor conceived the idea of a public ox roast months ago when he was assigned the task of arranging some phase of community activity in celebrating the centennial.

He arranged with Dick Machiele, Ottawa county agricultural agent, to stage an ox roast for Holland resident in the pine grove on campus, the area where the annual Village Squares are staged each summer by the Women's League for Hope College.

A highlight of the summer events is a chicken barbecue, also arranged by Machiele, and the October ox roast will be carried on much like the chicken barbecues except that picnic tables and benches will be in the grove, not the athletic field.

Bosman is hopeful that 3,000 persons will attend the event. This number includes approximately 1,100 college students eating in dormitories. The menu calls for barbecued beef, rolls, Boston baked beans, cabbage slaw with pineapple, celery and the De Bruyn companion orange drink, milk or coffee. Co-operating in providing food are Slater Food Service of the College, Dutch Boy Bakery and the De Ruyn companies.

The event is sponsored by the City of Holland and Bosman said proceeds will go to Hope College.

In case of inclement weather, the ox roast will be staged in Civic Center.

The mayor has arranged with Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf to have picnic tables and benches from city parks brought to the campus for the event. This is a convenient arrangement since this is the time of year that tables and benches go into storage for the winter.

College students who work in dining halls will assist in the serving operations. Two serving lines are planned.

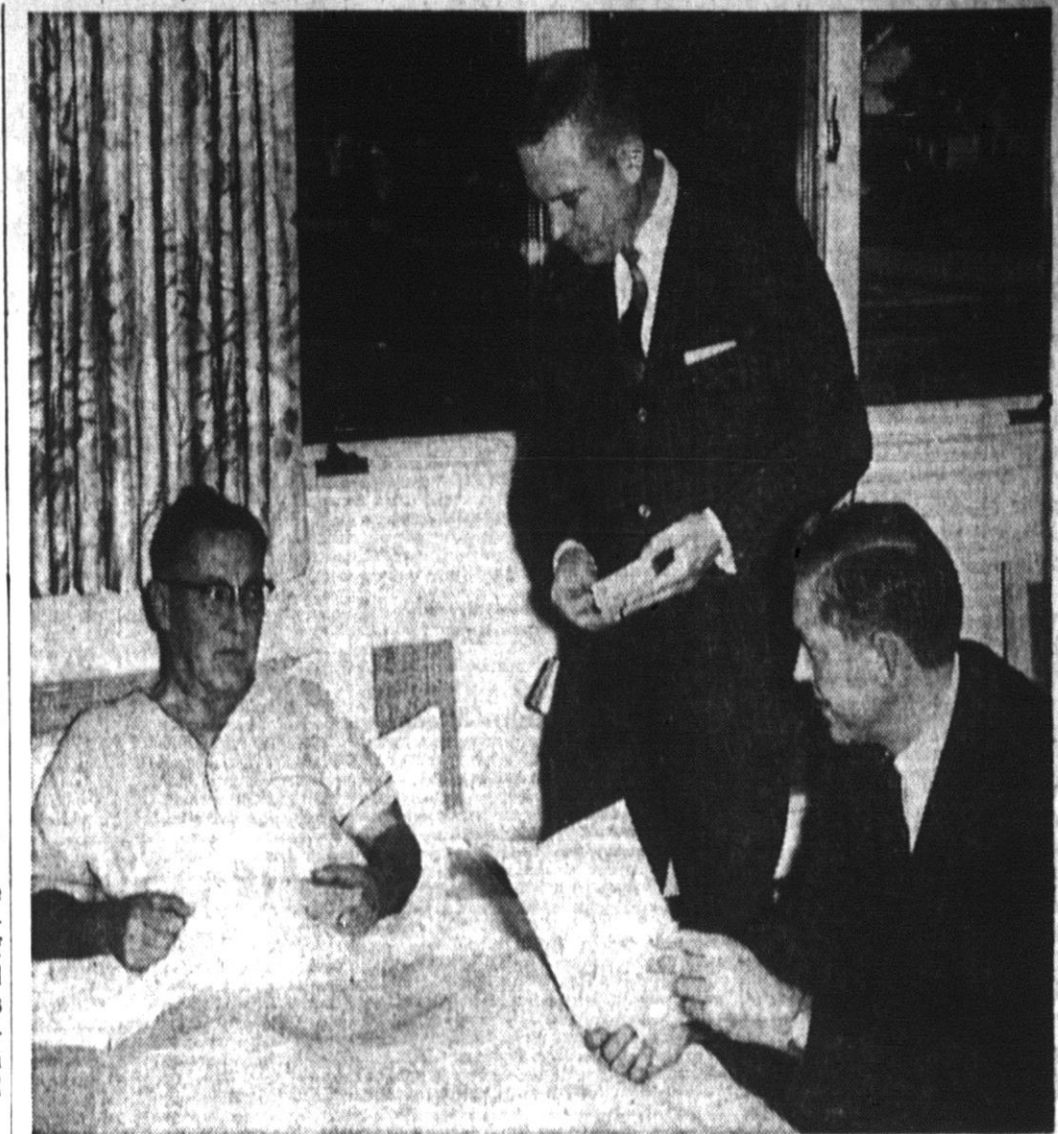

ZEELAND — Zeeland and Hudsonville fought to a scoreless tie here Friday night in what will probably be recorded as one of the best defensive games of the season in the Red Division of the O-K Conference.

The Chix, who ramblod to an easy 32-0 victory in their season opener and gained 428 yards just one week ago, could not muster a strong drive the entire evening in the face of a superb Hudsonville defense.

But, if Hudsonville's defense was superb, then Zeeland's must have been perfect, because it was the Chix defense in the late moments of the game that kept the game scoreless.

In the third quarter, Hudsonville started a promising drive only to have a Denny Kuiper pass intercepted by Steve Nagelkirk at mid-field. Nagelkirk came out of nowhere to grab the ball and saved what could have been a key play for the Eagles.

Panthers Tie In Opening O-K Contest

ADA—The West Ottawa and Forest Hills football teams battled to a 13-13 tie Friday night at the Forest Hills field.

Penalties plagued the Panthers, as they erred 11 times. One 15-yard clipping penalty kept the Panthers from winning, as halfback Steve Tucker had run 47 yards for a touchdown on the play.

The Rangers opened scoring midway through the first quarter when halfback Gary Krenion scored, narrowly missing the tackle attempt of Panther center Gary Bloomers. Krenion made good the extra point.

The Panthers entered Forest Hills territory early in the second quarter for the first time when the Rangers picked up a 15-yard penalty.

A 13-yard pass from quarterback Dan Bauer to Jerry Klompars and another 15-yard penalty against Forest Hills then brought the ball to the Rangers 18-yard line. Bauer scored on a quarterback sneak after having completed a pass to Tucker which had brought the ball down to the one-yard line.

Darryle Mitchell's kick for the extra point was good.

Mitchell, a new face in West Ottawa football this year, is the first kicker the Panthers have had in three years.

With 2:52 left in the half, Krenion once again took the ball for the Rangers, running 12 yards for a tally. The extra point attempt was blocked.

In the third quarter, possession of the ball volleyed back and forth, as both teams picked up numerous penalties for a variety of violations.

The Panthers controlled the ball as the fourth quarter opened, and scored on a nine-yard pass from Bauer to Randy Zomermaand, with 11:54 of playing time remaining. Mitchell's kick for the extra point was blocked.

It then looked like West Ottawa all the way when the fired-up Panthers again took over. Tucker received the handoff from Bauer and went 47 yards to score, but a clipping penalty had been called and the touchdown was nullified.

A seesaw battle marked the remainder of the game, with the Panthers inching their way down the field, losing control with :50 on the clock. Forest Hills tried for a quick tally, but the Rangers were halted when Mike Kolean intercepted a key pass with :08 remaining.

Of the 150 yards the Panthers acquired rushing, 136 were credited to the speedy Tucker. Tucker also gained better than 100 yards for the Panthers on runs that were nullified by illegal procedures elsewhere on the field.

Panther quarterback Bauer passed with a sure grace sending 50 per cent of his tosses in to the hands of his capable teammates. All of the completed passes were instrumental in the Panther's scoring. A three-year man on the varsity, Bauer continues to manipulate the ball more expertly each season.

The Panthers are now 1-0-1 overall and; 0-0-1 in O-K League competition. They will host Zeeland next Friday at 7:30 p.m.

Late in the fourth quarter, Zeeland defenders robbed the Eagles of three passes which could have easily gone for touchdowns if it were not for fine defensive play.

Zeeland had its best scoring chance in the second quarter when Chix defenders had the Eagles' Kuiper in the end zone for what looked like a sure touch-back. Kuiper slipped away from the tacklers and got over the goal line. Those two points would have looked awfully big at the end of the game.

Most of the game's action came in the fourth quarter. Hudsonville repeatedly threatened to score, but was held back each time by Zeeland defenders.

With 9:30 left in the game, Hudsonville took the ball on Zeeland's 48 yard line. On a 17rd and four play, the Eagles lost a yard. Then, on fourth down with five yards to go, Hudsonville gambled. Quarterback Kuiper rolled out to his left to pass. The pass pattern was broken and Kuiper kept the ball and ramblod to the 33 for a first down.

Kuiper kept the ball for two more plays, gaining a total of 25 yards and putting the Eagles on the Chix 8 yard line. Bob Poelman carried the ball to the Hudsonville 6 yard line and then Hudsonville as penalized 15 yards for grabbing a face mask.

With the ball on the 21 yard line, Roger Vander Kuyl carried back to the 15 on a six yard run. Then Kuiper sent a pass into the deep right corner of the defense for what looked like a sure touchdown. But, before Hudsonville coach Jack Rabine even had a chance to count 6 points on the scoreboard, Zeeland's Dave Vanderwijk made a desperate dive at the ball and deflected it from the receiver's hands. With fourth and 15 yards to go, Kuiper threw a pass to the left side by what once again should have been a touchdown, but Zeeland's Jack Walters knocked it away.

Hudsonville's big scoring threat, Mike Gerkin, who ran for 111 yards in his first game was held to negative yardage by the Chix.

Zeeland will travel to West Ottawa next Friday night for its first away game this season.

The final Hamilton tally came on a seven-yard run by fullback Ward Johnson to complete a 70-yard drive in the fourth quarter.

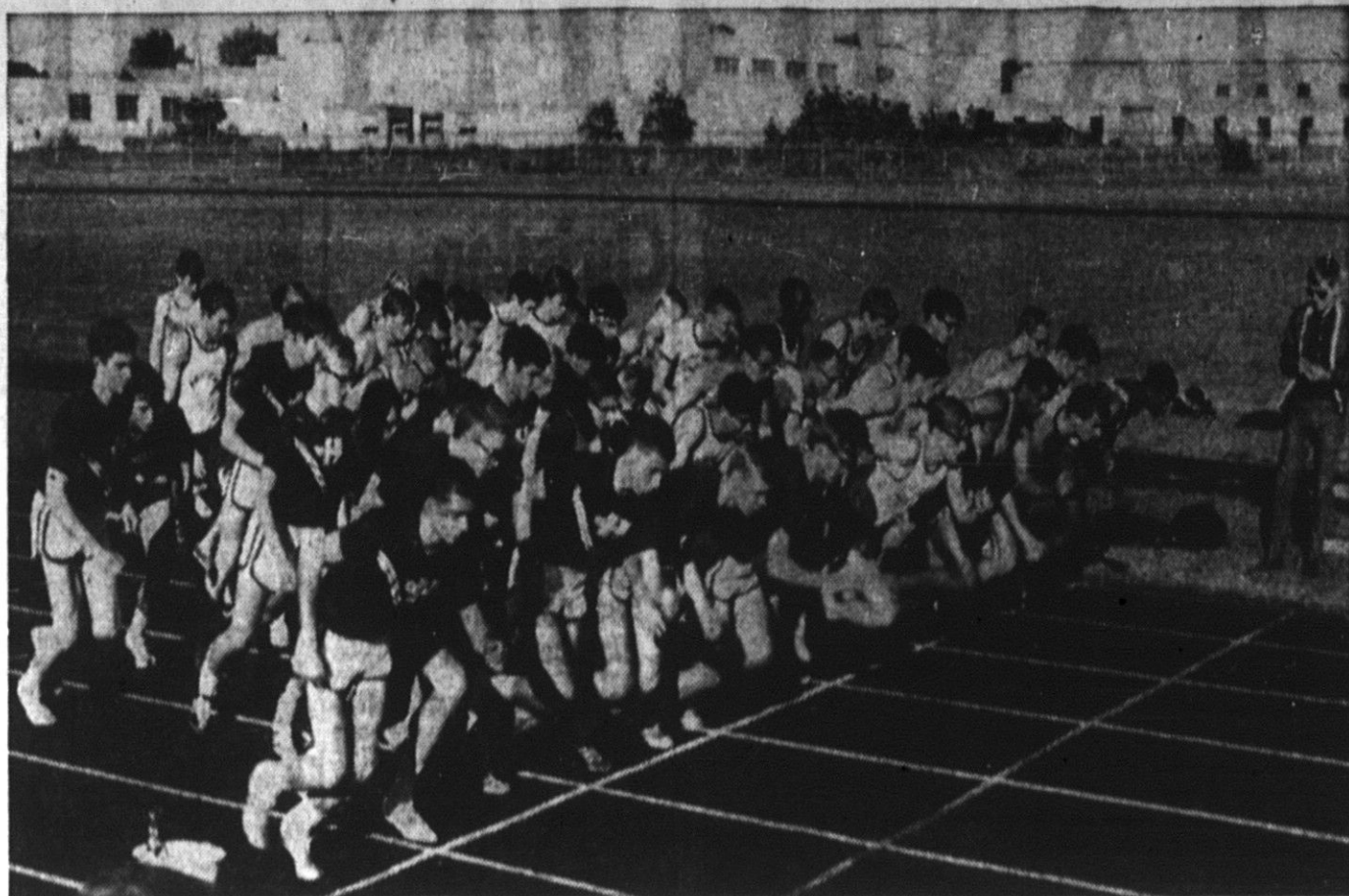

Dutch Score Late to Post First Victory

WHEATON, ILL. — Hope College went ahead on a late touchdown drive, and held off two Wheaton College scoring threats to preserve an 18-14 football victory here Saturday afternoon.

The Flying Dutchmen drove 59 yards to score with 5:22 remaining in the game, then recovered a fumble and threw up a stellar pass defense to thwart a pair of Crusader rallies in the closing minutes.

A crowd of more than 4,000 at McCully Field saw Hope even its season record at 1-1 and hand Wheaton its 10th straight loss over two seasons. After a pair of non-league games Hope moves into Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association action next Saturday, hosting Adrian.

The final scoring drive began with Keith Abel's 16-yard punt return to Hope's 41-yard line. Quarterback Clint Schilstra, substituting for the injured Gary Frens, then threw to split end Ray Cooper for 12 yards and to slotback Walt Reed for 43 yards, taking the Flying Dutchmen to the Wheaton four.

Abel then tried right guard with no success, but fullback Charlie Langeland went through left tackle twice, scoring from one foot out on the second try.

Two plays after the ensuing kick off, Reed recovered a fumble at the Wheaton 45 and Hope appeared to have a chance to score again and sew up the victory.

However, the Flying Dutchmen stalled at the Wheaton 37 with just over one minute to play and the center to punter Ken Feit, also replacing Frens, went over the kicker's head for a 25-yard loss.

It is, the Crusaders took over on downs with 1:00 remaining at the Hope 38 and moved to the 21 in one play, a pass from Dave Carlson to right end Jerry Webb. Wheaton gained its final yardage of the day on the next play, an 11-yard pass from halfback Don Griffin to flanker Mark Pett.

With first down at the Hope 10, Carlson saw four straight pass attempts fall incomplete, thanks to a couple of fine defensive efforts by Feit and Langeland.

Schilstra then fell on the ball twice to end the game.

Hope scored first in the contest when Reed electrified the crowd with a 72-yard scoring return of Griffin's towering 46-

yard punt. The pass from center on the extra point attempt was high and Frens attempted to run for the conversion, but failed. Hope led 6-0 less than six minutes into the game.

Wheaton came back with a long scoring play of its own. Halfback Roger Cornelius powered through the middle and then outran the defense for a 74-yard touchdown five minutes into the second quarter. The then-important extra point was kicked by Griffin, who missed a 32-yard field goal attempt earlier in the period.

Wheaton scored again quickly when 250-pound tackle Larry New recovered a Frens fumble at the Hope 31, Carlson passed 18 yards to Webb at the 13 and workhouse fullback Bob Bennett ramblod the remaining distance through the middle. Griffin once again booted the extra point.

Frens rolled out to his left and dived into the end zone for a seven-yard touchdown run, capping a 66-yard drive with

a junior from Coloma, Mich., round up with five for 16 for 59 yards in the air.

Abel led Hope's ground game with 50 yards in 14 attempts. Langeland added 39 yards in 11 tries and South Haven freshman Bill Plockocki contributed 34 in nine carries.

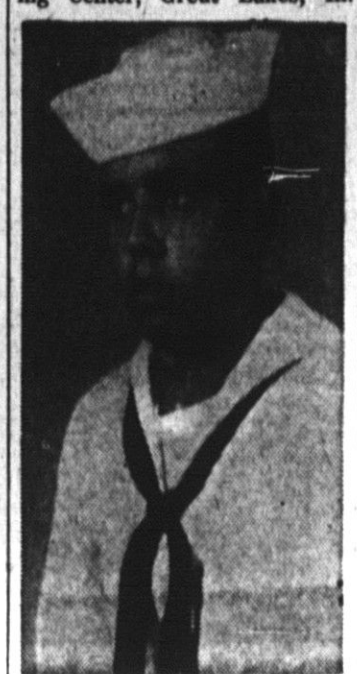

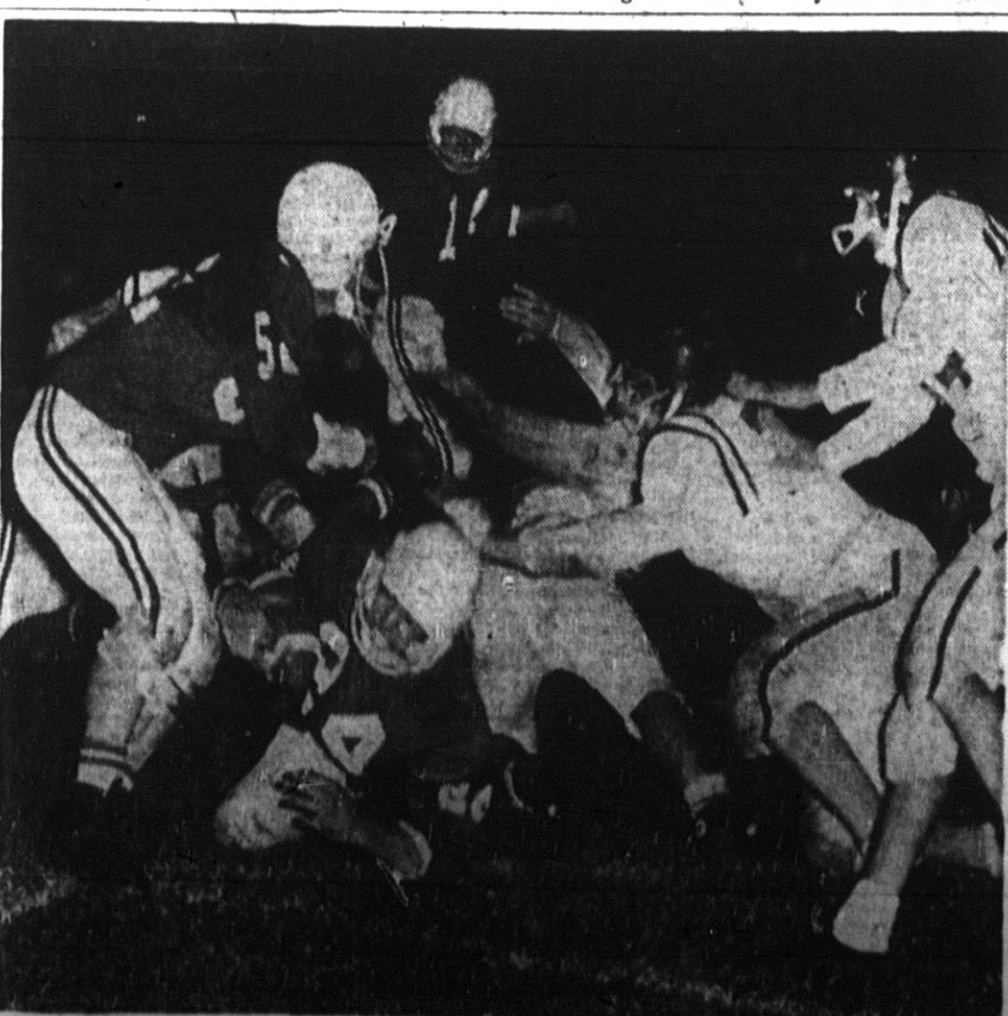

Holland Leads Valley Coast Conference

Holland High took sole possession of first place in the Valley Coast Conference football race Friday night by posting an easy 28-13 victory over determined, but outmanned, Grandville in Riverview Park.

The Dutch rolled to a 28-0 lead as Grandville didn't threaten in the first 47 minutes of the game, but the Bulldogs scored twice in the final 41 seconds to save face.

Halfback Randy Rogers, scored two touchdowns and kicked four extra points and fullback Dave Dick and end Randy Veenhoven each scored once for the Dutch. Holland quarterback Chip Millard passed for a pair of the touchdowns.

Holland ramblod through Grandville for 253 yards on the ground and 133 passing for a total of 386 yards, while limiting the Bulldogs to 31 yards rushing.

Holland moved 51 yards in 12 plays for a touchdown the first time it got possession of the ball. Junior halfback Phil Schaap carried for 24 yards and Dick ran for 19 yards in the series, which was capped by a four-yard pass from Millard to Veenhoven with 5:37 left in the first period.

Bob LaBarge returned a Grandville punt to the Bulldog 44-yard line four plays later and a 15-yard personal foul penalty moved the ball to the 29. Holland scored on a three-yard run by Rogers after Millard had hit for 24 yards to the three on a fourth down and eight to go situation on the 27.

The Dutch struck again midway through the second quarter when Millard passed 27 yards to Rogers for a tally on the first play after linebacker Bill Wick picked off a Rick Millhouth aerial at the Grandville 27.

Dick rushed for 54 yards in a 71-yard drive for the final Holland touchdown, going three yards through the middle for the score with 5:56 remaining in the contest.

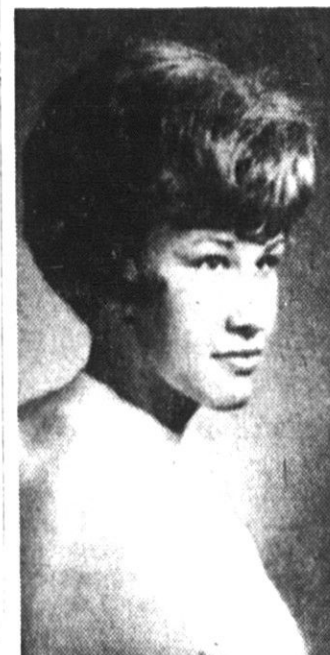

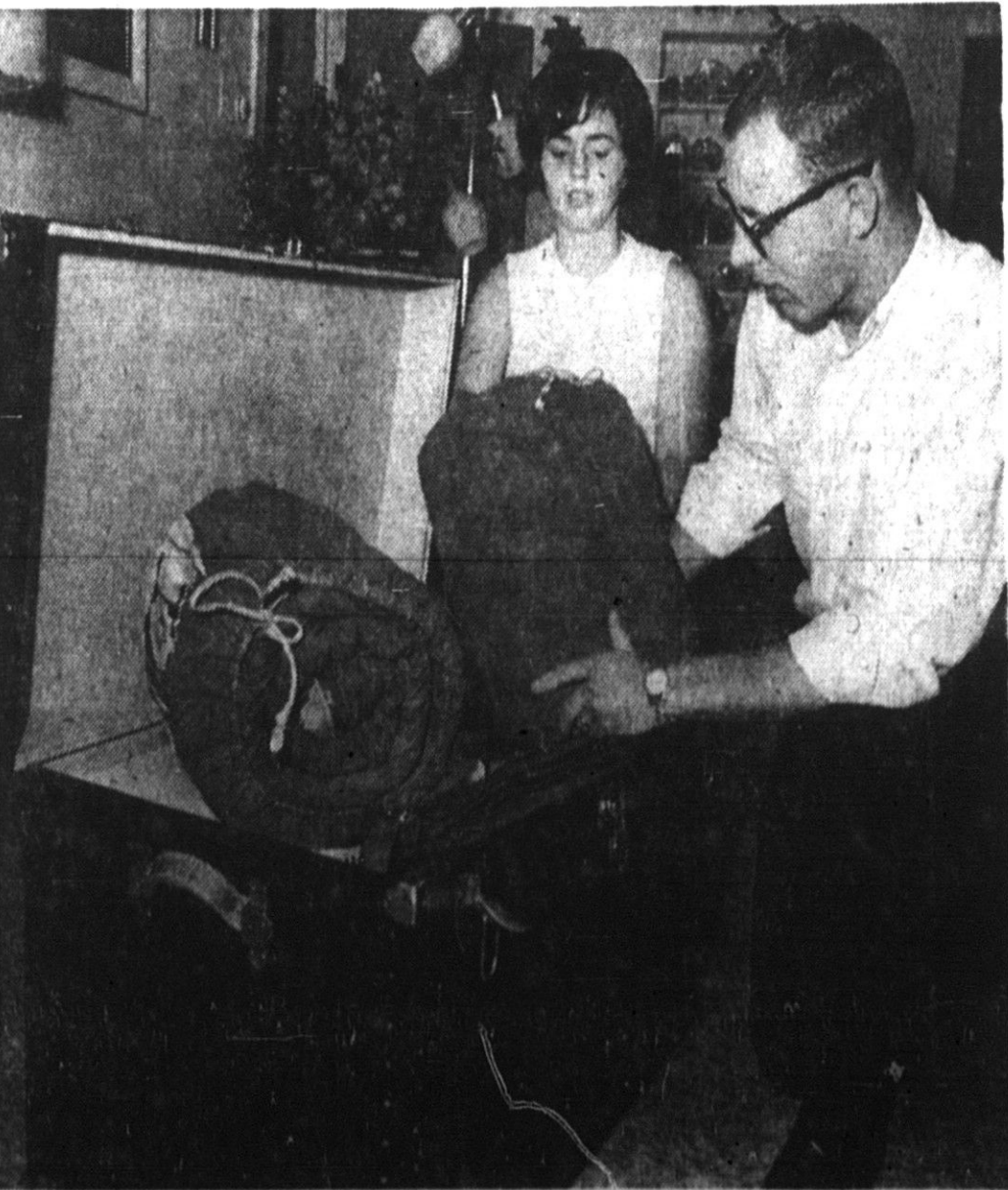

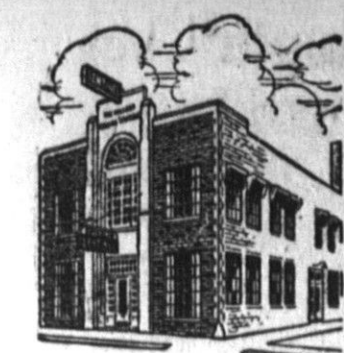

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THE CREDIBILITY GAP

In his famous "Appeal to Arms" speech, Patrick Henry, warning against those who "indulge in the illusions of hope" in the impending Revolutionary War, expressed his view in these words: "For my part, whatever anguish of spirit it may cost, I am willing to know the whole truth; to know the worst and to provide for it." We believe most Americans echo his sentiments and want "the whole truth" in the news reports from the Vietnamese war.

Our editorial of July 13 "Truth in War-Time" raised the question of whether or not we were getting it, and deplored "a growing rift in the confidence of many average citizens in his government." Now comes the revelation that even experts are beginning to question the news. Richard N. Goodwin, recently resigned, but speechwriter and special assistant to both Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, speaking before the National Board of Americans for Democratic Action, revealed that, in the words of a UPI report: "although many of the administration's statements and speeches on Viet Nam are 'sincere' and well-meaning, some are intended to deceive." (and) a deliberate lie and distortion." He continues: "with full allowance for necessary uncertainties, I believe there has never been such intense and widespread deception and confusion as that which surrounds this war."

One may question the propriety of his having disclosed this information after having been privy to the inner councils of the administration. But it is most disturbing to know from a first hand source that the so-called credibility gap is very real and not merely an election-time created myth.

Sunday School Lesson

Isaiah, The Willing Prophet.
Isaiah 6:1-9, 11-12
By C. P. Dame

During the last quarter of this year we will study eleven messages from Isaiah and Jeremiah, two of the greatest prophets of Judah. In the last two lessons we will begin the study of Luke's gospel. This lesson tells us about God's call to Isaiah and his willing response to it.

I. One throne is never empty. "In the year that king Uzziah died I saw also the Lord sitting upon a throne." Isaiah, a man of royal blood, of education, culture and training, a man from a priestly family, a prophet and a statesman had a vision of God in a year when the nation lost a king who had ruled 52 years. Uzziah died a leper because he tried to usurp priestly functions. His death made a deep impression upon the people and especially upon Isaiah. Some events we date by the calendar, some by a particular experience in life, such as a death, a conversion, a graduation or an anniversary.

Some unwise people stay away from God's House in a time of sorrow. Isaiah did the better thing in going. Now and then something striking happens in church. Isaiah lost one king but got a vision of another—he saw God on the throne.

The prophet also saw the seraphims, "the shining ones" or "burning ones" and each one had six wings and "with twin he covered his face and with twin he covered his feet, and with twin he did fly".

Note that these creatures had two wings for flight, that is for service, and four for reverence of worship. This is a healthy proportion from the biblical standpoint. These shining ones sang about the holiness of God. II. A confession of sin is always timely. "Then said I, Woe is me!" He said this after having a vision of God. The man who has a vision of God is apt to see himself as a sinner. The prophet became conscious of a definite sin for he said, that he was a "man of unclean lips."

First the prophet spoke of his own sins and then of the sins of his people. "I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips." Conviction of sin resulted in a confession and then cleansing of sin. "Then flew one of the seraphims unto me having a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with the tongs from off the altar; and he laid it upon my mouth, and said, Lo, this hath touched thy lips; and thine iniquity is taken away, and thy sin purged." A holy God pardons sinners who confess their wrongdoing. The cross of Christ gives us this assurance.

III. God calls and uses forgiven sinners. God said, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" A sovereign, holy God calls for workers. Isaiah heard and responded heartily by saying, "Here am I; send me." God had done much for Isaiah and now he felt constrained to serve Him. Today God has many volunteer workers in the world. Much of the work done in our churches is done by volunteers who freely give of their time, talents, and treasures. Conviction, confession, cleansing result in a commitment.

God did not promise Isaiah an easy time. Preaching has two results. Some respond to God's call, some refuse and harden their hearts. Every time a person says, "No" to God he hardens his heart. God said, "Here am I; I am calling today, who will respond to me?"

K-12 Vote Set Oct. 3 For Allegan

ALLEGAN — A second school reorganization vote has been set for Monday, Oct. 3, in Allegan County.

Affecting only five of the county's nine school districts, the forthcoming election will be held on an area-by-area basis rather than county-wide as before.

The first K-12 election requiring votes to be counted on a county-wide basis failed to pass May 9 of this year. The second vote under Method II of Act 289, Public Act of 1964, calls for a vote by area. If the proposed plan should fail this time, it will be up to the state legislature to decide what further steps to take.

Individual school districts in the specified areas will not vote separately in the October election. According to County Superintendent of Schools William Sexton, votes of several districts in specified areas will be tallied together and a simple majority will determine the outcome.

Any resident of these districts involved in the present reorganization plan may vote if he is a registered elector of the school district in which he resides.

Districts affected by the Oct. 3 vote outcome are Allegan, Fennville, Hopkins, Hamilton and Martin.

No vote is scheduled for the Otsego school district. The two rural schools involved in the first election — Hicks School, Trowbridge Township and Allen School, Otsego Township — were declared "disorganized districts" this summer when they failed to elect new officers following resignation of their school board members. As a result these schools were assigned to the Otsego Public Schools by the County Intermediate Board of Education.

Six rural schools which turned down the original proposal, voted on their own recently to annex to the Wayland Public Schools thereby nullifying the necessity for a second reorganizational vote in the Wayland area.

The Osborne School in Watson Township has been closed but not disorganized. Sexton said Osborne pupils are presently attending school as tuition students at Martin.

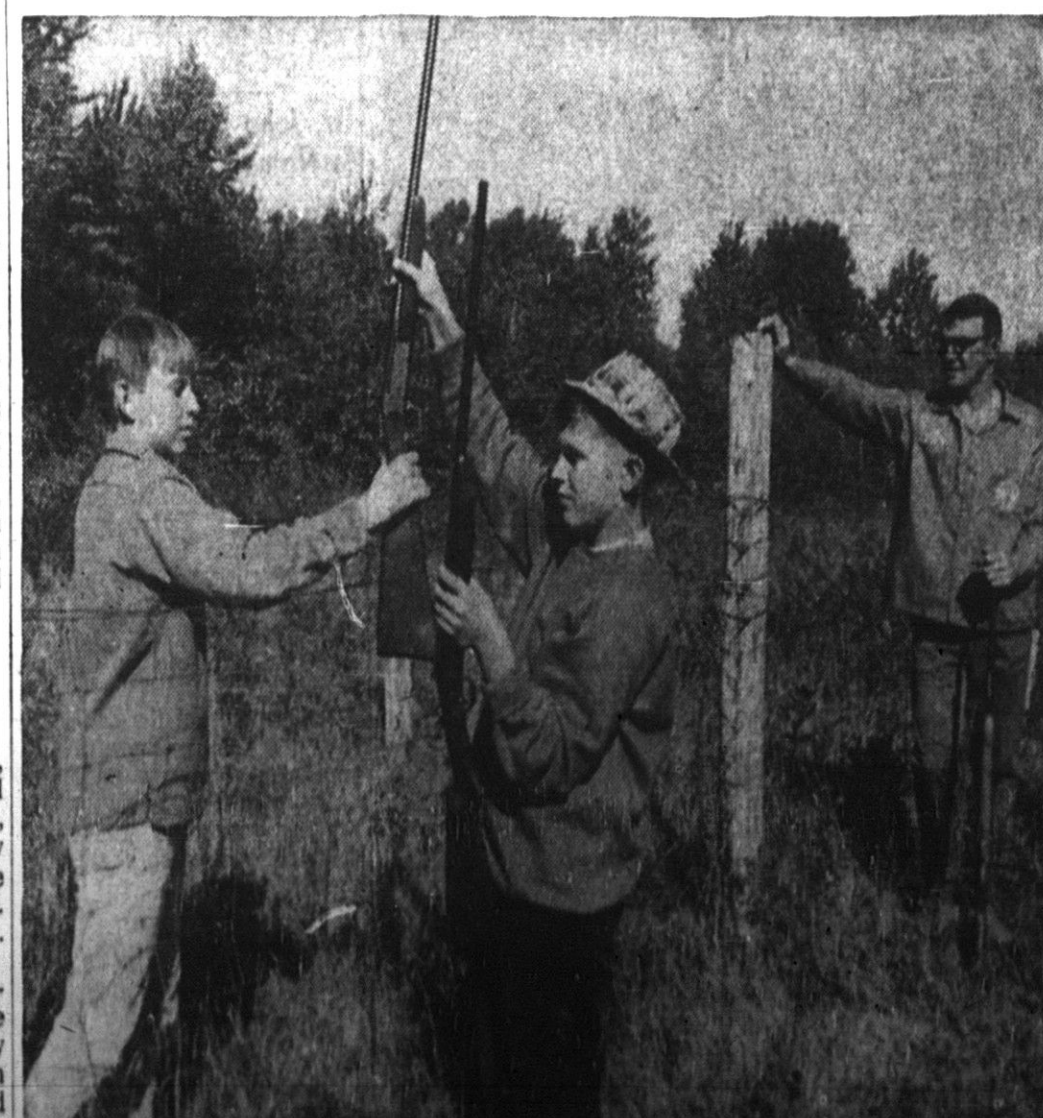

Union Rejects G.E. Offer

General Electric Co. workers in Holland Saturday voted to reject a company offer for a new three-year contract, it was reported today, opening the door for a possible strike next Monday.

The 700-member Local 931 of the International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE) rejected the latest company offer by more than 80 per cent, according to Local 931 president Don Boerman.

Meeting at a mass membership meeting in the Civic Center, Local 931 joined some 114,000 G.E. workers throughout the United States in the weekend contract vote.

A G.E. spokesman in New York said the company had learned from its plants that the nationwide contract offer had been rejected. There was no immediate report on over-all figures.

Extension of the pact from 26 to 30 months, plus a cost of living increase, were cited as main stumbling blocks by several union leaders.

Union officials in Holland are negotiating local agreements with local plant representatives, Boerman said.

Nationally, the IUE - G.E. conference board, made up of delegates from G.E. locals, are scheduled to meet Wednesday at IUE headquarters in Washington to review the status of negotiations and consider calling a strike.

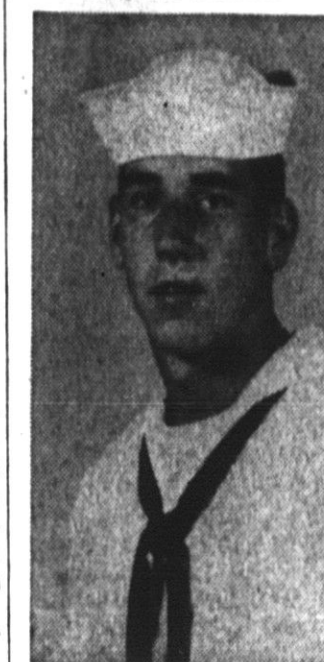

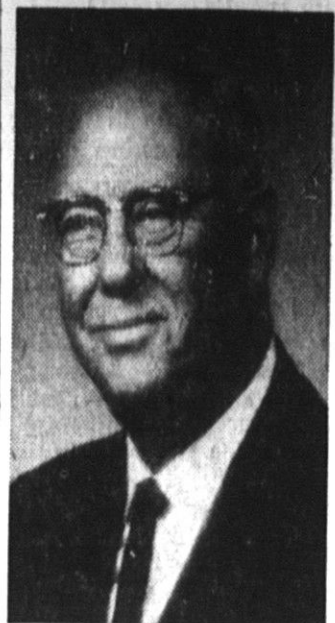

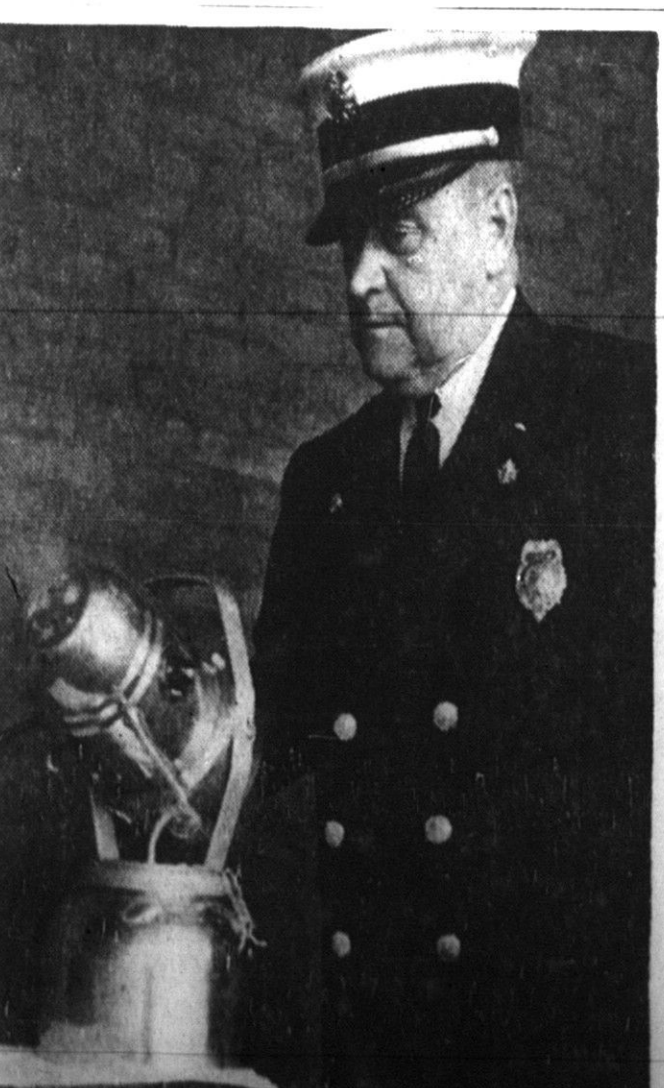
