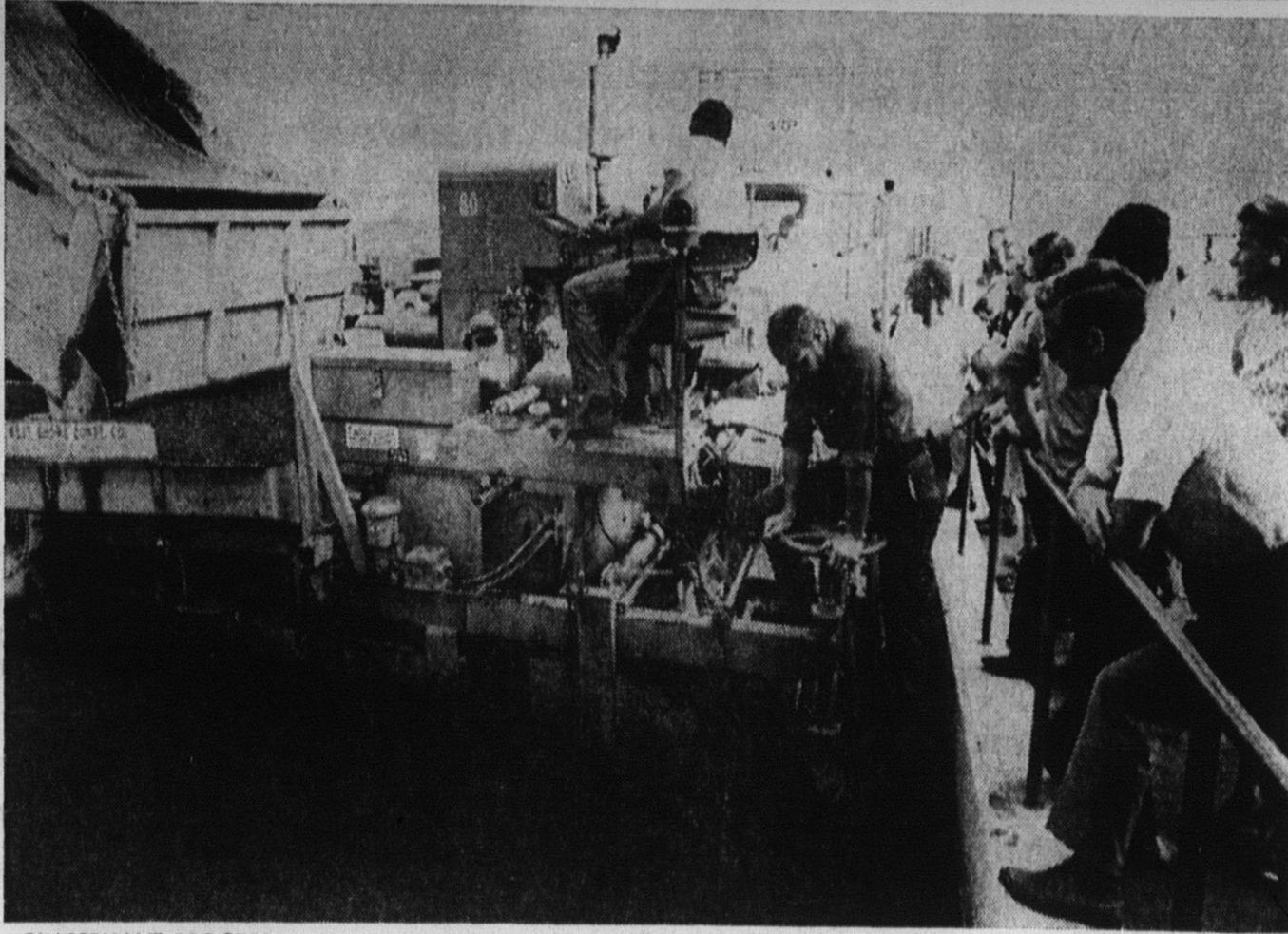

\$332,500 More Earmarked For Ottawa County

GRAND HAVEN — William L. Kennedy, chairman of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners, announced today that Ottawa County has been allotted an additional \$332,500 from Section 5 of the U.S. Department of Labor's Act which previously had allocated \$691,400 to the county. In addition, the county has been awarded the state's share of the same section listed at \$56,400.

Thus far, the county has established 105 positions through its own agencies listing seven cities, nine school systems and various townships. The county again is contacting these political subdivisions before applying for further funding.

It is the intent of the program to establish meaningful public service to be filled from the ranks of the unemployed with preference to Vietnam veterans, public welfare recipients and other disadvantaged persons.

Kennedy said initial funding is expected momentarily and hiring will start as soon as funds are received.

Board Okays Lunch Policy

Holland Board of Education has approved the continuation of the "free and reduced price" school lunch policy for school children unable to pay the full price for lunches because of low income or hardship in the family.

Applications and information are available at the principal's office in each school where school lunches are provided. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

The policy also provides that there be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school offering a school lunch program and also in the office of the financial secretary.

New Fishing Suit Is Filed By Indian

GRAND HAVEN — An unemployed college graduate who claims to be a member of the Sault band of Chippewa Indians, has filed a countersuit in Ottawa Circuit Court seeking to ban sport fishermen from fishing in Michigan waters.

Tony Nertoli, 22, claims that fishing in the Great Lakes and Michigan waters by members of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and other "sport fishermen" is threatening the fish population far greater than fishing by Michigan Indians.

Nertoli's court action is in response to a suit filed Aug. 2 in Ottawa Circuit court against Indian commercial fishermen.

The suit filed in the Ottawa court at Grand Haven by the MUCC was against Donald and Jacob Anthony, the Bay Mills Indian community and other Indians who "claim by virtue of Indian Treaty rights with the U.S. the right to fish in the waters of Michigan without compliance with state fish and game laws."

The Supreme Court in clarifying its ruling of last April in the Jondreau case, spelled out that the Treaty of 1854 conveyed unrestricted hunting and fishing rights only to certain Chippewa Indians in certain townships of Keweenaw Bay.

In a separate case, Ottawa Circuit Court upheld that same position and approved a restraining order which stops Indian defendants in that suit from fishing outside the authority of the Michigan fishing laws. On the basis of evidence presented in that case, the Ottawa Court ruled that Great Lakes fish stock are being seriously injured by Indian commercial fishing, which has expanded out of control in wake of the Jondreau decision.

The Sault Ste. Marie youth claims that the threat against certain species of fish in Michigan waters is 20 times greater if the sport fishermen are permitted to continue fishing, than the threat posed by fishing by Indians. He says the MUCC has 130,000 members and some fish off Ottawa county.

The MUCC members, he claims, have been permitted to "take fish in far greater numbers, and of each and every species than have been taken by Indian fishermen."

In the counter claim he demands that the Ottawa Court issue an injunction, restraining the MUCC and its members and all other sport fishermen from fishing in Michigan waters. Secondly, he asks that the Court issue a preliminary injunction order, restraining the clubs and others from fishing in the waters of Michigan.

He also demands that the Ottawa Court declare this case a "class action" and that all persons who claim by virtue of possession of a fishing license the right to fish in state waters be added as "parties defendant therein."

Power Outages Darken City Area

Trouble of uncertain cause centered in power transformers near the Bohn Aluminum Co., 365 West 24th St., contributed to power failures Saturday that affected much of the southwestern region of the city.

A Board of Public Works spokesman said the first power outage occurred at 5:50 a.m. and others occurred later while repairs were being made and attempts to restore electrical service failed.

Holland hospital was among customers darkened by the power outages but switched to emergency generators to provide power supplies.

Car Runs Out of Control In Parking Lot, Hits Auto

Three cars were damaged in a city parking lot along Ninth St. between River and Central Aves. Tuesday at 2:44 p.m. when one of the cars went out of control.

Police said a car operated by Katherine Knoll, 63, of 86 West 18th St., went out of control while the driver was attempting to park and knocked down a parking meter and hit a parked car, shoving it into one parked alongside.

No injuries were reported.

Ronald G. Kragt, 21, of 139 East 21st St., was killed early Wednesday when the car in which he was riding went out of control while passing another auto along Lincoln Ave. south of the U.S.-31 bypass and struck four trees.

Kragt, thrown from the vehicle, was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital of multiple head injuries. He was the second traffic fatality in the city this year.

Police said Kragt was a passenger in the 1966 model sports car driven by David Jon Neuman, 22, of 315 West 40th St.

The driver of the other car, Candace Jean Emerick, 19, of 397 East Lakewood Blvd., was not reported injured.

Officers said the mishap occurred at 12:15 a.m. today as both vehicles were southbound along Lincoln Ave. near the third entrance to the Willow Park mobile homes, 558 feet south of the bypass.

The Neuman car passed the Emerick auto on the left and apparently cut back too short, clipping the left front of the Emerick auto with his right rear corner. Miss Emerick had attempted a left turn but stopped.

The Neuman auto skidded across the southbound traffic lane and slammed into the first of four trees it struck along the west side of the roadway. The other trees were hit one at a time.

The auto came to rest 93.9 feet from the original impact point. Kragt was found 136 feet from the Neuman car. Police said parts of the car were found scattered about a 200-foot area.

Police said Miss Emerick told them she heard the sound of squealing tires approaching her from behind and stopped her attempted left turn as the other vehicle went past.

About six minutes before the crash occurred, officers were called to 28th St. and Michigan Ave. where a complaint was received of cars squealing tires. A description matching the Neuman car was provided.

Holland police were to confer with the Ottawa county prosecutor's office concerning possible charges in the accident.

Kragt, who attended Holland High and was employed at the Swift ice cream plant, is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nick Kragt; two brothers, Leon D. of Zeeland and Gerald L. of Holland, and a girl friend, Karen Ambler of Coloma.

Services are scheduled Friday at 1:30 p.m. at Notre-Dame-Langeland Chapel with the Rev. Fred Van Houten officiating. Burial will be at Restlawn Memorial Gardens.

Friends and relatives may meet the family Wednesday and Thursday from 7 to 9 p.m. at the chapel.

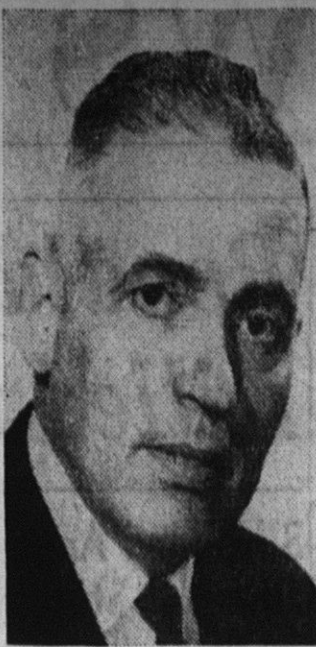

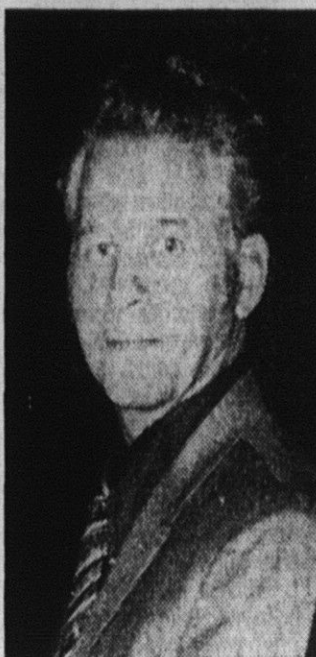
Prosecutor Rules Fatal Shooting Was Accidental

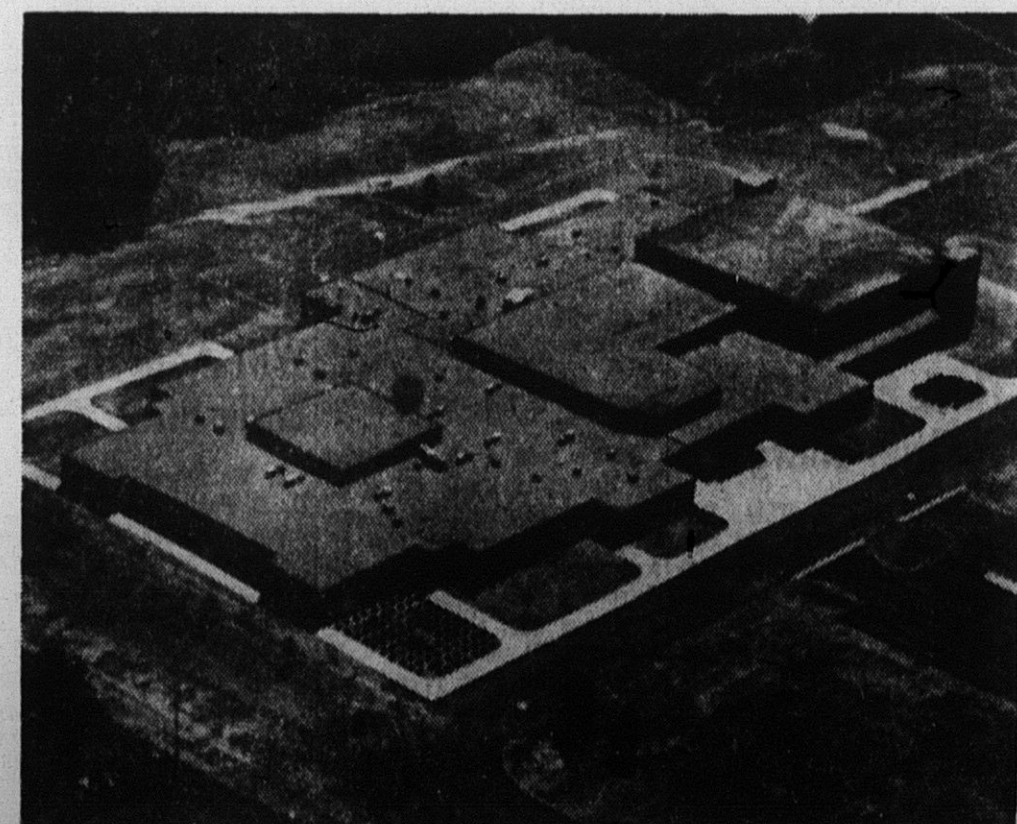

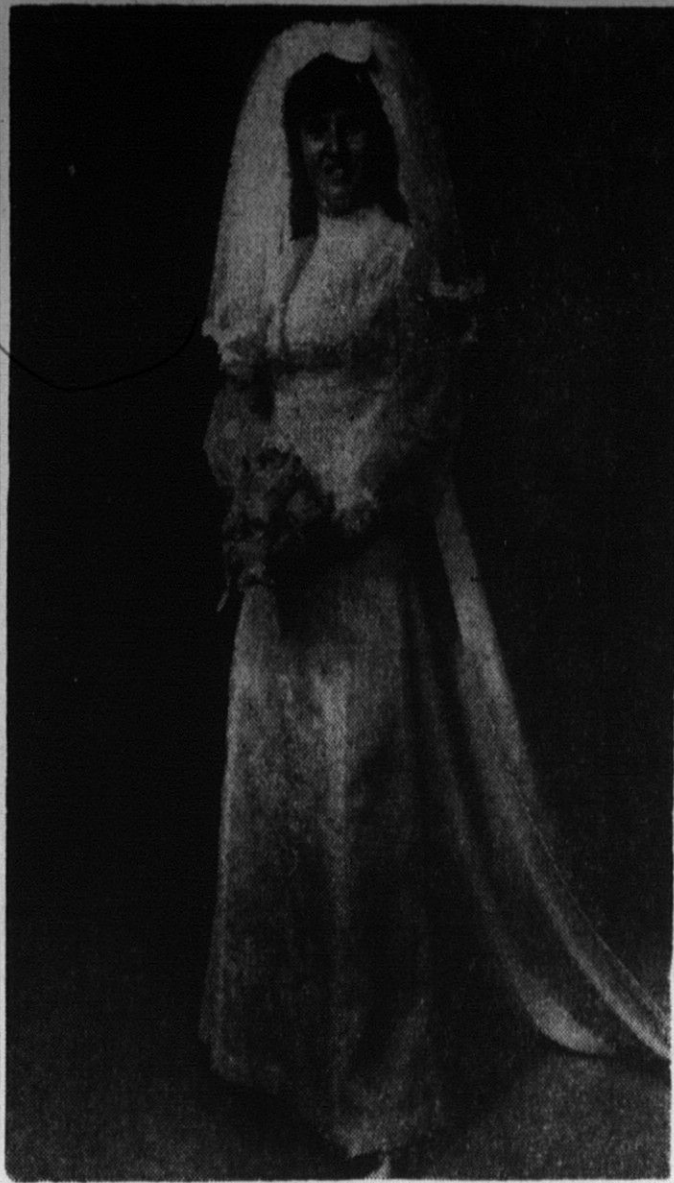

Hope College Given Grant Of \$20,000

Hope College has received a \$20,000 grant from a New York Foundation to be used for student aid.

Half the total is a one-year renewal of a grant of \$10,000 to be used in Hope's work-study program and the other \$10,000 represents a new grant to start a revolving student loan fund to help students who aren't able to secure funds for their education through other sources.

Under the work-study program 20 Hope College students, selected on the basis of need, have been able to earn money to defray tuition and other college costs during each of the last two academic years. Twenty more scholars have been selected for the current school year.

In 1970, this grant represented more than one-third of the total expended under various Hope work-study programs.

Altogether, 1,247 Hope students, 62 per cent of the enrollment, received loan, scholarship, work-study or other assistance from the College or other sources last year. The average amount was \$1,074 per student. A total of \$1,339,748 in student aid was coordinated by the Hope College Financial Aid Office in 1970-71.

Next Friday Zeeland will travel to Rogers hoping to gain its third victory of the season.

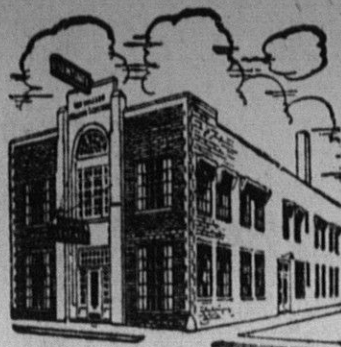

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NIXON'S NICHE IN HISTORY

Guessing about a president's reputation in the future is a risky business at best. There are just too many unseen circumstances that may change what people think of him many decades from now. There have been some presidents who began and lived through their official careers without demanding a great deal of attention who in later years have been reevaluated as very significant leaders. And there are those who caused a great stir while in office who later suffered a decline in reputation.

The case of President Nixon is no different. So far in his official capacity he has made no great impression on the course of our history as we can see it now. He has, however, the opportunity to do great things. There are pressing problems, which, if solved with wisdom and imagination might put him among our presidential immortals.

There is the problem of the Vietnam War. There is still a bare chance that the President may make historical hay out of that one, but he will have to act fast. It may just be that he may stem the tide of inflation, that plague that has killed other nations. There is the possibility that he may be remembered for his realignment of nations and his solution of the China problem if that comes off right.

But his best chance of putting his stamp on the future of American history lies in his appointments to the Supreme Court. By the time he finishes his stint in office, Nixon will have appointed almost half of the justices. There may be a chance for more.

So the best chance, it seems now, of Nixon's influencing the course of our history lies in his appointment of Supreme Court justices.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 3
Bod Calls Men
Exodus 3:1-14

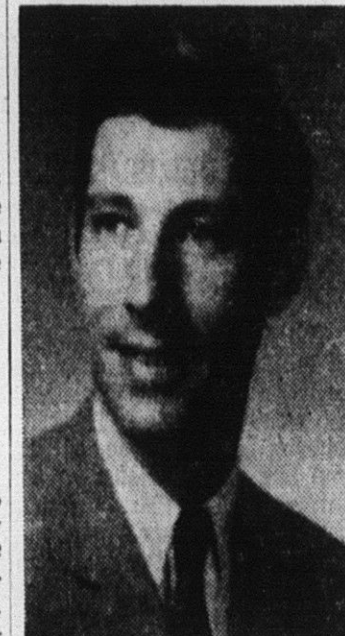
The Bible tells us that God called all manner of men and women to serve Him. This lesson relates how God called a man to lead a people out of slavery.

Today he is recognized as one of the greatest men that ever lived. God still calls people to work with and for Him. I. God calls workers in various ways. Can you tell of several ways Moses, as all Bible readers know, was trained in the best universities to become a high official in the Egyptian court. The first verse of the text says that Moses was keeping the sheep of his father-in-law, Jethro. How come? One day in Egypt an Egyptian slave driver beat a Hebrew and Moses slew the slave driver. On the next day Moses saw two Hebrews struggling together and he reproved the wrongdoer who asked whether he intended to kill him as he had killed an Egyptian. Moses, knowing that his crime had been detected, fled to Midian.

When Moses was sitting down by a well he helped seven maidens to water their flocks by chasing away some bullies who were troubling the girls. Moses was led by the girls at the command of their father to bring Moses home and eventually Moses married Zipporah, one of the girls, who bore him a son whom he called Gershom. While he was shepherding the sheep one day Moses saw a bush that was burning but it was not consumed. Moses turned to see what was happening and there God called him by name and revealed Himself as the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and told him to lead His people, the Hebrews, to the land He had promised to Abraham and his descendants.

II. Excuse-making is old. God had seen the affliction of His people, and was going to do something, but He needed Moses who made excuses—first he spoke of his own personal unworthiness, then he added another excuse that he was not able to answer the Israelites if they would question him about his sender and, finally, he said that the people would not believe him. God had an answer for every excuse and so finally Moses consented and thus began a great work, assured of the presence of God.

God had been training Moses for a great work, first in the universities of Egypt and then in the desert where he learned how to live in a wilderness. At the right time God called this brilliant man to a great work and we still study his contribution to mankind's well-being. The highest honor that can come to a person is to become a tool in God's hands.

Day Care Center Begins Play Area Construction

The first phase of construction started Saturday on a play area to be used by three and four year old children attending the Holland Day Care Center at Third Reformed Church. The groundbreaking was at 10 a.m.

In addition to the classroom space already provided in its educational wing, the church is

now making available the use of an outdoor area for the playground. The first phase of construction consists of free-form sodded earth mounds for running and climbing activities. A nearby tennis court will continue to be used for riding and games.

In explaining the need for the playground, Mrs. David Clark, director of the Center said "A child reacts and responds to his environment far more energetically and immediately than does an adult."

"He is in the process of discovering space — distance, levels, heights — and how he fits into these new dimensions. To him a little bit of height is a hilltop from which he can survey the world."

"The new playground at Third Church Center has been designed to provide for discoveries which will continually stimulate the children's imaginations."

It will be enclosed by a chain link fence and will be divided into two contrasting areas. The hard-surfaced tennis court area will be a wide open space for vigorous tricycle riding and other activities with wheeled toys. The landscaped area with its free form mounds and trees will be a more intimate space with places to explore and hide.

In the mound area, the children will experience the different textures of grass, sand, and brick. There will be a garden in the spring where they can plant some of the foods for their meals. The children will be able to climb the small hills, stretching their muscles and then roll down the slopes.

Work is being donated by parents of some of the children, by members of Third and Hope Reformed Churches, Alpha Phi Omega service fraternity of Hope College and St. Augustine Seminary. Equipment is being provided by Elzinga & Volkers Company, and Shinville Associates, Inc.

The playground was designed by Robert L. O'Boyle Associates, Kalamazoo. The Holland Garden Club has contributed the design fee. An attractive chain-link fence has been donated by the Holland Junior League, and materials for the mounds has been provided by Holland Motor Express Company.

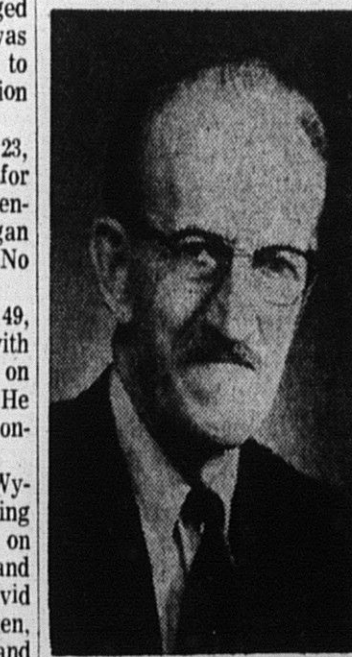

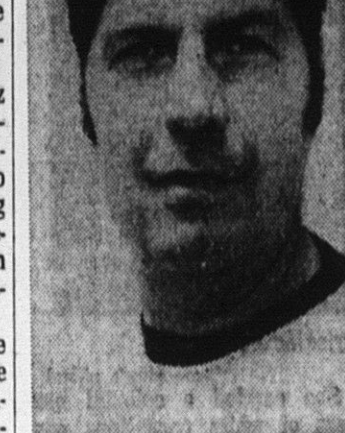

to 1968. Japinga has seen the league grow from six teams to an all-time high of 34 in 1970. This year there were 32 clubs competing in the four fast pitch loops.

Fast pitch sure isn't dying in Holland. Japinga points out that Grand Haven, a town of Holland's size, has only 19 squads compared to Holland's total.

Japinga is called the "Jack

of all Trades" person at Hope College. He didn't want to step down as director but his duties at the college forced him to make the decision. Japinga is equipment manager, trainer at times, bus driver and etc. And besides doing all this, he is a football, basketball and baseball official and a good one too.

"I had to give up something and I'm sorry it had to be this," Japinga said.

Japinga believes that there aren't as many top notch softball teams in Holland like in the past. He added, "this is probably because more are doing it strictly for recreation."

Japinga calls the old VFW team, "the best hitting" club he ever seen. "That Jay Hoffman was one of the best hitters around while Lum Veldman was just an outstanding pitcher. Hoffman died recently."

"In his day, Lum was the best pitcher I have ever seen. Although Bob Ebels of Northside Merchants is the best now," Japinga said.

Some of the things that Japinga is proud of are: softball program is almost all self-supporting; and the bills, lights, umpires and directorship fees are all paid by the entry fees.

The only thing that the taxpayers pay for is the field maintenance and the marking of the field," Japinga continued.

The friendly Japinga admitted that a fair team with a great pitcher would be put in the higher league. "This would be the case of Old North End with Lum on the mound," he said.

"It's been a great pleasure to work with Recreation Director Joe Moran and Bill De Boer, the scorekeeper at Van Tongeren Field and I would like to thank all the umpires that have helped me out," Japinga concluded.

Moran added, "Norm is a fine and dedicated man that we are going to miss a lot."

From the sports department, we would like to thank Norm for all the information he has given us and for making the fast pitch softball program in Holland one of the top programs in the state.

Rick Cook and Rita Den Hertog have the leading roles in this rife fantasy about love by enchanted moonlight and the disillusioning morning - after sunlight.

Dale Conklin and Tully Daniels are the two fathers who have a theory that the way to get children to do what is wanted of them is to forbid it.

Norm Tietzma as narrator not only holds the freshly pastoral story together with comment between scenes but also plays a roving vagabond hired to stage a fake abduction of the heroine so that the hero can win glory in her eyes in rescuing her.

Others in the cast are Dick Rasmussen as a tottering old

Shakespearean actor who garbles the famous lines he has been spouting for years, and Larry Schipper is an actor who can die effectively in the staged abduction.

The spoofing tone of the show is matched by its songs, several of them sweetly sentimental but also mocking jazz under-tones that joshes with love songs.

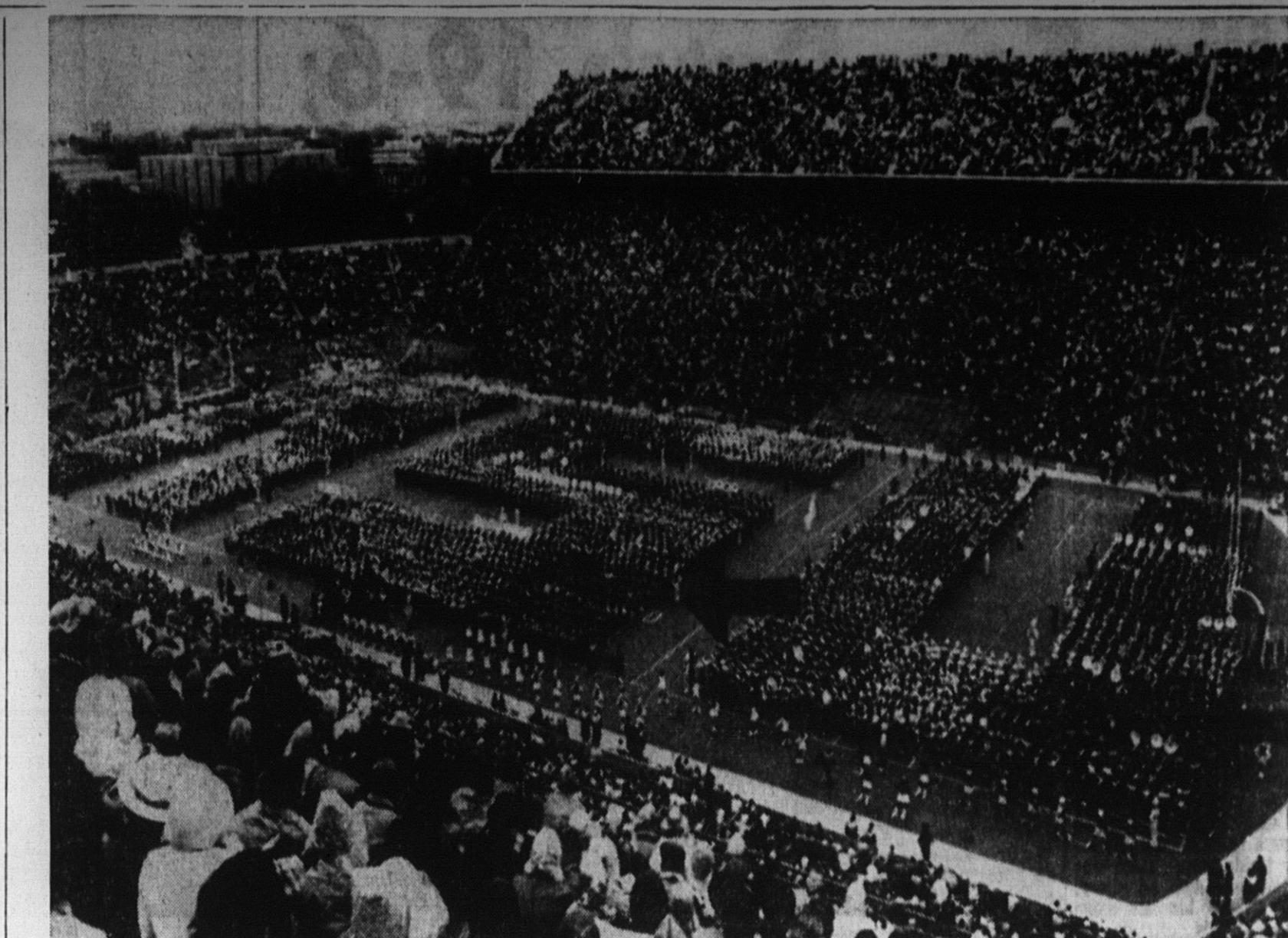
"The Fantasticks" has had a fantastic history. Tom Jones, author of the book and lyrics,

Charged with willful and malicious setting of fires, a felony, were Kurtis J. Potter, 17, of 965 Kenwood Dr.; Norman H. Buurisma Jr., 17, of 136 East 20th St., and Charles Van Der Kolk, 17, of 367 Country Club Dr.

Each waived examination in

District Court Friday and each was released on \$2,000 personal recognizance bond to appear in Ottawa Circuit Court Oct. 12.

Holland police said warrants were issued for more arrests.

Houses where firebombs were reported included Paul Mulder, the high school principal; and teachers Arthur Tuls, Jack Bos and Elmer Ribbens.

Police said the Mulder house at 761 Old Orchard Rd., was the target of firebombs twice—Friday, Sept. 17 when no damage was reported, and again Sunday when a garage door was damaged.

The Tuls house, 952 Columbia

Ave., and the Bos house, 59 East 26th St., were targets Sunday. The front steps at the Tuls house were damaged but no damage was reported at the Bos house.

Thursday night, a firebomb was tossed at the Ribbens house, 668 Central Ave. where the front door, house shingles and front steps were damaged.

Officers said the trio apprehended was believed involved in the Friday and Sunday incidents while Potter and others were involved in the Ribbens house incident.

Officers said the missiles were large pop bottles filled

with gasoline and rags were stuffed into the neck before the devices were lit and hurled.

Officers said the devices were not believed hurled from passing cars, but taken to the area by car and then a person or persons walked to the houses.

Police said a number of teachers at the high school had reported eggs tossed at their houses since August including three of the homes which were targets of the firebombs.

Police said a description of a car seen leaving the scene of the Tuls' incident Sunday was checked and aided in the apprehension of the three.

Grand Haven Area Flooded by Rain, Power Cut Off

GRAND HAVEN — A heavy rainfall and power failure virtually paralyzed the tri-city area of Grand Haven, Spring Lake and Ferrysburg for about two hours early Monday.

A total of 3.61 inches of rain fell during the night, including 3 inches in one 45 minute period. It flooded hundreds of basements in homes, some of them to a depth of 4 to 5 feet.

The fire department was called to pump them out.

A power failure struck more than 12,000 of the area's 16,000 population. There were no reported injuries, but a small section of a roof collapsed at the Peerless Novelty Co.

Streets and yards in lowland areas were under water for two hours and many cars and trucks were stalled.

Consumers Power Co. reported scattered outages in Ottawa county due to the storm.

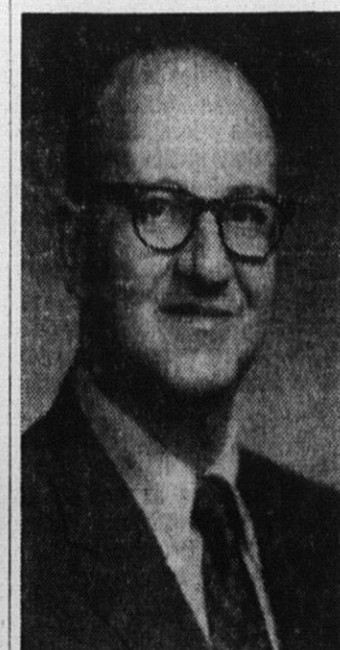

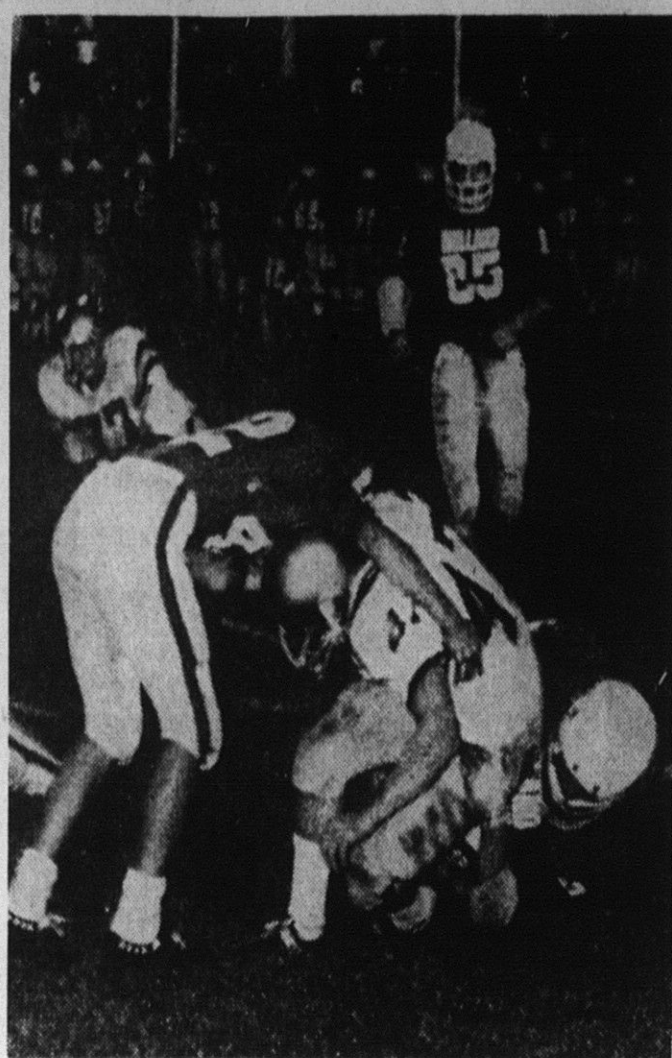

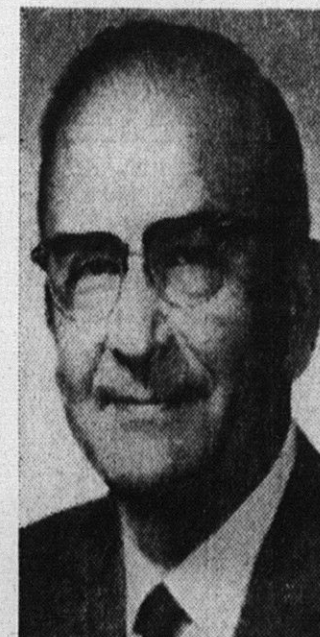

Campbell Building Mushroom Farm

CAMDEN, N.J. — Joseph Campbell Co., agricultural subsidiary of Campbell Soup Co., Friday announced contracts for construction of a mushroom farm in Allegan county southwest of Pennville, Mich.

The "under-roof" operation will produce mushrooms for Campbell food processing plants on a year-around basis. 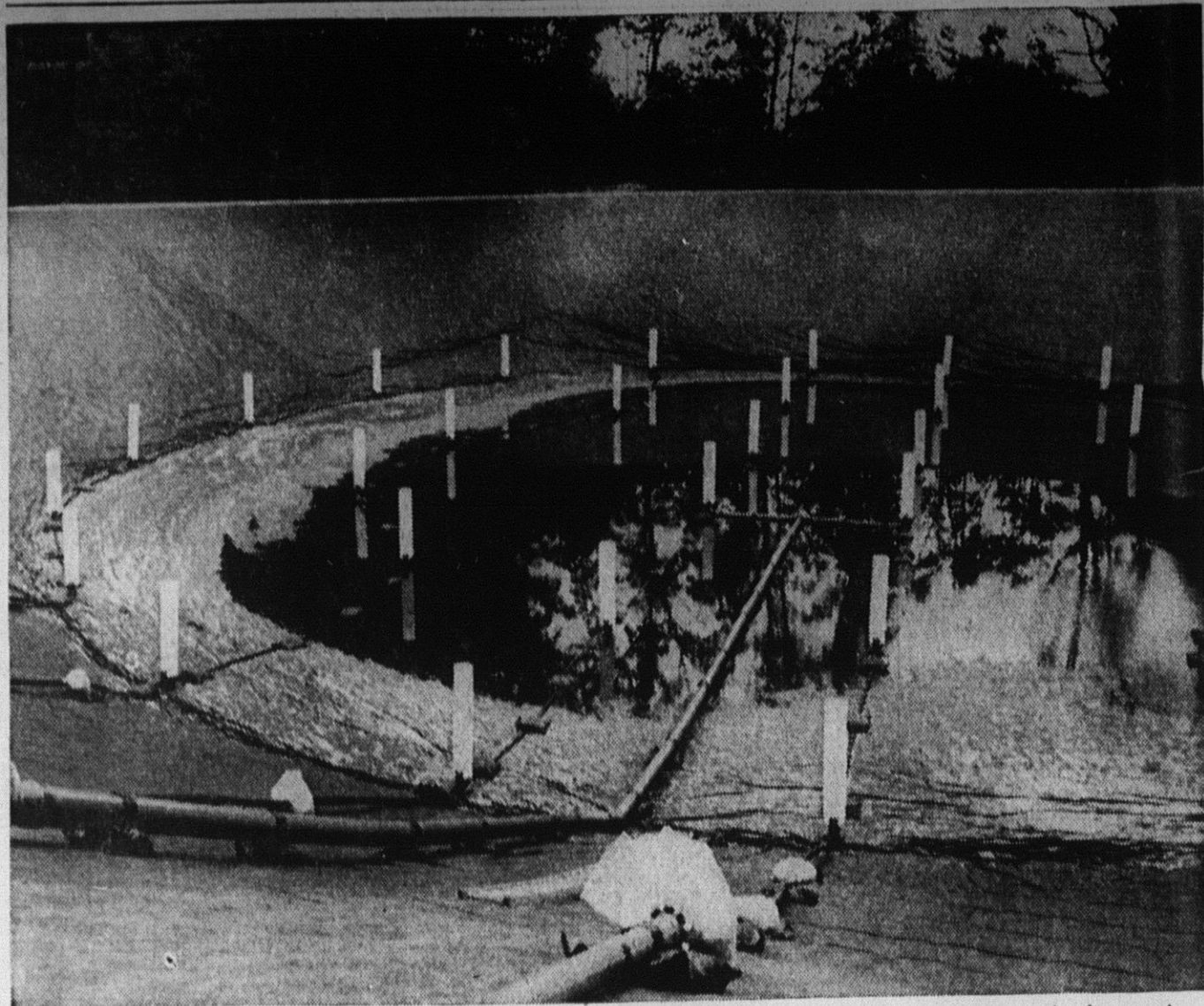

Chemetron Ready to Use Waste Treatment Plant

One of the first of a new type of lagoon systems designed for pollution control at a chemical plant goes into operation this week at Chemetron Corp. Pigments Division plant along Howard and Douglas Avenues.

The system, which uses a football stadium-type lagoon, is designed to reduce biological oxygen demand (BOD) to levels acceptable to Michigan pollution control agencies.

Heart of the secondary waste treatment plant is the aerated lagoon seeded with an activated sludge of oxygen-fed bacteria that consumes organic matter in the pigment plant wastes, plant manager Clifford Cuneo said.

The process lowers the BOD before effluent is released into Lake Macatawa. Construction of the lagoon, part of the \$300,000

anti-pollution project, began in June.

Project engineer Rodney Schroeder said the effluent flowing from the system into Lake Macatawa would be cleaner and full of more oxygen than water now in the lake.

The lagoon, dug on Chemetron property along Douglas Ave., holds 4.8 million gallons of plant manufacturing wastes. Compressed air will add oxygen to promote growth of the bacteria.

The lagoon measures 152 feet in diameter at the base and 252 feet at the water level. It is about 20 feet deep and lined with a rubberized material called Hypalon to prevent possible seepage of effluent.

Aeration is accomplished by a system that employs mixing tubes mounted in the lagoon through which compressed air is pumped. Previous aeration

methods used mechanical mixers which sometimes became fouled in freezing winter conditions.

Before entering the lagoon, plant wastes are treated in a clarifying system along Howard Ave. where lime is used to adjust the acidity-alkalinity levels and solids are removed. There are two such tanks, one added in 1969.

Underground plastic piping connects the clarifying tanks with the lagoon.

In earlier pollution control measures, Chemetron drilled two mile-deep wells in 1966 and 1969 to dispose of acid wastes from color pigment production without endangering ground and surface water resources.

Some 15 years ago the plant switched from a coal to a gas-fired boiler, eliminating a smokestack that emitted fly ash.

The board also announced plans for members only Fun Day Horse Show, to be held on Oct. 9 at 1 p.m. There will be judged events, timed speed events and games.

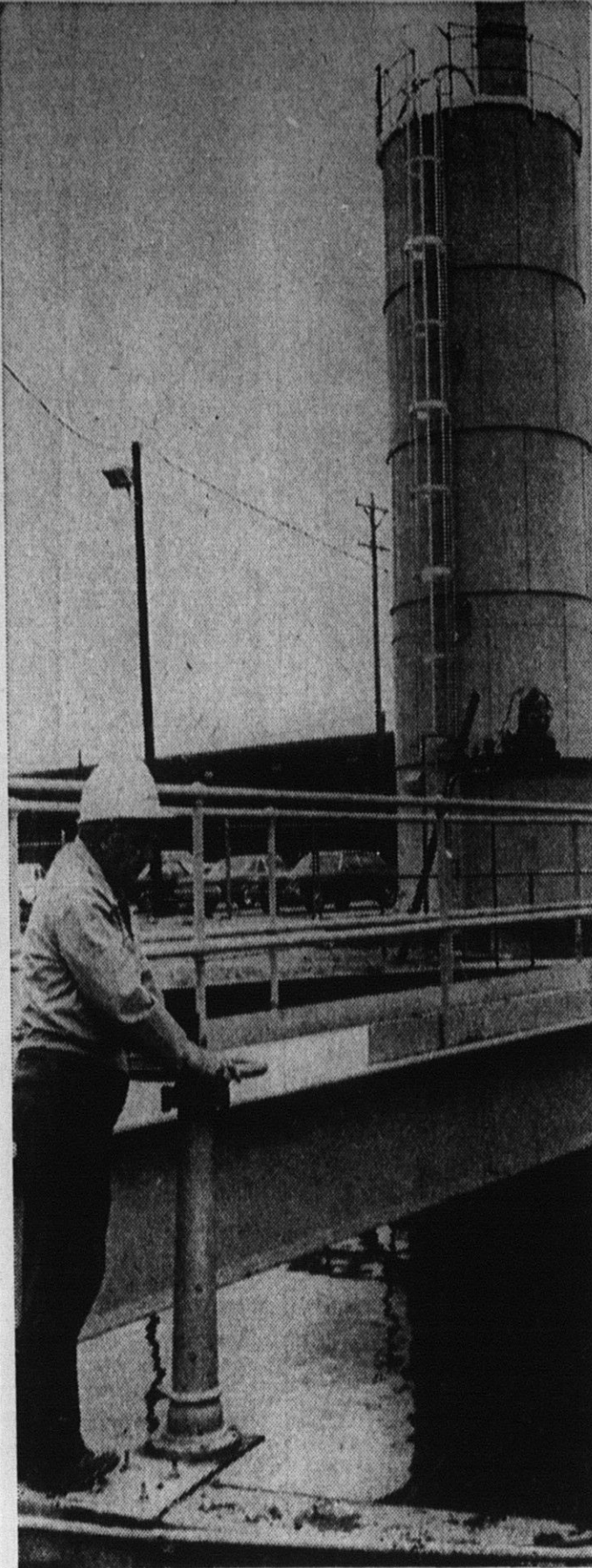

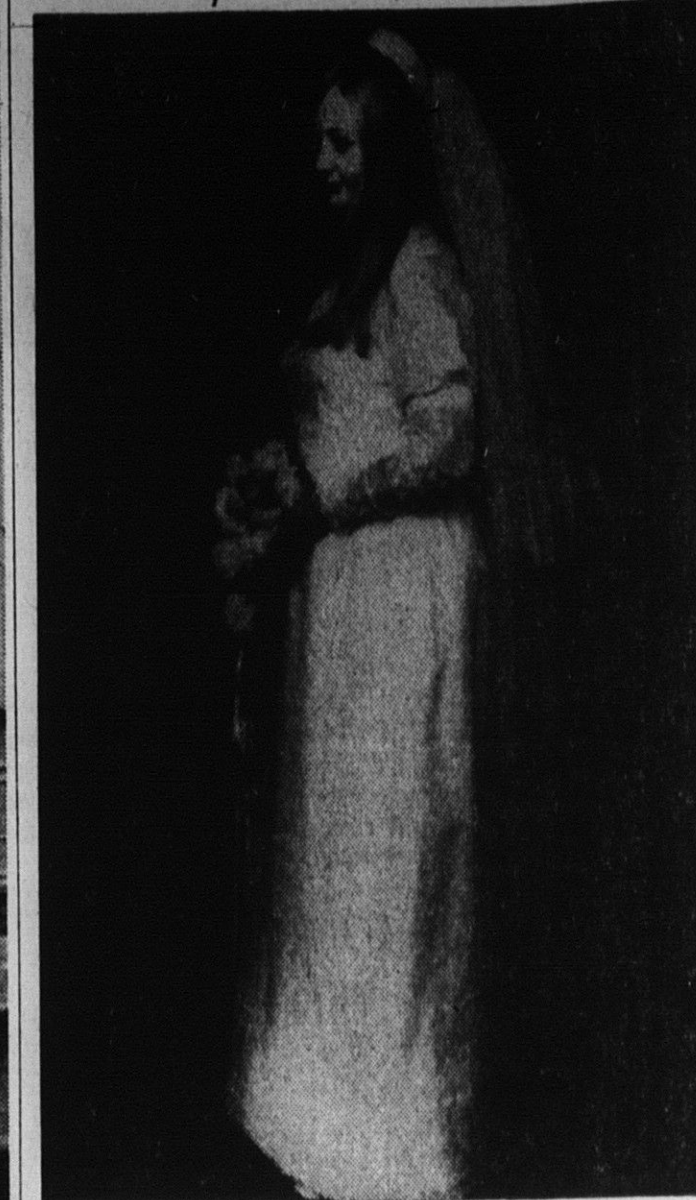
