car went off the east side of the road, hit a driveway embankment, became airborne and struck the tree. He was dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. His death is the 31st traffic fatality in Ottawa county this year.

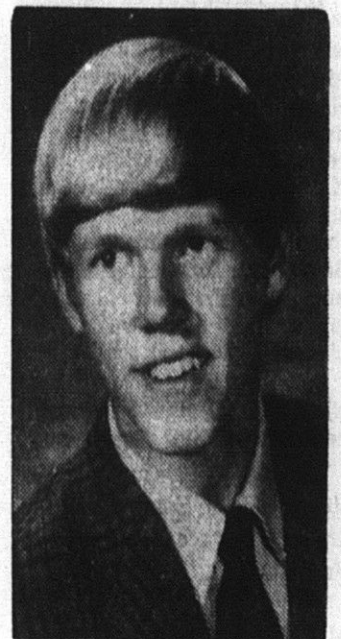

## Edwin H. Boers Dies in Crash

Edwin Henry Boers, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Boers, 12161 Polk St., route 2, Holland, was fatally injured at 1:37 a.m. Saturday when the car he was driving went off 120th Ave., one-tenth of a mile north of New Holland St. in Olive Township and struck a tree.

Boers was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital with a skull fracture.

Ottawa County deputies said

Boers was northbound along 120th Ave., and lost control. The car went off the east side of the road, traveled 87 feet off the roadway and struck a driveway embankment.

The car became airborne and traveled another 47 feet through the air before hitting a tree.

Boers' death is the 31st traffic fatality in Ottawa county this year compared with 25 on this date in 1971.

Boers was employed by the Vanderby Co., of Holland and attended Zeeland High School. He was a baptized member of the South Olive Christian Reformed church.

Survivors include the parents; two sisters, Mary Ann and Barbara Jean; two brothers, Glenn Jay and Vernon Lee, all at home, and several uncles and aunts.

## Pair Robs Glenn Couple

GLENN—State Police Saturday continued their investigation into the armed robbery of an elderly couple in their residence along Lakeshore Dr. a mile north of her early Friday.

Two male subjects fled with \$18 in cash and a portable television set after forcing their way into the small nursing home of Daisy McGuire, 64, and Carl McGuire, 66. Troopers said the McGuire care for three elderly persons in the home but none was reported injured.

Officers said the intruders broke down a front door at 1:30 a.m. Friday to gain entry. They wore sheet-like hoods over their heads with holes cut for the eyes. Both were believed to be young men.

Troopers said the intruders, armed with a double barreled shotgun, held Mrs. McGuire at gunpoint while they searched a bedroom and a storage room. Before leaving they ripped out the telephone line.

Mrs. McGuire notified State Police of the armed robbery at 7 a.m. Friday.

## Board of Appeals To Meet Thursday For Two Hearings

The Board of Appeals will meet Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in Council chambers of the second floor of City Hall. Two hearings are scheduled.

Tabled from the last appeals meeting is a request by Louis Padnos Iron & Metal Co. on whether proposed use of a newly constructed building at the rear of 52 West Fourth St. for a baling operation would create a nuisance or increase an existing nuisance.

The board will also hear a request submitted by Bethel Reformed Church, 279 West 19th St. for a variance for use of the property for a first floor and section of the basement of the house for supervised youth programs and activities. The second floor would be for a semi-student couple to serve as supervisors.

Church uses are permitted in this zone district, however a sideyard of 20 feet is required. The house is located about 11 feet from the east property line.

Also, in this zone district, for a single family dwelling, a lot width of 60 feet and a lot area of 7,200 square feet are required. The lot in question was 54 by 124 feet and has been reduced in width by about 12 feet with the construction of the parking lot to the west.

It focused on fund-raising; communications; public relations and advertising; administration and management; recruitment; relationships; and program information.

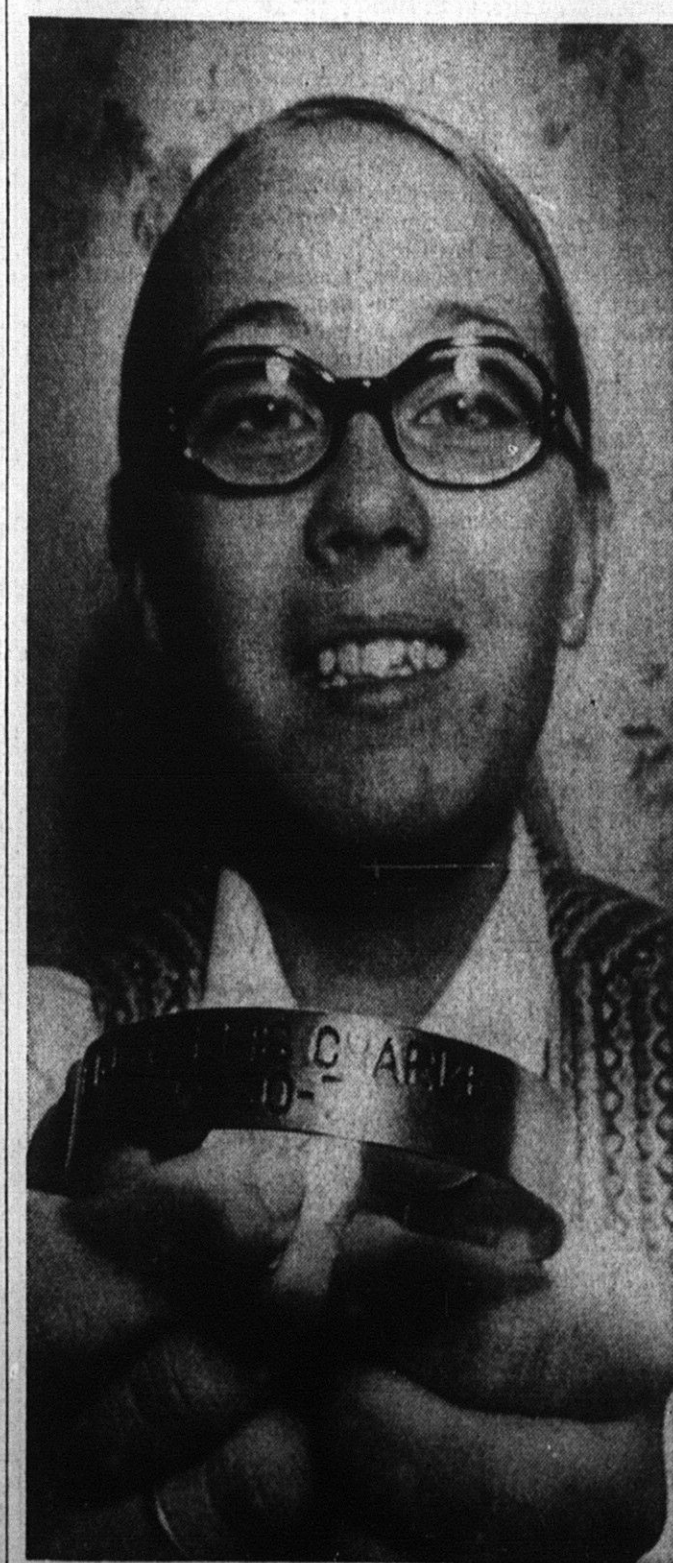
## Gordon Wheaton, 71, Dies in Columbus, Ohio

Fire damage was confined to the living room. Damage was estimated at \$1,000. No injuries were reported. The Wright township fire department responded.

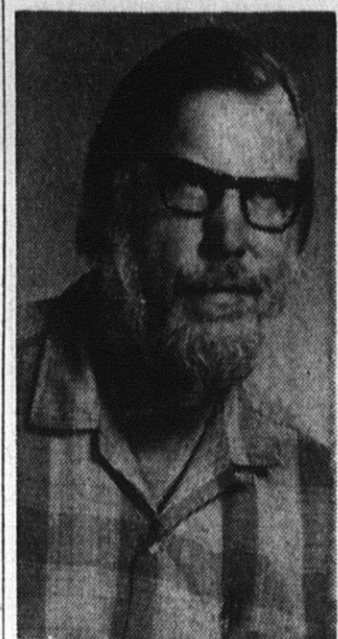

## Holland Firm Sued For Auto Repair

DETROIT — A Grand Rapids couple was awarded \$300,000 in a lawsuit against De Nooyer Chevrolet, Inc. of Holland which installed a faulty fan blade in their 1964 Ford.

Trial in Wayne County Circuit Court began last week and was ended Wednesday when the jury awarded the damages to James Reno, 28, the plaintiff.

Reno was injured when the fan blade tore loose while he was inspecting the engine two months later in front of his father-in-law's home in suburban Melvindale. He was struck in the face.

The automobile was originally purchased by a Zeeland firm and the engine failed in 1966. The car was repaired in June, 1967 by De Nooyer with an engine obtained from a scrap dealer and sold by the Zeeland firm to a wholesaler in Grand Haven who auctioned it to a Grand Rapids firm which sold the car to Reno, a De Nooyer spokesman said today.

In the trial it was learned that the mechanic doing the installation found one of the fan blades bent and allegedly straightened it. Experts testified once a fan blade is bent it should usually be replaced since imperfections could set up engine vibrations.

## GVSC Begins Nursing Degree

ALLENDALE — The Board of Nursing of Michigan's Department of Licensing and Regulation, voted unanimous approval Sept. 21 for initiation of Grand Valley State College's new baccalaureate program in nursing commencing January 1973.

"We are extremely pleased by the Board's action," Dr. Vera Brand, director of GVSC's School of Health Sciences' nursing education program, stated. "Our program, as outlined to the Board, has as its major objec-

tive, 'to prepare a nurse who is competent in providing sensitive and skilled health care for patients and their families in any setting.' We now look forward to implementing that goal through our first clinical courses for approximately twenty nursing students in January."

Offering an integrated curriculum within the College of Arts and Sciences, GVSC's new, fully approved program will lead to the Bachelor of Science degree in nursing. Earlier approval of the program was granted by the State of Michigan Board of Education, in Sept. 1971. Further details for both entering students and transfers may be secured from the Director of Nursing Education at GVSC.

Dr. Brand joined Grand Valley as director earlier this year from her position as chairman of the master's program in medical - surgical nursing at the University of Utah. She was joined this month by three new faculty members at the School of Health Sciences' nursing ed-

## Hearing Set On County Health Needs

A public hearing on health needs of Allegan and Ottawa counties is scheduled Thursday, Oct. 12 at 7:30 p.m. in the Heritage Room of Holland City Hospital.

The hearing is sponsored by the West Michigan Comprehensive Health Planning Unit (WMCHPU) formerly known as the Area-wide Comprehensive Health Planning Unit (ACHPU). Gerald Van Noord, chairman of WMCHPU, said the goal of the hearing is to decide what health needs are most important and how the needs can best be met.

WMCHPU is a planning unit designated by the federal government and composed of local citizens for a 12-county area of West Central Michigan. It is concerned with all aspects of physical, mental and environmental health.

Activities have included the study and approval of expansion plans for Allegan General Hospital, Holland City Hospital and Beacon Light Christian Nursing home in Marne and a study report of mental health services in Ottawa county.

Current WMCHPU is working on a study of the long-term care needs of Allegan and Ottawa counties.

## Well-known Artist Visits Macatawa

The scenery of Holland could very well be permanently captured and "hung" forever in a prominent museum in any part of the country or even the world.

William Samuel Schwartz, 75, of Chicago, an artist of international acclaim and tribute, has taken up temporary residency in Macatawa and weather permitting, takes his palette and talent out in search of new conquest.

A 1912 emigrant from Russia, he studied art at the Art Institute of Chicago, after attending Russia's Vilna Art School on scholarship. A firm believer in formal art education, Schwartz, however, repels at the thought of himself as an art teacher.

Sporting a carefully groomed moustache of the Salvador Dali vein, Schwartz has been described by art critics as "a romantic poet, a dreamer, a great craftsman and a good painter." Paintings on his motel room walls show a unique sense of color and perspective.

While studying art and continuing through his early years as a painter, Schwartz capitalized on his other talent: an operatic tenor. He performed numerous concerts and speaks lovingly of vaudeville as it was known in the 20's and 30's.

Still a hard working artist, he usually spends his days in front of a canvass and devotes his evenings to the performing arts. A recipient of awards and honors, Schwartz's work is on display in nearly 80 museums around the world including the Illinois State Historical Museum in Springfield where "The Emancipator" a mural with life size figures is on permanent display. His paintings have also been featured as covers for several editions of the "Journal of the American Medical Association."

Although a resident and citizen of this country nearly all of his life and a world traveler, he has never tired of the beauty and variety of the American scenery or of the vitality of the American people. He is a strong advocate of American art and American artists and believes they have

not been given either the recognition or credit that many deserve.

Schwartz and his wife, a retired kindergarten teacher, plan to stay in Macatawa a few more weeks before returning for the winter to their apartment in Chicago where Schwartz will continue to stroke, shape and mould the things he sees and feels.

In the meantime, he and his wife will roam the Macatawa Hills and the surrounding area, looking for another subject waiting to be immortalized.

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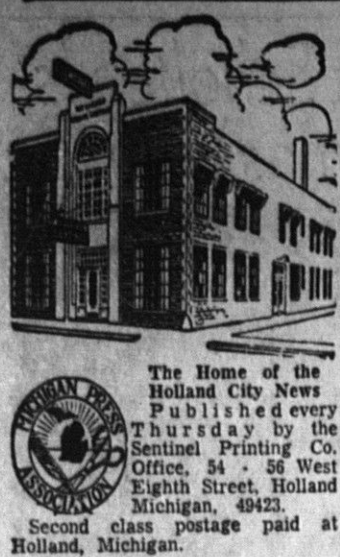
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## WHEN THERE ARE NO BASICS

In North Bend, Wash., dozens of men, ignoring the warnings of state troopers, stole 36,000 pounds of beef from an overturned trailer. In cities all over the world, murder by mail is being used by Arab terrorists. The two incidents reflect that the same lack of moral restraint is just as true with individuals as with men bound up with an international conspiracy. And this might well be the basic problem that our world faces.

We don't see our moral commitments tied to any basic core of faith that is absolute. And this gives us a relativism that allows us to do our own thing in any way that we please. We have seen the world moving more and more in the direction of amorality as the predominant faith by which we live.

What does one do when there is no basis? Can one make judgements? Can one put a man in jail? Can one speak of right or wrong? Actually not. We can now recall those days of a few years back and more when we poked fun of those basic issues that kept society together. Now we have dozens of writers asking what we can do when the foundation for morality has vanished.

As we said in our first sentence, the stealing of beef and the Arab terrorists have something in common. And this is where our real problems begin.

## Sunday School Lesson

Social Changes:  
Mass Communications  
II Timothy 4:1-5;  
Philippians 4:8-9  
By C. P. Dame

We live in a day of communication. News reaches people quickly. We can spend a lot of time considering the power of mass communications and its influence upon children, teenagers, adults and the family life but we will be sensible if we discuss how we can use this power for Christ and His Church.

I. Preaching the Word is important. "Preach the word"—so wrote Paul the seasoned preacher to young Timothy in his letter to his spiritual son. "I charge you," the new English Bible says, "I adjure you"—words that came from the heart of a man who was dead in earnest about the work God called him to do. Paul's world needed God's Word and ours sorely needs it too. When the Word is preached, modern problems such as poverty, racism, drugs and injustice, will be treated as the central truth of salvation by grace.

The word should be proclaimed urgently, "in season and out of season" and preachers should "reprove, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and doctrine." The warning note—"For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine"—is healthy teaching, and therefore they will "heap to themselves teachers having itching ears." When the Bible is rejected, some preachers turn to political and social action and humanism.

"But watch thou in all things," wrote Paul to Timothy who was working in wicked Ephesus, and "endure afflictions" when resisting the devil and "do the work of an evangelist," thus winning converts. Today the gospel can be presented in many ways. Let us use as many as possible.

II. Thinking should be followed by doing. "As a man thinketh in his heart so he is," therefore think upon and practice the virtues Paul mentions, the things that are true, honest, just, pure and lovely and "whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."

This is a time of propaganda. The Bible is in a way propaganda for God. We are bombarded by error and by the truth. The choice is ours. We can accept the truth or reject it. The battle is on. Who will win the minds of this generation, the devil or the Lord?

Placing third for the Panthers were Rita Van Vleet, Deb Streuer, Nancy Angel, Mary Jo Bertsch and Kim Hartman.

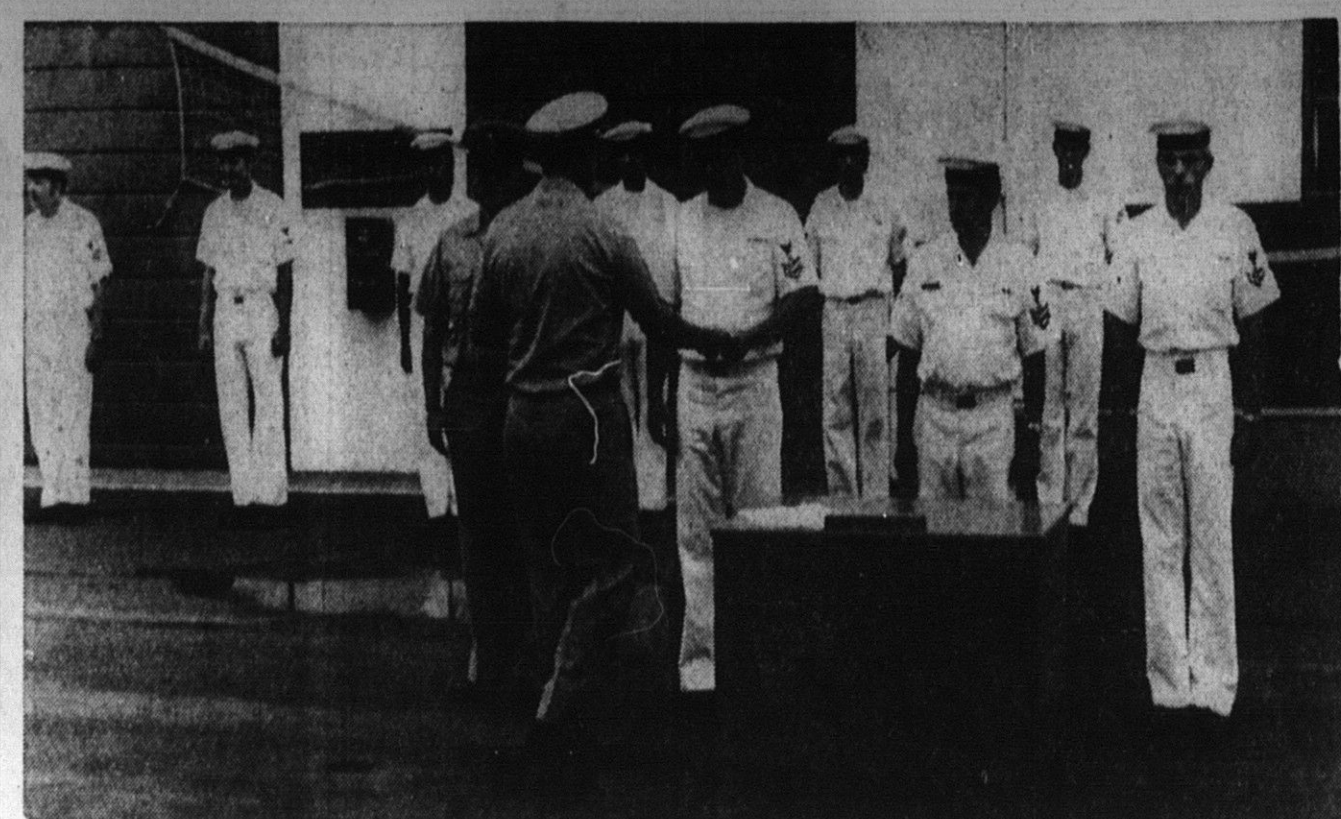
The Panthers are now 0-2 for the season and will face Rockford Wednesday.

## Peoples State Bank Merges With Old Kent

A proposal to affiliate the \$51.6 million - deposit Peoples State Bank of Holland with the \$648.6 million - deposit Old Kent Bank and Trust Company of Grand Rapids, and the subsequent ownership of the banks by a bank holding company, has been agreed to in principle by the directors of both institutions.

The holding company would be Old Kent Financial Corporation, proposed parent of Old Kent Bank and Trust Company. The joint announcement was made today by Richard M. Gillett, President of Old Kent, and Clarence Klaasen, Chairman of the Board, and L. C. Dalman, President of Peoples State Bank.

Terms of the proposal were not announced. However, shares of Old Kent Bank's parent, Old Kent Financial Corporation, will be used in the exchange if the proposal is approved. Approvals must be obtained from the Federal Reserve Board and Peoples State Bank's shareholders.

Old Kent, established in 1853, operates 33 offices in the area it serves. Peoples State Bank, established in 1905, operates six

offices in Holland. In making the announcement, Gillett stated that "since nearly the turn of the century the Peoples State Bank has furthered the growth and prosperity of the people of Holland and its surrounding area by providing for their financial needs. We are extremely pleased that their board has elected to join us in pursuing this partnership. I am confident that the combining of interests and forces of the two institutions would be of greater and continuing benefit to customers, shareholders and the entire communities served by both banks."

Klaasen and Dalman joined Gillett in expressing their belief that "the proposed affiliation will provide additional and expanded services to the Holland market if approved. We will increase our ability to serve the people of this area with no anticipated change in employees or directors."

Earlier this year the Board of Directors of First National Bank of Cadillac announced their intent to affiliate with Old Kent Bank with subsequent ownership by the Old Kent Financial Corporation holding company.

The Panthers had a big half-time lead in the statistics rushing for 100 yards to the Falcons 53. But Kentwood seemed to come up with the big play when they needed it. Again it was Beekman in the third quarter on a big fourth and five situation as he caught a pass on the two yard line. Even though the third period ended in an 8-8 tie, it only took two plays to score from the two, with Ficher scoring and running it in for the two point conversion giving Kentwood the edge 16-8.

## Dutchmen Rip Concordia Best Start in 14 Seasons

RIVER FOREST, Ill. — Off to its best start in 14 seasons, the Hope College Flying Dutchmen posted their second straight football triumph Saturday defeating Concordia Teachers College, 34-13.

The decision was never in doubt as Coach Ray Smith's Dutchmen led 34-0 early in the fourth period behind an effective rushing and passing attack and a defense that limited the host Cougars to only six yards rushing.

Victories in the first two games this season constitutes Hope's best start since the 1958 season when the Dutchmen won eight of nine games and captured the MIAA championship. The current three game winning streak is the longest for a Dutch team since 1963 when Hope ended with five consecutive wins.

Sophomore quarterback Bob Carlson spearheaded the Hope victory scoring two touchdowns while completing 11 of 20 passes for 123 yards.

As a team, Hope had one of its most successful offensive performances ever gaining 549 yards — 390 of them on the ground. The Dutchmen ran 85 plays as compared to the losers' 47 and owned a lopsided 30-5 advantage in first downs.

Junior tailback Bob Lamer, seeing action in less than three quarters, netted 190 yards in 29 carries while freshman Bob Miller of Columbus, Ohio celebrated his Hope running debut with 87 yards in 10 trips.

Coach Smith cleared his bench early in the fourth quarter giving his entire 36-member traveling team an opportunity to play. Arnold was a graduate of Holland High and Ferris State College. He had been employed at the Dutch Boy Bakery 14 years and retired from Chris Craft in 1961 after being employed there six years.

He had lived at 165 Duntun Ave. until moving into Holland three years ago where he lived with his sister.

WYOMING — Hudsonville lost a tough football game to Godwin Friday night, 35-12.

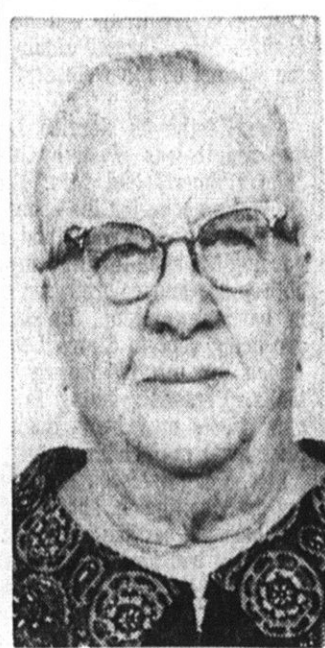
Godwin opened up an early lead by scoring 21 points in the first period while Hudsonville scored only six. The score came on a 34-yard run by Dave Hessler.

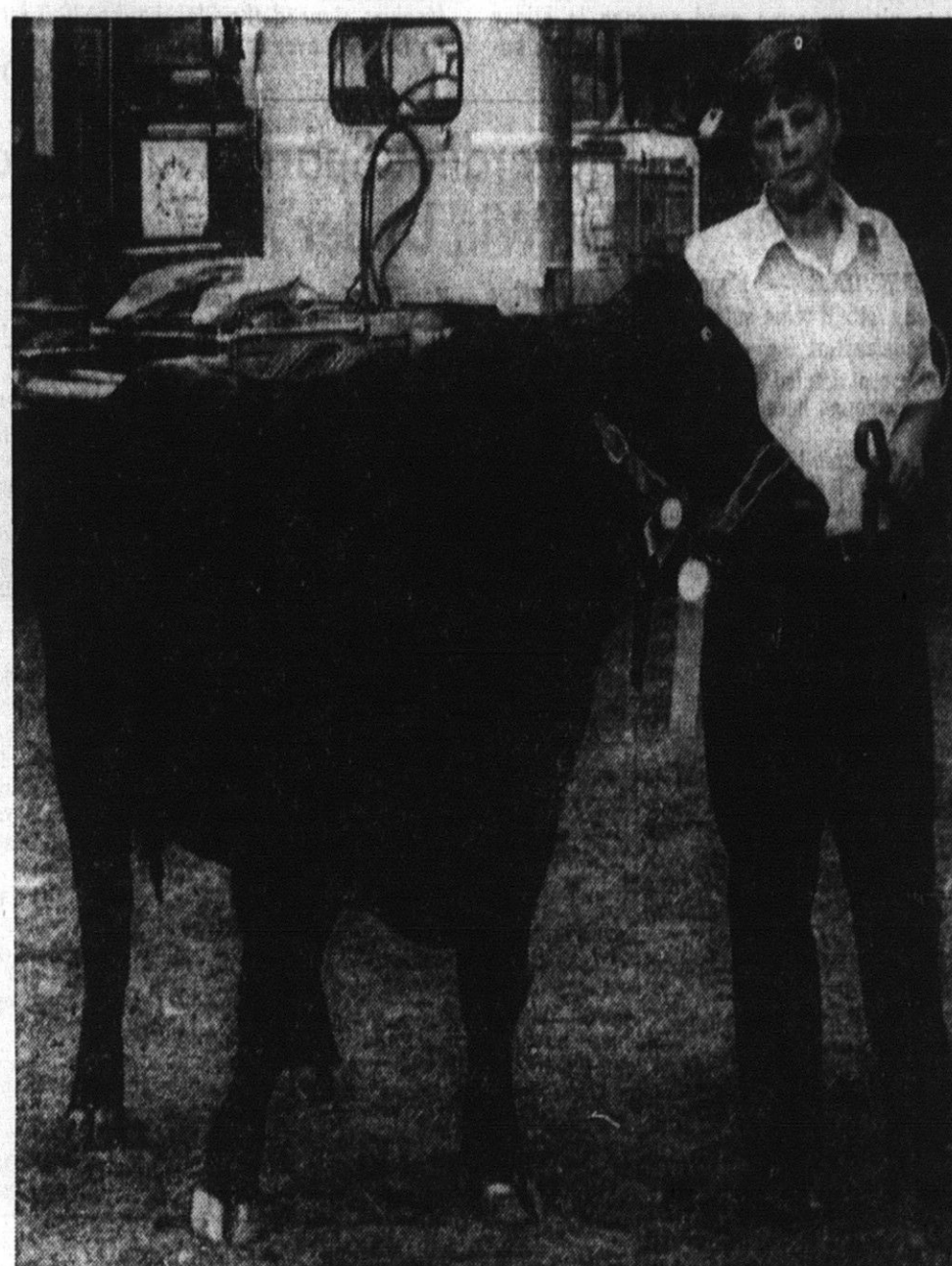

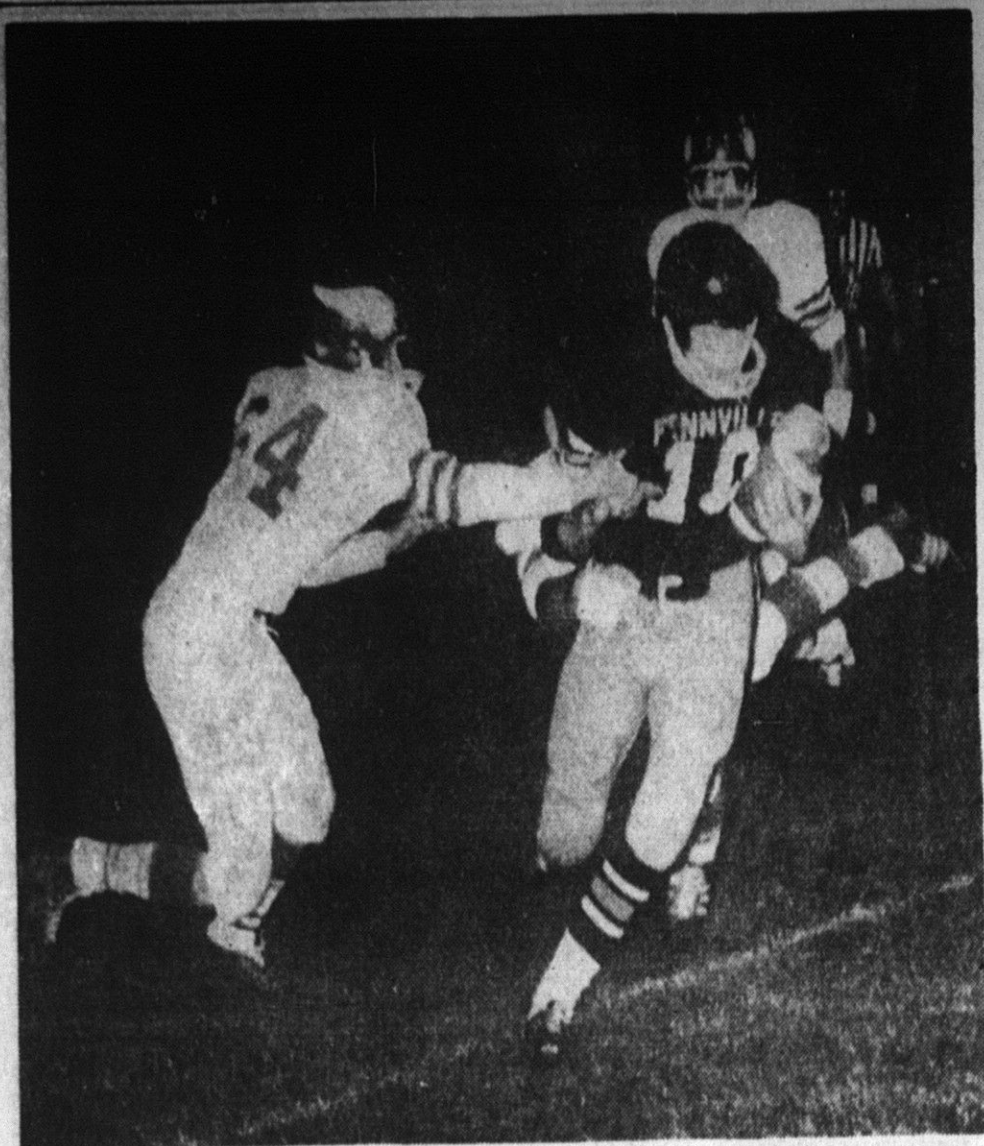

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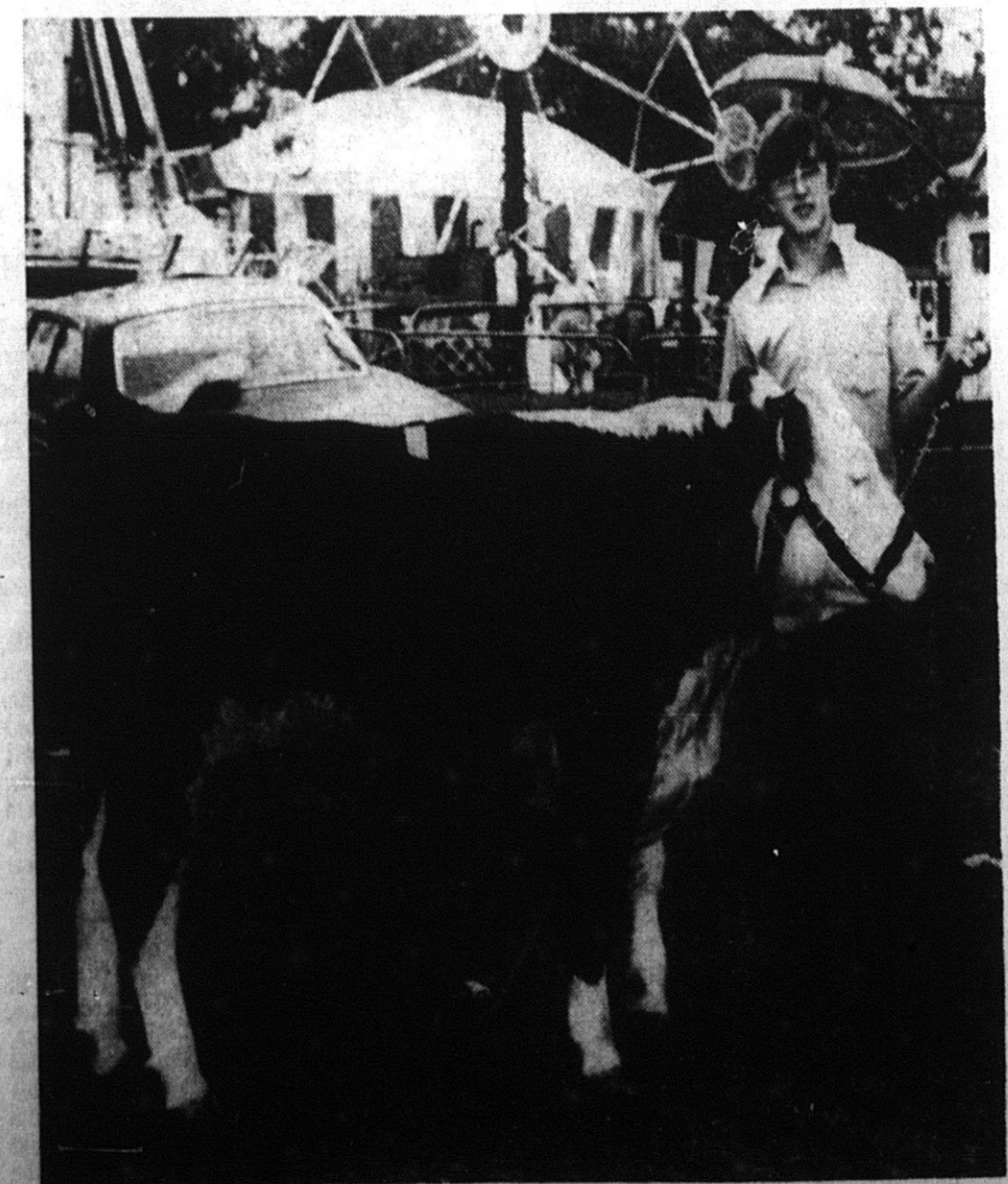

**NILES** — Bill Small of Niles proved he wasn't too small Friday night to Holland, as his toe was the difference in the football game, as the Vikings took a hard fought 21-18 decision.

The defeat was the second straight for new Coach Dan Porretta while Niles ran its record to 2-0.

Actually Holland had the best of the statistics, as they out-gained Niles in total yards 281-141 but two crucial fumbles and one key interception gave the Vikings the win.

Dick Wood, Holland's fine quarterback, put on a fantastic display of passing to ends Ron Israels, Ross Lamb and Dean Kapenga. Wood and sub Steve Bonnette finished the evening with 178 yards through the air on 12 completions out of 30 attempts.

With Wood on the bench because of leg cramps with only 5:30 left, Bonnette's pass was intercepted by Ed Hartman on the Niles five-yard line to kill off Holland's bid for win No. 1.

The Dutch got the ball back with only seconds remaining but it didn't make any difference, as the Vikings gobbled up another pass.

Ken Hoese, Niles' workhorse running back, scored the first of his three touchdowns with 5:46 to play in the second quarter by plunging three-yards for the TD after a Holland fumble had given Niles the ball on the 25. Small's kick was good and the score read Niles 7 Holland 0.

The Dutch came right back as Wood looked like Greg Landry of the Lions by dropping back in the pocket and hitting Lamb for 41 yards to set up Holland's first TD, as Clark Kuipers ran 10 yards for the score.

Niles marched right back to score its second touchdown with Hoese again going in for the score from the two. Small's kick was good again as the Vikings led 14-6 with only 2:08 to play in the first half.

It was about this time that two of Holland's finest players, linebacker - guard Jack Strabbing and tackle Mark Dykstra were injured and missed the rest of the game. Strabbing sustained a shoulder injury while Dykstra had a pinched nerve in his neck.

Wood went to the air with only seconds left, as he directed the Dutch down to their second touchdown of the season.

A pass interference on Niles with time already run out in the half allowed the Dutch to run one more play, and the result was a great catch by Israels between three men for a touchdown. Clark Kuipers' run was no good but the Dutch did cut the deficit to 14-12.

Another Holland mistake gave Niles the eventual deciding TD as Hoese dashed into the end zone from the four with 2:45 left in the third period. The TD was set up by another Dutch fumble on their own 25. Small's kick looked bigger than ever, as Holland now had to score twice to pull out the verdict.

Tim Barkel recovered a Niles fumble inside the five and two plays later Wood passed to Lamb all alone in the end zone for six points to close out the Dutch scoring.

Holland's defense with tackle Mike Windisch and Larry Arizmendez leading the way, did a fine job of containing the Vikings the rest of the way.

The Dutch will host Godwin next Friday night.

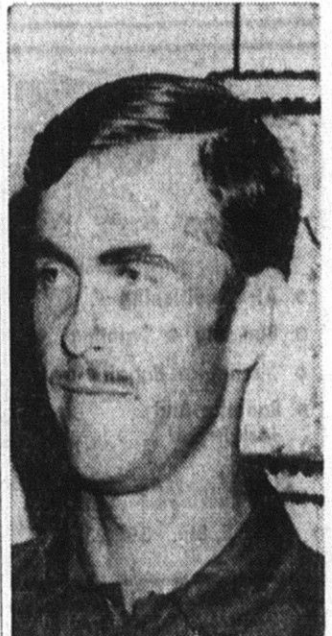
## Mrs. P. Dykstra Dies at Age 81

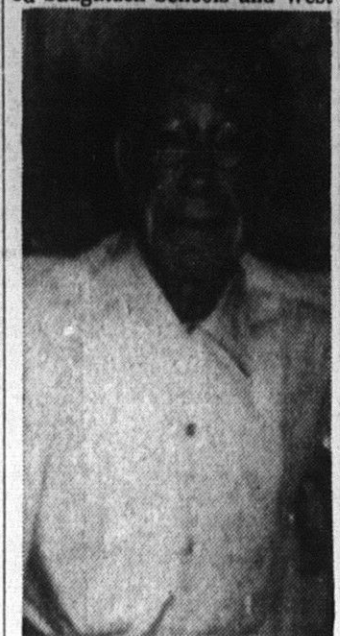
