Driver Serious After Hitting 3 Houses, 2 Trees

Louis Schaap, 21, of 3915 142nd Ave., was in serious condition at Holland Hospital Tuesday with injuries received in a spectacular one-car crash on Riley St. west of 136th Ave. about 2 a.m. Tuesday.

Schaap received a fractured left leg, a fractured left hand and facial lacerations when his high-powered sports car ran off Riley St. and struck parts of three houses, a car and two trees. The car traveled 582 feet across five front yards before finally coming to a stop. Schaap and the tailpipe of the car were thrown on to a sixth yard.

The accident followed a chase at speeds in excess of 110 miles per hour by Holland police. Ottawa County sheriff's deputies who investigated the accident said Schaap apparently lost control of the car at 136th Ave. as he sped west on Riley St.

The car went off Riley St. 400 yards west of 136th Ave. at Mrs. Jennie Wright's residence, 248 Riley St. It then struck a tree in Mrs. Wilma De Graaf's yard, sideswiped a car in Donald Bocks' driveway, and crashed into the Bocks home, 268 Riley St.

The car punched a hole in the brick front of the Bocks home, shattered windows and moved a bed four feet in which the Bocks were sleeping. The couple was not injured.

The car carrying bricks with it then careened into a pillar supporting an overhanging roof on the garage of the Gerrit Klinge residence, 276 Riley St. The four inch by four inch wood pillar was propelled into the Klinge's home, and broke through into their kitchen. Bricks from the Bocks residence were also propelled into the Klinge home. The hood of the car was left on the Klinges' porch.

The car finally stopped after hitting an evergreen tree and the front porch of the Harvey Johnson residence, 282 Riley St. Schaap was thrown on to the Chester Harmsen front yard at 286 Riley St.

Deputies said that the damage including \$6,000 for the car would run in excess of \$15,000.

Holland patrolman Robert Schra started chasing Schaap when he noted him traveling north on River Ave. near Fourth St. at a high rate of speed. Schra pursued him north on River Ave. to Butternut Dr. and then north on 144th Ave.

Schra then chased him east on Quincy St. to US-31, south on US-31 to Riley St. and then west on Riley St.

\$500,000 Pool Set For 22nd St.

Holland voters will vote on a swimming pool as well as elementary school construction at a special election called for Dec. 7.

This was decided at a special meeting of the Board of Education Monday afternoon. The swimming pool project had been deleted at a regular monthly meeting last week, pending further study on financing.

The swimming pool vote calls for an indoor pool to be built at the corner of 22nd St. and Maple Ave. at a cost not to exceed \$500,000. This cost would be amortized over a period of 20 years with a maximum tax levy not to exceed 6 mill starting in 1966.

Another proposition will call for 25 mill for three years for operations of the pool. The school proposition calls for a \$1,000,000 bond issue to replace old Van Raalte school and old Longfellow school and to relocate Maplewood school on a school-owned site in the vicinity of 38th St. and Central Ave.

Consequently, voters will face three propositions, (1) the \$1 million school bond issue, (2) the \$500,000 swimming pool bond issue, and (3) operating millage for the pool. The operating millage would provide approximately \$21,000 a year, based on equalized valuation of the school district of \$86 million.

Only property owners and their spouses may vote on the first two issues. All qualified voters in the school district may vote on the third.

The school district includes all of Holland city except a section in Maplewood area which is a part of the Hamilton school district.

The board vote was unanimous.

Tells Police Of Stealing Six Autos

A 20-year-old escaped convict from North Carolina was captured Wednesday on 24th St. between Maple and Washington Ave. after he led police on a wild 30-minute chase through back yards and over fences.

Edward McKenna escaped Oct. 11 from the Sampson County, N.C., prison camp while serving a three-year sentence for car theft, breaking and entering, larceny and receiving stolen goods and escape.

His arrest came when he fled the scene of a minor accident at 17th St. and College Ave. in a car he had stolen earlier from the Western Michigan University campus in Kalamazoo.

Holland detectives said McKenna first told them his name was "Black" but finally admitted his true identity and recited his long list of car thefts and burglaries after questioning Wednesday afternoon.

McKenna had the accident while driving around the city waiting for alterations on new clothes he had purchased earlier Wednesday in a downtown Holland store. He told Holland detectives he needed the new clothes to go with the new car he was driving.

Besides, McKenna said, he had a date later in the evening with a Holland girl to whom he had just sent a dozen roses. The money used to pay for the \$107 worth of clothing and the flowers was stolen in burglaries.

McKenna said he left Kalamazoo about 3 a.m. Wednesday and was headed for Grand Rapids but somehow ended up in Holland.

He purchased the clothing and toilet articles and then parked his car in the parking lot near the South American boat docks on 16th St. and slept most of the afternoon prior to taking a drive and the resulting accident at 17th St. and College Ave.

During the time he fled the North Carolina prison camp and his arrest, McKenna told detectives he had stolen six cars in Ohio and Michigan and committed dozens of burglaries in the two states.

As McKenna sped away from the Holland mishap police broadcast a description of the hit and run vehicle.

Ottawa County Detective John Hempel spotted the car at 32nd St. and Lincoln Ave. and gave chase. He curbed the car at 24th St. and College Ave. McKenna jumped out and ran.

Police converged on the area and took up the chase on foot. Residents of the area joined in the chase or aided police by pointing out the direction in which McKenna had fled along 24, 25th and 26th Sts. from College to Washington Aves.

Local authorities praised residents for their assistance in helping run down the fleeing fugitive.

McKenna was returned to Kalamazoo shortly after noon today after additional questioning by Holland police, detectives from Kalamazoo police and sheriff's departments and the FBI.

Hotel Warm Friend Sold In Holland

The Warm Friend Hotel was sold Friday to Arthur E. and Jack Vannette Jr., operators of two local drive-in restaurants.

Price of the hotel was not disclosed.

Business will continue as usual for the present.

The Vannettes plan to convert the hotel to apartment use in a flexible program in which renovations will be made over a period of years.

Citing the loss of transient patronage in recent years and the expanding need for a centrally located residential apartment hotel, the new owners plan up to 60 apartments with individually controlled heating and air conditioning and fully equipped electric kitchens.

In addition, private executive suites and newly decorated rooms will be made available to industrial and business firms requiring accommodations for their visitors.

A new entrance lobby, redecorated halls, and automatically operated elevators will be provided for residents.

While the conversion is in progress, two floors will be available for any groups of visitors requiring several rooms for a specified, limited period of time.

In their flexible program, the Vannettes are studying needs of transient visitors with a possible view of retaining some space for this use. Final determination has not been made.

With the exception of space occupied by Jean's Shop, the Chamber of Commerce and Kow's Realty, the main floor will become one of the largest eating establishments in the area. Most of the present lobby will be turned into a cafeteria.

The Tulip Room and Dutch Grill will be available for meetings, and the Oak Harbor Room in the basement will be used mainly for banquets. The cafeteria will operate for lunch and dinners at the outset and may possibly extend to breakfast, depending on demand. In the restaurant operation, there will be no bar service.

At present, there are seven apartments in the hotel on the fifth and sixth floors. First renovations will be made to the fourth floor in the development program that gradually will work down floor by floor. The Vannette brothers will serve as their own contractors and will be doing business with several local firms.

Accommodations will continue to be available for business, club and other meetings now held at the hotel. Reservations will also be accepted for banquets, wedding receptions, luncheons, etc.

"We hope to return the city's 'hub' building into a central meeting place and revitalize the business district for the good of the entire community," the Vannettes said.

The hotel, originally called the Warm Friend Tavern, was built in 1926. It was, and is, Holland's tallest building, a downtown landmark. It was built by a stock company issuing 30,000 shares. More than 50 per cent of the stock was held by the Holland Furnace Co. which used the hotel facilities extensively through the years.

It was in 1946 that the Vannette family moved to Holland. In 1950, Jack Vannette Sr. and his two sons, Arthur E. and Jack Jr., opened Jack's Ice Cream, a drive-in on Ottawa Beach Rd. Vannette Sr. previously had operated ice cream manufacturing and sales establishments in Muskegon and New Era.

In 1955 the first of a series of additions was made.

In 1959 Vannette Sr. retired and the sons assumed management. In 1960 The Vannettes took over the Dari-Queen at Eighth St. and Pine Ave.

In 1963 the north side drive-in was enlarged to accommodate 325 inside and the parking area was enlarged to provide for 100 cars. This improvement included Jack's Garden Room.

The sale followed weeks of negotiations with the board of directors of the Holland Hotel Co. Officers are Simon Stoel, president; Kenneth Zuverink, vice president; L. J. Essenburg, treasurer; Donald H. Hann, secretary. A fifth director is A. H. Loomis. Atty. Walter J. Roper represented the hotel company in the negotiations.

Establish Memorial Fund In Honor of G.W. Wesselink

A \$2,500 memorial fund honoring the late Gerritt W. Wesselink, General Counsel of the Air Force until his death June 3, 1965, has been established at Hope College by Wesselink's Air Force friends.

Presentation of the memorial fund was made in Washington, D.C. by Secretary of the Army Eugene M. Zukert who has since retired from government service.

The memorial fund is being used to establish the Gerritt M. Wesselink Memorial reading room in Hope College's Van Zoeren Library on the campus. Dr. Calvin Vander Werf, Hope president, accepted the Memorial Fund on behalf of the alumni, student body and friends of Hope College, saying, "The Gerritt W. Wesselink reading room . . . will serve countless generations of aspiring students, especially those in the fields of law, history and political and social science . . . and will stand as a vital, living, inspiring symbol on our campus."

"Our generation, it seems, is experiencing untold difficulty in communicating to the younger generation the ideal that life can have real content, purpose and meaning — and still be great high fun. Gerrit Wesselink's whole life epitomized this idea."

"His full life, overflowing with the joy of living, communicated almost contagiously the fact that a life dedicated to the service of our country and our fellowmen does have content, meaning and purpose, is fun of the highest type, and brings honor and deep satisfaction."

On hand to witness the presentation was Mrs. Wesselink who continues to make her home in the Washington, D.C. area.

The late Dr. Wesselink was a distinguished alumnus of Hope College. After his graduation from Hope in 1925, he entered Harvard Law School and received his Bachelor of Laws degree in 1928.

His career included private legal practice as an associate and later as a partner in the Chicago firm of Crowe, Gorman, Mulder and Wesselink.

The Department of the Air Force Citation states, "His career encompassed high achievement in legal scholarship and teaching . . . at the Georgetown University and George Washington University Law Schools, at the Judge Advocate General School and other service schools. It included valued contributions as a Government attorney, culminating in his service as General Counsel of the Department of the Air Force, in which capacity he provided the highest quality of leadership to an outstanding professional group."

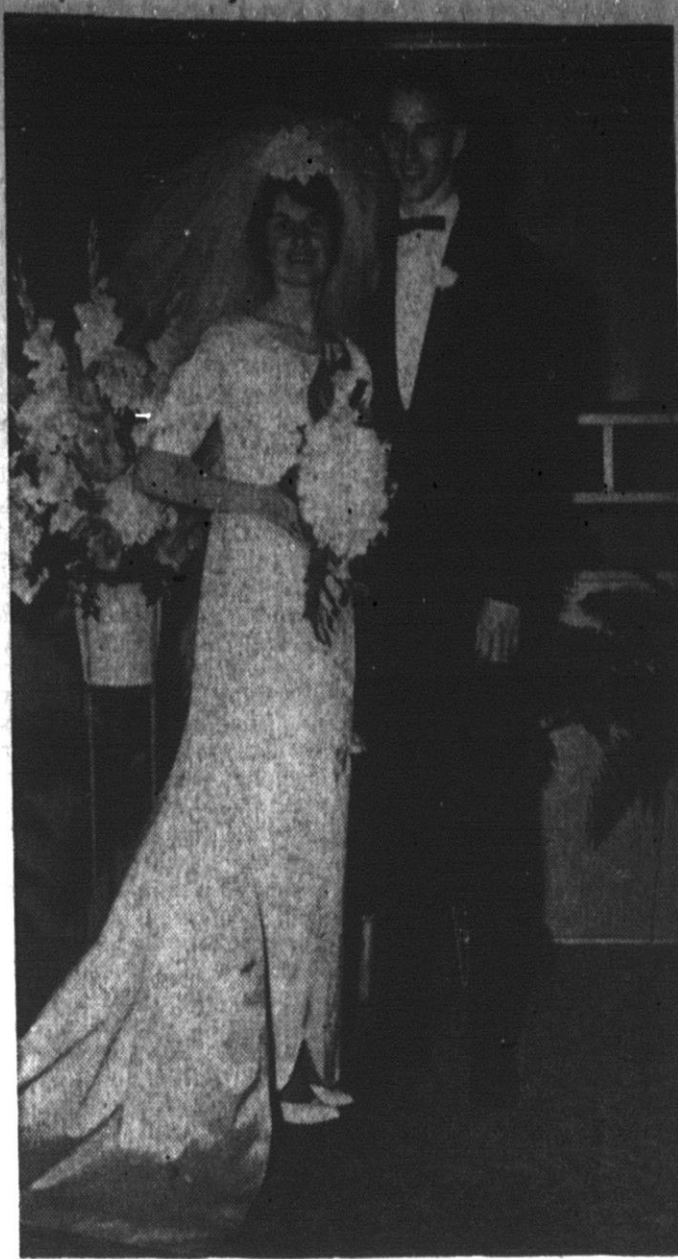

Implications for the liberal arts colleges are challenging. They might especially stress the development of women students in artistic and academic ways; a truly liberal education is the best preparation for either home making or a career. The leadership capacities of women should be developed; many community service groups are desperate for educated leaders; women might take more place than they do in Town Council, School Board, Civic Planning, Labor Unions. Some church denominations now permit women to serve on their consistories. Women students should be counseled to look beyond college and see worthwhile alternatives to hasty, ill-advised, bad marriages. Colleges might provide more opportunity for married women who want to return to study, in evening or special courses. Finally, administrators in Higher Education have themselves been guilty of discrimination against women faculty; they need to convince promising women teachers to remain in the profession by permitting more flexible schedules for women with families, by helping them to obtain advanced degrees with fellowships and stipends, by promoting them to become Administrators and Department heads.

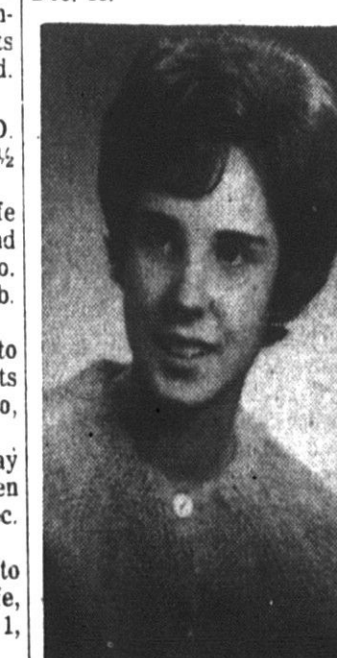

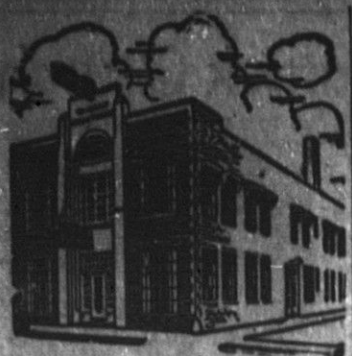

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 24, 1965
Caleb
Numbers 13: 30-32;
Joshua 1: 6-12

Some of the characters of the Bible win our admiration and some do not. Caleb is one who deserves the praise of young and old. The nation and the church need more men of his type and spirit.

I. Faith gives courage. "And Caleb stilled the people before Moses." What was the trouble? Moses had sent out twelve spies, all leaders, to spy out the land of Canaan. After spending forty days looking over the country they came back to give a report. No doubt the people were all eager to hear it. The twelve agreed that it was a good country, they brought some fruit to prove it, and that the people were strong, the cities were well fortified and large and there were giants in the land. This last part of the report frightened the people, who forgot the grapes and thought only of the giants.

Caleb said, "Let us go up at once and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it." Joshua agreed with him but the ten disagreed. The people believed the pessimistic report. They had no faith, the two men had no faith, the two men had no faith to be in the minority. Today many people are scared to oppose the crowd. "Everybody does it," and "they all wear it," and "what will people say?" these expressions are common.

All the twelve had left Egypt and had experienced all the great works of God but the ten got no impressions, the two did and faced the future with courage. Faith in God puts courage in our hearts. And that is why we need more faith in God.

II. God keeps the faithful. The ten spies died by a plague and all the people from twenty years and up died in the wilderness except Caleb and Joshua, because of their unbelief, and the whole nation wandered in the wilderness for 40 years—"for every day a year." When Caleb was 85 years old the conquered land was divided and he claimed the portion Moses, who was then dead, had promised him when he was 40. In his old age Caleb was thankful for his excellent health and was able to look back with pride upon a stand he had made at 40. It is a blessing to have pleasant memories in one's old age. Any one who always follows the Lord will have blessed memories.

III. Faith makes people daring. "Now therefore give me this mountain, whereof the Lord spoke of that day," so spoke Caleb to Joshua who then was in authority.

At 85 this man was ready to tackle a hard job, and he got it. He had a youthful spirit. The Bible contains four testimonies concerning this man. He said of himself, "I wholly followed the Lord my God." Moses said of him, "Thou hast wholly followed the Lord thy God." The historian of the Book of Joshua said of him, "He wholly followed the Lord God of Israel." God Himself testified of this brave man saying, "But my servant Caleb, because he had another spirit with him, and hath followed me fully"—this was the best testimony of all.

Take note of the words God spoke about him, "he had another spirit" and "hath followed me wholly" for they deserve special thought. God still needs men, women, boys and girls with the spirit of Caleb. Let us follow the Lord wholly day by day.

Pay Raises Are Okayed In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Four amendments were called for Monday before the Allegan Board of Supervisors finally approved a salary committee report raising maximum county employees and officers' salaries by more than 9 per cent.

Following a resolution presented by Allegan City Supervisor John Pahl, the board agreed to increase the salary of the juvenile court chief probation officer from \$5,356 to a top of \$5,500 with a starting wage of \$5,000.

Two other probation officers are to receive \$4,560 starting salary with a maximum of \$5,000.

The county dog warden top salary was set at \$4,650, an increase of \$250 a year.

In an unprecedented move the board voted to delete the social welfare director classification from the salary committee's report. It was agreed that the job in question awaits further clarification by the state before county board approval.

It was explained that Jan. 1, 1966, has been tentatively set as the changeover date when the Social Welfare departments will merge with the State Bureau of Social Aid. The County Social Welfare Board had set director Robert Hileski's salary at \$7,000.

A court ruling read before the supervisors stated they would be required to give final approval to the figure.

A move to raise all deputy sheriff's salaries from the 1965 maximum of \$4,120 to \$4,850 was defeated by a vote of 23 to 12. The top starting salary of the traffic safety officer was set at \$4,650 with a top of \$4,850.

Four other deputies and three radio operators will get beginning salaries of \$4,500 with a \$4,650 maximum.

Supervisors also approved finance committee chairman Phillip Quade's recommendation to include actuarial plan figures in the 1966 budget now being set up. The plan, as yet unapproved, calls for pensions for all county elected officials and employees. Each employee would contribute 5 per cent of his salary per year to be matched by the county.

A motion to raise salaries of the youth home superintendent and matron lost by a wide majority.

A hearing on the 1966 budget is set for Monday, Oct. 25.

Saugatuck Exchange Is Enlarged

LANSING — Peter B. Spivak, Chairman of the Michigan Public Service Commission, announced today that General Telephone Company of Michigan, has been authorized to enlarge its Saugatuck exchange base rate area by incorporating areas totaling approximately 10 square miles, including the immediate areas around the villages of Saugatuck and Douglas.

Spivak said that there has been sufficient residential development in the 10 square mile area to warrant the provision of urban classes of service therein without the application of mileage charges.

Spivak stated that there are 199 customers in the area being added to the present base rate area — 60 of these customers presently have urban classes of service and will save, on an average, \$25.00 per year through elimination of their mileage charges — 136 rural residence customers being brought into the base rate area will have their rural 8-party service upgraded to 4-party service while their rates will be reduced \$4.80 per year—and, 13 rural business customers will be upgraded to individual line service at an increase of \$2.95 per month.

Total reductions in rates will approximate \$1,600 annually; however, the company expects to offset some of the losses in revenue from customers changing to better grades of service.

In addition to the base rate area enlargement, approval was given to the transfer of a small area from the Saugatuck exchange to the Holland exchange of Michigan Bell Telephone Company and a small area from the Saugatuck exchange to the General Telephone Company's Ganges exchange.

In each case, the transfer is being made in order to place a few Holland and Ganges customers within the exchange from which they have been receiving service and to make the common boundary between said exchange easier to administer.

Traverse City Hands Dutch 7-0 Setback

Holland High's football team couldn't capitalize on any breaks here Friday night while Traverse City got one break, an intercepted pass and made it pay off for a 7-0 win before 1,200 fans in Riverview Park.

In a game between two winless mediocre teams it appeared that the last team to get a break would win the game and that's what happened. Holland had had a strong chance in both halves but failed.

The Trojans got their break with 6:25 left in the game when linebacker Larry Yankee picked the ball right out of the arms of the intended receiver, Herb (Tom) Thomas, and scooted 27 yards to score. Jerry Stanek converted.

Mike Bos threw the pass, one of 27 that he and Chip Millard had pitched in the game. They completed only six and had four intercepted, all in the fourth quarter.

Neither team had any speed and both had trouble moving the ball. The Dutch rushed for 51 yards in 29 tries while the Trojans were a shade better, gaining 73 yards on ground in 33 attempts.

Holland's best was on what turned out to be the last scrimmage play of the game when Millard, back to pass, decided to run and skirted the sideline for nine yards. Traverse City's best run was nine yards.

The Dutch picked up 85 yards in the air. A Millard to Thomas play when Thomas, got the defense, juggled the ball but held on for a 23 yard gain, was the longest single gain.

This occurred in the third quarter and put Holland on the Trojans 24 but they failed in the next four downs. After that Holland failed to generate any momentum the rest of the game.

In the first half, Holland had appeared on the way to its first win as they took the kickoff and marched from the Dutch 40 to the Trojans' 16 in 10 plays. Two pass plays to John Dalman of 18 and 15 yards sparked the drive.

Later in the period Holland got a break when Randy Rogers recovered a fumble on the Traverse City seven. Holland got to the one-yard-line but on fourth failed to punch the ball home.

Traverse City had its only first half threat as they moved to the Holland 15 but Bos picked off a Trojans' pass on his own five and returned to the 35 to squelch the drive. A personal foul penalty on the play gave the Dutch the ball at midfield where four passes missed.

Holland got another two breaks early in the third period. The Dutch kicked off and the short kick caught the Trojans off guard and Holland recovered on the Traverse City 45.

The Dutch were forced to punt four plays later but the ball was fumbled on the Traverse City 13 and Rogers recovered. A 15-yard penalty pushed the Dutch back but they responded with a 13-yard Millard to Rogers pass. A fourth down field goal from the 12 by Tom Prins was wide.

Traverse City used the punting of Jim Van Stratt as one of its best weapons. He booted eight times for a 34.5 average and got one off for 55 yards and another for 49 yards.

The win was Traverse City's first in five tries while Holland has an 0-5 mark. The Trojans are 1-2 in the LMAC and Holland is 0-4. The Dutch have dropped 13 straight over the past two seasons.

The Flying Dutchmen held the winners scoreless in the second half and managed to score twice in the fourth period. The setback, Hope's second in the three MIAA starts, eliminated them from title contention.

Albion and Kalamazoo, both unbeaten in MIAA action, are expected to determine the league winner in their showdown Saturday in Kalamazoo.

The Hornets, 18-8 winners over Adrian, are 3-0 in the MIAA and Albion is 2-0.

A strong passing attack, which saw eight completions in 13 attempts, scored Albion's touchdowns as quarterback Dave Nielson hit all-MIAA end John Ellinger three times and Floyd Harper once.

Hope's second half rushing impressed and showed the Flying Dutchmen may have jelled a ground game. The test will come Saturday when Hope entertains Albion in the annual Homecoming game.

After picking up only 40 yards rushing in the first half, the Hope backs found holes for 113 yards in the second half including the two tallies. Bill Keur and Dennis Wilder gained 134 of 153 yards rushed.

Keur, playing with an injured cheek received in the Olivet loss, scored the first touchdown on a 10-yard dive play with 13:42 left in the game. The Muskegon senior picked up 66 yards in 14 carries and the touchdown was his third in MIAA action this season.

Dennis Wilder, North Muskegon freshman, scored the other touchdown on a five-yard run with 1:35 left in the game. Wilder led the Hope rushers with 68 yards in 12 attempts.

He failed on his run for two points after the first score and Harlan Hyink was dumped trying for the two-pointer after the second score.

Nielson had a fine day as he completed seven of 11, including five of six in the first half. His first touchdown aerial came on a 21-yard play to Ellinger with 8:37 elapsed in the opening period. The play was set up on an Albion recovery of a Hope fumble on the Hope 35.

The second tally at 5:45 of the first period covered 28 yards and climaxed a 40-yard drive. Ellinger's catch was good for four yards after a 62-yard drive at 12:11 of the second. With 1:34 left in the half, Nielson hit Harper on a 17-yarder after a 38-yard drive. Joe Reed converted after each score.

Hope's passing game accounted for 95 yards as Hyink hit on six of 18 and freshman Gary Frens completed three of four and had one intercepted. Three of Hyink's passes were intercepted.

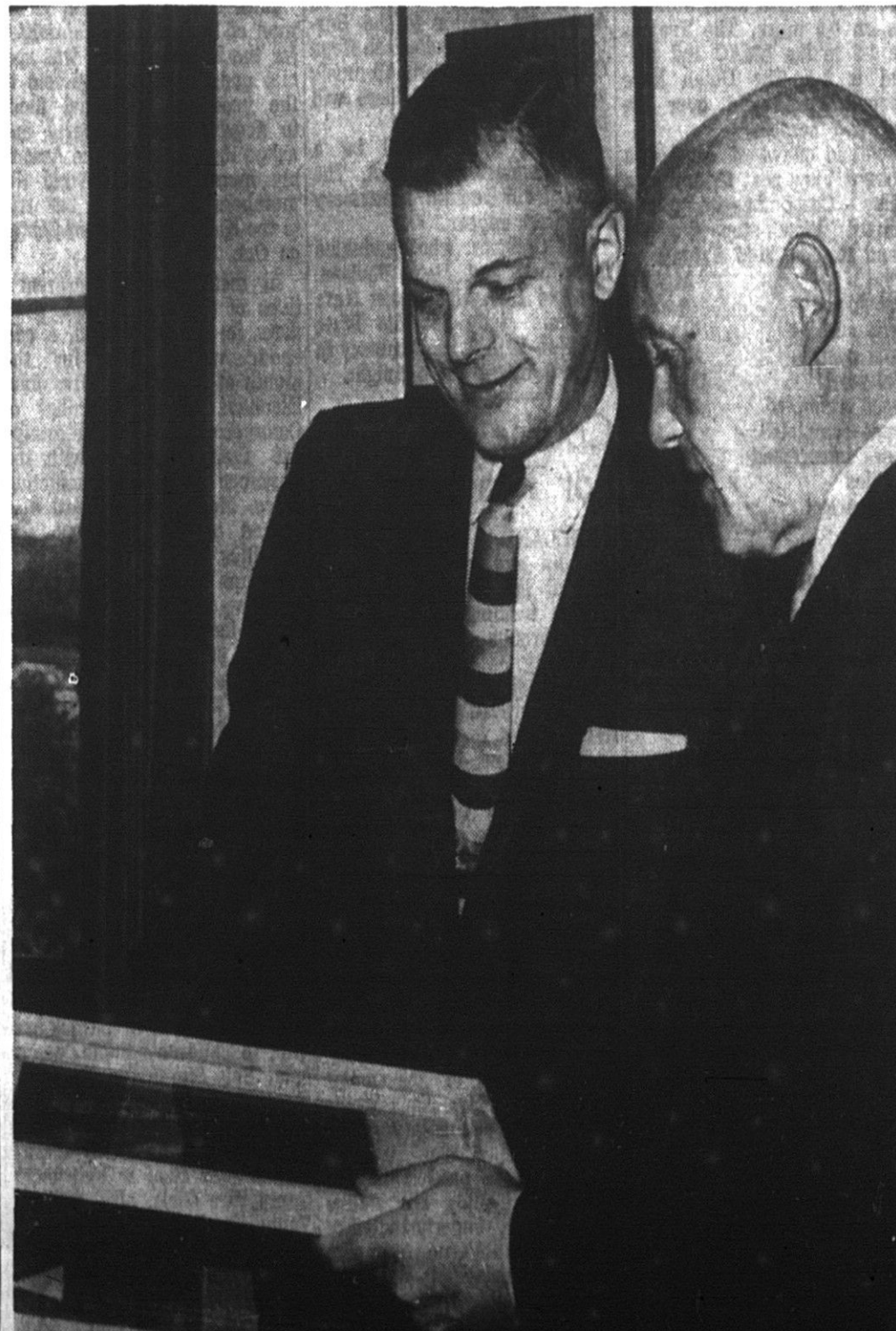

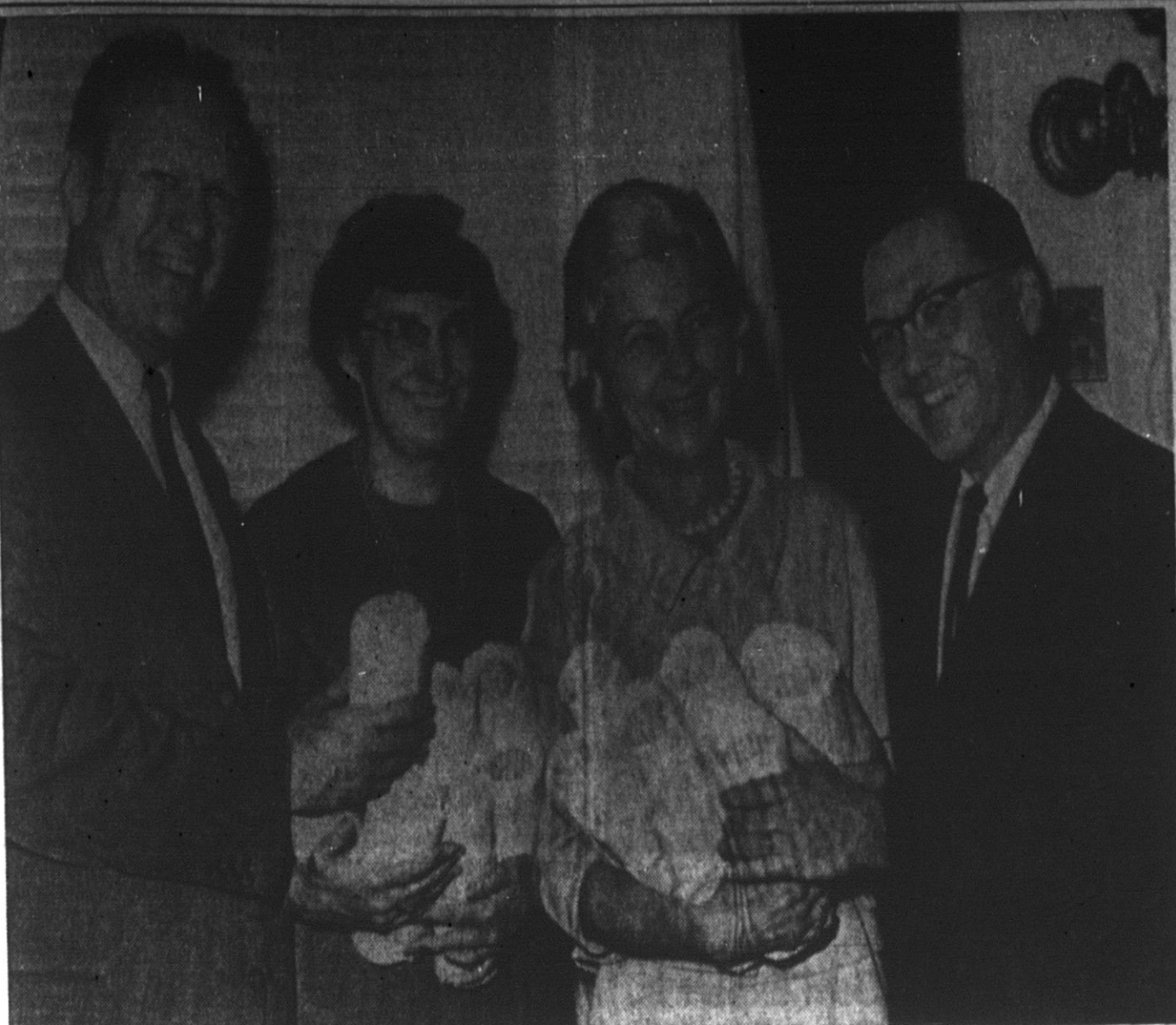

Supervisors Plan Visit To Infirmary

GRAND HAVEN—The Ottawa Board of Supervisors will meet Thursday at 1:30 p.m. for a brief meeting and will visit the county infirmary at Eastmanville at 2:30 p.m.

At Tuesday's meeting, the board again discussed Civil Defense and Ray Vander Laan of Hudsonville moved that a study be made of joining the sheriff's department and the CD department. After Sheriff Bernard Grysen said he definitely was not seeking the CD job, the board voted down the motion 21 to 12.

The board granted an additional \$3,000 for the marine patrol budget to take advantage of state funds, the state contributing \$2 to each \$1 budgeted by the county. The 1966 budget will be \$18,000 and will make possible two fulltime marine officers in the county. The department will have two boats at Grand Haven and two at Holland.

There was some heated discussion when the sheriff requested an additional deputy for Georgetown Township, the fastest growing section in the county. Supervisor Willard Claver of Zeeland said heavily-populated areas should pay their own police just as cities do. The request was granted. The deputy will be paid \$4,836.

Mayor Nelson Bosman of Holland, chairman of the sheriff's committee, pointed to the need for a second detective, requesting \$4,728 for a detective to assist John Hemple. Rather than jeopardize the whole 1966 budget, the board agreed to study the request when the tentative budget for 1967 comes up in April.

The board voted to pay Deputy Clerk Vivian Nuismer the same per diem paid board members for board meetings, \$10 a meeting. There are about 15 such board meetings a year. The deputy clerk serves as budget clerk and clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

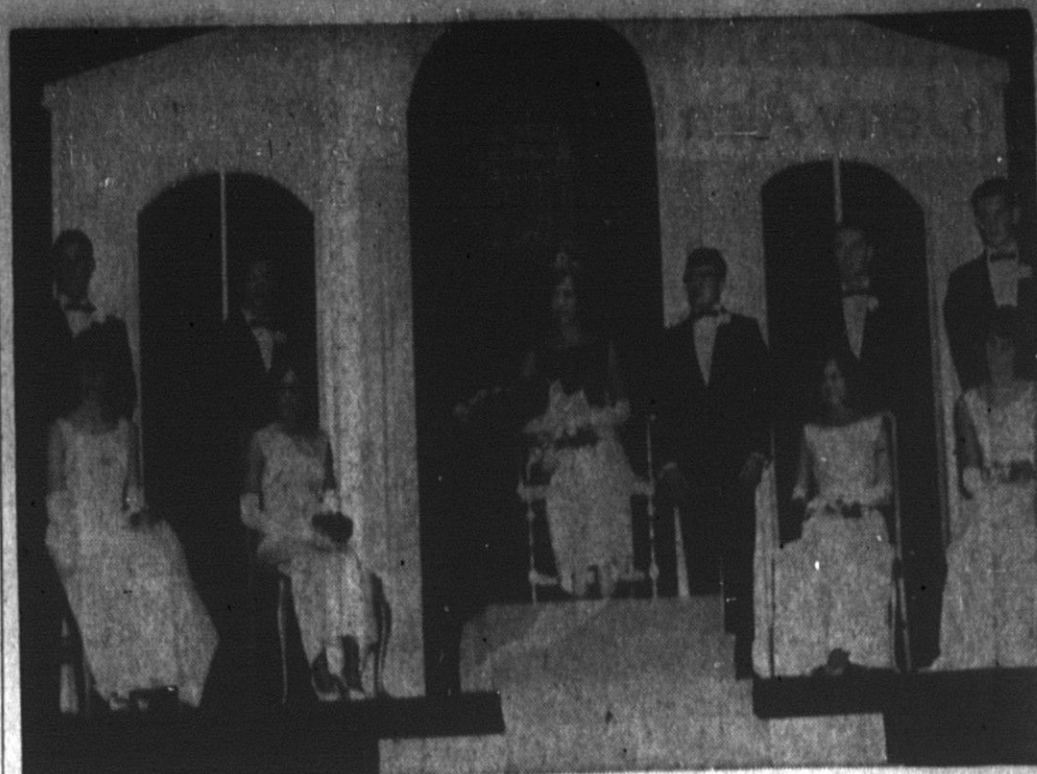

Sale of New State Park Land Completed

Deed and title to 98 acres of recreational land including over 1,000 feet of frontage on Lake Macatawa were transferred to the state of Michigan Monday in a ceremony at the home of Martin Michielens, 2219 Ottawa Beach Rd.

The land will become a part of Holland State Park which lies on Lake Michigan and the channel which connects Lake Michigan and Lake Macatawa. Final payment of \$117,500 was made to Mr. and Mrs. Michielens Monday. The sum was provided for in a special legislative appropriation made possible through the efforts of Sen. Harold J. Volkema of Holland, Rep. James S. Farnsworth of Otsego and Rep. Melvin De Stigter of Hudsonville.

The payment is in addition to a \$10,000 option in March, 1964, the result of special effort of former State Rep. Riemer Van Til of Holland. All were present when the money, deed and title were exchanged. Others present were representatives of the Holland Fish and Game Club, the Holland Chamber of Commerce and legal and realty representatives.

Representing the State Conservation Department was Ted Tucker, in charge of land acquisition. He explained plans for a development program on the new site which upon completion will provide 200 camp sites, two shower-toilet buildings and other facilities for administration including living quarters for the park manager. Total cost of this development program will run to \$200,000.

The new property more than triples the size of Holland State Park. The original site has 43 acres. Another 20 acres is in court litigation. This area in question would link the two large parcels but at a point of the large sand dunes and does not provide practical access. It is expected that the State Conservation department will acquire other properties in coming years.

Holland State Park and Grand Haven State Park have been consistently in the top three of the state in attendance figures. Since park fees went into effect a few years ago, the two parks in Ottawa county have been near the top in revenues.

Purchase of the Michielens property was the culmination of years of study and negotiations. A good share of interest in enlarging Holland State Park was generated by the Holland Fish and Game Club, currently headed by Arthur De Waard. The club appointed committees back in 1961.

Also working through the years on park improvements was the Holland Chamber of Commerce. This body will continue its attempts to have a state highway (either M-21 or M-40) extended to the state park.

Riemer Van Til said legislators have long considered expansions and improvements at the Holland park but it was not until the \$2 entry fee was initiated a few years ago that practical planning could be made. It was in 1963 that he led the fight for the \$10,000 option for the Michielens property in the 1964 appropriations bill.

Tucker of the Conservation department pointed to the possibility of moving sand deposits on the oval at the end of the winter season to the beach on Lake Macatawa to develop a good waterfront.

Expansion of the local park is part of an over-all state improvement program which also lists future improvements for

Grand Haven state park. A particular factor in the local transfer was the availability of lakefront property on Lake Macatawa. Department representatives said little lakefront property is available at park sites throughout Michigan.

The Michielens will vacate their home on the property June 15, 1966. The home formerly served as clubhouse for the former Ottawa Beach golf course. After acquiring the property around the 1940's, the Michielens erected several cottages. The level area in front of the Michielson home leading to the lake covers some 25 acres of the 98-acre site. The greater share is to the north and west, roughly between the two tall peaks which can be seen from the Ottawa Beach Road which bisects the property.

Ottawa County Farm News

Representatives of Michigan State University and the Dutch flower bulb industry have launched a five-year, \$100,000 research project designed to perfect methods of growing bulb flowers in U. S. greenhouses. The research work will be conducted by MSU's Department of Horticulture, supported by funds from the Holland bulb industry. The research contract was signed this week by Dr. Thomas K. Cowden, Dean of MSU's College of Agriculture, and Dr. John Carew, chairman of the American Group of Dutch Bulb Exporters Association, F. B. M. Nederveen, general secretary of the Dutch Bulb Exporters Association, and Gustave Springer, American director of the Netherlands Flowerbulb Institute, New York City.

Drs. Richard Stinson and Gustave De Hertagh, MSU horticulturists, will be in charge of the research project. They will be assisted by Johannes Van Den Hoek, an expert on commercial flower-bulb growing in Holland, who has been sent to the Michigan campus by the Dutch bulb industry.

The researchers are aiming for improved quality in both cut and potted tulip and hyacinths. They also hope to produce flowers which will have a longer life in the home. Thousands of flower bulbs for the first year's experiments have already been shipped to the MSU campus from Holland. Results from initial tests are expected in early 1966. These tests will concentrate on improved methods of "forcing" tulips - getting them to produce flowers in a shorter-than-normal 18 gith of time. In addition to laboratory tests on the MSU campus, other experiments will be conducted in nearby commercial greenhouses through the cooperation of the Michigan florists groups.

At the end of August the cumulative average production for DHIA cows was 11,482 lbs. of milk and 428.8 lbs. of butterfat. The milk average is 27 lbs. over the 1964 figure. The butterfat average is one pound lower.

The average test has been running slightly lower this year averaging 3.74 per cent for the first eleven months as compared to 3.76 a year ago. Grain feeding continues at a somewhat higher level this year being 125 lbs. above last year. The eleven month total is 4,155 lbs. per cow. The number of potential 600 pound herds is somewhat less this year. About 50 had an average of 550 lbs. or more when this report was prepared.

However, all August barn sheets had not been accounted for by this date. Last year 57 herds had averaged 550 lbs. or more at the end of August. Eleven herds had already assured themselves of a 600 pound yearly average by the eleventh month. The high accumulative average was 652 lbs. This herd can possibly make a 700 lb. yearly average.

Dairy cows in area herds have been credited with recently completed lactations under official production testing rules of Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

These Register Holstein and their actual performance records are: Berthawne Madcap Maestro Posey 4772657, a five-year-old, produced 19,350 lbs. milk and 736 lbs. butterfat in 363 days. Berthawne Madcap Duchess Lady 5270391, a three-year-old, had 15,150 lbs. milk and 611 lbs. butterfat in 305 days. Both are owned by A. J. Bajema, Hudsonville.

These new production figures may be compared to the estimated annual output of 7,280 lbs. of milk and 285 lbs. of butterfat by the average U. S. dairy cow, notes the national Holstein Association, Michigan.

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West Ottawa School Board Has Meeting

Several items occupied West Ottawa Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night.

The board reaffirmed its present transportation policy but agreed to revisions since none had been made since 1959. The action came as the result of a communication from William De Vries requesting a reevaluation.

Mrs. June Reimink, president of the West Ottawa MEA district, outlined aims and purposes of the association, stating 141 staff members were affiliated with MEA. She explained that the MEA is organizing to seek recognition in collective bargaining "in a framework beneficial to all."

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte reported district enrollment at 3,568 as of the fourth Friday after Labor Day. Of this number, 2,007 are in elementary schools and 1,561 in grades seven through 12. The board also discussed proposed legislation making owners of migrant housing responsible that children of migrant laborers attend school. This will be taken up with state legislators.

The board gave final approval to High School Principal Duane Hooker's organization of department chairman and approved a similar program for JHS Principal Edward Roberts. Chairmen of departments received \$100 extra per year. The board also approved payment of \$600 a year extra to nine teachers in the secondary school who teach an additional class period.

Hooker also described special library service at the high school library which is open Tuesday from 7 to 9 p.m. The program will continue on a trial basis for the remainder of the semester and will utilize the services of Douglas Waldron of the athletic department in a supervisory capacity. West Ottawa students must
