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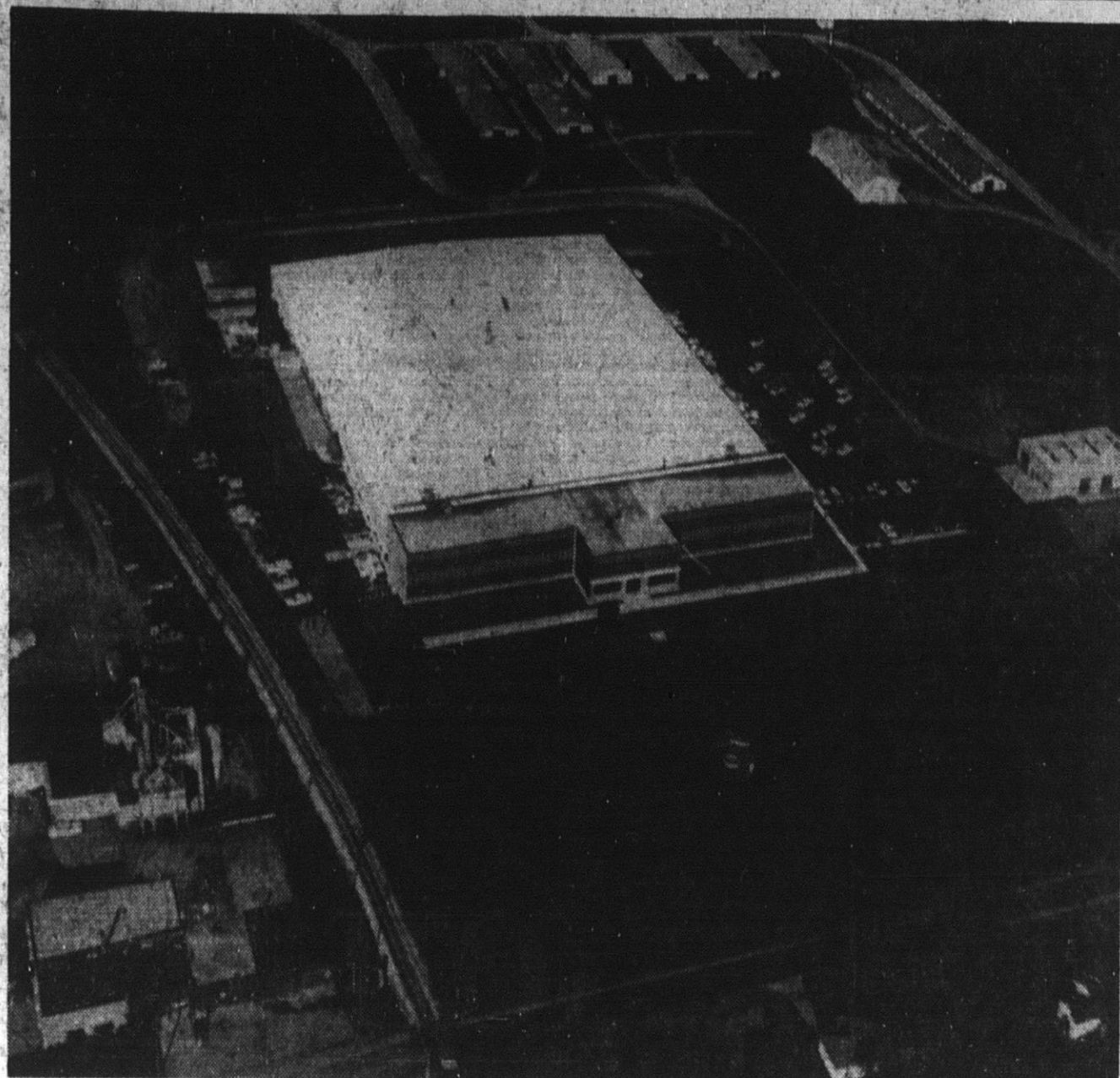


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New Headquarters and Assembly Plant for Big Dutchman in Zeeland

Public Invited to Tour Big Dutchman Facilities

ZEELAND—Dedication ceremonies and open house will be held at the new Big Dutchman headquarters and assembly plant in Zeeland Friday.

The dedication will be attended by executives and employees of U. S. Industries, Inc. and Big Dutchman, as well as press representatives and civic leaders of the Holland-Zeeland area.

The public open house will be held from 3 to 7 p.m. Guided tours of the facilities will be conducted by Big Dutchman personnel.

Honored guests at the dedication will include J. J. Billera, President of U. S. Industries Inc. Big Dutchman joined the U.S.I. family of companies last March. The company founders, Richard A. De Witt and Jack De Witt, are currently serving as president and chairman of the board, respectively.

Guest speaker for the dedication will be Michigan's 9th District Congressman, Guy Vander Jagt of Cadillac. Also invited to speak are Mayor Frank Hoogland of Zeeland and Mayor Nelson Bosman of Holland. Construction of the new Big Dutchman assembly plant began in April, 1966. The structure was completed late that year and put into service early in 1967. The attached offices were completed in 1967 and occupied early this year. The 300 by 434 foot building encompasses more than 145,000 square feet of floor space including the two-story office section of 50 by 300 feet.

Big Dutchman is a worldwide organization engaged in the production and marketing of equipment systems for the poultry and livestock industries.

Eight Arrested On Marijuana Counts in County

COOPERSVILLE — Eight teenagers including two 16-year-olds have been arrested by Ottawa sheriff's officers on charges of using marijuana. The two 16-year-olds have been referred to Probate Court and the other six demanded examination when arraigned Tuesday morning before Justice Lawrence De Witt.

They are Dennis But, Dick Lackey, Daniel Holman, David Barberick, David Veeneman and John Bush, all 17 and all of Coopersville except Barberick who is of Nunica. Examination was set Oct. 17 but may be delayed pending chemical reports. Bonds of \$500 each were not immediately furnished.

Two other Coopersville youths, were arrested last week on David Ophoff and Larry Kuzniar, charges of selling marijuana. They were free on \$1,000 bonds.

The investigation also led to the arrest of two 19-year-old Grand Rapids girls, Rebecca Dow and Theresa Langly, on charges of selling marijuana. The arrests were made by Grand Rapids vice squad members. Both are free on \$1,000 bonds. The Coopersville arrests followed a lengthy investigation by sheriff's officers.

Grand Haven Has Paint-in

GRAND HAVEN — There's a "paint-in" going on in downtown Grand Haven.

The intersection of Washington and Third Sts., Grand Haven's "State and Madison," has become a Mecca for aspiring artists — at least for four days. Art students from junior and senior high schools in the community have undertaken the project of "artistically decorating the 300 feet of white board fence erected by the Security First Bank and Trust Co. around the site of the old U. S. Post Office Building, now being torn down.

The bank purchased the property for expansion purposes in 1967 and Houting and Meeusen of Holland are razing the old building. About 180 students are painting the fence. One group is scheduled each morning and afternoon during the paint-in. The theme is "Security Is..." Richard Sweet of the high school art department is in charge.

Girl in Hospital Suffering From Human Bites

A 14-year-old New Richmond girl was under treatment today in Holland Hospital for what appeared to be serious human bites, believed inflicted by a gang of juveniles two days ago in New Richmond.

Allegan sheriff's officers are investigating the bizarre case. The girl who was taken to the hospital at 4 a.m. today by her parents has a high temperature and has been unable to give a coherent account of the attack two days ago.

Allegan authorities said she had bites on several parts of her body. Her condition was described as fair by hospital authorities.

Call Special Meeting of City Council

City Manager Herb Holt has called a special meeting of City Council at 5 p.m. today to reconsider rescinding all or part of the resolution calling for three bond issues to finance a new police station, a central fire station and a suburban fire station, and a warehouse for park and recreational departments, appearing on the Nov. 5 ballot.

Many objections to expanding the city hall site have been voiced by residents in the area. Architects' plans call for a police station and central fire station and a building for the Board of Public Works (not covered by the bond issue) near City Hall, a suburban fire station on 40th St. near the US-31 bypass and a park and recreation warehouse adjoining the street department warehouse on Fairbanks Ave. The BPW building also would house the engineering and environmental health departments.

GE Recalls 126 Workers

Ab Martin, general manager of the General Electric plant here in Holland, today announced a partial recall of the employees who have been laid off since Sept. 11. Martin said 126 of the workers will return to their jobs on Monday.

Some 600 employees were laid off as a result of the strike by United Products Workers Union against the Tecumseh Products Co. which began Sept. 3.

The strike at the Tecumseh plant remains unsettled and is now in its sixth week; however, Martin said orders from other customers has necessitated the recall of workers here.

Tecumseh Products is a major manufacturer of compressors and is a large customer of the local General Electric plant.

Gerrit Timmer Dies at Age 59

ZEELAND — Gerrit E. Timmer, 59, of 711 East Lincoln Ave., Zeeland, died at his home early this morning following a heart attack.

He was a member of the First Reformed Church, Zeeland, and had been employed at the Mead Johnson Co., Zeeland, for the past 24 years.

Surviving are the wife, Johanna; two sons, Jay and Duane both of Zeeland; three daughters, Mrs. Paul (Marcia) De Roos of Holland, Mrs. Allen (Sally) Disselkoen of Zeeland and Sheri at home; eight grandchildren; three brothers, Adrien and Willard both of Holland and Lester of Drenthe.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 3 p.m. at the Yntema Funeral Home, Zeeland, with the Rev. A. J. Newhouse officiating. Burial will be in the Zeeland cemetery.

Members of the family will be at the funeral home tonight and Friday from 7 to 9.

Holland Swept By Fire Just 97 Years Ago

Fire Prevention Week, observed widely this week, always recalls the big Holland fire which swept the colony just 97 years ago Wednesday.

It was on the early morning of Oct. 9, 1871, between 1 and 3 a.m. that fire roared in from smoldering forests southwest of the city, leaving in its wake destruction estimated at \$900,000.

Loss of human life was limited to one elderly widow, Mrs. J. Tolk, who lived in a house on Ninth St.

Property loss included more than 353 buildings, 250 head of livestock and left 300 families without shelter.

The city had experienced an uninterrupted drought for many weeks preceding the fire, according to an account of the fire written in 1893 by Gerrit Van Schelvel in "Historical and Business Compendium of Ottawa County."

Woods and muckland had been on fire for many weeks and by hard labor, the southeastern part of the city was saved from these forest fires the week before the conflagration.

On Sunday afternoon, Oct. 8, the atmosphere was very oppressive and sultry, and at intervals fine ashes showered over the city. These ashes subsequently were explained as the first messengers of the great fire that swept Chicago that Sunday afternoon.

At 2 p.m. the wind turned southwesterly and the fire alarm was rung from the bell of Third Reformed Church. As night advanced the wind increased in force until it hit hurricanes proportions at midnight, sweeping fire from the woods with alarming velocity toward the city.

Huge bark piles at the Cappon and Bertsch tannery in the western part of the city and Third Reformed Church in the then southern part of the city were among the first points attacked.

Then the wind turned west, forcing the fire toward the center and eastern part of the town, and within two hours the entire devastation was accomplished.

The grounds of Hope College, somewhat isolated as they were,

seemed to be the only spot where one could escape with his life. Many took to the waters of Black Lake (Lake Macatawa) escaping in small boats.

Population of Holland at the time was 2,400. The colony was founded 24 years earlier in 1847.

Buildings destroyed: dwellings, 210; stores, shops and offices, 75; manufacturing, 15; churches, 5; hotels, 3; miscellaneous buildings, 45; docks and warehouses, 5, one tug and several boats.

Over 250 dead horses, cattle and swine were found in the burned district.

The fire swept the heart of the city. What was left was a strip of houses along the extreme western and southern parts of the city all south of 10th St. and east of Market St., and nearly the entire first ward, Hope College, Pluggers Mill, Heald's Planing Mill, Union School, First Reformed Church, Ninth Street Christian Reformed Church on Market St., the railroad depot and the old town house.

Only about \$100,000 of the \$900,000 loss was covered by insurance and only part was recovered inasmuch as many insurance companies were rendered insolvent by the great Chicago fire.

Damage also was great in Holland township as well as Fillmore and Laketown townships in Allegan county.

The general conflagrations of Oct. 8 and 9, 1871, embraced not only Holland and Chicago but also Pesto, Wis., Manistee, Port Sheldon and some other locations in Michigan.

As news of destruction here became generally known, aid and relief were liberally forwarded. The Board of Supervisors made ample provision for a destitution feared, but thanks to a generous public, it was never needed.

A new assessment roll of Holland was ordered. Gov. Baldwin visited Holland and other burned districts in the state. Voluntary relief, however, rendered this service unnecessary.

Work of rebuilding Holland went on, although rebuilding in Chicago created heavy demand for all kinds of building material and a corresponding increase in prices. Close upon this period came the general shrinkage in values caused by the panic of 1873, reducing assets and valuation of the rebuilt city fully 50 per cent without lessening liabilities and incumbrances incurred, all drawing interest at the then prevailing rate of 10 per cent.

Sgt. R. Knoll Military Rites

Full military rites will be held Thursday for Sgt. Robert E. Knoll, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Knoll, 286 Home Ave., who was killed in hostilities in Vietnam near Duc Lap on Friday, Sept. 27.

Sgt. Knoll was assigned to the 4th Infantry Division near Ban Me Thuot, Vietnam on May 25 and was a platoon sergeant at the time of his death. He was in the front lines near Duc Lap in charge of a fire team.

A telegram received by his parents Monday night said "The remains of Sgt. Robert E. Knoll escorted by Sp-4 Wayne Wagnenfeld of Holland has departed from San Francisco and will arrive in Grand Rapids Tuesday (Oct. 8) at 7:43 p.m."

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. at Grace Episcopal Church with the Rev. Canon William I. Carter of Kalamao officiating. Full military rites will be held at Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

Serving as honor guard will be Sgt. Knoll's friend Lt. Michael Graham of Owosso, now stationed at Fort Bragg, N.C. A military escort of 15 men will be here from Ft. Benning to serve as pall bearers, buglers and gun crew.

Sp-4 Wagnenfeld, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Wagnenfeld, 171 Waukazoo Dr., was requested by Mrs. Knoll to serve as escort for her son's body. The two Holland soldiers entered the service at the same time. Wagnenfeld was serving at Dak To, Vietnam, at the time his services were requested. Lt. Graham was a friend of Sgt. Knoll's when they lived in Owosso before moving to Holland.

Survivors besides the parents include three sisters, Jennifer, Margie and Valerie and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Plaggenmeyer of Holland. The family requests that gifts be sent to Grace Episcopal Church for Long Range Reconnaissance Patrol (LRRP) boxes for Vietnam.

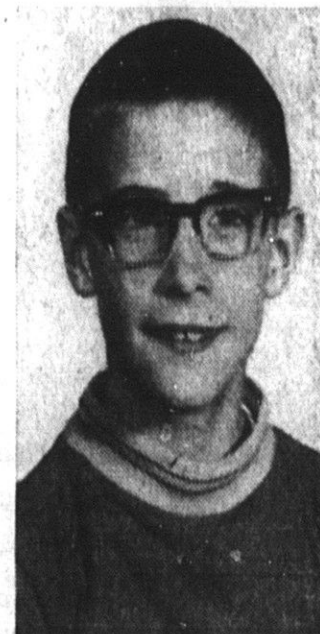
Flags will fly at half mast from the time the body arrives until after the funeral on Thursday. This affects flags in Holland township, Park township and Holland city.

Zeeland Boy Dies After Hit by Car

David Bosch, 9,
Receives Head, Neck
Injuries in Accident

Ottawa county recorded its 28th fatal accident of the year with the death of a 9-year-old Zeeland boy Thursday.

David Bosch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Bosch, of 1832 104th Ave., Zeeland, died in Grand Rapids Butterworth Hospital of injuries received when struck by a car at 104th Ave. Zeeland, died in Grand Rapids

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the boy was hit when he darted into the path of a car driven by Lawrence Edward Tibbet, 53, of 726 First Ave., Holland.

Deputies said Tibbet was driving west on M-21 when the child, walking south on 104th Ave., not far from his home, darted into the path of the car and was struck by the car on his left side.

According to deputies who are continuing their investigation the child was thrown about 70 feet.

The boy was first taken to Zeeland Community Hospital for treatment of severe head and neck injuries and was later transferred to the Grand Rapids hospital. He died at 6:05 p.m.

Surviving besides the parents are two sisters, Cheryl and Janet, and one brother, Robert, all at home; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius P. Dood of Grand Rapids.

Funeral services are scheduled 1:30 p.m. Monday at Haven Christian Reformed Church with the Rev. J. De Vries officiating. Burial will be in Zeeland cemetery.

Clean Water Promoted In Address

Problems of water pollution and possible solutions were outlined by Dr. Richard Schwaiger of Grand Rapids, a layman concerned with the rapid disappearance of quantity and quality of clean water, at a meeting in Herrick Public Library Thursday afternoon, sponsored by the Conservation Study Group of the Holland Garden Club. About 65 attended.

"We could clean up our rivers quickly if we would just stop dumping wastes into them," he said. "The flow of rivers would correct many problems, but lakes are another matter, and cleaning them is a much bigger problem."

He said solutions also must be studied for disposal of certain industrial wastes currently pumped into deep wells. "When you pump such things as cyanide and acids associated with the plating industry under high pressure, into the ground, you never can be sure what will happen down there. We learned that in Japan this even led to more earthquakes."

As for domestic wastes, he felt no effluent from sewage treatment plans should be dumped into public waters, and that some method of disposal on land must be explored. "When sludge worms are found three miles out on the bottom of Lake Michigan, something else must be done with sewage," he said.

He called attention to the state bond issue on the Nov. 5 ballot calling for \$335 million for clean water and \$100 million for recreation. If passed, local and federal matching funds could increase the total programs to more than \$600 million for clean water and \$155 million for recreation.

This is only part of the solution, the speaker said, since industry, governmental groups and individuals also must do their part.

Dr. Schwaiger said many industries which originally protested orders to clean up wastes have found proper treatment is profitable since in many cases, materials previously thrown out are now reclaimed.

It was pointed out that Lake Macatawa appears much cleaner this year than last year, a

hopeful sign recognized by many persons.

In seeking solutions, Dr. Schwaiger urged local persons to become aware of pollution problems, to become aware of local situations on treatment of industrial and domestic wastes, work with officials and other groups on solutions, support candidates concerned with pollution and write local officials and state and national officials.

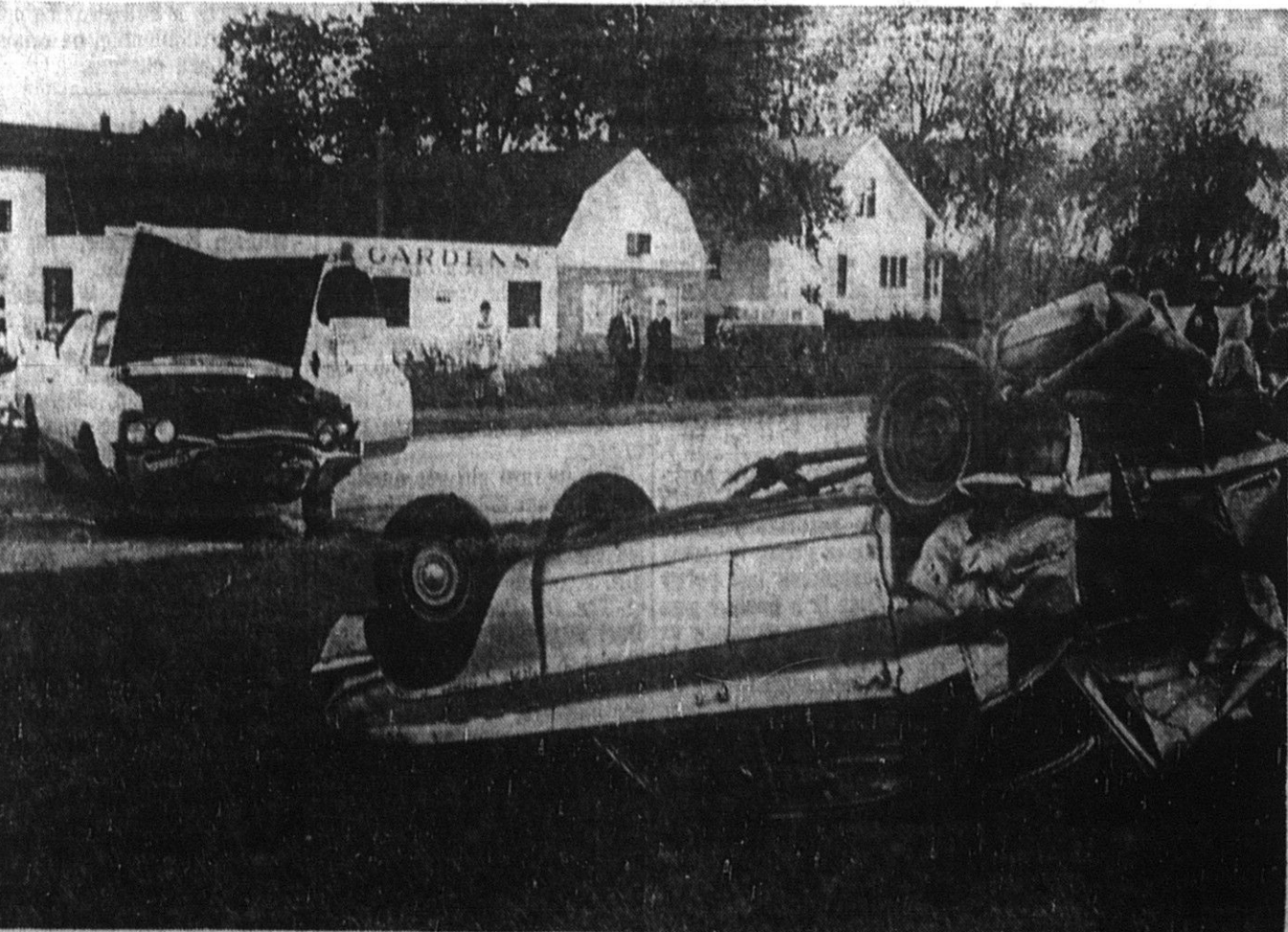

Dutch Come Back Strong In 2nd Half

It was "The Holland Comeback That Had To Be" produced by some fine play calling from the Holland bench, directed by Max Glupker, with Glupker and Larry Lamb in the leading roles with a supporting cast of approximately 45 Dutchmen who were hungry for the Wooden Shoes Holland hasn't had since 1964.

Holland coach Dave Kempker couldn't have thought up a better ending to the Homecoming game as Holland came back to defeat Grand Haven 20-18 before an overflow crowd in Riverview Park Friday.

Kempker commented "it's always nice when plays work for you" and this certainly was the case as Holland's passing attack made mince meat out of Grand Haven in the second half.

At halftime no one would have thought Holland was about to pull a coup d'etat.

Grand Haven, taking advantage of a four yard punt by Gary Lound struck pay dirt first at 5:43 of the first quarter when quarterback Barry Brugger snuck in from the two. John Olsen missed the extra point and Grand Haven led 6-0.

With 0:26 left in the half Grand Haven terminated a 52 yard 11 play drive as Brugger passed to Rog Schroeder, who eluded one tackler, for the score from eight yards out. Olsen missed the conversion again but Grand Haven led at the half 12-0.

Holland was guilty of shoddy play in the first half, lacking offensive punch and displaying some poor tackling defensively.

Holland gained only 60 yards in the half and picked up only two first downs while Grand Haven took advantage of Holland's lackluster play to mount a two touchdown lead.

But the second half called for a different script and Holland wrote one.

Grand Haven added to their margin following an interception of a Glupker pass by Scott Bldner on the Holland 34.

Bob Wallish ripped up the middle on the second play from scrimmage for 30 yards and a touchdown to increase the margin to 18-0 at 9:37 of the third quarter.

After a Holland punt Grand Haven was threatening again when Larry Lewis intercepted his second pass of the night for the Dutch on Holland's 18 yard line.

After a one yard plunge by Tom Moes Holland decided it was futile to run against the sure tackling Buccaneers and on three successive pass completions from Glupker to Lamb for 39 yards, to Dave Gosselaar for 16 yards, to Dave Gosselaar for touchdown toss of 26 yards Holland had whittled the lead to 18-6. Bernie Rosendahl's successful conversion made the score 18-7 with 3:33 remaining in the third quarter.

It was at this point, Holland's first touchdown, that coach Kempker felt the momentum of the game changed.

Holland got the ball next with 11:13 remaining in the game and moved 77 yards in 13 plays for the score which came on a sweep by Glupker from two yards out with 6:39 left in the final quarter. The play was a fake hand off to De Boer from a previous off tackle play and the consequent roll out by Glupker for the score. Rosendahl's conversion made it 18-14.

Holland utilized the old statue of liberty play twice in the drive with Lound picking up 28 yards. The play was incorporated into the Holland offense Thursday.

Grand Haven after receiving the kick off, was immediately thrust into a key third and seven situation with 5:00 showing on the clock. Brugger threw a flat pass to Wallish but Lound was there to wrestle him to the ground for only a three yard gain.

Grand Haven was forced to punt and Bill Masenbrook's punt was taken by Glupker for a fair catch at Holland's 26 yard line with 4:31 left in the game.

Glupker hit Gosselaar for 12 and a first down then threw a screen pass to Ken De Boer for 20 yards.

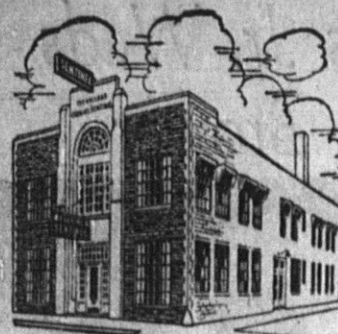

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NATIONAL NEWSPAPER WEEK, OCTOBER 6-12

Once again we find that we have received a list of many articles that quote men like Johannes Gutenberg, the man who invented movable type. While he was listed as a trouble maker, "he is reported to have had a hunch it would make a printer's work easier if type could be used over and over again in various combinations. Before his time, printers carved entire texts on large blocks of wood. Gutenberg, experimenting, sawed up one of these blocks into individual letter-units.

"His idea worked. It made printing a great deal easier. But the ruckus it was to cause would have astounded this humble and devout German craftsman. For movable type not only simplified printing, it made possible for the first time the distribution of ideas to large numbers of people.

"Under the interchange of ideas, serfs became restless, national states developed, and feudalism crumbled. Revolutionary trouble-makers such as Voltaire, Tom Paine, and a group of uncouth pamphleteers in England took ideas directly to the people. They found print was the ideal way to express complex thoughts. It was true then, and it is true today.

"Printing made possible modern newspapers. Good newspapers always make trouble. They're trouble to officials who want to carry on the public's business in secret. They're trouble to anyone with entrenched authority. They're often troublesome to those whose private lives become suddenly caught up in the public business.

"But the work that newspapers do has become a basic link in our political process." That's something for you to think about during National Newspaper Week and all during the year. With the continued increases in all forms of government and the continued increases in taxes, everyone needs to spend a little time telling their government officials that we need to find ways to reduce the duplication in government and the continued waste of our tax dollars.

Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 13
Christ Our Mediator
Hebrews 4:14-5:10
By C. P. Dame
Christ holds three offices. He is a prophet, a priest and a king. In this lesson we will study the priesthood of our Lord. This office of our Lord deserves more thought from believers.

I. Jesus is our great high priest. The epistle to the Hebrews was written to Jewish Christians who were thinking about going back again to Judaism. The word "better" appears a number of times in the epistle. Jesus Christ is better than angels, than Moses, than Joshua, than Aaron. Christianity is the better religion.

Chapters 5 to 10 teach about the priesthood of Jesus—He is the divine, eternal priest who is in the immediate presence of God. In view of Christ's exalted position we are urged to "hold fast our profession" that is our confession regarding Christ, the divine and human priest.

Christ knows about our infirmities for He too was tempted in all points, "yet without sin." Christ is sinless and sympathetic. Because He is sinless He is more sympathetic. The best doctor is not the man who has had the most ailments, but who has the most knowledge.

A sinner is the poorest judge of sin. Seeing that Christ meets our needs we are urged to "come boldly unto the throne of grace, and find grace to help in time of need."

II. Christ has the essential priestly qualifications. The first is that He is a man and is from the human race. In this respect He was like the Levitical priests. Christ being human sympathizes with our human weakness and ignorance. The Old Testament priests were appointed by God—Christ was also divinely appointed. Note especially that Christ is Son and Priest. Christ is superior to all the Old Testament priests. The second qualification is His divine appointment. Christ meets all the divine requirements for this holy office.

III. Christ is the priest we all need. "Thou art a priest forever after the order of Melchizedek"—this makes Him different. Read Genesis 14:17-20 about this unique man who is called "King of Salem," "King of righteousness" and "king of peace"—the name Salem means peace. Neither Christ nor Melchizedek came from a priestly family—this is the meaning of the words, "He is without father or mother."

Priesthood involves praying. Christ prayed much and many times. Christ also suffered much and learned "obedience by the things which He suffered." The words, "the source of eternal salvation" point to a great fact.

Today we read much about rehabilitation, reconstruction and other similar words but little about salvation which man badly needs. The Bible plainly teaches that Christ is the only source of man's salvation. Christ came to this earth to make salvation possible.

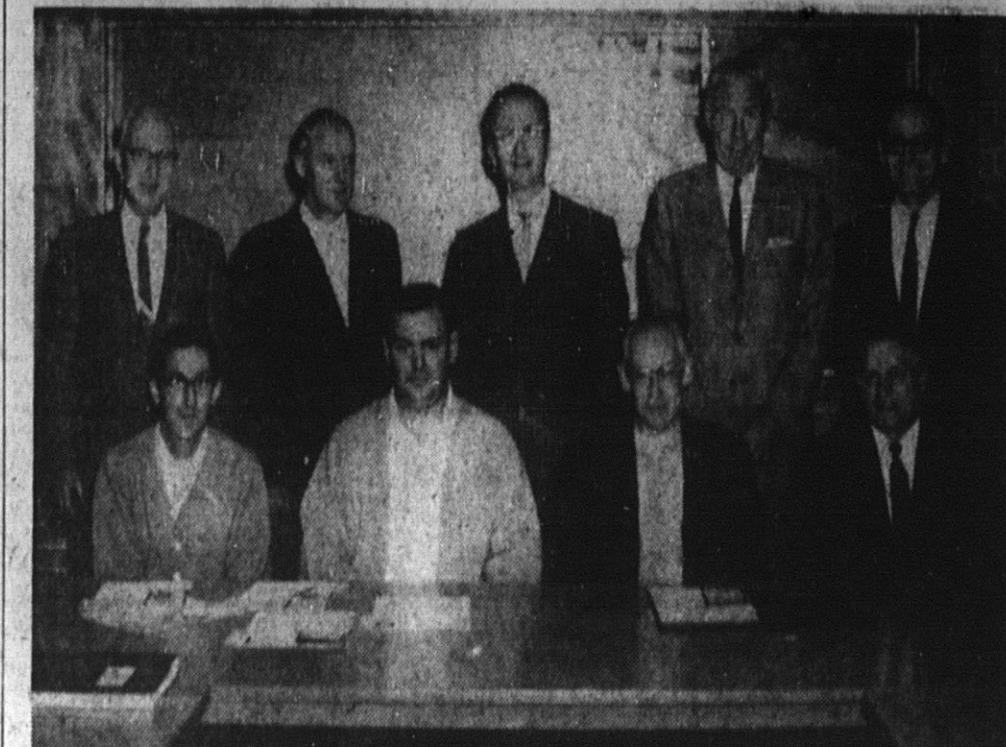

Zeeland Chamber Hears Talk on 'Selling America'

ZEELAND — A total of 255 people crowded into the Middle School Tuesday night to hear Richard M. De Vos, president of Amway Corporation of Ada, speak on the subject, "Selling America." The occasion marked the 31st annual membership banquet of the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce.

De Vos, in his dynamic and forceful way, proclaimed the virtues of free enterprise. He said, "I am vitally concerned that many people who are enjoying the fruits of free enterprise are not aware that these benefits come because of the efforts of millions of American and not because of one group or another or because of laws passed in Washington."

He stated further, "America is what it is today because it gives individuals an opportunity to work in a free society where each individual can advance based on his personal effort. All young people need to be shown that the highest standard of living in the world has resulted from our personal enterprise system under which every person has the right to work and succeed in his chosen vocation in direct proportion to his ability and efforts."

De Vos pointed out that many are over-critical about our free enterprise system. "Some people say that this free enterprise system is too 'dog eat dog,' too competitive in this and it just doesn't work anymore. It makes Americans too self-centered, too selfish. But, I can't believe that, because the American people last year gave away 10½ billion dollars to the United Community Services and to the Red Cross and to the Salvation Army and to many other organizations they believe in — gave voluntarily."

He added, "Another thing that disturbs me is the way we are able to very carefully catalog and pigeonhole our young children coming out of school. Somehow or another we have lost sight of the fact that although education is extremely important and we all would encourage anyone to go as far as he possibly can to gain technical skills, we must also remember that motivation is a phenomenal force — I become alarmed over the words 'non-college bound' because these kids hadn't even graduated from high school yet and we had already put a failure name on them. 'Non-college bound' — just as if they already flunked."

"Is it so terribly bad not to go to college today? Are those people who do not go on to college such utter failures, such worthless Americans? I say they are not and I think it is time we begin to have mutual respect for each other and a mutual awareness of our needs for each other."

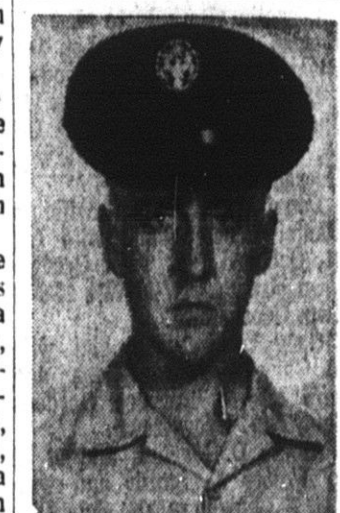
The Scout Reservation is located eight miles north of Barryton, on Highway 66, and then one and one-half miles east.

Assailant Asks Exam On Charge

Patrolman Van Ingen Undergoes Surgery, Reported Satisfactory

A Holland police officer was wounded Thursday afternoon when he went on a call to assist another Holland officer who was in pursuit of a man attempting to flee arrest.

Patrolman John Van Ingen, 23, incurred a wound in the left arm in a scuffle that broke out around 3:45 p.m. Thursday in a lot on Sixth St. between River and Central Aves.

Van Ingen was taken to Holland Hospital where he underwent surgery Thursday night. He was reported in satisfactory condition Friday.

The assailant, Arthur Ogden, 38, of rural Holland, was charged with assault with intent to commit murder and he demanded examination when arraigned later Thursday evening before Holland Municipal Judge John Galien Jr.

Bond on Ogden was set at \$20,000. Ogden was later transferred to Ottawa county jail.

This was the first time in 26 years a Holland policeman was wounded. Former Police Chief Peter A. Lieverse was seriously wounded during a holdup at the First National Bank on Sept. 29, 1932.

Van Ingen was wounded during a scuffle that terminated events triggered when Patrolman Glenn Bareman arrested Ogden on a disorderly charge for using vile and vulgar language in a public place at Eighth St. and Central Ave. around 3:30 p.m. Thursday.

Ogden allegedly struck Patrolman Bareman and began fleeing on foot. Officer Bareman radioed for assistance and followed Ogden in the police cruiser to the vicinity of a parking lot near the Old North End Tavern at 22 West Sixth St. where he chased Ogden on foot. Police said the tavern itself was not involved in the incident.

When Officer Van Ingen and other officers arrived at the scene Bareman and a second Holland officer had been struggling with Ogden.

During the struggle, police said Bareman's revolver unknowingly became unholstered. It was allegedly grabbed by Ogden.

Officer Bareman wrestled Ogden to the ground and as Bareman shoved the gun barrel into the dirt, Ogden fired a shot. After the first shot, Ogden wrenched the gun free and allegedly turned and fired a second shot that struck Patrolman Van Ingen.

Bareman and other officers again grabbed the revolver and a third shot was fired into the ground as the gun was being secured.

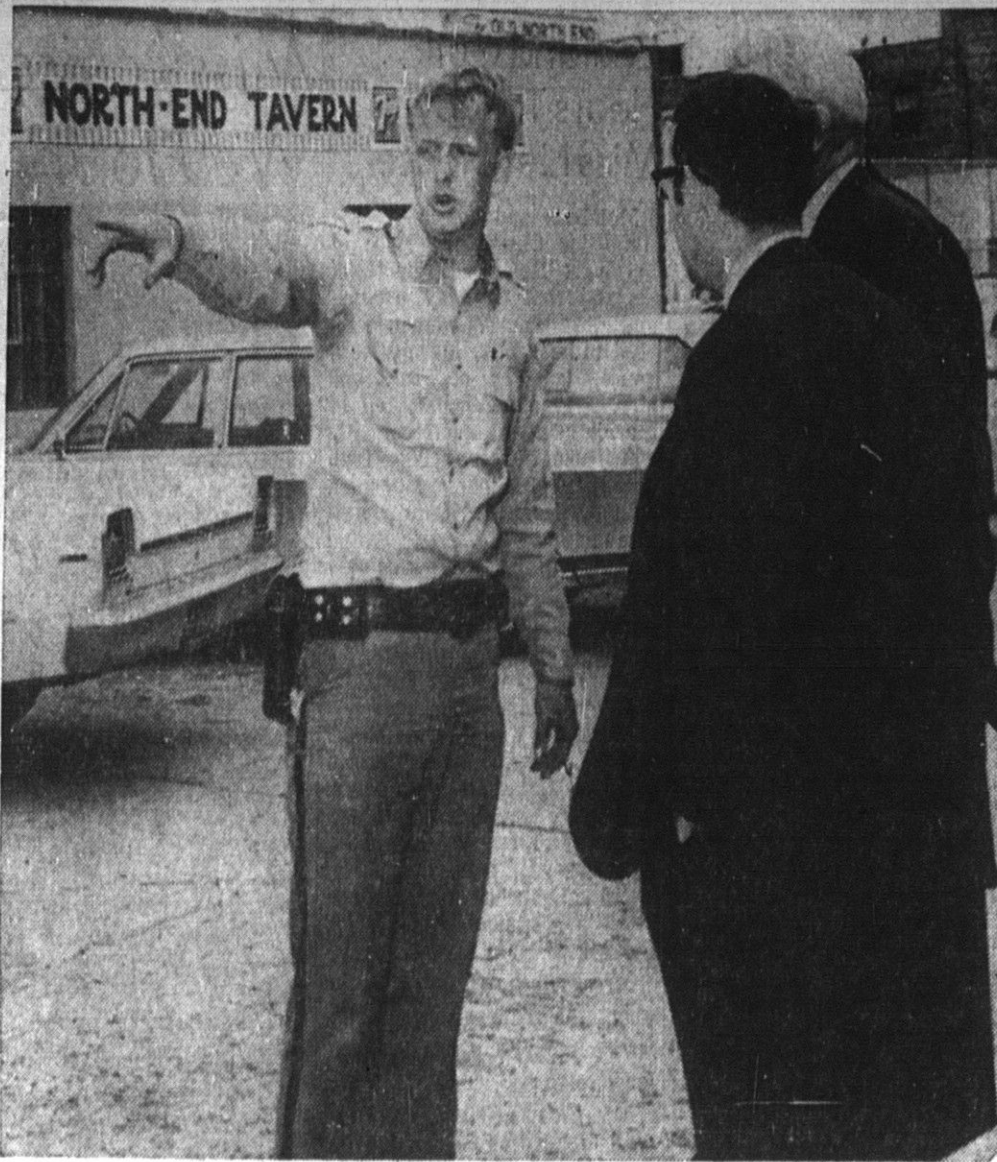

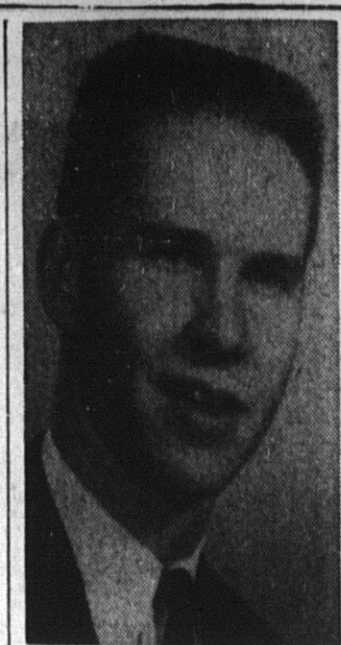

Kiddie Kampus Program Told To Exchange Club

The speaker at Monday's noon luncheon of the Holland Exchange Club was Larry Dykstra, executive director of Kiddie Kampus. He explained the organization of Kiddie Kampus and the work involved.

He named the three organizations in Holland which work with the pre-school child. They are the Holland Day Center which meets in Hope Church, the Cherry Lane Cooperative, run by parents and supported by them and the third and the latest one to be organized here, the Kiddie Kampus, a private venture with no outside support.

Kiddie Kampus is a school which takes children below school age. Mr. Dykstra emphasized it is not a baby-sitting center. It is a new and unique system dealing with the development of young children and their parents.

The important factor is not what they do there, but why they do it, not how much does the child learn, but how does the child react to daily experiences in this school. The main objective is designed to give a perfect pre-school program.

The speaker mentioned many of the physical features which make Kiddie Kampus unique. The building is located on an easily accessible site, with comparative freedom from traffic. It has a fenced-in play area which is sodded for softness. The children like the furniture and other equipment specially designed for them. Safety is stressed in all equipment.

The director and his three full-time assistants assure individual care for all. Children are taught the flag salute. They enjoy the merry-go-round and the tumble slide. Arts and crafts feature paper cutting and coloring. Their mental development program involves a story time, films and a film strip program. They are taught to think in pictures and to think in words.

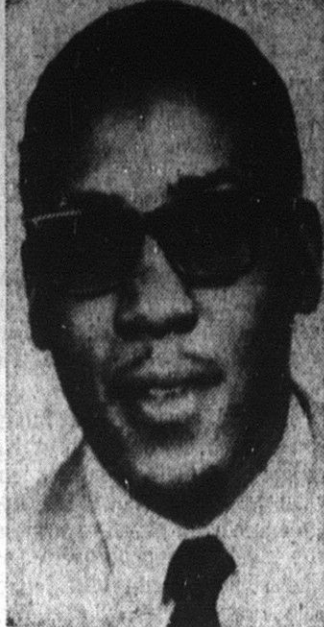

Vander Jagt Challenges Media to 'Correct' Image

Century Club members and guests Monday night heard U.S. Congressman Guy Vander Jagt challenge the broadcasting and television media to "include 'what's right with America' in their news coverage."

This positive approach to broadcasting was the theme of Mr. Vander Jagt's speech on the "Impact on Elections of Broadcasting and Television."

He emphasized that although it is the responsibility of tv and broadcasting to show "what's wrong with America," they need to use as much skill and perception to communicate the "good" to complete the news picture accurately.

For example, we need to be aware of the poverty in our country, he said, but along with this awareness, recognition should be made of the positive action that is being taken by the American taxpayer, that is, that "27 billion dollars is being given in aid to the poor in one form or another."

Rep. Vander Jagt enumerated and assessed these significant impacts on elections made by television and broadcasting: the computer projections available even before the polls close on the West Coast, the awareness brought to voters of the need for reform of political conventions — the "mirror has been held up" and the tv audiences could see for themselves the "divisiveness and antiquated structure" of our old-style political conventions; and above all the tremendous impact of television in bringing the Vietnam War "into the living rooms" of America.

It was also pointed out that television's impact is felt most strongly in the opportunity it gives a politician or office-seeker to become an "instant hero" or personality, and he cited the impact tv has had on bringing George Wallace, essentially a regional candidate, to national prominence.

Likewise, he said, Ronald Reagan's one speech for Barry Goldwater in 1964 on television gained him a wide audience and put him over as a national candidate. Television has also changed the style of speaking for candidates. Conversational speaking is "in" — the old-style

oratory and gestures are no longer needed.

In the last analysis, however, Vander Jagt said, the election outcome still depends on the grass roots efforts of the volunteer workers and he gave several examples of the importance of one vote in past elections.

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Hope Routed 34-6 By Classy Alma Eleven

Alma College's football team was as cool and perfect as the weather at Riverview Park Saturday as the Scots registered a 34-6 drubbing of Hope College in the MIAA opener for both teams.

Alma exhibited the class and execution of a well precisioned team that has now won 13 straight games over three seasons.

Led by an offense that dug up turf all over the field and a defense that threw Hope quarterback Groy Kaper for losses eight times while attempting to pass Alma proved too tough and experienced for the Flying Dutchmen.

Alma, winning the toss of the coin for the 13th straight game to coincide with their winning streak, gave Hope an early opportunity when two time all-league junior quarterback Tom Jakovac fumbled on the third play of the game with Hope's Karl Nadolsky recovering on Scots 25 yard line.

Gary Frens, who gave Hope another great effort offensively and defensively, on three successive carries moved for a first down to the Alma 15.

Kaper then attempted a pass that was intercepted by Alma's Robert Zins on the Scots 13.

Alma then moved 87 yards in 14 plays for their first of five touchdowns, all of which were scored by different personnel.

Jack Prince scored from the one at 6:15 of the first quarter and following Jeff Blough's conversion the Scots were ahead to stay 7-0.

Alma added to the lead when Jakovac hit John Fuzak with an 18 yard scoring strike at 1:24 of the quarter and after Blough's conversion the score mounted to 14-0.

Hope took the kickoff and moved to the Alma 16 on the strength of Kaper's passing and a pass interference penalty on the Scots. On fourth and six Kaper's pass was knocked down by Alma's Rick Ledy.

Following an exchange of punts Alma moved 48 yards in six plays with the score resulting from a Jakovac to Chad Creevy pass for 224 yards. Blough converted and Alma led 21-0.

Hope again took the kickoff and moved 66 yards to the Alma 14 yard line where the drive was halted on an incom-

plete pass on fourth down.

With only 17 seconds left in the half it appeared Alma would run out the clock but Prince fumbled and Keith Van Tubergen fell on the loose ball for Hope at Alma's 14 with 0:12 showing until intermission.

On the first play Kaper threw to Harry Rumohr for Hope's only score of the point. Bill Bekkering missed the day after and Hope trailed at the half 21-6.

The second half was no contest as Alma contained Hope's offense and added a couple scores of their own.

Alma upped the margin to 27-6 at 4:45 of the third quarter on a one yard sweep by Jakovac which terminated a nine play 49 yard drive.

Then with 13:19 left in the game Alma hit the scoreboard for the last time when Chris Clark, who ran for 103 yards in 25 carries, finally chalked up a score to his credit on a two yard burst off - tackle behind Alma's hard charging line.

Alma was able to run at will between Hope's tackles and enjoyed the luxury of having to take to the airways only ten times in the game despite a fine passer in Jakovac.

The Scots dominated play running 88 plays from scrimmage to Hope's 68 plays.

Jakovac, Clark, Prince and George Hilary all gained more than 64 yards rushing for Alma depicting the depth of this squad.

Jakovac threw for two touchdowns and ran for one while completing four of nine passes for 82 yards. Unlike Kaper who was thrown for losses eight times totaling 64 yards while attempting to pass Jakovac was thrown only once for a 16 yard loss.

Hope coach Russ De Vette praised the Alma squad and noted "it's really funny how things just build up, it was so typical of a bad game."

The Hope coach was "still pleased with our passing game," however, work is needed on the rushing offense which accounted for only 76 yards.

Hope, now 2-2 on the season, travels to Adrian for an encounter with the Bulldogs Saturday.
