## Pfc. D. Brown Receives Army Commendation

Pfc. Douglas P. Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Preston A. Brown of 569 West 30th St., who left in April for Vietnam, has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal with V device.

Pfc. Brown received the medal with the citation: "For heroism in connection with military operation against a hostile force, Pfc. Brown distinguished himself beyond exceptionally valorous actions while serving as a tank driver on June 19, 1969, during a re-action mission near Tay Ninh City.

B troop came under heavy fire from enemy rocket grenades, mortars and automatic weapons. The tank commander on Pfc. Brown's tank was placing out high volume of caliber .50 machinegun fire. Eventually the supply of ammunition became dangerously low. Pfc. Brown climbed out of his driver's hatch while under enemy fire and ran to some nearby vehicles to get more ammunition.

"Because of this courageous act his tank was able to stay active in the battle for the duration of the contact. This contributed immeasurably to the success of the mission. Pfc. Brown's valorous actions are in

keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army."

## Anniversaries Marked By Vandenberg Family

On Aug. 3, 1969, William C. and Florence Vandenberg will quietly observe their 60th wedding anniversary in their home at 27 West 13th St.

This home has been the setting of three Golden Wedding anniversaries in the Vandenberg family including the William Vandeborgs, who celebrated their 50th anniversary there on Aug. 3, 1959.

Mr. and Mrs. John Vandenberg, parents of William, celebrated their golden anniversary in 1926. She was the former Harriet Van Lente.

Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Henry Fairbanks, parents of Florence Vandenberg had their pictures taken on their golden anniversary in 1921. Mrs. Fairbanks was the former Elizabeth E. Goodrick.

Mrs. Vandenberg will be 84 on July 31 and Mr. Vandenberg will be 85 on Oct. 3.

The Vandenberg home is among the older homes in this community, having survived the devastating fire of 1871 and Mrs. Vandenberg has lived there for about 72 years.

Her parents met here at a church social in 1869. She is the granddaughter of Isaac Fairbanks, the original pioneer of the Holland area, who in 1843 settled in Fillmore Township about one mile southeast of the present limits of the City of Holland. Mr. Fairbanks represented the Federal Government in its relations with the Indians who then inhabited this area. He later moved into the City of Holland.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Vandenberg have led active and busy lives. The four years prior to her marriage, in 1909 Mrs. Vandenberg taught school and later became active in church and musical circles. Commencing in 1921, intermittently, she has been and is now an officer in the local Elizabeth Schuyler Hamilton Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

For many years William C. Vandenberg has been active in business, industrial and political affairs; he has been a member of the Holland City Council, the Michigan State Senate for six years, Lieutenant Governor of Michigan for two years, and was a member of State Central Committee of the Republican Party.

In civic affairs he was one of the organizers of Holland Chamber of Commerce in 1923-24, the Community Chest (United Fund) in 1931-32, was a charter member of the Holland Rotary Club. For several years he was a member of the Board of Directors of the old South Ottawa and West Allegan County Fair.

He also served as chairman of the Ottawa County Chapter of the American Red Cross. He has been active in church affairs and together with Mrs. Vandenberg and others, they were co-founders and charter members of the First Presbyterian Church of Holland.

The Vandeborgs were classmates in Holland High School and graduated together in 1903. They have two children, William C. Vandenberg, Jr. and Florence Margaret (Mrs. John) Daniels, five grandsons, five granddaughters and three great grandsons.

## Charge Driver In Fatality At Saugatuck

SAUGATUCK — A Holland man, Basil Beck, 36, was charged today with manslaughter and negligent homicide in the death of Mrs. Hazel M. Eaton, 65, route 2, Fennville, which occurred following a two-car crash at 6:50 p.m. Monday at the intersection of Blue Star Highway and Washington Rd. just north of here.

Mrs. Eaton was a passenger in a car driven by her daughter, Mrs. Charles Baker, 30, Saugatuck. Also in the car was M. S. Baker's four-year-old daughter Cheryl. Mrs. Eaton died at 11 p.m. in Blodgett Hospital in Grand Rapids.

Allegan sheriff's officers said Beck allegedly ran a stop sign as he headed north on Washington colliding with the Baker car headed south on Blue Star Highway. Beck who was held in Allegan county jail was initially charged with disorderly-drunk and the charge was changed Tuesday to manslaughter and negligent homicide.

He was arraigned today in Allegan District Court before Judge Elizabeth Ramsey and demanded a preliminary examination which was set for Aug. 5 at 1:30 p.m.

He was remanded back to the Allegan county jail in lieu of posting \$2,000 bond.

Mrs. Eaton was born in Ionia and spent most of her adult life in Ganges working with her husband, Monroe Eaton, in operating Eaton's Grocery. The couple was married July 26, 1933, in LaPorte, Ind.

Surviving are the husband; a daughter, Mrs. Charles (Mary) Baker of Saugatuck; three grandchildren, an daughter, Corwin Carter of Kalamazoo.

A Holland man is listed in satisfactory condition at Holland Hospital today where he was treated for abrasions and bruises received in an accident at 3:51 a.m. Wednesday on South Washington Ave. (US-31 business route) just south of 33rd St.

Rodney Montgomery Mullett, 26, of 43 West 17th St., was injured when the car he was driving north on South Washington Ave., skidded and collided with a semi truck which had been parked in a no parking zone on the east side of the highway, according to Holland police.

Mullett's car was demolished. The truck driver, Marcel Parker Cole, 29, of St. Anniston, Ala., was inside the gas station near where he had parked the semi at the time of the crash and was not injured. Holland police are investigating the accident.

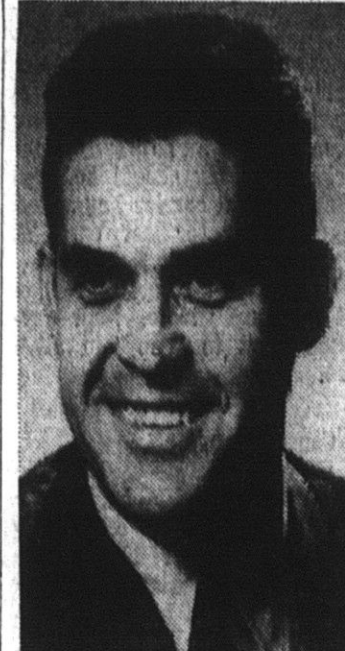

In 1961 he was employed as special assistant to the late Cong. Clarence J. Brown Sr., and later in the capacity of minority counsel for the House Rules committee.

In 1966 he was elected to the 90th Congress and was reelected in 1968 by 71 per cent of the vote. He serves on the House Science and Astronautics Committee and Post Office and Civil Service Committee and has served as a member of the House Republican Task Force on Congressional Reform.

Joel P. Verplank is chairman of the Ottawa county Republican committee.

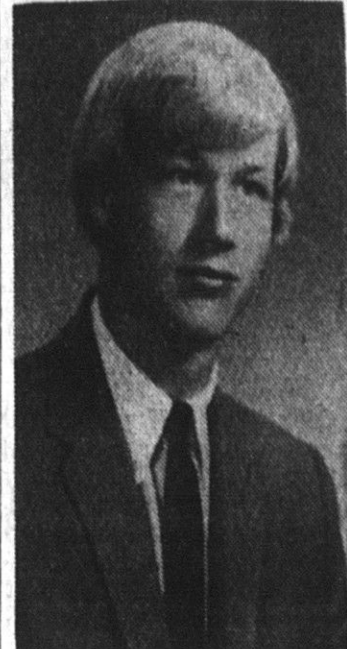

One youth was drowned but 11 others survived Monday afternoon when they were swept by a large wave into the channel from a pier at Holland State Park.

The drowning victim was Doyle Wayne Smith, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale A. Smith of 270 South Wall St., Zeeland. His body was recovered at 9:10

a.m. today in the channel by the marine division of the Ottawa county sheriff's department.

Smith was one of 12 youths walking on the pier at 2:18 p.m. Monday when a large wave catapulted them into the water. The other 11 made it to safety. Sheriff's officers said waves had reached a height of about eight feet when a storm struck.

Dragging operations were called off at 4:30 p.m. Monday because of huge waves. Coast Guardsmen and sheriff's officers cooperated in the dragging operations.

Smith, who graduated from Zeeland High School June, was a member of Zion Lutheran Church of Holland.

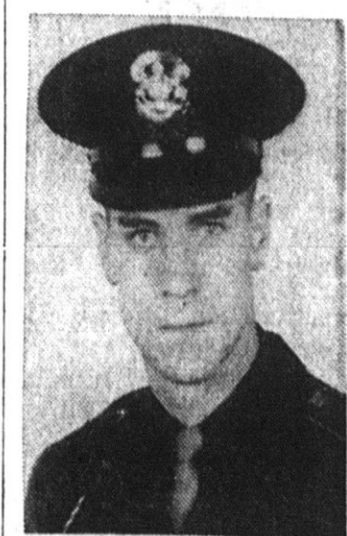

## City Tax Bills Being Compiled

City tax bills were being prepared in the city assessor's office today following confirmation of equalizing factors for Allegan county by the Michigan Tax Commission.

After six weeks, the state commission resolved equalized value of property in that portion of the city which lies in Allegan county, setting the factor at 1.176. The Ottawa county portion is equalized at 1.011.

This sets the city tax rate at \$40.81 per \$1,000 as equalized, a reduction of 14 cents from the \$40.95 rate last year. To make out the bills, the assessor's staff multiplies the assessed valuation by the equalizing factor, and then applies the tax rate. Total equalized valuation of the city is \$97,026,615.

Total tax levy for the city is \$3,948,947.97.

City Assessor Robert Nienhuis estimates it will take at least two weeks to make out all bills, providing no machine breakdowns, hopefully by Aug. 12.

City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts said his office is moving the deadline for tax payments to Sept. 10. After that date, a 6 per cent collection fee and interest charge will be added. The assessor's office has been issuing estimated bills based on a tax rate of \$41.50. Adjustments will be made later. Persons planning to be on vacation during the collection period may request estimates and pay them in advance.

The 1969 tax rate of \$40.81 is based on the following figures: city operations, \$14.34; city debt, \$2.41; school operations, \$10.37; school special operations, \$10, school debt, \$3.19; swim pool operations, \$.50.

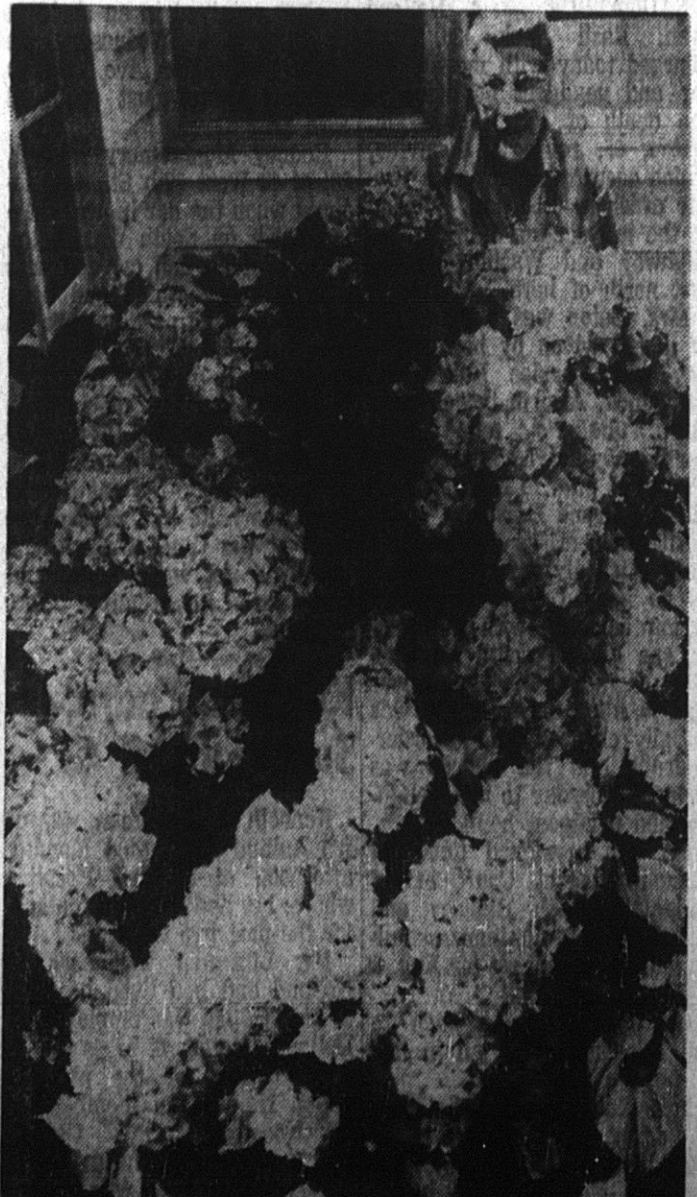

## Ambassador Describes Impressions of Denmark

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is the latest letter received from Miss Karin Granberg, Holland's 1969 Community Ambassador, who is in Denmark.)

For most people, a trip to Europe is "a long time in the planning." This is certainly true in my case because I have been planning a trip to Scandinavia (in my mind) for at least five years!

Think of all the hours of careful planning that are involved in a simple two-week vacation to Florida in the winter and multiply that by about three times. (This includes the special excitement that enters the pictures when your vacation happens to be Europe.)

What is it that makes a trip to another country such an exciting prospect? Perhaps it is the thought of all the new and beautiful surroundings; a change in climate and a dramatic geographical difference from your accustomed one.

Even more, it may be the anticipation of finding a different approach to life than we have in Holland, Mich., or even in the entire United States. Variety, in particular a whole new variety of people and cultural habits is an interesting possibility in a foreign land. I looked forward to this novelty when I began to plan my summer in Denmark.

After four weeks in Denmark I have realized that the cultural differences here are quite insignificant and that the geography (though it has a large assortment) of the country can be duplicated almost totally in various parts of Michigan alone! So that if it were to seek the excitement of a foreign country alone that I chose to come to Denmark, my choice would be a great disappointment.

Fortunately, before I left the United States I had made my main purpose for the trip to simply observe as much as possible about the country and the people, and not to be overly concerned when my preconceived ideas about things in Denmark proved false.

Denmark is probably one of the most "Americanized" coun-

tries in Europe. There is more English spoken in Copenhagen than in any other language, including Danish. Any product that you can buy in the United States can be purchased here although in the case of luxury items such as cosmetics, liquor and cigarettes the prices are considerably higher.

Housing in Denmark is expensive, but the homes in the cities have most of the conveniences available in America. Electrical appliances may not be as modern as ours but they are all on the market.

The other evening, I was in a restaurant in Copenhagen; the music was entirely in English and as I reached for the potato chips, I thought "Denmark isn't far from home!"

Miss Sophie M. Russo, 436 Main St., Saugatuck, died Thursday morning at a Holland Hospital.

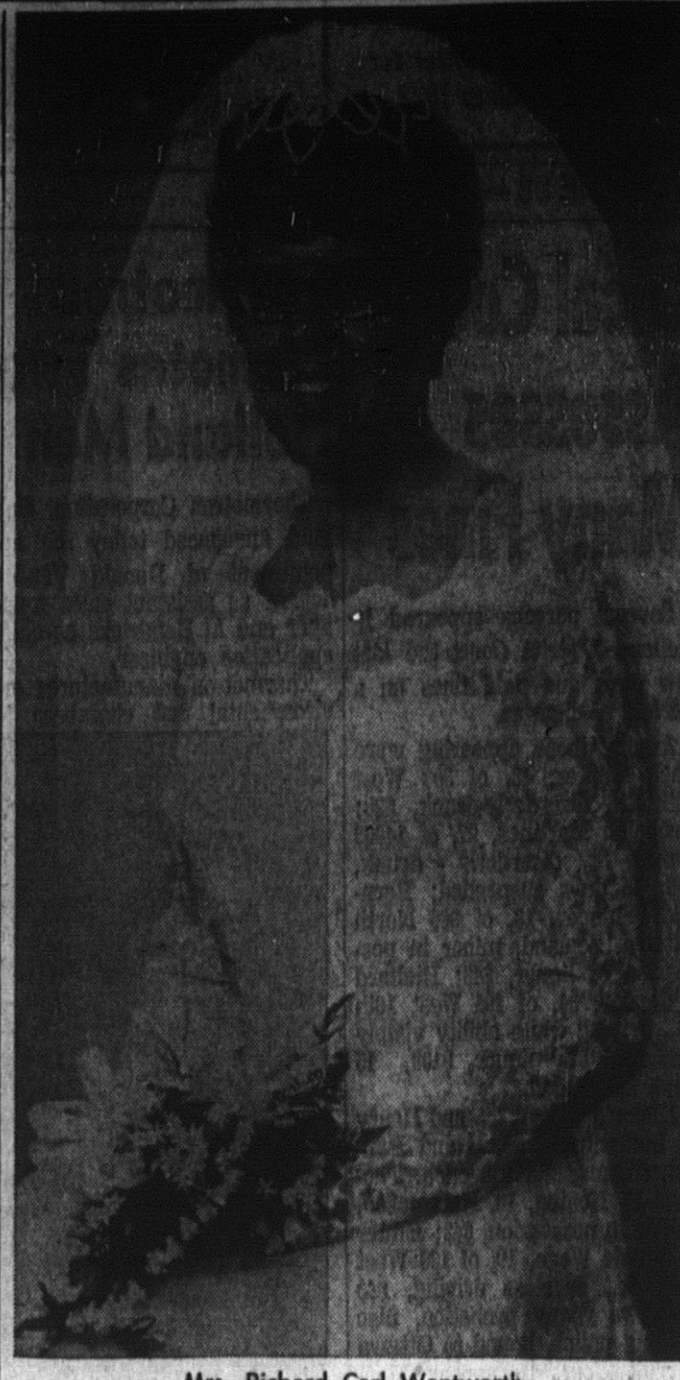

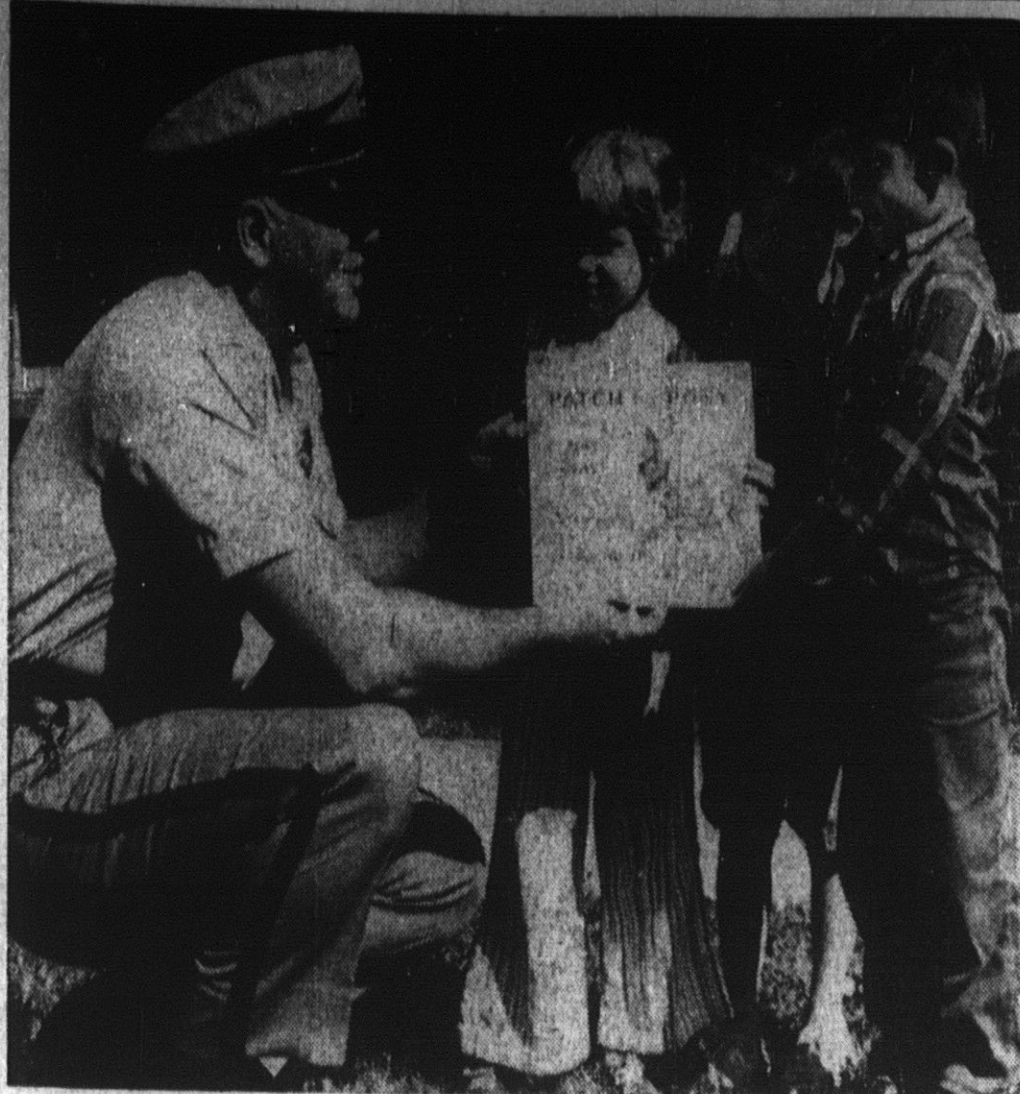

## Child Safety Program Launched in Holland

A campaign to prevent child molestation through education was launched in Holland this week, it was announced by Safety Education Officer Marty Hardenberg of the Holland Police Department.

A new safety education program, developed by the Society for Visual Education, Inc., of Chicago, for the purpose of making pre-school and kindergarten children aware of the danger of being lured by strangers, was made available in the Holland area by a generous gift from the Holland Jaycees Auxiliary.

The program features "Patch the Pony," a little brown and white pony who teaches children to beware of strangers with his safety slogan, "Nay! Nay! From Strangers Stay Away." The special "Patch the Pony" kit includes a full-color filmstrip and record which tell the legend of the friendly little pony who helps to protect children with vital safety rules. There are posters, self-adhesive stickers and lapel buttons which will be used in this program.

Officer Hardenberg indicated that child molestation is a serious, nationwide problem. "It is estimated that as many as one million children are molested annually in the United States," he said. "By no means do we want to frighten parents. This does mean that it can happen anywhere, and at any time, so we are taking precautionary measures. 'Patch the Pony's' record of achievement to date demonstrates that it is possible to deal successfully with this age-old problem in an effective and wholesome way."

"Protection of the young is the concern of all responsible citizens," Hardenberg concluded. "With the support of organizations like the Jaycee Auxiliary and everyone's help, we can hope to make the streets safe for all Holland children."

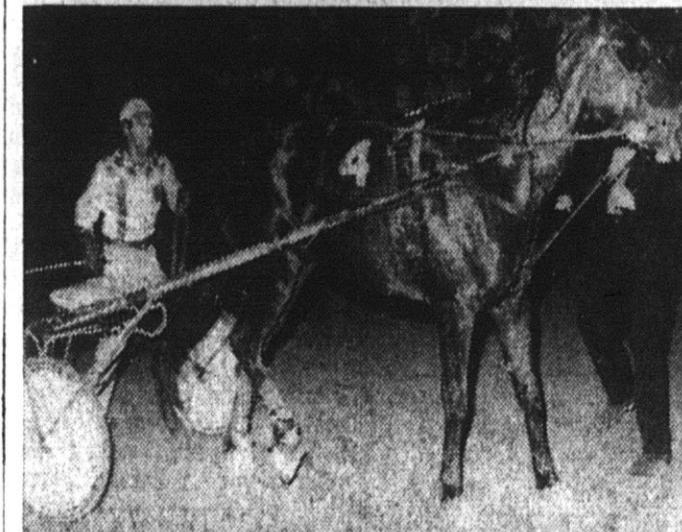
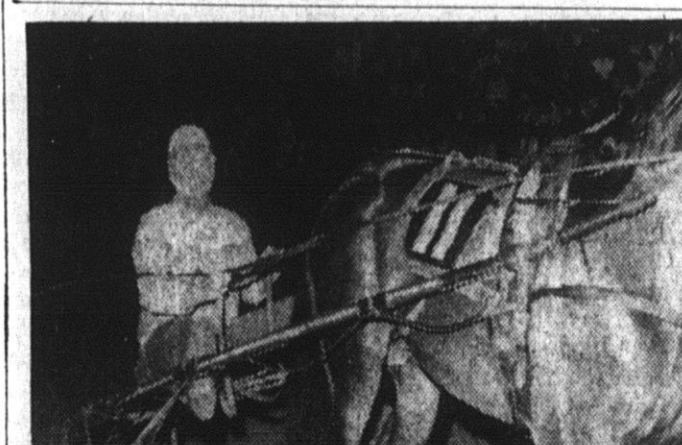

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 3  
God's Covenant and Law  
Exodus 19:3-8, 16-17; 20:18-20  
By C. P. Dame

The people whom God had delivered from Egypt were in need of training and discipline. This they showed by complaining shortly after being on their own. God gave His people His law which expressed His will.

I. God reveals Himself. Theologians speak of general revelation. God has made known His wisdom and power in nature. In the Bible God has in a special manner revealed Himself.

"And Moses went up unto God, and the Lord called unto Him out of the mountain." Moses was God's spokesman. God told him what he should say "to the house of Israel." Moses should remind the Israelites what God did "unto the Egyptians" and what He did for them. They soon forgot all the miracles He had wrought for them. God had brought them out of Egypt to Mt. Sinai for a special purpose. The Israelites were the descendants of Abraham with whom God had made a covenant. At Sinai God renewed this covenant with His people.

The Lord told Moses to tell the people what He expected of them. "Now therefore, if ye will obey My voice indeed, and keep My covenant"—that they should do and then the nation would be God's "peculiar treasure." His people in a special manner. "And ye shall be unto Me a kingdom of priests, and a holy nation." Peter in his epistle (I Peter 2:9) applies these Old Testament words to Christians.

II. The people responded to God's offer. Moses obeyed God's order and called the elders, the leaders of the nation and told them what God had commanded him. Moses was a faithful servant of God. The people said, in response to God, "All that the Lord hath spoken we will do." Moses brought the people's answer to the Lord. The people committed themselves to God's proposition. Note that the people without any coercion, freely accepted their part. Perhaps they did not fully realize the significance of the words they used.

III. God gave His law to His people. Some believe that the Ten Commandments are of human origin. They are the rules which the race has learned through human experience. The Bible teaches that the Ten Commandments, called the Decalogue, is of divine origin. God gave the commandments, also called the moral law, to His people. In the first four commandments God teaches us what our duty to Him is, and in the last six commandments God teaches us what our duty to our fellow man is.

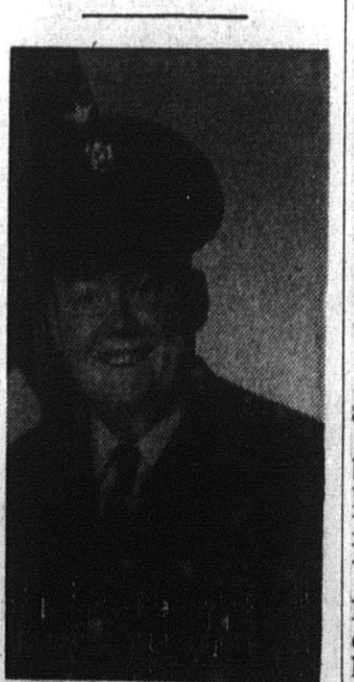
What is the purpose of God's law for Christians? The law reveals man's sinfulness—tells him what kind of a person he is. The law is a schoolmaster that directs a person to Christ who kept the law for us and in addition the law gives guidance for daily life. It tells us what God's will is.

## Dutch Magazine Editor Doing Story on Holland

Getting acquainted with Holland, Mich., these days is the English editor of a Dutch magazine and his wife and two daughters, all the way from Chislehurst, Kent, on the edge of London.

It was the second visit here this year for Vernon Leonard, editor of the Holland Herald, a monthly magazine of "good will" for the Netherlands designed mainly for English-speaking people all over the world but which is developing a growing circulation in the homeland.

When Leonard was here last March, he explored possibilities of featuring Holland, Mich. in an issue of the Holland Herald, and now he is here with his family to do the work on such an issue which probably will come out next March, nicely geared to Tulip Time. He will do stories on the Dutch in Western Michigan after more than a century since the original colonization in 1847. He also will be calling on local business and industry.

He hopes to develop an issue on much the same lines as he presented New York City as "New Amsterdam" last September. In that issue the staff traced Mayor John V. Lindsay's family tree back to 1612. It was a surprise to the mayor that the Vliet in his name (his mother's name) dated back nine generations to a Dirckes Jans van der Vliet who was born in 1612 in Rylevelt in Holland and died in Flatbush, N. Y. in 1696.

Since his visit here in March, Leonard has been to Japan where he started an ambitious program calling for producing an issue on Japan in the Holland Herald, printed in Japanese. He had samples of Japanese printing with him but concluded he will do no proof-reading or checking along that line.

The trend in the Netherlands for many years has been to turn away from the tourist concept of tulips, windmills and wooden shoes and promote the industrial growth and such accomplishments as land reclamation. The Holland Herald presents a many-sided picture of life in the Netherlands today—what's happening in commerce, culture, industry, science and tourism.

A blend of Holland—old and new—promises to be an interesting story and different too. It isn't often that modern Netherlands is compared with this Dutch-American city as viewed through the eyes of an Englishman.

The Leonards are spending a week to 10 days in Holland like any visiting family. Then Mrs. Leonard and the girls will head for San Francisco and Leonard will remain another two weeks or so to collect information for the issue.

He expects that the part of the issue on Holland, Mich. will be in one section which can be reproduced separately, much like a special edition he did this summer for aviation and KLM, the Dutch airline which has been one of the magazine's biggest boosters.

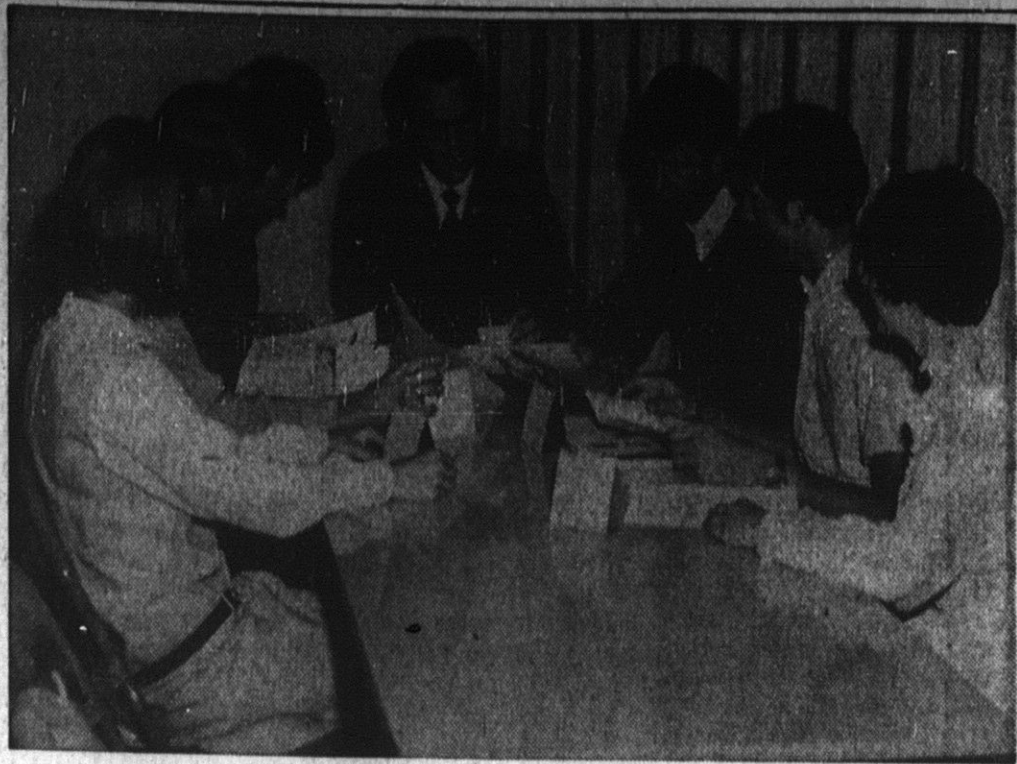

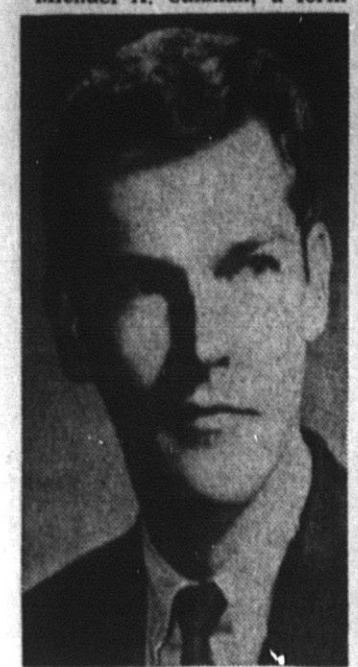

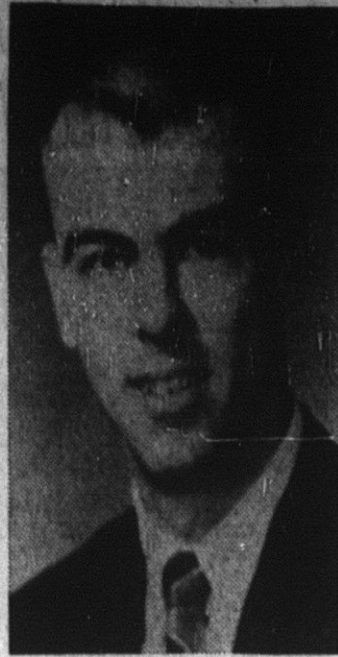

## Verdict Favors Reorganization

GRAND HAVEN — After a three-hour trial in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday afternoon, Judge Chester A. Ray rendered a verdict in favor of the Holland School District and the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District in the challenge case brought by residents of the former Federal and Harrington school districts.

Residents from the two districts had challenged the legality of the county school district reorganization program. The Ottawa county court previously had ruled in favor of the defendant and the decision was appealed to the Michigan Court of Appeals which referred it back to the Ottawa court for trial on the merits of the case.

The Holland Board of Education had held that reorganization must be resolved before calling a special election on transportation millage for the Holland district. The Holland board was represented by Atty. James E. Townsend and the county district by Atty. Harvey L. Scholten. Plaintiffs were represented by Lee Boothby of Niles.

The attorney for the plaintiff claimed that the people in the Federal and Harrington districts were denied an opportunity to be heard at several public hearings held prior to the time that the reorganization went into effect in 1967.

Boothby also claimed that an election was set by the intermediate district for Nov. 9, 1967, but later the date was changed to Nov. 7. He claimed that the ballot was not readily recognizable and that the

people were confused and misled. Donald De Pree, Jennie M. Kaufman, and Kenneth Heuvelman were called as witnesses. Boothby presented 17 exhibits. There was no immediate indication there would be an appeal. Plaintiffs have 20 days to file such an appeal after the judgment is signed.

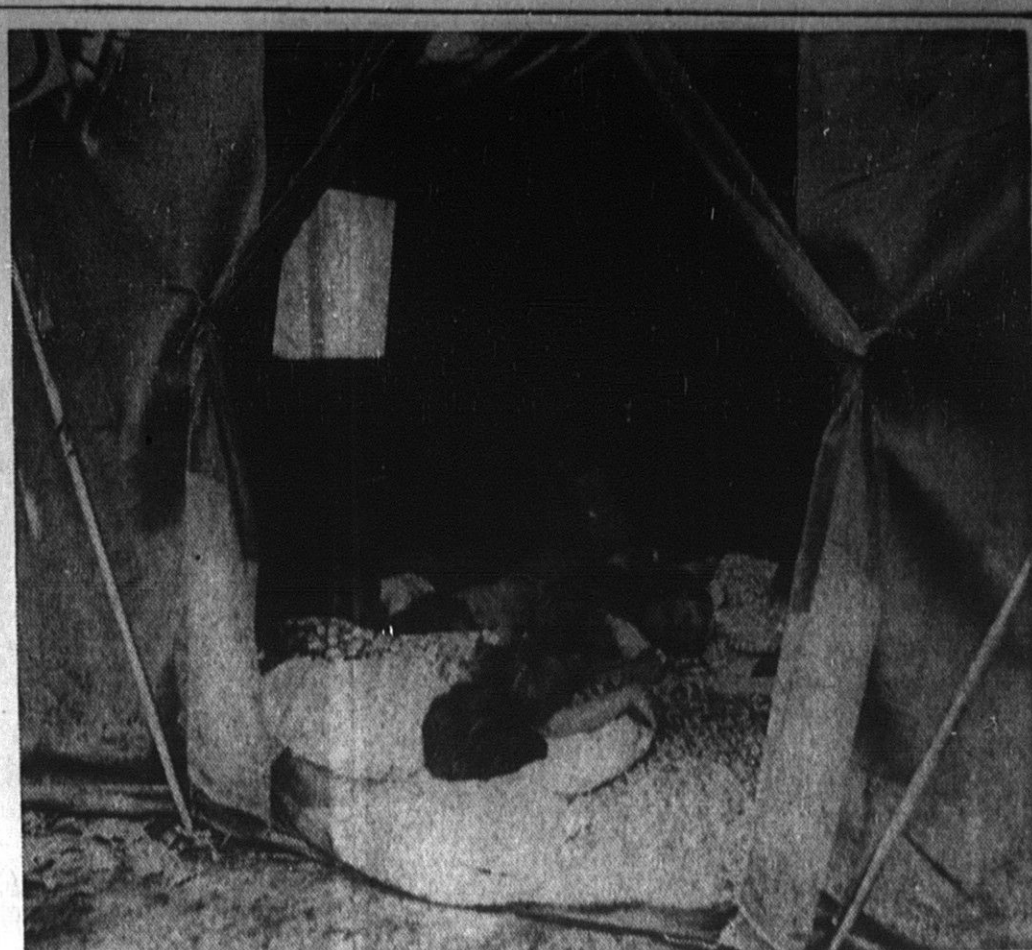
## G. Joostberns Succumbs at 64

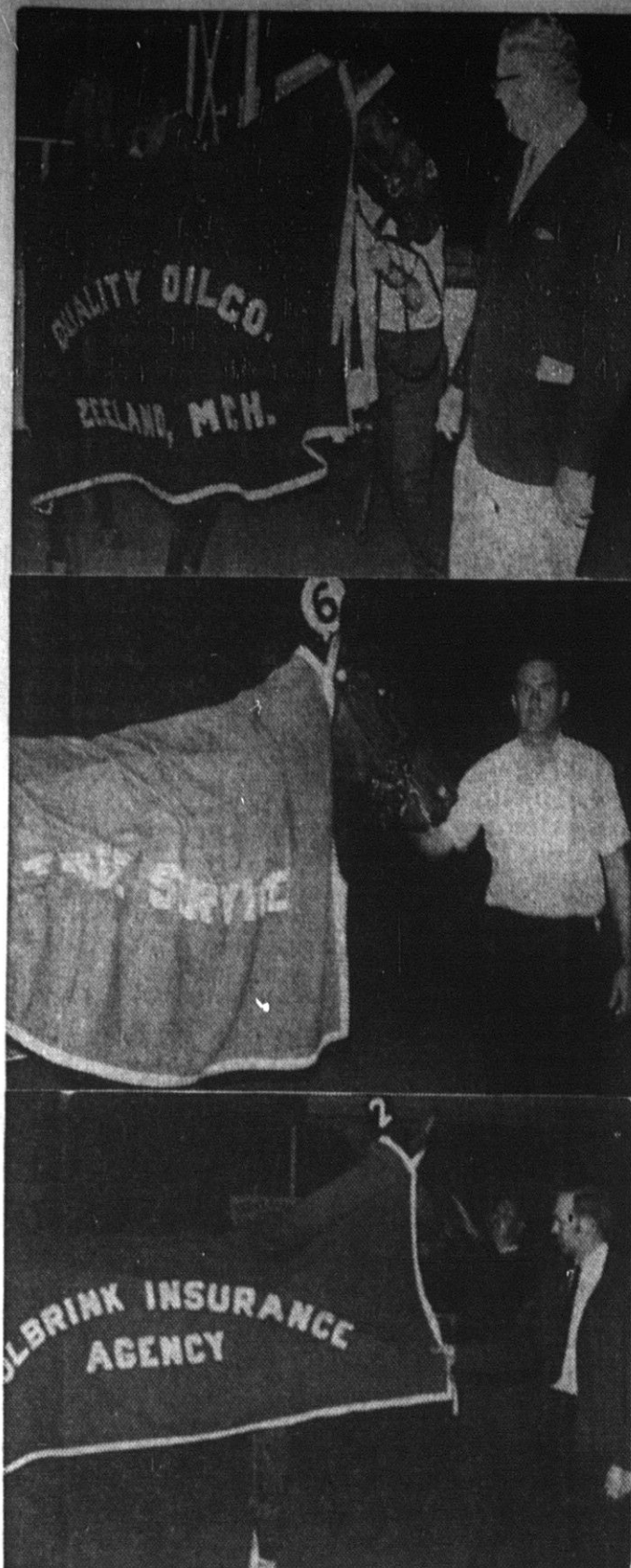

## Greater Voice for Germany In Europe Says van Voorst

"Germany is going to demand a greater voice in running European affairs," said Bruce van Voorst, Newsweek bureau chief in Bonn, Germany, Monday afternoon. He spoke to an audience including Japanese students who are attending the Hope College summer school.

The speaker, a former Hope College student and Sentinel staffer, is here visiting his family and his wife's family for several weeks with his children. "The post war period, in which Germany was willing to jump to attention whenever the world snapped its fingers is over. Germany has emerged as the continent's principal economic power, exporting VW's to America, steel to China, refrigerators to Africa. But increasingly Germans are convinced that its economic potential has not been matched by an appropriate voice in European and Atlantic affairs."

"The problem is, it is difficult to imagine in which direction this growing restlessness can find an outlet. De Gaulle's departure from the French political scene does not necessarily mean that British entry into the Common Market is assured, and in any case the Germans are not in a position to force the issue. The French still retain a veto."

"Nor is there really much room for German initiatives on any major scale in Eastern Europe. The Soviet intervention in Czechoslovakia demonstrated clearly enough how much and no more the Soviets will tolerate there. The much-dis-

puted German "Detente" policy towards Eastern Europe has been reduced to cautious contacts with the Rumanians, and behind-the-scenes talks with the Poles and Hungarians.

"In one major area of political conflict, nuclear affairs, the German hands are effectively tied. Germany has pledged itself not to construct or possess ABC weapons, and

no serious politician is directly proposing it in quite that fashion."

"Yet there is an awareness that a major European power such as Germany must deal realistically with its security problem, and in the modern age that means some resolution of the nuclear problem. Minister of Finance Franz Josef Strauss publicly urged in London recently the establishment of a European nuclear committee including the British and French weapons, and including a strong German voice."

The upcoming U.S. - Soviet talks on SALT (Strategic Arms Limitations Talks) also provide the Germans with grounds for concern about its own safety.

Rotarians Hear Moscow Report From Erickson

Moscow streets are clean and the subway system is spectacular, but fruit juice is served from the can in restaurants and public drunkenness is common.

Such were among the observations of life in Moscow passed on to Holland Rotary Club members yesterday noon when Claud Erickson spoke to their luncheon meeting at the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club.

Erickson is superintendent of the Lansing water and light systems. He visited Russia in the company of other electric power industry officials last year.

One of the things that appeared to impress him most was Russia's vast system of electrical power plants, and their plans for steadily increasing the system with hydro-electric plants for at least the next 10 years.

He related this industry to a maxim ascribed to Lenin: "Communism is soviet power plus electric power."

To the tourist, he said, religion might appear to be gaining in its competition with nationalism. Many of the ancient cathedrals are undergoing restoration and repair, which would indicate a revival of faith.

Actually, he said, this effort is intended to attract not the Russian people, who are still dominated by nationalism, but to encourage visits by tourists who have money to spend.

He referred to our own space exploits and pointed out how lagard we had been in this field. Russia started on her space program in 1929. We have caught up with her, he said, because of our educational system. Russia has some four million young people in colleges and universities; the United States has nearly double that number.

Russia is placing great emphasis on science education, Erickson said. Officials will screen 100,000 young people to find 200 who will study chemistry or other technical fields exclusively. With all this emphasis on technology, he noted, many stores, restaurants and even the postoffice still rely on the ancient abacus to figure charges instead of using modern mechanical of electrical devices.

Erickson was introduced by Guy Bel, program chairman.

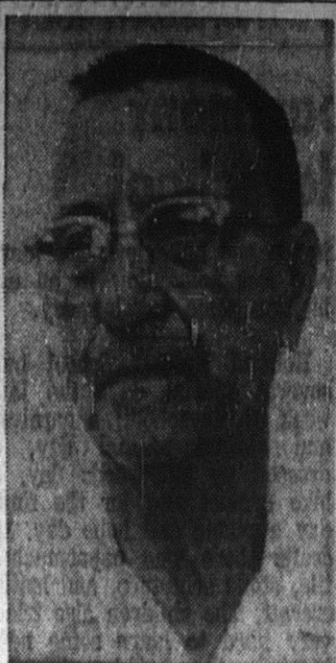

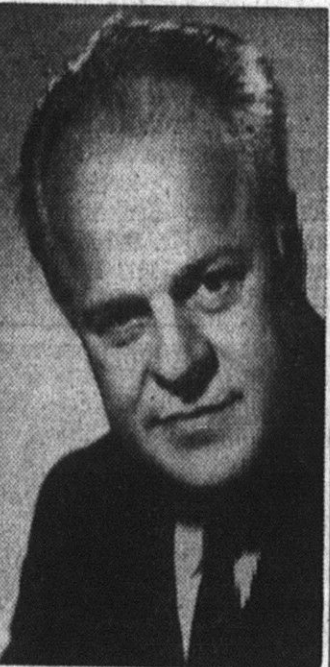
