The UNICEF Executive Board approved in September \$69.5 million in aid for programs in 111 countries and territories: 38 in Africa; 32 in the Americas; 26 in Asia; 14 in the Eastern Mediterranean, and one in Europe, in which the child population through 15 years of age is approximately 750 million.

UNICEF has recently responded to the West Africa drought emergency, to the drought-stricken areas of India, to the continuing needs

in Bangladesh, to Indo-China relief, aid to Nicaraguan Relief in its earthquake disaster, and to many other world emergencies.

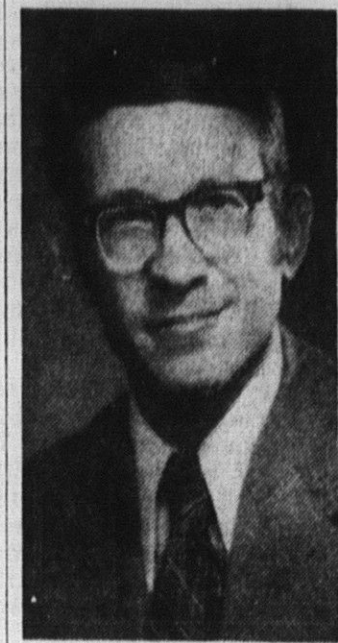

Two Social Agencies Merge to Better Aid

The Board of Directors of the Western Michigan Branch of Child and Family Services of Michigan in Holland and the Board of Directors of Higher Horizons announce a merger of programs.

Child and Family Services provides adoption, temporary foster care, problem pregnancy counseling, and family counseling services. Higher Horizons provides a big-brother and big-sister program in the city of Holland.

The plans for the merger began about one year ago. The Boards of Directors of each agency studied the possibilities separately before forming a task force during the summer composed of representatives of both boards and Hope College students to implement the plan. The chairman of the task force was Dr. Donald Williams, Grand Valley State College.

The name of the agency will remain Child and Family Services of Michigan and will be composed of three major areas of service. They are Children's Services, Family Services, and the big-brother, big-sister program, Higher Horizons. The total operation of the agency will be the responsibility of a 27 member Board of Directors.

Those from Holland on the Board of Directors are Mrs. Bryan Athey, Mrs. Tom Carey, Miss Geraldine Dykhuizen, Mrs. John Heyboer, Jay Keuning, Mrs. Glenn Mannes, Richard Nourie, Mrs. David Paulson,

Robert Riksen, Alex Rivera, Stephen Sanger, Mrs. Ray Swank, and Mrs. Barry Werkman.

It is planned that the Higher Horizon program will retain the office on the Hope College Campus under the supervision of Bruce Struik. Working with Mr. Struik are Mrs. William (Libby) Hillegonds, and student workers Margarita Chavez, Rita Hendricksen, Robert Kline, and Mark Williams.

At the present time there are nearly 200 children participating in the Higher Horizon program from the greater Holland area. Children from grades one through 12 are found in the program. The big-brothers and big-sisters are primarily students at Hope College. The need is increasing to recruit more men and women from the community to participate as big-brother and big-sister volunteers.

Volunteers is the key to the success of the program. The volunteers find themselves coaching with school work, helping a child develop skills to gain confidence, and helping youngsters to participate in cultural and group activities. Youths who are drifting into anti-social behavior and drop-out status receive counseling, guidance and if necessary, aid in finding employment.

So far this year the Children's Services program, under the supervision of Robert Vanderham has placed more than 25 children to adoptive homes, provide over 5,000 days of temporary foster care for children, and counseled over 130 individuals experiencing problem pregnancies. Working with Vanderham is Mrs. Clarence (Elinor) Faber, Miss Audrey Navis, Mrs. Marcia Page, and University of Michigan student Dennis DeWitt.

The Family problem counseling service will provide counseling to about 200 families in 1973. Family counselors are Fred Doidge, Kenneth Phelps, and Tom Van Eerden.

Recognizing the importance of family living for both the individual and the community, Child and Family Services of Michigan is dedicated to strengthening troubled families, securing stable family surroundings for children, and providing direction for worried and confused pregnant women, married as well as unmarried.

Child and Family Services of Michigan's professional staff is capably assisted by the many volunteers from all age groups and walks of life. The clerical staff of Mrs. Kenneth Douma and Mrs. Willis Knoll are very much a part of the service to the community.

Through the merger of the programs the Board of Directors, the Executive Director Kenneth Phelps, and the staff hope to provide a more comprehensive family social service

Hope Grad Isolates Hormone

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (UPI) — A University of North Carolina medical school researcher Tuesday announced isolation of a growth-promoting hormone that could help dwarfed children and aid in cancer research.

Dr. Judson J. Van Wyk said isolation of a newly purified hormone from the blood called "somatomedin," is a major milestone in researching human growth.

Dr. Van Wyk is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. John C. Van Wyk, Colonial Green Apartments. He is a 1943 graduate of Hope College and Muskegon High School. The doctor's wife is the former Persis Parker, a 1944 Hope graduate.

He said it has great potential as a stimulator of growth in dwarfed children.

"We may be onto something here which could open doors in

medicine we never before dreamed of," Van Wyk said.

He said clinical testing of "somatomedin" was not yet possible because of the scarcity of the hormone.

He said he had used two tons of outdated human blood plasma and had been able to isolate but one milligram of the substance.

Van Wyk, a pediatric endocrinologist, said cancer researchers are very interested in his work because of the growth stimulation factor.

"It is possible that by showing how cells grow we can provide new clues to more effective treatment of leukemia and other cancer victims."

Holland Police Receive Grant For Investigation

The Holland Police Dept. has received a \$20,700 grant from the Michigan Office of Criminal Justice Programs in Lansing, according to Police Chief Charles Lindstrom.

Lindstrom noted that the grant was awarded for the improvement of the investigation effort of the department.

Specific goals of the grant include intensive training in criminal investigation, utilizing technological police equipment to reduce offenses committed by the "repeat offender" by the earliest possible apprehension of such offenders of serious crime.

Police Lt. Marty Hardenberg will be project director of the program, with coordination of police technicians and evidence handling being conducted by Detective John Ingren.

Police and city finance officials were in Lansing Thursday morning working out details of the project.

Charge Man With Marijuana Possession

A similar "Blitz Day" is planned by the Zeeland United Fund and its chairman, Mrs. Gladys Blackamp.

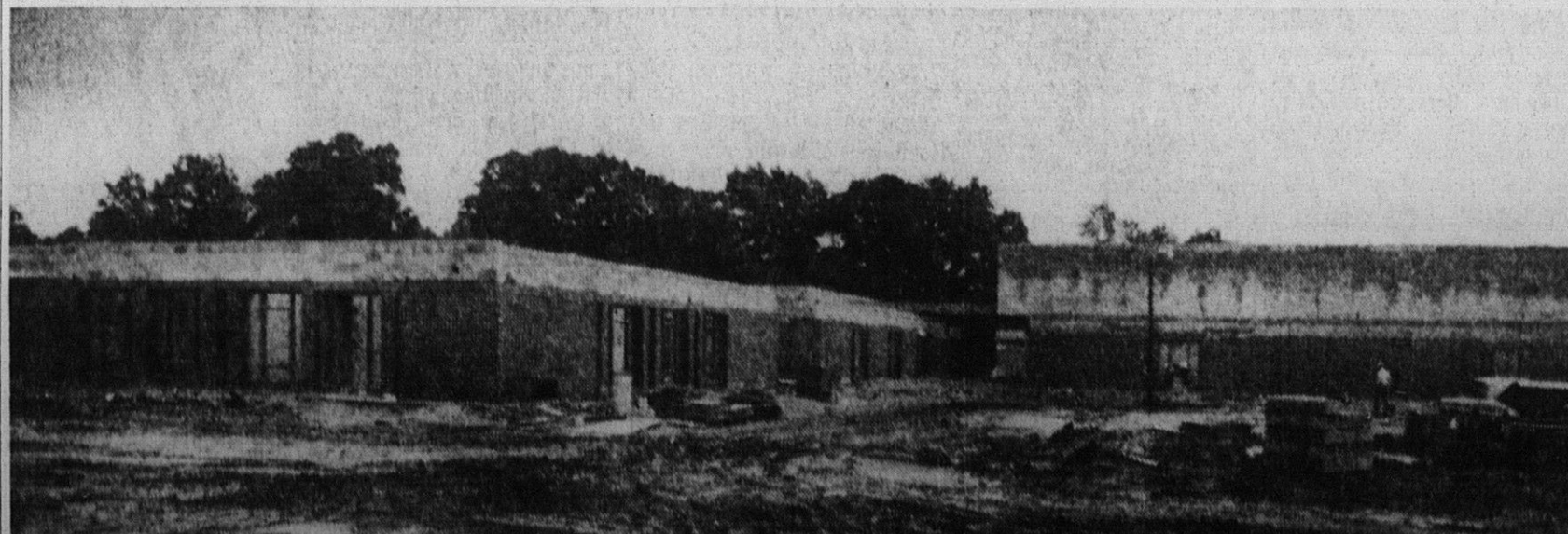
Students, Professor Attend Conference

Enrollment Down a Bit In Schools

Official enrollment in Holland public schools as of the fourth Friday in September is 5,290, or 73 less than a year ago, the Board of Education was informed at its monthly meeting Monday night.

Supt. Donald E. Ihrman commented that St. Francis de Sales has organized a kindergarten this year with 22 enrollees. The official count on the fourth Friday was 23 more than at the end of the first week of school.

The primary school total of 2,350 is divided as follows: Apple Avenue, 32; Federal, 129; Harrington, 294; Holland Heights, 186; Jefferson, 301; Lakeview, 315; Lincoln, 286; Longfellow, 388; Maplewood, 186; Montello Park, 127; Van Raalte, 277; Washington, 279.

Junior high total is 1,255 and senior high, 1,185.

Curriculum Director Gardner Wierenga told the board he had been unsuccessful in hiring bilingual personnel in social and psychological areas, and he received approval to hire a bilingual testing aide.

Dr. Nick Fridsma, special education director, commented on a request of the Saugatuck Board of Education to participate in the Holland - West Ottawa special ed program. Dr. Fridsma said some work already has been done on testing four Saugatuck children, two of whom were referred to Holland. The board approved the request subject to current formulas for reimbursement.

Tom Carey presented a report on the confidentiality of student records, along with practices and procedures. He explained that the cumulative record for each student includes academic and health records, testing data, parent - teacher conference reports, letters from principals to parents, letters from teachers to parents, remedial reading reports, specialists' recommendations, nongraded progress reports and attendance records.

Carey submitted a blank for a signed release in which selected data may be released, signed by the student if over 18 or by the parent. The subject was taken under study by the board.

Accepted on a trial basis for a year were proposed guidelines dealing with meal allowance for junior high and high school contestants, participants and performers, in cities away from Holland.

The board discussed a revision of school rentals and use policies, covering increased costs of maintenance and custodial staff, covering actual costs only.

Architect Paul van der Leek presented a progress report on development of the high school site plan, concerning tiling, placing of top dirt and reseeded, hopefully providing some cover before winter.

Two high school students, Anne Feininger and Jeff Hemwall, presented plans for a two-part program calling for a "minicourse program" and a series of public programs of interest to students and the community alike.

Miss Feininger explained the minicourse program consisting of a film festival and/or a choice of some 40 subjects for a two-hour seminar. Among the popular choices were karate, auto mechanics for women, motorcycle mechanics, occult, photography, bike equipment and repair, dream analysis, stereo and hi-fi equipment, meditation, sailing and self-defense for women.

Low on the list were sex education, skin diving, acupuncture, air force and navy as careers.

Hemwall explained plans for a series of public gatherings November through March with the following speakers: Dr. Duncan E. Littlefair of Fountain Street Church of Grand Rapids, Dr. Lester De Koster of the Banner, Dr. James Lundy of Grand Valley State Colleges, Dr. James Lin, a Grand Rapids psychiatrist, and tentatively a women's lib speaker. On April 9, there will be a debate

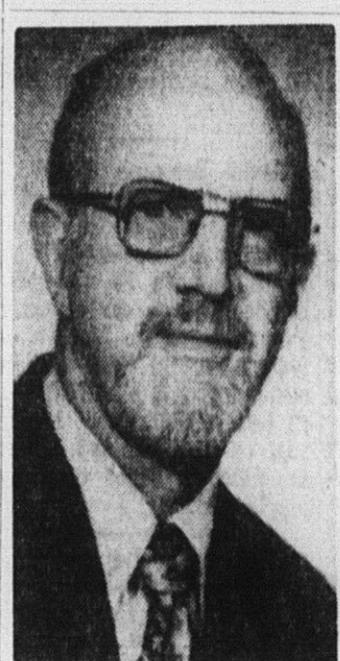

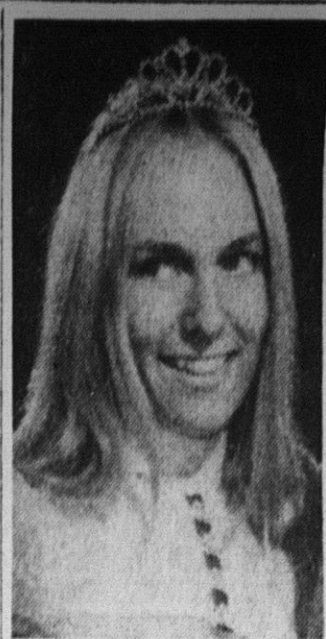

Operation Red Ball, a fire safety project sponsored by the U.S. Jaycees and American Red Ball movers, is being launched in Holland Monday.

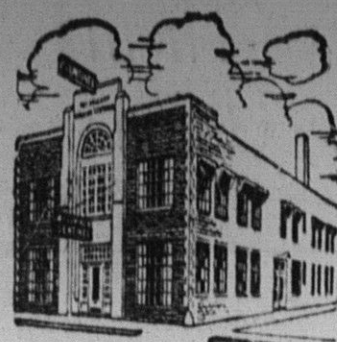

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THE AGED REBELLION

(Guest Editorial)

That spunky Gray Panther Maggie Kuhn could be the voice of the future. At a time of life when most people would place her solidly in the past, she represents a growing trend on the part of senior citizens to speak up and move out of the "obsolescence" they've been locked into for so long.

If present birth rates continue, by the year 2000 one of every three Americans will be over 65, a good clue that this country will shift, socially and economically, from its youth orientation toward greater attention to the elderly. To their credit, the elderly themselves are pointing the path to change by rising up in militant groups to accomplish what Miss Kuhn calls "rocking the boat."

Evidence of their impact is the attack on the National Council of Senior Citizens by former presidential counsel Charles Colson, who allegedly asked the Internal Revenue Service to investigate the group's contributors because "this outfit is giving us trouble."

Changes in society's treatment of the elderly stem more appropriately from them than anyone. By virtue of marching on their own behalf, the elderly achieve a dignity and self-respect they have long been denied. A bit of stridency is not out of order. In urging an end to aging stereotypes, the elderly point to a report to the California Legislature and the U. S. Senate that it is simply not true that the over 65 population is composed of people going downhill mentally and physically.

What is true is that 25 million people over 65 in the U. S. have the fastest growing rates of poverty and suicide of any age group. This is clearly the result of equating "young" with "attractive," "useful," "intelligent," "active," "needed" and "independent." The implication is that the elderly are none of these, but militants are saying that, if they are not, it is because society has not let them be so. The reforming energy that the elderly stored up during the years of youth protest is spilling over. What silence could not accomplish, organizing and political force may.

At long last some studies on aging are coming forth. A Senate special committee is holding hearings aimed at finding ways to combat or solve problems arising from years of tossing the elderly on human scrap piles. There is greater focus on living later years in dignity, instead of in poverty, loneliness and despair. America can do better than that for its aged, and the aged are right to demand that it does.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 14
Reconciliation Through Christ
Romans 5: 1-11
By C. P. Dame

In modern life there are frictions and classes between various groups with different motives and goals in life. To get united action calls for reconciliation. The primary cause for barriers and separations is due to man's alienation from God. This lesson tells us how God through Christ removed the barrier of sin and made fellowship possible.

1. Man is justified by faith. After reading the text the great words, such as "justified," "grace," "hope," "reconciled," "atonement" stand out. To justify is a legal term belonging to the law courts. The sinner is guilty of wrongdoing and deserves to die, but God the Judge, declares him innocent and so he is free from punishment. How can a just God do that? If a human judge did that he would violate justice. God through Christ paid the penalty, the righteousness of Christ is charged to the sinner's account and the sinner is reconciled to God and a new relationship has been established.

Let us look at the three benefits that have come to the sinner. The first is "peace with God through Jesus Christ." Believers enjoy inner peace. Jesus spoke of it, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give unto you." The second is access to grace. We go directly to our Father just as children walk in their house without knocking. We have all the blessings grace offers. The third is the hope of sharing the glory of God. Believers have a great future. Let us put the four blessings in one package — first a Christian is justified, that means he is right with God and as a consequence he has peace, stands in grace and rejoices in hope.

II. Suffering is unpleasant but is beneficial. It produces endurance, patience, a mature character which yields hope which rests on a solid foundation of God's love "which is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given to us." This love God manifested in the death of Christ who died "while we were yet sinners" which means we were lawbreakers and helpless — in need of help but unable to get it. The death of Christ brought many benefits, the Christ who now lives continues to bring blessings.

Since the sinner is on good terms with God he is saved from God's wrath—his constant hostility to sin, is freed from sin's enslavement and can live joyfully. In the lesson text the words, "rejoice in God" are used three times. We are an affluent people but are we a joyful people? Do we have more joy than our ancestors who were poor but who found much satisfaction and solid joy in the service of God?

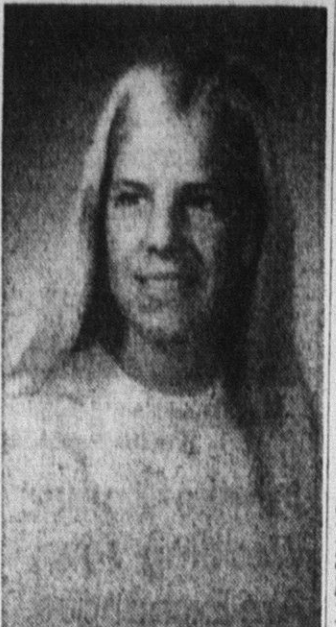

The program is entitled "Sweet Seas of Water—A Saga of Michigan's Waters" and will be geared to providing a deeper appreciation of the lakes, their beauty and importance as a world resource. Speakers will deal with the topics of our lake heritage, the life story of a lake, a story of community action in restoring lake quality, the role of manmade lakes, waterways legislation, and "fortune hunting" along lake shores.

At last week's meeting of the Garden Club Dr. Eldon Greij, associate professor of biology at Hope College, presented a most interesting and enjoyable program on the Holland marsh, including slides of some of the birds nesting there. Dr. Greij explained that the marsh is not a static place but an ongoing, dynamic process that is also aesthetically pleasing. He described the vegetation and wildlife there, including the yellow warbler, mallard and wood ducks, the pie-billed grebe with its floating nest, the black tern, the herons, the bittern which blends with the cattail when it freezes in a neck-up position, the rails, coots, and finally the gallinule, which was the object of a summer's study last year.

Dr. Greij will be presenting a report on this study at a meeting of the American Ornithologists Union soon and gave club members a fascinating summary. He explained the catch techniques developed, how many birds were found and banded, how sex had to be determined by surgery, the nesting habits, and the usual two broods per season found.

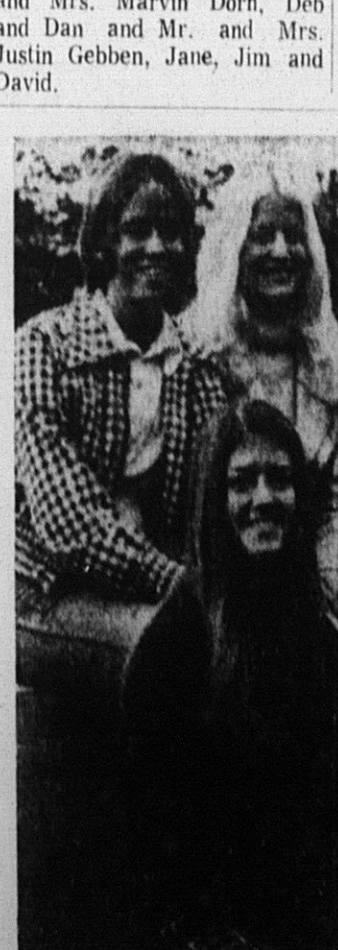

Environmental Tour For County Students Slated

GRAND HAVEN — The educational tour on environmental problems for the schools of Ottawa County will be held Thursday. This year's theme is "Trees and the Environment." The tour will start at Pigeon Creek Park, west of 120th Ave. on Stanton St. Tour guides were sent to schools of the county recently. The tour will be held from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

At the first stop students will be given a tour guide and a brief outline of the tour by Ed Howard, director of audio-visual education of the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District.

The second stop will be just west of the park at the Ottawa County Sanitary Land Fill site. Leslie Toth, supervising sanitarian of the Environmental Health Department of Ottawa County, will talk with students about the operation of this facility.

The third stop will be just east of the land fill in the park. Bill Boss, 4-H youth agent of the Cooperative Extension Service, will talk to students about the park system, show them sand stabilization with beach grass, and tell them the need for proper use of off-road vehicles such as trail bikes and snowmobiles.

The fourth stop will be across the road north of the land fill. Students will be able to see a thinning operation on county land being done by Total Chips Company of Shepard. Bill Allred, district conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, will talk to students about the need for pruning and thinning pine plantations.

Stop five is at one of Stone's Christmas tree farms, owned by Theron Stone. Bob Van Klompenberg, district horticulture agent of the Cooperative Extension Service will tell students of the cost and work in Christmas tree farming.

The sixth stop is at the Northland Evergreen Co. Larry Stebbins, Ottawa County extension director and Vern Heers, office manager of Northland Evergreen Co., owned by John Bakale, will tell students about the problems involved in growing trees and shrubs for nursery stock.

The Ottawa Soil and Water Conservation District will furnish refreshments. Clarence Reenders, chairman of the board of directors, assisted by Pat Nogar, district clerk and Ben Loosemore, district aid, will be in charge.

Twenty-four hundred students and adults attended the tour last year. Schools should send reservations to Ed

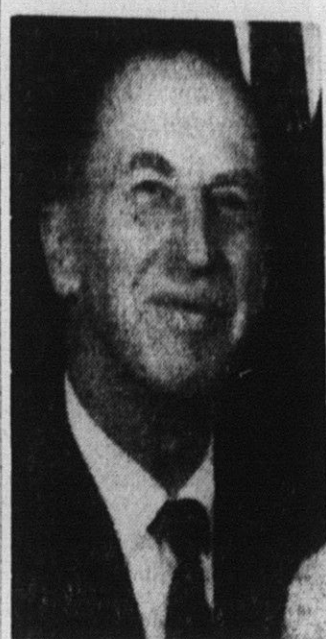

Mrs. Heerspink is a member of Providence church. She takes a keen interest in local and world affairs by reading, and pursues her domestic interest in baking and preserving fruits.

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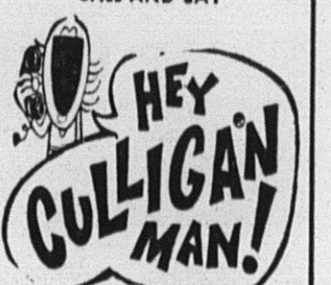


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
