City to Hire Consultant On Windmill

Specific information on what Holland could expect in the way of tourist interest in the event a large imported Dutch windmill is erected here will be obtained by hiring Dr. Frank W. Suggitt of Michigan State University, an authority on tourism in Michigan. City Council Wednesday night approved hiring his services as a consultant on Project Windmill on recommendation of City Manager Herb Holt who said detailed information would be needed in setting up any program for revenue bonds. Dr. Suggitt's fees would be at the prevailing rates and contingent upon funds becoming available through the proposed method of financing. The Project Windmill committee also has recommended this method of obtaining the needed information.

Dr. Suggitt has conducted several tourist surveys including several for the Upjohn Institute. Holt pointed out that the average person gainfully employed in Holland, Mich., has no real conception of the value of the tourist dollar in Michigan, particularly at a time when automation affects the number of jobs.

Holt said tourism in Michigan is a \$2,600,000,000 industry with a potential of much more. Surveys have revealed that the future of tourism is much brighter than the expansion of general industrial activity, although the state promotes industry at every turn. Michigan with its fresh water lakes and streams is unparalleled as a recreation center, offering far more than the other states in the midwest cluster which takes in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

Most people whose jobs are supported indirectly by the tourist industry have no concept of the source of their income, Holt said. He quoted figures on tourist activity and percentages on funds spent on lodging, food and entertainment which loomed almost fantastic in comparison to established industries.

Court Asked to Halt Election for Van Meer

High Court Appeal Gains City Okay

Seek Reversal of Ruling Halting Nov. 6 Election In Federal District

City Council Wednesday night approved plans outlined by City Attorney Gordon Cunningham for immediate application to Michigan Supreme Court to vacate an Ottawa Circuit Court injunction issued earlier Wednesday to halt the special Nov. 6 election in which Federal district seeks to annex to Holland city.

Specifically, the city attorney is appealing to the Supreme Court on behalf of City Clerk D. W. Schipper, one of four defendants named in the original suit filed by Charles Vande Water, a township resident who sought the injunction. Other defendants are Secretary of State James M. Hare, Ottawa County Clerk Harris Nijsma and Holland Township Clerk Maurice Vander Haar.

Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith granted the permanent injunction on the basis of priority for an earlier petition seeking to incorporate the proposed city of Van Meer whose 7½-square-mile area includes most of the Federal area which is just under a square mile. Federal area is surrounded by the city of Holland on three sides.

Council adopted Cunningham's recommendation without further discussion.

The body also granted Cunningham's recommendation that his law partner, James E. Townsend, former city attorney, be retained by the city as special legal counsel in connection with public hearings called by the Michigan Public Service Commission on Michigan Gas and Electric Co. rates, to continue work in connection with anti-trust litigation involving several utility companies in Federal Court, and to assist in Federal annexation litigation. Holland's association in the anti-trust case involves equipment for Board of Public Works light plant installations.

Because Cunningham will be absent from the state Oct. 19 through 26, Mayor Nelson Bosman appointed City Manager Herb Holt to represent the city attorney at meetings of the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors during the remainder of the October session. Such temporary appointments are allowed under the city charter.

Other appointments by the mayor included a committee to work with the Hospital Board to study the Hamilton Association recommendations on long-term hospital expansion. Named to this committee were Henry Steffens, Richard Smith Jr. and Maurice Peerbolt.

Named to a new committee to study a fulltime recreation director were Harold Volkema, Donald D. Oosterbaan, Harvey Butler and John Van Eerden.

Final Approval Of 1963 Budget Set for Friday

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Supervisors Tuesday completed its item-by-item study of the 1963 record-breaking budget and then tabled it until Friday when final approval is expected.

Since the board has set the county millage at 4.16, same as this year, the total budget is limited to the figure proposed at the opening session last week of \$1,275,205, compared with \$1,222,780 the current year.

The salary of the county Civil Defense director, Hans Suzenaar, was increased from \$2,700 to \$3,200 but the \$500 increase was subtracted from the \$4,800 item budgeted for radiological defense in the 1963 budget.

The board decided to continue its mileage rate of seven cents a mile for use of cars by supervisors on county business, even though the state legislature has increased the rate to 10 cents.

The \$2,250 budget for the county water patrol, a part of the sheriff's department, was decreased to \$1,800 as state funds supply doubling funds starting in 1963 instead of matching funds.

The board voted increases for Mr. and Mrs. Marvin J. Swartz, superintendent and matron at the county youth home, setting salaries at \$3,500 and \$2,300, respectively and also voted to include \$4,000 in the budget for a full-time assistant at the home, and a part-time teacher at \$100 per month. The Swartzes had been under contract to be paid \$2,800 and \$2,100 respectively, in the 1962 budget.

Improvements to facilities at Camp Pottawatomie near Grand Haven, Ottawa county 4-H camp and recreation area, were proposed by Agricultural Agent Richard Machiele and the conservation committee.

Machiele reported that improvements were made to the swimming area on Pottawatomie lake last year but as the bayou at this point has a dangerous muddy bottom this is not a safe place to swim.

He proposed that a commercial swimming pool, 20 by 50 feet, be installed at a cost of \$8,000, which does not include a fence around the pool. The County 4-H council has volunteered to install a fence, he said.

Action on the program of improvements was postponed until the next regular session in April, to give the committee time to study the plan.

H. E. Stafseth, county highway engineer who is in charge of furnishing the Grand Valley State College area with water and sanitation facilities, explained the systems proposed, using a map of the Allendale area.

Prosecutor J. W. Bussard ruled on several questions referred to him by the board last week. He informed the board that provisions for "substitutes" for city members who are ill or out of the city at the time of board meetings are provided in the charters of the cities of Grand Haven and Holland. The state laws do not provide for similar provisions in the townships, he said.

The Dutch couple in Monday's volleys column was identified today as Mr. and Mrs. Peter De Koning of Dordrecht, South Holland, the Netherlands, who were visiting relatives in Holland, Mich., during Tulip Time.

Mrs. De Koning is a cousin of Mrs. Dick Versendaal, Sr., of 863 Paw Paw Dr. The De Konings arrived in America by jet March 17 and spent the summer in Holland, leaving Sept. 27 by boat. It was their first visit to America.

The clothing they wore was typical farm clothing worn in South Holland more than a century ago. The clothes had been in Mr. De Koning's family for 150 years. They also brought their wooden shoes with them, but left them at the Versendaal home.

122 Request Ballots

The city clerk's office in City Hall thus far has received applications for 122 absent voter ballots for the Nov. 6 election. Deadline for applying is 2 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 3.

Request For Water Is Tabled

A letter from Holland Township Board requesting permission to tap city water mains in the township for the purpose of supplying water to any and all industrial concerns requiring water and to permit the township to install fire hydrants on city water mains was read at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night and was tabled without comment.

The letter pointed out that if permission is granted, it was understood that the township would foot the cost of the fire hydrants and their installation and the industrial concerns would pay their own costs of installation and service. Fire hydrants would be at such locations as the board and council would determine.

Meanwhile, Zeeland city is seeking permission to lay a pipeline in township property for a new water supply associated with Holland city.

Ella M. Zone, a resident of the township, filed suit Wednesday afternoon against the Board of Supervisors and its clerk, Harris Nijsma, seeking to halt an election on the proposed incorporation of 7½ square miles in the township as "The City of Van Meer, Mich."

Petitions for the incorporation of a large part of the township were filed July 18 and again on July 24, the plaintiff claims, but she contends the petitions are "defective, invalid and insufficient to form the basis for an election."

Judge Raymond L. Smith was asked to issue an injunction to restrain the clerk and the board from setting an election date. He did not issue an injunction but ordered the defendants to show cause why a temporary injunction should not be issued. A hearing on the order will be held Oct. 23.

Zeeland's record is now 2-3 overall and 1-2 in Grand Valley play. West Ottawa is 1-4 overall and 0-3 in league play. The Panthers travel to Grand Rapids next week to tangle with Godwin in the Panther's last league game of the season.

The race started from Indianapolis, Ind., and Kliphuis' bird covered the distance in a speed of 1,293.38 yards per minute. The birds were released at 7 a.m. and the Holland winner was home at noon.

A total of 228 pigeons from 49 lofts from eight cities throughout Michigan competed. Besides the first time Holland entry, birds were entered from Muskegon, Grand Rapids, Bay City, Maple City, Flint, Lansing and Kalamazoo.

Kliphuis entered eight birds in the race and they finished first, sixth, seventh and 24th. He came to Holland ten years ago from the Netherlands where he raced pigeons as a boy.

Joining the Holland club two years ago, Kliphuis has worked his way to the top of the club with his victories. In the young bird races this year he has won two club races and the state race. He also won the club's total points trophy with an accumulation of 80 points this year. An insurance salesman, Kliphuis spends a lot of time training his birds and his patience and training technique have won the respect of pigeon racers throughout Michigan.

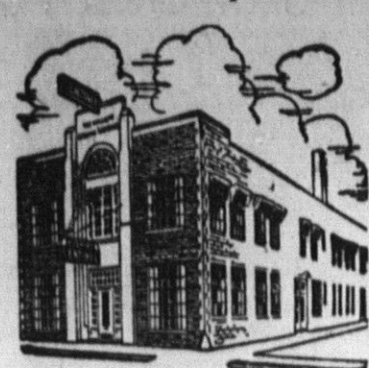

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, October 21
The Son of God
John 6:35-40; Philippians 2:5-11
By C. P. Dame
The names of John and Paul are familiar to Bible readers. A part of the lesson text was written by John. He wrote his gospel about the year 90 A. D.

The second part is from the pen of Paul, from the letter which he wrote while a prisoner in Rome to his beloved church in Philippi about the year 62 A. D. Paul wrote before John. The two passages of Scripture direct our minds to Jesus Christ.

I. Jesus made great claims concerning Himself. The words of Jesus, "I am the bread of life" were spoken to a crowd of people whom He had fed with the five loaves and two fishes a boy had given.

Jesus escaped from them overnight but they found Him in Capernaum the next day. These people were looking for more bread. Jesus tried to turn their minds to their spiritual need which He only could satisfy. The Lord made the great claim that He is the true Bread from heaven.

The people asked for a sign such as the manna which Moses gave to their fathers. Jesus told them that anyone who came to Him would never hunger and "he that believeth" on Him "shall never thirst." Jesus gives soul satisfaction.

The Lord's words, "All that the Father giveth Me shall come to Me" suggest a great claim. Jesus has a people. And the words, "him that cometh to Me I will in no wise cast out" are most encouraging to all who think of going to the Lord. They will be welcomed.

The Lord came to this earth to do His Father's will. It was His Father's will that all believers be securely kept and enjoy complete salvation which would be realized in the resurrection of the body followed by eternal joyful living.

Only the Son of God would dare to make the claims uttered. II. Jesus greatly humbled Himself. Paul pointed to Jesus as an example and told the Philippians to reveal His mind, citing His humility and obedience. Christ stooped by becoming a man.

He who was Sovereign became a slave, a member of the lowest class in society, and "became obedient unto death"—and that the death of a criminal, dying on the cross, in obedience to His Father.

The Apostle teaches that the mind that prompted Jesus to stoop from sovereignty to slavery is the mind all Christians should reveal in their daily lives. We can readily see that this involves getting rid of pride, selfishness, power-seeking and the aggressive spirit. And this is not easy. The greatness of Jesus is revealed in His humility and obedience.

III. God highly exalted Jesus. The New Testament portrays the humiliation and the exaltation of Jesus. Today many disregard and dishonor the name of Jesus. God's ideal is that "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow...." "And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" and this will be realized in God's own good time.

God has a calendar and He honors it. A rebellious world will some day bend the knee, showing submission, and confess with the tongue that Jesus is Lord and thus acknowledge His authority.

Jesus, the Son of Man and the Son of God deserves the adoration of our lips and hearts and the service of our hands and minds.

ALLEGAN—Sixty Allegan county senior citizens, ranging from 75 to 96 years, welcomed the first "open house" ever held at the Allegan County Medical Care Facility, or County Farm as it was formerly called. Visitors had an opportunity to tour the hospital and infirmary, and see the exhibits planned for the occasion. Refreshments were served.

Two years ago, at the suggestion of Dr. A. P. Brachman, Medical Director, the county Board of Supervisors authorized the partial employment of Mrs. Ruth Popp, an occupational therapist, to assist these elderly patients in handicraft work. Space for a work shop was equipped at the hospital, and several women in the community volunteered to help. Organizations contributed money and materials. Elderly people suddenly found a use for long forgotten skills, and the chance to use new ones. The doctor's "prescription" brought about patient improvement not possible with medication alone.

Twenty to 25 of the patients go to the work-shop two afternoons each week, where they sew, weave, paint and do tile work. One, who is sightless, makes jewelry, refinishes furniture, and cane weaves stools and chairs. Five women volunteers work with them.

An exhibit of patients' craft work appeared at the Allegan County Fair this year for the first time; and 21 patients, through the combined efforts of the doctor, hospital staff, volunteer workers, and several wheel chairs; were taken to the fair where they could enjoy seeing their work on display and many other features of the fair.

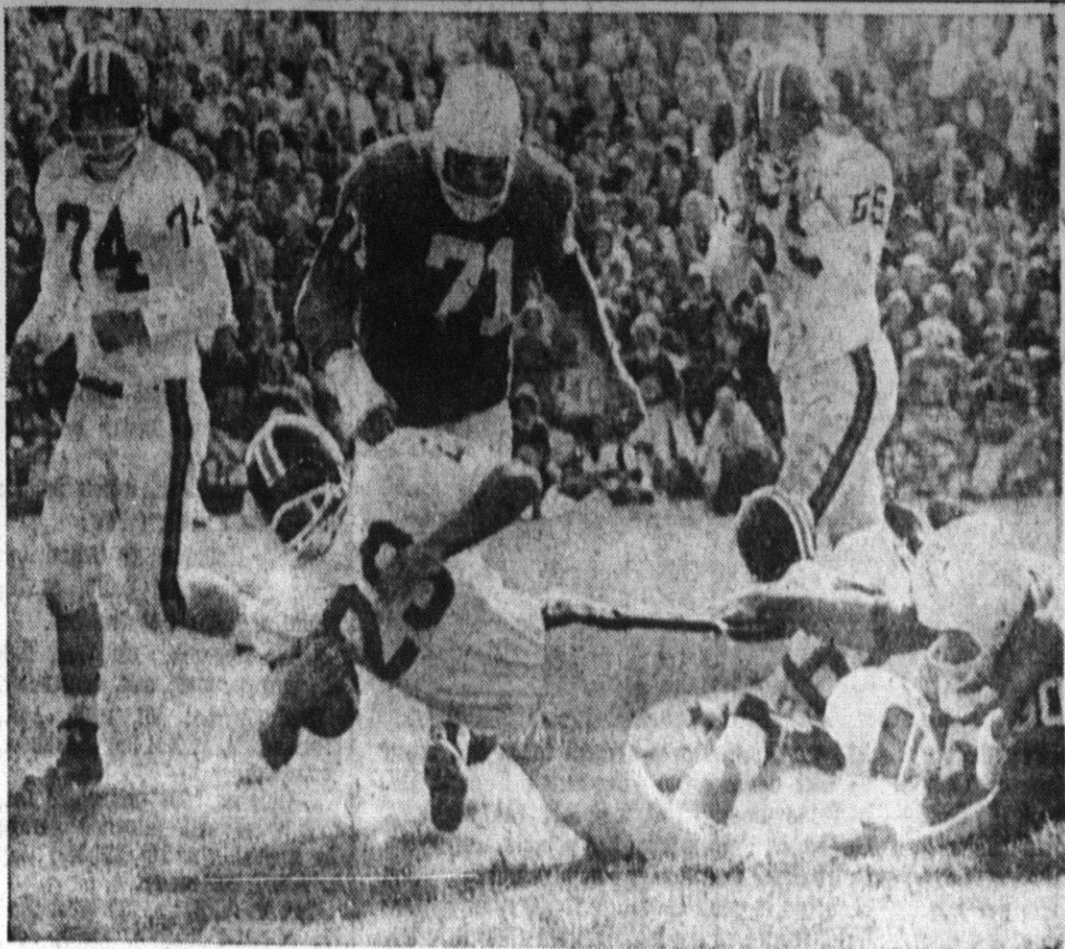
Grand Rapids Man Killed Near Zeeland

It was an uphill battle for Olivet after they had spotted Hope an early 6-0 lead and then trailed 12-6 at half. On Hope's second scrimmage play of the game after getting the initial kickoff, Mitchell pitched to Jon Schoon for a touchdown with the game 1-6 odd.

The play covered 73 yards, starting on the Hope 27. Schoon caught the ball on the Olivet 42 and outran the defense. Jim Van Dam's kick failed.

Jim Bekering fumbled the next time Hope got the ball on the Comets' 45 and Sigler recovered. It took the winners 13 plays to move 53 yards with Burnett rolling out the final four yards with 4:12 remaining in the first period.

It took eight plays to score with Bekering's knifing tackle for the final four yards with 1:29 of the first period left. Mitchell's pass attempt for the extra point failed.

The Dutchmen fumbled eight times and lost the ball seven. One fumble in the second quarter was recovered by Bob Powell on the Hope 37 and started an Olivet drive that moved to the two where it was stopped with De Kuiper applying the fourth down tackle.

The child has suffered serious and permanent injuries, Cassidy claims.

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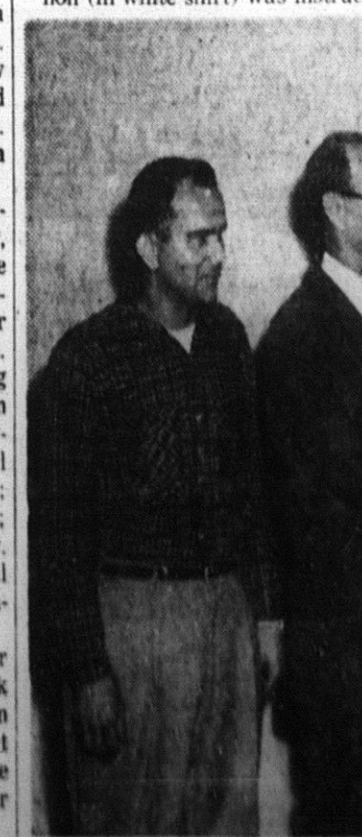

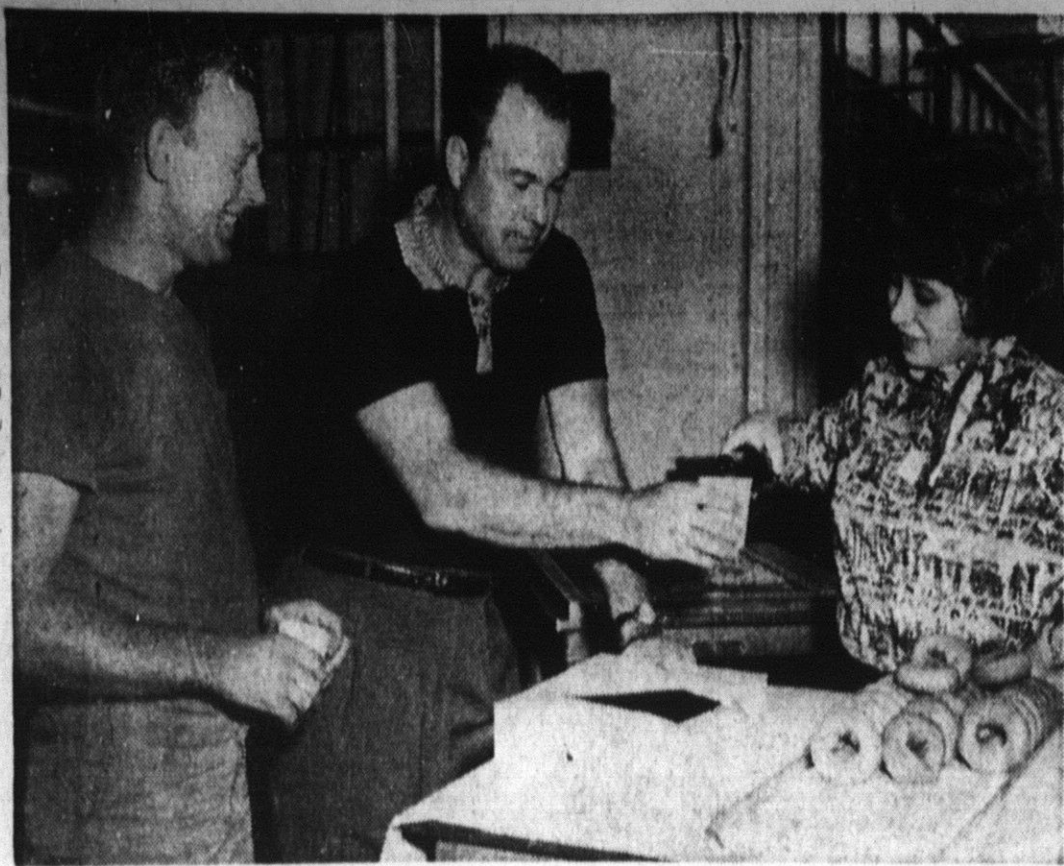

Allegan Board, Sheriff Mull Supplemental Appropriations

ALLEGAN—Sheriff Harry Smith and members of the Allegan board of supervisors met Monday in an attempt to clear the air in the situation resulting from the board's refusal to approve any more supplemental appropriations for part-time deputies.

Smith had requested an additional \$900 for per diem officers for the balance of the year. When the board turned down the request, Smith announced the department would be able to handle only those complaints that could be staffed by full-time officers and suggested that other complaints be referred to the state police and—if state officers were not available—"call your supervisor."

As a result, quite a few supervisors received phone calls, especially on Saturday night when three accidents occurred in the county at almost the same time, requiring the attention of the sheriff and his regular officers and the state police as well.

Last fall, when the board authorized a sixth full-time deputy, supervisors had been assured that an \$1,800 budget item for per diem officers would be sufficient. What was not known at the time, however, was the fact that this account would wind up the year "in the red" nearly \$1,800. When Smith was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Walter Runkel, he discovered the situation and asked the board for \$2,800 for the per diem account. The board approved two appropriations totaling \$2,300 but balked on Smith's last request, for \$900.

The sheriff's department budget has been hurt further by the need to board prisoners in the Ottawa county jail whenever the jail population gets over the 33-limit set by the state fire marshal. The board may consider giving Smith authorization to use his eight per diem deputies and charge the expense against the department's 1963 budget, a plan which several supervisors indicated they would "go along with."

Board members voted 22-15 to comply with an order of the auditor general's department which will require the board to pass on all claims of the health department. At present the department's expenditures are approved by the health committee of the board of supervisors, meeting with department executives once a month. Opposition by some supervisors to this resolution stemmed from the fact that it was broadened to include the salaries of health department employees. Under the motion, these salaries will be set in the same manner as those of other general fund departmental staffs.

Several Changes in Allegan Sheriff's Department Okayed

ALLEGAN — Allegan county moved two steps closer to reorganization of sheriff's department procedures Friday when the board of supervisors authorized the Jail Committee to seek bids on four patrol cars and a pick-up truck for the new Dog Warden's department.

The board also authorized the purchase of two additional police car radios, one of which will be used in the dog warden's truck.

Under the new set-up, which seems to be meeting with little opposition from the board as it approves various resolutions needed to put the plan into effect Jan. 1, the county will own its patrol cars. At present the sheriff is required to furnish two vehicles while deputies drive their own cars and are reimbursed for their mileage.

Allegan City Supervisor James Farnsworth urged the board to take a second, closer look at the new plan—cost of which has been estimated at \$85,125 for 1963 as compared to the \$56,615 expended for the same functions this year. Of the \$29,000 increase, approximately \$10,000 will go for vehicles. Farnsworth said that expansion of the sheriff's department would bring the total cost of law enforcement in the county—including city, village and state police activities—to an estimated \$309,426 a year and pointed out that this amounted to more than \$5.40 per capita.

Farnsworth indicated that he felt some study should be made of the possibility of eliminating duplication of effort in the law enforcement field, pointing out that the county's cities and villages employ more than 20 police officers, with more than 75 state troopers, from posts at Wayland, South Haven and Paw Paw available for duty in the county, plus the sheriff and his deputies. Farnsworth, who said he was not opposed so much to the reorganization plan as to the duplication of police efforts, later voted for both of the committee recommendations.

Details of the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement System, under consideration for county employees, were outlined to the board Friday by Mrs. Florence Blundy, accountant for the system.

Mrs. Blundy said the number of municipalities under this plan has grown from the original 14, in 1946, to 95. The Allegan County Road Commission was among the

first to come under the program. Employees would pay into the plan at the rate of 3 per cent for the first \$4,200 in annual earnings and 5 per cent for additional income. Retirement benefits, payable after ten years of service, may be collected voluntarily at age 60, with retirement compulsory at age 70.

The county's share of the program is determined by an actuarial survey, according to Mrs. Blundy. In most cases, the municipality pays from 6 per cent downward, depending on the average age and length of service of the employees.

Approximately seventy county officers and their staff members would come under the program if it is adopted by the board of supervisors.
