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Holland United Fund Campaign Over the Top

Exceed Goal 7th Year In a Row

The Greater Holland United Fund-Red Cross campaign for 1965 has gone over the top for the seventh consecutive year.

This news was announced by Campaign Chairman Donald G. Rector at a "Dutch Treat" Victory Breakfast this morning in Hotel Warm Friend.

With some reports yet to come in, gifts and pledges today totaled \$128,620.54 or 102.85 per cent of the \$125,050 drive goal.

Campaign Chairman Donald G. Rector praised the generosity of local citizens and business firms in the Greater Holland area and expressed thanks to the approximately 1,000 volunteer workers for their sincerity of purpose and untiring efforts in bringing the drive to a successful conclusion.

He also extended thanks to the newspaper and radio stations for the excellent job done in informing the public both of the need for funds and the progress of the drive.

Auditing of the reports by John Bender, Herbert C. Colton and George Wise, co-chairmen of the auditing committee, assisted by members of the Holland Chapter, American Society of Women Accountants, also came in for special praise.

With four of the seven campaign divisions exceeding quota and additional reports still to be received which assures that all divisions will ultimately make quota, no particular area of the drive can be singled out for special mention; an indication that volunteer workers in all divisions put forth exceptional effort to put the drive "over the top," Rector said.

Jack Plewke, United Fund Board President, said this year's achievement stands as a splendid tribute to the generosity of Holland area people.

Hope College has initiated a special scholarship program known as the Alpha Scholars. The program is designed to enable gifted high school students to obtain a challenging liberal education at Hope College.

In its first year, the program has attracted 15 outstanding students from California, Illinois, Michigan, New York and Wisconsin.

Each year a group of entering freshmen with superior academic records, marked intellectual interests, and leadership ability, will be invited to be Alpha Scholars, and they are eligible for scholarship aid up to full tuition, the amount depending on financial need as established through the College Scholarship Service.

Each year applicants for admission who feel that they meet the general qualifications may request the Director of Admissions to place their names in nomination. Candidates are then interviewed by college representatives in February, and an announcement of the Alpha Scholar group is made March 15.

The scholars must maintain high scholastic standing during the four year program which consists of special course work in the freshman liberal studies honors section, an honors course in the sophomore year, a specialized study project at the junior level, and seminar participation sessions with distinguished scholars brought to the campus during the senior year.

War-Time Strength Authorized

Holland's National Guard unit today was named as part of a national back-up force for the regular army.

The Holland unit, along with 26 other Michigan National Guard units with a combined strength of 3,385 men, will form a brigade in a Selected Reserve Force (SRF) being organized throughout the United States.

Under the SRF buildup, Holland's unit is being reorganized from its present structure of one headquarters platoon, two rifle platoons and a weapons platoon, to include a headquarters platoon, three rifle platoons, and weapons platoon to be supplied by the Grand Haven National Guard unit.

Present strength of Company B is 137 enlisted men and five officers. As a priority unit, the authorized strength of the unit is 151 men and officers.

The nation-wide buildup calls for training 150,000 selected army national guard, and reserve units to fill a time gap created by an increase in regular army forces for the Viet Nam crisis.

Acting Governor William Miliken, who made the announcement, said the 2nd Brigade of the 46th Infantry Division of the Michigan National Guard and several separate guard units will be used to make up the SRF brigade from Michigan.

Ten Michigan Army Reserve units, with a strength of 1,071 men, were named to the SRF by Gov. George Romney before he left on a tour of Viet Nam and Japan earlier this month.

Major Gen. Clarence Schnipke, Adj. Gen. of Michigan, said all the designated selected force units would be brought up to war-time strength and supplied with the latest military equipment in case of a call to active duty.

All the units belonging to the SRF brigade also will have their weekly and weekend drill periods increased by 50 per cent to place the men at their peak performance and readiness, Schnipke said.

They would probably perform their two-weeks annual summer training in June next year instead of July. The increased training program is scheduled to begin Nov. 15.

Colonel Robert K. Williams, Grand Rapids, was named commander of the 2nd Brigade of the SRF.

Three infantry battalions, with units from various parts of the state, and airborne artillery and cavalry units from Detroit and an air-mobile company from Grand Ledge will form the brigade.

The largest number of men assigned to the SRF brigade will come from the Detroit and Grand Rapids area. Other cities called to boost their strength to 100 per cent for the SRF units were Flint, Alma, Ionia, LaPeer, Saginaw, Port Huron, Greenville, Holland, Grand Haven, Big Rapids and Owosso.

Reserve units previously announced to the SRF were from Ann Arbor, Jackson, Inkster, City and Battle Creek.

Two Boats Damaged In Mishap

Two cabin cruisers, one 52-foot long and the other 38-foot long, were damaged in an accident at the mouth of the Holland Channel about 2 a.m. Monday.

The 52-foot cruiser, valued at \$50,000 and owned by Richard A. Murray of Hammond, Ind., was totally destroyed in the accident. The 38-foot boat owned by S. F. Crivello of Milwaukee, Wis., received only minor damage.

The 52-foot boat was towing the other vessel when the tow rope broke as the two boats approached the channel. The 38-foot boat, operated by Martin Mizerki of Chicago, Ill., was washed aground by the high seas and strong winds on the Macatawa side of the channel.

Edward Jakubas, of Chicago, Ill., operator of the 52-foot boat, tried to back up to catch the 38-foot vessel. His clutch went out, and the engine died. The boat was then washed onto the rocks between the south break-wall and the channel entrance.

The two cabin cruisers were en route to Bay Haven Marina from Chicago for winter storage.

A third cabin cruiser owned by Alfred Santiago also made the trip from Chicago to Bay Haven for winter storage. Robert Linn of Bay Haven Marina said the 42-foot boat had extensive damage to its bow, but it is not known where the damage occurred.

U. S. Coast Guardsmen discovered the two boats and their skippers at the entrance to the channel Monday while making a routine check of the area. Ottawa County sheriff's deputies also investigated the accident.

Coast Guardsmen said that the boats had to come through eight to 12-foot high waves and winds up to 48 miles per hour Sunday night.

Robert Linn warned area residents that the persons taking things from the damaged boats would be prosecuted.

Man Badly Injured In Elevator Crash

GRAND HAVEN — Raymond Verplank, 55, Grand Haven, is in serious condition in Hackley Hospital after fracturing his back in three places and crushing both heels in an elevator accident at Vander Wall Brothers, Inc., Spring Lake, at 10:15 a.m. Tuesday.

Verplank, a partner in the Verplank Coal and Dock Co., had gone to the upper level to check bins for a load of slag he had delivered. On the descending trip, a chain on the elevator broke 20 to 30 feet from the floor and Verplank took the entire jolt standing up.

He was taken to Hackley Hospital and underwent surgery.

Supervisor Lester Veldheer of Olive reported he lives near the county dog shelter and many persons, who visit the dog shelter to leave dogs find the shelter closed so release their dogs in his township.

Chairman R. L. Cook named Marlin Sheridan, supervisor from Chester, and City Clerk J. Nyhof Poel of Grand Haven to serve with the health committee in a study of the need of a county medical facility. There are more than 100 welfare patients in rest homes in the county, it was reported at a previous meeting, and some members believe there is a need for a county facility.

Two transfers of fund were approved. The buildings and grounds committee reported that furnishings and other items in the new county building cost \$80,000 and this amount was transferred from the general fund. Slaughter reported that the justice court fund is "in the red" \$200, and \$6,000 was transferred to that fund from the contingency fund, for the remainder of 1965.

Poel, head of the County Youth Home committee, reported that 111 youths and girls were housed in the home, built two years ago, during the first nine months of 1965. Of this number 83 were boys and 28 were girls. The committee has had difficulty in finding a permanent superintendent but Poel said that former State Police Corp. Roy Collins and his wife have been engaged since Sept. 7 and are proving highly successful.

Rotarians Hear Address by Rev. Leestma

The establishment of the nation's first "walk-in, drive-in" church, and the philosophy that led to its founding, were the subjects of a talk by the Rev. Harold Leestma before Holland Rotary Club Thursday noon.

Rev. Leestma, Hope College graduate and formerly minister of Reformed Churches in Muskegon and Grand Rapids, is minister of evangelism at the Garden Grove Community Church in Los Angeles, Calif.

The church, which grew out of the use of a drive-in theater as temporary headquarters for religious services, occupies a 10-acre site in the Los Angeles area. The congregation numbers 2,000 and is divided between the sanctuary, which seats 800, and the drive-in area which is similar to an outdoor theater arrangement. A 12-story tower with rooms for classes, counseling, and administrative responsibilities is planned for completion next Spring.

Rev. Leestma shares ministerial responsibilities with two associates. The staff includes 60 teachers for the Sunday School, which includes an enrollment of 1,200 young people, and seven choirs.

Similar "drive-in, walk-in" churches of the Reformed Church are now holding services or are under construction in Scottsdale, Ariz., Long Beach, Calif., Riverdale, Calif., and other communities in the Far West, the speaker said.

Rev. Leestma said four "D's" were behind the founding of the church and are contributing to its growth. He explained these as a "dream" of a big project that fills a need, the recognition of the proper "direction" such a project must take, the "determination" to achieve, and the "dynamic" enthusiasm to get the job done.

The speaker was introduced by Dr. William Rottschaefer. Guests included Paul Hillegonds of Holland High School and Jack Kuiper of West Ottawa, junior Rotarians.

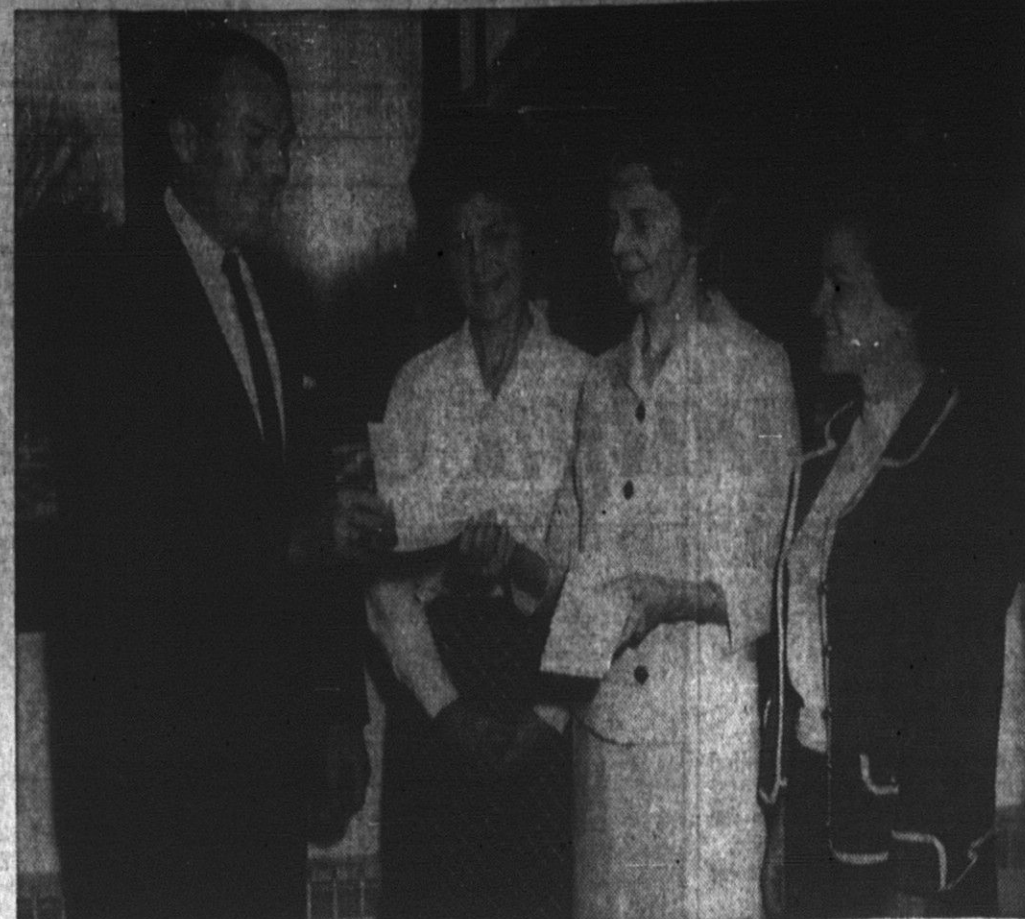

"University Women — Implications for the Future" was the topic Mrs. Dorothy Ross, counselor at Michigan State University, spoke on at the dinner meeting held at Point West Thursday evening by the Holland Branch of the American Association of University Women. Mrs. Steven Van Gound introduced Mrs. Ross, who informed the group of the findings of a study in which she had been engaged since 1958.

The first part of the study was directed toward identifying the goals, values, attitudes and concerns of a potentially superior group of Freshmen women starting their college work at Michigan State in 1958, '59, '60, '61, '62, with the purpose of identifying any differences among the groups representing each of those years.

The second part of the study concerned itself with following through the group entering in 1958 and graduating in 1962, and the group entering in 1961 which graduated this past June.

The study was to identify and measure change which occurred from freshman to senior years, and to note any differences in these two graduating classes.

Out of total of 10,067 freshmen women in the five classes, 101 participated in this study.

In summarizing the common characteristics and differences of the five selected samples from the records, interviews and test data, Mrs. Ross went on to say that the following conclusions could be inferred: The women in all of the groups had similar potential academic ability, came from the same kind of families and schools. They chose a variety of majors. Early groups were distributed over majors from the Colleges of Arts and Letters, Social Sciences and Natural Sciences.

More recent groups tended to increasingly choose the College of Natural Science. The mean academic point average at the end of the first term was about the same for all groups. The 1958, '59 and '60 samples constituted a more cautious, conservative group. They entered into the campus life and traditional activities. The 1961 and '62 samples did not accept the status quo. All five groups held marriage as a desirable goal. Most wished to combine career, graduate school and marriage.

In a comparing the two groups as seniors Mrs. Ross said the group graduating this past June had more of its members married as undergraduates; more of them had accelerated their programs and graduated early, more of them had taken jobs and fewer of them had gone on to graduate school. Their academic records were very similar except that more of the recent class had graduated with science or math majors.

The class graduating in 1962 had exercised more leadership on campus and had earned many more forms of recognition. For all of their outward success in combining scholarly activity with marriage and their feminine roles, the members of the recent class were less confident of their own abilities, and much less identified with tradition and cultural heritage.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 31
Samson

Judges 13:24, 24: 16:4; 15:21
By C. P. Dame

Some people make a mess of life. Our lesson tells about Samson who had great possibilities and opportunities to make an impact upon his nation but he failed for he did not know how to control himself.

I. A good beginning means much. In the days of the Judges the angel of the Lord told a childless wife that she would become a mother of a son and therefore she should not "drink wine nor strong drink, and eat not any unclean thing." Prenatal influence is important. The angel also said that the son would be a Nazirite, which meant that he was not to drink wine or strong drink, nor eat anything unclean and that no razor was to come upon his head. God had a mission for him—to deliver Israel from the oppression of the Philistines. God has a mission for us all—to glorify Him.

II. To yield to temptation is foolish. Samson grew up to be a strong man physically but spiritually he failed. He allowed three women to ruin his life. He married a Philistine woman against the counsel of his parents. This marriage did not last long. The next woman who came into his life was a harlot in Gaza, a Philistine city. The last woman, Delilah was the most beguiling and most wicked of the three. The Philistines bribed her to find out what was the secret of Samson's physical strength.

The wicked Delilah posed as a lover and played with weak Samson until she learned about his strength. Do not think that she made the attempts in quick succession, she took her time. Evil is persistent. Three times Samson resisted the wiles of Delilah but when she pestered him the fourth time he yielded and told her about his hair.

Delilah knew she had the secret and got busy by putting him to sleep on her lap and had his hair cut. When the Philistines came to bind Samson he woke up and said, "I will go out as at other times before and shake myself. And he wist not that the Lord had departed from him." Gone was his strength.

III. Sin is costly. The Philistines chained and blinded Samson and made him grind in prison, doing a woman's work. God's Nazirite had become Satan's slave. While in prison his hair grew again, but his eyesight did not return. Some losses are for good.

One day the Philistines had a religious festival. They called for Samson to make sport for them. They brought him out of prison—which was their undoing for Samson asked the lad who was leading him to bring him to the pillars upon which the building rested. All the dignitaries were on the roof. After a short prayer Samson grasped the two pillars and pulling them from their sockets, the building collapsed and three thousand Philistines were killed.

Samson, a gifted man, disappointed his family, his friends and his people, and God. He did not use his God-given strength and abilities aright. He could have done much more. Why did he fail? He was not wholly committed to God. Many people today waste their powers, time, abilities because they do not put God first in their lives.

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U.N. DAY WAS OCTOBER 24TH

Through the years, and particularly in recent ones, the U.N. has been attacked as an ineffective organization. Extreme right groups such as the John Birch Society have been particularly active and vocal in spear-heading a movement looking toward its abolition. This incidentally is their inalienable right to do as American citizens because the very essence of democracy is to allow dissent and to promote public discussion and debate. In passing, as an aside, it may be said this is also true of pro-con discussion of our involvement in Viet Nam, much as many may disagree with the methods of the latest wave of protests.

But with the passing of U. N. day, we keep coming back to the question. Where would the world be today if it hadn't been for the U. N. these last 20 post-war years? It has provided a world-wide forum for talk and help to keep open lines of communication between present and prospective belligerents. While it has failed to avert some wars, it has a creditable record of having played a major part in averting many. There is no nothing as world opinion which is a powerful moral force brought to bear upon disputants. The recent appearance of Pope Paul has bolstered the prestige of the organization which at its 20th anniversary was admittedly at a low point.

When to this crucial question, we add the thoughts of what would become of its far-flung auxiliary organizations such as Unicef and the World Health Organization and other organizations working around-the-clock to alleviate basic causes of war, we cannot do other than to express the hope that the U.N. continues to grow in influence and prosper. Perhaps in the distant future, we even dare to hope that it may ultimately be the instrumentality in ridding the world of the scourge of war.

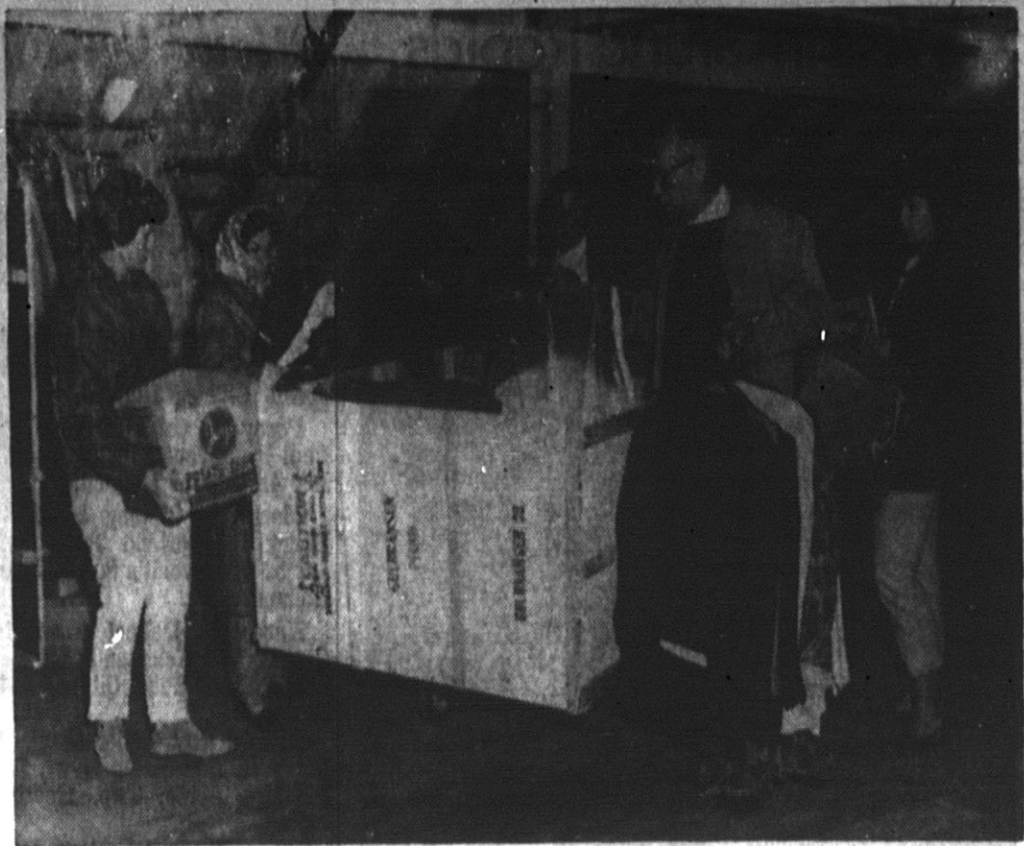

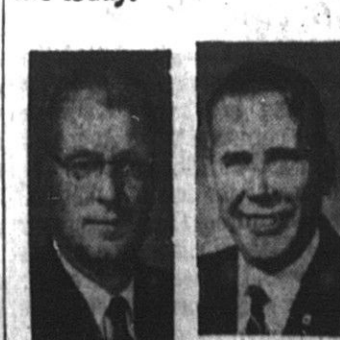

Dutch Snap 13-Game Losing Streak

MUSKEGON—Holland High's football team broke a 13-game losing streak here Friday night as they blanketed Muskegon Orchard View, 7-0 before 2,500 fans in Orchard View Stadium.

It also marked Holland's first Valley-Coast Conference win in history and its first victory in six starts this season. It was Orchard View's first league loss in three starts.

Defense played the biggest part in the win and some alert defense also helped Holland set up its touchdown.

Dale Flowerday recovered an Orchard View fumble on the Cardinals nine-yard line. Two plays later, quarterback Chip Millard rolled out and swept left end to score. Tom Prins converted with 7:01 left in the third quarter.

A 50-yard Mike Oonk punt followed by an Orchard View penalty had put the Cardinals on their own four-yard line. The first play gained five yards and then came the fumble.

Three times in the first half, Holland's defense stopped the Cardinals inside the 12-yard line. The first Orchard View drive was stopped on the five-yard line, the second on the 12 and the third on the two-yard line as the first half closed.

Terry Grevel intercepted a Holland pass on his own 10 and returned to the 35. In 14 plays, with Dennis Poppo carrying eight times, the Cardinals punched to the Holland five. Here on fourth down and inches, the Dutch held.

In the second quarter the Cardinals got to the Dutch 12-yard line. They were aided by a 15-yard Holland penalty and Poppo's 32-yard run in a drive which started on the Cardinals' 40.

After getting to the 15 with first down, Orchard View tried four plays but gained only three yards. A fake, which picked up eight yards and enough for a first down, started the third drive.

Seven plays later the losers got to the Holland eight. Another Holland penalty put the ball on the four and the final play of the first half ended on the two.

The Cardinals, who had won four straight after an opening game loss and were ranked 11th in Class B, lost their quarterback Dave Workman early in the game when he fractured his arm as he fell after being tackled.

Orchard View's furthest penetration in the second half was to the Dutch 25 midway in the fourth quarter. In the closing seconds, the losers got to the Holland 34 but again lost the ball on downs.

Holland's overall play was improved, Coach Dave Kemper said. Junior back Dave Dick played for the first time this season following a leg injury and displayed some good blocking and running.

With the addition of Dick, Kemper started a junior backfield of Millard, Randy Rogers and Len Fowler.

Kemper complimented his defensive unit, calling the victory a team effort. The Dutch, now 1-5, have unbeaten Muskegon next Friday in the annual Homecoming game at 8 p.m. in Riverview Park.

Holland's win was its first since the Dutch defeated East Grand Rapids in the 1964 season's opener.

BORCULO — Fire gutted the roof and upstairs of a home belonging to Thomas Kapenga at the corner of 112th Ave. and North Holland St. Monday.

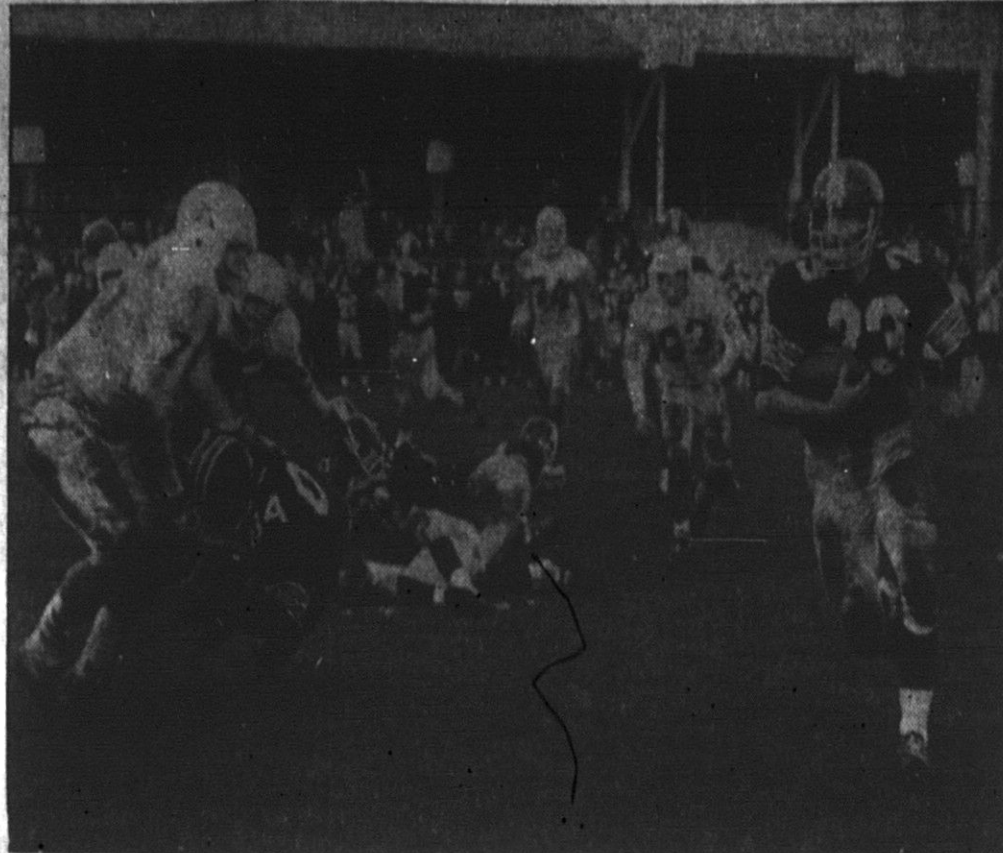
Cause of the fire is unknown. Firemen from the Blenden and Olive Township fire department answered the call and brought the fire under control about 1:45 p.m. today.

Hope College's football team crushed Alma, 48-6 in Riverview Park Saturday and made a cold day, filled with rain, hail and a little sunshine, an enjoyable Centennial Homecoming for 2,500 alumni and fans.

The Flying Dutchmen put on their best offensive show of the season, with sharp blocking and hard running, and made the outcome obvious in the first half. They also turned in a sparkling, tough defensive performance.

It was the worst beating a Hope team has ever given Alma in 38 games. In chalking up the win, Coach Russ De Vette was able to play his entire team and 42 players saw action.

The Flying Dutchmen scored 34 points in the first half, including 28 in the second quarter. Bill

Keur, Muskegon senior halfback, had his best day, scoring four touchdowns, three in the first half. Keur leads the MIAA in scoring with 42 points.

His first came on a one-yard off tackle slant with 5:54 left in the opening quarter. The tally climaxed a 98-yard, 13-play drive which started after Alma had fumbled on the Hope two and Paul Wassenaar recovered. The Alma upset began on the Hope 34 after a short punt.

Two freshmen engineered Hope's final touchdown as Clint Schilstra, on his first college play, tossed a pass to Jim Holt-slaw. The play covered 24 yards and came with 1:30 to play.

Capt. Rog Kroodsma had himself quite a day as he led the defense, grabbed a Hyink pass that covered 41 yards and set up Keur's fourth touchdown, kicked two extra points and caught two passes for two-pointers after touchdowns. Also turning in fine defensive performances were Joe Kusak and Wassenaar.

The Flying Dutchmen gained 460 yards, including 285 on the ground. Of this, Hope had 261 yards rushing in the first half. Besides Keur's running, De Kuiper gained 72 yards in five carries while Langeland had 57 in five and Gary Frens 33 in three.

West Ottawa's football team had its Homecoming hopes shattered Friday night as the Wyoming Vikings scored two touchdowns in the first quarter to give them a 12 to 0 victory.

It took the second play from scrimmage after the opening kickoff to ruin Homecoming for West Ottawa. It was on this play that 1,500 spectators saw Viking halfback Dan Dayman go 33 yards off left tackle for the first of the two touchdowns Wyoming would score in the game.

Capt. John Oonk kicked off to begin the ballgame. Wyoming halfback Jim Wicht gathered the ball in on his own 30-yard line and returned it to midfield. On the first play Wicht passed to end Dave Poskey who carried down to the 33 yard line. It was on the next play, with 11:11 left in the first quarter that Dayman went in to score.

Doug Stalonsbury was unsuccessful in attempting to kick the extra point.

The Panthers were frustrated in their attempts to move the ball and found themselves deep in their own territory on fourth down.

Dale Lubbers punted from his 10 and the Vikings found themselves with a first down on the Panther 39-yard line. On the first play Wicht juggled to the 34, and then, as if using the preceding down to warm up, Wicht took the ball on a hand off and duplicated the earlier touchdown run and scored again. The final touchdown came with 3:01 left in the first quarter. The extra point try was broken up by Mike Graves and Dale Bronkema.

West Ottawa tightened up its defense and refused to allow the Vikings another touchdown. Frank Houting, Oonk, Frank Sawitsky, and Steve Tucker, combined to stop the highly rated O-K League leaders for no gains or short yardage for the rest of the game.

Although the defense held Wyoming the next three quarters, the Panther offense would never really get started. The second quarter found both teams see-sawing back and forth with neither team making significant gains.

It was in the third quarter that the West Ottawa offense penetrated into Wyoming territory. Quarterback Dan Bauer, on a keeper picked up a first down on the Wyoming 45. Houting on a sweep, drove down to the 32 for a first down and it appeared that the Panthers were on the march.

Having completed his internship at Harper Hospital in Detroit, he and his Hope College sweetheart, Margaret Den Herder of Zeeland, Mich., were married in 1924, after four years in Detroit, the van der Velde moved to Holland. In addition to his active practice, Dr. van der Velde devoted his time as

Car Chases . . City Sticks With Police

The question of whether police should chase speeding motorists was discussed by City Council Thursday night.

Answering the question asked by Councilman Bertal Slagh, City Manager Herb Holt said he knows of no other successful alternative to apprehend such a violator, particularly in the need for positive identification for successful prosecution.

"Successful prosecution should not be limited to those who allow themselves to be caught," he said. "More often than not, those trying to outrun police are trying to escape something other than a speeding ticket and often involves something very serious."

Councilman Hollis H. Clark expressed concern for risks policemen incur and felt they deserve a great deal of credit and certainly should have public support.

He mentioned a case in which local officers stopped a car from Muskegon which had been traveling at speeds of 100 miles. Other motorists stopping at the scene asked why the offender had not been stopped earlier since there had been many near misses in forcing others off the road.

City Attorney Gordon Cunningham pointed to an incident which occurred Wednesday in which an escaped convict driving a stolen car was apprehended after a chase by car and on foot in the city of Holland by a member of the sheriff's department, city police and a number of citizens.

Racing Club Ends Season

Three members of the Holland Racing Club placed pigeons in the recent 210-mile state race from Indianapolis, Ind., the final race of the season.

Vern Barkel's bird placed third while Pete Bouwens' birds were fourth and fifth. Every club in Michigan was represented with 400 birds from 50 lofts competing.

There were no day birds because of a northeast wind, race officials said, and only eight birds had found their way home at the end of two days of racing.

The Holland club ran a special race from Indianapolis in conjunction with the state Race. Only two birds returned home on the day with Vern De Jonge winning first and Lyle Hop second.

The club flew its 320-mile race from Louisville, Ky., and eight lofts sent 145 birds. Reed Sloothaak swept the first three places having the only day birds in the club.

He also captured the young bird point trophy because of his fine showing. Other finishers were birds owned by Fritz Kliphuis, Bouwens, Hop and Barkel.

Wyoming Man Dies of Injuries

GRAND RAPIDS — Demas Wigginton, 44, Wyoming, died at 9:20 a.m. Saturday in St. Mary's Hospital of injuries received in a crash Wednesday, Oct. 20, at the intersection of Port Sheldon Rd. and M-21 in Georgetown township.

His death marks the 15th traffic fatality for Ottawa county in 1965.

Wigginton was critically injured when his car crashed into a tree. A passing motorist, James Hayward, 44, Holland, parked off the roadway to assist at the scene. Seconds later an auto operated by Wigginton's wife, Mary, went out of control at the accident scene and crashed into Hayward's parked car.

Atty. Wendell Miles of Holland slowed when approaching the scene and his car was struck from behind by a car driven by John Noor, 70, Holland. Miles was admitted to Holland Hospital for observation of neck and back injuries and was released Saturday.

More Use Of Center Approved

City Council Thursday night approved a recommendation of the city manager to increase recreational offerings at Civic Center in those periods when the place is not rented. The report was coupled with a report from the Civic Center manager suggesting various recreational activities in periods where other activities are scheduled. Such recreational activities would be subject to cancellation if paid activity contracts for the use of the auditorium.

Council denied a request from Clinton and Associates of Grand Rapids submitted two weeks ago for water services at Eighth St. and Clover Ave. in Holland township.

Councilman Morris Peerbolt, who made the motion to deny, felt that granting water to outsiders would not be fair to the people who would like to annex to the city and obtain water services. He said Council should support these persons and encourage them in their annexation moves.

At the close of the meeting, Peerbolt reintroduced the water subject and pointed out that much work has been done and much money has been spent to improve the water program and extend it to areas within the city limits. He said persons living outside the city should contact their governmental units for service. His motion to put this statement on record passed unanimously.

A communication from Harold De Pree, 564 West 18th St., expressing the opinion that the sanitary landfill operation remain open until at least 6 p.m. or that the city go to compulsory refuse pickup was placed on file.

Mayor Nelson Bosman said perhaps the city should have a study on the landfill operation and this led to a discussion in which City Manager Herb Holt described operations of the landfill which he says aims to operate on a self-supporting basis. Councilman Richard Smith felt the dump should be open until 5:30 p.m., but Councilman Bertal Slag offered a substitute motion tabling the subject to next meeting, seeking more information in the meantime.

A Traffic and Safety Commission report recommending that Rogers Rd. be made a through street from 32nd St. to South Shore Dr. was approved by a 5 to 1 vote, Smith dissenting. Streets stopping for Rogers Rd. will be 24th, 26th and 28th Sts., Grandridge Ct. and Bluebell Dr., all in the vicinity of Lakeview School. Councilman Van Eerden asked whether the commission had considered sidewalks for children's safety in the areas and Councilman Morris Peerbolt asked whether yield signs might be as effective as stop signs.

Council set Dec. 1 as date for public hearing on a request to close a portion of an alley lying east of Lincoln Ave. between 13th and 14th Sts.

A request from the Holland Board of Education asking that the city clerk conduct the special school election Dec. 7 was granted.

A report from the Hospital Board revealed plans were made for a west exit in the new public parking lot at the hospital, as recommended by the Traffic and Safety Commission.

Letters from the classis of Zeeland, Reformed Church in America, and Bentheim Reformed Church expressing disapproval of Sunday operations at Windmill Island were received and filed.

A gift of a mirror for the x-ray machine valued at \$50, as reported by the Hospital Board, was accepted with thanks.

Council approved proposed agreements submitted by the Library Board to provide library services to the residents of Fillmore and Laketown townships on the same basis as previous agreements with other governmental units.

A claim against the city from Arthur Bauder, route 1, Zeeland, was referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

All Councilmen were present except Donald Oosterbaan, Henry Steffens and Eugene Vande Vusse. Cards from Steffens and Vande Vusse thanked Council for plants sent them during their illness. The invocation was given by the Rev. Charles Steenstra of Faith Christian Reformed Church. The meeting lasted less than 50 minutes.

The Council chamber was filled with some 55 students from citizenship classes of E. E. Fell Junior High School taught by Dorothy Bradish and Mrs. Carl Van Lente. Mayor Bosman welcomed the students.

Four Chamber Officials Are Honored at Banquet

Plaques of recognition were given to four retiring directors of the Holland Chamber of Commerce Thursday night at the Chamber's annual banquet attended by 250 persons in Phelps Hall.

President L. C. Dalman presented plaques to John Van Dyke, Jr., Henry Weyenberg, the Rev. William F. Burd and Marvin C. Lindeman. Dalman said Lindeman served 18 years on the Chamber board, including the last 15 consecutive years, longer than any other Holland Chamber member.

New president Kenneth Zuverink presented Dalman with a plaque for his service as president. Dalman indicated the Chamber enthusiasm has never been higher and said the Chamber must continue to grow in all of its phases.

Zuverink said the Chamber is making great strides toward expansion. He said the Chamber must expand its economic boundary to the north, south and east. He felt the Chamber had to manpower to carry on the expansion program in the future.

Executive vice president Roscoe F. Giles reported on the work of the Chamber committees during the past year. He said more than 100 persons are serving on committees and committees were functioning on a 12-month basis.

Commenting on HEDCOR, Giles said the Beech-Nut Corp. will begin plant construction next April 15 while the Slick Craft firm anticipates starting construction in three weeks and the Seven Up Co. has already started construction.

Giles noted that 37 firms have increased employment in the past

two years and five firms decreased employment. He said the Fantas survey had estimated 36 would increase by 1965.

He reported 1,200 sophomores in three high schools took part in the career-conference day and reported Holland and West Ottawa high schools have strengthened their vocational programs.

Monthly committee meetings were held with State Sen. Harold Volkema and State Rep. James Farnsworth and Melvin De Stigter, Giles said. He reported the average attendance was 100 at the "early bird" breakfasts.

The Chamber anticipated a \$4,000 increase in Chamber dues and a net gain of 18 member accounts, Giles said. He reported a two-year supply of 27,000 tourist and resort brochures were used up this year.

Improved Christmas decorations are planned with \$3,000 used this year as part of a three-year plan of \$7,500. The city of Holland will match up to \$1,250, Giles said and merchants were assessed \$1 a front foot per year for three years.

W. H. De Hart of Sparta, affiliated with education for more than 40 years gave a humorous talk entitled "Do We Have to Get Used to It?"

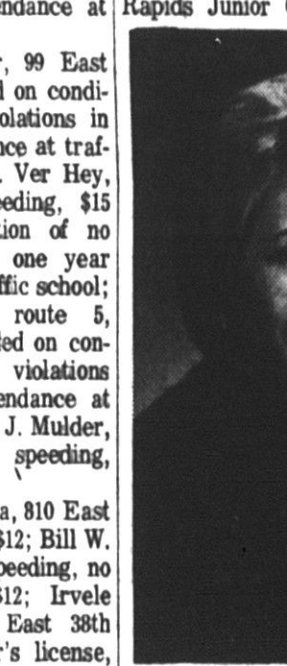

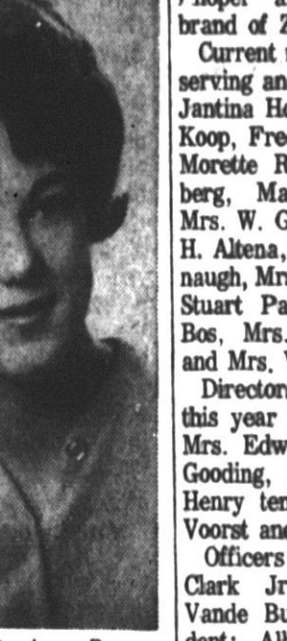

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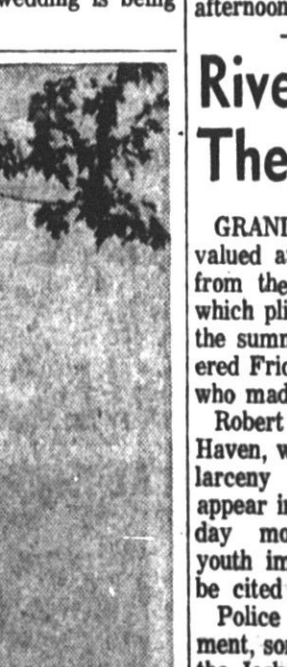
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Area Schools Winners At Marching Band Event

Hamilton school received a first division rating while Zeeland and Hudsonville were named as second division winners.

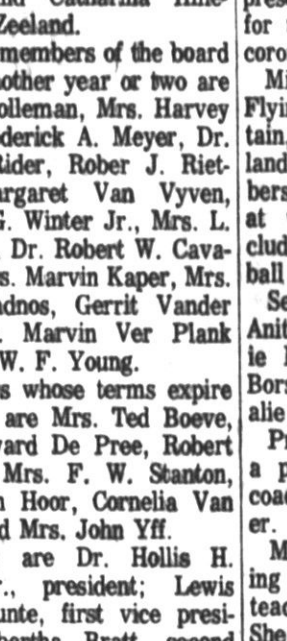

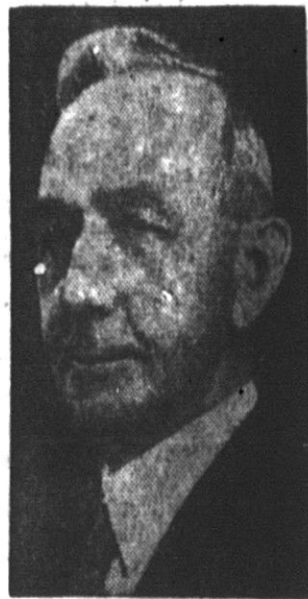

Dr. Wayer Succumbs At Age 94

Dr. James Wayer, 94, of 26 East 12th St., died Monday afternoon in Holland Hospital where he was taken Sunday following a fall in Dimment Memorial Chapel where he attended the morning worship for Hope Reformed Church which is meeting temporarily in the chapel.

He was born in the Netherlands July 6 and came to the United States in 1892. He graduated from Hope College in 1901 and from Western Theological Seminary in 1904.

That year he married the former Margaret Maring of Muskegon and was ordained as pas-

tor of Ebenezer Reformed Church east of Holland.

He later served Bethany Reformed Church in Grand Rapids, First Reformed Church in Holland, Racine Reformed Church in Wisconsin and as assistant minister of Hope Church.

He served as First church pastor here for 20 years before going to Wisconsin. The Wayers returned to Holland 16 years ago and he assisted with the work at Hope Church until he was 90 years old.

He served on the Board of Trustees of Hope College for many years and on the Classical Board of Benevolences for the Reformed Church in America which handles scholarships for students. He was a member of the Board of Domestic Missions for 20 years and was one of the founders of the 50-year circle of Hope College. He was granted an honorary doctor of divinity degree from Hope College in 1955.

Highpoints for the Wayers since their return to Holland in 1949 were two recognition gatherings in Hope Church on the occasion of their 50th wedding anniversary in 1954 and their 60th anniversary in 1964, the latter also marking Dr. Wayer's 60th anniversary of his ordination. More than 300 friends signed the guest book on the latter occasion.

Indicative of the many long years of service to the community by the couple was a tribute in 1954 by the late Mayor Harry Harrington who wrote: "What we do for ourselves dies with us, but what we do for our communities lives on."

Dr. Wayer is survived by the wife, Margaret, a brother-in-law, Albert Maring of Muskegon, and several nephews and nieces.

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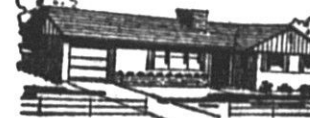
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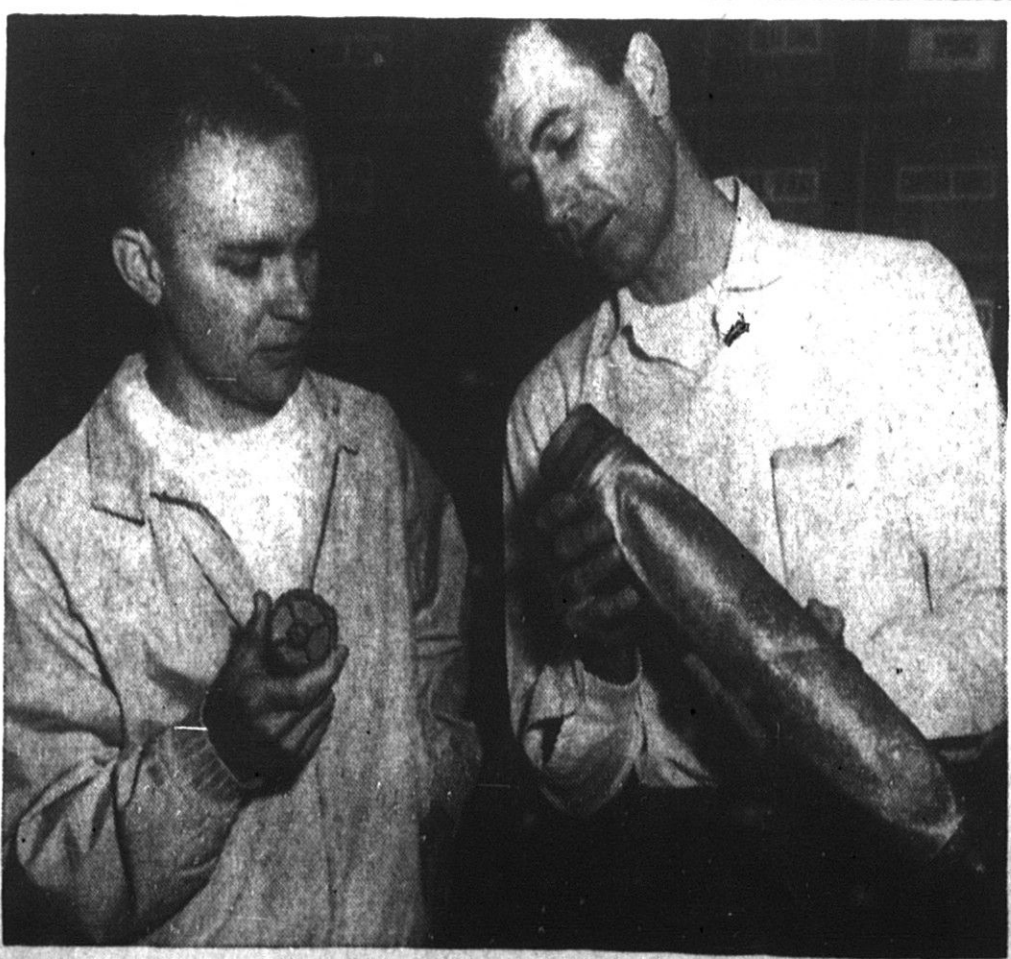
