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Road Budget Presented to Supervisors

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Road Commission presented its proposed operating budget for 1969 before the Board of Supervisors at the opening meeting of the October session of the supervisors Monday and several appointments to county offices were made by the board.

Ronald Bakker, county engineer-manager, presented the proposed budget, which calls for total disbursements of \$3,365,000, including \$900,000 in road construction. The annual county allocation for roads sought by the commission for next year is \$300,000. Included in the improvements in county parks is the proposed construction of a "lumberman's museum" at the new county arboretum at Hager Park near Hudsonville and improvements to the parking area at that park.

Four persons were reappointed to the new county mental health services board, upon recommendation of Ray Vander Laan, Hudsonville, chairman of the mental health board. They are the Rev. Milton Doorbos of Hudsonville, Laverne Lampen of Zeeland, Mrs. Carol Van Putten of Holland and Judge Frederick T. Miles of Grand Haven.

Supervisors adopted a resolution, designating the mental health board as an official administrative body with authority to hire a director and staff.

Dr. Richard Schaftenaar, county health department director, was reappointed chief medical examiner for the county for three years. Other appointments listed John Koster of Tallmadge township to the social welfare commission for three years and Neal Van Leeuwen of Spring Lake, to the road commission for six years.

E. C. Roberts of the treasurer's office and Elsie Pitts of the Health department were named delegates to the Michigan Municipal Employees retirement board meeting at Lansing Oct. 16.

R. V. Terrill, Grand Haven, chairman of the officers and employees committee, reported that his group is negotiating on salaries with a nurses association, the sheriff's deputies and a county employees group. He was authorized to retain the services of a Grand Rapids attorney as a special counsel and will report to the board following a meeting of his committee Wednesday morning.

The board agreed to meet today, Wednesday and Thursday of this week and then adjourn until the following Thursday to study the 1969 budget.

Glen Timmer of Holland, county director of civil defense, appeared before the board to outline the new civil defense procedure in Michigan under the nationwide network system.

Holland Delegates To Attend Meet Of Arts Councils

A majority of Michigan communities will have representation at the Second State Conference for the Arts.

Among these delegates will be Mrs. Paul McIlwain and Donald Ihrman, co-chairmen of the Holland Council for the Arts.

The Michigan State Council for the Arts (MSCA) are the sponsors of the one-day meeting to be held Monday, October 21, in the Michigan State University Union Building, and an estimated 250 are expected to attend from both Michigan peninsulas.

Both Governor and Mrs. George Romney will participate in the conference; the Governor will welcome conferees at 9 a.m. and Mrs. Romney will serve as a panel moderator on "Neighborhood Programs."

Two dozen state and national authorities are scheduled to speak during the eight-hour program — which is designed to aid communities interested in beginning arts councils and to furnish new ideas for operational councils.

An afternoon panel on success stories of local Arts Councils will include a report by the Holland Council which has been placed in group B 10,000 to 50,000 population.

Michigan communities having a population of 4,000 or more were invited to send delegates and any others interested were also encouraged to attend, said E. Ray Scott, MSCA director.

Boat Owner Sought

Holland police Monday said they are attempting to find the owner of a 14-foot inboard motorboat that has been creating a traffic problem at the docks at Kollen Park. The wooden turquoise- and white craft that bears no name or numbers has been abandoned there for about a week, officers said, and it looks as though it had been submerged. Police said the motor is in the boat.

To encourage more tulip plantings in residential areas, Holland Tulip Time Festival, Inc., is sponsoring a contest for Holland's 40th Tulip Time festival next spring.

Mayor Nelson Bosman announced today that an anonymous donor would provide prizes consisting of a \$100 bond for grand prize, \$50 bond for second prize, and six \$25 bonds.

Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf has obtained 20,000 tulip bulbs which will be made available to residents in Holland city in lots of 50 for \$5. The sale will

Conservation Tour Draws 1,400 Persons

Fourteen hundred people attended the Conservation Education Tour on Conservation and Recreation for Ottawa County Schools, Oct. 10.

The tour began at Pigeon Creek Park just west of 120th on Stanton and buses began arriving at 9:30 a.m. Ken Burger of the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District handed out tour guides as the buses arrived, and Willis Boss, 4-H Youth Extension Agent, greeted the group.

The purpose of the tour was to acquaint students with land use of sandy soils for agricultural crops and recreation and discuss the necessary conservation practices in connection with them.

Across from the county park in an area of Federal land being purchased by the county, Bill Allred, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, told students of the serious wind erosion problems in the West Ottawa District when it was organized in 1938.

Thirty thousand acres of trees were planted as part of the stabilization program. Most of the trees are large enough for pruning and thinning and the trees on this land have been thinned. Limbs and small poles were put into brush piles for wildlife.

The Bluegrass Sod Farm was next on the tour. Jack Bosgraaf, one of the owners, and Bob Van Klompenberg, Extension Agent in agriculture, told the students about the business of growing sod. The farm has been developed on what was formerly known as Robinson Marsh and has grown from a small acreage to hundreds of acres of sod.

Very little topsoil is lost in the operation because of modern sod cutting equipment. The farm has ten miles of shallow field ditches and a mile and a half of outlet ditches on each 80 acres. Students were able to see the irrigation system that is one half-mile long on wheels and has a motor that will move itself. The system delivers 550 gallons of water per minute which covers five acres of land at one setting.

Students visited the West Ottawa Country Club which was formerly a farm. Jerry Hertel, owner of the golf course, and Bill Antonides, Soil Conservation Technician of the Soil Conservation Service, talked to the students. The course is on sandy soil and is covered with grass so it doesn't erode from wind or water.

Ponds and a deep well are used for irrigation and a lot of water is required to irrigate because of the large area and the sandy soils that are naturally dry.

The West Ottawa Soil Conservation District furnished apples which were given out to the students by Clarence Reenders, chairman of the district.

The last stop was at John Zelenka's Evergreen Nursery. Zelenka has one of the many nurseries in Ottawa County, with 1,000 acres in various farms. Mel Baron, Ottawa County Extension Aide, and John Strazanan, employed by the nursery, explained the operation of that type of conservation problem.

Plants are sprayed regularly to protect them from insects and disease and irrigation water comes from a pit-type pond, which is stocked with fish.

The educational conservation tour is sponsored annually by the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District, the Ottawa County Extension Service, The West Ottawa Soil Conservation District and the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. This is the largest conservation tour ever held in the district.

start Tuesday in Civic Center which will be open from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Current price of such bulbs is \$1.50 a dozen.

The bulbs are in three varieties, Darwin, Cottage and Triumph, and in 13 colors. All sales will be in solid colors, none mixed. De Graaf said years of experience have established that the three varieties flourish best in the local climate.

Mayor Bosman explained that sales will be limited to 50 bulbs only for the contest. These 50 bulbs are to be planted in front yards visible from the street. They will be judged on design, display, etc. The planting may be supplemented by other bulbs and plantings but should remain distinctive in the lot of 50 for judging. Sometime in advance of the blooming season, next spring, numbers will be distributed to contestants to be placed on the beds for judging.

Tulip bulbs may be planted at any time this fall as long as the ground is pliable. De Graaf said bulbs should be planted six to eight inches deep with bone meal mixed with the soil. Explicit information on plantings will be given later.

Mayor Bosman emphasized that plantings should be between homes and the sidewalk, not on the curbstrip.

The Tulip Time board is sponsoring the contest and has appointed Mayor Bosman and De Graaf, board members, to arrange it.

Supervisors Discuss New Court System

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Supervisors held its second meeting of the October session Tuesday and after hearing the annual report of the County Health Department adjourned as a committee of the whole to study the record budget for operation of the county for 1969. The board met again today at 1:30 p.m. and was to continue the study of the budget.

Sanitarian John H. Wyma and several nurses from the health department reviewed the department's report for the board.

Much of the meeting Tuesday was spent in discussing plans to accommodate the three new district courts in the county, which will replace the justice courts Jan. 1.

An item of \$12,820 was included in the proposed budget for the district courts for next year but this was increased to \$20,320 to cover annual rental of present municipal court offices in the Holland City Hall, space used by the present municipal court in Grand Haven City Hall and office space in the Hudsonville area, possibly the City Hall.

The judges' salaries will be paid by the state, \$18,000 for each judge, and the Ottawa board will be asked to pay \$2,000 supplementary salary for each judge. Other expenses will be three court officers, probation officers, clerks and stenographers.

Aviation Contests Are Scheduled

Also on Saturday, Oct. 19 at 12 noon Burgess Aviation will hold a cross-country rally with trophies presented for best performance from a licensed student pilot and best performance from a private or commercial pilot.

The object of the cross-country rally will involve navigation ability and planning.

Pilots will be trying to fly to maintain the exact fuel consumption and estimated time in route that they planned it would take. The pilot that comes closest to this estimate will be declared the winner by the contest judges who are Thomas Burgess, Dennis Adams, John Brower and Bob Payne.

Three Charged In Shooting Of Pheasants

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies apprehended three persons on charges of illegal possession of game after the trio was stopped in their car on 112th Ave. just off M-21 Sunday night.

James Gigowski, 24, of route 1, Hopkins and Thomas Burns, 39, of Weyland, were lodged in the county jail until arraigned before Justice Eva O. Workman in Spring Lake Monday where they both pleaded guilty to shooting pheasants during the closed season.

City Bond Issues Taken From Ballot

Second Ward Councilman L. W. Lamb Jr. felt a delay in voting would be good so that the building program may be re-studied and that consideration might be given to other sites, as well as the current site.

City Manager Herb Holt pointed out that there has been very little question as to the need for the facilities and hoped citizens would not lose interest in the building program but that all could work together on a satisfactory plan.

Councilman Hollis Clark reiterated that the delay should not be interpreted as a search

The third shift will report at 9:18 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 20, and other shifts at regular starting time Monday, Oct. 21.

Aids available for helping the physically handicapped were demonstrated, along with patience shown the mentally retarded and the satisfaction derived from simple accomplishments.

Because staffing special education departments always is difficult, emphasis was given possible scholarships and a strong recruitment program to attract persons and other teachers into the field. The special education program is down this year, partly because of difficulties in staffing and because other sections of the county have begun their own programs.

The local program is financed through state funds and by reimbursements from the county through the special half - mill assessment in effect for several years. The half - mill does not cover all needs and it is expected current surpluses will be used up this year.

The two films are being shown to PTAs and other interested groups.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman called attention to the annual meeting of the Michigan School Board Association to be held in Grand Rapids Nov. 5-7. He also reported receipt of \$30,378 in the reading program covering the period from Sept. 1968, to Aug. 1, 1969.

Ihrman also reported on official membership as of the fourth Friday in September at 5,429 prorated to 4,868 through part-time students from non-public schools and those in special adult and swimming programs.

The board passed a resolution establishing nonresident tuition rates at maximum allowed under law. This places elementary tuition at \$378.11 and secondary tuition at \$402.78.

New on the financial report for September is the 1968 Harrington building and site fund, listing a balance of \$33,346.29. The original fund had listed \$81,000 plus \$2,920.41 interest and other receipts, with disbursements to date at \$550,574.12.

Board Member Charles Bradford reported on work about to start on a curriculum study with the aid of professional educators.

Board President James O. Lamb presided and Russel Fredricks gave the invocation. The meeting lasted 2 1/4 hours.

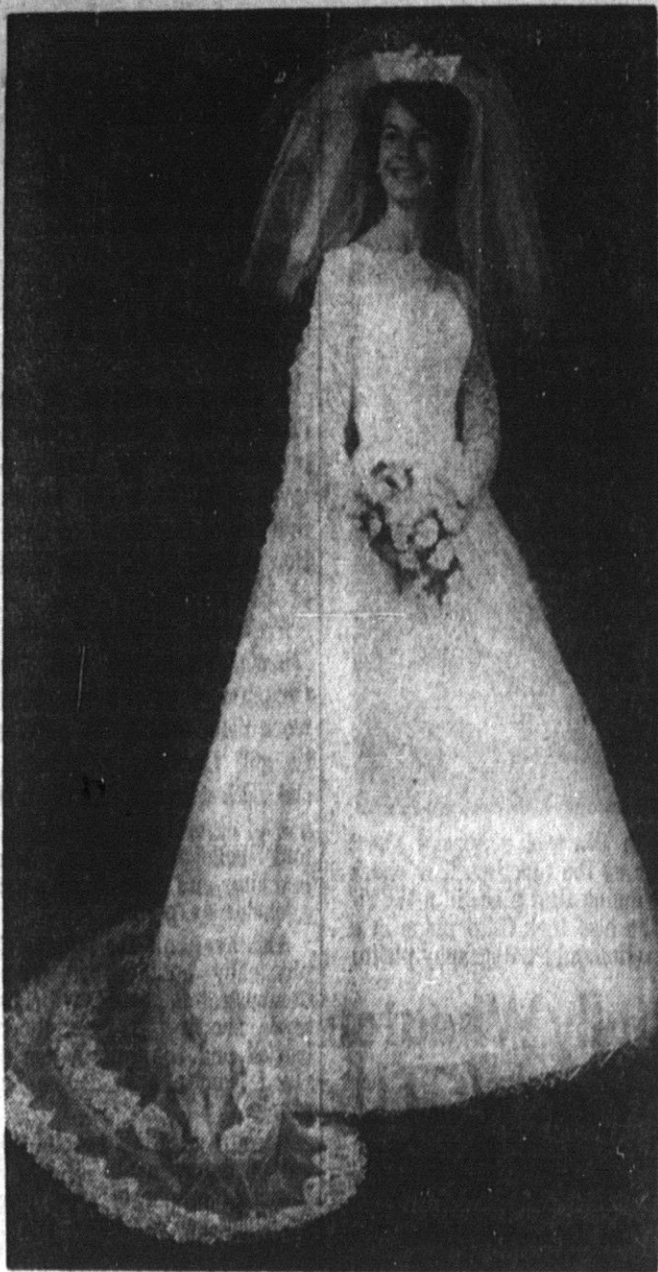

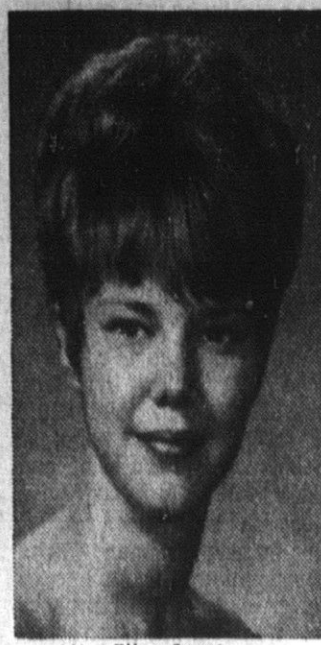

Believe Girl Was Bitten During Fight

Woman's Literary Club Stages Political Program

The Woman's Literary Club went political Tuesday afternoon with a program on "Candidates — Platforms — Issues" headed by the two 9th district Congressional candidates, incumbent Guy Vander Jagt of Cadillac, Republican, and Jay A. Wabeke of Eastmanville, Democrat.

Wabeke, sporting a Democratic tie with donkeys, presented a tie with elephants to Vander Jagt, and proceeded to list political issues, first those he figured the two candidates had a great deal of agreement, and second those of differences.

He favored (1) the 18-year vote, (2) changing the system for nominating presidential and vice presidential nominees favoring a national primary, (3) changing House terms to four years, (4) favoring another state park for Ottawa county just north of M-45 extension on Lake Michigan, (5) opposing public funds for nonpublic schools, (6) favoring Sleeping Bear Dunes as a national park, and (7) doing something about Congressional ethics and favoring a bill making it illegal for Congressmen to practice their professions while in office.

Vander Jagt who said it was just 16 years ago that he appeared before the Literary Club as Holland's Community Ambassador during his senior year at Hope College, said the 18-year vote, the four-year term and political conventions were not basic issues in an election year and pointed to Vietnam, crime and lawlessness and fiscal responsibility as true campaign issues.

He said the lack of credibility of the present administration was largely responsible for the lack and unity and purpose today in America.

He said such issues as a state park and aid to nonpublic schools were strictly state matters and should be taken up in Lansing, and differed with Wabeke on making it illegal to practice professions while in Congressional office. "Both Mr. Wabeke and I have divinity degrees and I think we should be allowed to preach a sermon now and then. Congress might be better for it," Vander Jagt said.

Vander Jagt added he, too, favors Sleeping Bear Dunes as a national park but voted against the Hart bill because it did not spell out a good many details which could cause conflict. For instance, removing 65,000 acres from tax rolls would seriously affect school bond issues, a point which should be resolved before passage.

As for Congressional ethics, Vander Jagt said such a bill has been passed, but, unfortunately, the enforcement lies with the majority party which has been unwilling to move even in investigating the Gallagher case.

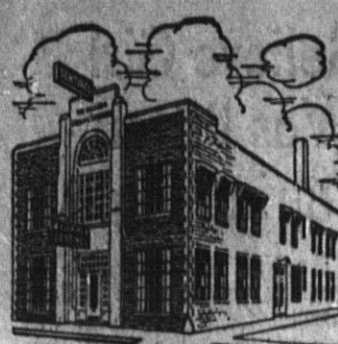

Among the collection Dr. and Mrs. TenPas have a piece of Steuben Glass made and signed by the original makers. Some of the employees of these glass works came from England and were already skilled artisans.

The beautiful Threaded Glass was made by the Mt. Washington Co., and contains diamond shapes blown in a mold into the glass. The beautiful Mary Gregory Glass made by Boston and Sandwich Glass Co. was displayed. Mary Gregory worked in the glass company, and gave her distinctive name to the glass. All the early glass contains bubbles of air. A method was invented to take care of this defect later.

Tiffany glass was made in New York. Mr. Tiffany was born in 1848 and died in 1933. He was a great chemist and made iridescent glass. This glassware is always signed L.C.T.

The Steuben Glass was made by the Corning Glass Co. The Mt. Fiori Glass has a cold feeling. It was made of glass rocks molded together. Findlay, Ohio, was the only place where Onyx Glass was made. There are many collectors of these fine pieces of glassware who perpetuate the wonderful masterpieces of American glass makers.



Sunday School Lesson

Loyal to the Faith
Hebrews 12:1-4, 7-15
By C. P. Dame

This is a great time in which to show loyalty to our families, our church and our Lord Jesus. May the study of this lesson give us a greater determination to show loyalty to our God and to the Christian faith.

I. The Christian life is a race. It is not a picnic, a stroll or sitting in a park. Racing demands strength. Our lesson text begins with the word, "Wherefore" which word points to what has gone on before, the chapter about the heroes of faith who by their lives witnessed to their faith in God.

We should "Lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us" and "run with patience the race that is set before us." How can we do that? By "looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith." Take note of the various names the writer of this epistle gives to Jesus—Son, Apostle, High Priest, Leader, Perfecter and here the Finisher. Every name means something about Christ.

Faith did not come easy to Christ. All through his ministry Jesus met with opposition. It cost him his blood. The Hebrew Christians had "not yet resisted unto blood." More faith was needed now in order to run a successful race.

II. Sonship involves discipline. The Hebrew Christians were not taking their troubles and trials graciously. God was using their trials in order to discipline them. Discipline is a proof of sonship. Good earthly fathers discipline their children. How much more may we expect God to discipline his children. Earthly fathers corrected children for a time according to the best of their judgement and ability and at times blundered but God makes no mistakes. To be sure, discipline is not pleasant for the moment but it yields good results. Faith and discipline go together. This does not overlook.

III. Christians always need to be challenged. "Wherefore lift up the hands which hang down and the feeble knees." It is the defeatist attitude which prompts the agitation for church union. Some modern believers have lost courage. The Hebrew Christians had begun well but they were in danger of losing their goal. The writer called upon them to keep going in the right direction. In this day there are Christians who began well but they are turning to novelties, leaving the good old ways. And some preachers are losing their message.

"Follow peace with all men and holiness"—that is pursue both for they are much needed in the church. The failure to do what will result in dangers. Note the words, "lest any man fall of the grace of God" meaning the loss of spiritual power and privileges.

Another danger is cited in the words, "lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble you, and thereby many be defiled." One person can defile others. And that is the reason why it is so essential to strive after holiness, "without which no man shall see the Lord." We all want to see Him.

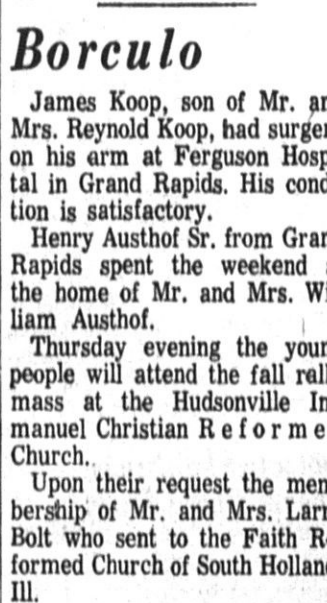

Dutch Win With 'Great Team Effort'

MUSKEGON — It wasn't the Detroit Tigers but the Holland High Dutch football team chanting "we're number one" following a 23-7 Friday night triumph over tenth ranked Muskegon Mona Shores giving the Dutch the Valley Coast Conference lead.

Picking up where they left off last week the Dutch struck early when quarterback Max Glupker, on Holland's second play from scrimmage, hit the fleet Larry Lamb for a 68-yard scoring strike. Bernie Rosendahl missed the conversion attempt and Holland led 6-0 with 8:49 left in the first quarter.

Later in the quarter the Dutch were forced to punt from deep in their own territory. Gary Lound's punt was blocked by Grant Stevenson who picked the ball up on the five yard line and ran it in for the score. Ken Boynes converted and the Sailors led 7-6.

Holland wasted no time in regaining the lead as Glupker connected with Lamb again on a 49-yard touchdown which capped a 62 yard drive requiring four plays. Rosendahl converted and Holland led for keeps 13-7.

Just before the half the Dutch drove to Mona Shores four yard line where on fourth down Bernie Rosendahl kicked a 24 yard field goal to give Holland a more comfortable 16-7 margin.

This was the score at half-time as Holland's defense held Mona Shores to four total yards in the half completely bottling up the highly touted Sailor rushing attack. Glupker's two early bombs to Lamb were sufficient to rattle the Sailors and set up later passes across the middle.

Another factor in Holland's favor the first half and for the entire game was the good field position the Dutch enjoyed due mainly to the punting of the Sailor's Don Heekenga who averaged only 27 yards a kick in the game.

Holland had come out with a wide open offense as coach Dave Kempker had planned and been successful.

Holland continued domination of the game in the second half and wrapped up the scoring with a 54 yard, eight play drive, terminated on a one yard plunge by Glupker at 5:09 of the third quarter. Rosendahl converted and the scoring was completed.

Kempker noted after the game that it was at this point he felt the Dutch had the victory.

However the game wasn't over yet.

The Sailors drove to the Dutch 18 late in the third quarter where in a fourth and seven situation Jess Chase was thrown for a loss by Mike Fraam and Rick Zweering.

The next time Mona Shores got the ball they again advanced into Dutch territory on the Holland 20 where on third and one Bob Michelotti was stopped for no gain and on fourth and one Greg Strudwick was hit by Rick Munson and Rick Berens short of the first down.

Coach Kempker noted "even though our offense moved the ball I was particularly pleased with our defense, they finally came to life and played some ball."

Kempker didn't want to single anyone out and felt the victory was "a great team effort." Kempker and his assistants Ray Backus and Clyde Line felt before the game that the team was sky high and ready for the game. Line noted this mania spread from player to player. Kempker felt "two back to back victories are something for us. We're going to be tough now."

Glupker again displayed a

talent for passing, completing 8 of 16 passes for 193 yards and two touch downs.

Gosselaar led the receivers with four grabs for 50 yards while "the point man," Larry Lamb, caught three passes for 141 yards and two touchdowns.

Tom Moes led the Dutch runners with 54 yards in 8 carries including a 40 yard burst up the middle which set up Rosendahl's field goal just before halftime.

After the game one Holland player was heard to remark, "I think we'll take it (the league title). As a matter of fact I know we will." If the Dutch play football the way they did Friday night there will be no stopping them.

The Dutch, 3-2 for the year, meet Muskegon Orchard View next Friday in Muskegon.

Before an enthusiastic Homecoming crowd Friday night the West Ottawa Panthers football team defeated Wyoming Rogers, 34-0.

Using a balanced attack and making very few mistakes, the Panthers recorded their fourth shut-out in five outings.

West Ottawa kicked off to open the game. After taking the ball on their own 33-yard line, the Golden Hawks were thrown for three consecutive losses.

Taking the Rogers punt on the Golden Hawks 40-yard line, the Panthers scored their first touchdown by driving for 40 yards in six plays. The touchdown was scored on a 13-yard pass from quarterback Jim Visser to halfback Tom Kruijthof. Darryl Mitchell kicked the extra point making the score 7-0.

Following the ensuing kick off, the Panthers again stopped the Golden Hawks after they had driven down to the West Ottawa 49-yard line. After giving up two quick first downs, the Panthers, led by Dennis Wilson and Frank Silva, forced a Rogers punt which Visser returned to their own 28-yard line.

The first quarter ended with neither team able to move the ball.

The Panthers opened the second quarter by receiving a punt on their own 30-yard line. Following a eight-yard gain by fullback Greg Dalman, West Ottawa lost the ball on a fumble, their only bad mistake in the whole game.

The West Ottawa defense held strong, throwing the quarterback, Tim Telder, for a four yard loss. Two plays later on a third and 12 situation, line-backer Greg Van Wieren intercepted a Telder pass and ran the ball back 75 yards for a touchdown. The kick was again good by Mitchell making the score 14-0.

The Golden Hawks were unable to generate any offense for the remainder of the second quarter. They were able to pick up only one more first down against the tight Panther defense for the rest of the first half.

With just over three minutes left in the half, Kruijthof intercepted a Rogers pass and brought the ball back to their 47-yard line. Five plays later, Visser hit end Dave Overway with a 23-yard scoring strike. The conversion was blocked and the score stood at 20-0.

Again forcing a punt, the Panthers scored once more. On the first play following the punt, Visser hit Dalman with a 45-yard touchdown pass. The extra point was good making the score at half time, 27-0.

West Ottawa received the kick off opening the second half. With the ball on the Rogers 45-yard line, the Panthers scored in four plays. Les Zimmermaend scored the touchdown on a two-yard run. Mitchell booted the extra point to make the score 34-0.

From this point on, Coach Ron Wetherbee substituted freely. Virgil Payne blocked a Rogers' punt and Mike Mesbergen intercepted a Telder pass as the defense held the Golden Hawks scoreless for the remainder of the way.

Standouts for the Panthers on defense were Dennis Wilson and Greg Dalman. Wetherbee commented that his entire defensive backfield looked especially sharp. He also noted that his second string is beginning to look like a first string.

ALLEGAN — Robert E. Hopkins, 78, route 5, died Saturday at the Allegan Health Center.

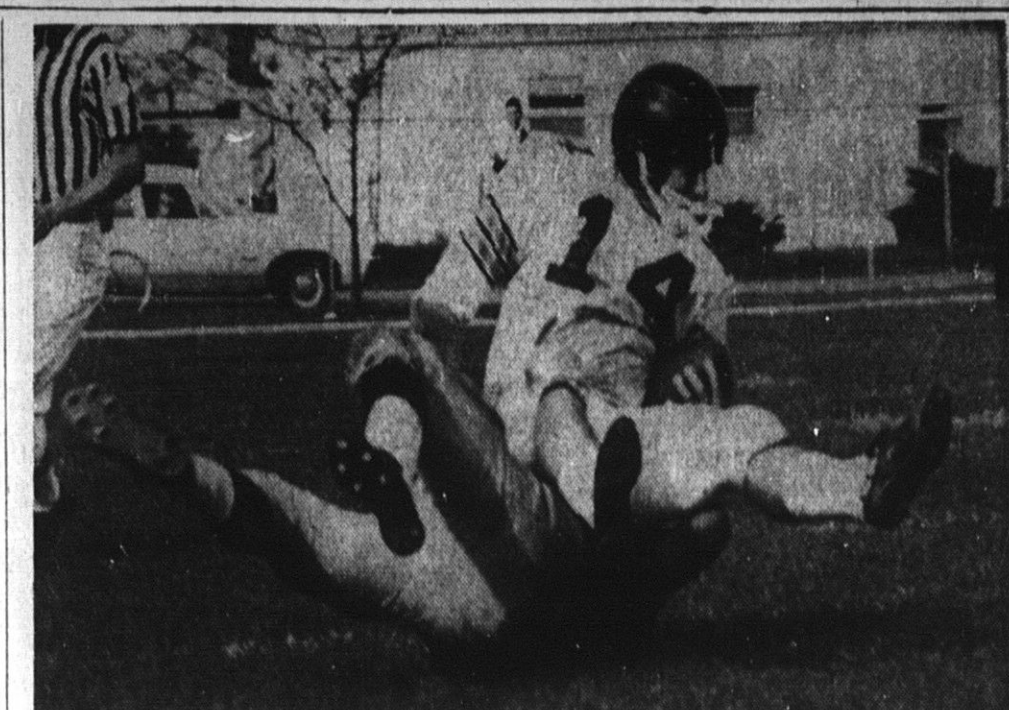
Hopkins served as Allegan township clerk for more than 25 years, was a former member of the Allegan Library Board, and also served for several years on the Babylon School Board.

Hope Dumped by Adrian 42-31; Mistakes Costly

ADRIAN — Hope College's football team found itself at the bottom of the MIAA here Saturday following a 42-31 loss to Adrian.

Adrian permeated the Hope defense at will throughout the game. Hope was without the services of two defensive starters, tackle Keith Van Tubergen and back Walter Reed. Offensive end Jim Roedvoets also did not see action.

Adrian was paced by the running of sophomore back Ron Labadie who gained 195 yards in 30 carries and scored three touchdowns.

Labadie scored Adrian's first touchdown at 10:38 of the first quarter following an Adrian recovery of a fumbled punt by Groy Kaper.

This was the first of three costly fumbles by the Flying Dutchmen who also saw Adrian take advantage of a pass interception to score.

Hope came back to drive 62 yards in 13 plays at 4:57 of the first quarter with Nate Bowles covering the final five yards for the score. Bill Bekkering's conversion tied the game.

Near the end of the quarter Kaper's second fumble of an Adrian punt gave the Bulldogs the ball at the Hope 24.

Four plays later Barry Beck bulldozed over from the one and after Mark Duddy made his second of six successful conversion attempts Adrian led 14-7.

At 9:20 of the second quarter Labadie ripped through the Dutch defense and raced 66 yards for the score putting Adrian ahead 21-7.

Hope came back with two touchdowns to tie the game at halftime.

The first came on a quarterback sneak by Kaper with 4:08 left in the half. The score followed a 39 yard kickoff return by Bowles and terminated a 41-yard drive in which Kaper hit on three passes.

With 0:44 left in the half Kaper threw a 22 yard touchdown pass to Bekkering. The score was set up by a Kaper to Bekkering pass of 36 yards.

At the beginning of the second half Hope got a break when Labadie fumbled on his own 19 yard line and Rich Frank recovered. Hope was unable to pick up a first down but Gary Frens booted a 32 yard field goal giving Hope the lead for the first time 24-21.

Hope regained the ball but Kaper was intercepted by Steve Rulewicz on Adrian's 48.

Quarterback Beck completed three of five passes the last to Greg Cady for 24 yards to the Hope one. Steve Rulewicz blasted in from that point to regain the lead for Adrian.

Early in the fourth quarter of the titanic offensive struggle Bill Leismer intercepted a Beck aerial at the Adrian 36. Eight plays later Kaper hit Bekkering with an eight yard scoring strike giving Hope the lead for the last time at 9:22 of the final quarter.

Adrian scored on a 60 yard drive with 6:22 remaining with Rulewicz covering the final three yards. Labadie gained 40 yards in the drive on two runs.

Hope still had a chance for victory with 5:39 showing on the clock and Adrian leading 35-31. However Dick Bont fumbled at the Hope 27 with Larry Merx recovering for the Bulldogs.

Seven plays later Labadie clinched the game for Adrian with a three yard scoring jaunt. Hope's defense, after looking strong in the first three games of the year, has allowed 76 points in two league games.

One bright spot for the Fly-

ing Dutchmen was the play of end Bekkering who caught seven passes for 107 yards and two touchdowns.

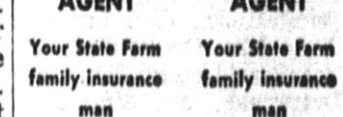

Community College Plan Outlined

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman outlined developments in the plan for an Ottawa-Allegan Community College for the Board of Education at the regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Plans call for an election, possibly early February of 1969, in three parts (1) approving a community college, (2) selecting seven trustees and (3) approving millage. This would be for the district covering Ottawa county, and Saugatuck, Allegan and Hamilton in Allegan county. This takes in 12 school districts.

The proposed local college would be one of 32 recommended in 32 districts in the state of Michigan. The local college would be a vocational-technical training school for high school and post high school students.

A minimum of 80 acres with options for further expansion is recommended in a site where water, electricity and sewage services are available. This site is to be selected by the board of trustees to be selected at large from the entire voting area in the district.

The feasibility study has pointed to an area which approximately \$500,000,000 in state equalized valuation, with a student population in excess of \$40,000. Curriculum could and would be based on local needs—not the needs of neighboring community college areas.

The college, designed to furnish vocational-technical training for high school students, dropouts and post high school age, would be open to public and nonpublic students alike, and would be offering a service not offered by Hope College, Grand Valley State College, Calvin or Aquinas Colleges.

The Ottawa County Intermediate Board has been committed to supporting the proposition for a community college to hire a secretary to assist in promotion, set aside a sum of money to assist, and has retained the services of an attorney for assisting in legal matters.

With 12 school districts involved in voting on the community college proposition, leaders are aware that the time for a vote cannot be satisfactory for all.

Another meeting of superintendents and top leaders will be held soon to finalize thinking.

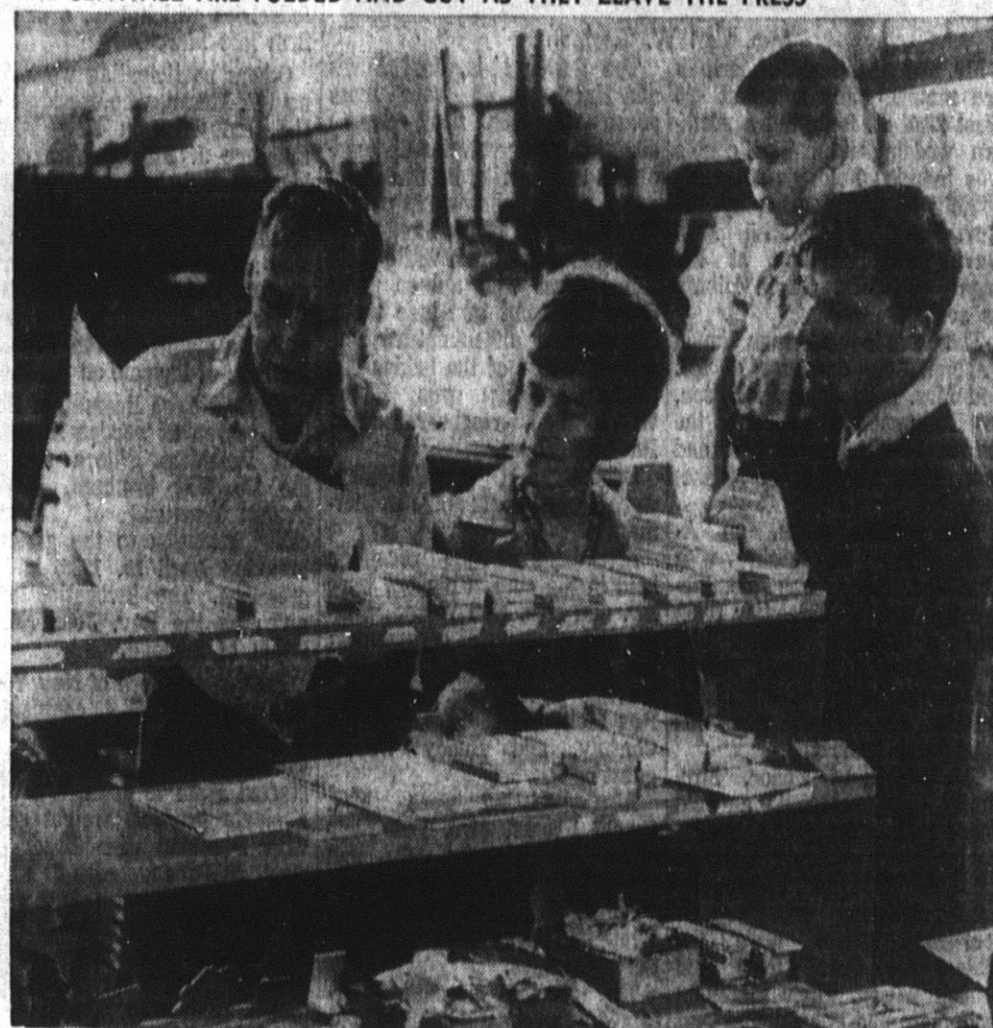

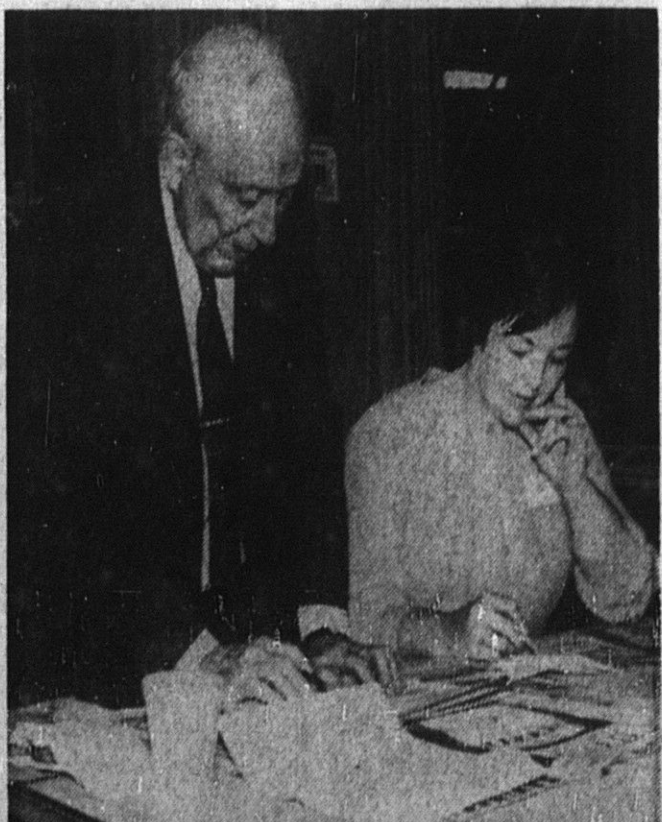

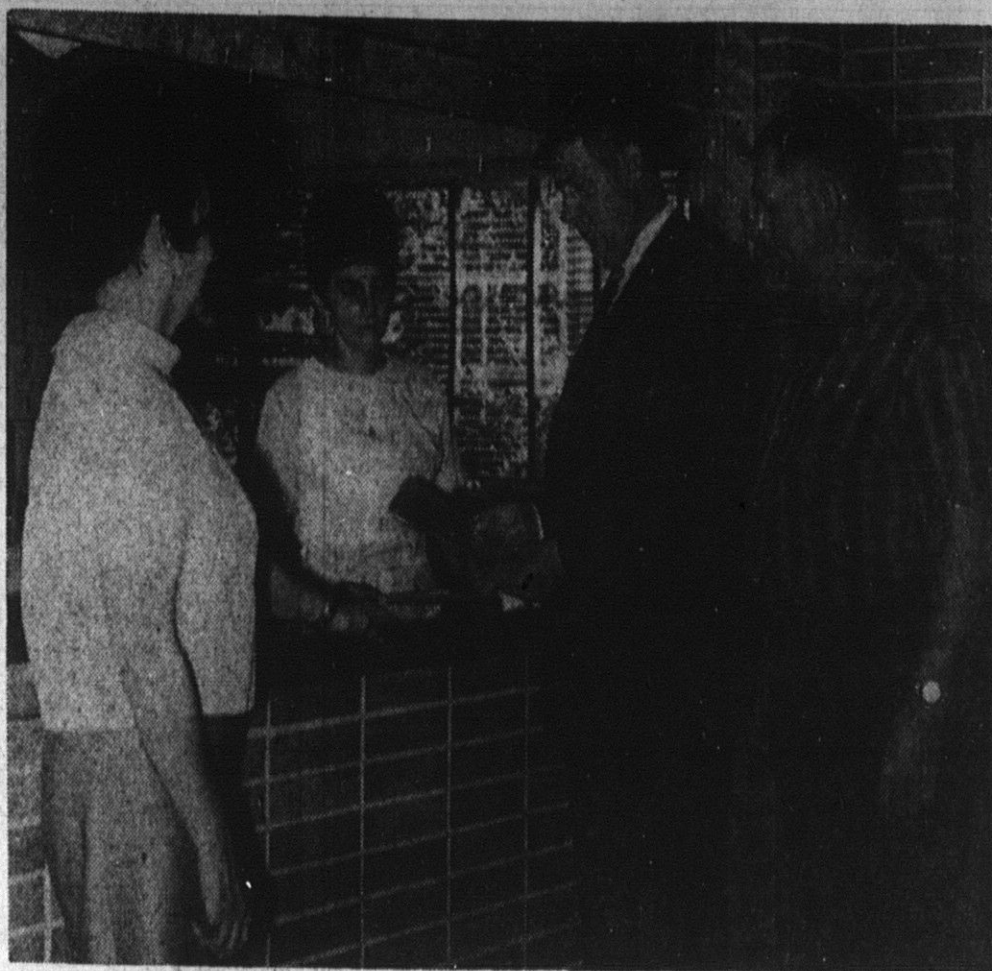

New School Budget Over \$3.4 Million

The Board of Education Monday night unanimously adopted a budget for 1968-69 calling for a total outlay of \$3,479,078.99.

The board was late this year in adopting the annual budget partly because of legal problems in annexing two more school districts. Last year's operating budget was \$2,728,288.

The greater share of revenue comes from \$2,061,282.14 in taxes, based on 20,445 mills on state equalized valuations. Holland city based on valuation of \$90,022,069 brings \$1,840,501.02; Harrington on \$4,441,052 in Park township brings \$90,797.31; Harrington on \$2,644,620 in Lake-town township brings \$54,069.29; and Federal in Holland township on \$5,770,679 brings \$117,981.53.

State aid and primary fund based on 5,425 students brings \$1,169,751.26 based on a net of \$215.62. Transportation under state aid brings \$14,613.66 and for special education under state aid, \$90,453.92, for a total from state sources of \$1,274,818.85.

Other revenue lists vocational education reimbursement, state, \$10,500; driver education reimbursement, state, \$13,500; county reimbursement, special education, \$30,000; delinquent taxes, \$21,000; West Ottawa-Zeeland co-op program reimbursement, \$21,000; West Ottawa reimbursement for conservation program, \$5,000; tuition, special education, \$2,500; interest on investments, \$30,000; NDEA reimbursement federal, \$7,900.

The budget lists a grand total for instruction of \$2,512,071.02. Broken down, this lists elementary instruction, \$1,289,667.11; conservation education, \$12,189.75; junior high instruction, \$378,677.98; junior high extra pay for special duties and athletic expenses, \$8,400; senior high instruction, \$603,311.18; senior high extra pay for special duties, \$15,805; extra pay for department chairmen, \$4,020.

Other budget items list special education, \$148,922; administration, \$138,494; health services, \$11,112; pupil transportation, \$23,760; operation of plant, \$335,342; maintenance of plant, \$107,287.50; fixed charges, \$61,000; capital outlay, \$43,795; community services, \$4,900; tuition to other districts, \$17,760; grand total for expenditures, \$3,401,443.52.

With estimated expenditures totaling \$3,401,443.52, the estimated balance June 30, 1968, is \$77,635.47.

Under the pupil transportation section was one item of \$9,000 on debt on three buses taken over from Harrington district. Herb Wiersma of Harrington pointed out that note should be taken that Harrington district had paid \$12,000 on the original expenditure for buses.

Regular teachers are slated to teach 182 days or 37 weeks for the current year. Principals, counselors and some specialists or consultants work up to 48 and 52 weeks.

Dutch Girl Begins Teaching At Allegan Day Care Center

ALLEGAN — She has the looks and intensity of a Swedish motion picture actress and the first thing you have to do is resist the temptation to ask the old "what's a girl like you doing in a place like this" question.

The question soon answers itself, however.

Margriet Vels, 23, late of Groningen, The Netherlands, is the new teacher at Precious Acres Day Care Center - operated by the Allegan County Association for retarded children - because she has a vocation and the love and affection it takes to follow it.

"In Europe," she will tell you, "less than a hundred years ago one could read actual newspaper stories about people coming across 'wolf boys' in rural France. There was always a great deal of speculation about their origin - were they really human? - that sort of thing."

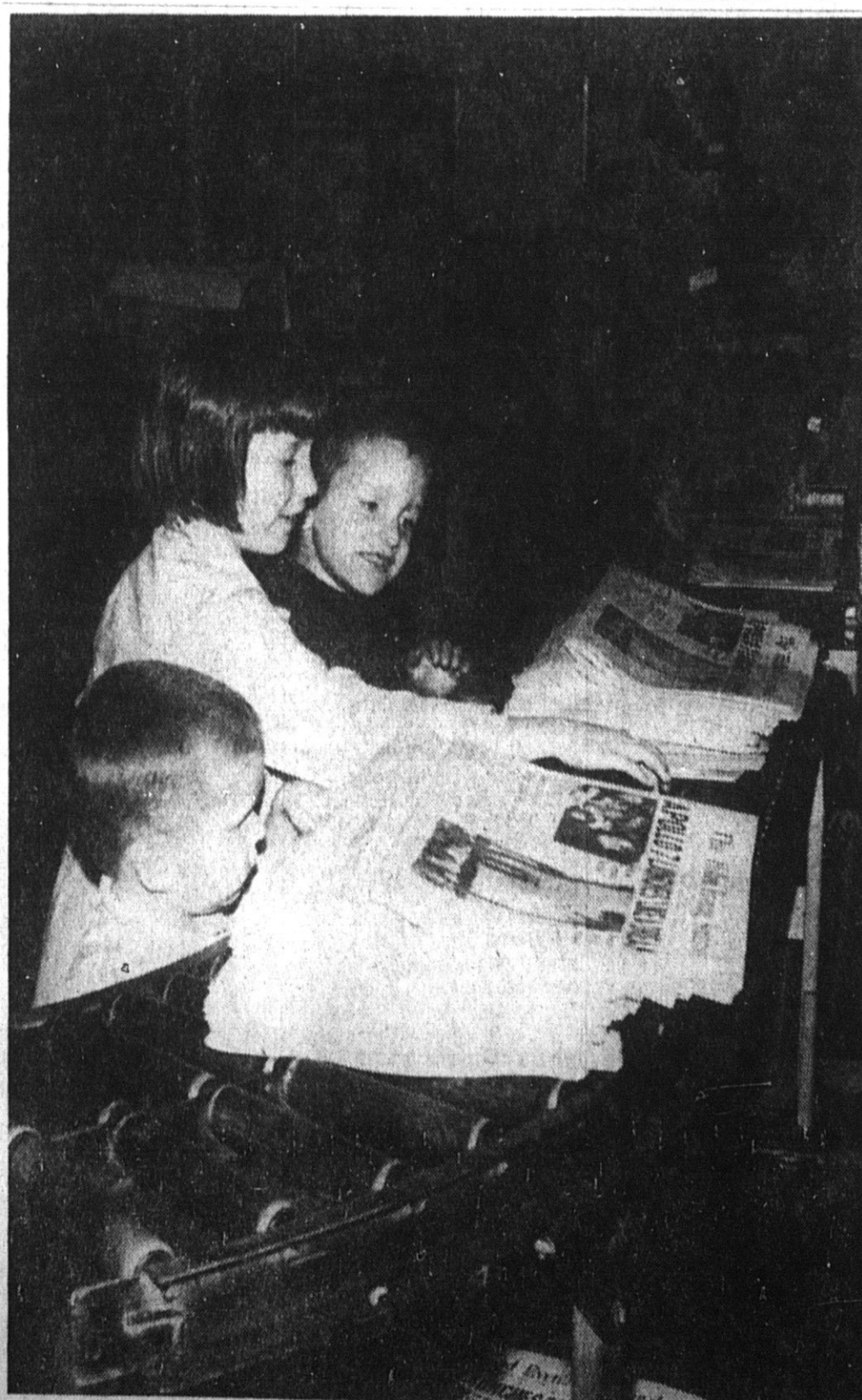
"Now, of course, we know they were simply retarded children . . . turned loose to fend for themselves like wild animals," she says.

"We have come a long way since then and I am proud and happy to have the chance to have a share of the work."

The stories of European "Wolf Boys" obviously played a substantial part in Margriet Vels' choice of a career. In the Netherlands, state - supported associations for retarded children operated six large hospitals similar to such institutions as the Coldwater State Home and Training School. They offered a three-year course in working with the retarded and Margriet took advantage of it.

The course included classroom studies in psychology, sociology and related subjects, plus the opportunity to work with the children.

The nine day care center "graduates" will be moving into a third room recently completed at Allegan's Hudson Corners School which will be taught by Miss Jane Kapenga of Holland. Until the class is formed, Miss Kapenga has been working with Miss Vels at the day care center. Margriet will not be alone after the transfer, however, since Mrs. Betty Phillips, of Otsego, a long-time assistant at Precious Acres, will remain on the job.

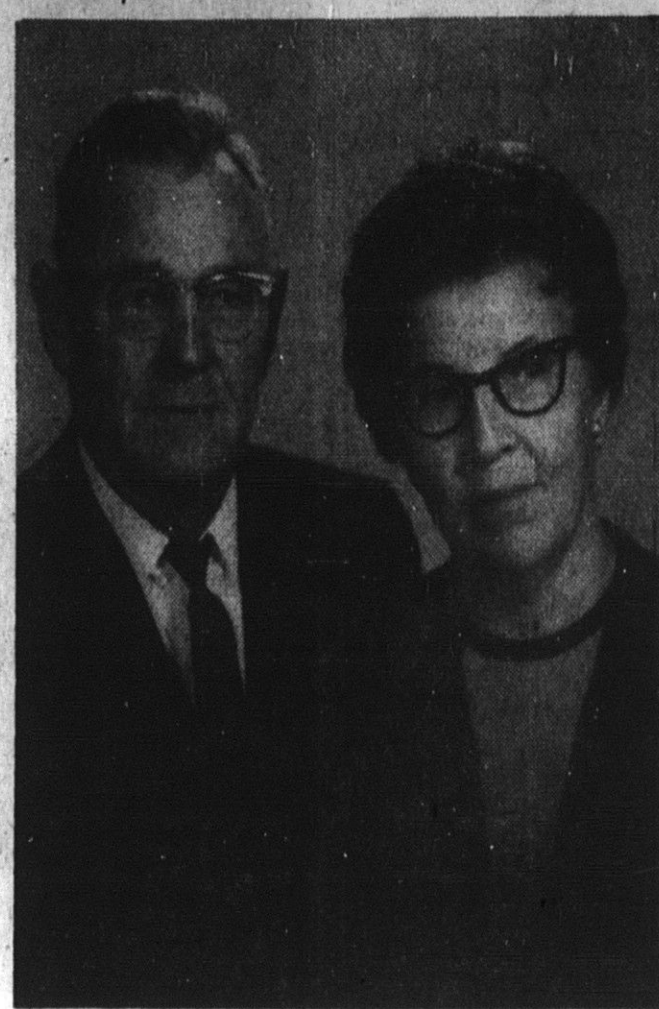
