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County OKs New District Court Bids

GRAND HAVEN—Because of spiraling costs and high bids the county district court building, to be erected in conjunction with a new city police building at Holland, will cost the county more than \$300,000, compared with the estimate made last year of \$225,000.

The lowest bid submitted for the county building, to be erected on the present site of the fire and police building on West Eighth St., was \$286,150 and by a vote of 14 to 3 Monday the Board of Commissioners executed the contract with the Wyoming contractors, Ter Horst and Rinzena.

Chairman William Kennedy of the board reported that the land to be occupied by the building cost the county \$30,000 and architects' fees will amount to \$17,000, bringing the cost to more than \$300,000. Many north Ottawa residents have objected to payment of even the \$200,000 figure for a courtroom and offices for the south half of the county.

The Holland district court is now using offices in city hall. But the city needs the space on the second floor of the hall for offices for the board of public works.

The improvement committee headed by Franklin Schmidt of Coopersville, met with Kammeraad, Stroop and Vander Leek of Holland, architects, Wednesday and attempted to revise the cost of the structure. But Monday the committee recommended that a full basement, partially unfinished, be included in the contract. A section of the basement must be included as it houses mechanical equipment.

The board passed three resolutions, one being execution of the contract. The other two authorized payments of money at various periods during construction and authorization of minor changes in the building plans by the committee and the architects.

Holland city officials and county officials will hold a formal contract signing at Holland this week.

Roger G. Zeef, director of county water utilities, appeared before the board to explain the county's part in \$1,300,000 water system in Holland township.

Extensions from the Wyoming treatment plant and pipeline, in which the county has 15 per cent capacity interest, are expected soon and action on a resolution prepared by the water and sanitation committee, was postponed until the next meeting of the board to-day at 1:30 p.m. The project will be financed by a \$1,300,000 20-year bond issue.

A hearing was held on the \$3,651,909 general operation budget for county operations for 1971 but there was no one present from the general public. Chairman Kennedy formally announced the hearing closed.

The board voted to endorse an application being prepared by Holland city for funds from the state recreation bond funds. Holland city plans to develop Washington school playground as a recreation area for all ages. The location is at 11th Street and Maple Ave. Funds may be available from the second phase of the state bonding program. No county funds will be used in the project but the city officials sought the endorsement of the county board. The project was explained by Donald Stoltz, Holland, of the recreation committee.

Bert Schuitema, chairman of the sheriff's committee, urged board members to attend the open house at the county juvenile department's new "Group House" at Grand Haven Wednesday afternoon. The project is a community effort to house wayward youths who have encountered difficulty, rather than to send them to some institution. Muskegon county and other county officials are watching the project closely, he said.

Veterans Day Observance Here Monday

Veterans Day will be observed in Holland Monday, Oct. 25.

Selection of Monday for certain holidays comes under a federal Monday Holiday Law which has placed Washington's Birthday the third Monday in February, Memorial Day the last Monday in May, Labor Day the first Monday in September, Columbus Day the second Monday in October and Veterans Day the fourth Monday in October.

Holland post office will have no city or rural deliveries and no window service on that day. Services that will be provided are special delivery mail, lobby open for lock box customers and stamp vending machines, and box collection once during the day in addition to the regular evening collection.

Local banking institutions will be closed for the day. Courts also will be closed.

Holland High School is planning its traditional Veterans Day program at 10:15 a.m. that day.

Drivers Learn New Street Plan

Operations of Holland's one-way street system, in its second day, Tuesday was under study as officials attempted to iron out some rough edges concerning signing and parking.

Generally police officials said the system worked well but some motorists complained of traffic tieups along Pine Ave. between River Ave. and Seventh St.

Parking was eliminated temporarily on Seventh and Ninth Sts., pending completion of necessary traffic control signing.

Police Lt. Gene Geib said plans called for the parking ban to be lifted as soon as possible after full traffic control can be maintained.

Until July 1, 1972, parking is to be allowed generally along the north sides of Seventh and Ninth Sts. After that date, plans call for all parking to be eliminated along the one way streets.

GRAND HAVEN — A "Save Our Sand Dunes" committee has been formed in the Grand Haven area and a fund has been set up to accept contributions from persons and groups who wish to assist in the effort.

"The committee is interested in stopping or controlling sand mining in north Ottawa," Doug Tjapkes, Grand Haven, chairman, said. "The goal is to save the wooded hills and rolling dunes, which are precious to many residents, between Grand Haven and Lake Michigan. We fear they may be leveled in the next 15 to 30 years."

HEA Okays Three-Year Contract

The Holland Education Association Thursday afternoon ratified a three-year master agreement following six months of negotiations with the Holland Board of Education. The vote was 151-14. About 100 members were not present.

The contract had been approved unanimously by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night.

The agreement covers all non-economic items for three years but has an opening clause for salary and extra pay duty items for the 1972-73 year and the 1973-74 year.

The salary schedule carries an increase of approximately 6 per cent, subject to wage-price freeze regulations.

The schedule for teachers with bachelor's degrees starts at \$7,870 and moves up in 12 steps to \$11,580. Teachers with master's degrees start at \$8,310 and advance in 13 steps to \$13,140. Teachers currently are paid on the 1970-71 schedule under the wage-price freeze.

New sections added to the contract this year are binding arbitration on the grievance procedure (for 1972-73) and staff personnel reduction procedures.

Anniversary Emblem Art Contest Set

The three local high schools are participating in an art contest for a symbol for Holland's 125th anniversary celebration in 1972.

The anniversary committee at its monthly meeting Tuesday night was informed that art departments in Holland High School, Holland Christian High School and West Ottawa High School will be promoting the contest among their students. There will be awards for winning students and an award to the school. Plans call for selecting the design about Dec. 1.

This design will be used on bulletin covers for local churches Feb. 6, 1972, the Sunday closest to Feb. 9, the date Dr. A. C. Van Raalte and his scouting party arrived in this area in 1847. The emblem also will be used on the program of a community religious program Feb. 6 in Dimment Memorial Chapel on Hope campus.

The emblem also will be on the 1972 Tulip Time programs and the festival itself will have a historical theme. Following the "umbrella" concept in which activities throughout the year will be geared to the anniversary, the emblem will have many uses including the possibilities of flags pennants and related objects.

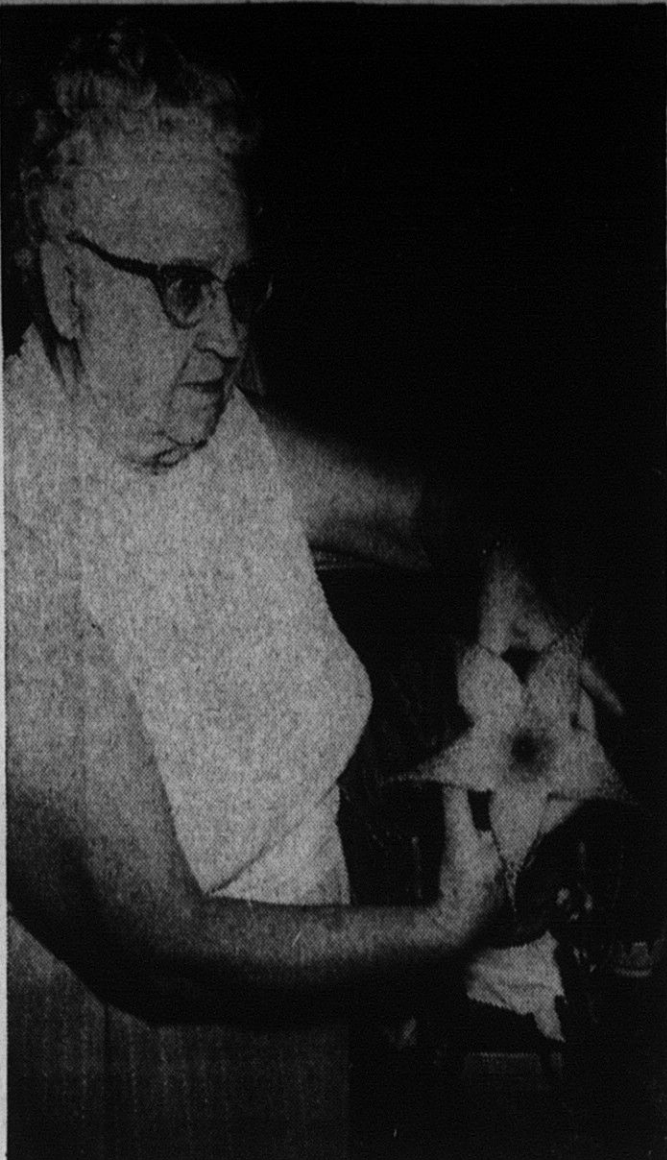
Saturday's program will close with a period of challenge and commitment with Rev. Sergy.

Seek Petitions For Beer Sale In Zeeland

ZEELAND. — Circulation of petitions regarding a city ordinance prohibiting sale of beer and wine in the city was planned by a resident who was turned down earlier for a beer and wine takeout license, city council was informed Monday.

An attorney for Elwin Van Ommen submitted a letter and a copy of the petition for initiative and referendum regarding the 1912 ordinance. The petitions ask council to rescind the ordinance or put the issue to a public vote.

The petitions are to be circulated within 30 days of receipt of the petitions by the city attorney who is to study them for proper wording.

Van Ommen had sought an SDM license for the sale of beer and wine in the city but was turned down by council. The petitions require signatures of 290 registered voters in the city, representing 15 per cent of the registered voters who voted for governor in the last state election, city clerk Leon Van Harn said.

A new city government position would be created under the Emergency Employment Act which provides federal funds for a program of hiring the unemployed.

Council Monday approved a contract with Ottawa county which administers the program. Federal funds would cover 90 per cent of the cost or about \$30,000.

Under the program, one of the six positions in municipal government would be city assessor and building inspector. Other jobs would be for the police department, a wastewater treatment operator, power plant operator, water distribution man, and an electrical lineman.

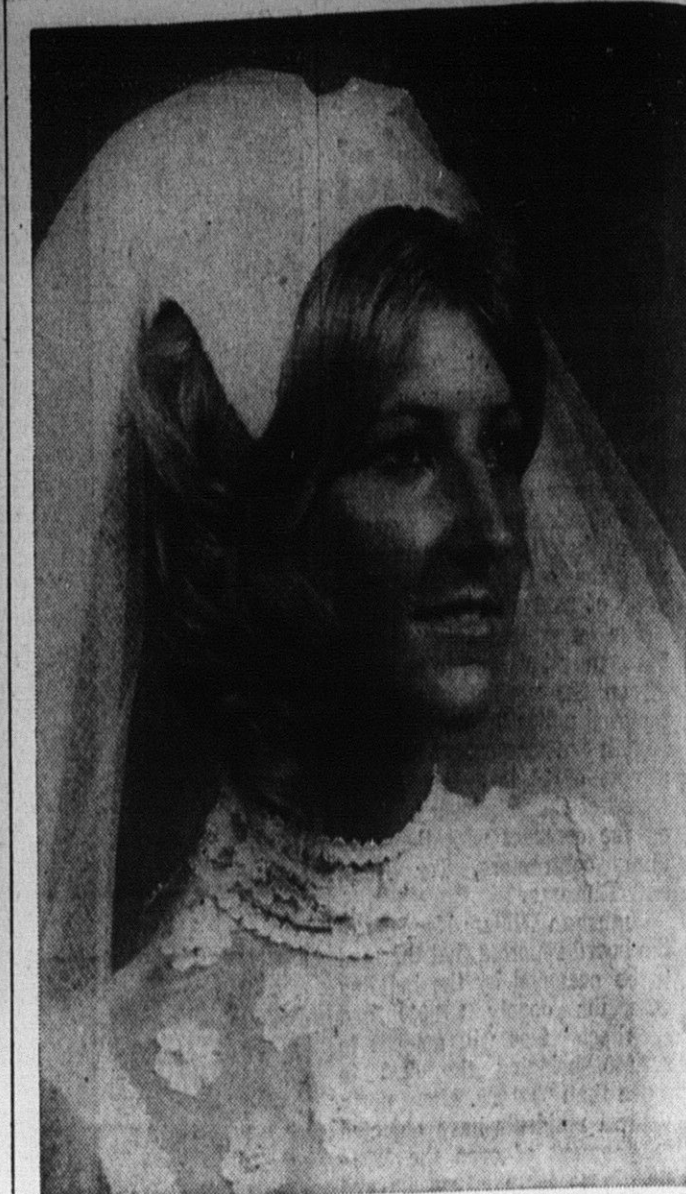

Fulton Lewis Impresses Literary Club Members

Members of the Woman's Literary Club "met Fulton Lewis III" at their regular meeting Tuesday afternoon and agreed that the personable news analyst and commentator hit the nail on the head with the questions he answered from the floor.

In his opening remarks he complimented the women for having the foresight to include a news analyst (not necessarily him) as a part of their program and for giving the high school students the opportunity to ask

questions that have been bothering them. He said they asked many intelligent questions about the state of the world and he was "very impressed" with their attentiveness.

Lewis pointed out that a high school audience is one of the hardest to address because they are probing and challenging. He said a speaker must not pretend to "know it all." Students must be dealt with delicately and the hope is that they and the speaker arrive at the right conclusions together at the right time.

The advice he gave the 3,500 students in his four talks Monday and Tuesday was to become active and involved in affairs of their city, state and nation.

Using as an example of how youth can be a determining force for good, he told of Barry Goldwater's personal popularity in the 1963-64 years and then in 1968 only four years later the swing to Eugene McCarthy, pointing out that young people are not necessarily fickle but that they were impressed by both men because they were candid and did not lie about issues.

In all phases of government and other affairs, they demand "Give us honest leadership," he said.

Mr. Lewis is impressed with the honesty of the present administration. He outlined many ways the public is gaining confidence in leadership. He noted the cooling off on the nation's campuses lately indicating that students are recognizing the fact that promises are being kept.

In answering questions from the floor, the speaker said that although student dissenters are usually leftists, this is not always true. They are sitting on the fence in the Vietnam war.

In answering the question on registering 18-year-olds for voting, he said it was the responsibility of the Republicans and Democrats to make registration accessible and available to all.

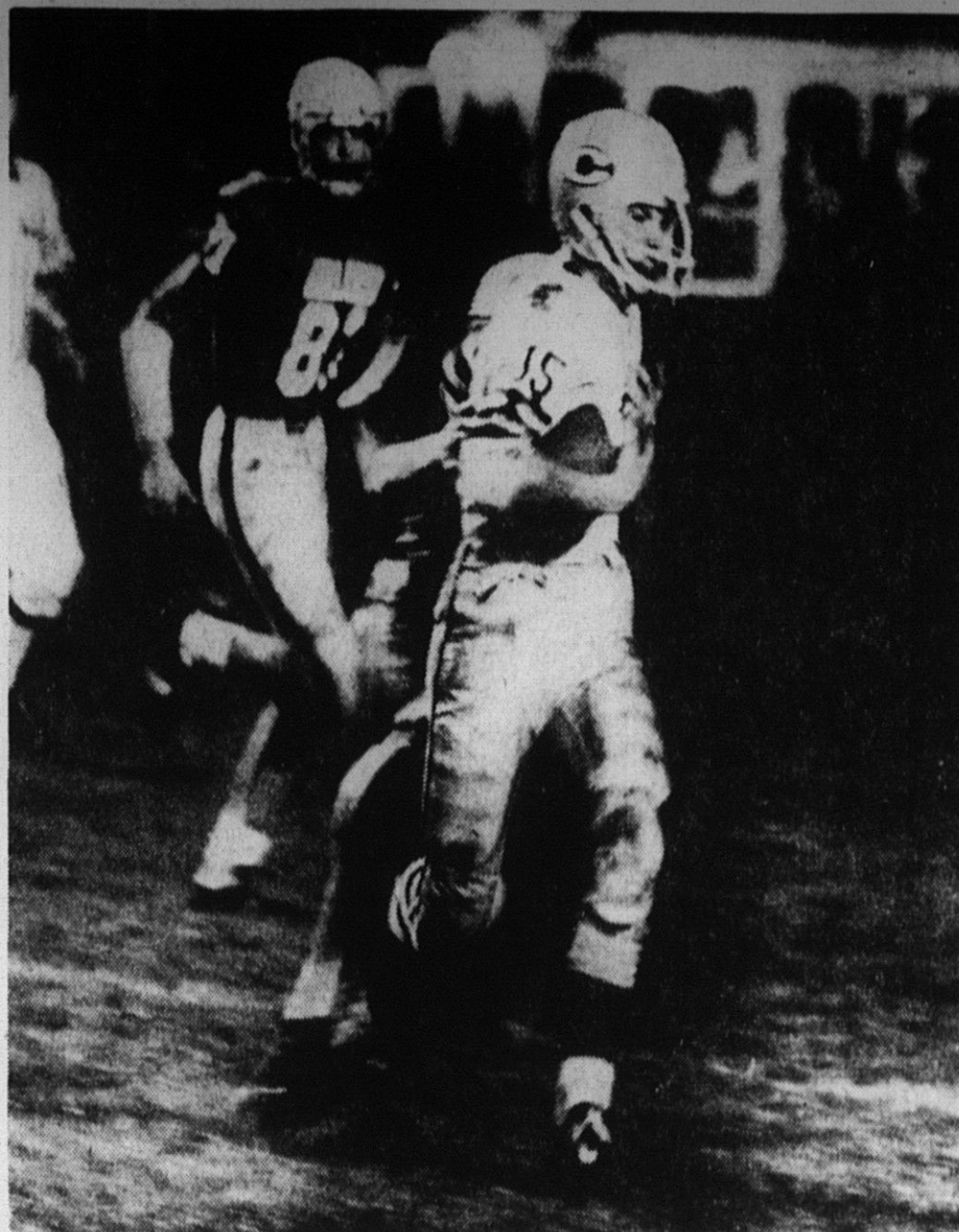

The win was the fourth in five outings for Coach Joe Mc Gee's Polar Bears while the loss broke Holland's two-game winning streak and gives the Dutch a season mark of 3-2.

"They were the best team we have played all season," said Coach Dave Kempker. "They really stuck us on defense."

However, Holland's defense stood out too as they stopped several Creston scoring bids throughout the entire game.

The 15th rated Polar Bears held Holland to only one first down through the first three quarters and to five for the evening while picking up 13 first downs themselves.

"We never had field position all night," continued Kempker. "Our defense kept us in the game but we'll get going again on offense."

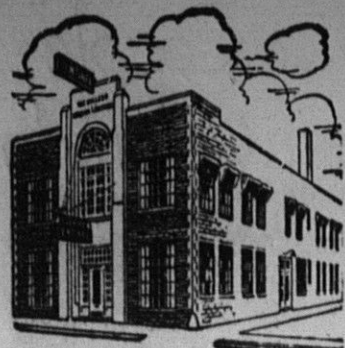

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 24

God Heals Broken Humanity
Isaiah 61:1-4; Colossians 1:21-23
By C. P. Dame

Every news item we hear today tells us that humanity is broken and needs healing. Neither science nor education have made a contribution to the healing of mankind. The Bible tells us that God through Jesus Christ can and is healing humanity.

I. Jesus knew what His mission was. "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me"—these words were spoken by Isaiah the prophet who gave a message to the exiled Jews who were hoping to return to their own land where they were on account of their sins. Isaiah wrote these words 700 years before Christ who used these words in His sermon in the synagogue in Nazareth.

After Christ had read the passage He closed the book and gave it back to the attendant and then said, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." Undoubtedly His hearers did not fully realize the full meaning of those words. We will apply these words to Jesus.

The Lord claimed divine authority and He says that He was anointed for a definite purpose. What He says in this statement He did in His ministry. The words, "to preach," "to bind," "to proclaim," "to comfort," "to appoint," "to give" all tell what Jesus did all through His few years of life.

Note too the people to whom Jesus ministered — the meek, the brokenhearted, the captives. The gospel is meant for the people mentioned. Does the church today present a message to the kind of people who are described by these words? The people mentioned by Isaiah and later by Jesus are with us today and they need the message of hope the prophet and Jesus gave in their day. Jesus knew His mission and ministered to the needy.

II. The gospel changes people. The second part of the lesson text is from Paul's letter to the church at Colossae, which he had not founded but in which he was deeply interested. In this epistle Paul sets forth the greatness of Christ before the new Christians who had come from paganism. These people had experienced a change—once they had been rebels but now they were children of God. Once they were sinners, now they were saints. Through Christ they had been transferred from darkness to light, from death to life. Paul called them to holiness, warning them against the temptations of their times and urging them to stand for the faith.

We live in a time when there are many opportunities offered us to teach and preach the gospel. Let us use them faithfully, so that the broken may be healed.

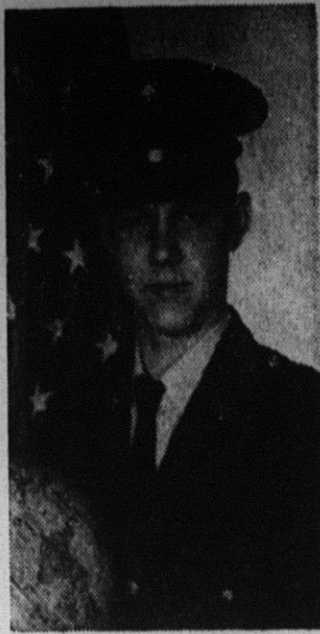

50-60 Hired In Emergency Job Program

GRAND HAVEN — Fifty to 60 employees have been hired under the Federal Emergency Employment Act in Ottawa county, Larry Hildore of Holland, director of social welfare in the county, reported to the Board of Commissioners Tuesday. The county has funds for 112 positions, he said.

The six cities in the county, one village, three townships and nine school districts have been given slots in the program, Hildore said. By next week, he said, 75 will be given jobs, and the full maximum number will be employed in two weeks.

The county applied for \$691,000 in EEA funds in August and state funds totaling \$56,400 have been allocated. Under section 6 of the program, Ottawa has applied for \$343,540 additional and this application is awaiting Department of Labor approval at Chicago. This will make possible the addition of 54 employees in the county.

Holland city and the hospital will hire 22 persons under the emergency program, including two detectives, two patrolmen, a housing inspector, a personal property appraiser, a computer operator-trainee, three typist-clerks, a security guard, a director of volunteers at the hospital, one engineer's assistant, three laborers, a building custodian, a police desk clerk, a draftsman, an administrative aide, an account clerk and a programmer trainee.

Grand Haven has been allotted two patrolmen, an appraiser, a typist - clerk and one housing inspector and North Ottawa Hospital will receive a cashier, an insurance clerk, a messenger, a custodian aide and a dark room attendant.

Grand Haven schools will use four elementary teachers and three teacher aides and Spring Lake will hire two study hall supervisors, a library aide, two teacher aides and a curriculum secretary. Ferrysburg city will hire a community development coordinator. West Ottawa jobs list a system consultant, a special service teacher, a high school night custodian and a maintenance carpenter.

Ottawa sheriff's department will add five deputies, two cadets, a matron-clerk and a maintenance man for the jail. The board spent most of its session Tuesday as a committee studying the proposed budget for 1972 and adjourned until Monday afternoon.

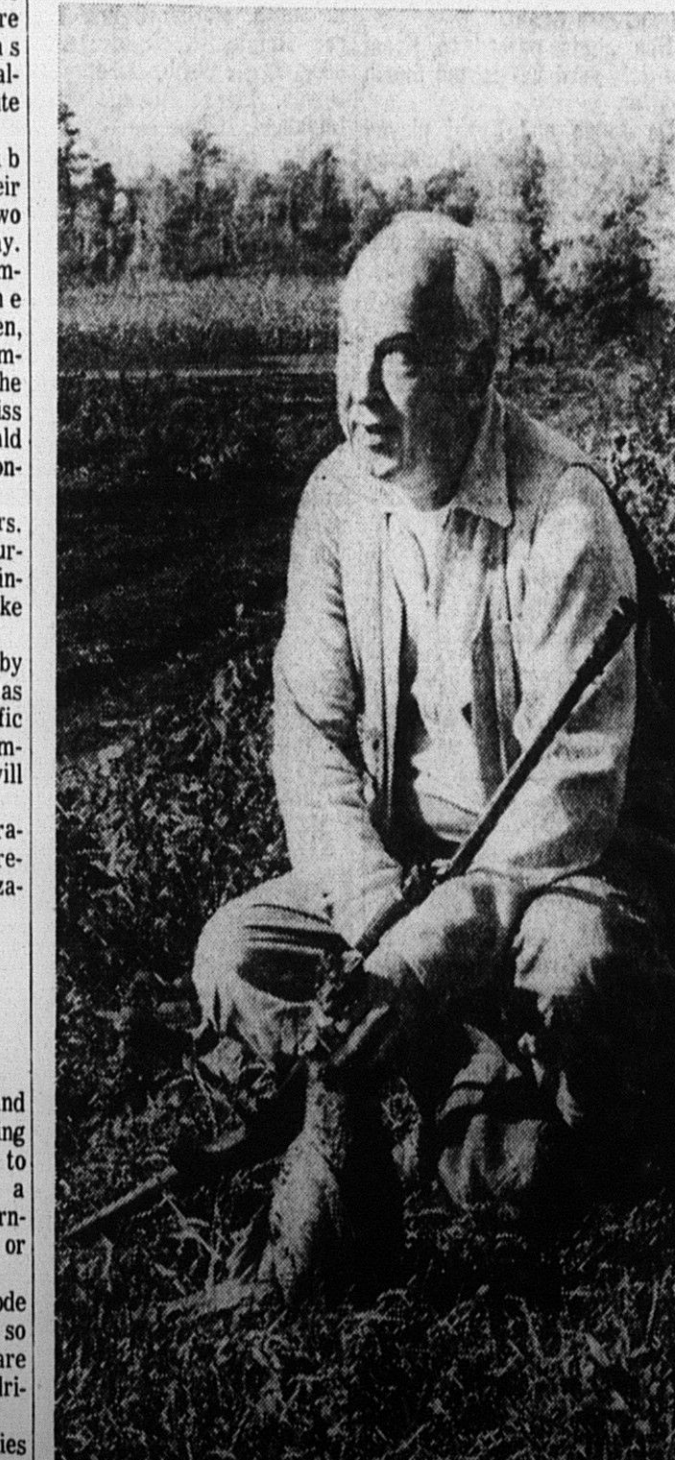

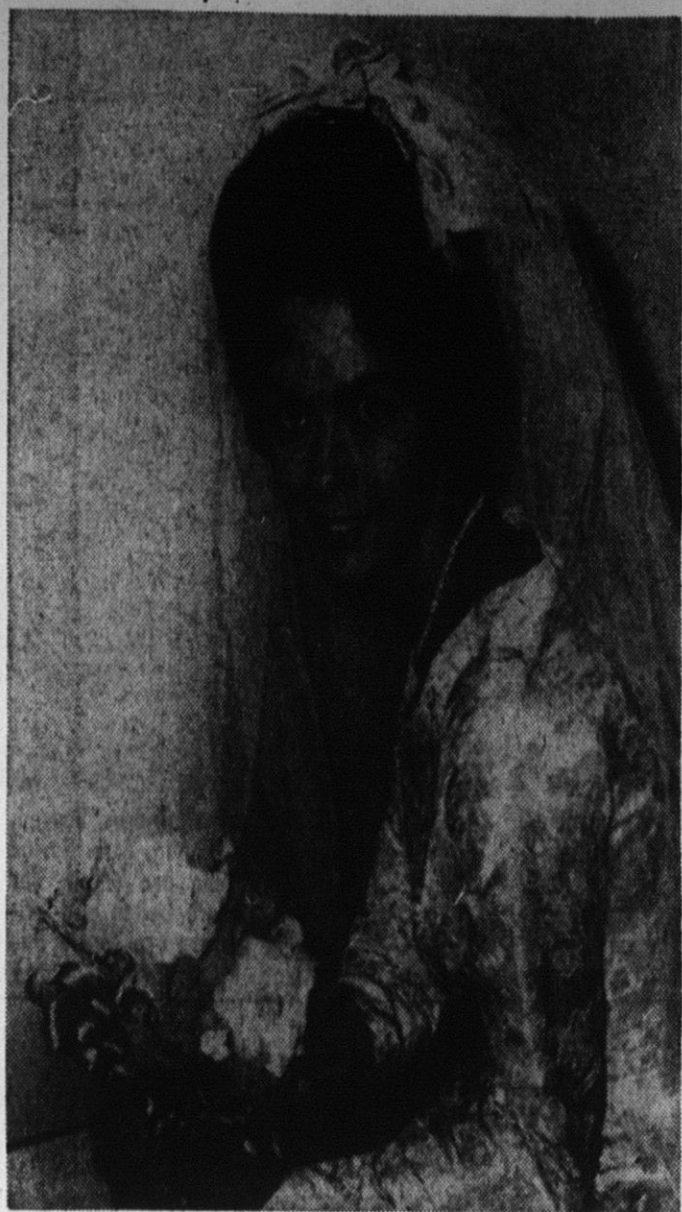

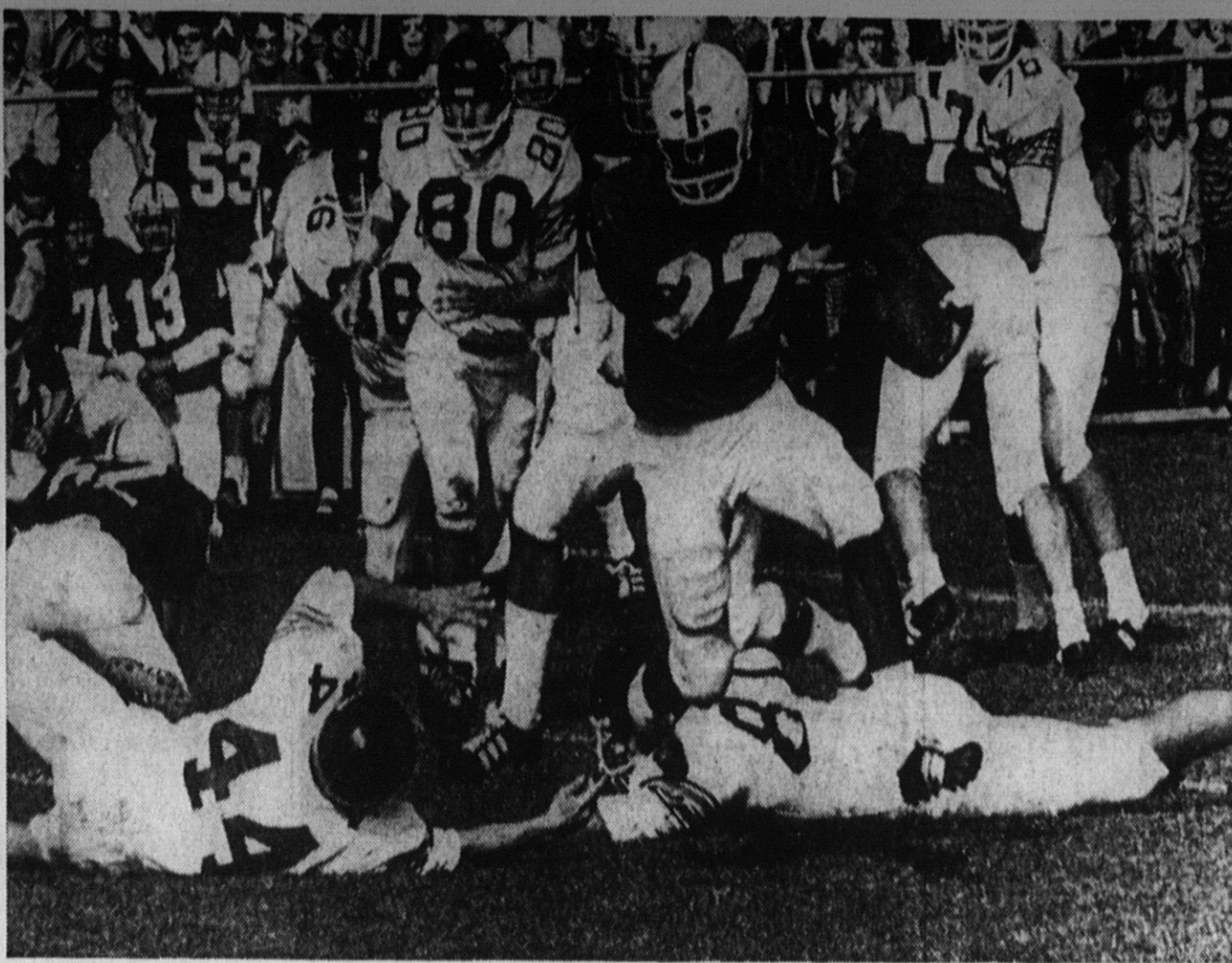

Voss Gains 197 Yards For Dutchmen

OLIVET — Surprising Olivet College — defying the pre-season pollsters who picked them to occupy the MIAA football cellar this fall—leads the league today on the basis of its 20-7 upset triumph over Hope College Saturday afternoon.

The Comets utilized the speed of their running backs, especially freshman tailback Bob Christman, in posting their third victory in four outings.

Coach Ray Smith's Dutchmen slipped to 2-3 overall and 1-1 in the MIAA. Hope shares second place in the standings with Alma, Adrian and Kalamazoo.

Christman, a Chicago product, scored three touchdowns on runs of 55, 24 and 50 yards. The 160-pounder ended with 143 yards in only nine carries and grabbed one pass for another 27 yards.

Hope, which had limited its last two foes to under 200 total yards of offense, allowed the Comets 310 yards on the ground (201 during the first half) and another 32 in the air.

Defeat overshadowed another brilliant running effort by Hope sophomore Greg Voss. The tailback gained 197 yards in 37 carries to rebound from a sub-par performance a week earlier against Albion when he was limited to 60 yards. Voss entered the game ranked the nation's eighth-leading small college rusher with a 140.2 yard per game average.

Olivet successfully executed several counter plays that repeatedly caught the Dutchmen flat-footed in pulling to a 21-0 lead before a delighted homecoming day crowd.

Hope's first offensive series set the tempo for the day. The Dutchmen took the opening kickoff and were moving the ball when Jon Constant's pass was intercepted on the Olivet 12 yard line by Comet Earl Moore. Olivet was forced to punt after three downs, but so were the Dutchmen on their next series.

Christman got the Comets on the scoreboard on a second down and four situation with a 55 yard jaunt into the end zone. Hal Hooks kicked the first of four successful conversions.

Ed Sanders' 35 yard kickoff return gave Hope good field position, but a penalty and two incomplete passes again forced the Dutchmen to punt.

Olivet moved to Hope's 25 on eight plays before Christman again executed the counter play and raced untouched into the end zone.

Hope's biggest first half threat came in the last minute of the second period, but the Dutchmen were stopped on downs on the Olivet nine. Olivet needed only to run out the clock to preserve the three touchdown bulge.

Olivet was forced to punt after receiving the second half kickoff and the Dutchmen marched 54 yards in 12 plays before Constant connected with end Jim Lamer from the four for a touchdown. Mike Hinga kicked the extra point.

Hope's catchup strategy after that was one frustration after another. The Dutchmen limited Olivet to only four first downs in the last 30 minutes of play, but several of their own drives were stalled.

The Dutchmen were trying one last drive when a third Constant pass was intercepted by Moore with 5:18 remaining to be played. A first down run by Christman lost three yards, but he came back with the exact same play and this time ran 50 yards for the game clinching touchdown.

Constant ended with 30 yards in eight carries. Smith used seven different ball carriers in the contest.

Jim Lamer caught four passes for 31 yards as Constant completed only five of 12 tries, Bob

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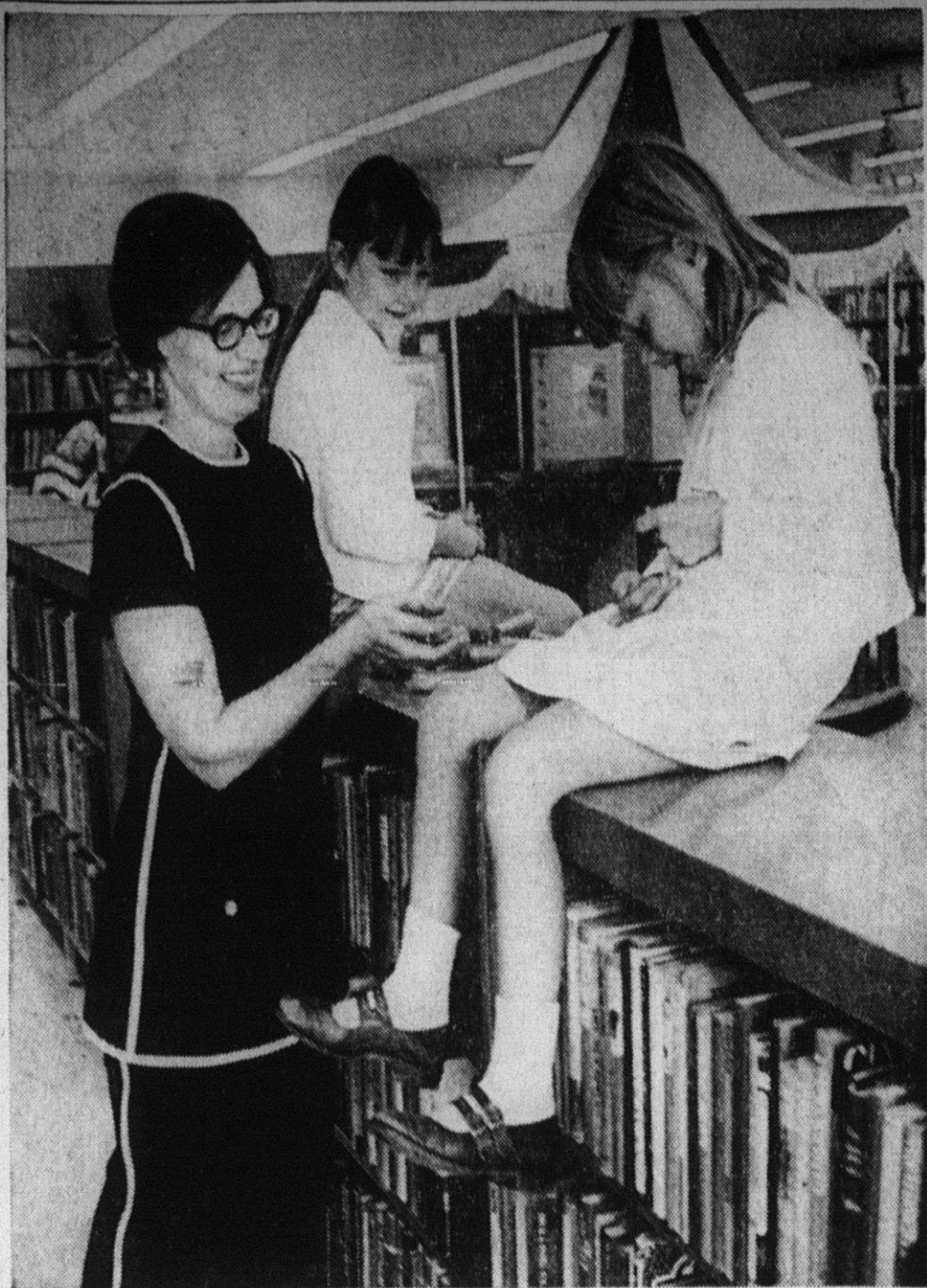

Dr. D. Heerema Talks to AAUW On U.S. Economy

In an attempt to give relief to the economy, the President has proposed a Price Administration Board. This board, rather than the market place, will determine prices. In other words, the Price Administration Board will determine who will pay for the comfort and greed of others and the 1972 elections will determine the Price Administration Board.

Colorful Pheasant Released in 1895

Spot Marked By Boulder North of City

Include Game Birds In Hunting Season First Time in 1925

Six miles north of Holland stands a stone marker on the spot where Chinese ringneck pheasants were first released in 1895.

A good share of small game hunters who pursued the colorful cocks on opening day Wednesday may thank Arthur G. Baumgartel of Holland who had the foresight back in 1895 to introduce the game bird to the local area.

The marker is at the northwest corner of 136th Ave. and Van Buren St. in Olive township.

It reads "This boulder commemorates the first planting of pheasants in Michigan. They were released near this spot by A. G. Baumgartel of Holland, Michigan, March 27, 1895. Erected by the Holland Fish and Game Club, Holland Pointer and Setter Club, November, 1940."

According to information researched by William H. Vande Water of Holland and as chronicled in 1895 in the Ottawa County Times, a weekly now long out of print, Baumgartel was secretary-treasurer of the Holland Rod and Gun Club. He and his brother Henry had been encouraged by their father, William Baumgartel, in outdoor sportsmanship and conservation. Arthur took up hunting partly because of an illness which required he be outdoors as much as possible.

After watching the quail disappear in 1890 and knowing the native ruffed grouse would not thrive in open farm country, he thought of the pheasant as a possible game bird to fill the agricultural fields of Southern Michigan. Oregon and some eastern states had enjoyed some success with the Chinese Ringneck pheasant.

With Ben Van Raalte, grandson of Holland's founder, Baumgartel conferred with Emerson Hough of Chicago, famous naturalist, on whether the Hungarian partridge or the ringneck pheasant would thrive best. The pheasant won.

Together Baumgartel and Van Raalte built pens to rear pheasants, solicited funds and talked former State Rep. Isaac Marsilje of Holland into sponsoring legislation for the protection of the birds.

First birds were ordered from Oregon but authorities there ruled against exportation of their pheasants. Baumgartel was stubborn and persistent. He finally got some birds from a breeding farm in New Jersey Aug. 4, 1893.

The Holland Rod and Gun Club was formed with M. G. Manting as president, Henry Kiekintveld as vice president and Baumgartel as secretary-treasurer.

On March 27, 1895, Baumgartel in company with Harry R. Doesburg liberated two pairs of pheasants at the Olive township site. No cameras were present to record the flight of the first bird — a young rooster.

More pheasants were freed at various times and places until 1899 when Baumgartel, a railroad clerk, moved to Grand Rapids.

In 1917 the state game department took up the project and started its first state game farm at Mason. In 1925, the first hunting season on pheasants was held in Michigan.

Dr. Otto van der Velde delivered the dedication speech when the stone was unveiled Nov. 2, 1940. Baumgartel, who died in 1949, was present at the dedication and told how the ringnecks came to Michigan. He had continued his interests in conservation through the years and served as secretary of the Izaak Walton League in Grand Rapids for many years.

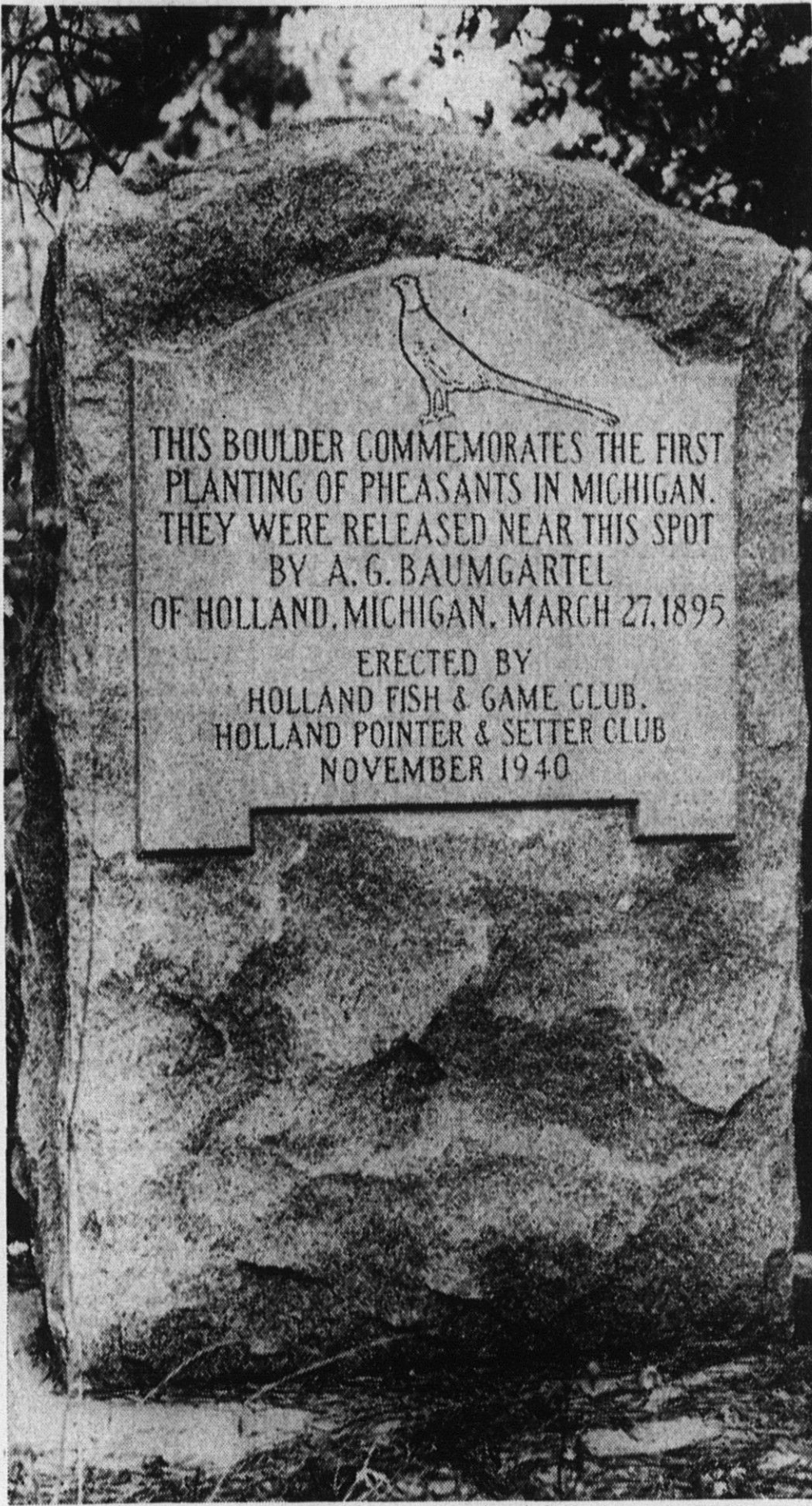

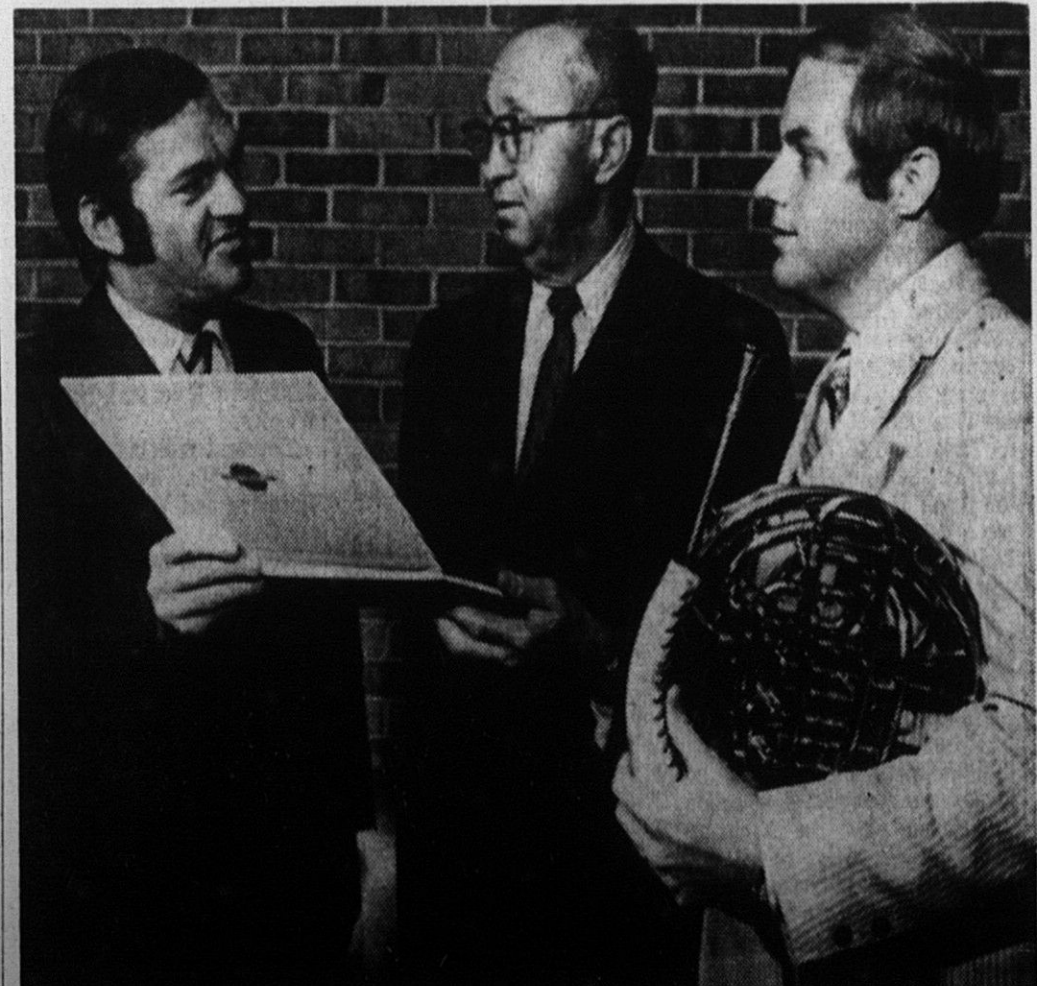

Fulton Lewis III Poses New Answer to Militants

An effective answer aimed at balancing the great appeal of the militant revolutionary on campus today was posed by Fulton Lewis III, news analyst and producer of documentaries, at a public meeting in Civic Center Monday night, sponsored by the Woman's Literary Club.

The Committee for Responsible Dialogue, he said, is a group of articulate young people including his friend and neighbor, U. S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt of Michigan's 9th district (including Ottawa county) who are willing to confront a Rennie Davis, a Jerry Rubin or a William Kunstler in debates on the campuses of the nation.

The radio commentator explained the Committee for Responsible Dialogue after relating a dramatic incident last December at St. Cloud State College in Minnesota in which he and two others successfully challenged three revolutionaries, Rennie Davis, Jennifer Dorne and John Froines in a campus seminar. The final indignity was action by students not to pay the revolutionaries because they had not fulfilled the contract.

"You don't win debates; the other side loses," Lewis told the audience. "But think of the many, many appearances on campuses by revolutionaries who are not challenged!"

Concern over this lack led to the Committee for Concerned Dialogue, a nonpartisan group reflecting many ideologies working within the system. Vander Jagt is one of three Congressmen in the group.

The idea is that when a William Kunstler is scheduled for a campus appearance, the CCD approaches leaders with the idea of a debate — Kunstler vs. William Buckley, a prospect few students can resist, and the con-

frontation is much more interesting and effective than separate talks by the two men.

During the question period, Lewis did not regard Julian Bond as a revolutionary — in fact he would like to see him in the CCD.

Lewis who specializes in talks before young people addressed students in Holland Christian High School and Allendale High School Monday and before Holland and West Ottawa High Schools today. He also addressed the Woman's Literary Club this afternoon.

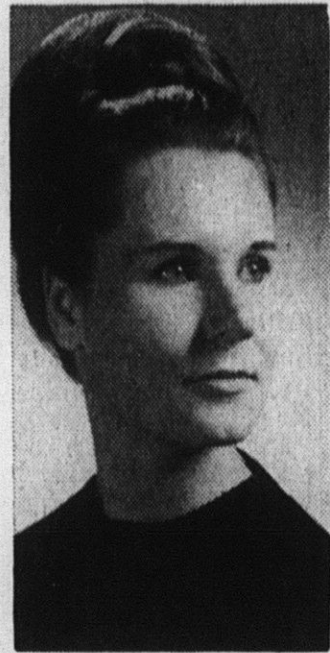
Lewis who says the youth today are exceptionally intelligent are categorized (1) apathetic, (2) turned off by negativism, and (3) truly concerned, busily researching problems and working constructively toward solutions.

"But these three groups can very easily be exploited by the fourth group, the revolutionaries, who are skilled in exploiting the weaknesses and developing emotions for their own negative objectives, geared to convictions that this is a rotten country and this is a rotten society."

Lewis qualified the first classification on apathetic students — all of them concerned over pollution and Vietnam but are involved with their studies, their dates and their own world to become truly involved. He said the Rennie Davises are not true revolutionaries in the sense of Fidel Castro — that Castro had a doctrine and a program, not just an overthrow of the government.

Lewis said many colleges today are too permissive, permitting indoctrination, not education, scheduling not just liberals but extreme militants, and it is the obligation of the adult community not to overbalance the ideologies.

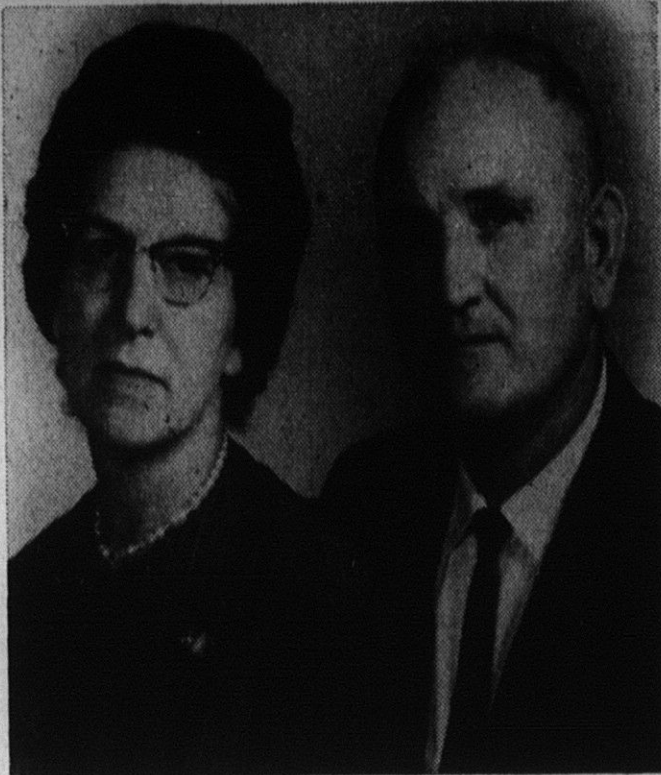

District Judge John Galien has issued an opinion ruling that helmets on cyclists no longer are required. The action was taken after the Michigan Court of Appeals ruled this ordinance was not constitutional.
