Holland Man, 24, Falls from Boat

Lee Hughes Accused Of Murder

Former Wife, Husband
Slain at Otsego Home;
Policeman Wounded

ALLEGAN — A former Allegan man wanted in connection with the shotgun slayings of his ex-wife and her husband at Otsego was captured this morning in a barn northwest of Otsego where a manhunt traced him after he fled by truck and horseback.

Lodged in the Allegan County jail on a first degree murder charge was Lee Patrick Hughes, 33, a truck driver from Ohio. Killed in the shootings early today at their home west of Otsego were Frank Passage, 39, and his wife of 14 months, Ann Passage, 30.

Otsego police officer Don Morris, 41, was injured when Hughes allegedly blasted the cruiser with a shotgun as Morris and his partner, Sgt. Elton Goswick, arrived at the murder scene. Morris was treated in Pipp Memorial hospital in Plainwell and released. Goswick suffered minor injuries.

Hughes was apprehended at 10:43 a.m. in a barn on a farm along 19th St. north of 108th Ave., about three miles northwest of Otsego. Deputies said Hughes offered no resistance and was not armed. He was bleeding from a cut finger.

Deputies said Hughes had fled the shooting scene in his produce truck west along M-69 and abandoned it about a mile west of the city and fled on foot.

Then he found a horse on a farm along 108th Ave., and rode the animal about a mile along the road to where the horse was found standing. Hughes was captured in a nearby barn.

Deputies said they received a telephone call at 2:30 a.m. today from Passage who said he had been shot and was dying. Deputies said Passage and his wife had been struck by blasts from a shotgun. The shotgun was recovered.

Deputies dispatched the Otsego police officers to the Passage home. As the officers approached the house, Hughes allegedly opened fire with a shotgun, wounding Morris. Morris returned the fire and it was believed at first that Hughes may have been wounded.

Otsego police chief John Kreckman said the two officers "never had a chance to get out of the car" before Hughes opened fire on them. He said the cruiser was struck twice by shotgun blasts.

Deputies said Hughes fled the scene in his truck loaded with produce. The officers gave chase. A shotgun was recovered but Hughes was believed armed with a .38 caliber revolver.

A manhunt was organized after the truck was found abandoned along M-89. Deputies were joined by police officers from departments in Allegan, Plainwell and Otsego as well as troopers from Wayland State Police and a tracking dog from South Haven State Police.

Later a helicopter from Grand Haven State Police joined the search.

Kreckman said Passage was believed employed by the post office at Kalamazoo. He said he knew nothing more about the family.

ALLEGAN — Authorities today investigated the reported theft of \$9,045 in food stamps and \$1,713 in cash from the downtown offices of the Allegan County Department of Social Services.

The break in was discovered Sunday evening by Mrs. Ruth Berkens, a staff member who went to the office to do some work. The break in was believed to have occurred during the weekend.

Police chief William Brandt said access to the two-story building was gained by slipping the latch on the front door lock. A file cabinet in which stamps were kept was forced open. Nothing else in the office was reported missing.

Authorities said the missing stamps included 200 books containing \$30 worth of stamps with serial numbers from E 774 53 001 to E 774 53 200 and 250 books containing \$3 worth of stamps from B 333 83 501 through B 333 83 750. Stores in the area were being notified of the missing stamps and numbers.

Shupert was charged in connection with the Sept. 14 slaying of a fellow carnival worker at the Allegan County Fairgrounds. Stephen William Bailey, 22, of West Palm Beach, Fla., died from a gun shot wound of the heart.

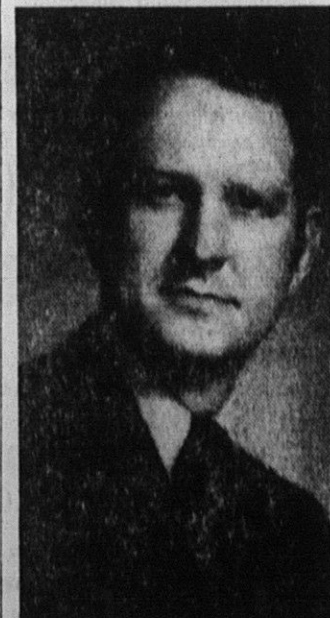

Explosion Rips Boat; Occupants Not Injured

An explosion ripped apart a 23-foot twin-engine fiberglass boat owned and operated by H. J. Windolph, of 861 Allen Dr., at 3:41 p.m. Thursday only minutes after its occupants directed the craft onto Lake Macatawa.

Windolph, and an unidentified passenger, escaped injury when they were thrown clear of the burning vessel. Coast Guardsman in Holland heard the explosion and dispatched a rescue crew to the site where they pulled the survivors from the water. Windolph told Coast Guard officials he had just finished fueling the boat at Jesiek Brothers and began to pull out onto the lake when "the forward and after section just blew up," a short distance northeast of Point West.

Windolph said the force of the blast rocketed the back seat almost 150 feet into the air. The craft, which was valued at \$15,000, was judged a total loss.

Coast Guard officials indicated the explosion may have involved improper ventilation.

Dr. Holleman, Missionary, Dies At 83

Dr. Clarence Holleman, long-time medical missionary of the Reformed Church, serving in China, died at the age of 83 in Pomona, Calif., on Oct. 11. The cause of death was cancer.

Dr. Holleman was well-known here and had spoken in many churches in this area, and was supported by the Overseas Reformed Church.

He was born in 1890 in Springfield, S. D., the last of the 15 children of William and Clara Holleman. He graduated in 1914 from Hope College, received his M.D. degree from Western Reserve Medical School in Cleveland, in 1918.

In 1919, with his wife, the former Ruth Van den Berg, he went to Lengna, South Fukien, China, and there founded a hospital. In 1931 he was captured by the Communist army, led by Mao-Tse-Tung, and forced to accompany them on a march, ministering to their medical needs, until he made an escape.

He then became the superintendent of the Hope and Wilhelm Hospital on Kulangau, an island in the Amoy harbor. This hospital had been founded by Dr. John Otto in 1898, and was partially supported by the Reformed Church in America.

Dr. Holleman became a specialist in obstetrics and took post-

graduate studies in various medical centers in the United States during his furlough years.

In 1957 he was called by the Presbyterian Church of Canada to head the MacKay Hospital in Taipei, Taiwan, and engaged in fund-raising, to rebuild the hospital. He retired in 1960.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Eleanor March, several grand-children, and nieces and nephews.

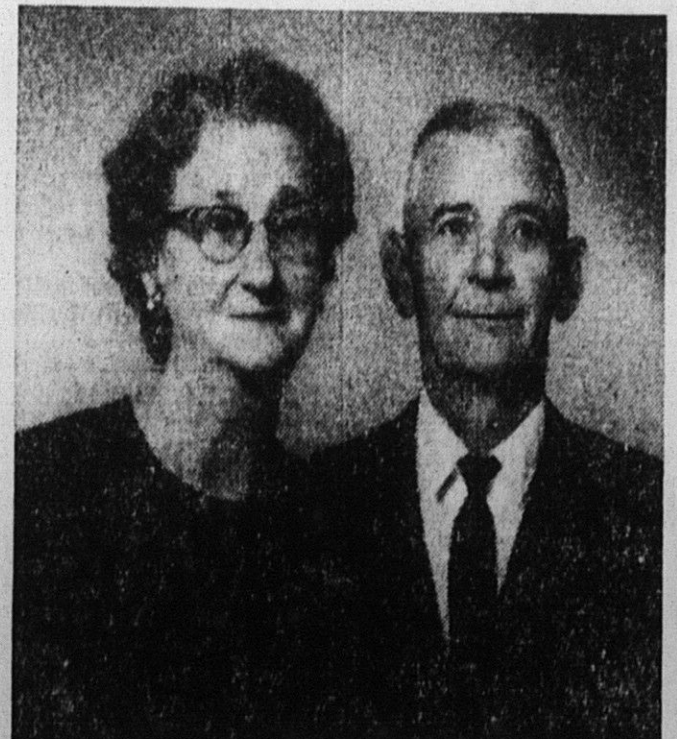
Mrs. G. Bredeweg Succumbs at 81

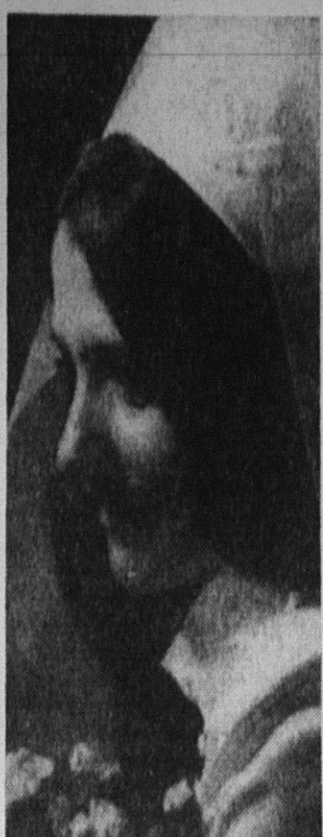

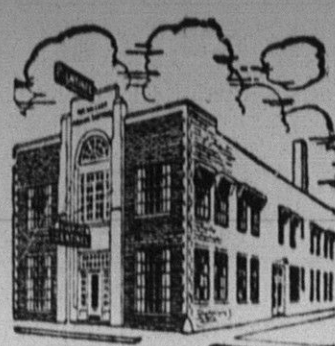

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 21
Free But Still Bound
Romans 6: 15-23

By C. P. Dame

Everyone likes to be free and no one likes to be bound. The cry for freedom is common and loud especially among the young. This lesson teaches the old truth that we all have a master, either we are slaves of the Lord or of Satan. Some do not recognize this fact.

I. A Christian is free and also bound. The Church has always faced problems. Paul sent a letter to the church in Rome, the members were either from pagan or Jewish background. All had experienced a change, they had become related to Christ. As Christ was raised from the dead so they were raised to newness of life. Their relationship to sin was broken when they became united to the new Lord, "For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace."

The words "law" and "grace" created questions. The law restrains. If the law goes then restraint disappears. That is the way some argued. An explanation was needed. The law forbids sin but does not inspire to service. Grace pardons sin and incites service because of gratitude. We are through with the law which can't save but honor it as a guide to holy living. Hence they were free from the law as a means of salvation but bound to Christ.

II. A Christian is obedient to the Lord. Once believers were slaves to sin, now they are slaves of righteousness. Note the contrast between the words "sin" and "righteousness."

Once sin ruled, now righteousness is on the throne. Those Roman Christians revealed a new obedience, a new influence, a new freedom, a new service and a new commitment which they expressed in their new mode of life. Before their conversion they used their bodies in the service of sin but now they used the members of their bodies, their eyes, ears, hands, feet, tongue and minds in the Lord's service. Conversion involves the whole person, body, mind and soul. No Christian is free from every sin, but sin no longer rules his life.

III. Christian living has consequences. It is also true that sin has results. The wages of sin is death. Wages play a big role in modern life. Our newspapers keep on informing us that the wages of sin are just as high now as they were years ago. The gift of God is eternal life. Salvation is a gift. It results in eternal life. This blessing cannot be earned, it can be received when offered, and it can also be rejected.

Herrick Traces Local Heritage

Do you have unanswered questions about your origins or family background?

Do you wonder how Ottawa County got started and grew? Or, for that matter, does the history of the area of Ottawa and Allegan counties interest you?

Residents of Holland are particularly lucky in this respect, because the Herrick Public Library has a wealth of this type of information.

The present sources at Herrick include family genealogies from all over Ottawa and Allegan counties, some of them back to the original settlers. Ralph Haan, whose avocation is genealogy, works with copies of boat lists, cemetery lists, and the 1850 census. The City of Holland register of deaths contains news clippings of obituaries, and the Herrick collection includes the Holland City News back to 1872, as well as the Sentinel to 1912.

According to Haan, a school librarian from Jenison who works at Herrick Library on alternate Saturdays, people are more aware of their heritage these days. "Now that people are more diversified and travel more," he said, "genealogy has become even more interesting and challenging than in the past."

Genealogy has been Haan's hobby since a dozen years ago when he worked out his own family history, tracing it back to 1892. He has worked with the Herrick Library resources for more than two years, trying to build up the sources of original materials.

The best sources of information, according to Haan, are the descendants of people who lived in the area. Organization of records and correspondence is what Haan has been able to do himself, but he credits local people with much of the necessary aid. He said that Mrs. Grace Keeler, who maintains correspondence with original sources, got a lot of the genealogy work started in Holland. Edward Prins has passenger ship lists of the original settlers, 1847 through 1878, which constitute a direct tie with The Netherlands. The Netherlands Information Center has Dutch immigration records on microfilm.

Correspondence is what Haan finds most interesting. He recently received a letter from archbishops in The Netherlands, inquiring about a particular Dutch family which immigrated to America in the last century. By tracing the family name through his tables and writing letters, Haan made contact with the descendants in Kalamazoo who furnished the entire family tree, all the way back to the first immigrant. He was then able to forward the information to The Netherlands.

Haan estimates that he receives an average of three to five such letters in a two-week period, from people who are requesting information, verifying what they might have suspected, or just plain curious.

"There is the fantasy part of genealogy," he said. "Someone might want to know if his ancestor was a king, or a prince, for example. But the main idea and the direction of the requests we are getting now, is getting back and seeing where you come from. Some people call it a waste of time, but it's my hobby, and I find it fascinating."

Haan has projects for the future, including getting his own family's genealogy published. He has it together, complete with pictures. Another project is a Heritage Room for Herrick, where all of these valuable, rare resources could be kept for everyone to consult.

At present, accessibility is a big problem. The library wants these resources kept available to the public, but at the same time they must be secure. None of the older books, mostly limited editions could never be replaced. Many of the valuable books are on the shelves now; other sources can be consulted at the desk.

In the mean time, Haan wants to build up the Herrick resources. He maintains correspondence, and welcomes questions and requests. The person to see during the week is Mrs. Darlene Winter.

Herrick Library willingly accepts and cares for original genealogical sources from the public. Mr. Haan is seeking contributions to the library's collection, either by donating family trees and photographs, or by granting permission for the library to photocopy these materials.

The library is also forming a genealogical society. There are more than a dozen names signed up, and the first meeting will be called as soon as there are a few more. Anyone interested is encouraged to sign up at the desk.

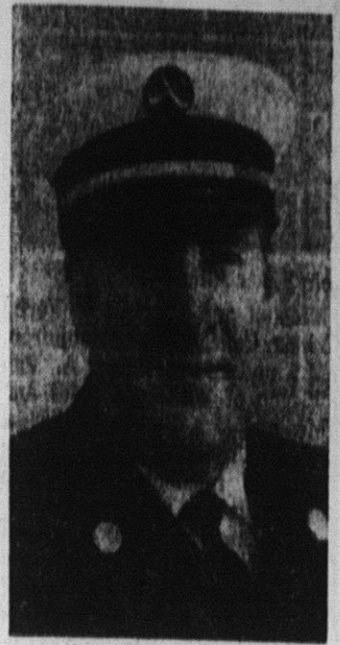

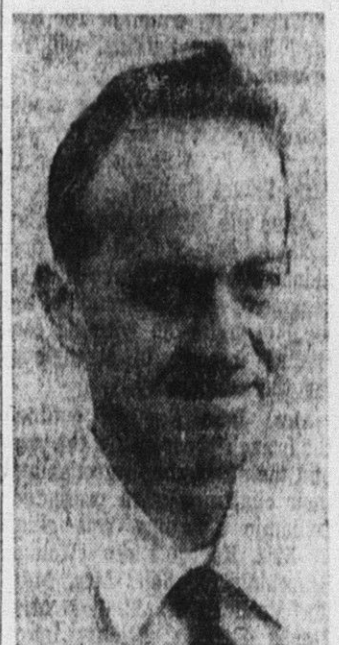

It is planned that the Higher Horizon program will retain the office on the Hope College Campus under the supervision of Bruce Struik. Working with Mr. Struik are Mrs. William (Libby) Hillegonds, and student workers Margarita Chavez, Rita Hendricksen, Robert Kline, and Mark Williams.

At the present time there are nearly 200 children participating in the Higher Horizon program from the greater Holland area. Children from grades one through 12 are found in the program. The big-brothers and big-sisters are primarily students at Hope College. The need is increasing to recruit more men and women from the community to participate as big-brother and big-sister volunteers. Volunteers is the key to the success of the program. The volunteers

find themselves coaching with school work, helping a child develop skills to gain confidence, and helping youngsters to participate in cultural and group activities. Youths who are drifting into anti-social behavior and drop-out status receive counseling, guidance and if necessary, aid in finding employment.

So far this year the Children Services program, under the supervision of Robert Vanderham has placed more than 25 children to adoptive homes, provide over 5,000 days of temporary foster care for children, and counseled over 130 individuals experiencing problem pregnancies. Working with Vanderham is Mrs. Clarence (Ellnor) Faber, Miss Audrey Navis, Mrs. Marcia Page, and University of Michigan student Dennis DeWitt.

The Family problem counseling service will provide counseling to about 200 families in 1973. Family counselors are Fred Dodge, Kenneth Phelps, and Tom Van Eerden.

Recognizing the importance of family living for both the individual and the community, Child and Family Services of Michigan is dedicated to strengthening troubled families, securing stable family surroundings for children, and providing direction for worried and confused pregnant women, married as well as unmarried.

Child and Family Services of Michigan's professional staff is capably assisted by the many volunteers from all age groups and walks of life. The clerical staff of Mrs. Kenneth Douma and Mrs. Willis Knoll are very much a part of the service to the community.

Through the merger of the programs the Board of Directors, the Executive Director Kenneth Phelps, and the staff hope to provide a more comprehensive family social service

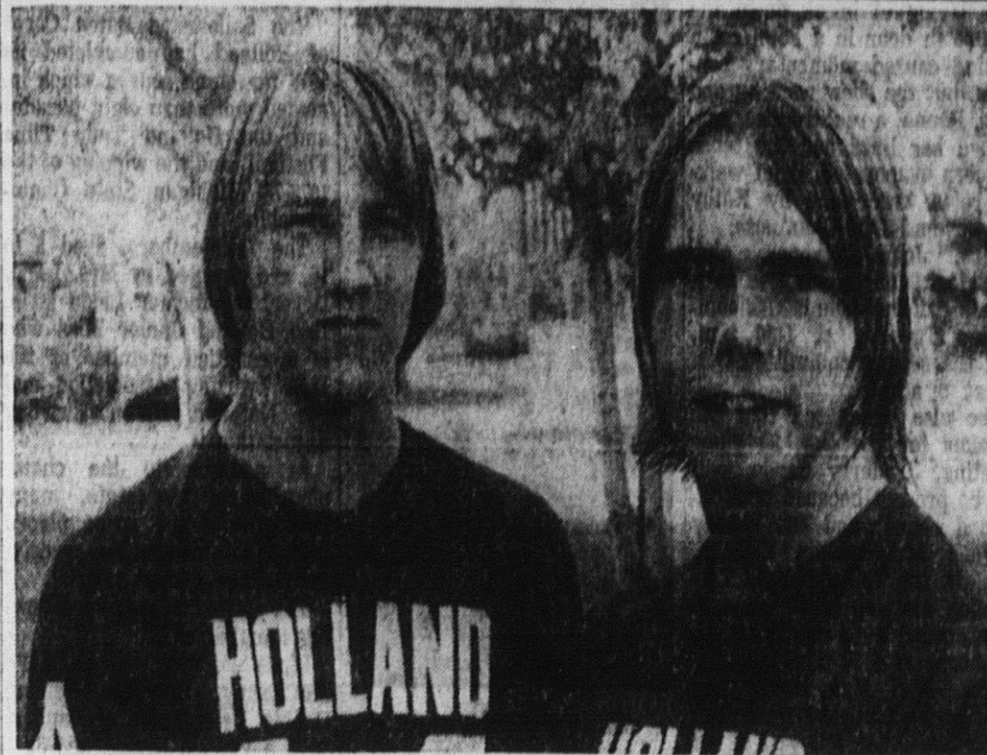

Dutchmen Share 1st With Hornets

ADRIAN — Three years of football frustration were quickly forgotten here Saturday as Hope College remained unbeaten in MIAA football action with a rousing 47-7 victory over Adrian before 2,100 rain-soaked Bulldog homecoming fans.

Coach Ray Smith's Flying Dutchmen share first place in the MIAA race with Kalamazoo. Both teams are 2-0.

The Dutchmen erupted for four second half touchdowns while holding Adrian scoreless to post their most lopsided MIAA football triumph since 1965 when Hope beat Alma 43-6. It was also the most points ever scored by a Hope team against Adrian in the 35 year old series.

The victory had to be most satisfying for coach Smith who had never guided a Dutchmen team to a win over Adrian. And each of the previous losses had proven to be Adrian's springboard to the MIAA title.

The Hope defense provided the game's impetus scoring two touchdowns while causing Adrian to fumble four times, blocking two Bulldog punts and intercepting a pair of enemy passes.

It was truly a team effort as seven different Hope players scored touchdowns.

Hope scored the first two times it gained the ball. Junior wingback Gary Constant caught his third touchdown pass in two game, grabbing a 38-yard aerial from quarterback Bob Carlson. The drive started after sophomore Jim Vander Meer made his third fumble recovery of the season.

Hope drove 92 yards in nine

plays on the next series tailback Ed Sanders and fullback Chuck Brooks providing the power. The drive was climaxed by Brooks' six-yard touchdown run.

Adrian went to the airways behind veteran quarterback Angelo Antonucci who didn't start because of an injury. Antonucci teamed up with end Mark Radosevic to march the Bulldogs from their own 35 to a touchdown. Radosevic caught five passes during the drive before fullback Rick Staccione scored from the one.

Hope was forced to punt when their next drive stalled and Adrian seemed to be gaining momentum as they marched to the Dutchmen 36. Almost as quickly as the Bulldogs appeared to have gained an advantage they lost it as Hope freshman Rick Mc Louth intercepted an Antonucci pass and returned it 72 yards for a touchdown.

Adrian again reverted to the pass to get back into the game and was on the Hope 10 when Hope freshman Bob Coleman intercepted an Antonucci pass in the end zone for a touchdown as the half ended.

The defense provided Hope with its next touchdown early in the second half when tackles Ron Posthuma and Craig Van Tuinen teamed up for a touchdown. Posthuma blocked an Adrian punt patting the ball into the end zone where Van Tuinen made the recovery for the score.

A steady rain failed to dampen the Hope offense during the remainder of the game as the Dutchmen generated three more touchdowns.

Freshman end Dave Teater wrestled the ball away from Adrian defensive back Rob Conklin in the end zone for a touchdown as the two battled for a 32-yard pass from Carlson making the score 37-7.

Sanders climaxed another outstanding performance when he scored on a one-yard plunge early in the fourth quarter, and his replacement at tailback, freshman Kurt Bennett of Zeeland, rambled for a 37 - yard touchdown run the first time he had the ball.

Junior Jeff Stewart kicked the Hope extra points. He missed his first two tries but booted the next five in a row.

Sanders enjoyed his fifth 100-yard-plus rushing performance gaining 116 yards in 24 carries. Brooks ended with 58 yards in eight rushes while Bennett had 54 yards in six carries.

Hope travels to Albion Saturday to face the surprising Britons who upset Alma 13-10 to snap an 11 game MIAA losing streak.

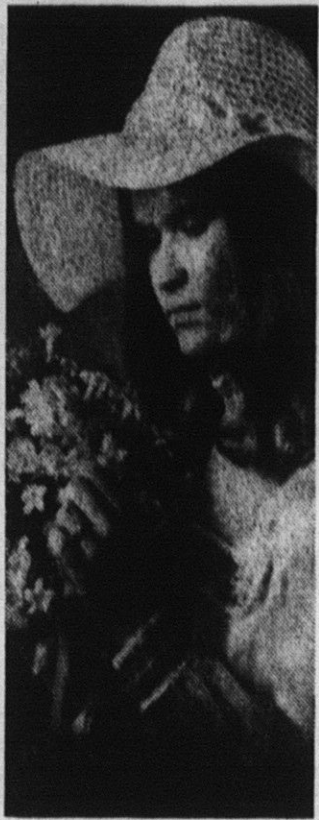

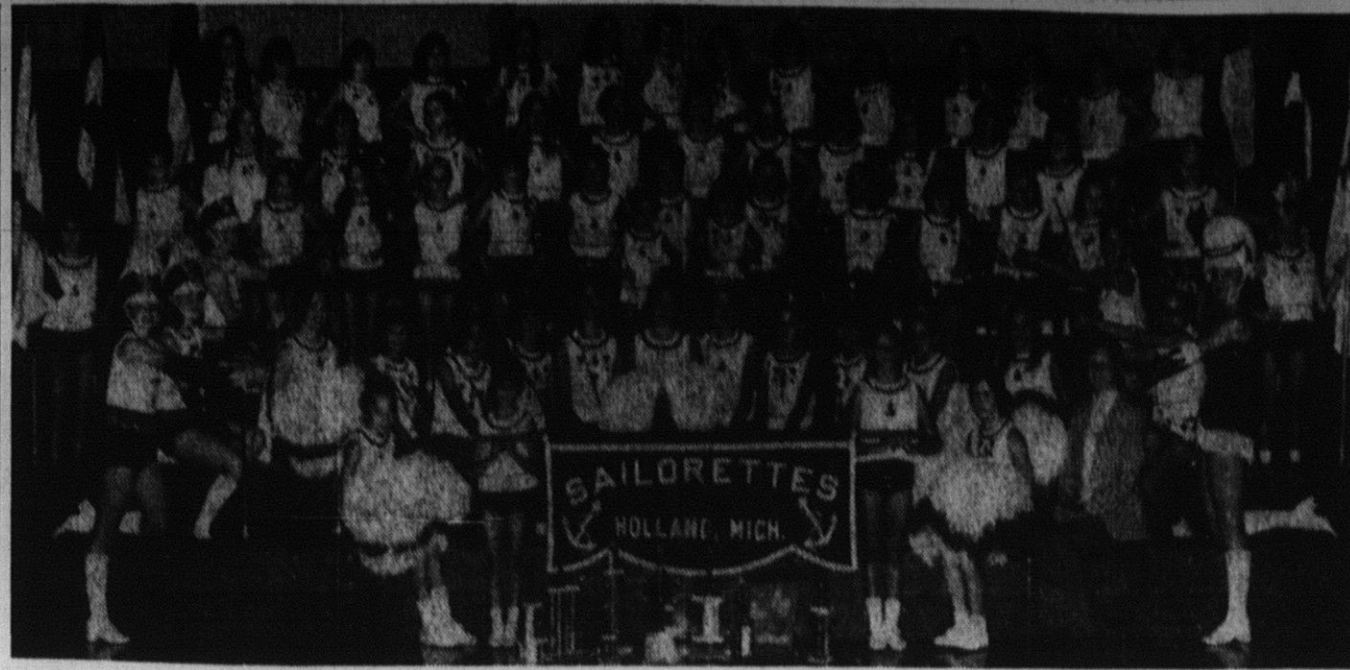

Mrs. W. D. Haigh Succumbs at 67

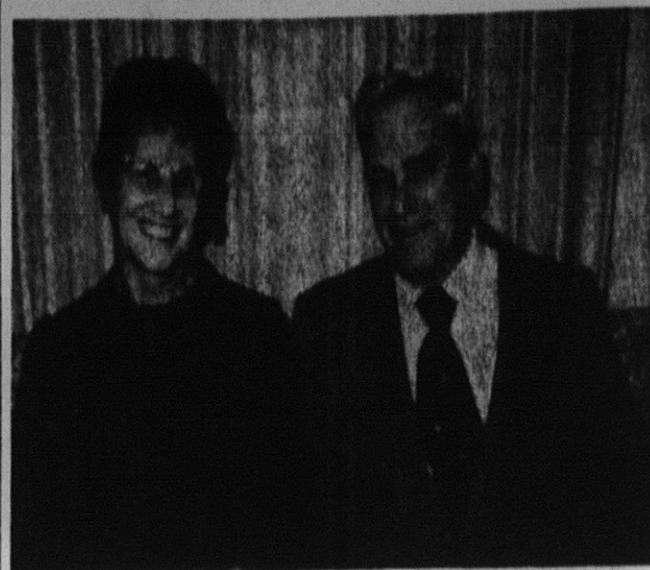
