## Chamber Hears Justice Coleman

Functions of Michigan's Supreme Court with decisions ranging from the weighty to the almost insignificant were outlined by Justice Mary S. Coleman at the annual meeting of the Holland Chamber of Commerce Monday.

"The nonpartisan races at the right of the ballot are often overlooked, and one-third of the voters pass them up," Justice Coleman said.

"In elections, people are partisan minded and nearly all of the attention goes to legislative and executive posts, the President, Congress, Legislature and county officers, yet the nonpartisan judicial posts represent one-third of the government," she explained.

"And since the Supreme Court sets precedents for all other courts in the state, (274 courts and 500 judges) it is essential that careful consideration be given to naming justices who are knowledgeable, fair and use

some common sense," Justice Coleman said.

She said the Supreme Court has had a rocky road the last two years with one justice resigning to become dean of a law school, another one died of cancer and a third was indicted by a grand jury. Even with replacements, the court often functions with five instead of seven members, and the Nov. 2 ballot will find positions for three justices instead of one. One will be named for an eight-year term, another for a six-year term and a third for a two-year term.

Justice Coleman also said the Michigan selection of Supreme Court candidates named by political parties is the only one of its kind in the United States, and added she was glad she could settle down and do her work for another four years without running for re-election.

Cases confronting the court, she said, have been dealing with the business property tax, equalization, gas tax, a variety of zoning cases, referendums, indigent fees, appointing counsel for civil cases, no-fault insurance, workman's compensation and disabilities.

The speaker was introduced by Ronald Dalman, master of ceremonies. Past President Harvey J. Butler reviewed some Chamber accomplishments the past year (larger quarters, workshops, fishing derby, new businesses) and the incoming president, William Smolenski, presented Butler with a past president's plaque. The invocation given by Jerald Redeker.

Framed certificates were presented to retiring directors, Robert Den Herder, Donald De Witt, Norma Diekema, William Murdoch, Walter Roper. Donald Thomas and Jack Vanette.

### City Hospital Recognized For Cost Program

Holland City Hospital has been formally recognized by the American Hospital Association as an active participant in a program to more effectively monitor cost management.

The program involves the sharing of cost data submitted by nearly 3,000 health care institutions as a means for these facilities to compare their own cost control effectiveness with others of similar size.

Holland City Hospital has been taking part in the AHA-sponsored program since November, 1962.

"We have found the data information supplied by the program to be an excellent management tool in evaluating our cost containment efforts," said Frederick Burd, director. "By keeping abreast of what other health care institutions are doing in cost areas, we are better able to adjust our own procedures accordingly."

## Time Capsule Is Buried

Next summer when the weather warms, enticing young ladies into shorts, Laura Veldheer will search in vain for her pair of cutoffs.

Unknown to the 22-year-old Zeeland miss the vintage pair of blue jean cutoffs she has worn for two seasons will not reappear on the surface of the earth until July 4, 2076.

Laura's mother, Mrs. Larry Veldheer, an organizer of the Zeeland time capsule buried Monday, donated her daughter's cutoffs as one of several items of wearing apparel depicting life styles today.

And with the seemingly endless fascination for denim it is altogether likely the pair of cutoffs will fit a stylish lass 100 years from now.

Though such may be the case, the time capsule committee, while not formally directing their ancestors on the disposi-

tion of the vault contents, has speculated that the local museum will be the recipient of the hundreds of items.

Ceremonies Monday bordered more on fun and frivolity than solemnity.

Children and adolescents couldn't resist digging into the red, white and blue vault preceding and during the ceremonies.

The sheer uniqueness of the circumstances enthralled everyone from tikes in hand, to working men with lunch pails to elderly citizens.

But it was the contagious enthusiasm of the youngsters which spread throughout the crowd. Even normally nonchalant high school band members scrambled into the crowd following their patriotic numbers to view sealing of the vault.

One pretty Lincoln School stu-

dent, ten-year-old Leslie Kleinheksel, campaigned until the church bulletin she insisted be included was retrieved by an adult and buried with the contents.

Leslie's friend, Jane Nordstrom, nine, moaned that something from their school should have been included.

It probably was. The list of items was massive and comprehensive.

Program chairman the Rev. Gerrit W. Sheeres encouraged members of the crowd to contribute any last minute items to the vault.

Chief Veldheer contributed a traffic ticket.

Over the two months only four items were rejected: a Catechism book held up by a young man, two wives (rejected earlier in the month) and one mother-in-law.

Comments by Mayor Dick

Timmer and five Polaroid pictures of the ceremonies were the last items placed in the vault.

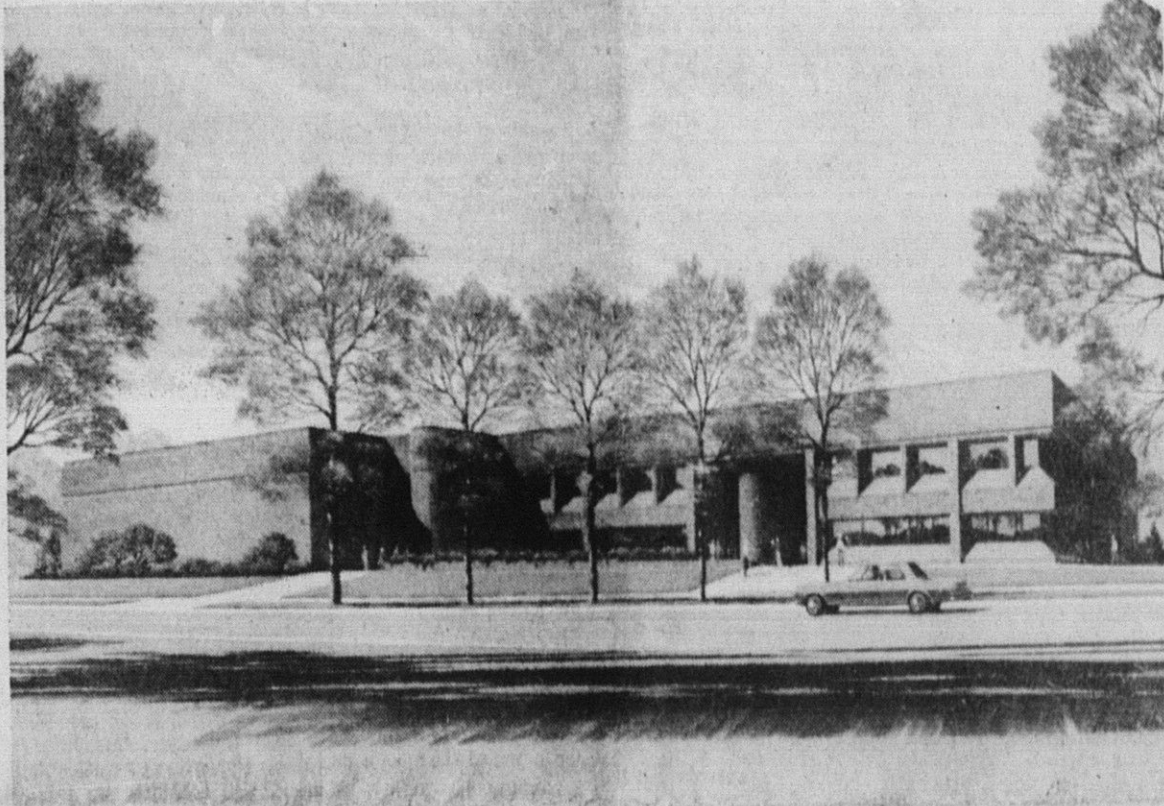
Mrs. Veldheer, expressing the sentiment of the time capsule committee formed by Randall Dekker, explained that it would have been fun if someone had made up a time capsule 100 years ago.

Cost of the marker and vault were assumed by the Zeeland Historical Society, Zeeland foundation, and Zeeland Bicentennial Commission.

During the ceremonies two representative essays from those written by seventh and eighth graders of Zeeland Middle School and Zeeland Christian were read.

### Lack of Operating Funds

## Community Action House to Close

Community Action House, offering assistance and food to needy persons since 1969, Thursday announced it was closing its doors effective Monday because of a lack of operating funds.

The action to shut down operations was taken by the CAH board of directors at a meeting Thursday.

In 1975 CAH assisted nearly 7,000 persons and operated with a budget of \$22,000. Support was received from churches, businesses and private donations.

A spokesman for the agency said attempts were made to re-organize and seek funding to continue the work.

Community Action House was organized in June, 1969 out of a need expressed by the then established Latin American

society.

Organizers included the social action committees of Third Reform Church, Hope Reformed Church, First Presbyterian Church, St. Francis de Sales Church, St. Augustine seminary and the AAUW.

In addition current assistance was received from Peace Lutheran Church and Grace Episcopal church.

Financial contributions this year included \$5,000 from the churches, \$6,000 from individuals, \$500 from business and industry and the remainder from service organizations.

CAH had provided food, clothing, furniture, housing and help in filling paper forms and applications and medical bills. Maria Gaitan was director.

## Hope Will Build Phys Ed Center

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Hope College Physical Education and Health Center will be held Saturday, Oct. 16 at 10:30 a.m. as part of Homecoming weekend.

The building, estimated to cost \$3.2 million, has approximately 80,000 square feet. The center will be an activity-oriented facility with an emphasis on the multiple use of space, flexibility and economy.

Architects of the center are Alden B. Dow Associates of Midland. Contracts will be awarded late this fall and construction is expected to begin before the end of the year.

The center will be located on the southeast perimeter of the campus. It will be bounded by 12th and 14th streets between Columbia Ave. and the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad tracks.

When the new Physical Education Center is completed in early 1978, Hope will have, for the first time in several decades, a facility which is adequate for the comprehensive program in physical education, recreation, and athletics which has evolved over the years, according to President Gordon J. Van Wylen.

"At Hope College we seek to enable each student to develop, to the greatest extent possible, the whole person — body, soul,

and mind," said President Van Wylen. "In this facility, which will be used by students, staff, and the community, the focal point will be on developing a mature and wholesome approach to capabilities, care, and use of the body."

The new building will consist of a gymnasium with three courts, an L-shaped swimming pool, conditioning and exercising areas, a dance studio, wrestling and multi-purpose rooms and classrooms.

In order to achieve effective coordination of activities in physical fitness, health care and nutrition, the college's health clinic will be located in the new center.

An aerobic track will circle the gymnasium at the second floor level. The swimming pool will be designed to facilitate competition in either yards or meters.

The new center will replace Carnegie-Schouten gymnasium which was built in 1905 when the college had an enrollment of 400 students. Enrollment at Hope this year is 2,290.

Groundbreaking ceremonies will take place on 14th St. east of Columbia Ave. The public is invited.

### Truck Driver Dies in Crash

ZEELAND — A Mancelona, Mich., semi-truck driver was killed in a traffic accident with a van Friday at 11:38 p.m. in Zeeland Township.

James Howard Bruner, 53, was pronounced dead at the scene by medical examiner Alfred Vander Waa. Driver of the van, David A. Raney, 29, of Danvers, Ill., was treated at Holland Hospital and released.

According to Ottawa County Sheriff's deputies both drivers were traveling east on I-96 near Byron Rd. when Raney passed Bruner, forcing the semi-truck to strike the van broadside. The semi-truck rolled down an embankment pinning driver for about an hour. Bruner had been hauling cement pipes for St. Louis Freight.

Assisting at the accident were Ottawa County Sheriff's deputies, Park Township E. unit, Zeeland Police, Zeeland Civil Defense, Holland fire rescue unit, and Drenthe Fire department.

## Van Vleck Named As Historic

Van Vleck residence hall on the campus of Hope College has been approved by the Michigan Historical Commission as a registered historic site.

An official marker will be unveiled during ceremonies Saturday, Oct. 16 at 10 a.m., according to Willard C. Wichers, secretary of the Hope College board of trustees and a member of the Michigan Historical Commission.

Van Vleck Hall was built in 1857 as the first permanent facility of the Holland Academy, chartered in 1866 as Hope College. The building was named after the Rev. John Van Vleck, principal of the institution at the time of construction.

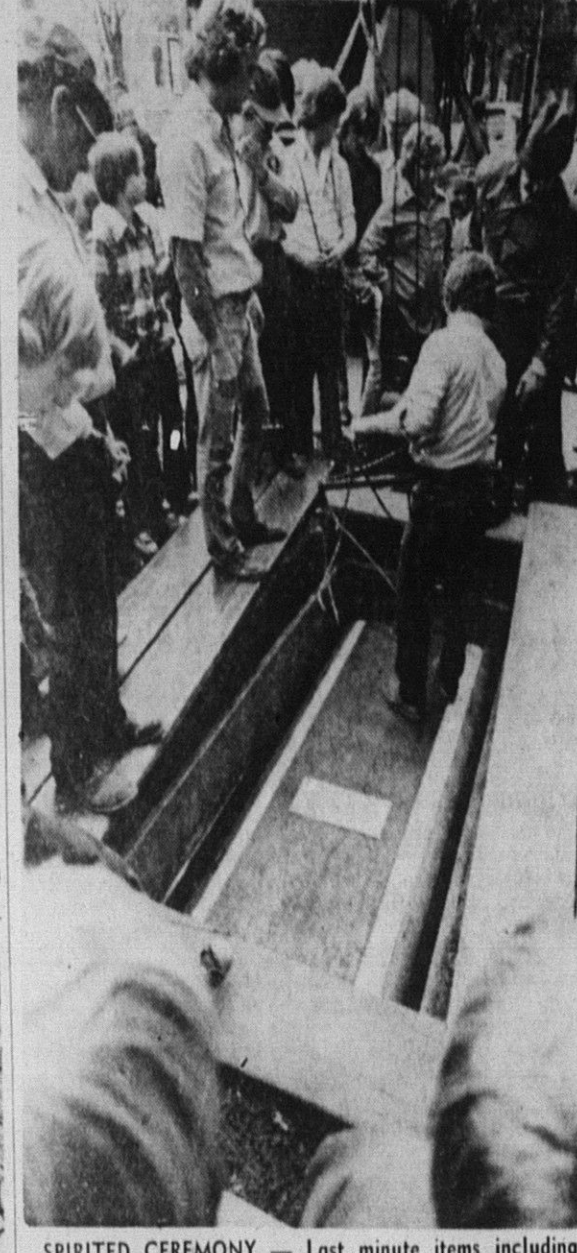
Van Vleck Hall was erected on the highest point of the campus. It originally housed a residence for the principal, classrooms, dormitory rooms, a reading room and a refectory. A room also served as the school's first chapel and was used as such until 1862, when a gymnasium — assembly hall was built.

From 1890 - 1894, the College's library collection was housed in two rooms on the first floor of the facility. Van Vleck Hall was converted into a dormitory for women in the early 1920s and it is still used for this purpose today.

The Hope College Archives Council and the bicentennial committee were instrumental in achieving this recognition for Van Vleck Hall. The approval of the building as an historic site will result in the second Michigan Historical Commission marker to be placed on Hope's campus. The first marker, located on the west lawn of Graves Hall, was dedicated on May 24, 1963 and recognizes the founding of the Pioneer School, the Holland Academy, and Hope College.

## Deputies Close Case in Death

ALLEGAN — Sheriff's officials today said they were formally closing the investigation of the death of a 19-year-old Tennessee man who died Saturday while studying to be a missionary at the Seventh Day Adventist Training camp at nearby Pullman.

The dead man, identified as Rob Van Dusen of Collegedale, Tenn., was one of 60 students at the Oak Haven camp west of here near Lake Michigan.

Van Dusen died of natural causes, according to medical examiner Dr. William Schock of Saugatuck indicating no need for further investigation, deputies said.

Schock said cause of death was pulmonary edema, a condition in which the lungs fill with fluid. According to Schock Van Dusen's body showed bruises suffered from a beating with a rubber hose.

Daniel Thomas, a spokesman for the camp told United Press International that Van Dusen may have succumbed to influenza.

"We have 85 people here and a lot of us have had the flu," Sidney Sweet, who is in charge of the camp, refused Monday to comment to UPI on the rubber hose bruises which Schock said he found on the

buttocks of Van Dusen's body. "I don't have anything to say about that," Sweet told UPI. "This boy was not in good shape when he arrived. He was not in the best mental condition."

"But shortly before he died, you could carry on a normal conversation with him. He smiled; he had expression in his face; his eyes were clear."

"We feel that at this moment, this young man was right with the Lord, probably for the first time in his life, and this was the moment for the Lord to take him," Sweet said.

Schock said Van Dusen was hit with a rubber hose a week and a half before he died but that the beating was not related to his death.

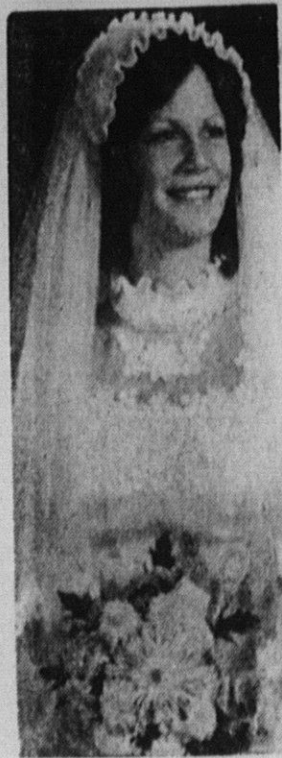

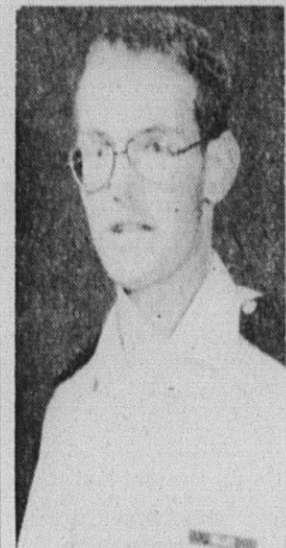

## 'Alice in Wonderland' Is Imaginative Production

Hope College Theatre went "way out" Thursday night at the opening of "Alice in Wonderland," an experimental production from the Lewis Carroll fantasy.

Applying an experimental approach to an already highly imaginative tale resulted in an entirely new concept locally, one that may be better understood by children than adults.

It was largely the product of Tom Lillard, Hope's artists-in-residence, who has done many roles on stage but who revels in experimental, innovative drama. Lillard served as artistic director for Stage 3 in Grand Rapids last year.

Lillard was one of the company of eight in the active romp on a circular stage-in-the-round, reliving the adventures of Lewis Carroll's heroine who went through the looking-glass, down a hole and encountered all kinds of unreal, fantastic adventures.

Lisa Huebner was a winsome Alice, on stage virtually full time in the almost two-hour drama which ran continuously without an intermission.

Surrounding her were Guest Artist Lillard, along with Kathy Cornell, Wendy Fenn, Dan Huizenga, Dave James, Phil McCullough and Grace Tannehill, all creatures of the imaginative kingdom, slipping easily from character to character in Alice's dream-like activities.

Familiar figures appeared from time to time, the Cheshire cat, the Madhatter's tea party, the Red Queen with her off-with-their-heads proclivities, and even Humpty Dumpty on the wall. There were few props and Director John Tammi with Lillard's assistance evolved some original choreography and other tricks which effectively had Alice changing her size.

Music chanted by company members ranged from Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever" to "Hail to the Chief" to a funeral march for Humpty Dumpty.

Scenic, costume and property design were by Richard Smith with highly effective lighting design by Mike Grindstaff.

"Alice" runs again tonight and Saturday at 8 p.m. in De Witt Center Theatre and again next week Wednesday through Saturday.

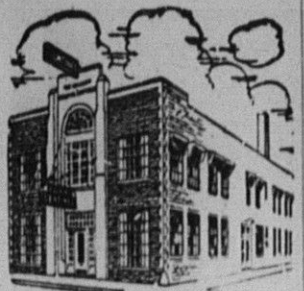

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HAPPY 75TH BIRTHDAY

The Holland Evening Sentinel heartily joins local citizens, businesses and institutions in congratulating Holland Christian Schools on 75 years of service 1901 - 1976.

Today's fine educational program with modern buildings is a far cry from the humble start dating back to 1893 when such a school was first discussed, and only the persons who sacrificed through thick and thin can truly understand just what the accomplishment means.

It was back in 1893 that the first interest in a Christian School was expressed and it took another four years before a summer school was arranged to arouse interest. In 1900 a site was purchased on Central Ave. and in 1901 the first school opened in Central Avenue Christian Reformed Church.

In 1902 the first building of four rooms for 130 pupils was erected on Central Ave. near 15th St.

Back in 1911, tuition was 35 cents a week and children brought the money to school every Monday morning. Teachers were paid \$250 a year. Dutch was taught until 1913.

In 1916 the 15th St. building was added, in 1920 the high school was organized, and over the next few years classes were held in the 15th St. building and in the basements of Fourteenth Street Church, Central Avenue Church and the old Prospect Park Church which was on the corner of 25th St. and Central Ave. The first class of 11 seniors was graduated in 1922.

In 1923 a new high school was constructed at a cost of \$90,000.

Depression years invoked severe financial difficulties and in 1936 the bank threatened to foreclose the mortgage whereupon a bond issue of \$35,000 was floated to pay off the mortgage. By 1941 all debt was liquidated.

From 1949 to 1953, four new elementary schools were added, and in 1965 - 66 the high school was constructed. A \$600,000 debt virtually was eliminated in 1968 and 1974, and this year construction was begun on a high school addition.

Thus, a 75 - year span is accounted for, but this time frame overlooks the blood, sweat and sacrifice that a persevering society of earnest parents concerned with providing a Christian - based education for their children were able to accomplish.

All training sessions are held at the unit office of the ACS at 211 Lincoln Ave. Volunteers and professional staff members from the Michigan Division, Lansing, assist with the training.

Reach to Recovery is the Cancer Society's program to aid women who have undergone breast surgery. Established in hospitals all over the U.S., the program began in 1952 in New York City and became an American Cancer Society program in 1969, and began in Ottawa County soon afterward.

Volunteer visitors, carefully selected and trained, who have successfully adjusted to their own surgery, with the approval of patients' physicians, make visits to the hospital a few days after surgery. Patients are provided with kits containing information about rehabilitative exercises, exercise equipment and temporary breast forms. When the physician gives permission, the volunteer will begin to teach the exercises to the patient and also provide literature designed to reassure the patient's husband and teenage children. All information about the patient is kept strictly confidential and there is never any charge for services. Later, the volunteer will help the patient adjust to her prosthesis and help her with clothing and grooming with supportive service.

The Cancer Society's ostomy rehabilitation program operates similarly, providing, with the approval of the physician, carefully trained volunteers who have successfully adjusted to their own surgery and visit the patient, ready to help on a one-to-one basis.

The training programs include lectures, films, hospital visits and simulated patient interviews.

## Appeals Unit For County Given Delay

GRAND HAVEN — Naming of a plumbing board of appeals in connection with inspection services provided by Ottawa County proved too hot to handle Tuesday and the matter was referred back to committee before a "can of worms" was opened.

Commissioner Herbert Wybenga submitted names for the appeals board but William Kennedy asked for more details about the board and its functions and cost to operate.

He questioned whether the county adopted a building code for the townships under a state inspection program and if not why should the county provide an appeals board.

Governmental units were given the option of adopting their own building codes and enforcing the codes or let the county enforce the codes. In either case the county could provide the inspection services.

Nine townships were using the inspection services of the county but Commissioner Marilyn Sherwood said all the governmental units had adopted a building code on their own.

Ottawa County prosecutor Wesley J. Nykamp was called in later to shed some light and said if the townships adopted a building code they should provide the appeal processes.

Commissioner Jack Smant urged the matter be referred to the development committee because the issue "could open an entire can of worms."

Commissioners agreed. Meanwhile commissioners extended a contract with John Kistler and Associates of Grand Haven to provide inspection services. The contract expires Oct. 15. It was extended to Nov. 15.

Oct. 26 was set by commissioners for their first study session of the proposed 1977 budget and public hearings would be set later.

Commissioners rejected a request for an additional full time person at the Hudsonville District Court but did approve a full time probation officer for the Holland and Hudsonville District Courts to replace four part-time officers.

## Grand Rapids Bank Purchased By Corporation

DETROIT — First National Financial Corp. of Kalamazoo, a \$600 million bank holding company with 10 affiliate banks in the upper and lower peninsulas of Michigan, has signed an agreement for purchase of the Grand Rapids Bank from Northern States Bancorporation, Detroit, for \$2.9 million in cash.

Northern States is parent of Detroit-based City National Bank and six other affiliated banks serving primarily the greater Detroit market. ## Maine's Mime Theatre Sensitive, Refreshing

Three insects, specifically two playful mosquitoes and one wounded fly, were characterized with delightful animation by the Celebration Mime Theatre of South Paris, Me., in the Civic Center Tuesday night. The theatre was the second event of the Holland Great Performance Series.

The troupe of eight highly skilled players performed at their finest when using their bodies to express animate life whether lions, seals, pigeons, snakes or flies and mosquitoes.

As part of one sketch of a summer at a boys' camp, two mischievous mosquitoes intent on dining on one of the new young campers, buzzed incessantly at the lad who retaliated with bug spray until it ran dry.

The insects gleefully emerge from hiding, sharpen and screw on their stingers and suck super from the young camper until he withers in face and form.

In another brilliant sketch one male created a sympathetic fly with the use of two plungers, his forelegs. During the portrayal one of the fly's legs is caught and pulled off as he flies.

The subsequent awareness of his loss, his return to retrieve the broken forefoot and whimpering retreat drew an ovation from the crowd. The solitary performance alone would have made a satisfying evening.

But the multi-talented company whose vignettes were spiced with acrobatics and gymnastics drew their biggest response from the audience with "The Legend of Tillston Twitchell," an original Maine tall tale.

Disgruntled with horses that gallop away and a mail ordered tractor (represented by five tumbling mine players) from which wheels spin off or deflate, farmer Twitchell constructs his own machine.

Designed to wash clothes, bake bread and shine shoes, as well as plow, all amusingly demonstrated, the tractor establishes the troupe's precision and agility as the five do cart-

wheels, forward rolls and other gymnastics to bring the equipment to life.

Only one selection failed to grasp the rapt attention of the audience: a sketch on chess which undoubtedly would have been of most interest to chess players in the audience. But judging strictly by audience response only a few chess players were present or the intent of the sketch went undetected by most.

One piece, entitled "Peace Talks" depicted the two sides of peace talks, the struggles in private and the handshaking goodwill for the media. Although slightly prolonged, the skit was mime at its most appealing posture.

Coach Ray Smith's club is now tied with Albion at 2-0 in the conference. The Britons just slipped by Adrian College Saturday, 20-19.

Boyce's three touchdown passes to DeZwaan, gives him a season total of nine in five games which is only three short of the school mark of 12, set in 1962 by Don Mitchell.

DeZwaan caught five passes for the game for 88 yards and now has snatched seven TDs for the season. Fullback Mike Skelton led in rushing with 153 yards in 24 carries. John Bonnette of Holland chipped in with 83 yards in 20 tries.

Mike Skelton's one-yard TD plunge with only two seconds gone in the second period upped the lead to 13-0. Mark Burger kicked a 25-yard field goal for Kalamazoo to cut the lead to 13-3.

A 23-yard touchdown pass from Boyce to DeZwaan gave Hope a 20-3 margin at the intermission.

Bonnette's five-yard run for six points upped Hope's lead to 27-3 in the third quarter. The Hornets only sustained drive of the game, 78 yards in 15 plays resulted in Moody cracking over for the score from the one-yard line later in the quarter. The pass for two points failed.

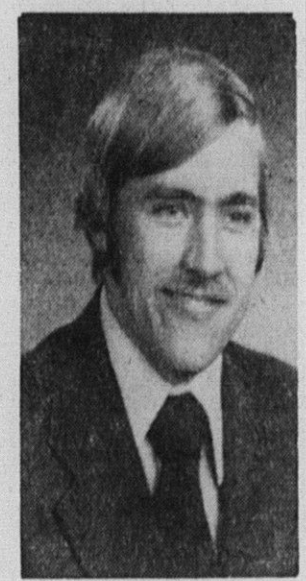

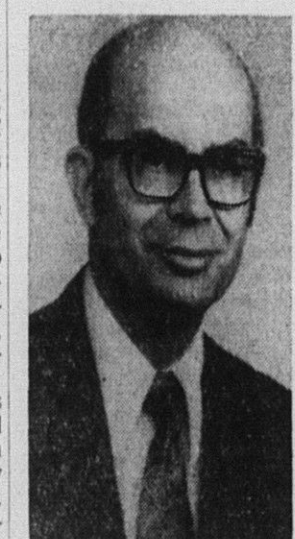

## County Asks Funds For 'Poor Farm'

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Tuesday decided to play a long shot that could lead to a \$1.1 million federal grant for a new Community Haven at Eastmanville and committed themselves to \$10,000 for a preliminary architect's plan.

Commissioner William Kennedy, chairman of the Social Services and Manpower Committee, explained the procedure in applying for funds under a public works act designed to benefit areas of high joblessness.

President Ford has not yet signed legislation funding the act but was expected to do so later this month, Kennedy said.

Commissioners have been studying plans for replacement of the present structures at Community Haven and proposed a 60-bed facility with nursing care and apartments.

Commissioners unanimously directed architects Vander Meiden and Koteles to prepare the design and development phase of the plans for \$10,000 with the funds being advanced by the Department of Social Services.

The preliminary plans will be submitted with the application for funding and once the application has been accepted an additional \$30,000 would be needed to develop detailed construction plans.

Should the funding not be approved, Kennedy said the county would have the final planning work completed and could proceed with the building should other funds become available.

Kennedy said his committee felt the Community Haven project had a "reasonable chance of winning federal funding" but "would be a gamble and the possibility exists" that the funds would not be approved.

Commissioners Eunice Braham and Jack Smant said if the county commits the planning funds then the county should be ready to complete the project if federal funds are not approved.

Community Haven but does not have the backing of the county project will become reality regardless of the federal funding," said Mrs. Braham.

"I believe the project will have to be paid by revenue sharing or a bond issue or millage" if the federal funding fails, she continued.

Raymond Vander Laan said he would not want to be locked into using revenue sharing funds for the project if the grant application is rejected.

"I think we need the flexibility to make decisions regarding the building program for the county," he added.

Kennedy said he agreed with Vander Laan.

When asked if other building programs in the county were further advanced for the application than Community Haven, mission," Kennedy explained. "One telephone call could stop Kennedy said no."

"The law enforcement building is equally as far along as the project after application if there is a lack of support for the project."

Commissioners voted 11 to nothing to proceed with the application and to have additional plans completed.

Commissioners approved up to \$12,000 of the county's share of the cost of a parking lot off Seventh St., in Holland for the District Court building and received a letter from Holland City Hospital requesting aid in the purchase of \$50,000 worth of telemetry equipment for ambulances and emergency vehicles.

The Road Commission, acting as an agent for Holland township, was given approval to use a \$145,000 surplus in a township water bonding proposal to pay for expansion of the township's water system along Quincy St. and in Coolidge Ave., off Eighth St.

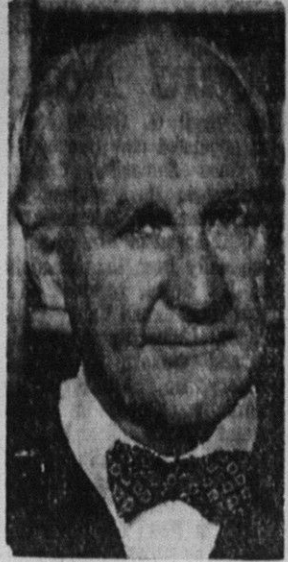

Born the son of a banker in Paris in 1893, Verneuil became first a theatrical press agent, then a journalist and a painter before becoming a playwright. His first play "La Verve Folle," was produced in 1910 when he was only 18 years of age. Later he married Lysiane Bernhardt, the granddaughter of Sarah Bernhardt, managed Miss Bernhardt's tours in the United States, and wrote the last two plays in which she appeared, "Daniel," and "Regino Armand."

Howard Barnes of the New York Herald Tribune said of Verneuil, "he displays a remarkable command of American wit and idiom in 'Affairs of State'..." the noted French author has fashioned a sprightly topical comedy." John Chapman of the New York Daily News wrote "he does not want to make politics funny; all he wants to do is to make love interesting and amusing — at least to the lovers."

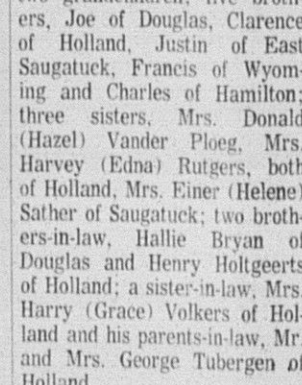
