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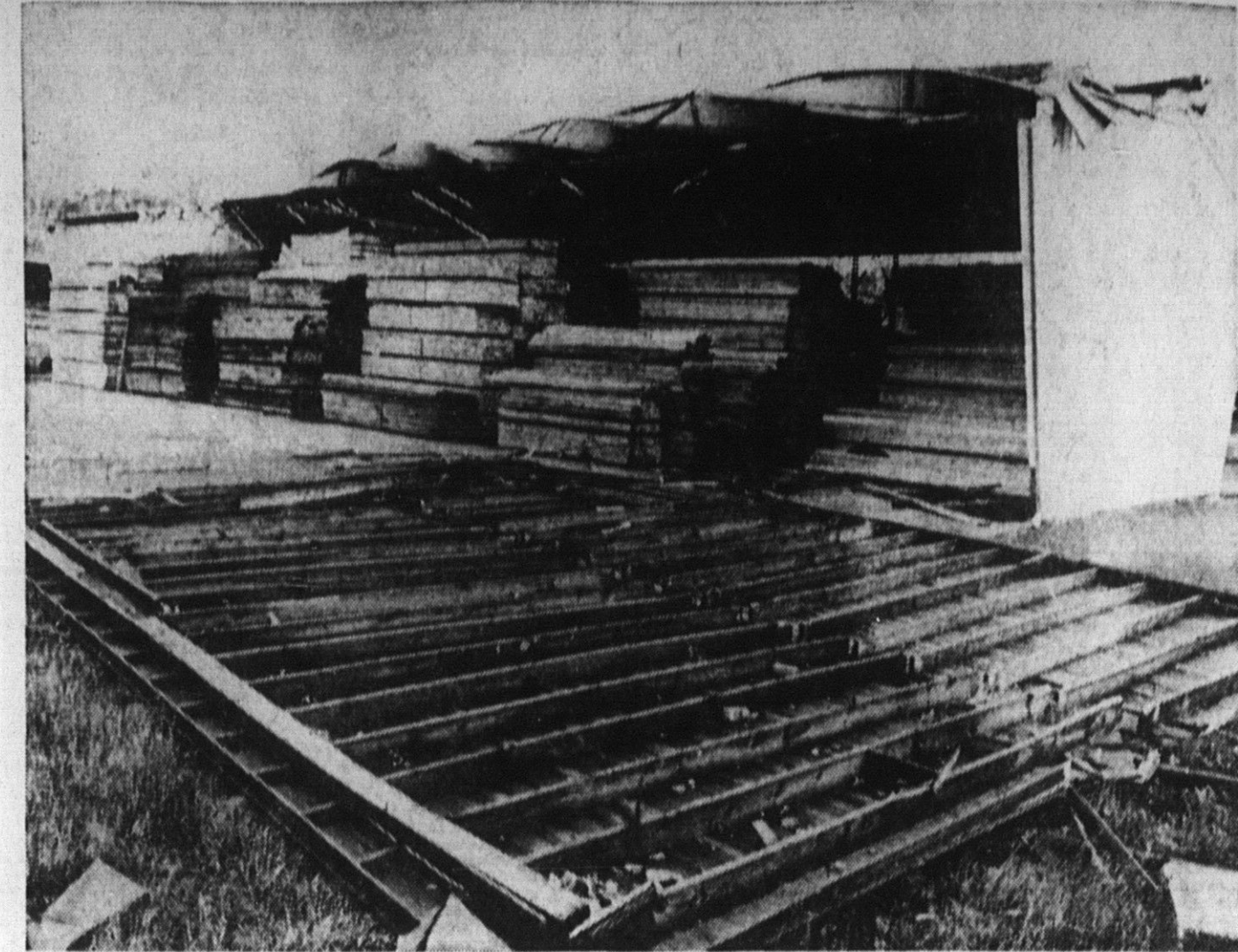

Rain, Heavy Winds Lash Holland Area

Gusts Tear Roofs, Hit Buildings

Clock Winds at 75 mph; Trees, Falling Limbs Knock Out Power Lines

Public utility crews were out today repairing the remnant of damage caused by heavy winds and rain that hit Holland area Tuesday night.

While isolated damage was reported, Holland city was not under an actual severe weather watch or alert, according to Glenn Timmer, Ottawa County Civil Defense Director.

Records show .64 inch rain fell since 5 p.m. Tuesday. Gust winds were clocked at 75 miles an hour around 8 p.m. at the local Civil Defense headquarters, 327 North River Ave.

Winds took the roof and blew out three walls of the cement-block Theisen Clemens Co. building, 39 Howard Ave. The roof on one of the storage sheds at De Leeuw Lumber Co., 187 North River Ave., was twisted by the wind.

Winds whisked a 26 by 58 foot greenhouse from its location in the William Rietveld Jr. yard at 12782 Felch St. and blew it some 120 feet across Felch St., blocking it to through traffic.

A new house under construction at 128th St. and Bellwood Ave. was blown from its foundation.

Many incidents of tree limbs knocking out power and phone lines were reported scattered throughout the city. Several trees were reported down, including one at 19th St. and Central Ave. and another on 120th Ave. Holland police said several limbs were torn from trees in Kollen Park.

Consumers Power spokesman reported a 46,000 volt line at the substation near the Chris-Craft plant was snapped around 7:45 p.m. Tuesday leaving several thousand customers without power for periods ranging from less than one hour to all night. Spokesman said all power was restored by 7 a.m. today.

Consumers Power was out in an area along the Lakeshore line, the north side of Holland, along the Black Lake line, Zeeland and Port Sheldon.

Consumers crews employing some 70 men worked through the night making repairs in the storm-hit area.

Holland Superintendent of Public Works Guy Bell said the city "fared pretty well" in spite of the high winds and pounding rain. He said power in Holland dimmed around 7:45 p.m. when the Consumers line went down taxing the interconnect system.

"Voltage went so low that the No. 3 boiler went out," Bell said, causing a five-minute outage for persons living in the area of 27th, 28th and 29th Streets from Washington Blvd. west to Ottawa Ave. Power was restored and all was in order by 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Holland Board of Public Works crews were out until shortly after 12:30 a.m. today repairing several individual outages caused by trees and limbs falling on wires.

Bell Telephone officials reported several wires knocked down north of town and the number of "routine problems" was up. It was expected all storm damage and wires would be cleared by 7 p.m. tonight.

A travel camping trailer was reported blown over on its side between Ruth Ave. and Lugers Rd. A 10 by 10 foot metal utility building was also blown over in the same vicinity.

Local Gifts Exceed Goal By \$420

News that the Greater Holland United Fund - Red Cross campaign has gone "over the top" for the ninth consecutive year was greeted with enthusiasm at the Victory Breakfast this morning in Hotel Warm Friend. The victory was especially significant since this year's goal was 13 per cent more than last year's quota.

Today's grand total of gifts and pledges amounted to \$149,732.03 or 100.28 per cent of the \$149,312 goal. Some reports are yet to be received. Five of the seven divisions exceeded quota.

Find Body South of Allendale

HUDSONVILLE — An autopsy was performed late Friday afternoon and early evening to determine the cause of death of a young Negro girl whose body was discovered about noon Friday by two pheasant hunters near Allendale.

Cause of death is still undetermined pending laboratory analysis, according to Ottawa sheriff's deputies. The autopsy was performed by Dr. Daniel Glazer, a pathologist from Kalamazoo, and Ottawa county medical examiner Dr. Peter Verkaik, of Hudsonville, at the Vander Laan Funeral Home in Hudsonville.

Doctors said the girl, who they estimated to be between 16 and 20 years old, had been dead from three to seven days before being discovered.

The girl, who was found unclothed from the waist up, was about five feet eight inches tall and weighed about 100 pounds, deputies said. Deputies said the girl was wearing yellow slacks and light blue stockings.

The body was discovered by Danny Reister, 14, of Whitehall, who was hunting with his father Warren Reister on property next to the farm where they used to live.

The body was found on top of the ground in a clump of woods about 100 yards south of Fillmore St. approximately one half mile east of 52nd Ave., in Allendale township.

Ottawa sheriff Bernard Grynsen requested the aid of State Police crime lab detectives from East Lansing. A team of four detectives were sent to the scene to sift for evidence.

Grynsen said that there were visible signs of head injuries to the body. Grynsen added that he was convinced that there was "foul play" involved in the killing.

Grand Rapids police authorities came to the scene in an attempt to identify the girl as being one of several runaways from the Grand Rapids area. The girl, however, did not match their descriptions.

Mobile Homes Pushed Over By Winds

ALLEGAN — Heavy winds Tuesday pushed over two mobile homes in Allegan county and collapsed a barn, killing 22 cattle.

A 10 by 50 foot mobile home owned by Donald Kerber was split in two at its location on route 5, 126th Ave. The Kerber family was inside at the time and was taken to Allegan Health Center for treatment of injuries.

Kerber and one of their two children were treated for lacerations. Allegan county sheriff's deputies reported Kerber's wife, Dorothy, received an injured back and hip and the other Kerber child was observed for possible internal injuries.

A 12 by 56 foot mobile home was demolished at its sight on Monterey Rd. at Wetmore Lake, deputies reported.

The David Shaffer barn located on 130th Ave., one mile east of 30th St. Monterey township, collapsed to total loss. The barn was filled with hay and housed 40 head of cattle. It was reported 10 head were removed from the wreckage Tuesday night; however, the remainder could not be removed until the hay was cleared.

Two Shoplifters Plead Guilty

Two of the three remaining Lansing persons arrested by Holland police on Oct. 12 for a shoplifting spree in the Holland area pleaded guilty to lesser charges Tuesday afternoon in Holland municipal court.

Gerald Thomas Siebert, 28, of Lansing, and Patricia Ann Sebastian, 22, of Holt, both pleaded guilty to simple larceny. They will return on Nov. 7 for sentencing.

Mary Ann Welch, 24, of Lansing, the pairs alleged accomplice, is still being charged with larceny from a store. She will appear for examination on Nov. 7.

A fourth accomplice in the theft spree, Roger Donald Case, 24, also of Lansing, pleaded guilty to receiving and concealing stolen goods at his appearance in court on Oct. 13. He will also be sentenced on Nov. 7.

County Supervisors Okay Record Budget

GRAND HAVEN — A record budget of \$1,858,377.17 for Ottawa county for 1968 was adopted by the Board of Supervisors at the final meeting of the October session Tuesday. The total is \$700,000 more than the 1967 budget.

The vote was 33 to 4 with dissenting votes cast by George Wessel, Stuart Poel and J. Nyhof Poel of Grand Haven and Gilbert Van Hoven of Zeeland.

Point in question was an additional four deputies for the sheriff's department. Last week Sheriff Bernard Grynsen requested an additional detective and four more deputies for his staff. The detective was approved but the item for four deputies was tabled. On Monday, the board voted 21-14 to approve the deputies, and on Tuesday City Atty. Gordon Cunningham of Holland asked again that the \$22,296 item for four deputies be deleted. This vote lost 19-18.

Board Chairman Herman Widemuller asked the board to study a proposal for a "true" budget for county operations and J. Nyhof Poel urged hiring a full-time controller, with space for such a department to be included in the new addition to the county building planned for next year.

Grand Rapids Man Receives Stab Wounds

DOUGLAS — A Grand Rapids man, who picked up two men whose car broke down on the I-196 expressway near Douglas at 10:25 p.m. Tuesday.

Fred Williams, 68, of Grand Rapids, was admitted to Douglas Community Hospital with stab wounds in the chest received when Willie James Smith, 32, of Lansing, attacked him. Williams is reported in good condition.

South Haven State Police said Smith and another man were picked up by Williams in Indiana when their car apparently broke down. Williams was giving the pair a ride to Grand Rapids when Smith stabbed him. Smith then stole Williams' car but was apprehended a short time later by state police north of Grand Haven.

Troopers said the second man, Osborne Hopper, who was not involved in the stabbing, assisted Williams in getting to the hospital.

Smith was turned over to South Haven troopers, who charged him with armed robbery. Grand Haven State Police also charged Smith with unlawfully driving away an automobile.

State police, who are continuing their investigation, plan to confer with the prosecutor today on further charges.

Two Drivers Injured In Two-Car Collision

Two drivers received minor bruises in a two-car collision Tuesday at 5:46 p.m. on Lakewood Blvd. near Chicago Dr.

Ottawa sheriff's deputies cited David Phillip Mihm, 16, of 93 Spruce for failure to yield right of way and possessing no operators license after the car he was driving collided with a car driven by Kathleen Miller, 26, of 733 East Lincoln Ave., Zeeland.

Man Killed Changing Truck Tire

A 32-year-old Holland man was killed when a lock ring flew off a truck tire he was changing at the Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Co., on River Ave., Friday afternoon.

Jerry Dean Carmichael, of 368 West 17th St., was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital by medical examiner Dr. Warren K. Weststrate. Cause of death was listed as head injuries.

Carmichael, who was employed by the B. F. Goodrich Tire Co., was in the process of changing a truck tire when the lock ring, which is held on under pressure, snapped off of the rim and struck him in the head.

The Carmichael family moved to Holland 4½ years ago from Muncie, Ind.

He is survived by his wife, Kay; four daughters, Kimberly, Constance, Karen and Amy, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Francis Carmichael of Muncie, Ind.; a brother, James of Denver, Colo.; five sisters, Mrs. Lloyd Miller, Mrs. Hubert Miller, Mrs. Ronald Justus and Mrs. Charles Justus, all of Indianapolis, and Mrs. Phil Thomas of Bloomington, Ind.

Judge Blasts Allegan Council On Airport Ruling

ALLEGAN — An Allegan County Probate Court Judge has blasted the Allegan City Council for "rank discrimination in denying private hangar owners access" to the city's airport.

Judge Dwight Cheever, one of three men who own private airplane hangars adjacent to the municipal airport, challenged a city council ruling Monday night barring the men from using the Padgham Field runway. Also appearing were merchants Peter Collins and Buell Daniel.

The council had voted Oct. 10 to notify private hangar owners that they would be denied access to the field after Dec. 1. The city maintained it could not allow continued operation of private hangars in competition with a new city-built facility.

City officials agreed to postpone until Feb. 1 the December deadline given the private hangar owners. Councilmen were considering purchasing the private hangars from the three men and adding them to the city's complex.

GRAND HAVEN—Two Grand Haven young men were sentenced to prison, one man was placed on probation, a Zeeland youth was given a 60-day jail term and 12 persons were arraigned in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday.

The Dutch scored midway in the second quarter on a three-yard end sweep by Schaap, following Holland's longest sustained drive in the last three years. The Dutch forced the Cardinals into a punt situation early in the second period and Holland took over on their own 10 yard line. Mark Bonnette, senior fullback, helped maintain the 12-play drive with rushing gains of 16 and 27 yards. The conversion attempt was no good.

Bob Ver Hoef kicked off for the Dutch and Bill Cobb recovered for Holland on the Orchard View 28. On second down at the eight-yard-line, Gary Lound, junior halfback, sprinted around left end for the tally. Chip Ridenour's pass for the point after, was incomplete, giving Holland a 12-0 lead.

With 2:23 remaining in the half Holland recovered an Orchard View fumble on their own 48. After driving to the five-yard line in nine plays, Ridenour passed to Randy Bobeldyk in the end zone, making the score 18-0. The kick after was no good.

Holland's fourth touchdown came after another sustained drive of 60 yards in 15 plays. On a third and 18 play at the 20 Ridenour passed to Schaap on the one foot line. With 1:13 remaining in the third quarter, Bonnette plunged off tackle for the tally. The point after, kicked by Bernie Rosendahl was good, giving the Dutch a 25-0 lead.

It took the Dutch only two plays for their final score of the game early in the fourth period. Schaap received the handoff on the Holland 34, scurried to the sidelines, and eluded tacklers on his way into the end zone.

The Cardinals, depending primarily on their three-year letterman, fullback Dan Kulikowski, for offensive power, caused only minor concern to the capable Holland defensive unit who contained them throughout the game.

Orchard View was able to penetrate Holland's territory only three times, their best threat coming on the final play of the game on a 30-yard run to the 15 yard line.

Both teams played the final five minutes with substitutes. Both Lound and Bonnette contributed sizable rushing totals of 60 and 78 yards respectively. Bonnette also played a superior defensive game.

After the game head coach, Dave Kemper, had liberal praise for his team. "The most improvement came in our offensive and downfield blocking. We passed better and caught some of the passes we had been missing earlier in the season. We capitalized on their mistakes, particularly their fumbles," Kemper said.

The Dutch now hold a 3-2-1 record overall and improved their Valley-Coast conference mark to 3-1.

Next Friday night the Dutch entertain East Grand Rapids in another league game in Riverview Park at 7:45.

Dutchmen Drop 2nd MIAA Game

OLIVET — Undeclared Olivet College squelched any Hope College hopes for a Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association football championship Saturday by drubbing the Flying Dutchmen 46-21.

The defeat dropped coach Russ De Vette's Hope charges to 1-2 in league play and mathematically eliminated the Flying Dutchmen from the race although there are still two games to be played.

Olivet and Alma share the MIAA lead with 3-0 records. The leaders meet next Saturday afternoon in the key MIAA game of the season—both Alma and Olivet are undefeated through six games this fall.

Hope slipped into a three-way tie for third place with Albion and Adrian who have identical 1-2 league marks.

Olivet handed Hope its worst defeat since the first game of the 1965 season when the Flying Dutchmen bowed to Ohio Northern 34-0. It was also the most points ever scored against Hope by an Olivet team.

The winning Comets amassed 453 yards enroute to handing Hope their fourth defeat of the season. Olivet ground out 311 yards rushing and added 142 yards in the air lanes.

The Comets pulled ahead of the Flying Dutchmen 21-0 early in the second quarter and led 36-7 at one point in the second half.

Olivet quarterback Al Nagy ran for two touchdowns and passed for another while teammate Karl Wilson tallied twice. Kicking specialist Robert Jansen booted a 31 yard field goal, kicked five conversions and ran another to collect 10 points.

Hope quarterback Gary Frens passed for two touchdowns and rushed for another. The Fremont junior tossed touchdown passes to Harry Rumohr and Tom Pelon and ran four yards for the third.

Wilson and Harple sparked the Olivet rushing attack. Wilson gained 133 yards in 18 carries while Harple, the nation's 20th leading small college rusher going into the contest, totaled 104 yards in 22 trips.

Frens led all Hope rushers with 98 yards in 14 carries. He also completed 13 of 37 passes for 120 yards.

Olivet scored the first three times they had the football. The Comets took the opening kickoff and marched 77 yards with Nagy plunging the last yard for the touchdown.

An intercepted Hope pass set up the next touchdown with Harple climaxing a 32 yard drive with a one yard touchdown plunge.

Nagy ran nine yards for his second touchdown to make the score 21-0 before Frens connected on a four yard pass to Rumohr to put Hope on the scoreboard. Olivet led 28-7 at halftime as Wilson scored on a one yard plunge to cap a 62 yard drive.

Wilson opened the margin to 36-7 by racing 75 yards for his second touchdown midway through the third period.

The teams traded touchdowns in the closing minutes of the third period, Hope on a Frens to Pelon pass and Olivet on a Nagy to Devers aerial.

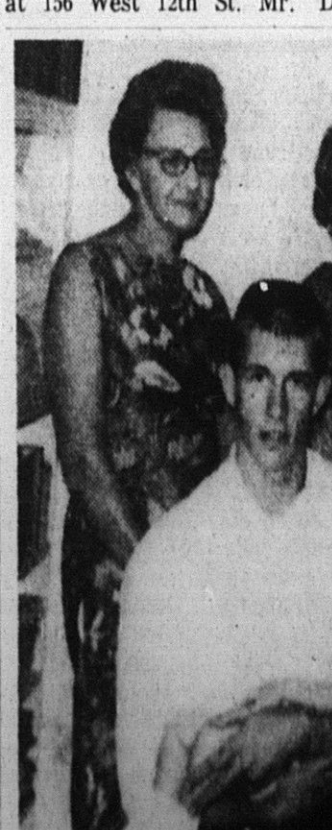

Also lost in the blaze were a corn planter, disc and other farm tools. Origin has not been determined. The Grand Haven township fire department responded. State police are investigating.

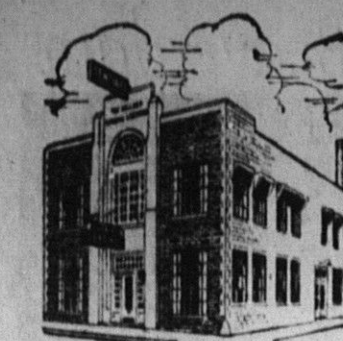

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CHINOOK FISHING ANYBODY?

The fall run of Coho has shown that thousands of sportsmen can be drawn to the West Michigan area. With the possibility of fishing from May to November, we may be on the verge of a large growth in the resort business, and maybe our own area needs a little push in this direction.

According to the "Status Report on Great Lakes Fisheries, 1967," rivers like the Muskegon, Grand, Kalamazoo, and St. Joseph offer potential as spawning and rearing areas for chinook salmon. All these are in the southern part of the state and in close proximity to the Holland area.

The chinook offers one big advantage over the coho in that it should provide year-round Great Lakes angling, weather and regulations permitting. In California, sportsmen take chinook in good numbers from February through November and, according to the Dept. of Conservation, "there seems little question but what the chinook will extend the scope of Great Lakes fisheries to new and exciting possibilities even in heavily populated southern Michigan."

One fortunate note on the chinook tells us that the adult chinook has amply demonstrated its ability to penetrate formidable reaches of polluted western rivers to reach clean upstream areas. This may be of some value to the southern fishermen, since pollution is certainly a problem in the rivers mentioned.

Good things for an area or community don't just happen, they need some planning and interest and with the possibilities ahead, we hope Southern Michigan will try to get things moving. Cooperation will certainly pay off.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 29
True Worship Versus
Popular Religion
Amos 4:4-5; 5:21-24; 8:4-7
By C. P. Dame

On Reformation Day Sunday, Oct. 29, many Protestants will recall that Luther nailed his ninety-five theses to the door of the Castle Church at Wittenberg, on the eve of All Saint's Day, 1517, which led to the Reformation. Amos, centuries before Luther, spoke against the abuses of the Old Testament Church, while Luther called for reform in the New Testament Church. Both men were reformers. This lesson teaches about the need of true worship and real, vital religion.

I. Hypocritical religionists sin. "Come to Bethel and transgress" — those words sound strange and need an explanation for there was a chapel at Bethel, a famous and historic place, and at Gilgal there was another place of worship. Both places were displeasing to God who wanted His people to worship in Jerusalem. Bethel and Gilgal fostered a corrupt religion.

Amos the preacher used sarcasm. The people were required to make three sacrifices a year. Amos suggested that since they were so religious they should make sacrifices daily. They were ordered to tithe annually and give a special tithe every third year — the prophet suggested they should do it every third day and show off their zeal. Instead of offering only the unleavened bread they should also offer the leavened bread which they had taken along for personal needs. And he said that they should announce publicly the names of all who gave more than the law required. These people were outwardly religious but their hearts were not sincere.

II. God hates all empty worship services. "I hate, I despise your feast days" — these are strong words. Why hate? Because the worship services were formal and insincere. It was obligatory for the males to attend the three religious feasts, The Passover, the Feast of Pentecost, and the Feast of the Tabernacles.

These feasts reminded the nation of God's mighty deeds on its behalf. God had also ordained four kinds of sacrifices — the sin offering, the trespass offering, the burnt offering and the peace offering. All of these offerings were intended to remind the people that God looked upon their sins as a serious matter, and that they should do something about them. God told His people that they should "let judgment run down, as waters, and righteousness as a mighty stream" — in short to live in a godly manner.

III. God wants religious people to be Godlike in conduct. Religion and exploitation of the poor do not belong together. And money-madness and godliness do not dwell in the same hearts. The merchants observed the holy days but they could hardly wait for them to pass so that they could do business again. And when they did business they used false weights, crooked scales, false measures and sold poor goods for high grade material. Well, today there seem to be many money-mad people in our land.

The Lord's day is desecrated, more and more stores are opening up on that day and dishonesty is becoming more common, and according to reports, some church members are showing less and less concern to stand up for the high moral standards of the Christian faith. May the study of this lesson urge us all to become more devoted to the Lord and the doing of His will.

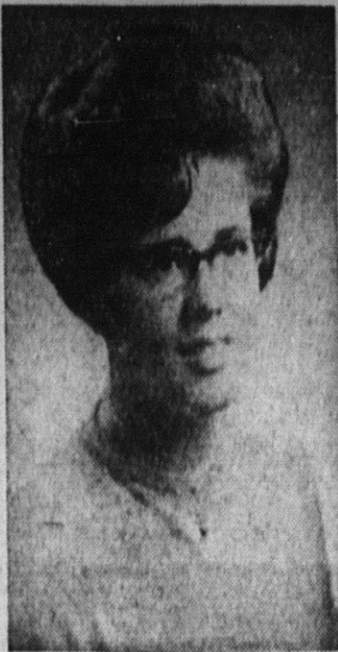

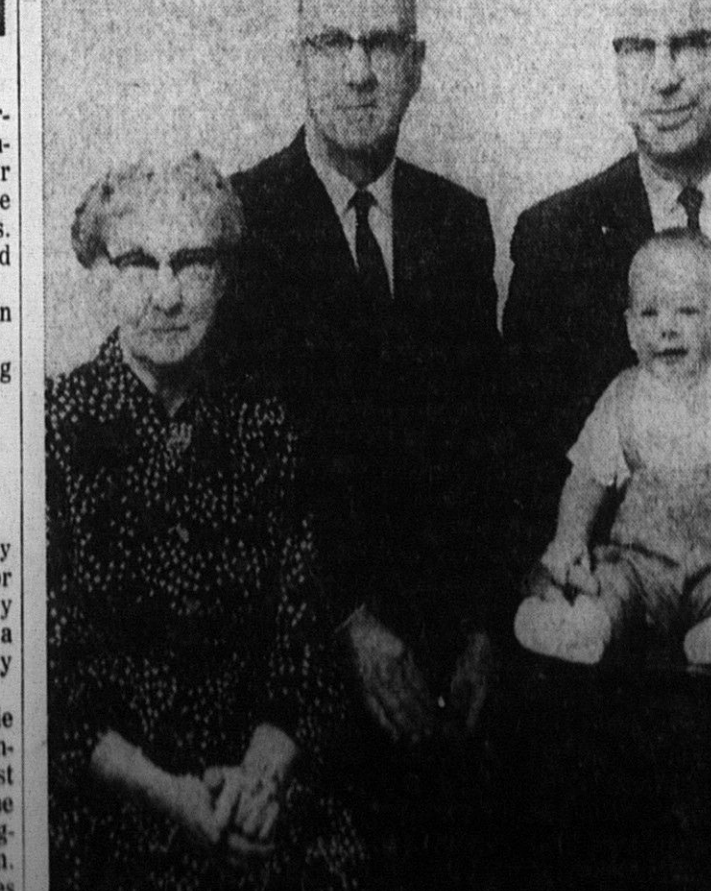
Miss A. Steveling Dies at Age 70

County Red Cross Marks Its 50th Anniversary

Ottawa County Red Cross celebrated 50 years of service at a dinner Tuesday night in Phelps Hall on Hope College campus attended by 185 persons representing past and present officers, board members, service chairman, but mostly by volunteers—the backbone of a truly great humanitarian organization founded just over 100 years ago.

As Red Cross Chairman Harold Langejans put it, "Red Cross ordinarily has a ratio of 71 volunteers to one paid worker, but in Ottawa county, the ratio is 671 to 1!"

And U. S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt (R-9th dist. Mich.) said the act of giving and serving helps those in need, but it does even more for the person giving unselfishly of himself. "We make our living by what we get, but we live by what we give," he said.

A highlight of the meeting was presentation of a pin and a certificate of merit to James Rotman of Holland who is credited with saving the life of five-year-old John Lewis of Gary, Ind., last May 27 when a family of five, a father and four children, were thrown into Lake Macatawa from a capsized boat.

Rotman had completed his Red Cross first aid training only four days earlier in a class taught by Glen Bareman, first aid instructor, who made the presentation. Rotman, who was in another boat, went ashore and administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to the child who had stopped breathing.

In accepting the citation, Rotman expressed the hope that more people would take first aid training. There was a rising ovation.

John Lawless, national Red Cross field representative, presented Langejans with a certificate for 50 years of service for Ottawa chapter and John Fonger presented Langejans with a plaque for his six years as chapter president and other services to Red Cross.

Named to the county board of directors were Bryan Athey, John Fonger, Clifford Onthak, Richard Hansen, Harris Pieper and Harold Tregloan, all of Holland, Howard De Back and Allen Groendyke of Georgetown, George Swartz of Chester, Harris Schipper of Zeeland, Mrs. Arthur Moser of Port Sheldon, John P. De Witt of Jamestown, Mrs. Charles Zimoch of Olive, Ed Langeland of Allendale, Mrs. John Trocke of Allendale, Mrs. Pearl Ver Berkmoes of Crocker, and Dale Luttmann and Brice Maddox of Grand Haven.

John Fonger of Holland was elected chapter chairman at a meeting following the dinner. Other officers are Allen Groendyke of Jenison, first vice chairman; William Shappee of Grand Haven, second vice chairman; William De Haan of Holland, treasurer, and Mrs. N. J. Danhof of Zeeland, secretary.

At a recognition service, hundreds of volunteers were

lauded for service to Red Cross and many certificates were presented. A candle light capping service for new Gray Ladies concluded the program.

In reviewing 50 years of Red Cross service in Ottawa County, Cong. Vander Jagt (glad to be in Holland after a harrowing flight in a light plane from Detroit through a thunderstorm) spoke of the fantastic changes in 50 years, not only in the Red Cross but in life in America.

"Fifty years ago my grandfather left Holland for Cadillac. In that world there were no hippies, no LSD, few people knew Vietnam existed and Communism was unknown. We ran the federal government on one-third of what we pay today on interest on debt.

"But some things never change. People then had needs; people today have needs. There was Red Cross then, and there is Red Cross today. We had American servicemen overseas in a war then, and we have Americans overseas now."

Vander Jagt cited the need for building—not tearing down, and said the person who is always griping and criticizing seldom does anything constructive.

"We know there is a great deal wrong about America. We are concerned with civil disobedience. We were shocked, when 70,000 persons marched on the Pentagon Saturday. We were shocked when the American flag was torn down and burned; yet 13 hours later 70,000,000 people (not 70,000) were worshipping in churches throughout the land," he said.

He added he was thrilled by the 2,868 adult volunteers in Ottawa county donating 134,300 hours of service to their fellowmen through one or more of the 17 Red Cross services, ranging from the blood program to water safety, to say nothing of the work in disasters and service to military families.

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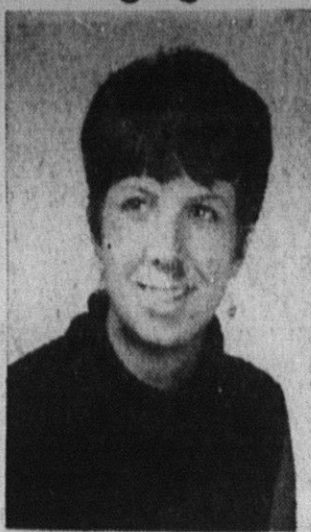
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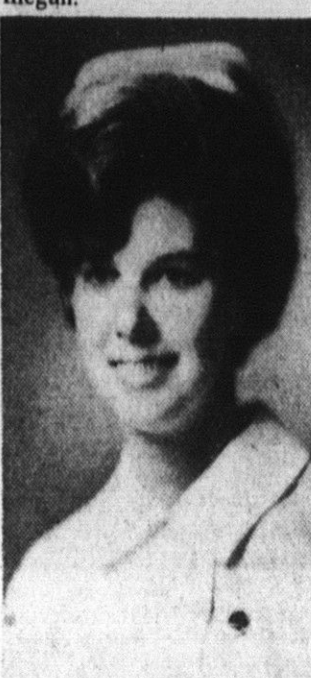

Blind Man Achieves Goal As FM Radio Announcer

Thaddeus Zaremba and his Leader dog, Duke, are familiar figures at Holland's radio station WHTC-FM when they appear to start Thad's daily broadcasts at 2 p.m. from Monday through Friday.

Zaremba, who is 21, was born in Detroit and has been blind since birth. He attended nursery school, first and second grades in Detroit Public Schools and then at the age of 8 attended the Michigan School for the Blind, graduating at 17.

He then attended Wayne State University where he majored in communications. He was interested in radio since he was a child and finally achieved his goal when he was hired last August as an FM announcer at WHTC.

Zaremba learned his broadcasting techniques at Radio Electronic Television School in Detroit and was taught by Art Lane, a Detroit announcer. He has a sister, Alicia McKibben, 25, who also has been blind since birth.

Mrs. McKibben is a teacher

in Detroit for the blind-retarded. Her husband Pat McKibben, also blind, is a teacher in the Detroit Public Schools.

Mrs. Lorraine Zaremba, the mother of Thad and Alicia, died when he was 16. She had been blind since the age of 16 when she became ill with spinal meningitis. Thad's father, Leon, lives in Detroit where he works at Chrysler Detroit-Forge. Zaremba works daily from Monday through Friday from 2 to 10 p.m. and usually arrives at the studios about an hour early to Braille his broadcast log and all commercials. One of the members of the WHTC staff, usually Johanna Gebben, reads to him as he Brailles his copy.

He passed his FCC third class operator's license exam upon graduation from radio school. But his license is not valid since he is not able to read meters or monitor his broadcast meters. His license is not needed, though, since the AM operator takes care of the required transmitter readings.

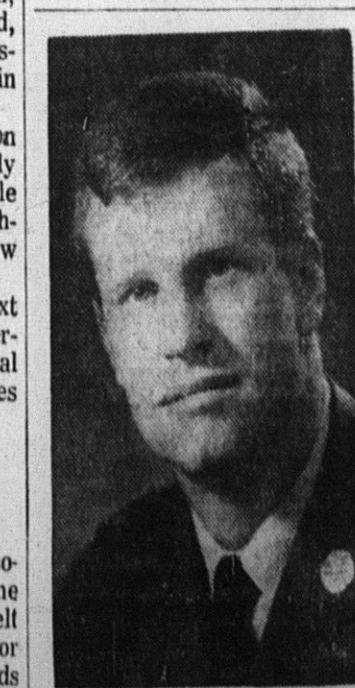

Yes, It Was Pineapples, But Only an Experiment

Anyone happening to drive past the Emerson Schaap farm near Hamilton early this fall might have thought he was seeing things, and he really was. It isn't every day pineapples are planted in Michigan, and by machine at that.

But that's just what was taking place. Ben Poll and a crew from Holland Transplanter Co., in Holland were field-testing a new experimental machine which could save pineapple planters thousands of man hours and millions of dollars a year.

A few days later the Holland Pineapple Transplanter was en route to Hawaii where it is being put through its paces on the Dole plantations. If it performs according to expectations it could be a breakthrough in automation in the pineapple industry.

As a farm implement, the regular transplanter was perfected in the late 1920's. Its widest use is in planting tobacco, strawberries, tomatoes, onions and other small transplants.

Planting, plant spacing, watering, and packing the earth around the plant are performed automatically by the machine which can be tractor-drawn, mounted, or self-propelled.

During a visit last Spring to Hawaii, Poll learned the pineapple industry is mechanized in mulching, fertilizing, weed control, and harvesting operations, but not in planting. Various mechanical means have been tried and found wanting, so the job is still done by hand.

One field worker, planting the fruit slips or crowns on 12-inch centers, can plant about 8,000 pineapples per day. The two Dole plantations have 125 million plants growing, which gives you some idea of the manpower involved.

Poll made a trip to Dole headquarters and suggested the use of the Holland Transplanter, suitably adapted to the requirements of pineapple planting. He received enough encouragement to start working on his ideas immediately when he returned to Michigan.

The Holland pineapple transplanter plants two rows of fruit at a time. It will plant slips, which grow from the same stem that produces the fruit, and crowns, as the top of the fruit is called.

First the plastic mulch is laid down. This is a strip of black plastic, about three feet wide, which covers the planting area to inhibit weed growth and help retain moisture.

The transplanter straddles the plastic mulch as it travels down the field. Digging shoes automatically punch holes through

slips or crowns are hand fed into the automatic planting mechanism which is synchronized with the digging operation. Packing wheels at the rear of the transplanter tamp the earth firmly around the plants.

Poll estimates his transplanter will plant approximately 50,000 plants per day. One limiting factor may be the size of the hopper which holds the pineapple slips or crowns. This is one of the problems that will be worked on as the Holland machine is tested at the Dole plantations. Another concern is the number of rows of pineapples that can be planted simultaneously. This model of the Holland Transplanter would be expanded to plant as many as six rows at one time. It appears almost certain, however, that even the two-row planting operation will be more efficient and the plastic and into the earth at desired depth and spacing.

At the same time, the pineapple less costly than the old planting method which finally seems to be on the way out.
