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New County Dog Setup Under Study

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Supervisors has taken under study a new dog program for the county in which fees would be doubled and licenses made available 12 months of the year.

As recommended by the sheriff's committee Monday afternoon, new fees would be \$2 for male and unsexed (the latter requiring certification from a veterinarian) and \$4 for females. The office dispensing licenses would be paid 30 cents instead of 15 cents per dog, and supervisors would be required to give accurate census figures each year. Sheriff's officers would arrest all dogs running at large. Whether the new program would be put in ordinance form or processed as a resolution would be determined later. Board action is expected at the September meeting.

The board unanimously adopted resolutions confirming the \$3.1 million sewage disposal bonds for the Rush Creek system for Hudsonville and Georgetown township and authorizing a policy statement on land acquisition. The project was outlined by Ron Ruscett of the engineering office.

The board also approved a resolution recommended by County Treasurer Fred Den Herder to invest the bonds with the Detroit branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago with interest of 7 per cent or more going into the sewage disposal project. Den Herder said expenditures on the construction program the first year are estimated at \$1.7 million. Interest on the sale of bonds averages 5.5 per cent. Total value of the bonds to date is \$3,148,000.

On recommendation of Prosecutor Calvin Bosman, the board approved retaining former Prosecutor James W. Bussard on an hourly basis on the appeal in the Court of Appeals in the case of the editor of the Lanthorn of Grand Valley State College who was convicted in Ottawa Circuit Court of a charge of distributing an obscene newspaper. The board earmarked up to \$1,000 for defending the appeal. The request was presented by Sheriff Bernard Grysen.

Former Board President Herman Windemuller, now supervisor of Park township, made three requests, one for a copy of the minutes to be provided to the Ottawa County Assessors' Association, another seeking action on dogs running at large and a third on littering, requesting a county ordinance for the latter since, he said, a township ordinance can only be enforced by township constables.

The board denied the first request, said it was considering a new dog program, and expressed concern over the littering on roads leading to the county landfill. Windemuller said the littering has become a heated issue in the township, leading to petitions recalling the entire board. He also pointed to problems over survey lines of lakefront property of land which has been leased to the state park at Ottawa Beach.

The board appointed William Winstrom of Park township as county representative on the Lake Macatawa Intermunicipality committee.

Considerable time was spent discussing a proposed lagoon type sewage disposal system for the county infirmary at Eastmanville and two resolutions were passed, one to approve the \$64,400 project and the other to apply for federal funds amounting to 55 per cent.

Tom De Pree of the Planning Committee spoke of attending a meeting with the Muskegon planning committee on plans to fight water pollution in Muskegon county, calling for an extensive study of the lagoon system. Larry Vredevoogd who was a guest of the Muskegon group visiting Penn State University told of a new spring irrigating system in which the odorless effluent is sprayed on crops. He said the university's experimental program was proved so successful that clients are "bidding" for the service which has resulted in a "big plus" for fertilizer. Attention was called to a meeting on water pollution Aug. 20 at 8 p.m. in the county building.

Chairman William Kennedy presided at the monthly meeting which lasted close to 3½ hours.

Improper Lane Usage

Thomas Robert Vander Plow, 16, of 176 East 26th St., was cited by Holland police for improper lane usage following an accident Saturday at 2:25 p.m. in which the car he was turning into a driveway on 26th St. 500 feet east of State St. drove partially into the left lane and struck a car driven by Louis Brieve, 73, of 241 East 13th St. Brieve sought his own treatment for minor injuries.

Sanitary Landfill Set For Allegan

ALLEGAN — City council members have authorized City Manager Kenneth Bollinger to negotiate a contract with Huitt Construction and Wrecking Co., Allegan, to provide facilities for solid waste disposal for the city of Allegan.

Huitt had made a proposal to establish a sanitary landfill on Dumont Road, approximately two miles north of Allegan, to meet the city's needs. Under the firm's proposal, the landfill would be available for use by city residents in return for a city payment of \$300 per month. This would entitle residents to dump up to two cans of refuse at no cost. Trucks would be charged on a sliding scale ranging from \$1.50 to \$10 per load.

Huitt assured the city the disposal area would be a licensed sanitary landfill project with refuse being covered constantly from sand stockpiles.

Council also went on record with a unanimous expression of gratitude to the city's professional and volunteer firemen for an "outstanding job" in limiting damage to a single building in the early morning fire Monday which destroyed the City Newsstand and the second floor offices of the Allegan County Selective Service board.

Action also was approved on a Federal Aviation Administration recommendation for removal of trees which are a potential hazard on the approaches to runways at the Allegan municipal airport. The trees are located on private property.

Miss Allegan Contest Set For Friday

ALLEGAN — Members of the audience will have a chance to compare their opinions with those of the official judges at the Miss Allegan pageant which will be held at 7:30 Friday night in the Griswold Memorial Auditorium.

Scoring sheets, identical to those used by the panel of judges, will be distributed prior to the contest to select the city's representative in the Allegan County Fair's Harvest Queen contest, an official preliminary to the Miss Michigan and Miss America pageants.

The winner will receive a \$50 savings bond and the two runners-up each will receive \$25 bonds. In addition, the girls themselves will select the winner of the Miss Congeniality title.

Seven Allegan area girls will be competing for the Miss Allegan title. They are Kimberly Allen, Beth Ann Campbell, Melinda Gleason, Susan Hunt, Sue Ellen Nahlikian, Susan E. Pugh and Diane Riede.

Tax Payments Hit \$160,000

Summer tax payments came in thick and fast Wednesday and today after belated bills were received in the mail.

City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts said approximately \$160,000 has been collected to date. Of this figure, some \$30,000 was collected in advance estimated payments.

Most of the taxes paid are on residential property.

A tax fact sheet is included with tax bills. Taxpayers are reminded that although the tax bill lists a due date of Aug. 15, taxes may be paid through Sept. 10 without penalty.

Police said no one was injured.

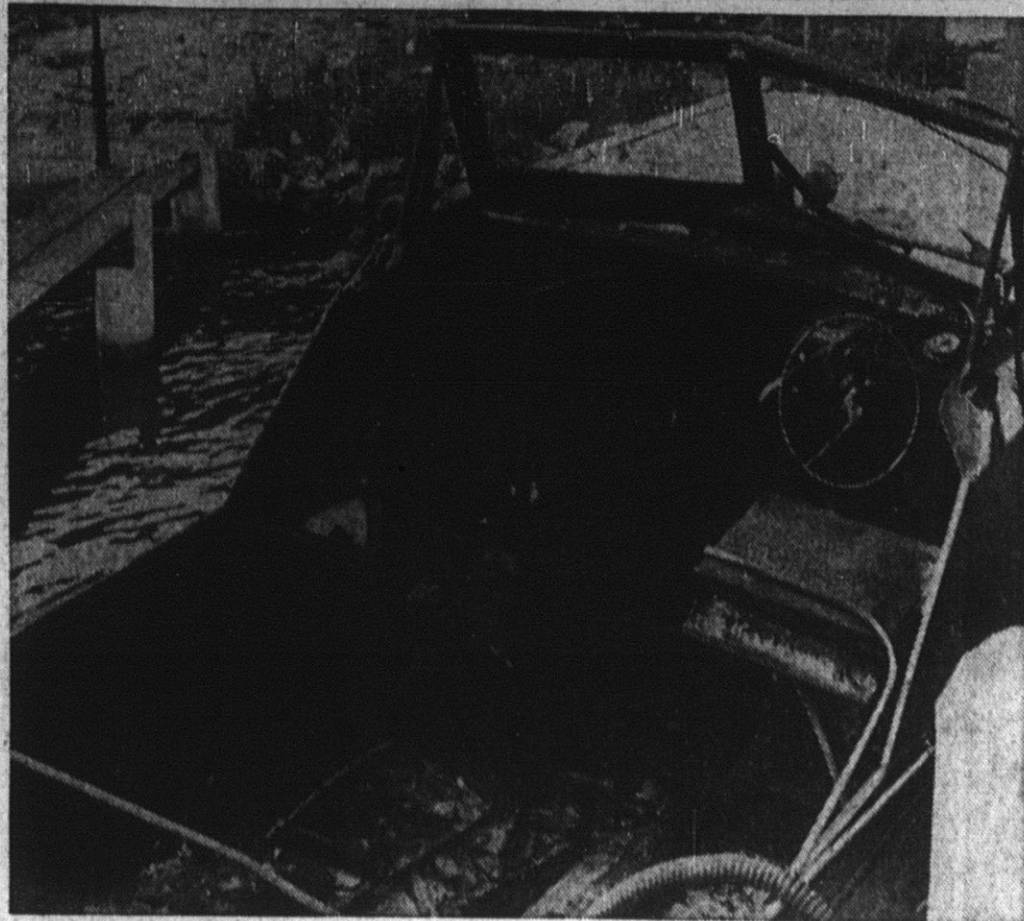

Cruiser Explodes, One Person Burned

One person received second degree burns and three others escaped injury at 4:10 p.m. Sunday when an inboard outboard cruiser exploded near the midsection after it had left Baker's Landing where it had been gassed up.

Jacob Potts, 39, Grand Rapids, owner-operator of the \$3,000 craft which was a total loss, was treated in Holland Hospital for second degree burns of the legs and right arm, and was released.

He and other passengers were rescued by Bernard Beverwyk, 14 and John Beverly, 16, of Grandville, and Muri Huizenga, of 99 East 14th St., Holland. They were on Baker's landing and boarded the Beverwyk craft, a 16-foot rowboat with

motor, and went to the scene of the explosion.

Pulled from the water were Potts, the operator; his son David, 7, his daughter Lisa, 4, and Ruth Damstra, 16, also of Grand Rapids. Huizenga then drove Potts to Holland Hospital.

Called to the scene were Sgt. Edgar Hall and Deputy Ross Moser of the Ottawa sheriff's marine division, and Holland Coast Guardsmen who extinguished the fire on a towed boat to the station. The explosion occurred about 100 yards south of the Coast Guard station.

Potts told marine officers some fuel was spilled while refueling but that he had washed excess gas away with a hose. He said he had no idea how or why the explosion occurred.

Citizens Group Circulating Recall Petitions

Lester Van Dree was elected chairman of a newly organized Park Township Citizens committee circulating petitions to recall the entire Park township board.

Election was held Tuesday night in North Shore Community Hall attended by some 50 persons. It was the second meeting of a group concerned with problems in the township on several fronts.

Other officers are Mrs. Marjorie De Feyter, secretary, and Howard Helder, treasurer.

Van Dree said many township residents are displeased with the general attitude of the board.

ZEA Contract In Tentative Agreement

ZEELAND — Tentative agreement on a one-year master contract has been reached by ne-Education Association and the Board of Education.

Ratification votes by both the Board of Education and ZEA will be held before the contract becomes effective, probably next week. Terms of the contract were not released.

Representing the board in negotiations were Robert Bennett, chief negotiator, Jay Jansean and Robert Formosa. On the teachers' negotiating team were William Robertson, ZEA president and chief negotiator, Robert Hoover, John Blom and Patricia Visser. Joan Steinhof is ZEA president-elect.

Absentee Deadline Saturday

Saturday is the deadline for obtaining absentee ballots for the special election Aug. 19 on a vocational-technical college for Ottawa-Allegan area and to vote bonds for Holland city to provide secondary treatment and phosphate removal in the sewage treatment plant.

Voters in Holland school district which includes the city and Federal and Harrington school districts may apply for absentee ballots in the city clerk's office in City Hall up to 2 p.m.

The college issue is in three parts, one to establish a Community College district, another to vote 2 mills to plan and implement such a program and the third to elect a seven-member board. There are 34 candidates.

If a Community College district is voted but the millage issue loses, the law provides two more elections on millage before the program becomes invalid.

Hart and Cooley Strike Called Off

In a special vote Monday at West Ottawa School, Hart and Cooley employees associated with local 1418, International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers (AFM-CIO) approved an alternate package in current wage negotiations, thereby calling off a strike which had been scheduled to start at midnight Sunday.

The plant resumed normal operations on the midnight shift. The union had voted 140 to 89 Thursday to reject a package offered by management. About 250 employees are represented by the union.

Car-Bike Accident Injures Boy

GRAND RAPIDS — A young Holland boy is in critical condition today at St. Mary's Hospital here being treated in the intensive care unit for severe head injuries received in a car-bicycle accident on 136th Ave. near Riley St. at 5:08 p.m. Wednesday.

Randall Phillip Van Dyke, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Van Dyke of 2795 132nd Ave. was injured when the bike he was riding collided with a 1969 car driven by Wallace Ledbetter, 70, of 5123 136th Ave.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the youth was riding his bike south on 136th and allegedly turned the bike into the left side of the car after coming from behind a southbound truck on 136th.

In attempting to avoid striking the child, Ledbetter's northbound car went into a ditch, deputies said. The car was damaged on the left side and right front.

The accident occurred 150 feet north of Riley St. in front of 967 136th Ave.

The Van Dyke child was taken by ambulance to Holland Hospital and was transferred to the Grand Rapids hospital at 5:45 p.m. He was listed in critical condition at the time he was admitted to St. Mary's intensive care unit.

Ledbetter escaped injury, deputies said. His wife, Dorcas, 70, received multiple minor bruises and was taken to Holland Hospital. She was released after treatment and examination.

International Unit Formed For Herman Miller

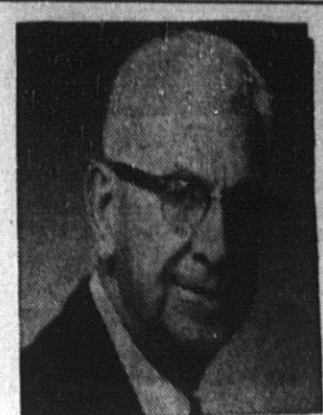

Max De Pree, president and executive vice president in charge of international operations, heads the new corporation. Other officers are Hugh De Pree, vice president; Clarence Boeve, secretary, and Vernon Poest, treasurer.

In another announcement, Robert Blaich, vice president of design and development, was named managing director of Herman Miller, AG, Basel, Switzerland. In addition to his other responsibilities, he will set up a functioning design group in Europe which will become integrated with the design and development unit in the United States.

The Switzerland operation is part of a long-range plan to create a more balanced organization and to change from a U.S.A. company with international affiliates to a truly international corporation.

With Blaich's move to Basel, Max De Pree who has been in Europe the past year will return in September.

Boy Fractures Neck in Dive

A Holland teenager fractured his neck and received severe head injuries in a dive from a 6-foot board at a West Olive family camping area at 3:10 p.m. Wednesday.

Jack Jipping, 15-year-old son of Mrs. Mike Jipping, of 32 East 28th St., was listed in fair condition at Holland Hospital today.

The youth was injured when he dived off the board at White Birch Park, 15396 Barry St., into 10 feet of water and hit his head on the dirt bottom of the spring-fed pond.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies administered first aid at the scene before the youth was removed to Holland Hospital.

Mrs. Raymond Ryzena of White Birch Park today verified the water depth and diving board height and said the pond is pumped full constantly.

Wyoming Firm Receives Bid

ALLEGAN — The Allegan County Board of Supervisors has awarded Karsten Construction Co., of Wyoming, a contract to build a 60-bed medical care facility for Allegan County, it was announced Wednesday.

The Wyoming firm's base bid of \$808,644 was low enough for the board to approve all construction alternates with few exceptions, Phillip Quade, chairman of the building committee for the supervisors said.

The facility will be financed by a five-year, one-mill tax sinking fund which still has one more year to go and bring in a total of \$1 million plus for the project.

57,652 Persons Visit Holland State Park

A total of 57,652 persons visited the beach at Holland State Park during the past week, according to Donald Ike, park manager, with 11,154 Saturday and 13,149 Sunday.

A total of 65 campers were turned away Saturday and 230 vehicles for day use were turned away Sunday. This morning there were 37 vacant camp sites.

Resident and non-resident annual permits sold throughout the week totaled 668 and 1,168 resident and non-resident daily permits were sold, according to Ike.

Fire Sweeps Draft Office In Allegan

Arson Suspected;
FBI, Fire Marshal
Join Investigation

ALLEGAN — Fire early today, believed to have been deliberately set, destroyed a two-story downtown building housing the Allegan County Selective Service Board office and the City News Stand.

Loss was estimated at \$50,000. It was not immediately determined how many Selective Service records were destroyed in the blaze, but authorities said duplicate records of all documents are on file in Lansing.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation, the State Fire Marshal's office and state Selective Service officials joined in the investigation. Det. Sgt. Robert E. Ruohonen of the Paw Paw state police branch is representing the fire marshal's office.

Allegan Fire Chief R. J. Blanz and Police Chief Howard Falk said arson was suspected. They said the fire started in the Selective Service office upstairs, probably in a desk, and burned through the floor, the desk falling into the first floor store.

The blaze was noticed at 4:05 a.m. today by Don Sturgis who was passing through the downtown area. Police officer Neil Folkertsma had had a busy night dealing with three false alarms on fires, a report of knocking down mail boxes on Hooker Rd. just outside the city, and one on squealing tires.

The building at 119 Locust St., one of the few downtown buildings which have fire walls, is owned by James Green who operates the newsstand. It formerly was a bank and is located in the main business block of the city.

There was some water damage to the appliance store of Hartman and Morgan, Inc., next door, and less damage to the Daniel and Collins TV Sales and service on the other side.

Allegan firemen were assisted by a pumper and 10 firemen from Otsego.

In addition to newspapers, the newsstand stocks paperbacks, greeting cards, gifts and novelty items.

Two Plead Guilty To Lesser Charges In Shooting

James Hardin, 23, of 330½ Howard Ave., charged with felonious assault with a dangerous weapon but without intent to commit murder in connection with allegedly precipitating a shooting incident last July 12, appeared in Holland District Court Tuesday and pleaded guilty to a lesser charge.

The felonious assault charge was dropped to a misdemeanor in that he "intentionally but without malice pointed a gun at one Wanda Pate," court officials reported.

Hardin was charged after being shot at by Charles Pate, 31, of 248 East 14th St., on Lakewood Blvd., according to Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who investigated. Deputies said the shooting occurred as the result of a quarrel.

Pate was charged with assault with intent to commit murder after he allegedly fired two shots with a .38 caliber pistol at Hardin. Hardin was not injured.

Hardin was ordered to confer with a probation officer on Aug. 28 and return for sentencing on Sept. 4 at 4 p.m. He was released.

Pate appeared in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday and also pleaded guilty to a reduced charge. He is to return for sentencing on Sept. 8.

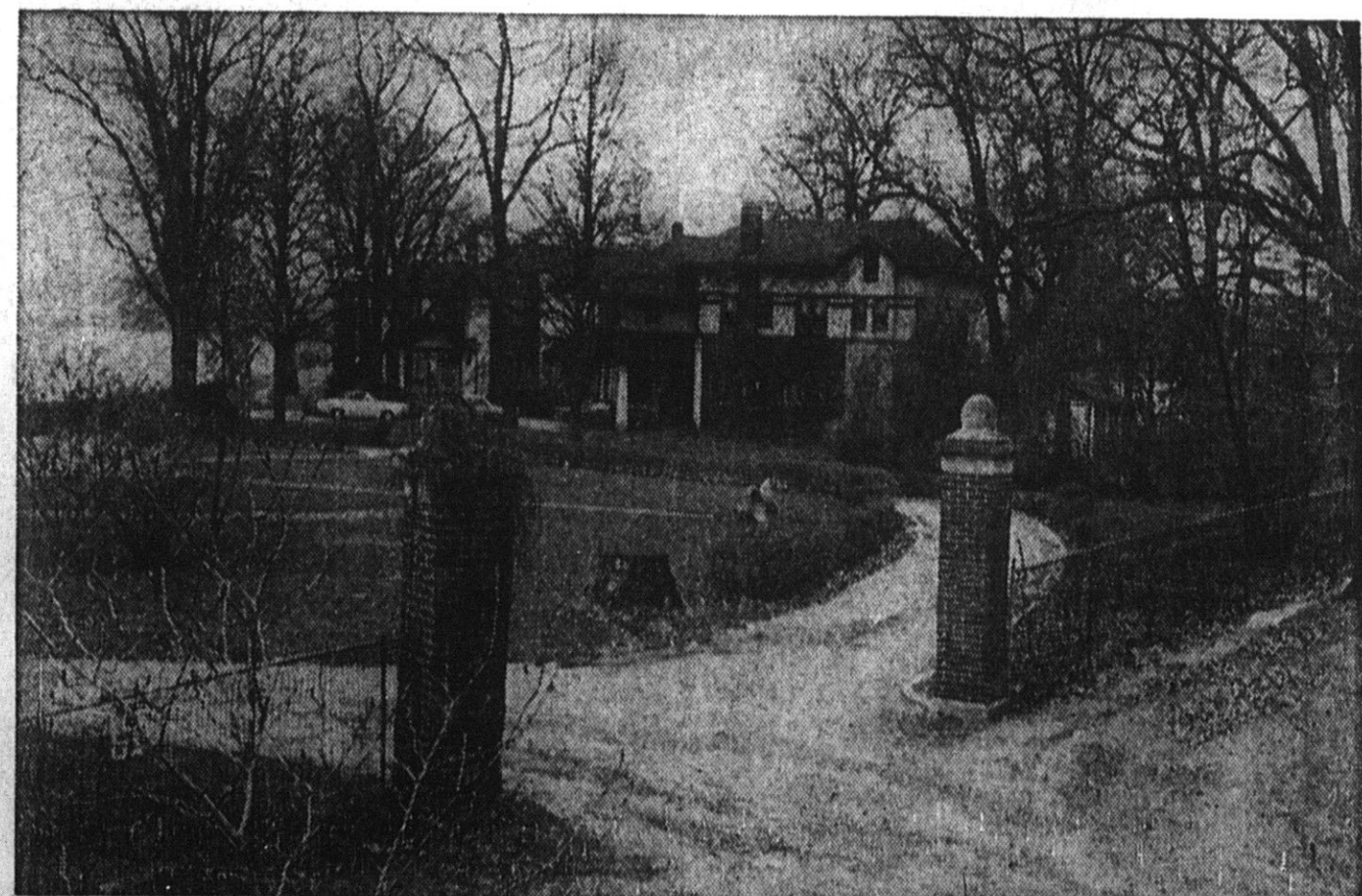
2 Reported Injured In 2-Car Accident

Two persons were transferred to Community Hospital, Douglas, after examination at Holland Hospital of injuries received in a two-car crash at the intersection of South Shore Dr. and Beechwood St. at 8:40 p.m. Friday.

Debra Snyder, 4, of 740 1st Ave. and Evelyn Thompson, 48, of Saugatuck, both injured, were passengers in a car driven by Daniel Lee Snyder, 23, of 740 1st Ave. Two other passengers were not injured.

The driver of the second car, Nancy Ann Gamby, 26, of 1188 West 32nd St., and three passengers were not injured. The accident occurred when the Gamby car, waiting for a car to turn at the intersection, was struck by the Snyder car, which skidded 21 feet before the impact, according to Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who cited Snyder for failure to maintain an assured clear distance.

Gold Property at Waukazoo Presented to Hope College

cruiser, "Infinity Hope."

Marigold Lodge was built in 1913 by Egbert Gold, a pioneer in the improvement of central heating systems. Gold received more than 100 patents during his career for improvements in heating devices, including the vapor system which is now in general use on the railroads of the United States, Canada, and several foreign countries.

Gold's father, in 1854, devised a method of heating dwellings with steam. His idea of putting a steam boiler into a house for heating purposes was then considered so fantastic that it was referred to as "Gold's folly."

Egbert Gold entered business on his own in 1901 by selling steam heating equipment for railway passenger cars. In 1905 he founded the Chicago Car Heating Co.

Mr. and Mrs. Gold fell in love with the Lake Macatawa property in the summer of 1912 while on a cruise of various resorts on the east coast of Lake Michigan in the Yacht "Marigold."

"We anchored the Marigold one afternoon just east of the present south dock on the Marigold Lodge and came ashore in a row boat," Gold wrote in his personal diary.

The unimproved property was then known as Superior Point. Late in 1912 Gold purchased the original pieces of property for \$7,150, a sizeable sum for those days.

Gold developed the property by having black dirt brought up from the Black River by scow. He was much interested in horticulture and growing plants which could not thrive in the sandy soil.

An entry in the Gold diary at the time of his death in 1928 offered a poignant testimonial to a great man. It read: "Thus closed the personally related

and recorded incidents by a great man, who, with creative genius and with an ardent appreciation of the beautiful in nature, had taken a barren sandy miniature peninsula and made it into a paradise — calling it Marigold Lodge in loving honor to the names of both wife and daughter. This place and its association Mr. Gold loved perhaps more than any other spot and it is quite significant that here he spent his last days."

Mrs. Gold, who later married Mischa Thorgevsky, died in 1968.

Miss Gold presently resides in New York City. Caretakers for the estate for many years have

been Mr. and Mrs. Albert Buursma.

Acquisition of the property has special significance to Hope College in that the college once owned a tract of 830 acres in the area which includes Gold's Point.

The college purchased the property in 1867 as a future site for Hope Haven University, but the plans for the establishment of a scientific school were never realized when the property was sold to ease a financial crisis. That same year Hope purchased the property which currently constitutes the campus area.

Community Ambassador Says Goodby to Denmark

(ED. NOTE: Following is the final article received from Miss Karin Granberg, Holland's 1969 Community Ambassador, who is in Denmark.)

Dear Friends in Holland,

Today is my final day in Denmark. Although I will be traveling in Europe until Aug. 20, the Experiment in International Living has come to its close. It has been a wonderful summer and I hope that I will be able to share my pictures as well as my experiences here with many of you when I return to Holland in September.

I would like to suggest the Experiment in International Living as a possibility for those from between the ages of 16 and 23 who are interested in a summer in Europe.

The past weeks strongly convince me that the best way to see another country is through the eyes of its inhabitants and

this cannot really happen unless you can find a way of sharing in their home life. By placing you in a family, the Experiment enables you to become acquainted with many other people. For example, this is being written from the desk of my Danish grandmother.

I have learned that shopping and sight-seeing are always available but not always desirable. It is wonderful to know people in a town and to share in their familiarity with it, rather than to bumble around by yourself as the unmistakable tourist!

In my series of articles, I have tried to convey important aspects of my visit to Denmark; the people, the countryside and the way of life. Of course, there is much I have had to omit. For this reason I hope all of you who are able will come to Denmark and discover its charm for yourselves. Traveling is a personal experience.

Perhaps you know of people who do not support my enthusiasm for Denmark. I suppose that in reality it is neither incomparably beautiful or different. However, if you enjoy good food and good companions, Denmark has much to offer you.

During these eight weeks I have considered myself very fortunate to participate in the Experiment as your Community Ambassador. I hope to further convey this gratitude in my various opportunities to speak with organizations and clubs about Denmark.

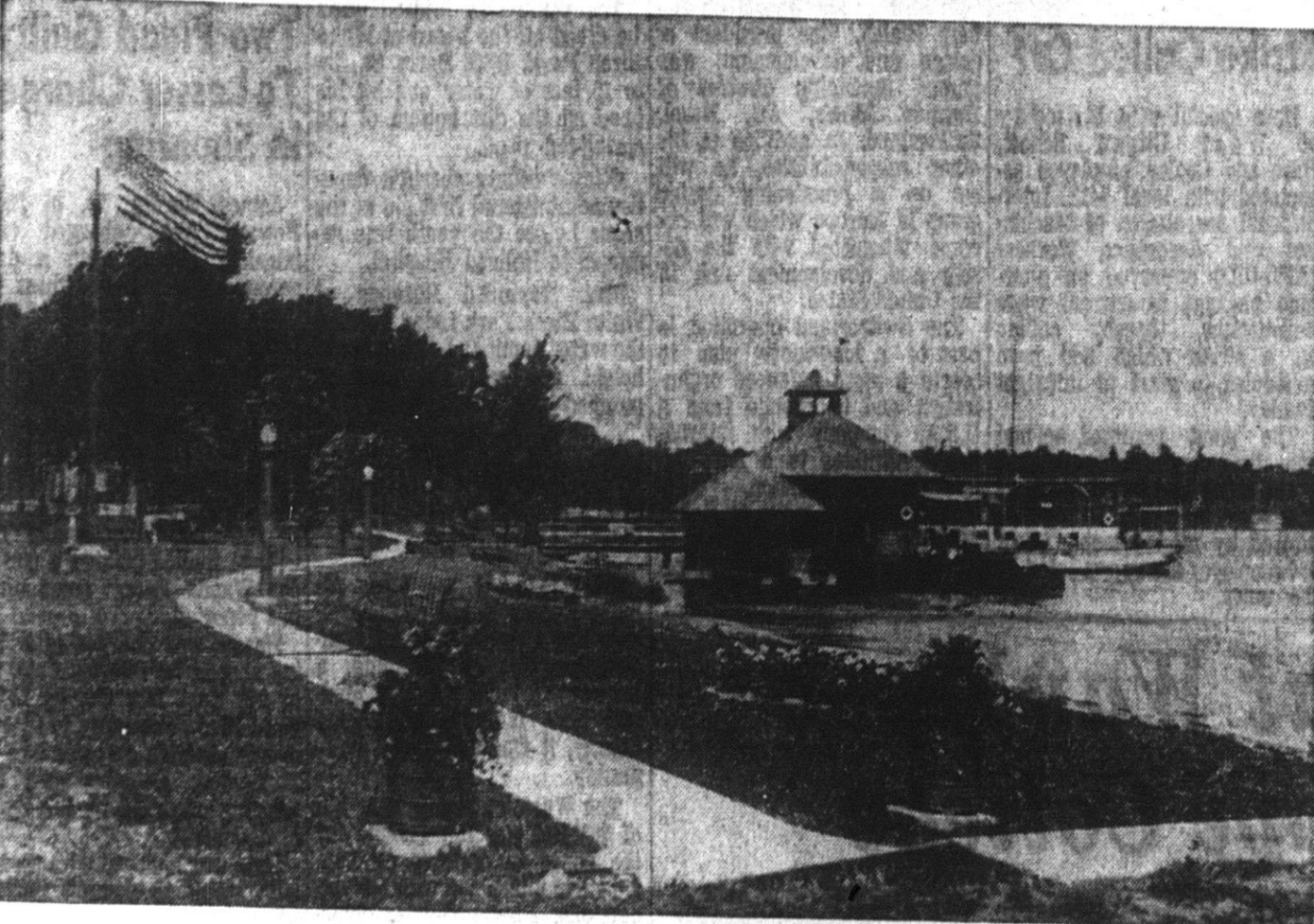

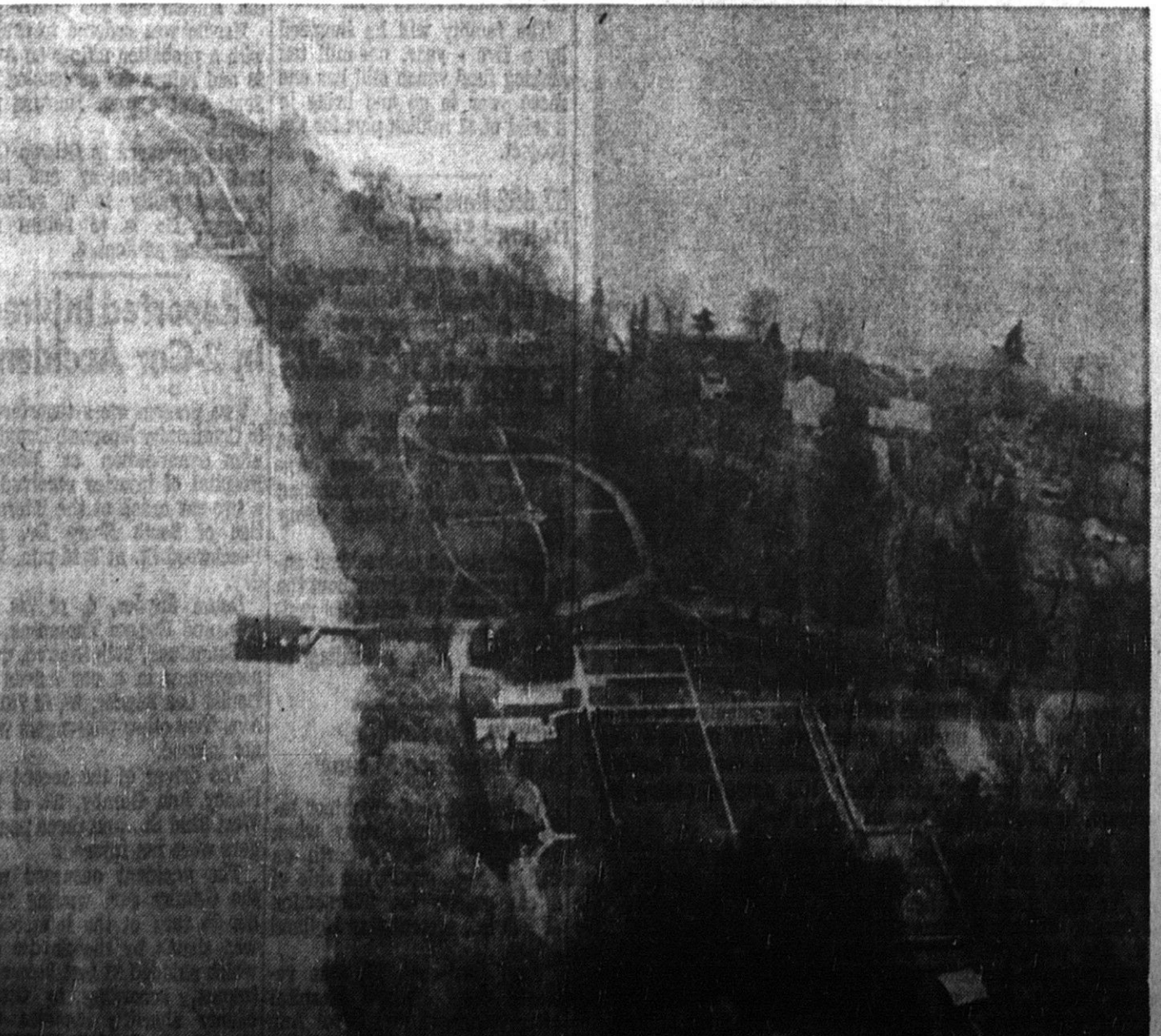

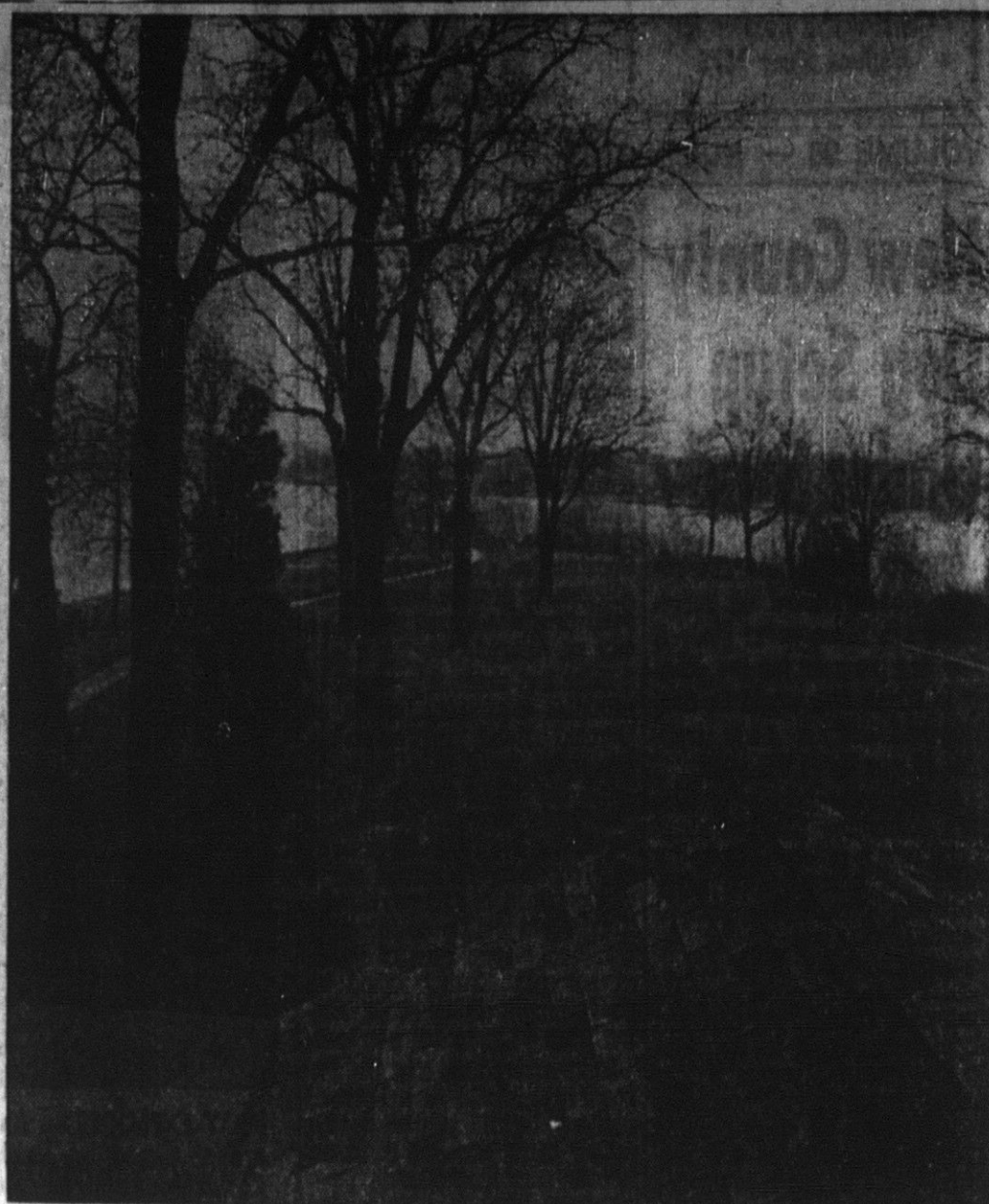

Ambassador Describes Her 'Home' in Denmark

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is the latest letter received from Miss Karin Granberg, Holland's 1969 Community Ambassador, who is visiting in Denmark.)

In my wish to share some general reactions to Denmark and its people, I have neglected to go into any detail about the city which has been my home base here in Denmark.

The city of Aalborg is the third largest city in Denmark. It is located on the Limfjord, a 70-mile fjord that stretches from sea to sea across North Jutland, from the North Sea to the Kattegat. Its position on the fjord has made it the fourth largest harbor in Denmark.

Every day there are arrivals and departures of ships headed for Copenhagen, Norway, Sweden and Holland; to name only a small portion of the Aalborg harbor traffic.

Greater Aalborg is composed of the city that spreads from her harbor location into the lovely suburb of Hasseris (where I have been located) and across the fjord into the city of Nørresundby. In total the population is 125,000.

Aalborg is a wonderful combination of old and new, industry and natural beauty. The old Aalborg dates back 800 years. The area around the city hall has been preserved as a monument to Aalborg's historic past.

One of the most interesting parts of old Aalborg is the Budolfi Cathedral, over 400 years old, whose steeple can be seen all over Aalborg — this lovely white structure is one of the youngest cathedrals in Denmark. Its interior is particularly beautiful with medieval frescoes on the porch, Renaissance pulpits and epitaphs on the walls and the Baroque frontpiece from 1728. Another is the Aalborghus, Denmark's only remaining administrative castle, built in 1539-1555. It looks more like a merchant's house than a castle because it was not used as a fortress but as the center for the administration of North Jutland (which it is today 400 years later!).

Modern Aalborg is a city that can compete with Copenhagen for entertainment and beauty. Aalborg, known as the "merry town" all over Denmark, has over 170 restaurants! The first opens where the last closes.

The zoo is second only to Copenhagen's, along with its miniature Livoli. Gardens are everywhere in Aalborg — long stretches of grass and then bursts of every color rose imaginable.

Many of you may have heard of Aalborg snaps or akavit,

which the people drink along with beer at most meals. It is probable that snaps helps to make Aalborg merry — but with or without it is a delightful town! One every visitor to Denmark should see.

es and coats from above the knee to full length in evening dresses and coats. The mini skirts will still be popular with the younger set.

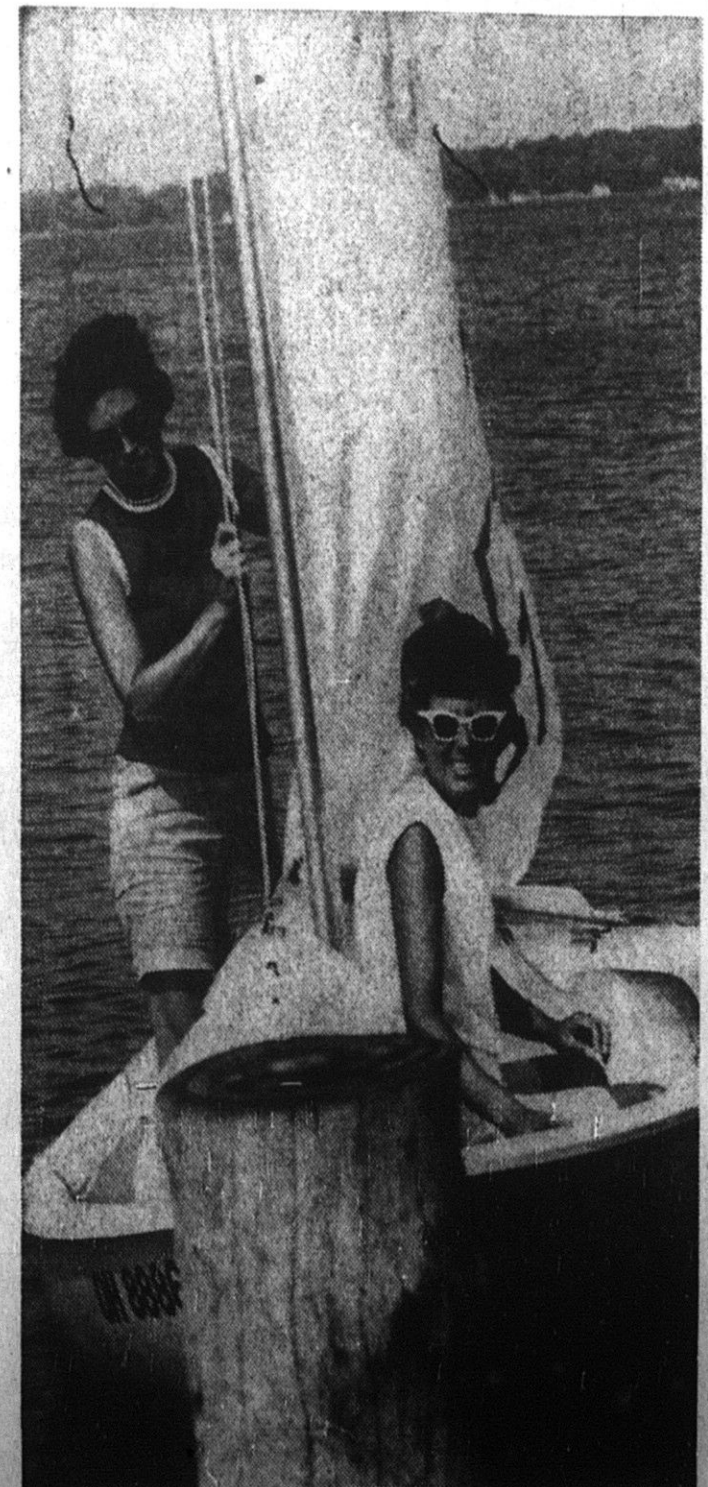

Muted colors are in for fall with plenty of body jewelry evident. At the Thursday showing the jewelry was a Geoffrey Beane's and the luscious furs

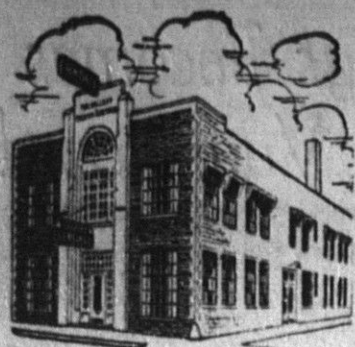

The word "success" is popular but the word "fail" suggests to many a tragedy. To fail God is really tragic although many people do not think so. Unbelief causes people to fail God — this lesson teaches this truth.

I. Some people get a special responsibility. The twelve men who were sent out to spy out the Promised Land, were all leaders, one from every tribe, charged with the task of looking around to find out all they could about the land and then to give a report regarding their findings.

The spies left Kadeshbarnea full of expectation. Before the people reached this place several events took place which showed that Israel was not ready to do ahead. The people murmured, complained, they were chastened by fire and they spoke of the varied diet they had in Egypt. Aaron and Miriam questioned the leadership of Moses and were punished for it. The people seemed distrustful. The spies later showed the mood of the nation.

II. Some people believe, some do not. The twelve came back with a report. All agreed on the fact that it was a good land. Disagreement revealed itself—note the word "nevertheless." Ten spies said that the people are strong, the cities are fortified, giants lived there and they seemed like grasshoppers beside them. The report made the people scared, they wept, grumbled, shouted, "Would God that we had died in the land of Egypt."

Two men, Joshua and Caleb gave a minority report. The ten said, "We are not able," the two said "We are able" and were threatened with stones. The two believed in God's promises, the ten disbelieved in God. The people chose to believe the majority report. The power of the majority is great and allures people. Today too it takes courage to oppose the majority as it did in times past but some have it. And unbelief blurs the thoughts of people today just as in the days of Moses and Joshua.

III. Some people cheat themselves. Unbelief is costly. The rebels were punished. God said that they would not be allowed to enter into the Promised Land but the children about whom they were concerned would have that privilege. All who were twenty years and up would die in the wilderness, but those under twenty, the coming generation, they would enter in the land. A whole generation due to their unbelief wasted away. Two older men, Caleb and Joshua, the believing spies, would go with the younger generation.

We live in a time of permissiveness. One result has been violence which is excused but not punished. God still punishes sin although many will not believe. God is just and righteous and hence must punish sin now and in eternity. Forgiveness may be obtained through faith in Jesus Christ.



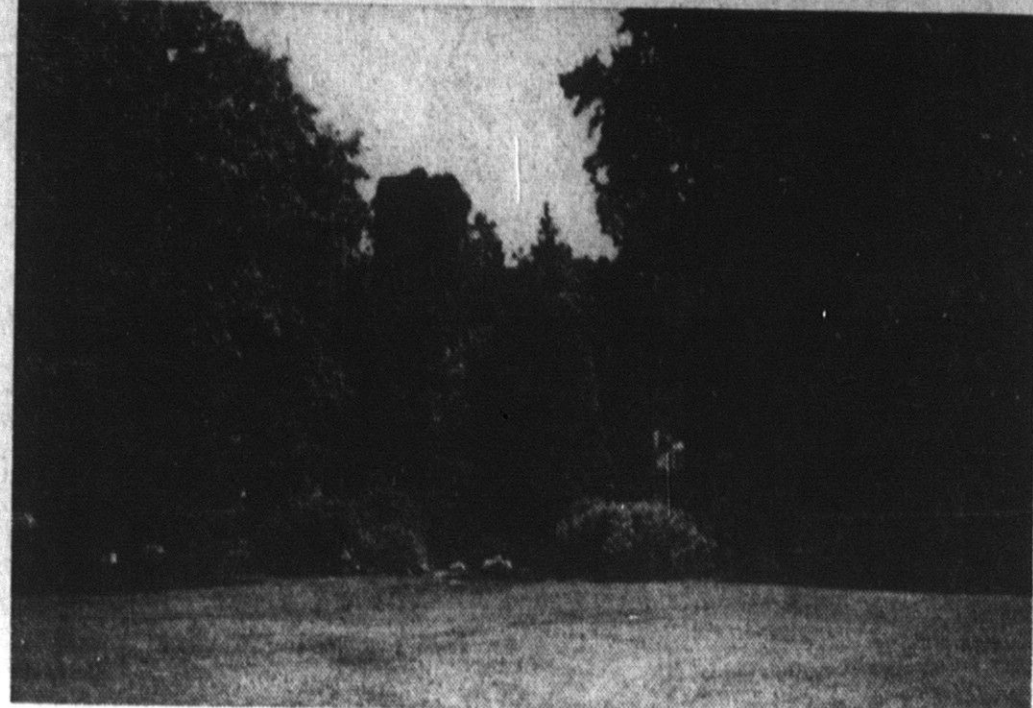

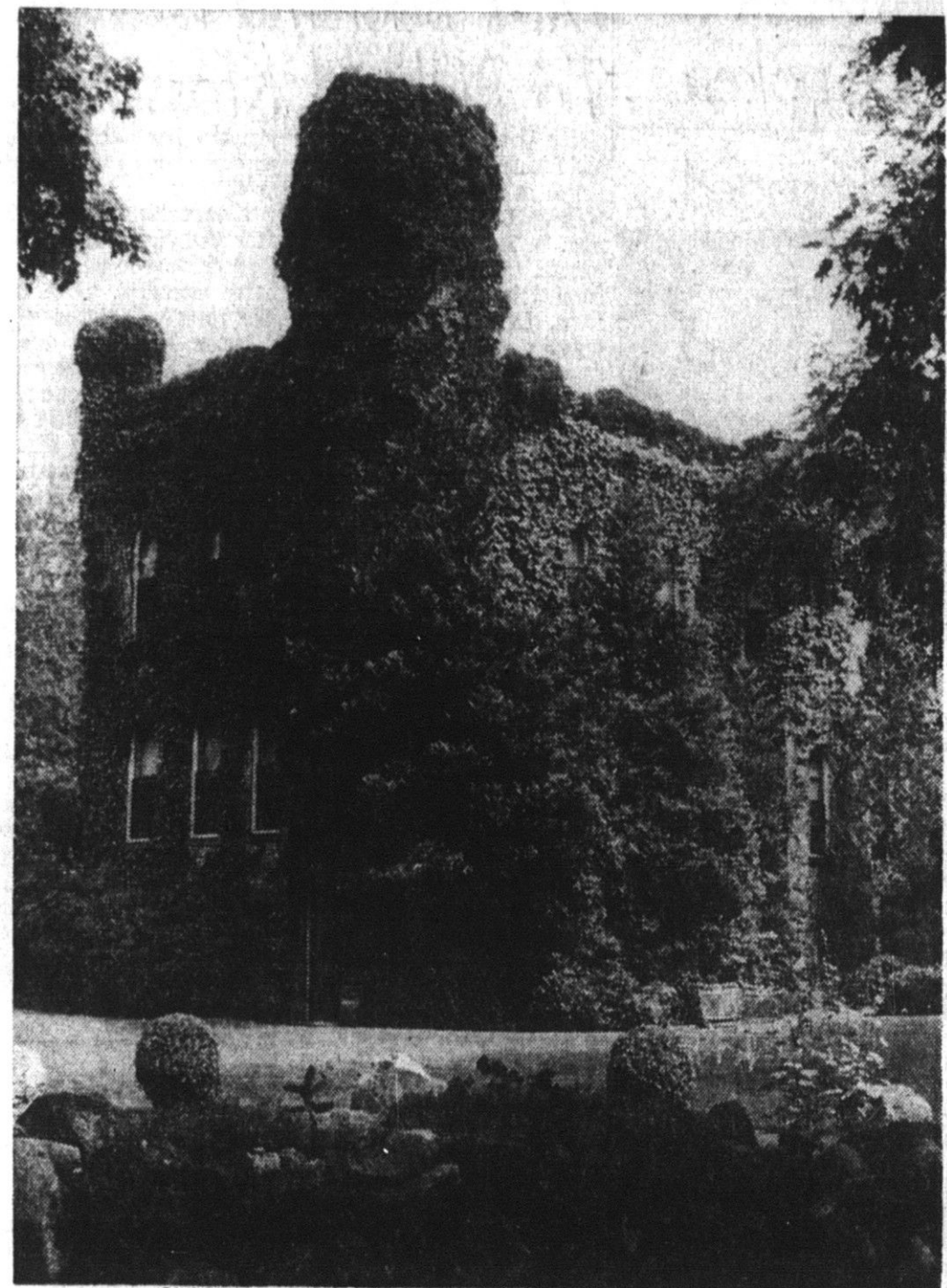

Storybook Legends Remain Intact at Castle Resort

"Once upon a time" is used mostly in children's literature to tell nursery rhymes or fairy tales. It usually refers to Kings and Queens and Princes and Princess and castles.

Legend has grown up that The Castle, hub of the Castle Park summer colony, was built in the 1880's by a Chicagoan of Austrian ancestry who fashioned The Castle from one he saw in Austria.

Michael Schwarz and his wife had six daughters and two sons and they in turn married and had children. The former Bertha Schwarz married Benjamin Wolters and they had a daughter, Marie, who is now Mrs. Marvin Hutchinson of Fennville. She found an old, old picture of The Castle among her mother's papers and brought it to The Sentinel.

In the old photo, taken during the winter, when the trees were bare, the Castle itself stands out clearly. Since then, the vines have covered the building and the trees have grown up so that to the casual observer couldn't see the Castle for the trees.

In the old picture the late Mrs. George Daniels of Cleveland is seen at the left near the big tree. She was the former Clara Schwarz.

Only two of the original Schwarz children are still alive, John Schwarz of Washington, D.C., and Mrs. John (Frieda

Schwarz) Whalen of Chicago. The others were Rose and Marie, Clara and Bertha, the eldest, John and George.

In 1896 the Castle and its grounds were bought by Mr. and Mrs. John H. Parr of Chicago who wanted to make a boy's camp out of it. It was so successful that cottages were built for parents who enjoyed the ideal resort conditions and it finally turned into a full-fledged summer resort with a family tradition.

In 1917, two former Castle Park resorters who had enjoyed the resort as children and later as sweethearts, Marion and Carter Brown, bought the Castle and have since made it the delightful resort that it is. Generations have spent many happy summers here and will continue to do so — the last great "summer resort" in the Holland area.

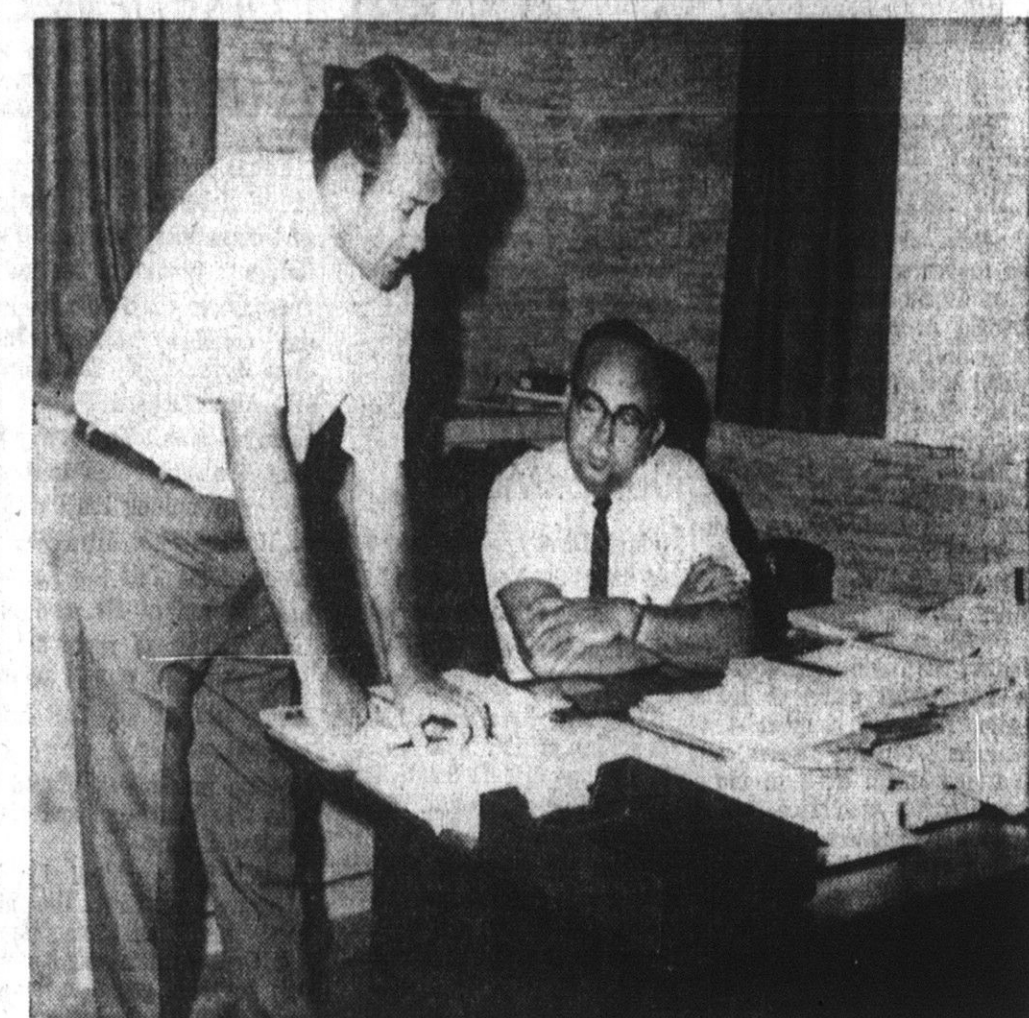

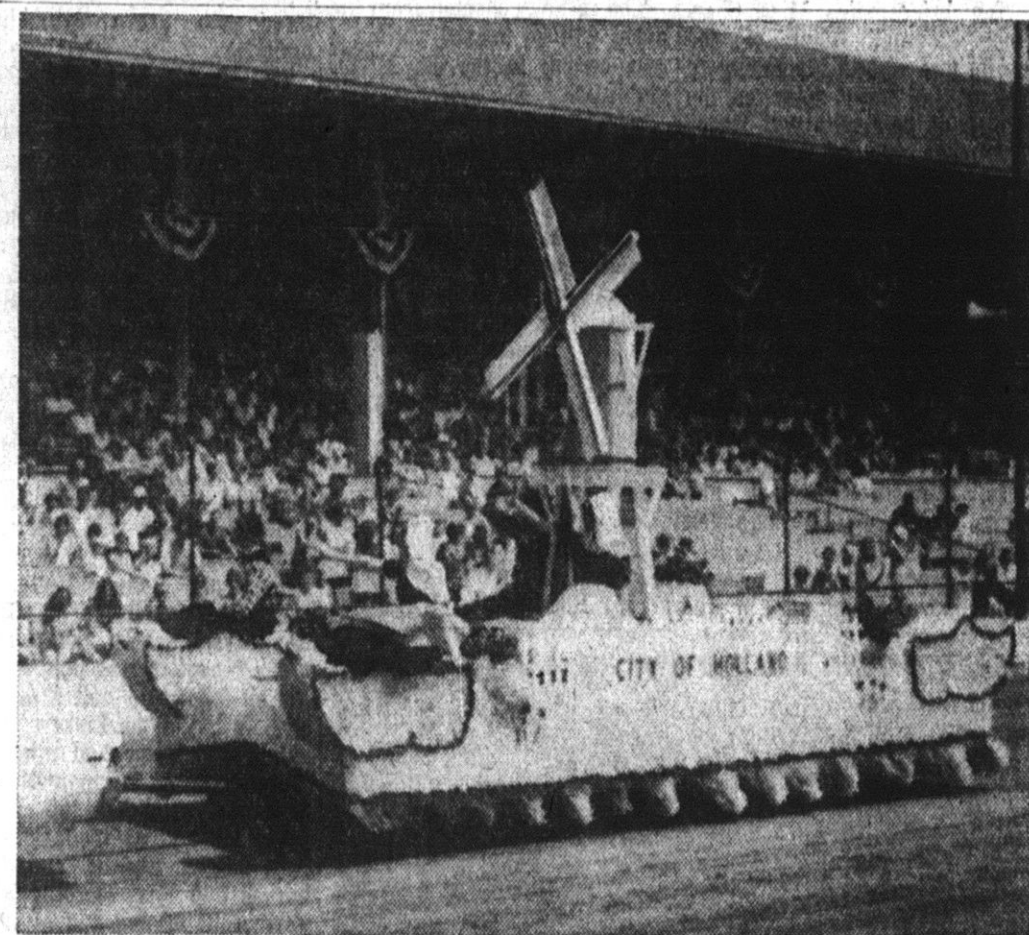

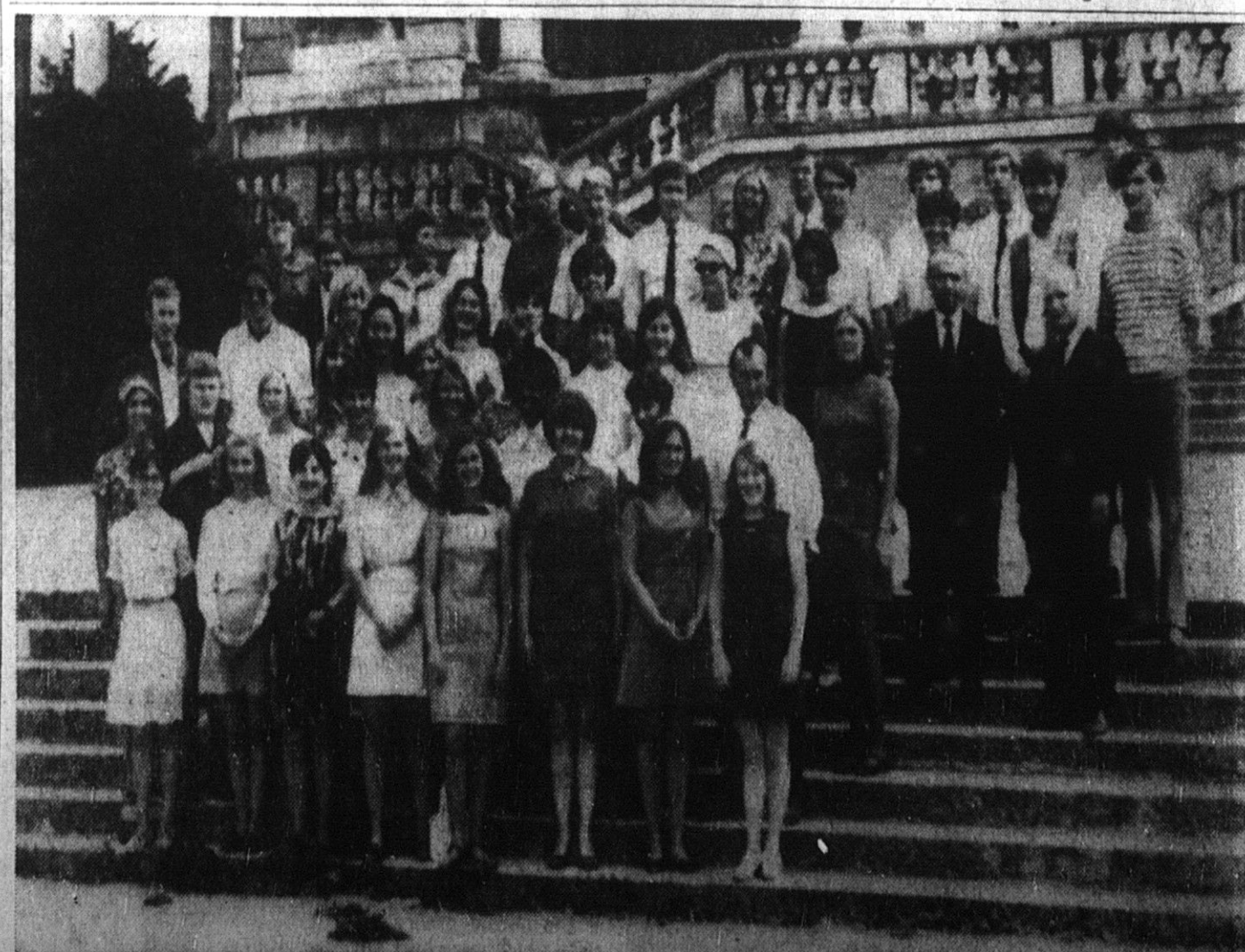

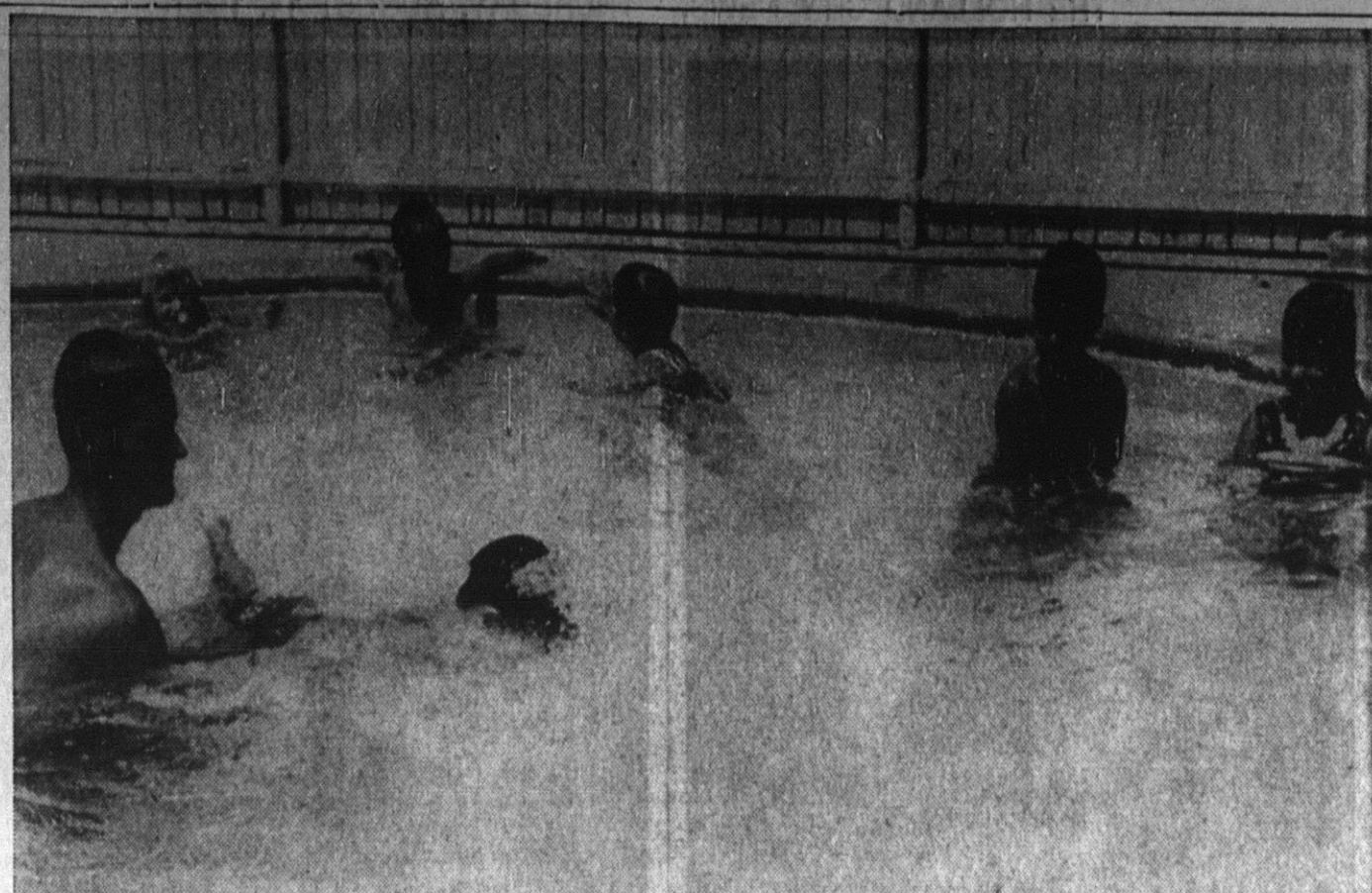

Grandstanding Pools Are a Success

Thanks to Bob Andree, teacher at Jefferson School in Holland, the YMCA has something going in the community that shows how the people of Holland are cooperating to help youngsters get started in safety swimming.

In 1964 Andree had an idea that has since become reality. Five years later this program is becoming stronger each year and without the people of Holland, this would not be so.

Yes, we are talking about back-yard pools. They have certainly arrived in Holland and

we have something to be proud of.

Back-yard pools have become quite popular in Holland. Presently there are seven pools that have been donated by Holland people to the YMCA.

The pools that are used by the operation presently are owned by Raymond Schumacher, Casey Brewer, Roger Beckman, Harold Cooper, Charles Kupsy and Donald Wuertel.

Without these and past Holland donors of their pools, there would be no such program, YMCA officials said.

Andree has been running three pools himself while Allison Hall who lives in Zeeland and who just came back from the peace corps is also teaching at one of the pools. Mrs. Judy Cornelissen has been helping also at one of the seven pools along with Bruce Struik who is the founder of the underprivileged children swimming safety program which is presently held at Kupsy's pool.

The YMCA has real fine instructors in these four people that are working hand and hand with the YMCA. Mrs. Cornelissen is a teacher at the West Ottawa High School while Struik is director of the Higher Horizons at Hope College.

It takes eight sessions to complete the program with one

hour held for each session for youngsters four to 12 years of age.

According to Andree, there are three worthy points that they attempt to teach each youngster. First, getting use to the water, second, water safety, third, sharpen up fundamentals.

There are four different programs that the teachers hope to get passing results from the youngsters.

The first session is for (minnow) beginners and consists of teaching the child how to dog paddle, hold his breath in the water and how to float on his back.

The second program is for low intermediates (fish club) and stresses the fundamentals and sculling and treading of

the water.

The (flying fish) middle intermediate third program consists of teaching the youngsters how to side stroke, frog kick and surface dives and object recovery.

To pass the last program each student must be able to dive four times off the diving board plus the underwater swim, lifesaving stroke, and back dive.

This is just another wonderful program that the people of Holland have cooperated on and Andree and the YMCA do have something going that commands respect in the community.

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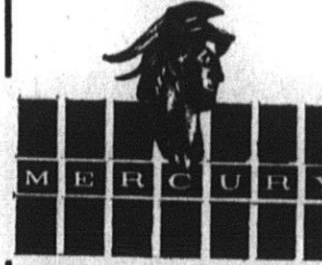

Kiwanis Endorses Sewer Bond Issue

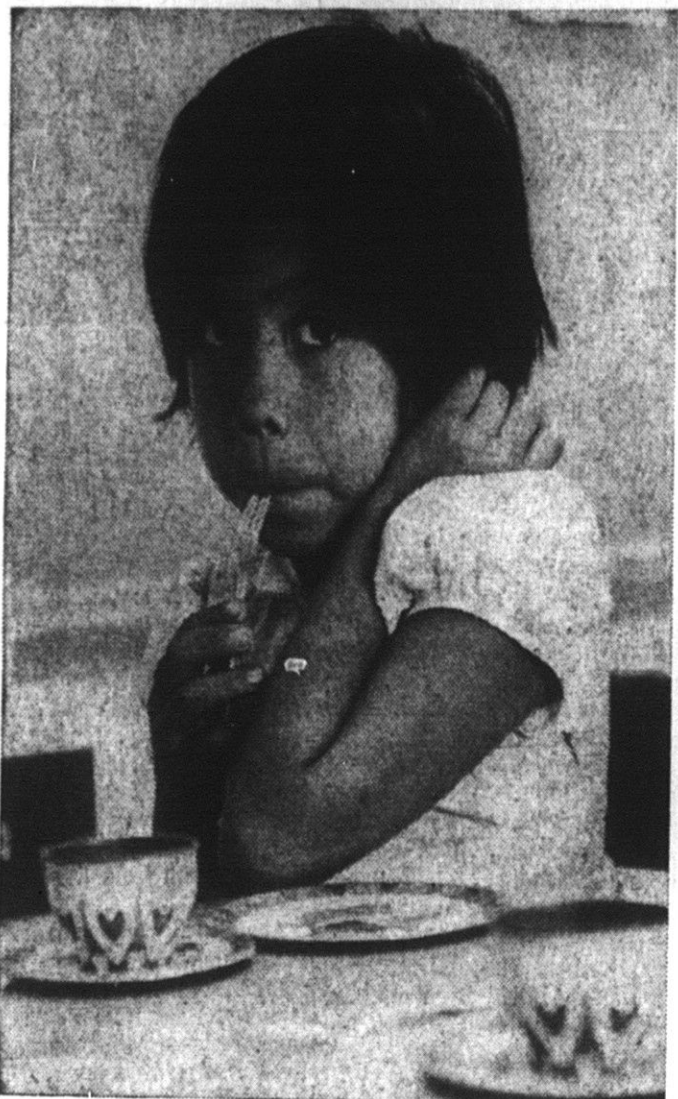

Pine Creek School Project Offers Unique Opportunity

A unique program was begun June 23 at Pine Creek School. Under the sponsorship of the United Migrants Opportunity, Inc., and the direction of Robert Hoeksema of Grand Valley State College, Pine Creek was selected as the site of one of four Migrant Head Start programs.

The project, new this year, is an attempt to reach the children of workers who come to Holland for the blueberry season.

Its goals, while still experimental and demonstrational, are twofold. For the older children three to six years, it is to help them acquire cognitive concepts, to learn the English language. For the younger ones it is to provide care, aid them in their development, teach them English, and give them the attention they miss with their mothers working all day.

The day begins as the children are bused in from the various camps for an 8 a.m. breakfast. After this the four- to six-year-olds are given baths and a clean set of clothes. The set they wore to the school is then sent to the laundry. By the time they are ready to leave for home at 4 p.m. the clothes are clean, pressed and returned for them to wear.

Following the baths the young ones have supervised play and rest periods. Even their play time is designed to increase their familiarity and use of English.

For the three- to six-year-olds the morning is filled with instruction and a practical application of English. The meanings and distinction between such problem concepts as in-out, up-down, around-through and others is the goal. What they are taught in the more formal class period is then put into use in their play time.

Building a house out of huge boxes not only gives them an opportunity to apply such propositions as in-out, but also to learn the names of the rooms and the objects which go inside. A girls' tea party is an occasion to distinguish the dishes and foods.

All this may seem superfluous to an observer but when one realizes that at least half the children there speak no English it is obvious how necessary this training is if they are ever to succeed when they reach elementary school.

Who are these youngsters and how do they react to this school?

Roughly 90 per cent of them come with their families from Texas on the harvest trail which includes picking blueberries in

Michigan. They are largely Spanish-Americans with only a rudimentary grasp of English.

At the school they are divided into nursery, toddler and pre-school groups. They are responsive, eager to learn and friendly once their confidence is won.

The project is subsidized by state and federal funds as well as donations of clothes and toys from the community. Presently there are 42 children being cared for with a capacity of 60. Complete family and academic records are kept for all participants to be forwarded to the schools they will attend in the future.

As well as offering educational opportunities, the Pine Creek program cares for the physical needs of the children with the aid of the Ottawa County Health Department. The youngsters are given physicals, hearing tests and dental attention. The staff is always attentive to any sign of illness on the part of the pupils.

An integral part of Head Start is the effort to involve the parents in the school. To this end Sam Garcia, parent coordinator, is encouraging the parents to visit the school and several of the employees have been hired directly from the migrant camps.

Pine Creek Head Start is more than a baby-sitting project. As Hoeksema is quick to point out its curriculum is a unique attempt at coping with the migrant problem as it affects the future of the children.

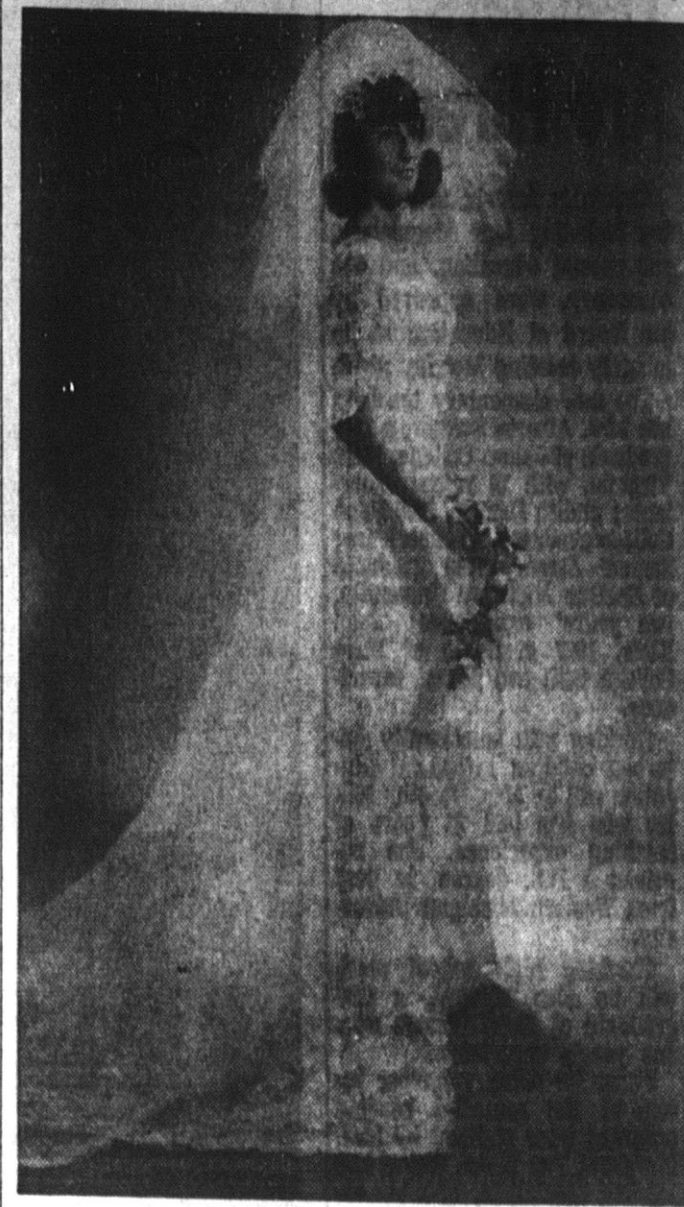

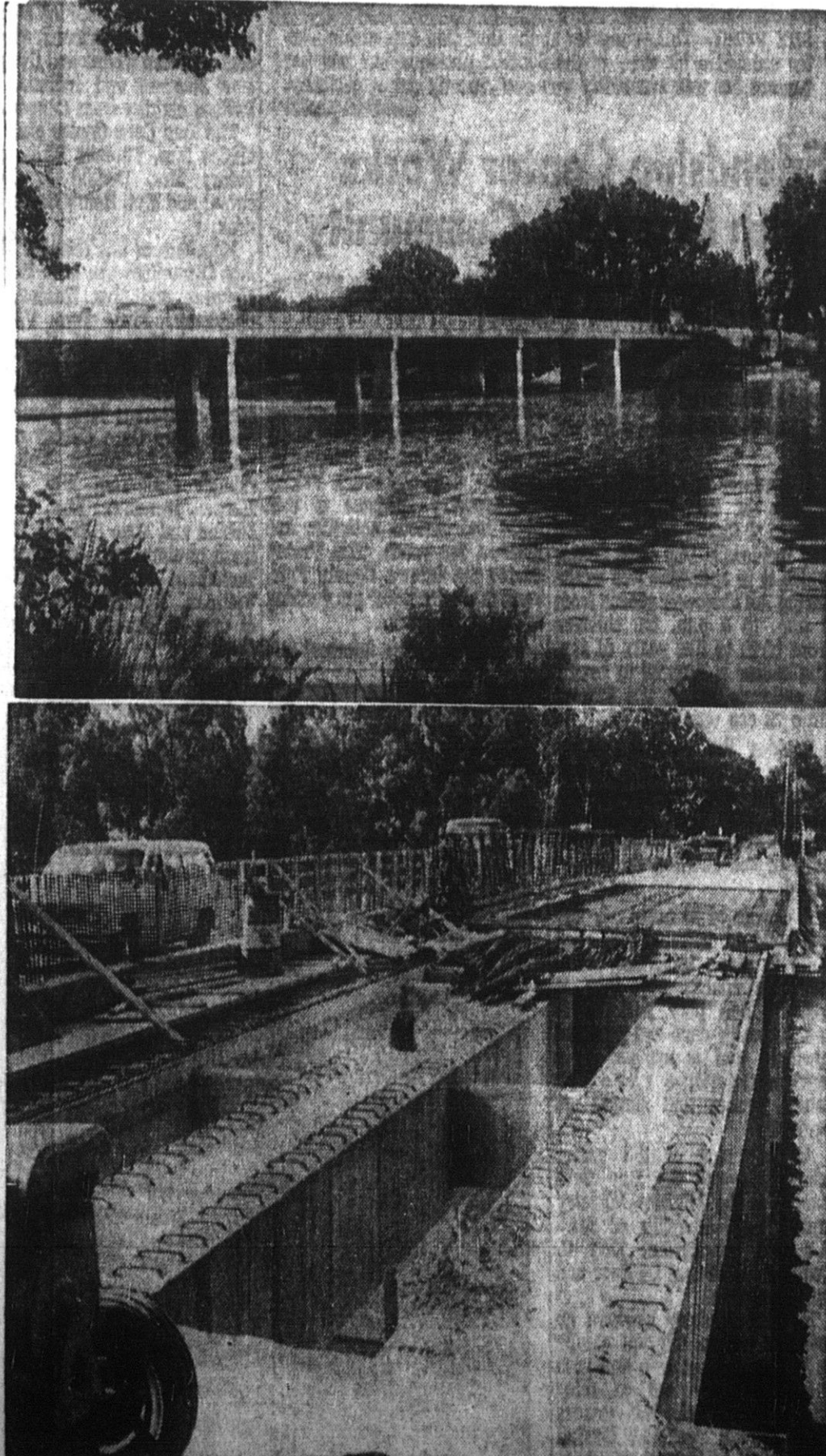

Six More Teachers Are Hired

Contracts for six new teachers including four elementary, one special education, and one secondary, were approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night.

The new elementary teachers are Mrs. Alberta Bakker, a 1947 graduate of Salem College, West Virginia, with 15 years' experience; Judith Deenik, 1969 Hope College graduate, no experience; Samuel Jersey, 1968 graduate of Eastern Michigan University, two years' experience; John Kleis, 1967 graduate of Hope College with two years' experience.

Working with emotionally disturbed children in special education will be Mrs. Dorothy Miller who has had 21 years of teaching experience. She received a B.S. degree in 1967 from Western Michigan University.

Teaching high school math will be Alan Myaard, a 1968 graduate of Hope College with one year's experience.

Plans for using volunteer tutors in the remedial reading program were outlined by Mrs. Margaret Van Wyke, one of two reading specialists, who has arranged with the AAUW for volunteer effort in working not only with reading skills but with Spanish American and southern children on a one-to-one basis with reading consultants working with each child perhaps once in two weeks. Mrs. Van Wyke also plans to continue using poor readers in fifth and sixth grades as tutors for poor readers in first and second grades since these children have a greater rapport and often the older children benefit more than the younger children. She also spoke of the need of men to work with boys in some cases, emphasizing that volunteers need not be teachers, nor do they need teaching backgrounds.

The board also passed a resolution applying for funds under Title I for the reading program. It was pointed out that the Headstart Program as it has been operating in Holland the last four summers may be changed under the new HEW program, probably serving fewer students but over a longer period of time.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman explained developments in the school reorganization case in the courts with Judge Chester A. Ray ruling in favor of the Ottawa Area Intermediate District and the Holland Board of Education. The school attorney was instructed to proceed with plans to schedule a transportation millage vote as soon as possible, pending possible appeals.

Board President James O. Lamb said he was pleased to announce that the negotiating team of the Holland Education Association and the Board of Education had arrived at a tentative agreement on a master contract for the 1969-70 school year, an arrangement he felt was equitable not only for the teachers and citizens of the community but would provide quality education for the children. He expressed the hope that the teacher's vote later this month would be affirmative.

Announcement was made that the high school band would be joining the Muskegon High School Band at a six-day band camp Aug. 18-23 at the Blue Lake Fine Arts camp near Muskegon.

Harvey Butler who served as Holland's representative on the County Tax Allocation Board for eight years was reappointed to the post.

Building Supt. Edward Prins reported on summer maintenance projects for 1969, explaining that 16 college and seminary students had supplemented regular crews in jobs of painting, cleaning, renovating and dealing with such items as bicycle racks, roofs, bus inspection, athletic fields, and the like.

The report stated a new water pump is being installed for the boiler at Harrington school and all the older two-piece desks have been replaced. This also was done in two classrooms in Federal school and eventually, all will be replaced.

Five custodians attended the summer custodial conference at Michigan State College and Prince gave three lectures on custodial maintenance as it affects 12-month school.

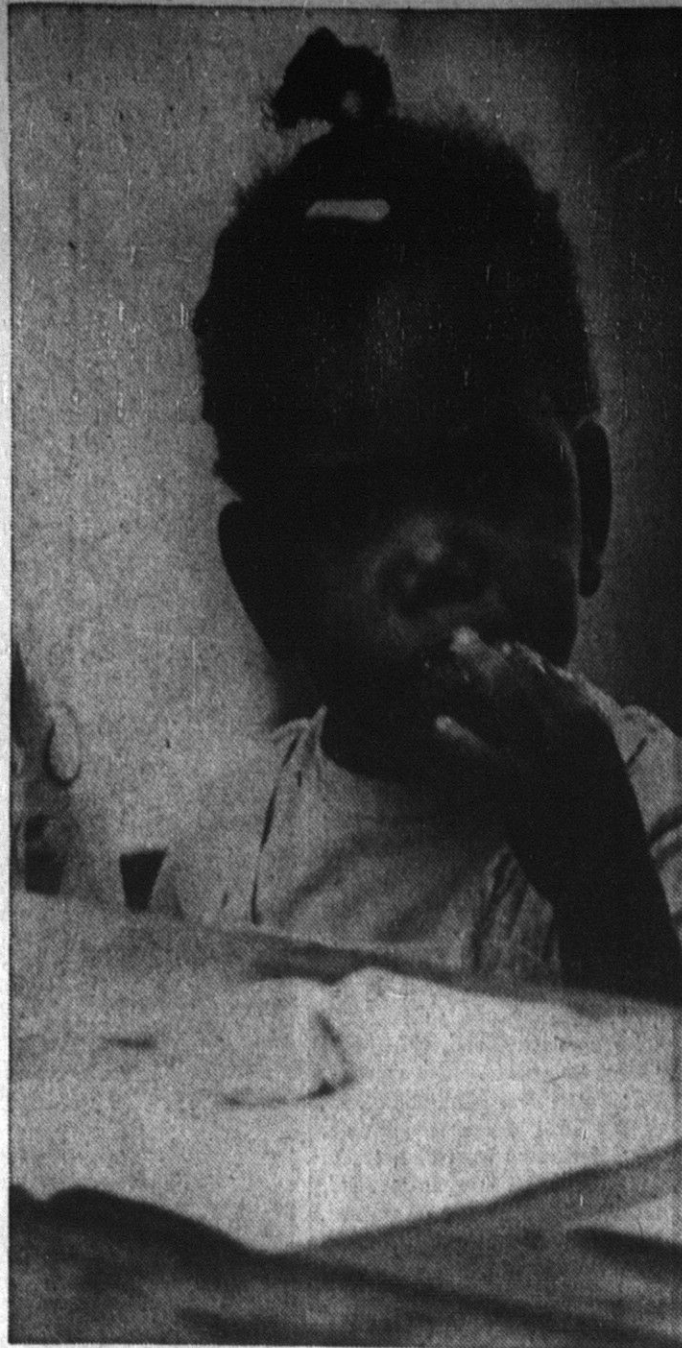

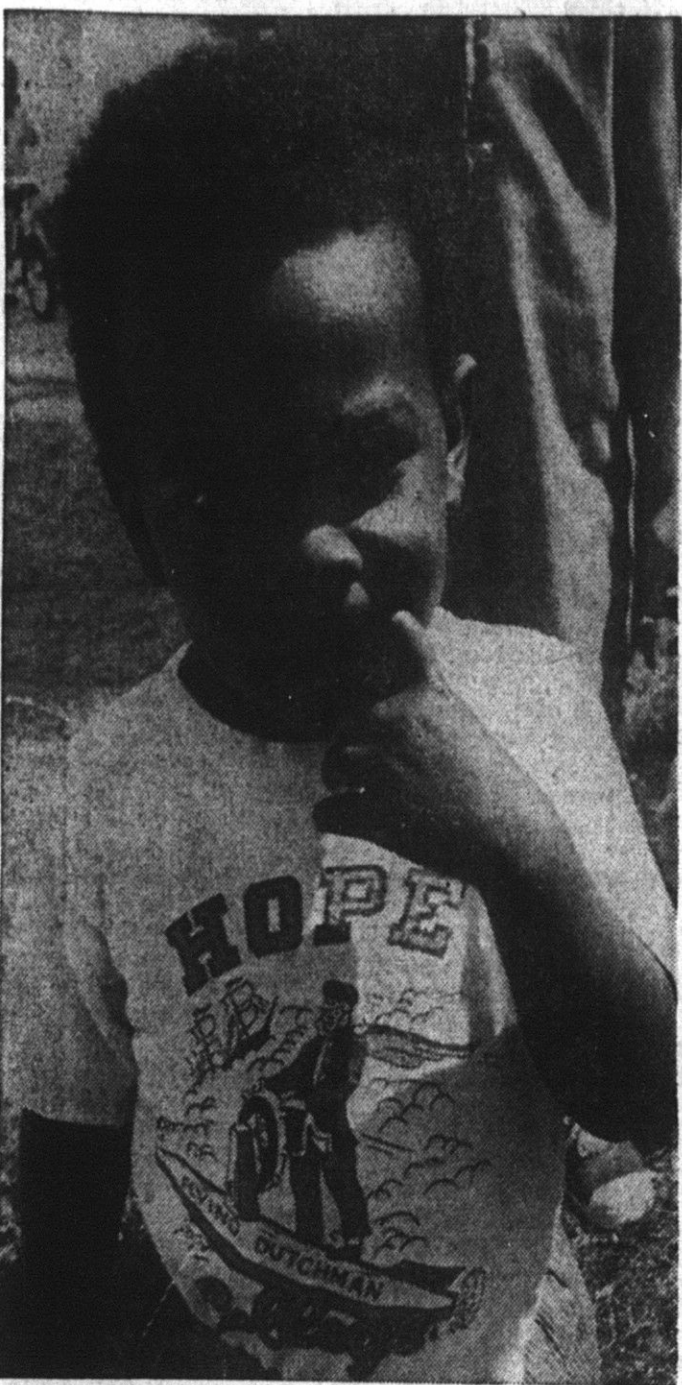

Friendship Center Works With Migrants, Community

The workers at the Christian Friendship Center on Berry St. are giving much more than lip service to creeds and ideas—they are involved and are proving that God is indeed alive and well.

The center is under the sponsorship of the Holland Area Council of Church Women United and includes a Day Care Center which is in operation five weeks during the blueberry season from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. for children from birth to five years of age. The center is licensed to handle 32 children and at the present time 22 are enrolled.

Besides the regular staff of a total of 10 volunteers per day, including one Horizon group, at the rate of five each in the morning and afternoon, take care of the children throughout the day.

A charge of 25 cents per day per child is collected and each child is given breakfast, lunch and two snacks per day; is bathed; has play periods; is taught health care and personal hygiene; and is exposed to a learning experience through music, games and simple art projects.

Another part of the center which preceded the Day Care Center is the Migrant Ministry under the leadership of Miss Karen Madderom, Don C. Damsteeg, William De Boer and Stig Andersson.

Migrant Ministry workers go into the various migrant camps in the area to act as a link with the community and to offer friendship and help. The workers meet human needs in myriad ways such as taking migrants to the social services office, telling them of the medical clinic or providing transportation to a doctor. The workers also act as a referral for migrants who

decide to settle out in the community.

The ministry also plans recreation and family nights which may include taking sports equipment into the camp for games. Some of the camps have many young people but no transportation for them so every Friday the ministry sponsors a teen night and various activities are planned for youth. The Friday during the Ottawa County Fair, teen night included an evening at the fairgrounds.

Sunday mornings informal ser-

vices are held at the center and are open to everyone.

Besides serving as a liaison with the community, the ministry is seeking to involve the community more with the camps through the Adopt-A-Camp program by which an organization or church group take a special interest in a particular camp, helping in any way possible and providing a learning experience for both sides.

The ministry workers see their efforts as a socio-religious ministry and as a method of witnessing their faith. They receive a good response from the growers who, for the most part, are happy with the interest taken in their workers and in the religious background; and the ministry workers feel free in both the camps and the fields.

Another feature of the center is the Wednesday night thrift sale which is also sponsored by the church women. Goods are collected and donated before the center is opened. The merchandise, which includes good used clothing, household items, etc., is displayed in a store-like set up with reasonable prices.

Monies received from the Day Care Center are channeled back into the program to further the center. Last year \$800 was collected from the Day Care Center and thrift center and \$3,600 was spent, the difference coming from donations.

Also on Wednesday evenings the Ottawa County Health Department runs a free medical clinic staffed by Dr. Vernon Boersma, who devotes much time and energy to the center, and various other area doctors.

It is estimated that migrant laborers taking advantage of the center are composed of 50 per cent Mexican-Americans, 45 per cent southern whites and five per cent Negroes and Indians, the Indians coming from Canada.

The Day Care Center staff includes Mrs. Thomas Elms, director; Mrs. Donald J. Cook, nurse; and Mrs. Henry Bareman, cook.

Members of the Migrant Ministry Committee are Mrs. Robert Nykamp and Mrs. Roscoe, co-chairman; Mrs. Tom Vander Kuy and Mrs. A. T. Severson, advisors to the chairmen; Mrs. Melvin Van Tatenhove, volunteers chairman; Mrs. James B. Smith, Day Care Center chairman; Mrs. Albert Timmer, finance chairman; Mrs. Virgil Harper, treasurer; Mrs. Donald Rohick and Mrs. Allan C. Steer, thrift co-chairmen; John Tucker, custodian; and Miss Henrietta Veltman, Holland Area Council of Church Women United president.

He was a member of Central Park Reformed Church where he sang in the choir many years. He also served as elder for several terms.

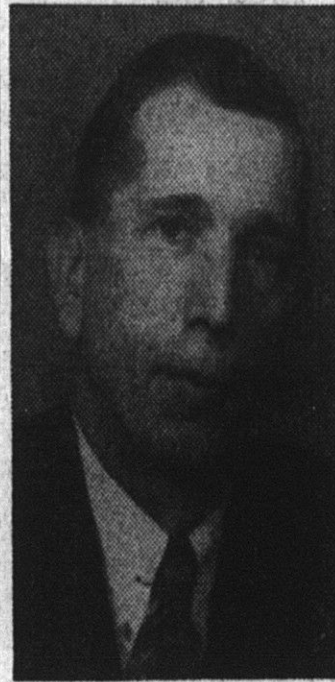

New Kidney Machine Used At Dekkers'

Due to the efforts of the Dekker Kidney Transplant Fund, a kidney machine is now in operation at the Harold Dekker home, 4256 Butternut Drive.

The machine, purchased for \$2,533.03, is used by Mrs. Carolyn Dekker every third day for six hours at a time.

Mr. and Mrs. Dekker trained for operation of the machine since April 9 and began actual treatment in their home on July 20. Dekker has to be on hand the entire six hours that his wife is under treatment and he must spend approximately one and a half hours in preparation and cleaning of the machine for each session.

Dekker, a carpenter at the Chris Craft Corporation, has remodeled a room in their home to house the machine. Materials and help for the remodeling were supplied by friends and relatives.

It was significant that the first treatment in the Dekker home coincided with the United States moon landings. The Dekker's feel that they also took a big step on that day and are most appreciative for the help which the community afforded them.

As the treatments continue here, hospitals in Denver and Cleveland are also studying the Dekker case in hopes of performing a kidney transplant. In the event that a transplant is eventually successful for her, the kidney machine will be sold by the directors of the fund or made available to other patients in the area.

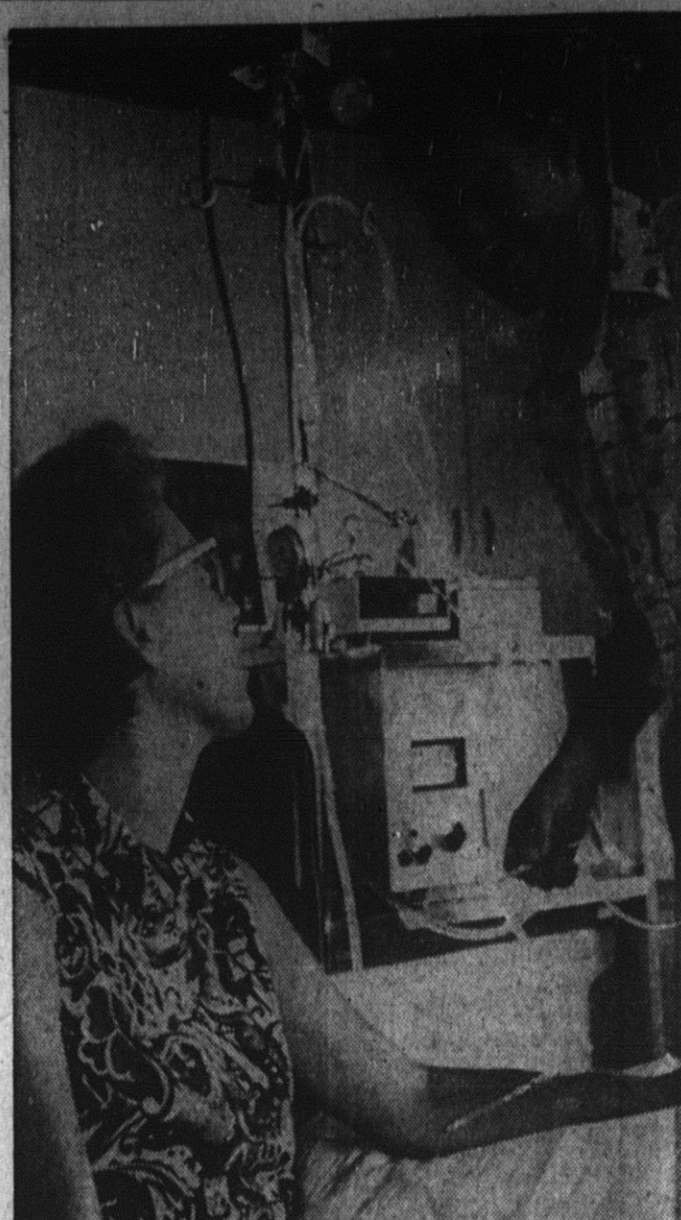
