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Two Trucks Crash, One Man Killed

HUDSONVILLE — George Beach, 75, of 10683 Walnut Dr., Nunica, was killed Tuesday when his pickup truck and an empty double bottom semi-trailer truck collided at M-21 and 48th Ave. on the Zeeland-Georgetown township line west of here at 8:19 a.m.

Beach was pinned in the cab of his wrecked truck and had to be freed by a rescue unit using a cutting saw. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids. He was the 33rd person to die in Ottawa County traffic accidents this year compared with 28 at this time in 1971.

Ottawa County deputies said Beach was southbound on 48th Ave. and failed to stop for the intersection of M-21. His truck pulled into the path of the semi-truck westbound in the right lane of M-21.

Beach's truck was struck on the drivers side and dragged 160 feet along the highway and into a ditch of the median before coming to rest wedged into the cab of the trailer truck.

The driver of the semi, Donald Hinton, 36, of Grand Rapids, suffered minor injuries and was to seek his own treatment.

The impact of the collision and the dragging ripped front wheels off both trucks.

The Georgetown fire department was called to stand by because of spilled gasoline and fuel.

Return Texas Man to Jail

GRAND HAVEN — Danny Muldune, 47, of Dallas, Tex., who was granted a new trial in Ottawa Circuit Court Sept. 14, 1972, after a previous sentence on Aug. 23, 1971, was sentenced to 16 months to 24 months in Southern Michigan prison Tuesday by Judge Wendell A. Miles.

Muldune was charged with violation of the check laws and was sentenced in August of 1971 to 20 months to two years. He later was granted a new trial after he claimed he was denied an attorney and was returned here on a writ of habeas corpus June 26, 1972. His previous plea of guilty was set aside.

The case was remanded to District Court and he was bound over to Circuit Court, where he was found guilty after a trial Sept. 14.

Donald E. Smith, 17, of Nunica, charged with violation of the check laws, and Roger Lee Stillson, 18, Spring Lake, charged with breaking and entering, were sentenced Tuesday. Both were arrested by Grand Haven and state police after a series of breaking and entering jobs in north Ottawa County.

Smith was sentenced to Cassidy Lake School for boys for 18 months to 14 years, with the minimum recommended. Stillson was placed under the youthful trainee status and was permitted to enter the armed forces.

Four other persons were placed on probation by Judge Raymond L. Smith. Patricia Walters, 36, Zeeland, charged with larceny from a building, was placed on probation for two years, must make restitution of \$421 and must pay \$100 costs.

Gilberto Longoria, 20, of 206 West Ninth St., Holland, charged with resisting arrest, was placed on probation for two years and must pay \$200 costs. Michael Lokker, 18, of 85 East 28th, Holland, charged with unlawful sale of LSD, was placed on probation for three years and must pay \$300 costs.

Lawrence Herbert, 19, of Douglas, charged with larceny from a building, was placed on probation for two years and must make restitution of \$135.

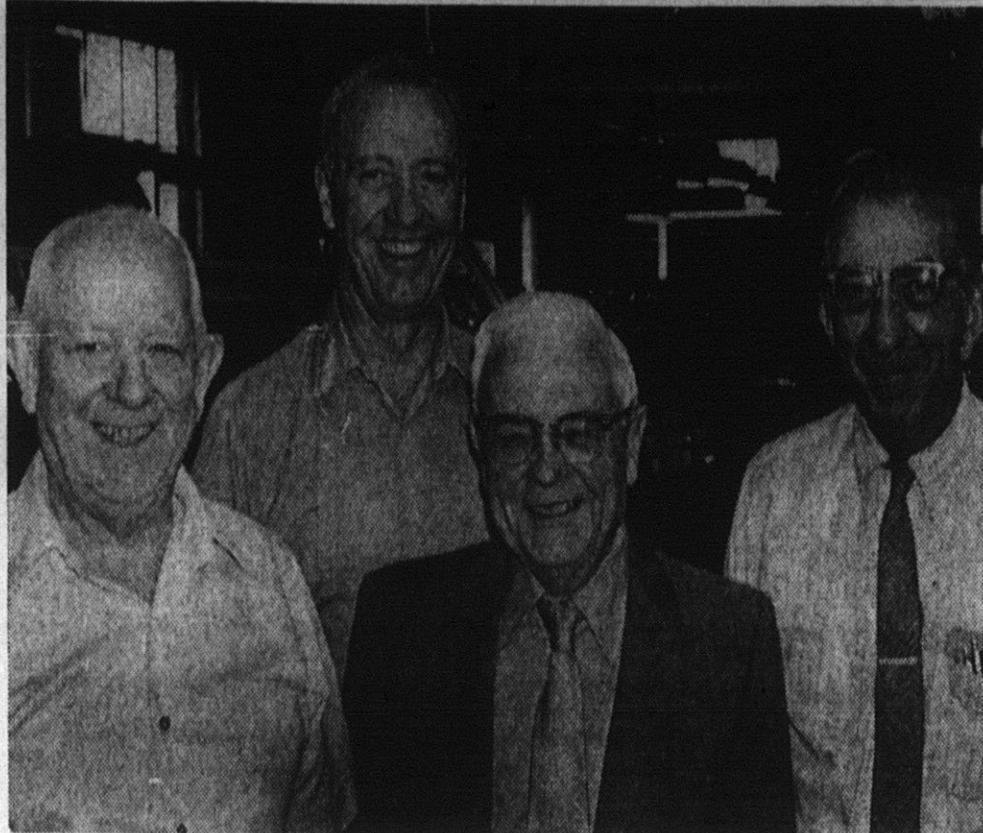

Driver Dies After Crash of 3 Cars

ZEELAND — Timothy Gulick, 22, of 6285 Taylor, Hudsonville, was killed and five other persons injured, one critically, in a three-car collision along 96th Ave. in Blendon Township Tuesday at 9:13 p.m.

Gulick, driver of a small car, that deputies said allegedly, was stopped on the northbound lane of 96th Ave. 500 feet north of Taylor St. when struck from behind by one car and shoved into the path of an oncoming auto, died in Zeeland Community hospital at 12:45 p.m. today.

A passenger in the car, Marc Nyhuis, 22, of 3108 Van Buren St., Hudsonville, was in "critical" condition in the Zeeland hospital with head injuries. Both were thrown from the vehicle.

Deputies said the Gulick car was stopped on the traveled portion of the northbound traffic lane when struck from behind by a car operated by Randy Lamer, 16, of 9676 Port Sheldon St., Borculo. Lamer and a passenger, Don De Glopper, 16, of 9474 Port Sheldon St., Borculo were treated in Zeeland hospital for minor injuries and released.

'Meet the Candidates' Draws Overflow Crowd

Extra chairs had to be set up for a large crowd attending the "Meet the Candidates" Wednesday night in Herick Public Library, sponsored by the Holland League of Women Voters and the local chapter of the American Association of University Women.

Participating mostly were Republican incumbents, a sprinkling of Democrats and two candidates of the American Independent Party. Each was granted a three-minute presentation with questions following the categories which were divided into county officers, judicial ticket and state and congressional tickets.

Most discussion revolved about the stands of state candidates on the proposals, mainly abortion and school revenue reform. Candidates were mostly in favor of Proposal C on school reform but divided on Proposal D to remove the constitutional ban on state income tax. As expected, the most controversial topic was abortion reform with varying opinions from audience and candidates.

Mrs. William G. Winter Jr. served as moderator and Mrs. Henry Hekman as timekeeper. Mrs. Jerome Cunnihan, president of the League of Women Voters, read statements for two absent Democratic candidates. The meeting lasted 2½ hours.

Participating were James E. Townsend and Gerald J. Van Wyke of the judicial ticket, James Farnsworth, Melvin De Stigter and Al Russell, State House of Representatives; Larry H. Olsen and DeLoyd Hesselink, congressional; Calvin Bosman, Bernard Gysen, Douglas Larsen, Harris Nieuwma, Riemer Van Til, Robert J. Kammeraad, Roscoe De Vries, county officers; James Dressel, Raymond V. Bush, Donald Stoltz, and William Winstrom, county board of commissioners.

Deputies said he was a student at Grand Valley State College. Funeral services are being completed in Detroit where the parents live.

GI Benefits Include Job Training

Vietnam War veterans in Ottawa County were reminded that training under the GI Bill is not limited to college education but includes on-the-job training as well.

Under the current provisions, veterans enrolled in on-the-job training are entitled to receive from \$108 per month for a single veteran to \$133 a month for a veteran with two or more dependents. The amounts payable are decreased during each succeeding six months of training.

Gary Scholten, director of veterans affairs for Ottawa County working out of the Department of Social Services, said 22 businesses and firms in Ottawa County now are approved for apprenticeship or on-the-job training programs for veterans. He said any business or firms may apply.

Veterans seeking to take part in the training program should contact the VA office or Scholten.

Business firms must qualify to take part in the training program. A form is to be completed listing starting wages and normal wage increases, a job description and the number of hours weekly devoted to each task of the job.

A representative of the Michigan Department of Education's adult and continuing education service is to study the application.

The GI Bill provides a maximum of \$8,000 in benefits spread over 36 months. The minimum training period is six months.

Scholten said the GI Bill allows the benefits to be used for education or training or a combination of both.

Statistics show on June 30 of this year there were 4,263 Vietnam veterans in Ottawa county. Unemployment figures in 1971 for a four-county area of Ottawa, Oceana, Muskegon and Newaygo listed 8.8 per cent among veterans compared with 7.3 per cent for non veterans.

About one-third of the eligible veterans were taking part in the GI Bill benefit programs, either in school or on-the-job training, Scholten said.

Then by means of a training program for all members of the personnel, the wrong way was corrected. The right way emphasized the importance of proper procedures and the reclaiming of the lost client.

In the talk which followed the film, Mrs. Mund stated that: "You are the voice of your organization. Your tone of voice and your display of courtesy create the definite image of your firm. If you wish to save money for your firm, use direct dialing for long distance calls. Be sure to have all pertinent information at your finger tips. Person-to-person calls usually cost two or three times more than an ordinary call."

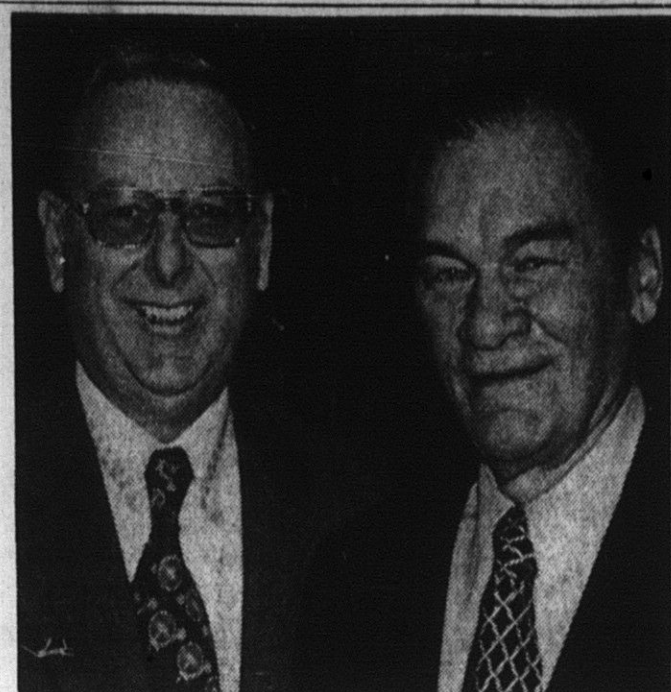

Unlicensed Dog Search Nearing

A house-to-house check for unlicensed dogs is scheduled to begin next week by authorized dog wardens for the Ottawa County sheriff's department, it was announced Tuesday.

Owners of unlicensed dogs found in the door-to-door check will be asked to pay the delinquent fee and will be served a summons for a court appearance for having an unlicensed dog in their possession. Conviction carries a fine of from \$10 to \$100, three months in jail or both.

1. Tulip bulbs must be purchased from Tulip Time in Civic Center.

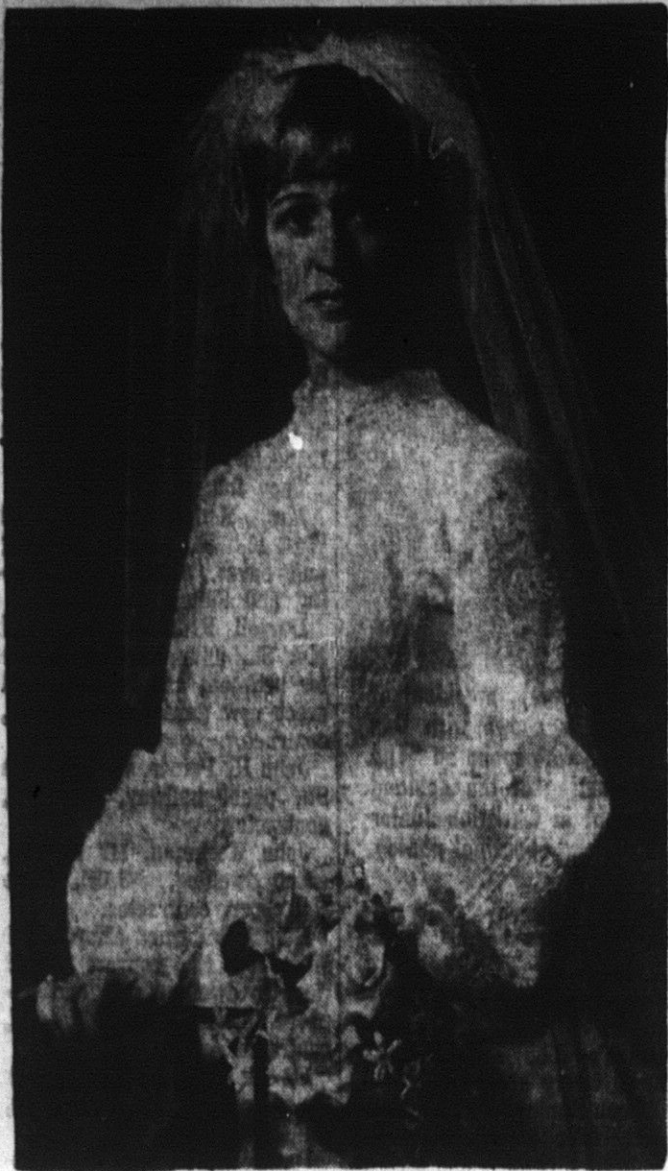
2. Each contestant will be limited to 200 bulbs which may be supplemented by other plant materials. Only bulbs purchased from Tulip Time will be judged.

Mental Health Needs Discussed By Plan Group

More services for the mentally retarded and mentally ill, drug abuse and alcoholism programs, greater measures to insure safe water, and increased health personnel were among the concerns expressed at a recent hearing on health needs in Ottawa and Allegan Counties.

The hearing, sponsored by the West Community Planning Unit of the West Michigan Comprehensive Health Planning Unit was held at the Holland City Hospital October 12.

George Jacob, Ph.D., Allegan County Mental Health Services, said there is a need for a residential treatment facility for mentally ill adults and a 24-hour emergency program for people experiencing acute mental health problems.

Other mental health needs, voiced by Mrs. Fern Hartsock, Ottawa County Mental Health, included recreation, workshop and creative living activities for the adult retarded; group homes for the mentally retarded who require custodial care but do not need to be institutionalized; and respite homes for the mentally ill or mentally retarded to give their families "time off."

Concern also was expressed for a state diabetes program, more regulations for three-bed permit homes, medical care for the poor and near poor, child abuse, nutritional minimums, improved ambulance service and additional basic care beds.

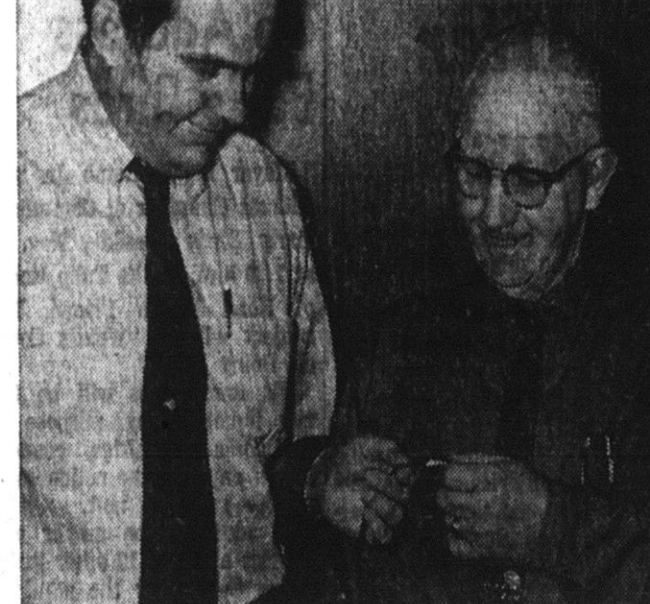

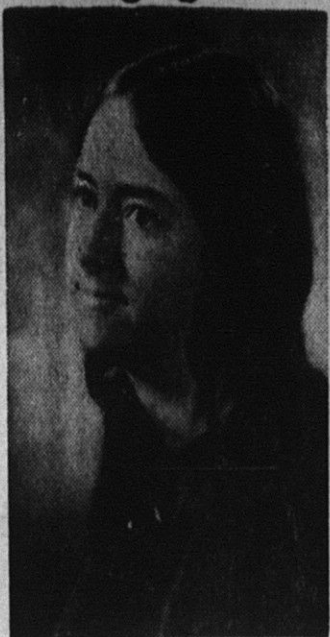

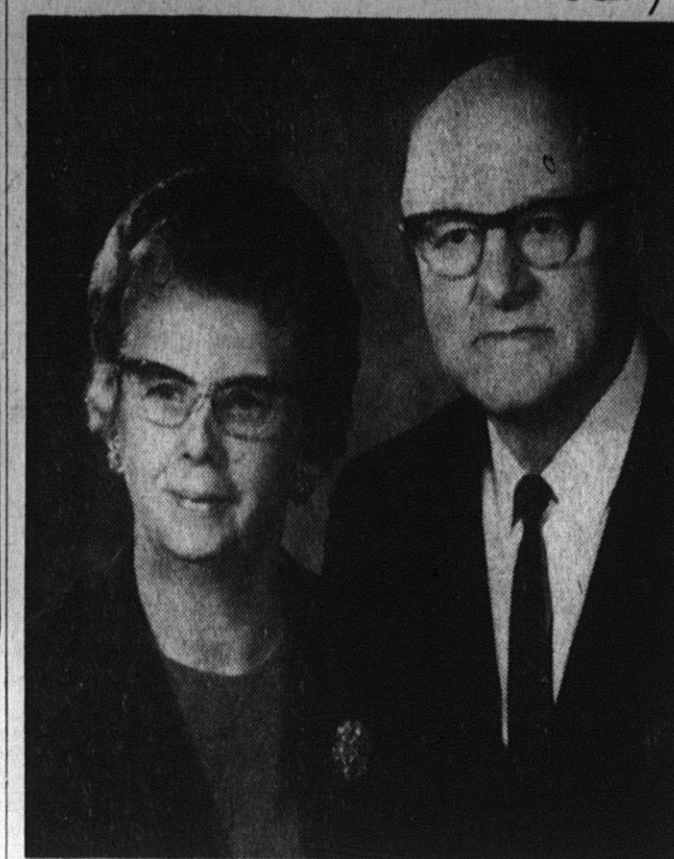

The body of Dr. Robert L. Melka, 39, missing since Dec. 30, 1971 when he vanished while fishing in Lake Michigan in the warm water outlet of the Consumers Power Co. generating plant at Port Sheldon was found Saturday at Idlewood Beach south of Tunnel Park.

Ottawa County sheriff's detectives said the body was identified through dental charts by the State Police crime lab at Holland.

Deputies said the body was found in the water by Norman Robinson who called the department at 3:19 p.m. Saturday. Identification of the decomposing body was established at 9 p.m. Saturday.

Medical examiner Dr. Warren Westrate ruled death by drowning.

Melka, an assistant professor of history at Hope College, was wading in four feet of water about 100 feet off shore when he was swept off his feet by an undertow. Other fishermen nearby were unsuccessful in attempts to rescue Melka.

An air and sea search was launched but rough weather conditions hampered efforts.

The body was being sent to Atwater, Minn., for services and burial in St. Mary's cemetery.

Survivors include the wife, Theresa, and three children, Peter, Karin and Andrew.

Dr. Melka was in his second year of teaching at Hope. Before coming to Holland he taught at the University of Minnesota and Wisconsin State University at Oshkosh.

J.F. Pinkerman Dies at Age 48

John F. Pinkerman, 48, of 748 Ottawa Ave., died Wednesday in Holland Hospital following a short illness.

He was cook at the Holland Country Club and had been food service manager of Holland Hospital for several years. A veteran of World War II, he was a member of the local VFW Post and the Holland American Legion.

Surviving are his wife, Betty; a son, John Edward of Holland and a daughter Jane Ann at home.

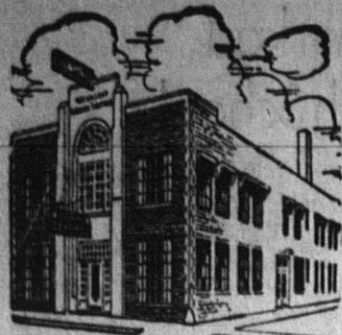

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 29
Freedom Under Authority
Romans 13:1-7; 1 Peter 2:11-17
By C. P. Dame
This lesson is especially timely in view of the fact that the election is close at hand and hence it is fitting that we study again what the Bible has to say about the government and the obligations of the citizens to it. Christians should be good citizens.

I. Government is of divine origin. The family and the church are also of God. The lesson text is composed of two passages of Scripture, written by the two leading men of the New Testament church. The truths these inspired men wrote are for today. "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers," means that citizens are commanded to obey the established government, whether it be democratic, totalitarian, socialist or capitalist, communist or Christian, local or national government.

The Bible also teaches that God comes first. If there is a conflict between the state and God, then the Christian gives obedience to God and not to the state. Acts 4:19, 20, 1 Timothy 2:1, 2 and Titus 3:1 contain more information. The New Testament leaders of the church taught the members, some of whom came from Judaism, Jews who hated Rome, to give obedience to the pagan government which gave them many advantages.

Note the reasons for obedience. The first is because government is of God; the second is the fear of punishment and the third is because of the voice of conscience. Christians have consciences schooled by the Holy Spirit and they should be in a time to obey. We live in a time of protests and demonstrations and demands for reform which, if they are peaceable, are in order. If a law is unjust, and some are, there are legal ways of changing it.

II. The nation needs Christian citizens. Peter reminded Christians that they are beloved of God and are aliens and exiles on the way to a better land but they were living in a pagan world and tempted to yield to their environment and to the sins of "the flesh. Christians should not let the flesh control their lives because they are related to the heavenly kingdom whose standards they are to follow, because the lusts of the flesh hinder the spiritual life and because Christians are watched.

"Be subject for the Lord's sake to every human institution." These words appeal to the highest loyalty under which all the lesser loyalties must function. Freedom does not mean to do as one pleases. Freedom and authority belong together and the free honor authority. Freedom implies not only that a person is free from something but also that he is free for something. The Christian is free through Jesus Christ from the enslaving power of sin. Faith in Christ is essential in order to live as free persons. A free society must be a responsible society and today a lot of thought should be given to the need of being responsible citizens.

Greiving Is Nominated For Award

Firefighter Melvin Greiving has been nominated for the International Benjamin Franklin Fire Service Award of the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

Fire Chief Dick Brandt of Holland nominated Greiving for the award after the volunteer fireman placed his life in jeopardy in the successful attempt to rescue a child from a second-floor apartment in a farm home north of Allegan on Aug. 31. Greiving placed a ladder in a second-floor window, found the child in the room, carried her down the ladder and applied resuscitation.

The award is presented to only 12 firefighters internationally each year. Nominations are reviewed by a special committee of fire service leaders judging professionalism, dedication to duty, and heroic action.

Hope's Tie With Hornets Puts Alma in First Alone

KALAMAZOO — Even though Kalamazoo College has only won one football game all season, they are probably one of the top teams in the state and they almost pulled off another shocker by battling MIAA unbeaten Hope College to a 0-0 standoff here Saturday in its homecoming in a light drizzle.

The Flying Dutchmen needed the win to stay in a first place tie with Alma which disposed of Albion, 33-9 while Adrian defeated Olivet, 16-7 in other league play.

Hope stands 2-0-1 in the conference compared to Alma's perfect 3-0 mark. The Hornets of Coach Ed Baker are 0-2-1 in the MIAA and 1-4-1 overall. Kalamazoo's record is misleading as they have lost all of its games by only 23 points. Hope is now 4-1-1 for the year.

It was the first scoreless tie for a Hope team since the 1941 season when they played Ypsilanti Normal to a standstill. Both teams had good opportunities to score. The Hornets had their best shot in the first half while the Dutchmen controlled the tempo of the game in the second half.

Kalamazoo's field goal kicker Dave Rowley missed on 43, 28 and 32-yard attempts in the first 30 minutes and were on the Dutchmen 11 late in the first half when Hope's tackle Paul Cornell recovered a fumble.

The Hornets returned the favor by stopping the Dutchmen four times in the second half. It looked like Hope had a chance for the victory with 14 seconds left when freshmen Darryl Brown tried a field goal from Kalamazoo's 34 but sailed far short and to the left.

Coach Ray Smith used three quarterbacks in an attempt to put some points on the board. Bob Carlson was the starter while also seeing action were Tim Van Heest and Jim Wojcicki.

"We put in Van Heest to try to get some passing into our attack," said Smith. "And used Wojcicki when Carlson turned an ankle late in the game."

Hope's rushing attack was at its best as Bob Lamer, the second leading ground gainer in small college games galloped for 168 yards in 34 carries. Kalamazoo's Dennis Kane, the second top rusher in the MIAA next to Lamer, had 180 yards in 28 tries.

Ed Sanders of the Dutchmen chipped in with 88 yards in 13 trips while the forgotten man of the backfield, Gary Constant rushed for 49 yards in just four attempts.

"I said all along that Kalamazoo was a good team and they played real well against us," added Smith.

After the game Baker said to Smith, "If your boys play like they are capable of, you should beat Alma by two touchdowns."

"It's not that I got anything against the Scots, it's just that they have been MIAA champs for the past two years," concluded Kalamazoo's friendly mentor.

A Dutchmen win over the Scots Saturday at home would put them into undisputed first place in the MIAA. The tie didn't hurt Hope as much as a defeat would have, but to make matters worse, the Dutchmen locker room was broken into and several wallets and watches reported taken.

The board was informed that the sprinkling system for the Trainable Center has been installed, the sod placed and playground equipment erected. Only work remaining is the seeding in front of the building.

The board approved a tentative plan for delivering special education services as required by special education mandatory legislation. Revisions are expected later.

Discussed at length was the potential problem of trainable youngsters in foster homes within the Ottawa Intermediate District. The administration was instructed to express this concern to the State Director of Mental Health. While the Ottawa district is prepared to handle youngsters from parents within the district, the addition of foster children diagnosed as trainable could create problems in space available in the training center.

The kiln for the arts and crafts room at the trainable center will be installed in the boiler room.

A review of the 1971-72 audit indicated the district was in good financial shape and that correct bookkeeping procedures were being followed. The auditing firm of Minshall, Tuori and Jacobson was approved the 1972-73 audit.

Questers Have Program On Herbs, Spices

The Christine Van Raalte Chapter of Questers met Monday at the home of Mrs. William DeVries.

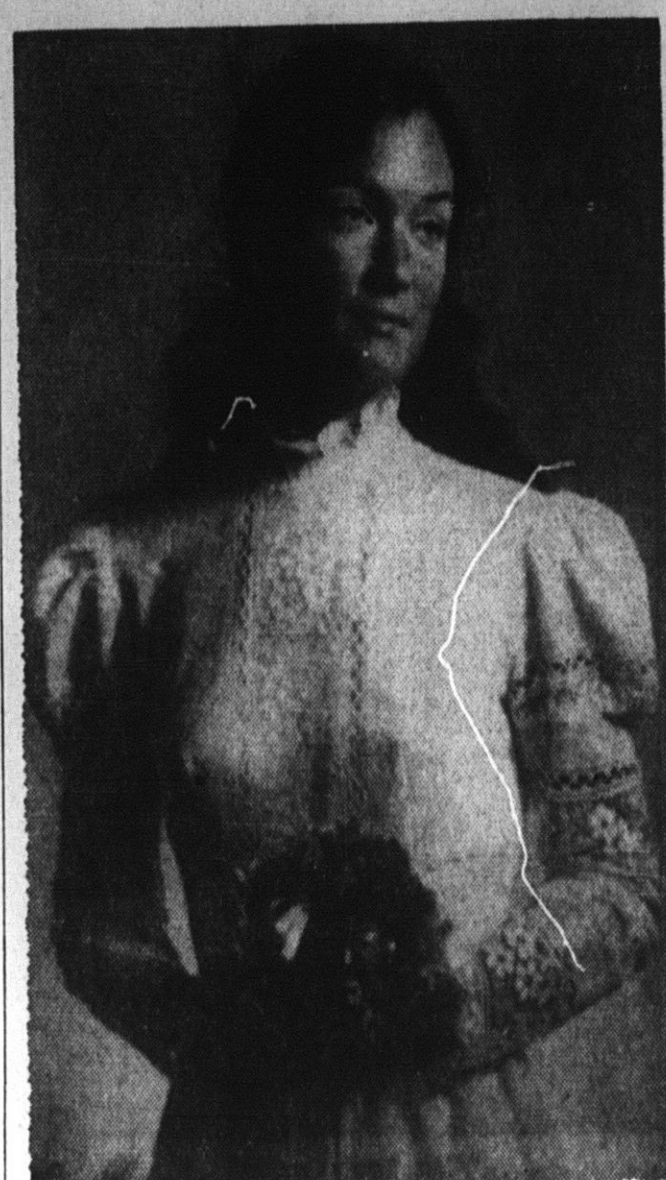
Jacob A. Lemson Succumbs at 78

Zeeland And Drenthe Toll Calls to End

Drenthe telephone numbers will be included in the May, 1973, issue of the Holland-Zeeland telephone directory.

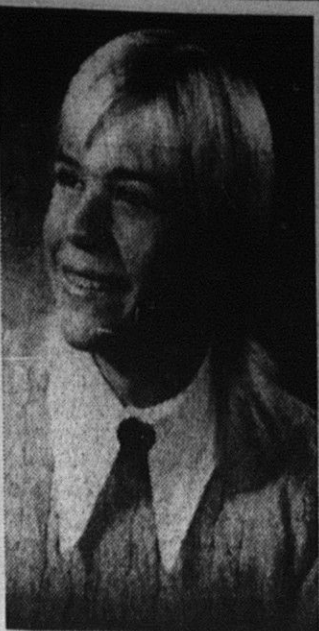

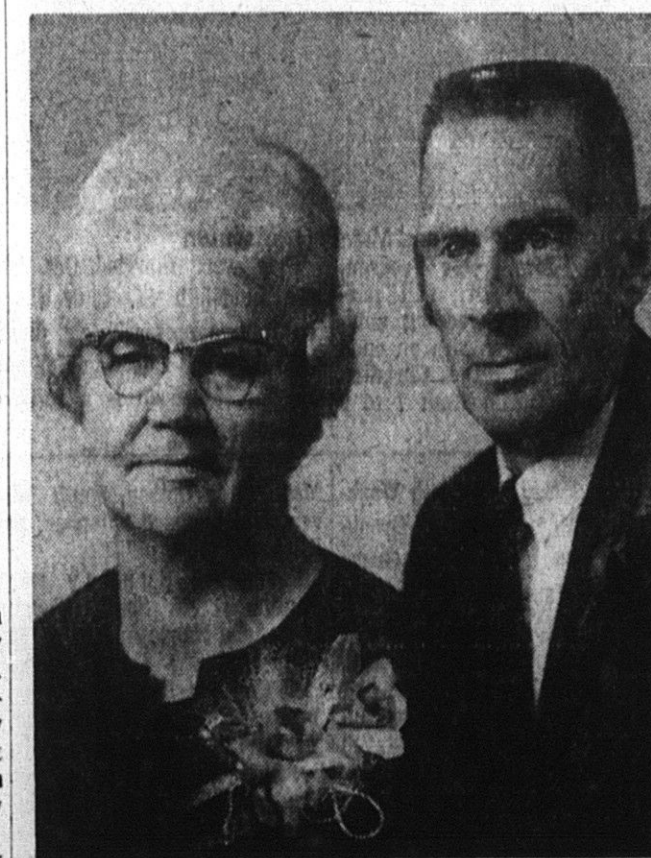
Zeeland At 69 Per Cent Of U-F Goal

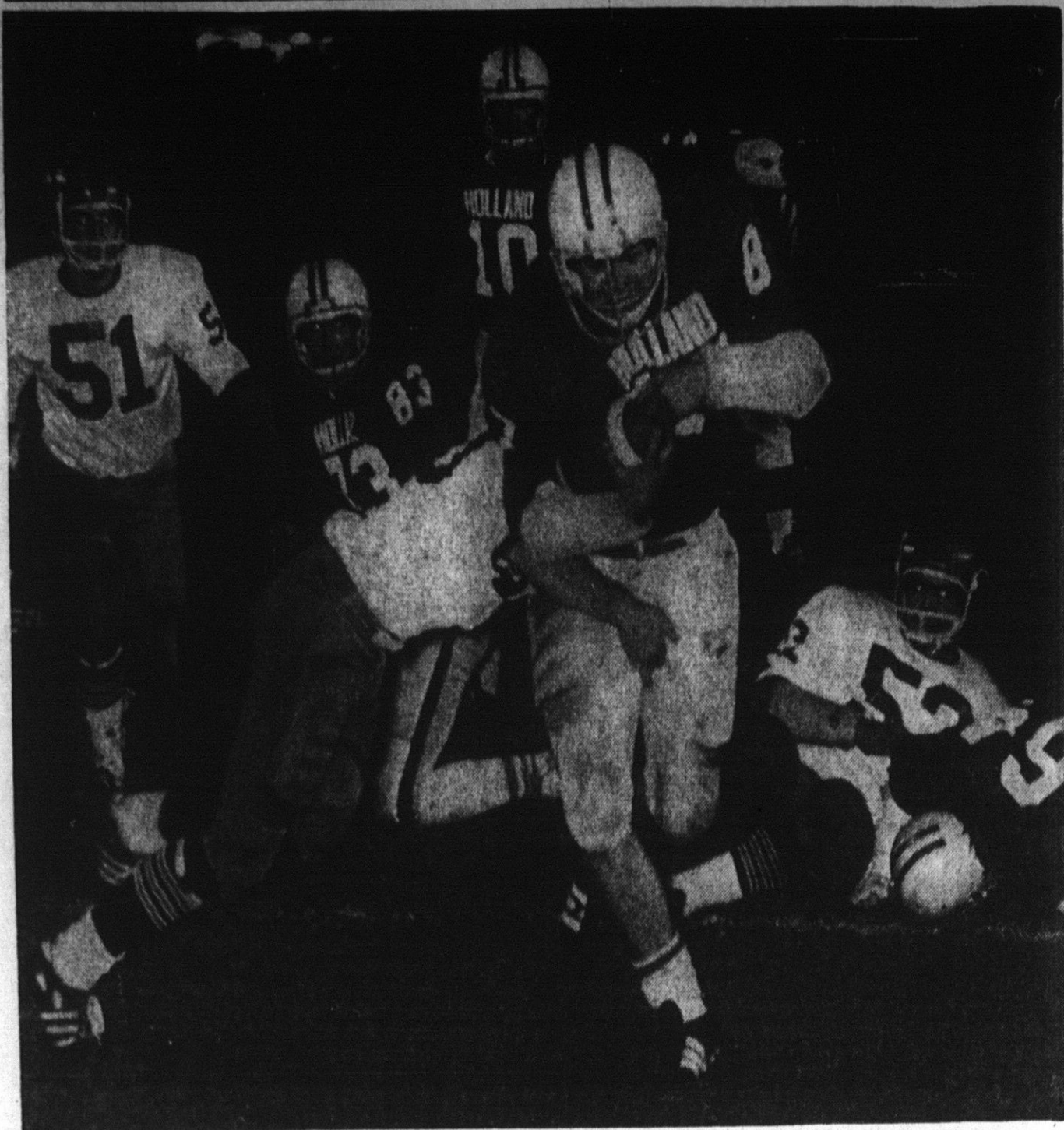

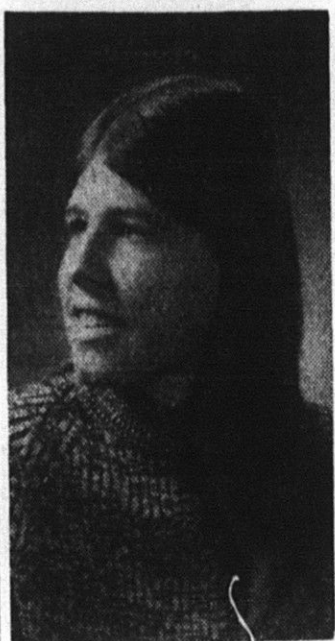

Dr. B.G. De Vries Succumbs at 84 In Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. — Funeral services were held here Monday for Dr. Bernard G. De Vries, 84, well known orthodontist and civic figure who died a week ago. Goliath got his shins kicked good Friday night at Riverview Park but David couldn't quite deliver the knockout blow, as 12th rated Portage Northern nudged Holland, 14-7 in a titanic struggle.

A pair of crucial mistakes helped the winners tally their first touchdown in the second period and a big fourth down completion for a TD in the fourth quarter gave Northern the win.

With John Bonnette doing most of the running and Dick Wood hitting Ron Israels, who made a fabulous one-handed catch, the Dutch shocked the Huskies by taking a 7-0 lead with 2:46 left in the first quarter.

Tough cookie Paul Shashaguy entered the Holland lineup in time to score the first touchdown from the six behind some good blocking up the middle by Joel Maatman, Mike Windisch and Mike Emerson. Windisch's kick was good, as Holland delighted its home fans with its early advantage.

A poor 15-yard punt and 29-yard pass from Don Beck to Brad Bretnier put the ball on Holland's five in the second period.

With the Dutch defense digging in and Portage in a fourth and 12 situation, one of Holland's backs was charged with a pass interception play to give Portage an automatic first down on the five.

Charlie Evens eventually hit pay dirt from the three with 4:26 left in the half. Bruno Gimbert, an exchange student from France booted the extra point far over the fence to tie the game at 7-7.

Both teams had opportunities to score before the half, as a fumble recovery run by big John Higgs gave Portage the pigskin on the Dutch 17.

Higgs, the son of Dick Higgs, a former Hope College standout in the late 1940s and now a principal at Portage, is one of the finest high jumpers in the nation. He has leaped 6'9" and is only a junior.

An outstanding 44-yard reception of a Steve Bonnette pass by Israels put the ball on Northern's 20 with time running out, as the Dutch made a great effort to score but couldn't punch it over.

Queen Jayne Wolbert, the court and the Holland High Band were the standouts at the intermission, as it looked like Holland might snatch its first triumph of the season.

Portage had good field position throughout the entire second half, even though they couldn't move it very well against Mark Dykstra and Co.

They did manage to punch it over for the deciding TD with 3:53 left in the game when Beck fired a five-yard pass to John Timmons on fourth down. Gimbert's kick closed out the scoring at 14-7.

J. Bonnette led the Holland ground gainers with 46 yards

in 19 carries while Dave Wright was top man for Portage with 67 yards in 21 tries.

The Dutch hope to notch their first victory of the season in their home finale next Friday against county rival Grand Haven.

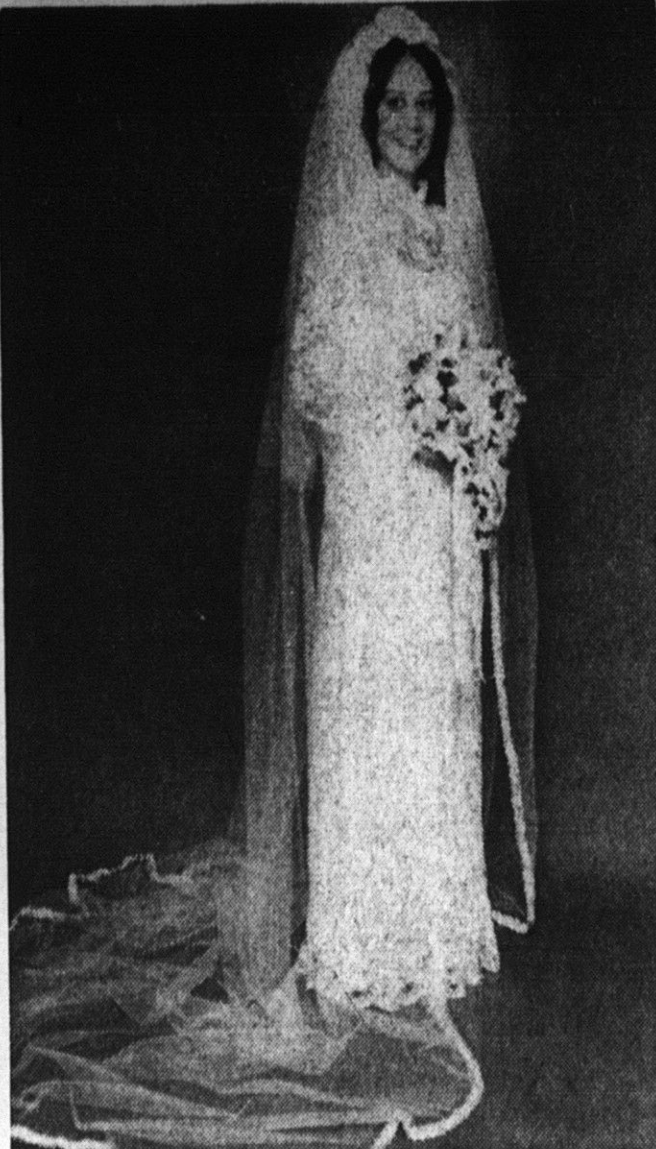

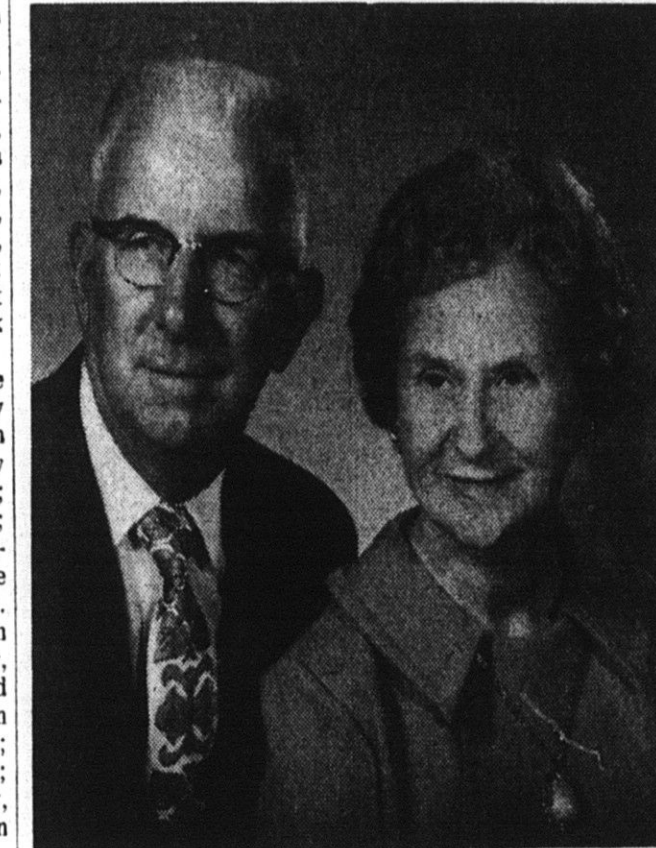

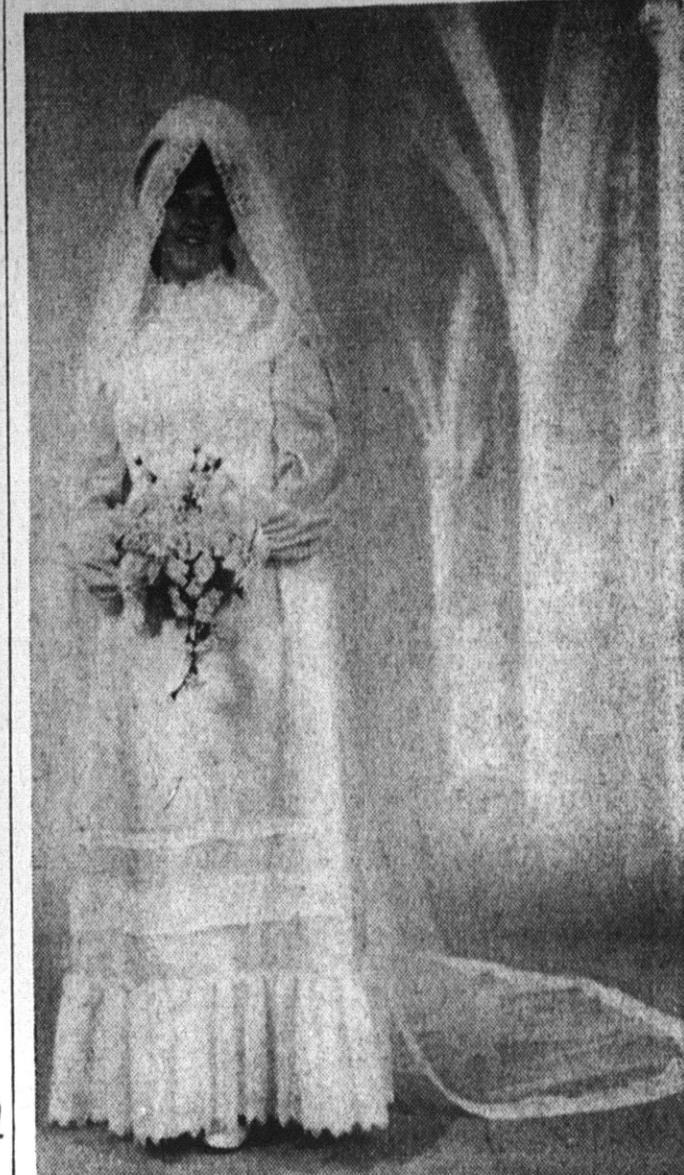

Kandu Industries Has New Building

Kandu Industries, Inc., Ottawa County's sole agency offering vocational rehabilitation and activity to the adult handicapped population has recently purchased a 20,000 square foot building at 13th St. and Van Raalte Ave.

Once renovated, the building is to become the training center and factory for Kandu's Holland area clients.

Originally created in 1966 by the Haven Foundation of Ottawa County, Kandu Industries provides a sheltered workshop and industrial training for those persons over 18 years old who are physically, mentally and/or emotionally handicapped due to a medically defined origin.

After detailed and thorough testing and evaluation by the professional Kandu staff, it is determined the individual's capabilities and potentials. Self sufficiency of the individual is Kandu's goal with its clients whether it be learning to tie shoes laces or hoe in the garden to running a riveter.

Presently an average of 15 clients is bused daily from Hol-

land to Grand Haven for training and activity. When the new building is ready, some 50 clients will initially be served. It is estimated that there are 1,000 persons in the county eligible for Kandu's services.

Kandu Industries receives operational funds from the United Fund. The \$65,000 purchase price for the building was raised through private solicitations and the renovation funds will come from state and federal grants. Anyone wishing to donate to the new building should contact O. W. Lowry, chairman of the fund raising drive.

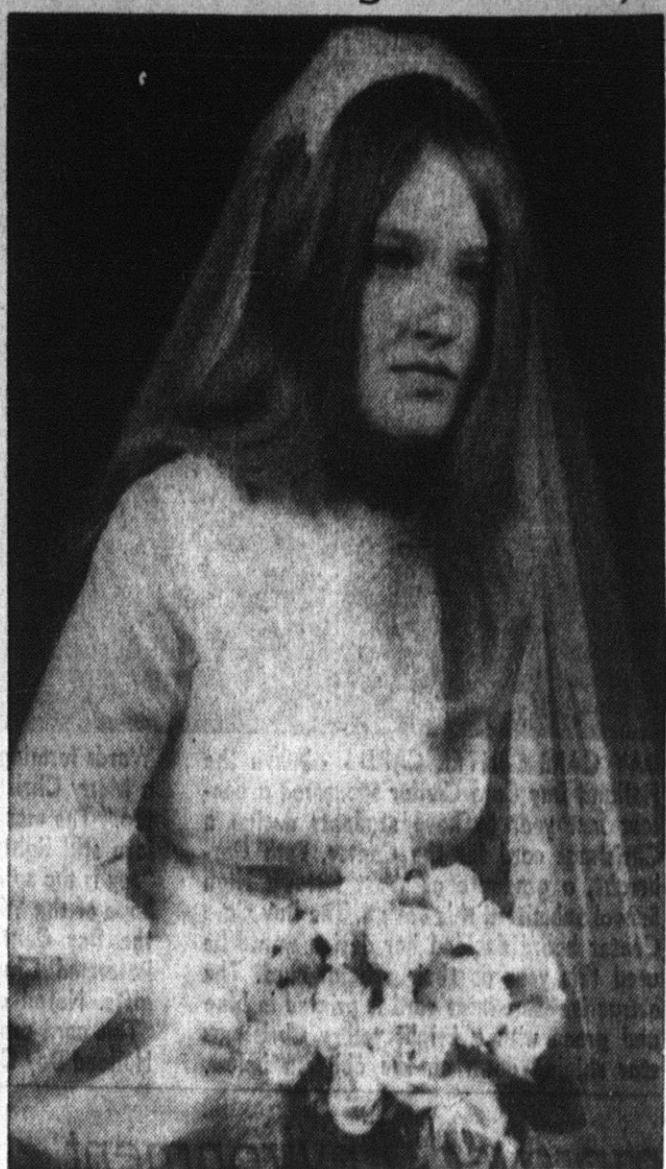

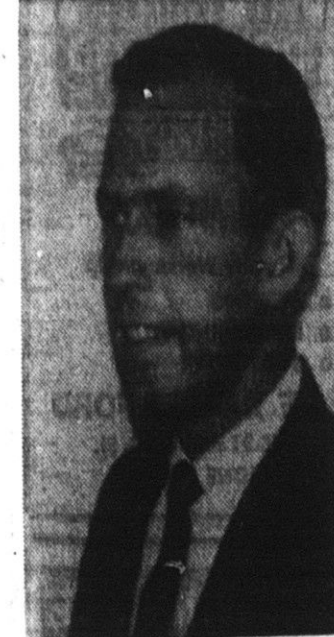
Mrs. N. Chard Succumbs at 81

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. James (Muriel) Hardie of Holland and two grandchildren, Nicholas and Donald Hardie both of Holland.

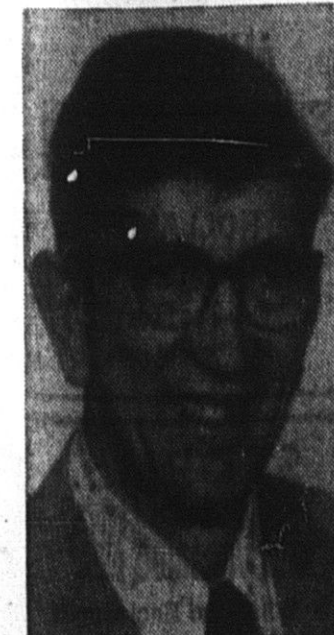

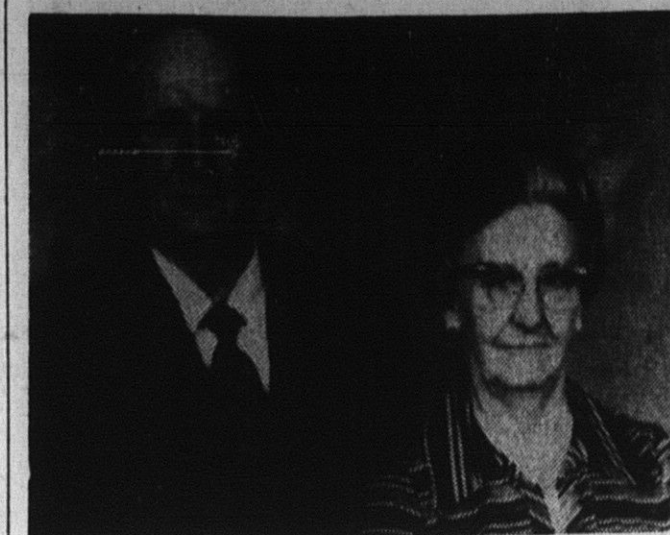

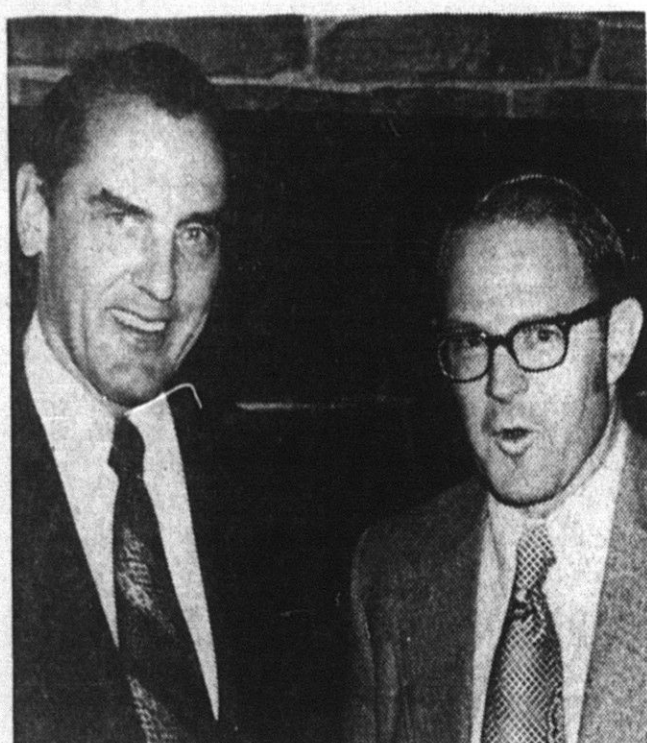

Improved Environment Sought by Chamber

Where is Holland going and what are the priorities were the challenges presented at the annual meeting of the Holland Chamber of Commerce Monday night at Point West.

Dr. Gordon J. Van Wylen, new president of Hope College, expressed the hope that the college and the community (town and gown) would continue to work together and reach new heights in providing an environment for meaningful life.

He spoke of changing attitudes of young people toward the "establishment," (generally optimistic), the criticism of "dehumanizing" production lines and the computer way of life in which large universities can become "very impersonal."

But a closer look at the computer reveals elimination of tedious records and research, and a closer look at the production line reveals that other work isn't always all that exciting. Yet there is a certain amount of truth in the criticisms and certain pressures to make life impersonal.

Dr. Van Wylen said the government cannot make people humane or compassionate, but government framework makes possible the solution to many problems. For instance, instead of just complying with quotas on minorities, affirmative action could go a long way to meeting the needs. Instilling a sense of compassion toward mi-

nority groups in our own schools along with creative action on all fronts would go a long way to an improved environment, he said.

Retiring Chamber President Don Hann, reviewing the past year, said outsiders marvel at the great talent in Holland and the willingness to work for the welfare of the entire community. He paid special tribute to Roscoe Giles, executive vice president, and Mayor L.W. Lamb Jr. and said chamber priorities for the year are much like those set last year.

President Floyd Folkert, currently in Spain, gave his president's message on tape pointing to a two-day retreat in Cadillac in which the following priorities were listed: (1) area planning with townships and counties, (2) vocational - technical needs, (3) downtown development, (4) regional health needs and hospital services, (5) Latin-American minority.

Vice President Don Stoltz presented a past president's plaque to Don Hann and a pair of wooden shoes to Dr. Van Wylen.

Framed citations also were presented to retiring officers and directors, Judson Bradford, Raymond Helder, William Jesick, Jack Westraite and Warren Willard. City Manager William J. Bopf was the master of ceremonies and Dr. James Cook of Western Theological Seminary gave the invocation.

Bill of Rights Studied At AAUW October Meeting

Mrs. Richard Giordano guided fellow AAUW members last Thursday night along the general theme for the year "What Is Our Right to Know?"

Upon arrival, members had been asked by college students to sign a proposed civil rights resolution. Many people did not sign. Of those who did, only a few recognized the identity of the document. Mrs. Giordano explained that the proposed civil rights resolution was really a paraphrase of the Bill of Rights.

Members shared some of the reasons they had not signed. They included: "We have those rights already;" and "I didn't have time to read the whole thing." However the main reason given was that they were reluctant to sign something that gave all citizens the right to keep and carry weapons without government interference.

Least anyone became too embarrassed about refusing to sign the Bill of Rights, a portion of the record "Stan Freeberg Presents the United States of

America" was played. The portion played included a dialogue between Thomas Jefferson and Benjamin Franklin where Jefferson is trying to convince Franklin to sign the Declaration of Independence. Franklin is rather reluctant to sign such a radical document but, as history tells us, ultimately does so.

Miss Barbara Lampen skillfully guided their thoughts and gave insight into the thinking of people at the time of the writing of the Declaration of Independence.

Miss Lampen divided her talk into three major areas. The first part was a summary of Jefferson's life from birth to death. It was emphasized that Jefferson was an extremely well educated man speaking over five languages, becoming this country's first archaeologist, a musician, a lawyer and a great statesman.

Jefferson considered his greatest contributions to his country were writing the Declaration of Independence; author-
