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Planning Consultant To Do Study

City Council Thursday night approved a recommendation of the Planning Commission to hire Scott Bagby and Associates for a renewal and redevelopment study of the city at a cost of \$2,500.

Willard C. Wichers of the Planning Commission said the figure mentioned was extremely reasonable and he hoped the study would be completed in three months at which time the commission would return to Council with further recommendations.

Holland is expanding, has many new homes and new industries, and with this comes an accelerated depreciation of property values in some of the older sections, causing a substantial subsidization of services by other properties, Wichers explained.

He said this situation is not unique, that it is happening all over, but it can get out of control and something must be done to reverse the trend and provide protection to all properties. He said this can be accomplished through federal urban renewal or through a new state legislative act whereby old substandard properties can be acquired and then made available to private investors at fair market values for apartments and other development.

Councilman Eugene Vande Vusse spoke at length on the plight of local developers and their inability to acquire property for apartment development at reasonable prices.

Wichers pointed out that rentals and property values in Holland are low, compared with other towns of comparable wealth or pay scales and said there is a serious shortage of good apartments or multiple dwellings of the executive type. Wichers added that Bagby had served as consultant to the planning commission for several years and had a wealth of information on the local situation. He said the planning commission again would welcome the services of a consultant.

Vote to approve the recommendation was unanimous.

Council also approved a swimming pool ordinance amendment tying in swimming pools and required fencing with the building code. It provides that no pool or its fencing may protrude in the required front yard or side street yard area.

Council approved an application of Walter Deitz for a permit to move a house and garage from 707 Washington Ave. to 229 West 30th St. by a 7 to 2 vote with John Van Eerden and Eugene Vande Vusse dissenting. Bill Boersma, of 1143 Legion Park Dr., who owns the lot next to the new site objected because houses further down the block were more modern. Harold Langejans who owns the house about to be moved said the house when moved and fixed up would be valued at \$15,000 whereas an older house next door was valued at perhaps \$10,000.

Another application of Walter Deitz to move a house and garage from 805 Lincoln Ave. to 204 East 35th St. was tabled until next meeting.

A communication from Taylor Produce and Storage Co. thanking Council for its cooperation in granting water last July on an emergency basis, commented on the critical need for water and requested that water be furnished for production, cooling and emergency purposes. The letter was referred to the Board of Public Works for study and report. Councilman Morris Peerbolt commented that this would be in keeping with the study the BPW currently is conducting along with Holland township.

On recommendation of the Board of Public Works, Council approved low bid of Norder Excavating, Inc., to install a gravity sewer, force main and lift station in 24th St. from Lincoln Ave. east about 1,030 feet, at a cost of \$50,965.40. It was the lowest of five bids submitted. The installation will be done under the alternate procedure.

Clerk to Reset Voting Machines on Friday

City Clerk D. W. Schipper will clear demonstrator voting machines Friday so that final reports on machine seal numbers and protective counters may be filed with county clerks on Saturday. This is the day city clerks and township clerks report to county clerks that all is in order for the election next Tuesday.

The clerk's office on the second floor of City Hall will be open Saturday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. for persons desiring absent voter ballots for the Nov. 3 election. Deadline is 2 p.m. Saturday.

To date, the office has received 654 requests for such ballots.

Johnson and Goldwater Both Favored

Two mock elections in educational institutions here Wednesday resulted in opposite choices for U.S. president.

Holland Christian High School gave 630 votes for Barry Goldwater and 256 for Johnson, of 73.9 per cent for the Republican candidate and 26.1 per cent for the Democratic choice.

Students at Western Theological Seminary gave Johnson 54 votes and Goldwater 35 votes. Because the enrollment comes from many states, no state offices were voted, but students indicated their general choices for other elective officers. This list: 46 Republicans, 8 Democrats and 38 independent voters. Stanley Hagemeyer, senior from Clara City, Minn., estimated students came from 15 states and a few from Canada, Philippines and Japan.

Christian High students also voted the entire ticket, but the vote was only compiled for president and governor. Romney the Republican incumbent, received 813 votes while Staebler received 74. This percentage ran 82.9 to 17.1.

Leaf Pickup Keeps City Crews Busy

With dry summer days prevailing, the street department has stepped up leaf collections on city streets, and leaf loaders, trucks and other equipment have been removing piles of leaves from local curbs.

The leaves are deposited at the rear of Pilgrim Home Cemetery when in time black dirt is mixed with the leaves and left to stand two years or more and eventually used in tulip lanes and flower beds.

Leaves are dropping fairly rapidly this year and department personnel hope to have the situation under control earlier than usual. There have been times in Holland that leaves kept falling after the ground was covered with snow.

The autumn weather the last few days has spurred many residents to rake their yards.

City Engineer Laverne Serne cautioned local residents to rake leaves only to the curb. The department is in no position to remove piles of brush and other debris. This is done only during Clean-up Week in the spring. On some occasions, crews have had to bypass certain piles because of branches, brush and other debris.

Christmas Overseas Mailing Period Set

The period Oct. 22 to Nov. 10 has been designated for mailing Christmas parcels by surface transportation to members of the armed forces overseas. Postmaster Louis A. Haight announced today.

For airmail parcels, the period is Dec. 1 to 10.

Greeting cards for the armed forces overseas should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

The term "armed forces overseas" includes personnel of the armed forces, members of their families, and authorized U.S. civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO, New York, San Francisco or Seattle, or Fleet post office, New York or San Francisco; or Navy post office c/o postmaster, Seattle, Wash.

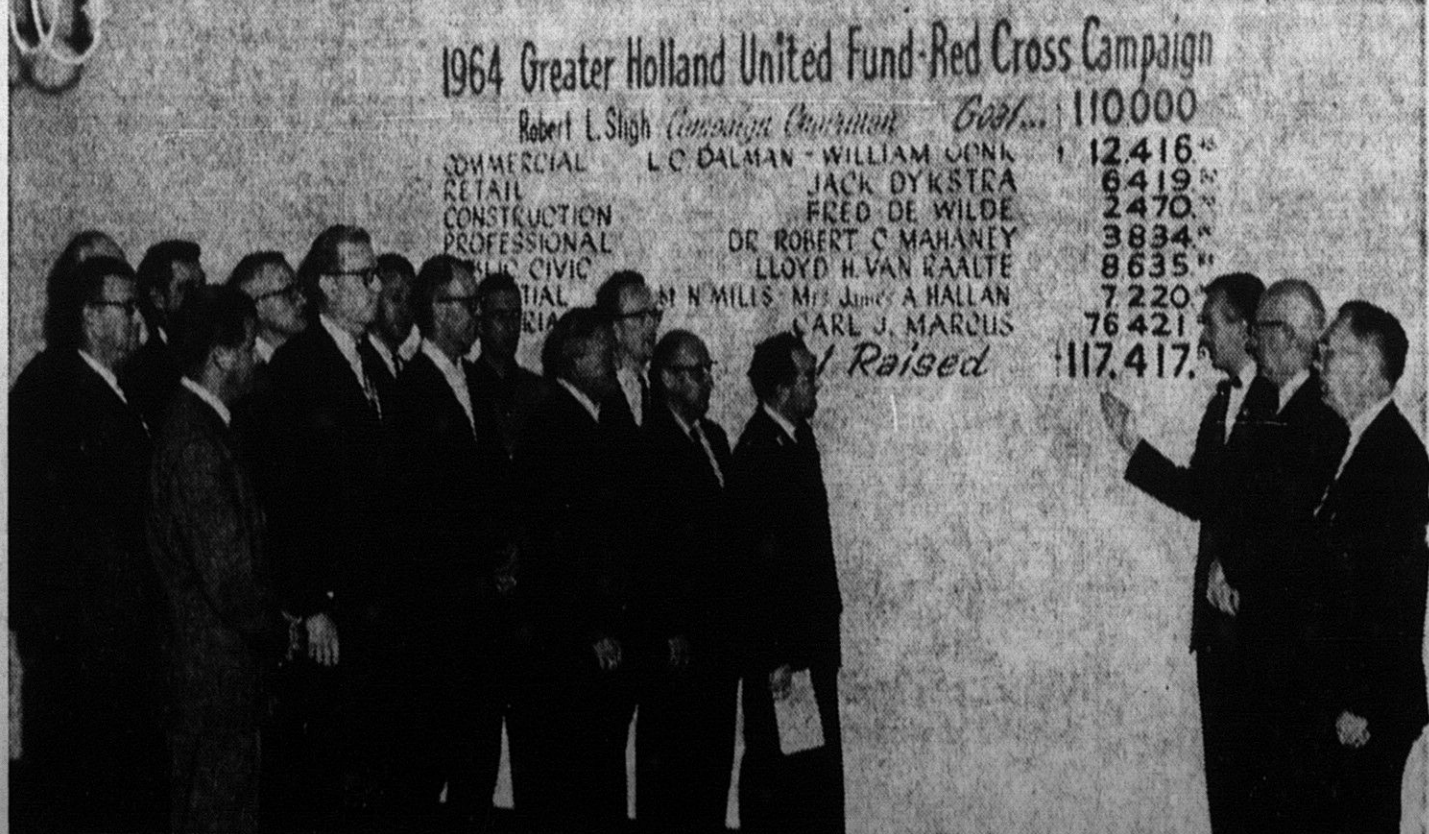

Development Program Set In Allegan

ALLEGAN—City Council Monday night made its long awaited decision to launch a downtown redevelopment project with a public hearing on new streets and parking lots—first step toward abolishing local business district "blight."

A resolution prepared by City Manager Kenneth Bollinger, stating the council's determination of necessity for streets and parking lots was approved unanimously. Tuesday, Dec. 1 at 7:30 p.m. was set for the public hearing in Griswold Memorial Building.

Described as evolving from "a joint decision of the Planning Commission and the City Council," the resolution calls for construction of several free parking areas at an estimated cost of \$200,000.

The resolution called for \$135,000 to be raised from special assessments in the business district with the balance to come from the city's general fund. Special assessments may be divided into ten annual installments.

The council indicated some revisions might be made in the special assessment district prior to the hearing, but that they would "stand firm" on the revised description.

Some unexpected developments have resulted from the city's new ordinance restricting accumulation of "junk cars" in residential areas.

Two youths and the parents of another were on hand Monday night to protest police enforcement of the ordinance as "too high handed."

It all boiled down to the fact that a number of young men rebuilt cars as a hobby and some argued that the 30-day extension allowed in the ordinance would be too short to get their cars in running order, as required under the ordinance.

One estimated it might take him "three, four—even six years" to ready an ancient La Salle for road display and competition.

Mayor T. E. Malila told the youth that it was "not the intention of the council to penalize hobbyists if they are cooperative."

City Attorney Ervin Andrews thought "some consideration should be given when an honest effort is being made."

A request for funds by a group of parents to repair the lower lounge of the Griswold Building to conform to fire safety standards so that it may be used for a private nursery school, was vetoed by the council. The building's board of directors had previously granted permission to use the room rent-free.

An option to buy an additional 6.3 acres for airport expansion was approved by a 3-2 vote, bringing the total acreage of the field to 154. Federal funds totaling \$60,000 recently were allocated for airport improvements, including pavement and landing lights.

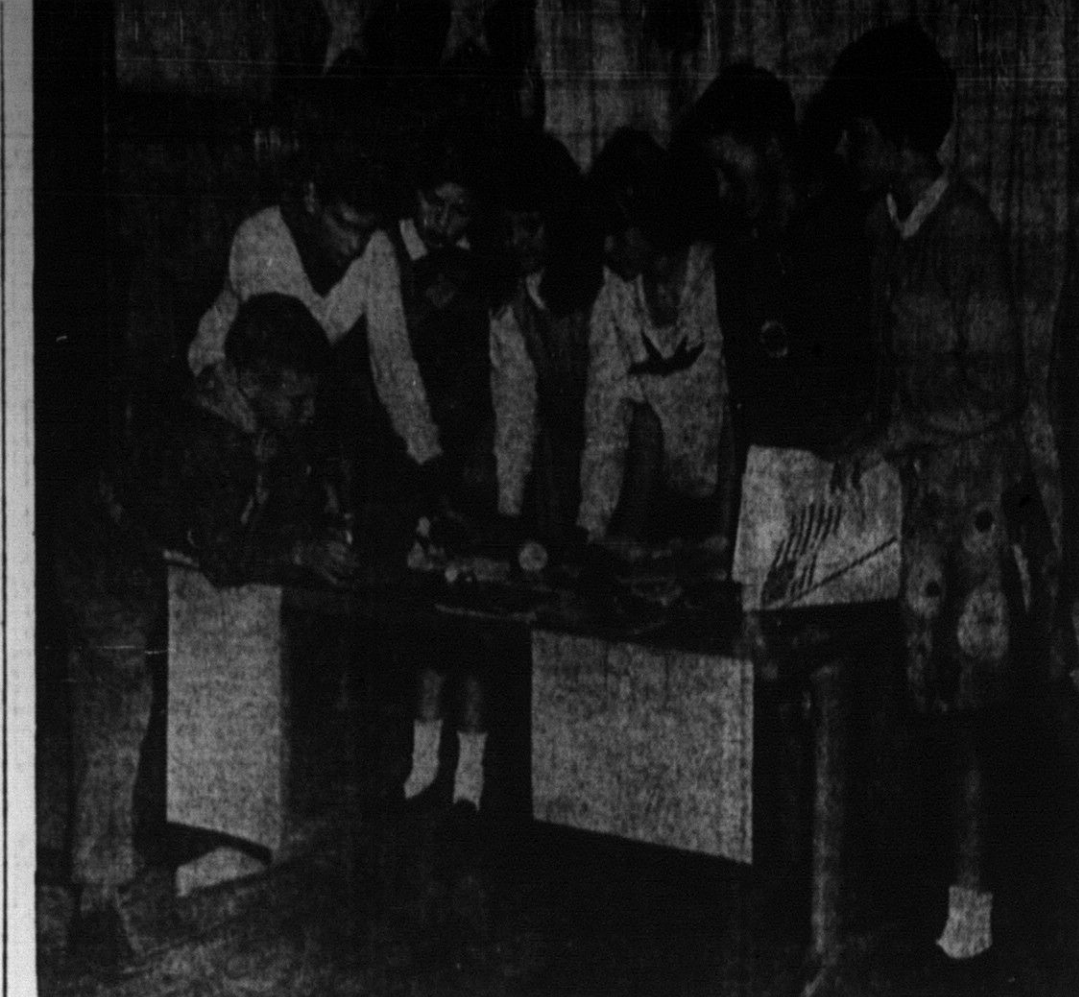

The two study groups sponsored non-partisan addresses to the classes by candidates for state offices. The Democratic group sponsored Ralph E. Richman, candidate for state representative from the 55th district, and the GOP group brought Harold J. Volkema, candidate for state senator from the 23rd district. The candidates spoke to the students about various facets of American politics and citizenship.

The students are making final preparations as the campaign closes and election day draws near. The sixth graders conducted a panel discussion Wednesday for the fourth and fifth graders in which the platform committees presented their findings; and the polling booths are nearing completion and will be ready for Tuesday's expected voting turnout of 150.

In describing the purpose of their program, the sixth graders said they wanted "to learn more about the Democratic and Republican parties" and "have more knowledge of the government," as well as find out "what the adults are doing." Their teachers, Mrs. Penna and Miss Bouman, said "we took advantage of election year to develop appreciation of our democratic way of life; more particularly, of the party system and the citizen vote."

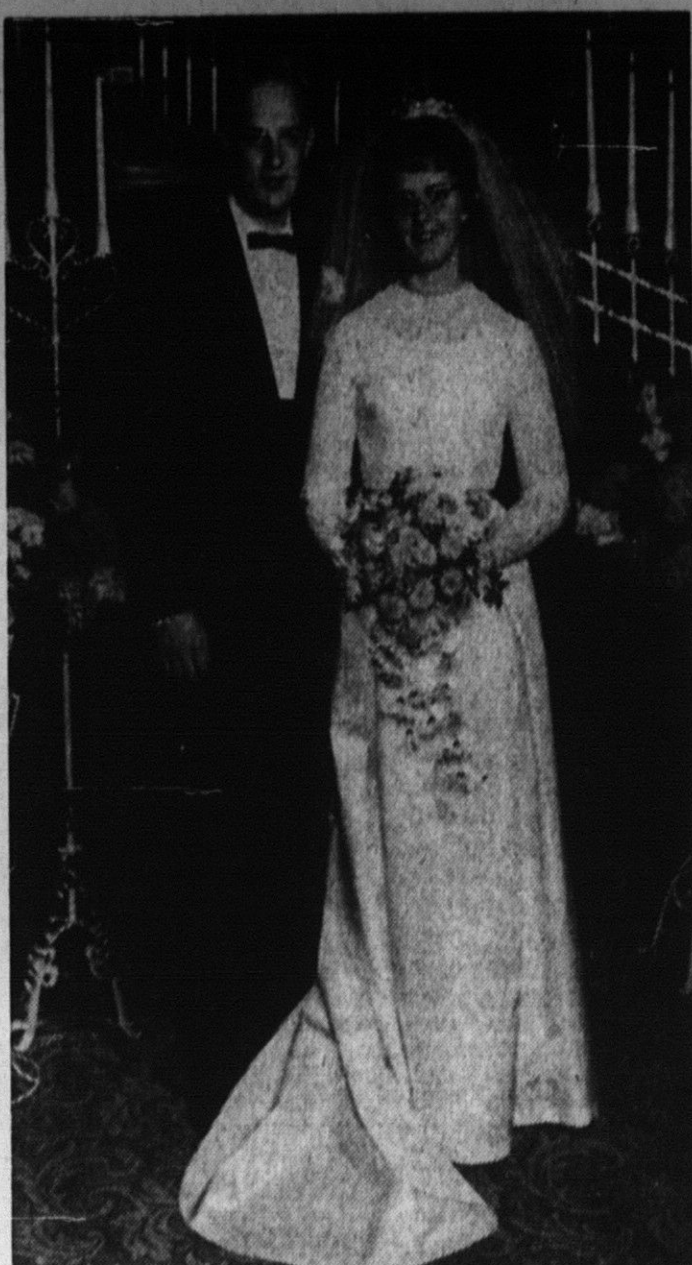

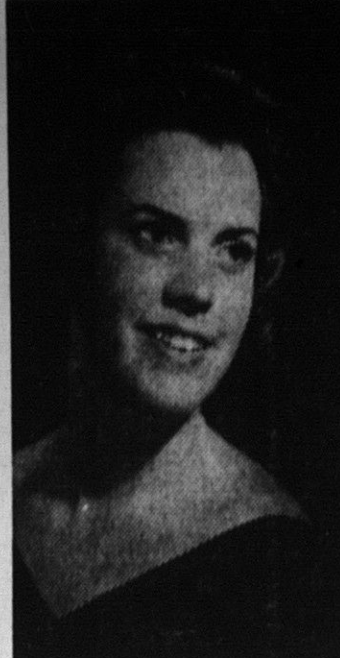

GRAND RAPIDS — Holland Christian's powerful cross country squad picked up its second trophy of the season here Friday afternoon as the Maroons defeated the Calvin College Christian High School Invitational meet run over the Knollcrest course.

Coach Phil Persenaire's club defeated six other Christian High Schools to win the event. Favored Grand Rapids Central Christian, presently leading the Grand Rapids City League, suffered its first defeat of the season by finishing second.

The Maroons won with 25 points, followed by Central Christian, 49, South Christian, 65, Grand Rapids East Christian, 97, Muskegon Christian, 135, Hudsonville Unity Christian, 157 and Kalamazoo Christian, 208. A total of 47 runners took part in the event.

Once again it was the depth of the Maroons which paid off as the Maroons copped the 2, 3, 4, 5 and 11th spots. A highlight of the Christian victory

was that only four seconds separated Holland's first four runners. Ver Beek of Central Christian copped the event in the 10:43 time over the two mile course.

Holland's first runner across was Ross Zoerhof in 10:50 followed by Larry Van Wieren, Lee Koning and Larry Klaasen. Hilbert Sybema, Christian's last point getter, was 11th. Ted Koeman of the locals finished 17th and Cal Davies was 20th.

The victory was especially sweet since the locals had taken second in the meet almost as long as it had been sponsored by Calvin.

Christian closes its regular season running in a triangular with Fennville and Paw Paw on Monday. Then next Saturday they will attempt to add more laurels when they compete in the state regionals at Grand Rapids. Two class B regionals will be run in Grand Rapids with Holland Christian drawing into the same regional as Vicksburg, the defending state class B champions.

Panthers Fall, 30-7 To Godwin

West Ottawa's football trip to Godwin's Athletic field was not a happy one Friday night as Godwin had little trouble in routing the Panthers 30-7 before 2,500 chilled Homecoming spectators.

Jackson Parkside Wins, 41-0

JACKSON — Holland High's football team ran into a surprisingly strong Jackson Parkside team here Friday night and absorbed a 41-0 defeat at Withington Field.

Parkside is a new Jackson high school and it will graduate its first class next June. It brought a 2-3 record into the game and succeeded in handing Holland its worst loss this season.

From their performance the Eagles showed that they will be heard from in the future as a prep football power. The winners were led by a sophomore halfback and a junior quarterback.

These two backs did everything and made it a miserable night for Holland. The Dutch won't have to face these two again because the pact was for only one year.

But they certainly left an indelible mark on the Dutch. The halfback is named Greg Harrison and he is billed as Parkside's all-everything back. His best asset is running but he can pass, catch passes and punt. The Eagles ground out 184 yards on the ground and Harrison picked up 148 of the yards. He scored three touchdowns. Parkside's other part of the one-two punch is Carl Conrad. He passed for two touchdowns and scored another.

Conrad's passing resulted in nine completions in 16 tries for 153 yards. Besides this offensive punch, Jackson also displayed a strong defense and didn't allow Holland beyond the Parkside 20.

A 36-yard pass from Conrad to junior halfback Don McCone was the first touchdown in the initial quarter. It was followed by a brilliant 42-yard Harrison run later in the period when he eluded the entire Dutch defense.

In the second quarter, Conrad hurled a six-yard scoring pass to McCone. Harrison scored on a three-yard drive in the third quarter after a bad pass from center on fourth down had given Jackson the ball deep in Holland territory.

In the final quarter Harrison ran 33 yards to score and Conrad speared three yards. John

McIntosh kicked five of six conversions. A bad pass from center prevented the other attempt. Parkside employed an effective spread offense with Harrison as a flanker. Conrad also ran the rollout option effectively. Both formations kept Holland off balance throughout.

The Dutch offense never got rolling. Holland managed to pick up 122 yards on the ground but fumbled, two pass interceptions and failure to make key yardage bogged the Dutch. Several times, including one series on the Jackson 20, the Dutch had to relinquish the ball on failure to gain a first down.

Holland made 10 first downs, seven by rushing, two by passing and one by penalty. Penalties were frequent and the winners were assessed 109 yards, including 45 in the first quarter, while Holland was charged with 53 yards.

The losers fired 21 passes, more than any previous game, and completed seven. Mike Bos and Paul Prins did the pitching with Pete Rector grabbing most of the aerials. Holland made 65 yards on passes.

Holland concludes its LMAC action next Friday at Muskegon. The Big Reds host Muskegon Catholic tonight. Holland now has a 1-5 record and 0-4 in the LMAC.

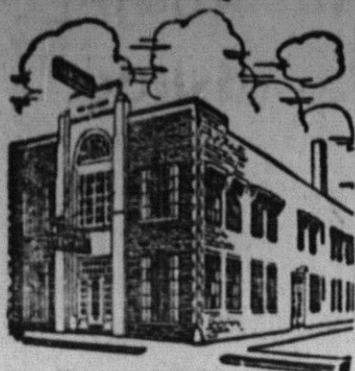

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FALL BRINGS NEED FOR HUNTING SAFETY

Along with fall comes the hunting season. We would like to remind you of the safety rules for handling firearms of all kinds. With a little extra caution there will be fewer of the accidents that come with autumn and hunters pouring into the open fields and woods.

Shotguns are dangerous. Rifles also are dangerous, especially high-powered models that are used to hunt large game. People who hunt birds and rabbits in the open in most cases will look first before they shoot, but each year there are many inexperienced hunters out for the first time who forget that they must be careful and they shoot at moving objects without seeing plainly what they are shooting at. Hunters with rifles especially should be sure that they practice safety first. High powered rifles are very dangerous because they carry a great distance. With thousands of people moving around in the woods, grass and brush it is very easy to cause an accident.

So remember first, Safety First. It will help to remember a few of the basic rules: Never point a gun at anything you do not intend to shoot. Almost as fundamental is this one: never carry a loaded gun in a car. Keep your gun in a case. Keep shells dry and do not load until you are ready to start hunting. Keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot. Take special care when you are climbing fences or crossing other obstructions. When you are hunting with a group be sure that you are aware of their location at all times.

Each year in the hunting season there are many accidents that could be avoided if everyone would just take a little extra caution. Think it over and then remember that you can probably recall many times when you have observed people who are careless in handling firearms. Safety First is the watchword for all.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, November 1
Stewardship of Possessions
I Timothy 6:6-12, 17-19
By C. P. Dame

The word "stewardship" is popular in modern church life. Timothy was a pastor in the church at Ephesus. Judging by the lesson text, there were members in that church who needed to be reminded of their financial responsibility. Paul knew that church, for he was its founder, says some good things about the use and misuse of wealth.

"But godliness with contentment is great gain" — so wrote Paul a long time ago. The more godliness there is in a community the more contentment there is. Today there are many discontented people everywhere in our world. We brought nothing in this world and we will carry nothing out with us. Since this is so, Paul says that we should be content with food and raiment. Paul excludes abundance and luxuries. Is it wrong to want some of the extra things of life? No indeed not, but it is wrong to let the passion for luxuries control our lives. This often happens in these times. Some church members do love those luxuries!

People who want to be rich are apt to fall into temptations. This fact is verified over and over again. It is the love of money that is the root of all manner of evil. Do not assume that only those who are rich are plagued by the love of money. How tightly some people with limited means cling to that which they have! Many people want money because they think it gives them status, security and power. The desire for money grows — the more some people have the more they want. Increase in wealth often means increase in temptations. People need godliness in the handling of money.

Life offers higher prizes than mere wealth. "But thou, O man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness." These virtues are well-known and need no explanation. In the sight of God the person who possesses these qualities is rich. Paul summons Timothy and all of us to "Fight the good fight of faith." The word "fight" suggests the presence of enemies. This fact is worth remembering today. How should we fight? To bear witness is one way. Keeping the commandments of God is another way. We are told to keep them in a spotless manner. Paul also told Timothy that Christ was coming again.

Wealth involves responsibilities. We know that wealth brings with it problems. Some rich people become "high-minded" and trust in uncertain wealth. Not all people know how to handle wealth for the cause trusting in "the living God" who gives us "richly all things to enjoy" — but not to boast about them. The more wealth a person has the more good he can do and the more helpful he can be to others. Wealth can be used to acquire lasting spiritual riches. Only the heavenly wealth lasts. This lesson offers a fine opportunity to talk about tithing, budgets, what are necessities and what are luxuries in life, how to teach boys and girls and young people to give and to gain a sense of responsibility for the growing work of the church.

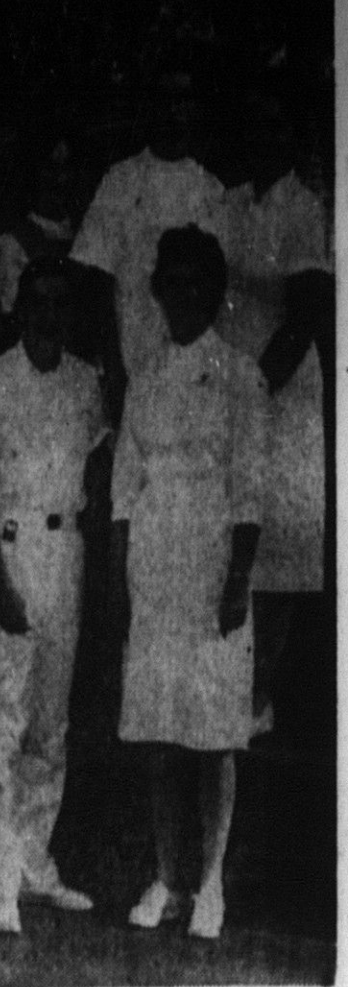

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Office Building Okayed By Board of Appeals

The Board of Appeals Wednesday night approved an alternate plan submitted by Russell Klaasen to erect a larger office building at 307-311 River Ave.

Klaasen previously had received permission to erect a smaller office building at 311 River Ave. He also was granted permission to put up a fence instead of hedge on the lot line, provided he obtain written permission from the adjacent property owners.

The board spent two hours discussing an application of Fred Arnoldink to reconsider a request for using a building at 706 Ottawa Ave. for light manufacturing. The board gave conditional approval.

Hope Faculty Hears Talk by Dr. Oppewall

Dr. Peter Oppewall, Democratic candidate for the State Board of Education, outlined responsibilities of the new board at a dinner meeting of Hope College faculty members on Hope campus Monday evening.

Dr. Oppewall pointed out that under the new constitution the board would have broad new powers, including appointing the superintendent of public instruction, who was formerly elected. It will also advise the legislature on the financial requirements of all education from kindergarten through the graduate school, and will plan the long-range development of the colleges and universities.

He said the board will appoint another eight-man board to oversee development of community colleges. Dr. Oppewall described the community colleges as the most rapidly growing segment of the whole educational system, and contended that they presented possible solutions to the problem of overcrowding in large universities and the unemployability of unskilled high school graduates.

Speaking on the role of the small private colleges such as Hope and Calvin in the state's educational picture, Dr. Oppewall pointed out that Michigan depended heavily on these schools to educate a fair share of the young people in the state. He praised the new state scholarship program, stressing that it permitted students to select colleges of their own choice without economic handicap. He urged a greatly expanded state scholarship and loan program.

Dr. Oppewall is a professor of English at Calvin College in Grand Rapids, where he has taught for the past ten years. He has also taught high school at the University of Michigan, for Michigan State University Extension in Grand Rapids, and was a Fulbright scholar at the University of Leiden in the Netherlands. He received an A.B. degree from Colvin College, and a master's and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Michigan.

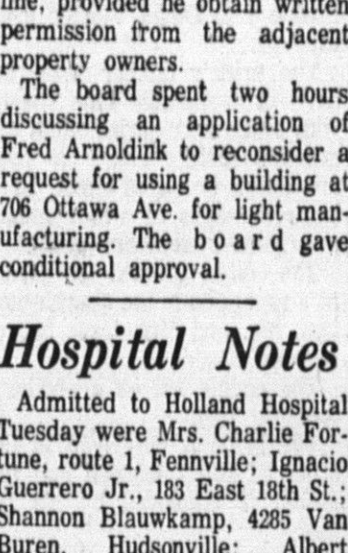

School year whether they want to continue their education in one of the health fields. Invariably, three-quarters enter the profession.

This year, the number of co-op students was boosted to 35, compared with 24 last year. For the first time, Christian High School is in the hospital part of the co-op program operated by Don Gebraad and Myles Runk. Previously, the Christian High pinkies had operated independently from the co-op program.

The pinkie program has been in operation at Holland Hospital since 1947, starting with only a few girls assisting nurses. Mrs. Virginia Atman, a registered nurse currently on the hospital staff, was a member of that first group.

While the hospital nursing training program is largely for girls, boys have occasionally signed up for the training course. This year, two boys are assigned to x-ray work.

Instructors in the co-op nursing training program are Mrs. Ruth Dyke, Mrs. Jennie Vander Woude, Mrs. Thressa Tien and Mrs. Amy Verburg.

Aside from personal inclination in choosing nursing as a profession, there are sound economic and security reasons for young men and women to select such a career. Personal satisfaction can be higher in nursing than in almost any other profession if one is motivated to be of service to others. The earning capacity for nurses has been rising at a faster pace than other professional groups and leaders feel salaries should soon equal the teaching profession and others in which academic attainments are approximately equal.

Another consideration is job security and job ability. A qualified nurse can obtain a position in almost any community in the nation these days. There are 50,000 vacancies for registered nurses in health agencies across the country, including 3,000 in Michigan.

The federal government enacted a nurse training act in September appropriating \$287,000,000 to be spent over a five-year period in a massive assault on the nursing shortage which has persisted since 1941.

Much of the money will be used to build and upgrade schools of nursing and to train teachers and administrators of nursing. About \$100,000,000 will be devoted to low interest loan funds for students. These loans may be up to \$1,000 for each year of study and are repayable over a 10-year period. Up to 50 per cent of the loan will be cancelled if the nurse works full time for five years after graduation.

Expansion of the local co-op program comes at a time when Holland Hospital is planning to expand its physical plant by approximately 33 per cent.

Hoffman, who is 89 and in failing health, retired from the House of Representatives in 1962 after serving 14 terms when he was stricken by two strokes.

He told United Press International several months ago he was a wholehearted supporter of Goldwater "but couldn't do much on behalf" of the controversial candidate.

However, his son, attorney Leo Hoffman, Saturday said the family has been flooded with requests from people around the nation asking the ex-congressman's view on Goldwater.

As a result, the attorney said, the congressman and other members of the family, are issuing a statement which will go out in the mails Monday to hundreds of persons, urging the support of Goldwater for president.

"It is vitally important that Senator Goldwater be elected president and that President Johnson be defeated," the statement declares.

Hoffman, like Goldwater, had opposition within the Republican Party during his long tenure as a congressman. During one election one county GOP group campaigned against him but he kept winning at the polls repeatedly and was able

Dutch Score On 75-Yard Punt Return

An undermanned Hope College football team battled powerful Albion for a half Saturday but the unbeaten Britons showed their strength in the second half and rolled to a 27-6 win before 4,000 Homecoming fans in Riverview Park.

The victory gave Albion assurance of at least a tie for the MIAA crown. It was the sixth straight for the Britons, ninth over the past two seasons since Hope beat them 21-6 last year, and the fourth straight MIAA win.

Hope scored on a brilliant 75-yard punt return by Capt. Roger Abel with 56 seconds left in the first quarter. He caught the punt on his own 25, eluded the Albion defense, was alone at the Albion 45 and then outraced the Briton safetymen. Steve Wessling's kick failed.

Besides this exciting moment, the Hope alumni also cheered the valiant defensive effort displayed for the first 30 minutes. The bigger Britons had all kinds of trouble moving the all against the Flying Dutchmen and didn't knot the score until five seconds remained in the half.

The tying touchdown was somewhat of a fluke as the intended receiver and a Hope defender touched the ball before it was caught.

Dave Neilson's five-yard pass bounced off the shoulder of a Hope player, then off the chest of the intended receiver and in to the arms of halfback Jim Royer who was standing in the end zone. Doug McDonald's try for the extra point was wide. The score was set up after Albion got a Hope punt on the losers 31.

The equalizing touchdown gave the Britons the momentum they needed and they completely dominated the second half. The first touchdown came on 10-yard off tackle smash by Paul Danforth with 10:59 left in the third quarter. The touchdown climaxed a six-play 38-yard drive.

Albion recovered a Hope fumble on the kickoff on the Hope 24 and Russ Wallis raced two yards to score six plays later. Wallis raced three yards around end with 11:24 left in the game for the other score after a low pass from center had forced the Hope punter down on his 14. The touchdown followed in three plays.

McDonald converted after the second touchdown and Wallis ran for the two points after the final touchdown.

The Hope College student body likes Gov. Romney. Not only did it favor him 10 to 1 for governor in a mock student election on campus Friday but it gave him 67 write-ins for President.

The vote was: Romney, 613, and Neil Staebler, 65.

The presidential and senatorial votes were closer together. The Johnson-Humphrey vote totaled 323 and the Goldwater-miller vote 299.

For senator, incumbent Philip A. Hart received 298 votes and his Republican opponent Elly Peterson received 356.

About 51 per cent of the student body voted, according to James Chesney, senior from Delmar, N.Y., who headed the committee for the National Student Association project. He said split ballots were the rule rather than the exception.

A good share of the voters reported just before the polls closed at 5 p.m.

In their zeal for Gov. Romney, students may have been influenced by their student newspaper "The Anchor" which supported Romney for the presidency in a special election edition this week.

Editor Chuck Menning, Grandville senior, called for the third choice because President Johnson "represents a continued march to a welfare state" and Goldwater, although "the better choice," hasn't "displayed workable programs for his conservative principles."

The Hope College radio station WTAS conducted a poll of the Hope faculty. A total of 71 per cent of the faculty responded to the poll with 74 per cent favoring Johnson and 26 per cent Goldwater.

Gov. Romney was favored by 74 per cent and 26 per cent favored Rep. Staebler. Sen. Hart was favored by 61 per cent and 39 per cent favored Mrs. Peterson.

Delbert Michel, director of the gallery program, and Dr. Edward Savage, comparatist in the English Department, will informally discuss some of the particularly outstanding prints in the exhibit, including Durer's "The Knight, Death and the Devil," four etchings by Rembrandt ("Christ Preaching," "The Deposition of Christ," "The Agony in the Garden," and "Landscape"), a Picasso line etching, and several other works.

This show of original prints, on loan from the Grand Rapids Art Museum and from the private collection of Miss Malvina Perkins of Grand Rapids, is of unusually high quality and of interest to a wide range of tastes. The college art department plans to continue to bring in art of high quality throughout the year for the interest and enjoyment of the entire community.

With the help and cooperation of the Holland public school system, the college art department is undertaking a new venture this semester. Don Rohlick, art consultant for the Holland system, is directing twenty art education students from the college in a weekly teaching workshop at Lincoln School. These teacher trainees teach art to sixty children from grades one through six who have been selected by the Lincoln School staff on the basis of ability, interest, and need. While the children receive supplementary art instruction, the student teachers gain direct, practical experience in planning and conducting art classes at various grade levels.

If evaluations are favorable, similar programs will be initiated in other schools at the invitation of their administrations. As an art department we are certainly grateful to the Lincoln School P.T.A. for their sponsorship of this pilot program in art education. Their cooperation has been splendid.

A similar program is in progress at the secondary level. We owe a great deal of appreciation to Mrs. Robert Visser, director of the Holland High School art program, who has helped us to form an experimental class of high school students.

This class is being taught at the college by college art students of high potential who are considering careers as secondary teachers.

I would like to remind adults in the community that all of the Hope College art courses are open to you. Several townspeople are already enrolled, and Michel and I are very pleased to have them. If you are interested, please look over the list of course offerings and feel free to inquire at the art department about taking a course in art history or in studio.

Supervisors Adopt Budget

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa county Board of Supervisors Thursday concluded its October session Thursday in record time, four days.

"I've been on the board more than 30 years," Supervisor Henry G. Slaughter of Lamont said after the board adjourned early Thursday afternoon, "and we never adjourned until after at least six meetings."

The 35 members adjourned until the January session after receiving their payroll, which totaled \$1,776.24, including \$10 per diem and mileage.

Another record was set Thursday when the board officially adopted a record \$1,368,500 budget for operation of the county offices, outside the road commission and education offices. It took the board only 90 minutes Oct. 13 to approve the budget, item by item, sitting as a committee of the whole.

The budget could not be officially approved until Thursday after a public hearing on Wednesday. Slaughter, chairman of the committee on ways and means, reported no one came to the hearing before his committee, which met from 1:30 to 3 p.m. The board adopted a resolution, presented by City Atty. Gordon Cunningham of Holland, seeking a prosecutor's opinion on whether the budget hearing must be held before a special meeting of the committee or before the entire board. The latter arrangement would save expense.

The board will ask the tax allocation commission to spread 4.05 mills for county purposes, to meet the 1965 budget. Of this millage .16279 mill is for county parks. Only two minor changes in the annual budget were approved by the board Thursday. City Manager R. V. Terrill, Grand Haven, of the officers committee, asked that two custodians in the county building, now being paid under the average custodian scale in the Tri-Cities, be increased in salary 5 per cent instead of 2½ per cent in the new budget. The

senior custodian was increased from \$3,552 to \$3,720 and the other was boosted from \$3,468 to \$3,636. Minor changes were also made in the salaries of members of the sheriff's staff.

The board also allocated the annual funds for water patrol work for 1965. The county's share next year will be \$3,750, which will be matched, 2 to 1, by state funds. In the county total are appropriations received from Holland city, Holland township and Park township for special patrols on Lake Macatawa in the south end of the county.

City Atty. Howard W. Fant of Grand Haven presented a resolution from the legislation committee of the board, asking the state legislature to change the supreme court rules in connection with appointment of lawyers in case of appeals of criminal convictions by indigent persons. The resolution was approved and will be forwarded to the legislators from Ottawa county, candidates seeking legislative offices, the governor, the supreme court and the State Association of Supervisors.

Fant explained that as amended the rule will place a heavy financial burden on the counties if counties are to pay the lawyers appointed to counsel indigents. The resolution, approved by the board, asks that the legislature provide that all fees and expenses of the attorneys in such cases be paid by the state.

The report of the committee on taxes and apportionment for 1964 was approved. Taxes apportioned total \$9,636,116.70, including school taxes, county taxes and other taxes, of which Holland city must raise \$2,474,154.48; Grand Haven, \$1,648,337.81; Hudsonville city, \$189,867.84; Zeeland, \$449,598.77; Ferrysburg city, \$143,861.81; Grand Haven township, \$259,812.37; Robinson, \$78,896; Spring Lake township and village, \$627,440, and Crocker, \$123,041.56.

Canals and Dikes Next For Windmill

Plans and specifications for canals and dikes at Holland's new Windmill development were distributed Friday by Architects Kammeraad and Stroop who are designing the \$460,000 restoration project of the 200-year-old Windmill De Zwaan which was dismantled some months ago at Vinkel, the Netherlands, and taken to Holland, Mich.

The contract for canals and dikes carried with it installation of a six-inch water main. Bids must be turned in on Oct. 30.

Architect Howard Kammeraad said the development is something of a peninsula in the Black River delta and plans call for cutting a canal across the base of the peninsula to make an island. This canal will be approximately 1,800 feet long. The waterway will be about 30 feet wide and the depth will average about five feet, sufficiently deep to run canal boats.

Dikes bordering the canal will be 14 feet wide on the top and designed with a 10-foot gravel pats. Seeding and Sodding on the dikes will be done next spring.

Plans call for an authentic wooden Dutch drawbridge across the canal as well as a service bridge for use of heavy vehicles only. There will be no parking on the 30-acre island. Parking for 300 cars is under development nearby. The De Forest Co. of Grand Rapids has the contract.

Work on constructing a new road which will be an extension of Lincoln Ave. north from Seventh St. is expected to be completed this week. This contract is held by Don Brink Construction Co. The toll booth for visitors will be placed on this road at about Sixth St.

All work on the new contracts to be let next week carries a completion date of April 1. Plans call for installing adequate toilet facilities in the hospitality building adjacent to the parking lot.

The six-inch water main is considered more than adequate to service the development. There will be a three-inch standpipe in the windmill itself to service the automatic sprinkler system for fire protection. This is a modern refinement installed in most mills in the Netherlands today since the wooden mills are quite vulnerable to fire, particularly lightning.

Meanwhile, a good sized garden already has been graded and the soil prepared for plantings. Jaap de Bleecourt, the Dutch gardener who came here from Mackinac Island where he supervised plantings of 200 acres, has designed the local gardens and the first of more than 100,000 tulip bulbs have been planted there.

Awards are granted in three different categories with Birchwood included in the category of housing for the elderly and nursing homes. Birchwood Manor was the only award winner in the nursing home classification in the Midwest.

Design requirement for Birchwood Manor was for a building of residential character that would provide efficient nursing care. A cross-shaped plan was chosen with all nursing services and control concentrated in the center of the cross. Three arms of the cross contain rooms for 60 patients in private and semi-private suites. Each patient wing includes a lounge and outdoor patio. The fourth arm houses service and administrative facilities as well as the

multi-purpose dining room. To help provide homelike character, landscaping was integrated with site development to furnish an abundance of outdoor areas. Planting materials were chosen to harmonize with those in a neighboring residential area.

The home is equipped with many features for patient safety and care, including corridors with handrails on both sides. All bath and toilet areas have safety grab bars. All rooms are served by the nurses call system, and there are intercom and private telephones where desired.

Wold and Bowers, Inc., architects, also won a top award in the national competition for nursing homes and housing for the elderly in the 1963 competition for Pilgrim Manor in Grand Rapids, a home for senior citizens.

Winning entries will get attention throughout the United States and foreign countries by means of FHA exhibits in professional trade group sessions, financial institutions, civic organizations and schools.

Exchange Club Members Hear About Windmill

Willard Wichers, director of The Netherlands Information Service and coordinator of the Windmill project, was guest speaker at the noon luncheon meeting of the Holland Exchange Club Monday. He spoke on the types of windmills in The Netherlands and told of some of the problems which had to be solved before Holland could get the windmill now being assembled here.

Wichers said there two general types of windmills in The Netherlands, the polder mills which pump water to keep the land dry and the larger mills which are still used for industrial purposes such as grinding grain, sawing or pressing oil from seeds. The latter type is the one being assembled here.

The windmill project which was first suggested by Carter Brown some three years ago is now well under way. At first the Windmill Society of The Netherlands flatly refused to consider selling a mill to the United States.

In The Netherlands the windmills are regarded as national monuments and the one here is probably the last mill to be sold. There are now about 900 mills left in The Netherlands and of these only 392 are still in use.

The history of the mill "De Zwaan" goes back over 200 years. It was once destroyed by fire, restored immediately, later moved to a new site and moved a second time because a church interfered with the wind which ran the mill. The mill is a large one measuring 80 feet from cap to ground with a wing tip of 125 feet above the ground.

Wichers went on to say that as required by law, all parts of the mill and lumber were fumigated. All roads and buildings will be built at least two feet above the highest known water level.

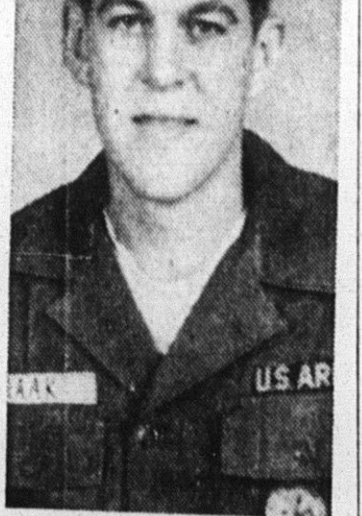
