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## 4 Traffic Changes Are Approved

Four traffic changes were approved by City Council Wednesday night on recommendation of City Manager Herb Holt and Adrian Koert, traffic consultant.

One authorizes four-way stop signs at 22nd St. and Van Raalte Ave. and removing the "high accident area" signs. Councilman Donald Oosterbaan said most residents in the area favored the change but three objected.

Parking on the east side of Pine Ave. between Third and Fourth Sts. here after will be parallel only.

Parking will be eliminated on the north side of 12th St. Maple to Washington Aves., and on the east side of Maple Ave. from 12th to 13th Sts.

Parking also will be limited on the north side of 22nd St. from Michigan Ave. west to the end of the curb or about 100 feet.

A letter from the Holland and Zeeland Area Housing Corp. (HAZAH) suggesting Council consider the desirability of appointing a commission for the city for the purpose of exploring needs and implementing construction of housing for the aged was referred to the city manager for study and report.

A resolution from East Grand Rapids City Commission urging the governor to take steps to place a representative of Western Michigan on the State Highway Commission at the earliest possible time was filed.

Council scheduled a public hearing Sept. 3 on an application of Sau-Tuk Industries, Inc., requesting a variance from requirements of the fire district ordinance with respect to constructing a steel storage building at 850 Maple Ave.

A Board of Public Works change order to the contract of General Electric Co. for the turbine generator at the James De Young plant involving one item for a reduction in the contract of \$471.56 was approved.

A Board of Public Works communication on bids for the purchase of surplus property located on the northwest corner of 20th St. and College Ave. was presented, and Council approved sale of the lot to Henry Zwiers for \$3,125.

A recommendation authorizing the BPW to make application to the Water Resources commission for federal funds for waste treatment plant improvements was adopted.

Council confirmed certifications for Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho, prints, \$9.16; Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., police and health departments, hospital and Windmill Island \$108.86.

Council approved zoning ordinance amendments concerning two parcels in the vicinity of 40th St. and Washington Ave., hanging one to B-1 apartment and the other to C-1 neighborhood commercial.

Councilman Lou Hallacy expressed concern over the increasing number of accidents on the US-31 bypass and asked the city manager and chief of police to compile data on recent accidents particularly at the Eighth St., 16th St., 32nd St. and M-40 crossings and report back to Council in the belief that updated statistics might suggest a new course of action to promote safety on this four-mile stretch.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and a quarter. All councilmen were present. The invocation was given by the Rev. Thomas Ten Hoeve, retired.

ALLEGAN — Mrs. Doris Nordhof, 39, route 2, Hamilton, charged with negligent homicide in the crash deaths of three Holland persons last Sept., was bound over to Allegan Circuit Court at a preliminary examination in Allegan District Court Friday. Her bond of \$600 was continued.

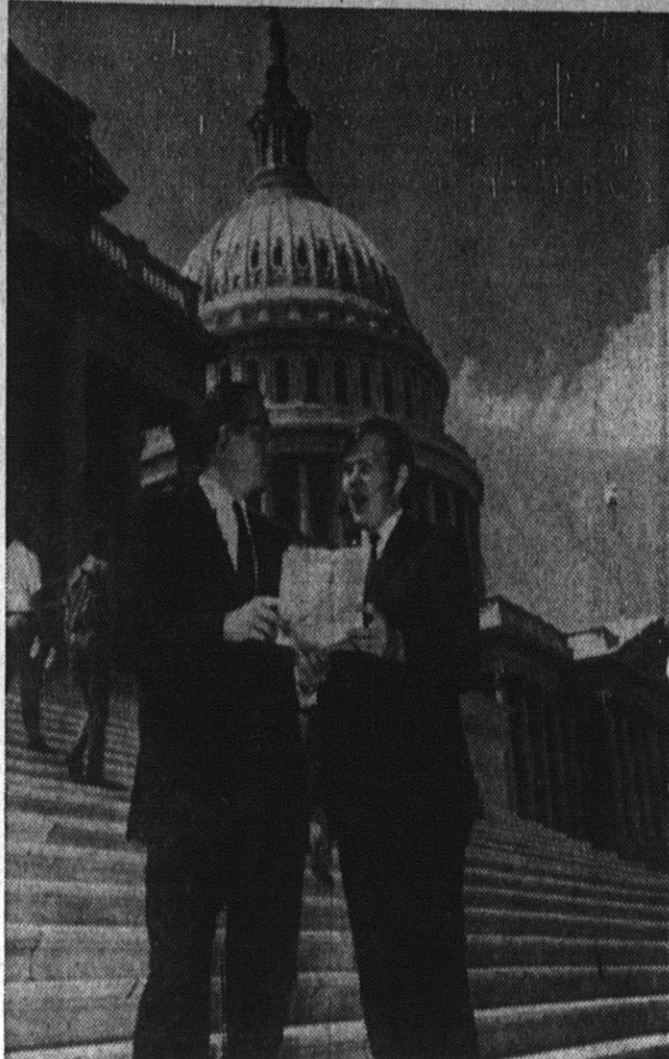
Mrs. Nordhof was charged with negligent homicide in connection with the death of Daniel Clark of Holland and two sons, Michael, 12, and John, 14. The crash occurred on Blue Star Highway 2½ miles south of Holland.

## GVSC Student Working On Vander Jagt Staff

WASHINGTON—Tom E. Selles, a Holland college student working in Washington this summer won his first political victory at the age of 16 and figures it may be a step toward the U.S. Senate.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Selles of 205 East 29th St. is collecting practical experience as a summer member of Congressman Guy Vander Jagt's staff.

Selles believes his summer education on Capitol Hill might help him some day to win election as a Senator after what he hopes will be a successful political career at the state level.

Election as chairman of the Southern Ottawa County Teenage Republicans was the first time Selles scored as a candidate.

However, before Selles embarks on a political career he plans to complete his senior year at Grand Valley State College and become a high school teacher.

"I have politics in my blood," says Selles. "Eventually, I will probably run for regular office." While teaching he will continue to be involved in GOP politics as a worker awaiting the right time to seek a state office.

Selles mixes politics with education at Grand Valley State where he is a chairman of the College Republicans and Vice President of Student Government.

As a member of Vander Jagt's staff this summer, Selles has several assignments, including legislative research, answering mail and writing a speech.

Washington, he has discovered, "is an exciting place for anyone interested in politics, otherwise it's just another big city."

Two highlights of the summer so far for Selles were receptions he attended at the White House and the Chinese Embassy. "Fabulous" is the de-

scription he gives.

A year ago Selles met Richard M. Nixon during the Republican national convention in Miami at a party given by Julie Nixon and David Eisenhower before they were married.

Selles was invited while he was serving as a messenger at the convention for the Michigan delegation. He is a real Nixon fan.

"The President impresses me for many reasons," says Selles, who predicts a "wonderful future" for the new Administration.

Congress is a "very efficient organization," says Selles. He points out that "most work is accomplished in committees away from the public eye."

Selles describes Vander Jagt as "one of the most competent young men in national government." The Ninth District Congressman, says Selles, "truly represents the people at home."

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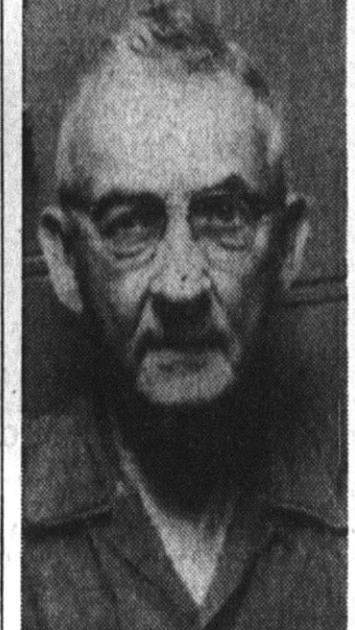
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## Andrew Lohman Retires From Farm Bureau

Another occupant, Gary Mannon, 20, route 5, Allegan, received back injuries and was taken to Bronson Hospital in Kalamazoo.

A third occupant, Dallas Snyder, 20, rural Allegan, was thrown from the car and he walked six miles to his home.

His father brought him to sheriff's headquarters shortly before noon and after he was questioned he was taken to Allegan Health Center for treatment of bruises he received in the crash.

Officers said they were unable to determine immediately which of the men was driving.

Clemens who was discharged only last Friday from the Army is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Clemens, two sisters and five brothers.

# Holland City Manager Announces Resignation

City Manager H. Herbert Holt who has served as city manager here for nearly 15 years announced Monday that he is resigning.

The resignation will be presented to City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall.

His letter reads: "I've given much thought of late to my long tenure in Holland and I believe that a city manager with a fresh approach to our many problems might be helpful. I have discussed the matter with the mayor and council and they concur."

"In this connection I wish to submit my resignation effective at such time as I have found a new assignment, but in no event later than March 1, 1970."

"Giving notice at this time will allow the mayor and council to begin the search for a replacement and hopefully an orderly and natural change in city managers can be accomplished."

Holt, 48, started his work as city manager here Dec. 1, 1954, when the late Harry Harrington

was mayor. The following spring, Robert Visscher was elected mayor, serving six years until Nelson Bosman became mayor in 1961.

It was Holt's first position as city manager and the city saw many changes in the period that has elapsed. He was reluctant to take credit for any part of the expanding program, but he is most proud of the modern personnel system and the capable leaders in the city hall family. Holland city today has 750 to 800 employees, more than half of them in Holland Hospital.

With city managers working an average of four years in any given position, Holt said he had overstayed his tenure because "Holland is such a nice city, a wonderful place for bringing up a family and a great place to live."

He said he has remained in Holland too long, and possibly at a sacrifice to his own pro-

fessional career.

Holt, a native of Akron, Colo., attended the University of Colorado at Kansas City and then obtained a master's degree in public administration from the University of Kansas. His college training was interrupted by four years in the Air Corps during which he piloted B-29s. During his training, he was associated with the office of L. P. Cookingham in Kansas City, and had a special one-year academic program in which he was paid \$35 a month, a sharp contrast to his present post which pays \$20,250 a year.

He came to Holland from Madison, Wis., where he spent a year on a research assignment on a public expenditures survey.

Holt says he has no immediate plans but will be surveying the field for city manager or consultant openings but was not committed definitely to continuing city manager work.

The Pershings reside in Denton, Texas, and Saugatuck.

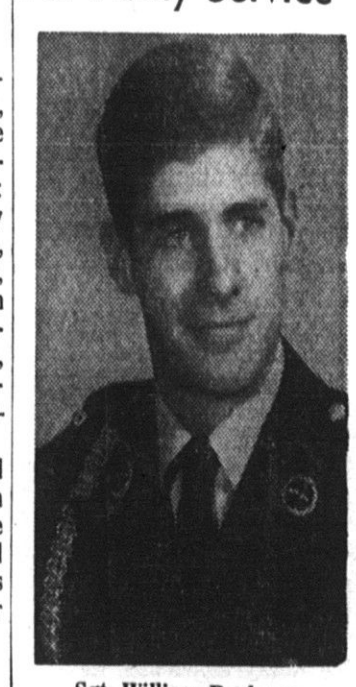
## Injured Cyclist Is 'Satisfactory'

John K. Weller, 22, and Harold J. Butts, 17, both of Muskegon, who were arrested Friday night outside the foundry, demanded examination when arraigned in Grand Haven District Court on charges of larceny from a building. Bond of \$5,000 was not posted.

Louis Loby, owner of Enterprise Iron and Metal Co. of Grand Rapids, demanded examination when arraigned in Grand Rapids Monday on charges of receiving and concealing stolen goods. He was released on \$1,800 bond.

Grand Haven city police were assisted by state police in the case. Nearly \$6,700 in goods was recovered in the Loby establishment, officers said.

## Holland Sailor in Protest

HONOLULU — A Holland, Mich., serviceman and two others from the same state are among 21 U.S. servicemen who have taken sanctuary in the church of the Crossroads here in opposition to the Army and the Vietnam war.

Navy Seaman Apprentice Arthur Parker, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Parker of 921 Shadybrook Dr., was to report for duty aboard a Navy tanker in Honolulu Friday night.

Parker had dropped out of West Ottawa High School in April and joined the Navy. He had completed basic training at Great Lakes Naval Training Center at Great Lakes, Ill., three weeks ago.

"I was on liberty and decided to go to the church," Parker said. "I've been thinking about this for a long time."

Parker's parents today said, "we have no comment at all."

The other Michigan residents seeking refuge in the church are

Army Pvt. Matthew Biggerstaff, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Biggerstaff of Westland and Army Spec. 4 Daniel Overstreet of Garden City.

Biggerstaff said, "It's about time something was done about the injustices in the military. There is no logical reason for us to be in Vietnam."

Biggerstaff's parents said they "want him to have the courage of his own conviction — whether it proves out in the future he's right or wrong."

The first of 21 servicemen to seek sanctuary at the church, Airman Louis D. Parry, 21, of San Jose, Calif., told some 400 members of the congregation Sunday that "our work has just begun."

Attired in blue jeans and a blue shirt, Parry called for "unity and togetherness" in an address to the worshippers at the church which has been offering refuge to military men opposed to the Vietnam war.

"I think the congregation felt kind of alienated from us before Sunday," Parry said, "but now I know they're in sympathy with our cause."

Most of the service Sunday was devoted to statements by the servicemen of why they went AWOL and how they planned to stay until the military "come and get us."

When all the servicemen were standing, the congregation rose and burst into applause.

Parry went to the church a week ago and since then the others have joined him.

Military authorities said all those inside the church would be given 30 days to come out voluntarily to face charges of being absent without leave. If they failed to comply, military officials said they would be arrested and charged as deserters.

Servicemen convicted of desertion face up to five years in prison.

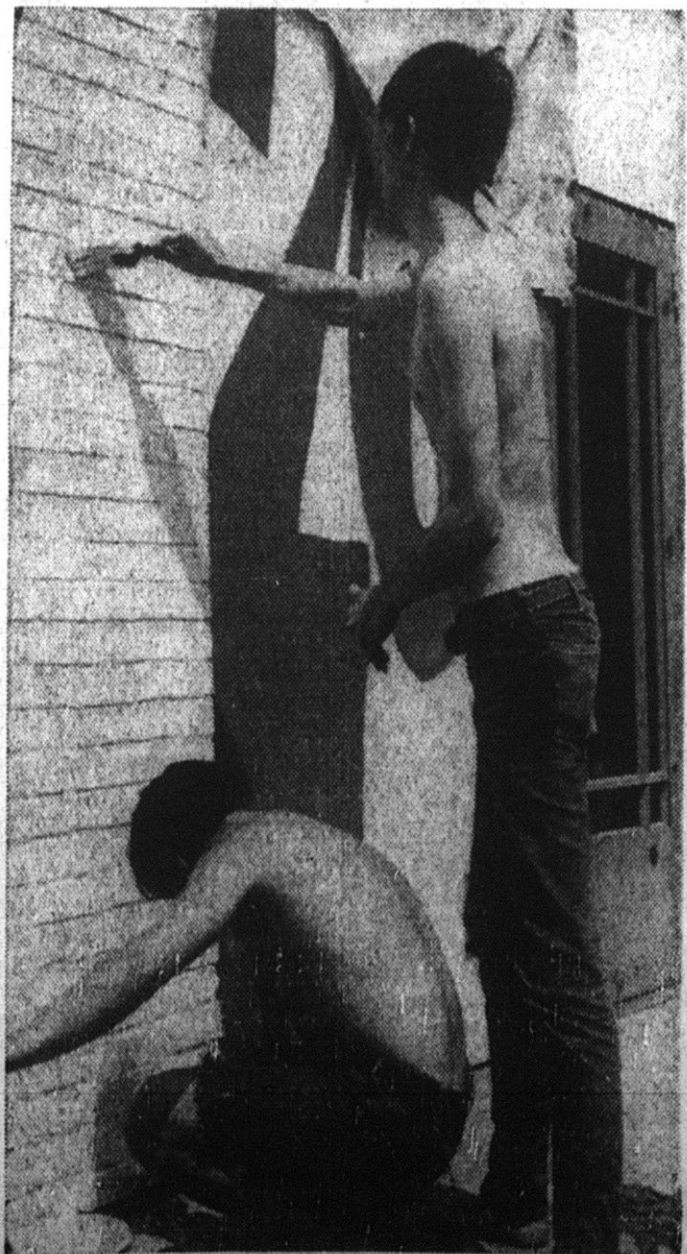

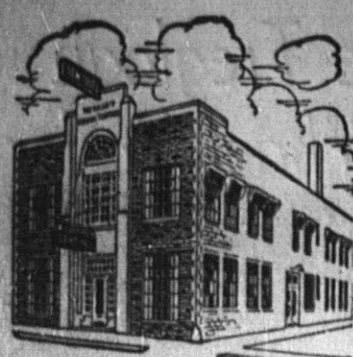

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, August 24, 1969  
God Gives the Promised Land.  
Joshua 1: 1-16; 1-2, 14-18  
By C. P. Dame

The Bible contains many of God's promises. God promised that he would give Canaan to the descendants of Abraham. The time had come for the Israelites to receive the land. But they had to work for it. God had a leader ready for the army that was ready to conquer.

I. God had prepared a leader. Moses the servant of the Lord died at the ripe old age of "a hundred and twenty years" and "his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated" at that time. Moses saw the Promised Land but was not permitted to enter into it.

Joshua was appointed to succeed Moses. He was trained. He had commanded Israel's army in the battle against the Amalekites. He was with Moses on the mountain. When twelve spies were selected to spy out the land he was one of them. And when ten of the spies brought in a bad report he with Caleb showed that he believed in the promises of God and urged the rebellious people to go forward. Joshua was born in Egypt, saw the miraculous deliverance from Egypt, experienced God's guidance and feeding of the nation and knew the mood of the people. The Bible says that he was "full of the spirit of wisdom."

II. The nation was ready to march. A new generation had come upon the scene. The generation that preferred the fleshpots of Egypt to freedom, the unbelievers and grumblers who 38 years before had accepted the poor report of the ten unbelieving spies had died. The leader and the nation were in full accord both believed that God would fulfill his promises. God had been with Moses, he would also be with Joshua. Three times God said, "Be strong and of good courage" to them and they heeded. When a church has strong, believing leaders great things happen.

III. God offers us choices. At the close of Joshua's life he called the nation together at Shechem, a place with sacred memories. Joshua told what God had done for them. No other nation had he treated like it. The veteran leader, called for a decision. Joshua mentions four choices from which they could choose—(1) the Babylonian gods their fathers had served beyond the river Euphrates, gods whom Abraham had forsaken; (2) the gods of the Egyptians; (3) the gods of the Amorites among whom they were living; (4) the true God who had delivered and led them. Joshua gave them a sterling example saying, "as for me and my house we will serve the Lord." What would happen to America if every father would say that?

Joshua was a man of courage and undivided loyalty to God. We need leaders like that today. The people responded and said that they would serve God and they did for we read in the Bible that "Israel served the Lord all the days of Joshua and all the days of the elders who outlived Joshua and had known all the works which the Lord did for Israel" (24:31).

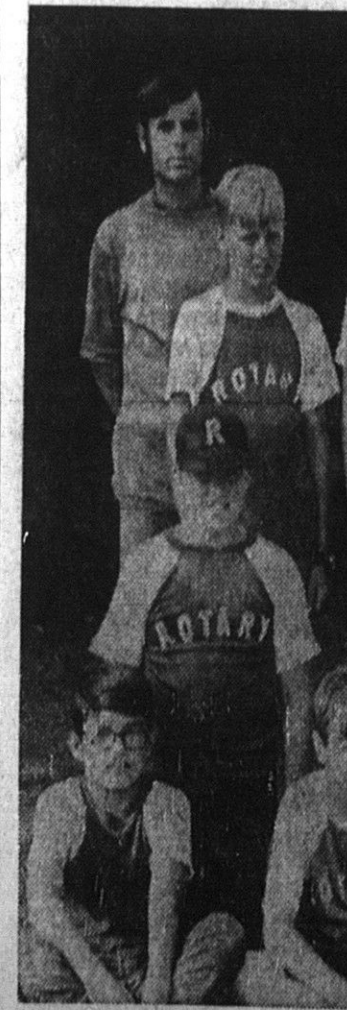
John Weeber smashed out a home run plus a single to lead the losers while Jim Drooger chipped in with two more hits for IXL.

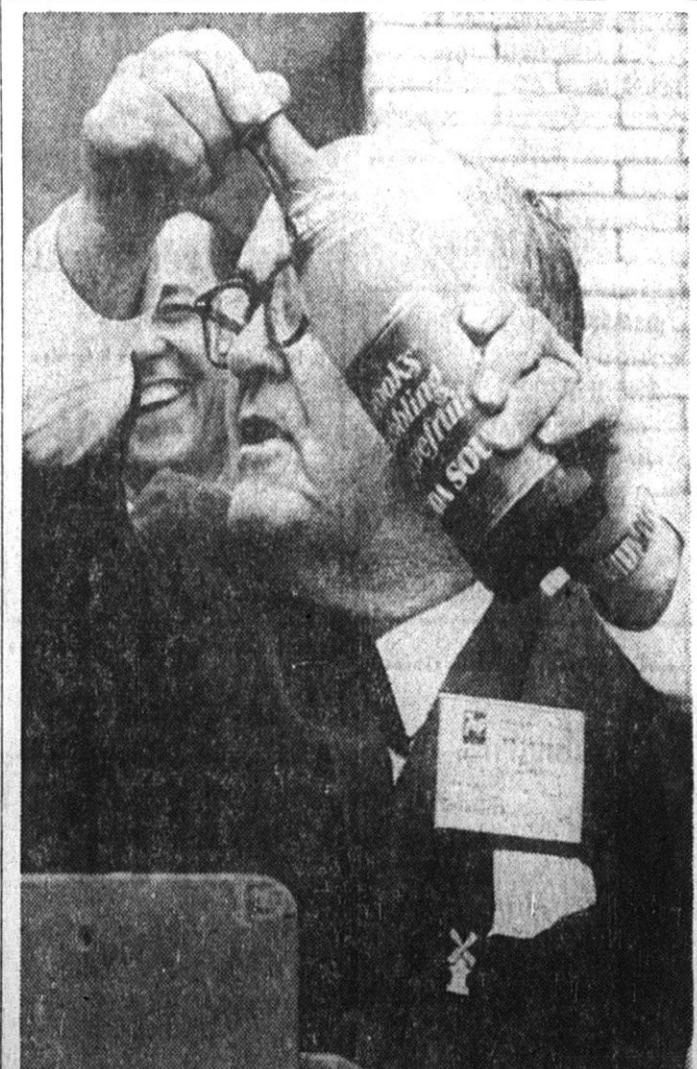

There are presently 57 camp sites vacant at the park.

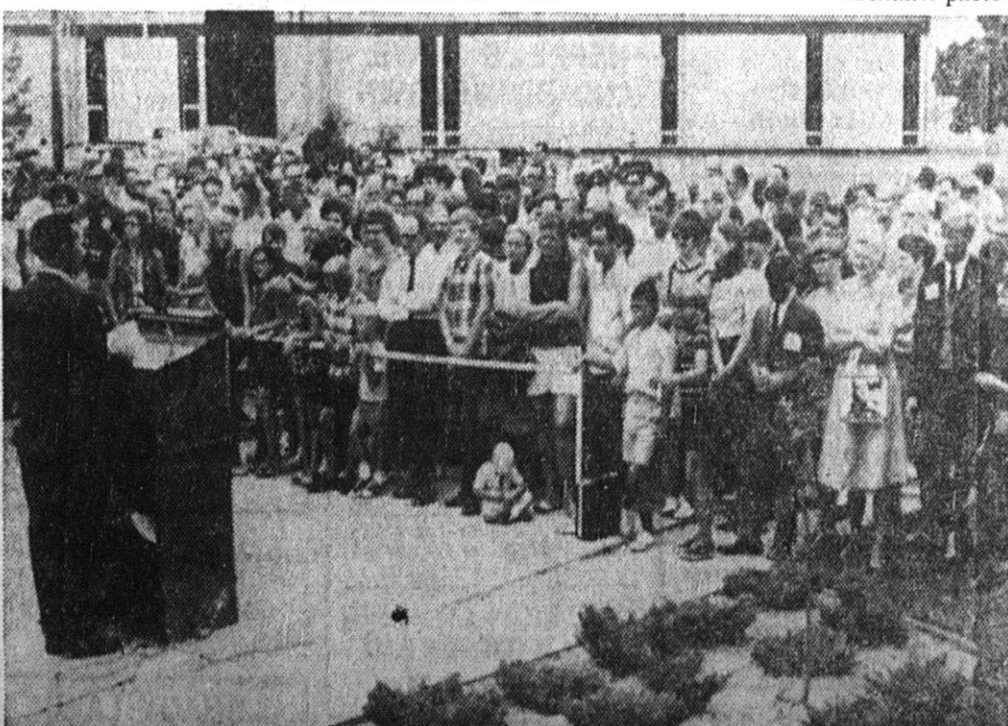

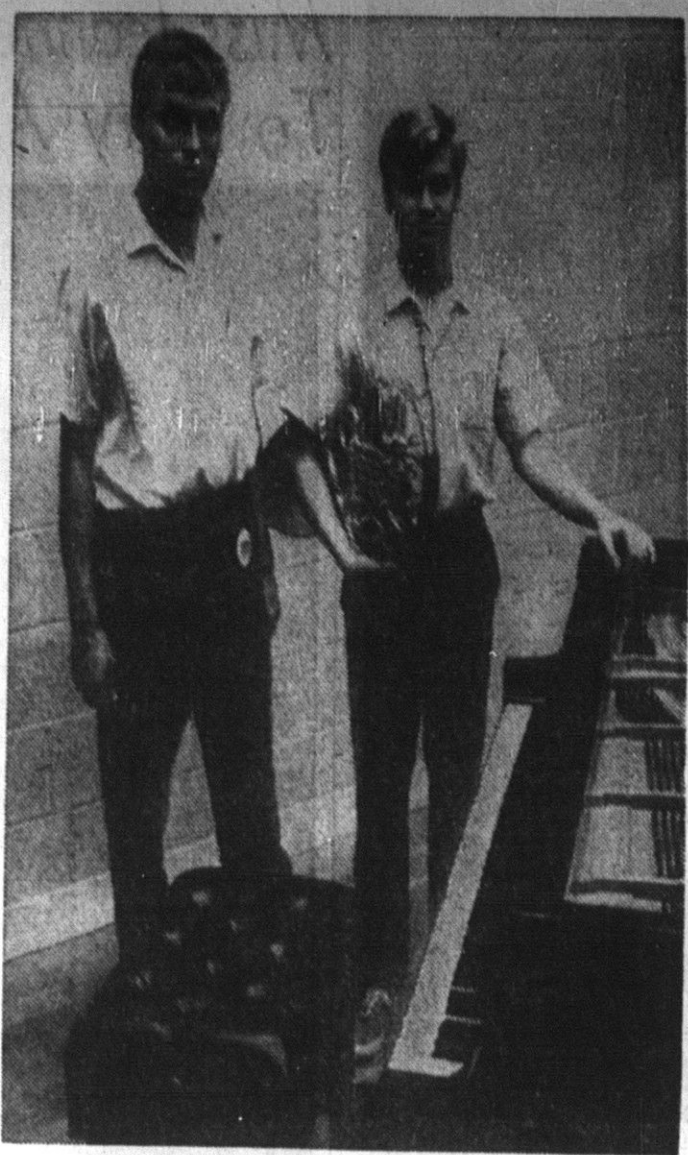

## Miss Beth Ann Campbell Is Allegan City Queen

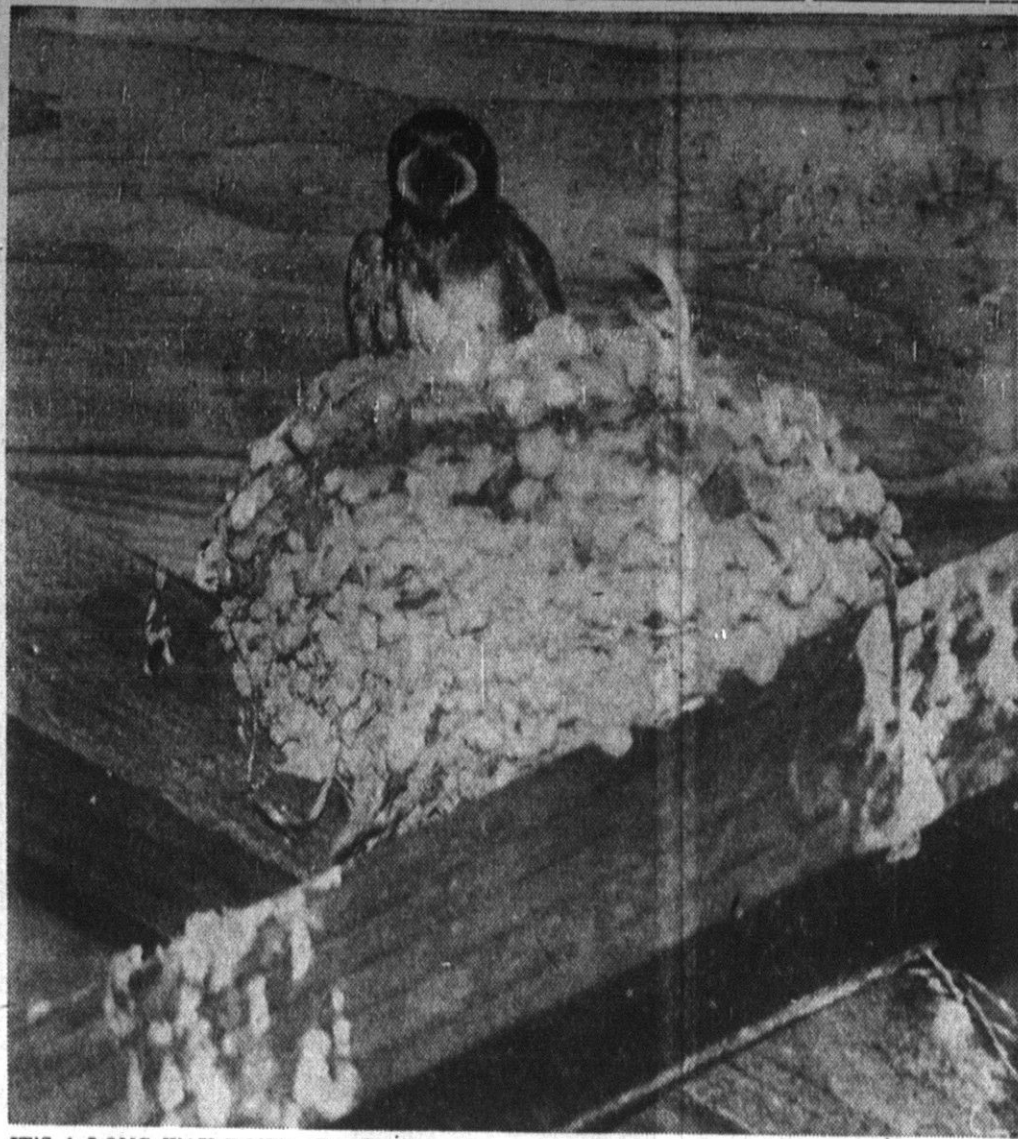

It also must be done in reverse so that when it is hung the glass will protect the painting in much the same way that a piece of glass is placed for protection in front of an oil done on canvas.

The work can be done on any type or shape glass. Oils are used for their thickness.

Woudstra draws the inspiration for his subjects from calendars, magazines and post cards. These he interprets freely to suit himself.

Once the subject is chosen he blocks out the major areas and allows these to dry overnight. Next he fills in the details and finishes by painting the sky over it all.

Dutch Hank had to give up his painting for a time when, as a naturalized citizen, he enlisted in the army and served in World War I.

He will never forget the time while in the service when he received a phonograph record—"Tell Mother I'll Be There"—from his mother, or the fact that he was once mistaken for another soldier named Henry Walters and presumed killed in action. He still carries a newspaper account of the incident.

The Holland VFW post is named after Henry Walters who was killed in action in World War I. Upon discharge from the army he resumed his painting work in Holland. He did painting jobs that required high climbing in those days, and many steeples in the Holland area were painted by Dutch Hank, one of which is the "Old Pillar" church.

During the time when he was doing painting for a living, he also tried his hand at canvas and board painting. These were also done in the Grandma Moses style, though he didn't confine himself to scenes and painted flowers, people, buildings and combinations of objects.

Woudstra retired from active painting at the age of 65, but after a year of retirement he went back to work as a painter for the Holland Public Schools where he stayed for six years.

In many of the boiler rooms of the schools are wall murals, made by Dutch Hank at the request of the building custodians. Many are of scenes around Holland, others of The Netherlands or of the school area itself.

He has two murals on the side of his own garage-like shed at home where he keeps the tools of his painting trade.

Many of the teachers in the Holland area have pictures which are gifts from Woudstra, who enjoys giving his work away even though he has sold some of it.

All the paintings in glass are marked with his initial cut into the glass with a diamond.

He has also done stage scenery painting for use in Holland High School where he sometimes assists his son Sydney, the

school's stage and property manager and custodian at the Junior High School.

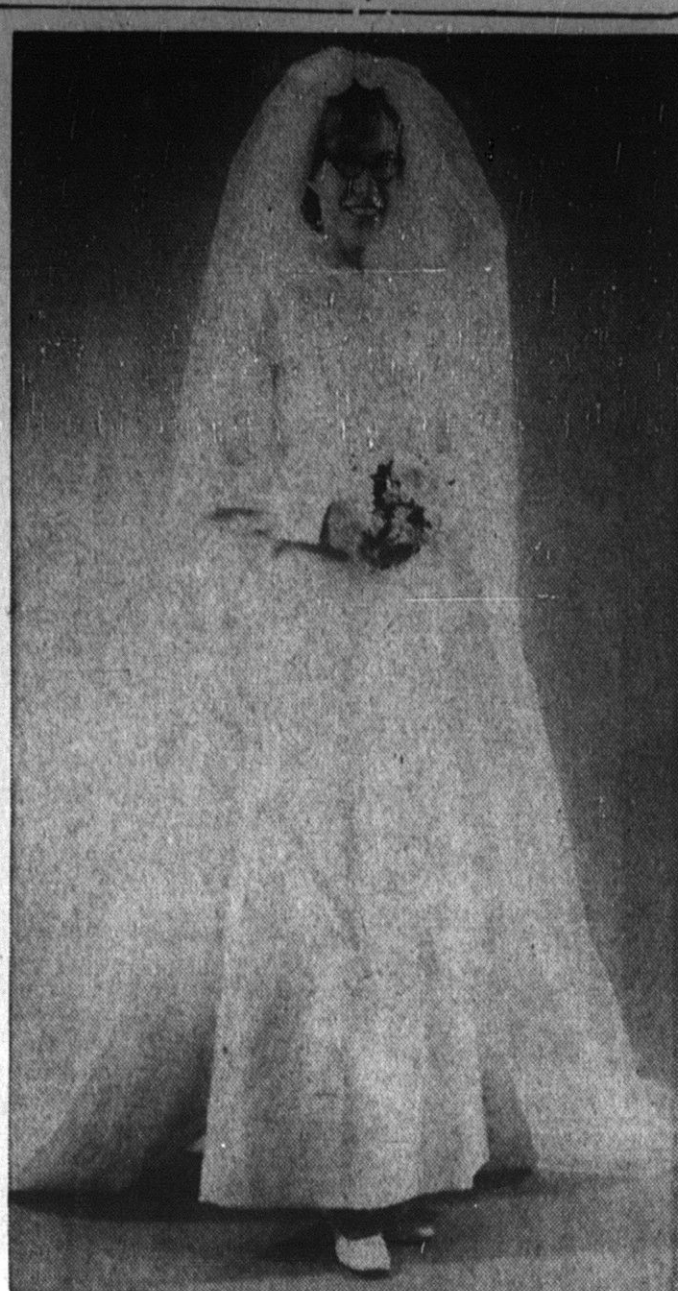
Woudstra, presently a patient at Holland City Hospital, carries on a unique art, one with few practitioners but one which serves as a further tie between Holland and The Netherlands.

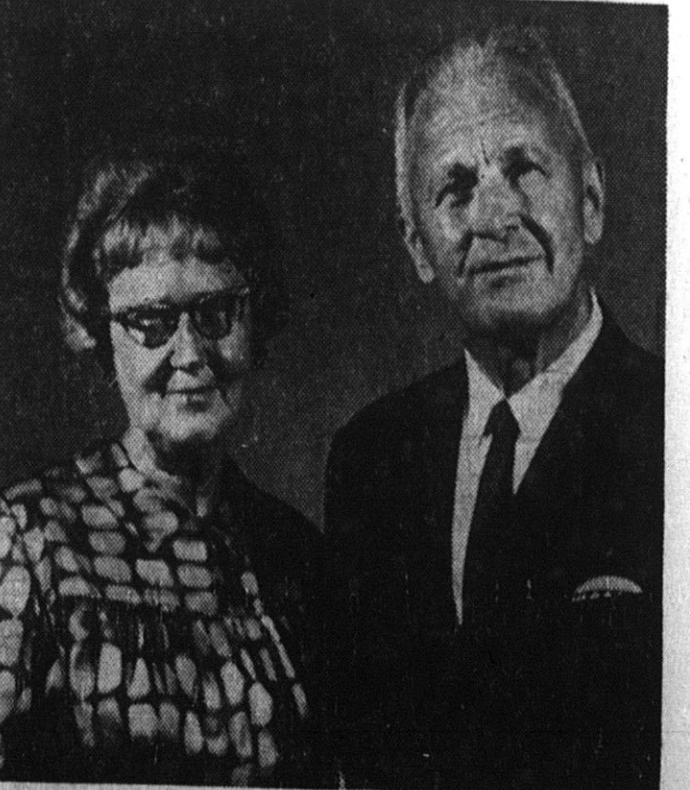

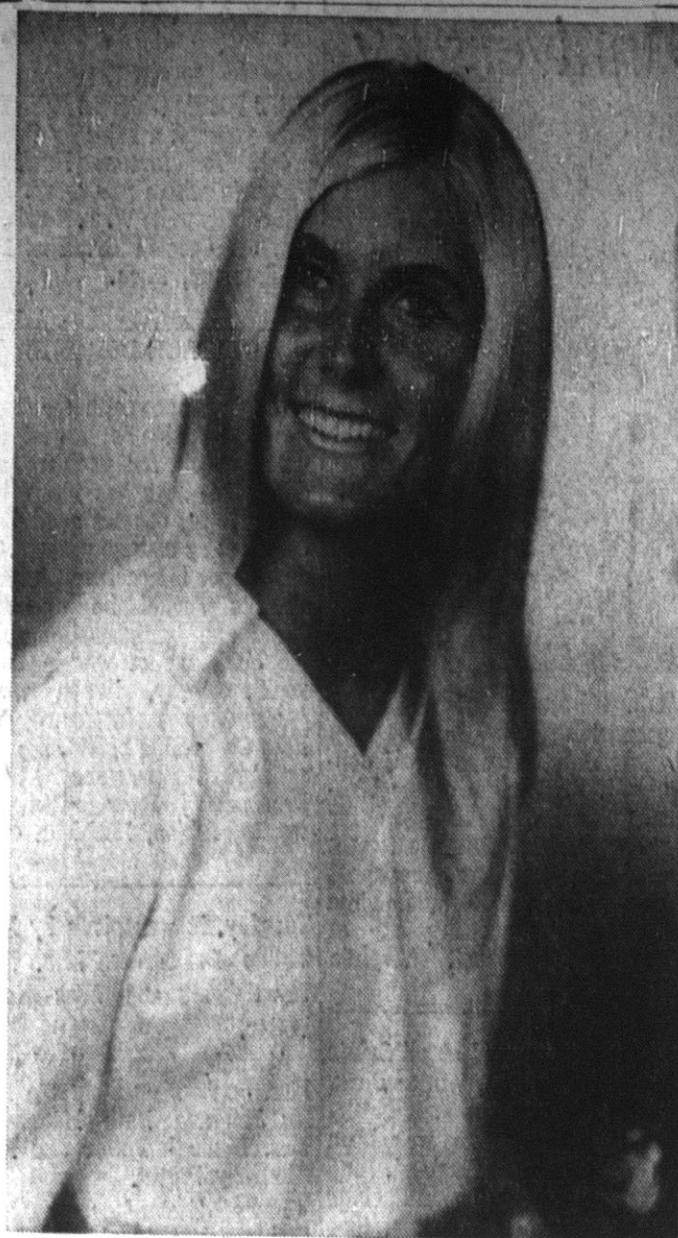

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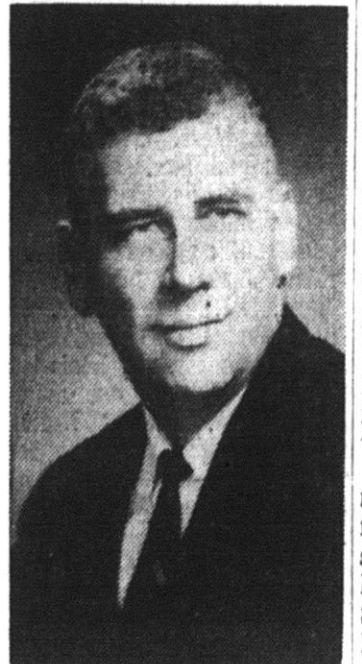
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## Holland Has New Juvenile Officer

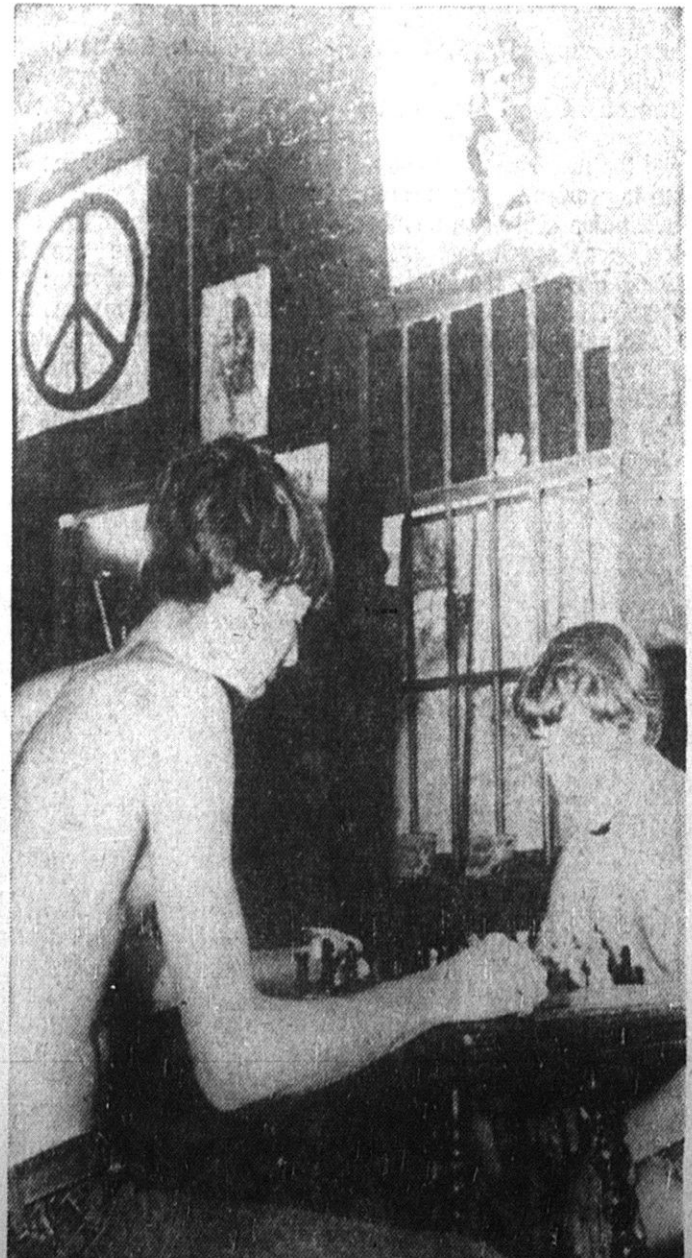
