LANSING — A temporary injunction issued Oct. 11 by Ingham Circuit Court restraining a Zeeland bank from operating a branch in Federal school district near Holland remained in effect today, following a hearing in the Lansing court Wednesday.

Circuit Judge Marvin J. Salmon dismissed First National Bank of Holland as one of the plaintiffs in the original suit in which First National Bank and Peoples State Bank of Holland sought to prevent operations of a branch bank of First Michigan Bank and Trust Co. of Zeeland. Judge Salmon ruled that the rights of a national bank should be tried in a separate suit.

No date was set for trial of the suit which concerns a question of whether or not Federal school district in Holland township should be considered a part of the city of Holland.

Named as defendants in the original suit were First Michigan Bank and Trust Co. of Zeeland, and the state banking commissioner, Charles Slay, who had authorized the branch.

Grand Haven Okays Three School Items

GRAND HAVEN — Three of the four school building projects proposed by the Board of Education of Grand Haven district were approved at a special bond election Tuesday, which attracted 4,372 voters.

Approved were a new junior high school, a new elementary school at Griffin St. and Robbins Rd. and a new school replacing the elementary school at Sixth and Franklin Sts. which was destroyed by fire last January.

The proposal which called for installation of a swimming pool as part of the new junior high building was defeated by 187 votes, the vote was 1,969 to 2,156.

The total "package" would have cost \$3,580,000 but with the defeat of the pool proposal the approved bond issue will now total \$3,430,000.

The Board of Education will hold a special meeting Thursday at 7:30 p.m. to canvass the vote and to make application for approval of a bond sale with the Municipal Finance Commission. Approval is expected in January and construction on part of the expansion program will probably start in early spring. Three of the proposals carried by 2-1 and 3-1 margins.

The largest project will be the erection of a \$2,000,000 junior high school building on a 30-acre site now under option on Griffin St. This carried 2,770 to 1,447.

Erection of a new midtown elementary building to replace the old Central school on South Sixth St., which was lost in a fire Jan. 28, was given the biggest majority, 3,160 to 1,054.

The other proposal was to spend \$1,150,000 for the erection of a new grade school on Robbins Rd., purchase of a factory building for technical purposes, remodel the high school and add several additions to rural schools. This project carried 3,037 to 1,149.

A similar expansion program presented to the voters last May was voted down by a similar margin. The inclusion of the swimming pool at the junior high school proved to be a controversial proposal. The district already has one large swimming pool at the high school erected in 1952.

Snow Removal Funds Paid Out

LANSING — Ottawa and Allegan counties are among 40 in Michigan's 83 counties which qualify for snow removal funds this year on the basis of last year's record snowfalls, according to State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie.

This year's fund totals nearly \$612,000 compared to \$594,000 last year. The fund is set aside from gas taxes and license plate fees to help defray cost of snow removal in counties which have heavy snowfalls.

Keweenaw county in the upper peninsula had the highest average snowfall last year — 162 inches, and Houghton county was second with 135 inches. Holland city had an official 137.5 inches last year, but the average for Ottawa county was 104 inches and for Allegan county 117 inches.

Distribution of the money is based on a complicated snowfall, mileage and snowfall contour formula, and Allegan county will receive the year's largest payment of \$46,259. Ottawa, fourth in line, will receive \$28,861. Muskegon with an average 119 inches will receive \$33,057 and Oceana with 120 inches will receive \$29,754. Kent with 72 inches will receive \$1,674.

Average snowfall for Michigan last winter was 72.5 inches compared with nearly 79 inches the previous winter and 55 inches in the winter of 1960-61. To qualify for funds, counties must have at least 70 inches of snow the previous winter. The lightest snowfall in Michigan last winter was 30 inches at several stations in the Detroit and Port Huron areas.

Largest snowfall in Michigan last year was 190 inches or nearly 17 feet at a station in Lapeer county. The largest in the lower peninsula was 150 inches at a station near Lake Michigan in Oceana county.

The resolution further stated that pollution had been going on for the past 30 years, without regard to law, rights property interests or welfare of the inhabitants of Allegan.

One Kalamazoo paper manufacturer, KVP, has already acknowledged receipt of the resolution, stating that it will be presented for discussion at a Dec. 6 board meeting.

Complaints from some north side residents regarding dangerous parking practices in the vicinity of a laundromat and grocery on Grand St. were also discussed at Monday night's council meeting.

Class of '14 Ready for Anniversary

The Holland High School graduating class of 1914 is planning a 50th anniversary celebration next year in connection with commencement exercises for the class of 1964, the Board of Education was informed Monday night.

Jacob Fris, a member of the class, invited the Board of Education to participate in the event and expressed the hope that all 45 living members of the class would be present. Simon D. Den Uyl was president of the class that year and it was the first class to graduate from the then new high school at 15th St. and Pine Ave.

It also was pointed out that Fris will have two grandchildren graduating from high school in 1964, one from Holland High and the other from West Ottawa.

Supt. Walter W. Scott announced that Gail Alderink has been certified as speech correctionist for the public schools. Miss Alderink has been working with 113 pupils. The speech correction program is reimbursed 100 per cent, either by the state or the county.

William Noyd, counselor at Junior High, informed the board that 1,008 parents visited the school in connection with parent-teacher conferences last week, representing 764 students or 75 per cent of the student body. Scott expressed some concern about the remaining 25 per cent, usually the group that could best benefit from such conferences. In some cases, teachers make their own plans to call on parents, sometimes in the homes.

Scott explained a communication from the Superintendent of Public Instruction calling attention to plans under consideration for asking the legislature to extend the compulsory school attendance age from 16 to 17 or until children graduate from high school. While Scott generally favored programs which would discourage dropouts, he added that if the age is extended the school system must do more to meet the needs of such children who find school difficult. In Holland the percentage of dropouts from kindergarten to 12th grade is 12½ to 15 per cent.

Arthur H. Seddon, in regard to the coming millage election Nov. 26, said many Holland people have been mistaking the board's discussions of "how to spend" the millage with the "need for" the millage. He said these are two separate and distinct questions, and added that perhaps the discussions of the "need for" millage did not receive enough emphasis. He pointed out that the board's vote Oct. 3 was unanimous on seeking 3 mills for 3 years even though this figure would restore only nominal services.

"Even though we've balanced the budget, the program is running at a steadily increasing educational deficit. The number of children is increasing. State aid and the local tax base are decreasing, and the net financial effect is equivalent to 8 or 9 mills which means that in order to operate the program at the level of 1961-62 would require 8 or 9 mills of special operating tax or a 30 per cent increase in expenditures over the current level. The 3-mill proposal will stop the continued erosion of the educational program but it only represents a 12 per cent increase in expenditures over current levels.

"Whenever you have a big difference between what you 'need' and what you can 'raise' (a 9 mill need and a 3 mill vote) you should expect lengthy discussion of 'how to spend' the millage. As I see it, such a discussion is essential to arriving at a public decision," Seddon said.

The board approved water School since a water line is being constructed in that locality on 48th St.

State Park Expansion to Get Priority

LANSING — Expansion of Holland state park will receive high priority in state park plans for consideration at the next session of the legislature, Rep. Riemer Van Til of Holland was assured today by State Conservation Department officials.

Ottawa Circuit Court last week removed a five-year-old legal obstacle when Judge Raymond L. Smith dismissed a complaint against the Conservation Department and the Ottawa County Road Commission by the West Michigan Park Association of Ottawa Beach.

Van Til, chairman of the House committee on state parks and public lands, points out that addition of new acreage will increase the present 43-acre park by about 50 per cent and will represent a substantial contribution to recreational facilities in the area. He added that a larger park will mean a sizeable boost to local economy.

The Holland park, one of the most popular in the state, has long been inadequate in meeting public demands.

Judge Smith's ruling Oct. 30 also provided that the lease agreement between the Ottawa County Road Commission and the Conservation Department may ensue.

Since the area in question had been designated as park purposes many years ago although little or no development had been done, the Road Commission claims the area some years ago for public purposes and entered into an agreement with the Conservation Commission. It covers that area east and north of the present state park and includes the huge sand dune.

West Ottawa didn't look like a winner early in the game as they fumbled their first play from scrimmage and the Cardinals recovered on West Ottawa's 23-yard line. Senior quarterback Curt Gardenour ran for a first down to the 13-yard line. Three more running plays and a five yard penalty brought up a fourth down seven situation for the losers and a Gardenour pass was intercepted by senior linebacker, Dave Underwood, to end the threat.

The Panthers then put on a display of offense that the fans have been waiting for all season, but until this time had not materialized. The Panthers surprised their opponents by using two split ends, the I formation and a man in motion, and marched right down the field 86 yards to score. West Ottawa controlled the ball seven minutes, used 16 plays and made five first downs in the drive. Dave Vizithum was the key man as he ran from the quarterback spot on runs of eight, 14, 19, and six as well as passing to Farabee for 11 yards, and Steve Piersma for 22. The final two yards was made by Jim Corwin, senior fullback. Steve Piersma kicked the extra point with Craig Van Dyke holding.

Orchard View bounced right back three plays later on a long 69-yard pass play from Gardenour to Ron Vander Molen. The Panthers had a missed assignment on their coverage and Vander Molen was all alone down the center of the field. Mitchell Six's attempted run for the extra point was short.

West Ottawa tried to help Orchard View on the next play as they passed it to an Orchard View player. The Cardinals could not capitalize on this opportunity, however, and were forced to punt. Neither team threatened seriously the rest of the second quarter.

Allegan Fair Plans Change

ALLEGAN — At their annual meeting Wednesday, officials of the 111-year-old Allegan county fair agreed that steps should be taken to increase the fair's appeal to teenagers and young adults.

No definite plans were made, but President James Snow indicated the possibility of establishing a special teen-age area — as a sort of "fair-within-a-fair" — would be studied.

Director James Pettapiece was named to head a committee to work on these plans and to confer with members of various county school boards to seek their aid in making the fair more valuable to the schools and more interesting for youngsters.

All directors whose terms expired this year were re-elected by acclamation. They were H.D. Tripp, John Axe, Clair McOmber, Pettapiece and James Chestnut.

At the dinner meeting of directors and advisory board members which followed the general meeting, all officers were re-elected for one-year terms.

The financial statement reported by Snow showed little change from the previous year's report. Admissions were down from 1962 by less than 900 — in spite of rain and cold weather. Admissions totaled \$63,856.50, with fees and other income bringing the year's gross to \$143,461.80 — a slight increase over 1962. Expenses for the year — including \$10,996 for depreciation — totaled \$147,313.47, for a net loss of \$4,851.67.

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VETERANS DAY, 1963

Anyone alive today who was four years old or over at the first Armistice Day in 1918 will never forget it. For the spontaneous rejoicing at the end of World War II in 1945 was as nothing compared to Nov. 11, 1918, or the "false armistice" a few days earlier.

And for those who have become voters in the last five years or more, the memory of World War II is little more than a blur. Even the Korean action in the early 1950's seems far removed and almost forgotten.

It is difficult for those who were a part of these last two wars to believe that this is the case, but time, which surely though unobserved removes us from the past, moves on. This makes it all the more necessary that the nation through national holidays remembers the sacrifices of those who gave so much that we might be and remain a free people.

On Armistice Day, now re-named Veterans Day, it is well that we pay tribute to all veterans past and present. But it is equally important that we disassociate the grateful memory of those who died from the monstrous institution of war which required their sacrifice. War does not settle who is right; it settles only who is left! If a third world war of thermo-nuclear dimensions is allowed to come, it isn't likely there will be enough survivors to allow any kind of recollection whatever.

One is reminded of the cartoon showing a group of young monkeys playing at putting on gas masks being admonished by the grandfather monkey with these ironic words: "Quit actin' like a couple of human beings!"

The price of freedom has always been eternal vigilance. This is true whether we view the enemy as being without or within. We have in the past and especially since the end of the Korean War sought to maintain a strong military force. We have been in Laos, the Congo, the Middle East, and Viet Nam. The men who even now are giving their lives in Viet Nam are doing so under a nation's conviction that its freedom is bound up with the freedom of these people far removed from our borders.

All this concern with the military has also brought a tremendous power into the hands of the military, a power which reaches into the life of every great corporation of the land. On at least two occasions former President Eisenhower has warned us to be careful lest this huge force be a barrier to freedom within our nation.

On this Veterans Day as we remember those who took part to preserve us as a nation, let us also heed the call to guard the freedom within our borders. We must do both to be faithful to our trust.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 17
The Power of a Dedicated Life
II Corinthians 2:14 to 3:6
By C. P. Dame

Some people grumble a lot and some people are thankful and show it. The Apostle Paul was a thankful man because he knew that Christ was winning people from paganism and he was confident that the cause of Christ would triumph. The person who sees the gospel making progress is bound to be thankful.

I. Preaching gets two results. Paul believed in preaching the gospel. It is the business of the church to spread the gospel. This is also the task of every Christian. The Bible teaches that some people will be saved and some will not be saved. The words "salvation" and "damnation" belong together.

The Bible says that people by nature are dead in trespasses and sins. Those who do not respond to the gospel remain dead spiritually—they remain under God's condemnation. By rejecting the gospel they harden their hearts and add to their guilt. Some people will be worse off because they heard the gospel and refused to accept it. On the other hand there are many who upon hearing the gospel accept it and find salvation and joy. In season and out of season Christians should make the gospel known.

II. God makes his workers sufficient. Paul was conscious of his task to preach. The work made him ask, "And who is sufficient for these things?" All who can say what Paul said when he confessed that "our sufficiency is of God"—they are able because they rely on God's help. In Paul's day there were people who corrupted the word of God by mixing up the truth with falsehoods and then proclaim it as the gospel. This is done today too. In the name of scholarship the virgin birth is denied, the atoning death of Christ is a legend and repentance and faith are not essential. Thus God's word is corrupted.

III. Every Christian is a letter of Christ. Paul said that the Christians in Corinth were his letters of recommendation. These Corinthians had been changed by the gospel of Christ which Paul preached. Every one of these Christians in Corinth was like a letter that anyone could read—they were superior to any letter written in ink.

Christian workers who win men, women, boys and girls to Christ are used of God to write the gospel in the hearts of people. Many people never open a Bible to read it but they do read the lives of Christian people and they note both their weak and strong points. Today the Christian Church needs many more people whose lives are letters known and read by all men.

Hope Wins Over Eastern Illinois

Dutch Notch 5th Straight In Last Game

Hope College's football team made the Mom and Dad's Day activities complete here Saturday as they defeated Eastern Illinois University, 15-6 in a game played on a dreary, rainy day before 2,800 fans in River-view Park.

It was Hope's fifth straight win this season and gave the Flying Dutchmen their first season over .500 in three years. Hope finished with a 5-4 record and sewed up a share of the MIAA championship last week.

A stout defense was the key to Hope's victory as the Flying Dutchmen were able to stop the Panthers when it counted.

Living up to its pre-game billing of a passing club, Eastern Illinois threw the football all over the field but wasn't able to convert any of the passes into touchdowns.

A total of 41 passes were thrown by Eastern quarterback Rod Butler and he completed 22 for a total of 181 yards. These statistics helped push the Panthers in front in yardage, 297-214.

Hope scored first with 1:17 left in the first half. Freshman Chuck Langeland cracked the middle for three yards to score two plays after Harlan Hyink had hit Bill Hultgren with a 43-yard pass to the Eastern nine. Steve Wessling converted.

The Flying Dutchmen scored their other touchdown with 2:38 left in the game on a one-yard end run by Chuck Veurink. His touchdown was set up on a pass interference penalty against the Panthers that put the ball on the Eastern two.

Hope's first touchdown came after an 80-yard, seven-play drive which started when the Panthers missed a field goal attempt. The Flying Dutchmen, with Wessling attempting, also missed a field goal in the first quarter after driving to the Eastern 11 from their own 44.

The second touchdown march took four plays and the penalty and began on the Eastern 46, three series after the Panthers had scored.

Jim Lynch cracked the middle for three yards to give Eastern its touchdown after an 11-play 74-yard drive, highlighted by four passes which totaled 39 yards.

On the attempt for the two points, Rog Kroodsmas, Zealand sophomore hit Lynch. He was quickly aided by Tom De Kuiper and Tom Cousineau and the trio drove Lynch back.

Defense, such as illustrated on the point after touchdown, pleased Hope coach Russ De Vette. "We played real good defense and hit real hard," De Vette said. "This comes with confidence and our kids have gotten this confidence in the last few games," the Hope coach added.

Hope stopped the Panthers on the five-yard line early in the second half and later in the period on the Hope 28. An intercepted pass by De Kuiper ruined another chance on the Eastern 42 and the final try was stopped on the Panthers' 46 when Hope went in for its second score.

The first half Eastern drive which ended with the field goal attempt moved to the 13 after starting on the Eastern 36. A Veurink fumble on the Eastern 21 early in the second quarter squelched a Hope drive that had started on the Hope 36.

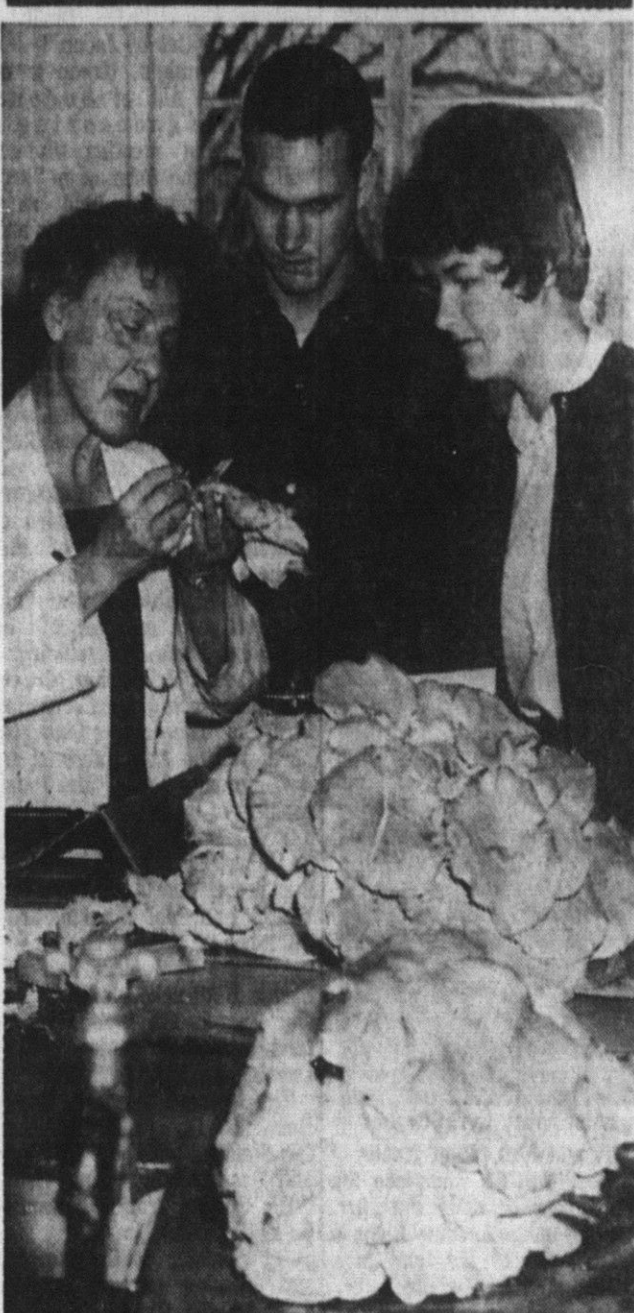

Huge Mushroom Clusters Found at Holland State Park

Mrs. Lou Haney, wife of the Holland State Park manager, brought several gigantic clusters of mushrooms into the Sentinel last week, which she had found on the beach area, hoping that someone here would be able to identify the mushrooms.

No one could, so she loaded all of them, except one, back into her car and took them home again. The other was taken to Prof. Eva Van Schaack of the Hope College botany department.

After experimentation, Dr. Van Schaack said the mushrooms probably were a variety of the "Pleurotus Ostreatus" species, or the oyster mushroom.

The mushrooms have a lavender-tint color spore, are edible, "but not very tasty," she said. This variety of mushrooms usually grows in clusters as these were found. Oyster mushrooms, however, are usually found in an open wooded area, growing on decayed wood. Unlike the pancake shape of those found in Holland State Park, oyster mushrooms are usually oyster-shaped, and the stems are shorter.

Dr. Van Schaack plans to send a specimen of the mushroom to a mycologist at the University of Michigan for further identification. The rest she will use in class work.

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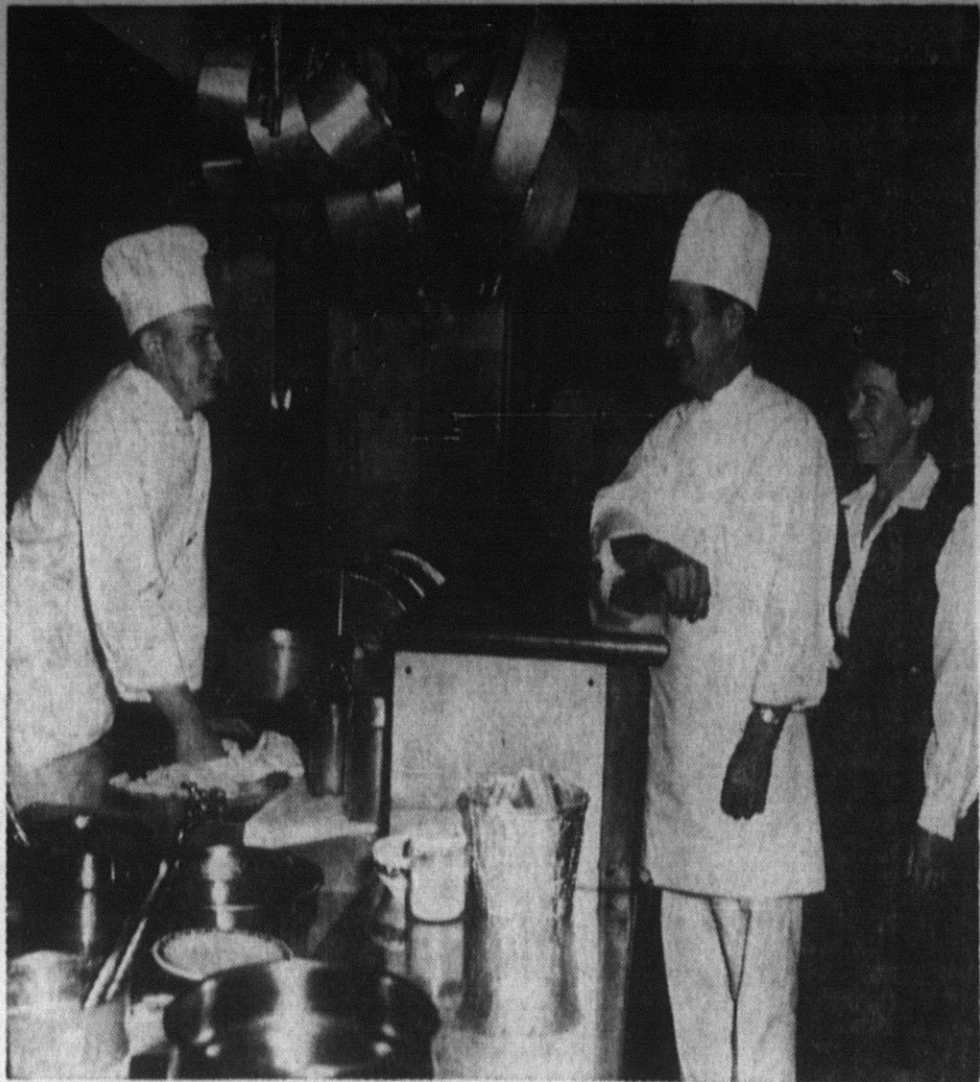

And like all chefs, his recipes for his famed wild rice with wild game, and for Roquefort cheese dressing, shall remain secret to all, except his replacement, O. T. Davis.

Barton and his wife will leave Monday for Florida where they will raise Black Angus steers. A farewell dinner is planned for them Thursday by the hotel.

Barton, who began training at the hotel when he was 16, has also specialized in preparing good prime ribs and steaks. He has always insisted that the hotel use the best qualities of meats, he said.

For Mrs. Barton, who was em-

ployed as catering manager and hostess of the Warm Friend dining room, retirement will mean a fulltime job as the chef at home. Barton may have been the chef at the hotel, but Mrs. Barton says she always prepares their one home dinner every Sunday.

Both have helped to prepare about 400 meals daily for the Warm Friend's dining room, Tavern Club, outside catering and three banquet rooms.

Barton still has menus dating back to 1936, listing four entrees; today the hotel prepares 13. Prices averaging \$1.25 then are today between \$3.50 to \$5.

He has also received a certificate from the American Hotels Corporation for "faithful employe in a unit of the American System."

In retrospect, Henning recognizes he got off to a slow start in meeting and understanding Americans, but he regards his year in America as rich in experience and expresses a particular thank-you to the D. Ivan Dykstra family with whom he lived, his American brothers, Brian and Darrell Dykstra, the high school principal Jay Forman and his counselor, Vern Kupelian as well as Rev. William Hillegonds, minister of the church he attended. "If I listed all my other friends in Holland, Mich., the list would never end," he wrote.

Michigan Nurse Week was celebrated last week. On the posters on display was a picture of three representatives of the nursing profession shown with Gov. Romney, Joann Clelland, a nurse at Holland Hospital, was among the three.

In the Volleys column of Oct. 19, we carried an appeal from Reginald Sharken of Petoskey for additional information about a Franklin Devereaux in the Civil War.

John Chisspell of 1091 Lakewood Blvd. came up with some answers. He informed the Netherlands Information Service that his grandfather enlisted in the Civil War and changed the spelling of his last name by adding an extra "s" because he was only 15 years old. He served in the same company as Franklin Devereaux, the 25th Michigan Volunteer Infantry, Co. 1. Apparently, Mr. Chisspell and Franklin Devereaux became fast friends.

Chisspell's mother was of French-Canadian and Indian stock and after the death of her husband, Henry, she married Franklin Devereaux, her son's army buddy.

In our mail was the copy of a letter from local 705 (AFL-CIO) to School Supt. Walter W. Scott expressing thanks to school authorities for aiding in furnishing tables and chairs for their annual banquet Oct. 26.

"Such cooperation, on short notice, from public officials is rare indeed, and is to be commended," the communication said.

The latest old newspaper to come our way is a copy of the Chicago Evening Journal (an extra) dated Oct. 9, 1871, on the great Chicago fire. It was a reprint (probably for souvenir purposes) of the great calamity of the age in which the great city of Chicago was reduced to ashes. It was found by Gord Emaus, 619 Hazelbank Rd.

Of small tabloid size with only three columns of type, the reproduction of the original story presumably was handed out by the Chicago Fire Cyclorama at a later date. The Cyclorama in which the fire was reproduced was completed at a cost of \$250,000 and was shown together with hourly lectures at a cost of 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

The story which was reproduced (dated 1 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 9, 1871) told how Chicago was burning at that moment and that an area nearly a mile in width and six or seven miles in length including all principal hotels, banks and public buildings, already had been destroyed.

The original story said the fire broke out on the corner of DeKoven and Twelfth Sts. about 9 p.m. The previous evening caused by a cow kicking over a lamp in a stable in which a woman was milking.

A story on the second page (ending 20 years of speculation of Mrs. O'Leary and her cow) stated that it wasn't Mrs. O'Leary at all, but another young lady who dropped the lamp when a mouse scampers out of the straw.

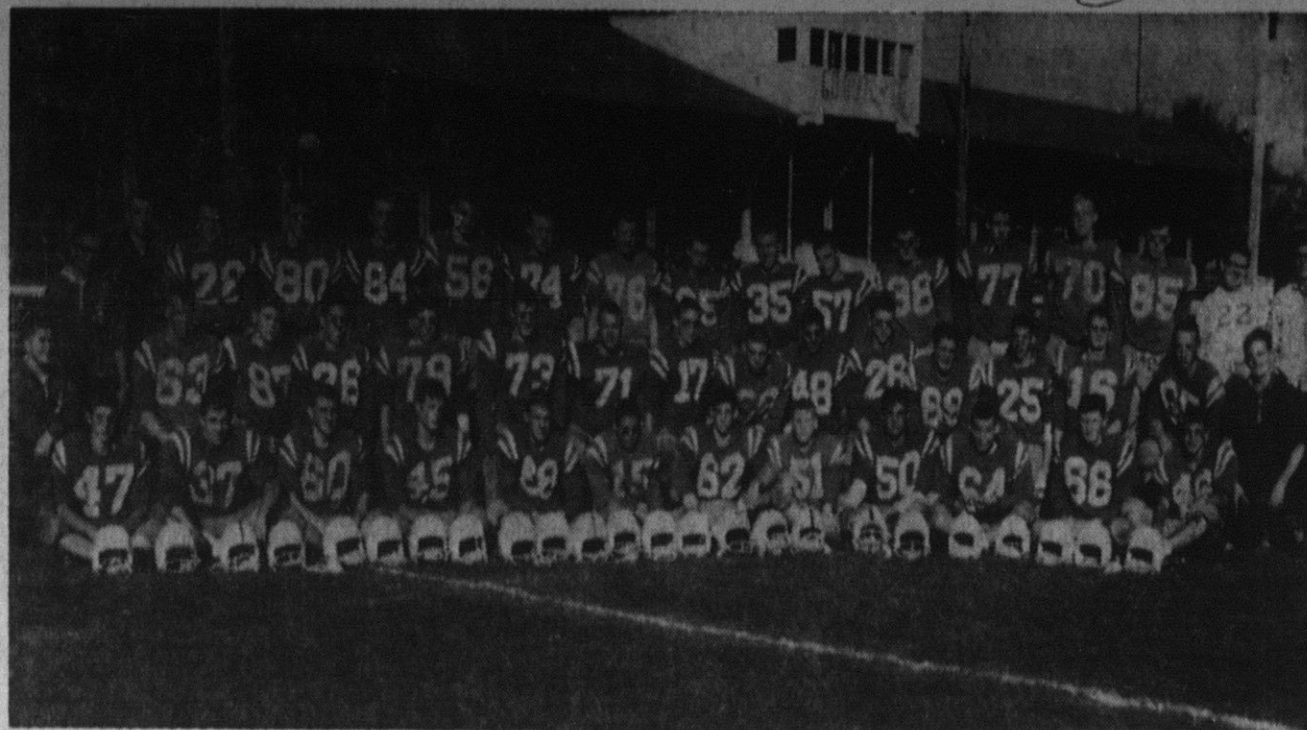

Hope College Alumnus Takes Over As President Nov. 16

A Hope College alumnus of 1937 has returned to his Alma Mater to become the eighth president of the 112 year-old institution.

Dr. Calvin A. VanderWerf will be inaugurated as Hope's president on Saturday, at ceremonies to be held at 2:30 p.m. in Dimment Memorial Chapel.

The 46-year-old president succeeds Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers who headed the Reformed Church college from 1945 until he retired last February.

Dr. VanderWerf assumed the duties of president at the 1600-student college last July after resigning from his position as professor of chemistry and chairman of the department at the University of Kansas, Lawrence. He had been affiliated with the University since 1941 when he joined the staff as instructor of chemistry.

In addition to his teaching and administrative work at the University of Kansas Dr. VanderWerf was co-author of two general chemistry textbooks and an organic chemistry laboratory manual.

As consulting editor in chemistry and biochemistry for the Reinhold Publishing Corporation, he pioneered in a new idea in chemical education: the publication of Reinhold's short texts, "Selected Topics in Modern Chemistry." Each text is designed to develop a single, fundamental concept in chemistry in thorough, uninterrupted fashion.

Together with his students he contributed more than one hundred papers to chemical literature. His research projects were in the fields of nitrogen compounds of petroleum, the organo-phosphorus compounds, the tranquilizing drugs, and the mechanisms of organic reactions.

Dr. VanderWerf has been a visiting scientist for the National Science Foundation. For

several years he was a lecturer on tv's Continental Classroom, and he has served as chairman of the Division of Chemical Education of the American Chemical Society.

A member of the Chemical Society of London, he is also affiliated with the honorary societies of Sigma Xi, Alpha Chi Sigma, Phi Lambda Upsilon, and Gamma Alpha.

He has supervised research projects sponsored by the Research Corporation; the Office of Naval Research; the Smith, Kline and French Laboratories, and the American Petroleum Institute.

To point up his inclusion among the top chemists of the United States, he was awarded on the Petroleum Research Fund's unsolicited and unrestricted \$50,000 grants for use in imaginative, basic research in 1961.

Three times, over a period of twenty years, Dr. VanderWerf was chosen, by alumni vote, one of the ten finest teachers on the University of Kansas faculty.

Since he has taken over the helm at Hope VanderWerf has become involved in a complete curriculum and calendar change. He has also turned over the first spade of dirt for a new greenhouse laboratory-the first building to be started under his administration.

His participation in student activities has won him a place in their hearts. This fall, along with the freshman class, he wore a green beanie signifying his newness to the campus community.

Last Halloween Dr. VanderWerf along with his wife, Rachel, and their six children donned a Chinese dragon costume and paraded through the college dining halls.

His office door is always open to students.

First Night Audience Warmly Receives Play

The Holland High Senior play, "The Mouse That Roared," opened Monday night in the Holland High Auditorium to an estimated audience of 400 who warmly received the two-act comedy written by Leonard Wibberly.

The entire cast handled themselves expertly including Betty Veenhoven, student director, who substituted for Cherie Oosterbaan due to illness.

The action shifts between a small, time-forgotten country in Europe called Grand Fenwick, Washington, D. C. and New York City which makes it a difficult play to stage. But the simplicity of the settings is very effective and allows the play to run smoothly.

The story concerns the Duchess of the "five mile long, three mile wide" Grand Fenwick, portrayed by Karen Swets and the financial problem of her duchy. After deliberation with the duchy's leaders played by Allen Croft and Bob Vrieling, it is conceded that the only way to get out of the financial fix is to declare war on the United States, lose the battle and accept American aid to war torn areas to rebuild their duchy and stabilize their economy. However, Glen Looman who plays the part of Tully Bascomb, a forest ranger and high constable, upsets the plan when he and his "14th century" army travels to America in a fishing boat, invades New York City in broad daylight with bows and arrows and takes a security officer and a nuclear physicist who has developed a new "Q" bomb as hostages back to Grand Fenwick. Meanwhile the president and secretary of state are unaware of what is happening thinking the declaration of war written on a scroll was a joke by newspaper reporters. However, the action is a humorous, clever series of events which leads to an unexpected but logical conclusion.

The audience was thoroughly delighted with Tim Dykstra in his role of Professor Kokintz, the nuclear physicist who has

developed this new peace weapon. He did an excellent job in bringing out the character of the nervous, excitable professor who was concerned not only with his discovery but also with his lunch. Jeff Hollenbach also did a good job employing English and Russian accents in his off-stage role of the radio announcer.

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School Board Presents Report on Millage Issue

The Board of Education Monday night presented reports on promoting a school millage issue at a special election Nov. 26 on raising an additional 3 mills for 3 years for special operations. The board had voted unanimously Oct. 3 to call the special election. Millage issues previously had been defeated on two occasions.

The additional funds would in large part reestablish the program of 1961-62 which had to be cut back because of insufficient funds, making necessary certain austerity measures now in the second year of operations.

The information sheets, which will be made available to PTAs and the public, cover all angles of the coming issue. Since all school elections involve equalized valuations, 3 mills on \$1,000 assessed valuation will be \$5.49, according to current ratios which may vary slightly from one year to another. A mill is one-tenth of 1 per cent or .001 which amounts to \$1 per \$1,000. Equalized valuation for Holland city

is 1.83 times assessed valuation.

The brochure points out that the average assessment for a home in Holland is about \$3,750. The tax increase for this home will amount to about \$20.59 per year, which figures out to less than 40 cents a week or 51½ cents a day. And every dollar a home owner pays in taxes is matched by a dollar in taxes paid by businesses and industries.

The board, in cooperation with the educational staff, has reviewed programs to determine what is needed to restore the school program to minimum standards.

In elementary schools, teachers will be added to keep average class enrollment below 30 pupils. At present more than 50 per cent of the children are in classes of 30 or more. Efforts will be made to improve library services in the 10 elementary schools, add two elementary music teachers, restore physical education and art. The allowance for instructional supplies and equipment

would be increased about 25 per cent. The place of a foreign language in elementary schools is now being reviewed by a language study committee.

To upgrade the instructional program in junior high school, the board proposes to engage two new science teachers, add two health and physical education teachers, two teachers in wood shop, metal shop and mechanical drawing, one teacher in social studies or English, and equip another science room, purchase additional supplies and equipment and install needed equipment in the boys gym in the west building.

In senior high school, the board proposes to strengthen the program by adding teachers to reduce overcrowded conditions that exist in certain subjects. This will also make it possible for students who qualify to take five subjects instead of four and will enable the entire teaching staff to meet better the individual needs of nearly 1,000 pupils in the three upper grades.

It is generally agreed that the entire matter of school personnel salaries should receive prompt and just action.

At Monday's meeting, a report was given of a meeting of the board with the salary and welfare committee of Holland MEA district listing two recommendations by the teachers group. One spelled out that the most important use of funds provided through successful passage would be the restoration of the school program. The second was that the board, after studying recommendations of each personnel group, determine a fair and equitable salary schedule, with increments within the means of the district and within range of competition for personnel.

Three mills on equalized valuation in Holland school district would produce approximately \$250,000 a year. The board has emphasized this amount would restore only minimum needs to a growing district now consisting of 10 elementary schools plus junior high and high school.
