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## City's Voting Percentage Hits 79.3

Although short of a record, Holland voters rolled up an impressive total in Tuesday's election, attracting 9,528 to the polls, or 79.3 per cent of the registered vote of 12,131.

The vote in the 1964 presidential year was 91.1 per cent, in 1962 81.8 per cent, in 1960 91.3 per cent and in 1958 77.2 per cent.

For the first time this year, the city had three additional counting boards to process a large absent voter response of over 450 votes. Two counting boards were set up for the Ottawa county portion of the city and one counting board for the two precincts in the fifth ward which lie in Allegan county.

Tuesday's ballot was not so long or complicated as the 1964 ballot which listed county offices as well as state educational boards for the first time. The Ottawa county chart listed some 65 entries in 1964 compared with 45 this year. County officers now serve four-year terms.

After this year, the governor and state officials also serve four years. Congressmen and House of Representatives members will continue to serve two-year terms.

The term of U.S. senator continues at six years. Terms of the various state educational boards run eight years. Terms of the justices of the supreme court also run eight years as will the term of the new circuit judge in the 20th judicial district. The term of the incumbent circuit judge runs six years.

## Union Aims Grievances

NEW YORK — Al Wassink, vice president of Holland Mich. Local 931, International Union of Electrical Workers, was in New York Tuesday where he presented a list of grievances to top General Electric officials.

The presentation of grievances was made behind closed doors Monday at the GE headquarters building. Local 931 represents some 625 workers at the GE plant in Holland.

The company said it would respond to the grievances next week.

Local 931 officials have contended that they could call a strike vote of the local membership if the union is not satisfied with the grievance procedure.

The company had objected that grieving over every wage rate accepted in a national contract constituted an attempt to reopen the national wage agreement.

Local 931 has not signed a local contract with the Holland plant.

## Hutchinson Wins Third House Term

FENNVILLE — Voters returned Republican incumbent Edward Hutchinson, 52, to his third straight U.S. House term

Hutchinson swamped John Martin, a farmer and distributor company owner from Hillsdale.

Hutchinson, now a member of the House Judiciary Committee, was formerly a state legislator from 1964 and 1960. Martin became active in politics in Colorado during the late John F. Kennedy's 1960 presidential campaign.

## New Slate Elected In Port Sheldon; Road Levy Downed

Port Sheldon township voters elected an entire new slate of officers and defeated a millage proposal in Tuesday's election.

Voters shunned a one-mill levy for two years by a vote of 162 to 136 yes. The money was to be used for road improvements.

The slate of Democratic candidates outpolled the Republican incumbents in Tuesday's close race.

Democrat Samuel Carini defeated Marion Van Slooten, 188 to 149, for office of township supervisor. Democrat Fred Van Slooten received 178 votes for the seat occupied by Trustee William T. Kempermen who polled 157 votes.

Two women narrowly outpolled their male, incumbent opponents. Joann Crawford defeated Lloyd Bakker, 174 to 162 for the office of clerk and Ann Meason downed Russell Any, 178 to 160, for the treasurer post.

Winning constable posts were David Ross and Gerald Greenwood who each received 173 votes. Ronald Jones, 172, and Leroy H. Francis Sr., 169 votes.

Also running for constable were Larry Van Slooten and Bruce Any who each received 168 votes. Lester Miles, 165 votes, and Daniel Meyers, 163 votes.

## Republican Incumbents Win Easily

Local State Senate and House incumbents, all of them Republicans, easily won reelection in Tuesday's general election.

State Senator Harold R. Volkema of Holland polled an unofficial 49,510 votes in the 23rd district. His Democratic opponent, Jay A. Wabeke of Eastmanville, received 18,980 votes.

In the 55th district, Rep. James Farnsworth received 18,965 votes to 6,020 for Harold Boone, Holland Democrat.

In the 95th district, Rep. Melvin De Stigter of Hudsonville had the largest plurality, polling 19,566 votes to 6,854 for Thomas L. Garzelloni, Spring Lake Democrat.

The 95th district lies wholly within Ottawa county.

In the 54th district, Rep. Edson Root received 14,317 votes to 6,939 for his opponent, Jules M. Serbinski, Paw Paw Democrat.

In the 23rd senate district, Ottawa county gave 27,025 to Volkema and 9,150 to Wabeke; Allegan gave 12,955 to Volkema and 4,622 to Wabeke; Barry (one township only) gave 220 votes to Volkema and 40 to Wabeke, and Van Buren gave 9,310 to Volkema and 4,686 to Wabeke.

In the 55th House district, Ottawa gave 7,902 votes to Farnsworth and 1,850 to Boone; Allegan gave 7,893 to Farnsworth and 2,798 to Boone, and Barry county gave 2,270 to Farnsworth and 1,372 to Boone.

In the 54th district, Allegan county gave 5,066 votes to Serbinski, 1,925, and Van Buren gave 9,251 to Root and 5,014 to Serbinski.

## Ottawa and Allegan Vote GOP 3 to 1

Both Ottawa and Allegan counties went overwhelmingly Republican in Tuesday's general election giving a 3 to 1 majority in each case.

Gov. George Romney led the ticket in both counties, winning an unofficial 29,283 votes in Ottawa to 7,811 votes for his Democratic opponent, Zolton Ferency. In Allegan, Romney polled 6,700 votes and Ferency 1,434. (See election charts, page 8.)

Next popular in both counties was U.S. Sen. Robert P. Griffin who received 28,359 in Ottawa and 6,451 in Allegan.

Secretary of State James M. Hare led the Democratic ticket, polling 11,575 in Ottawa and 2,300 in Allegan.

Ottawa county's vote in 1962 was a scant 2 to 1 Republican. In the Presidential race, it was considerably less, with Barry Goldwater receiving 24,512 to 20,070 for President Lyndon B. Johnson. Ottawa county was one of only three counties in the state that year to give Goldwater a plurality.

The proposition to lower the voting age to 18 lost in both counties, Ottawa voting 8,808 to 19,542, and Allegan 6,003 to 9,378.

The vote in Holland city followed a better than 3 to 1 Republican majority. In the city's 14 precincts and three counting districts Romney received 7,811 to 1,672 for Ferency; Griffin, 7,510, and Williams, 1,696; Volkema, 6,017, and Wabeke, 2,091; Farnsworth, 7,229, and Boone, 1,821; Miles, 4,962, and Ray, 3,269.

Totals in Allegan's 39 precincts follow: governor, Ferency, 4,549, and Romney, 16,389; secretary of state, Hare, 6,509, and Washington, 11,331; attorney general, Kelley, 5,778, and Lindemeyer, 11,859; U.S. senator, Williams, 4,862, and Griffin, 13,174; state senator, Wabeke, 4,622, and Volkema, 12,955; Rep. 55th district, Boone, 2,798, and Farnsworth, 7,893; Rep. 54th district, Serbinski, 1,925, and Root, 5,066; Cong. 4th district, Martin, 4,575, and Hutchinson, 13,220.

Gov. Romney carried every one of the 58 precincts and 3 counting boards in Ottawa county in Tuesday's election.

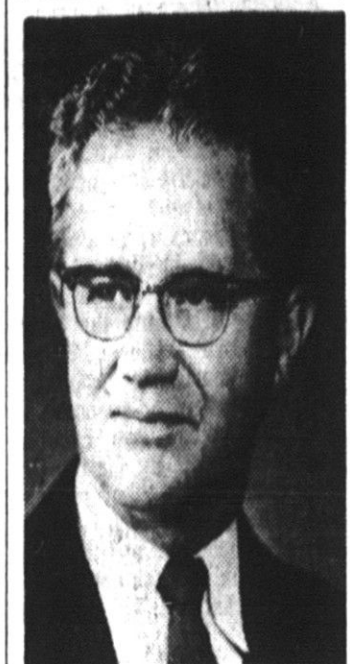

Hope College halfback Keith Abel posted the third highest single-season rushing total in modern MIAA history this fall, but wound up as runnerup according to final league statistics announced today.

The Hudsonville junior ran for 522 yards in 112 carries, but Albion freshman Jim Bell, a fullback, managed three more yards in 106 carries to take the title.

Both fell well short of the league record of 672 yards set by Marvin Raab of Adrian in 1955.

Only Hope individual titlist was quarterback Gary Frens who won easily in the punting department. Frens booted 22 times in conference games for an average of 40.6 yards per punt. Runnerup was Adrian's Jeff Seik with an average of 37.9 yards.

Frens' 96-yard punt against Olivet helped his average considerably, but he would have won the title without it. For his other 21 punts, the Fremont soph averaged 38.0 yards.

Only Hope player beside Abel in the top 15 rushers was senior fullback Charlie Langeland, who was fifth with 255 yards in 67 carries.

Bell won the scoring title with six touchdowns, tying for the lowest total to win the point race. Abel and Frens finished in three-way tie with Adrian's Pete Yelorda with 18 points apiece. Hope's Bill Keur, a 1966 graduate, won the scoring crown last fall with 48 points.

Rick Russell, Kalamazoo's quarterback, wound up tops in passing and in total offense. He passed for 609 yards (short of Harlan Hynek's 769 for Hope in 1963). Frens was fifth in passing with 243 yards while Hope's Clint Schilstra was sixth with 152 yards.

Russell's total offense figure was 572 yards (he lost 37 yards rushing for the season), while Abel's 522-yard mark was good for third behind Bell.

Langeland was Hope's top receiver with seven catches for 127 yards, while end Ray Cooper was 11th with two grabs for 85 yards.

Hope wound up second in pass defense, sixth in rushing defense, fourth in total defense, second in total offense, third in passing offense and second in rushing offense in team statistics.

Clifford Onthank of Holland, first aid chairman for the Ottawa county Red Cross chapter, announced today that first aid classes for both standard and advanced courses will begin Monday, Nov. 21, to run about nine weeks. ## Smithsonian Institution Comes Alive in Review

The Smithsonian Institution with its vast storehouses of treasures came alive in Herrick Public Library Wednesday afternoon when Mrs. Edward Donovan reviewed Leonard Carmichael's "James Smithsonian and the Smithsonian Institution."

Seldom has the intent of a person leaving a fund for the public good succeeded as has the case of the donor of the Smithsonian 200 years ago, Mrs. Donivan explained.

Punctuating her review with homey asides, many of them geared to human nature which hasn't changed much in 200 years, Mrs. Donivan traced the life of the famous Englishman James Smithsonian who at his death in 1829 in Genoa had converted all his properties to stocks and bonds and left his fortune to the United States of America. His will read that the legacy of half a million dollars would found an institution "to increase and diffuse knowledge among men."

Mrs. Donivan said Congress debated seven years before even accepting the gift in 1836 and then kicked the subject around another 10 years before creating the Smithsonian in 1846.

It was Joseph Henry, a physicist like Smithson, who was the first secretary of the new institution and he served for 32 years, setting up complex operation which not only covers the group of pinkish buildings on the mall in Washington, D. C., but takes in Washington's famous art galleries, libraries, the the Marine laboratories, the Canal Zone Biological Tropical Experiment Station, and the Washington Zoo. Also operated by the Smithsonian is the National Cultural Center, site of the new John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, now under construction on an 18-acre site on the Potomac not far from Lincoln Memorial.

Despite its complexities, science still remains the main subject at the Smithsonian, Mrs. Donivan said, and the newest addition also now under construction, is the Museum of History and Technology which will house all the artifacts of the space age. This new building will have classrooms for convenient briefings, something Mrs. Donivan said is dear to the heart of every school teacher who wants her students to learn as much as possible on such field trips.

Mrs. Donivan said the original gift of a half million dollars financed the cluster of pinkish buildings on the mall, but since then gifts, private endowments, grants and Congressional appropriations have built the institution into the greatest complex in the world.

One of the great boosts to the institution in 1876 was the gift

of 60 freight car loads of exhibits and other materials coming from the 1876 Centennial in Philadelphia. This posed a problem of storage and spawned plans for several new buildings. It was during the Eisenhower administration that a 13-acre site on the Potomac was given to the Smithsonian for a national cultural center. The \$31 million for the buildings was to come from the people.

Following the assassination of Kennedy, Congress in January, 1964, passed a new law naming the center after Kennedy and provided half of the money for the construction. It was the first time the American government became a paying member of the arts. When completed, this building designed by Edward Durrell Stone on an enlarged site will have three auditoriums for opera, symphony and ballet, and a foyer 600 feet long.

Italy has donated all the marble for the new complex at a cost of \$1½ million, Denmark is giving custom furniture for the foyer, Germany is giving two bronze doors, Ireland the chandelier in the Presidential room, Norway 12 chandeliers, and Japan the red and gold curtain for the main stage of the opera house, Mrs. Donivan said.

Maxine Robbert of the library staff displayed books on Washington available at the library and introduced Mrs. Donivan. Mrs. Gary W. Vreeman will be the reviewer in December.

### Newsweek Article By-Line Story by B. Van Voorst

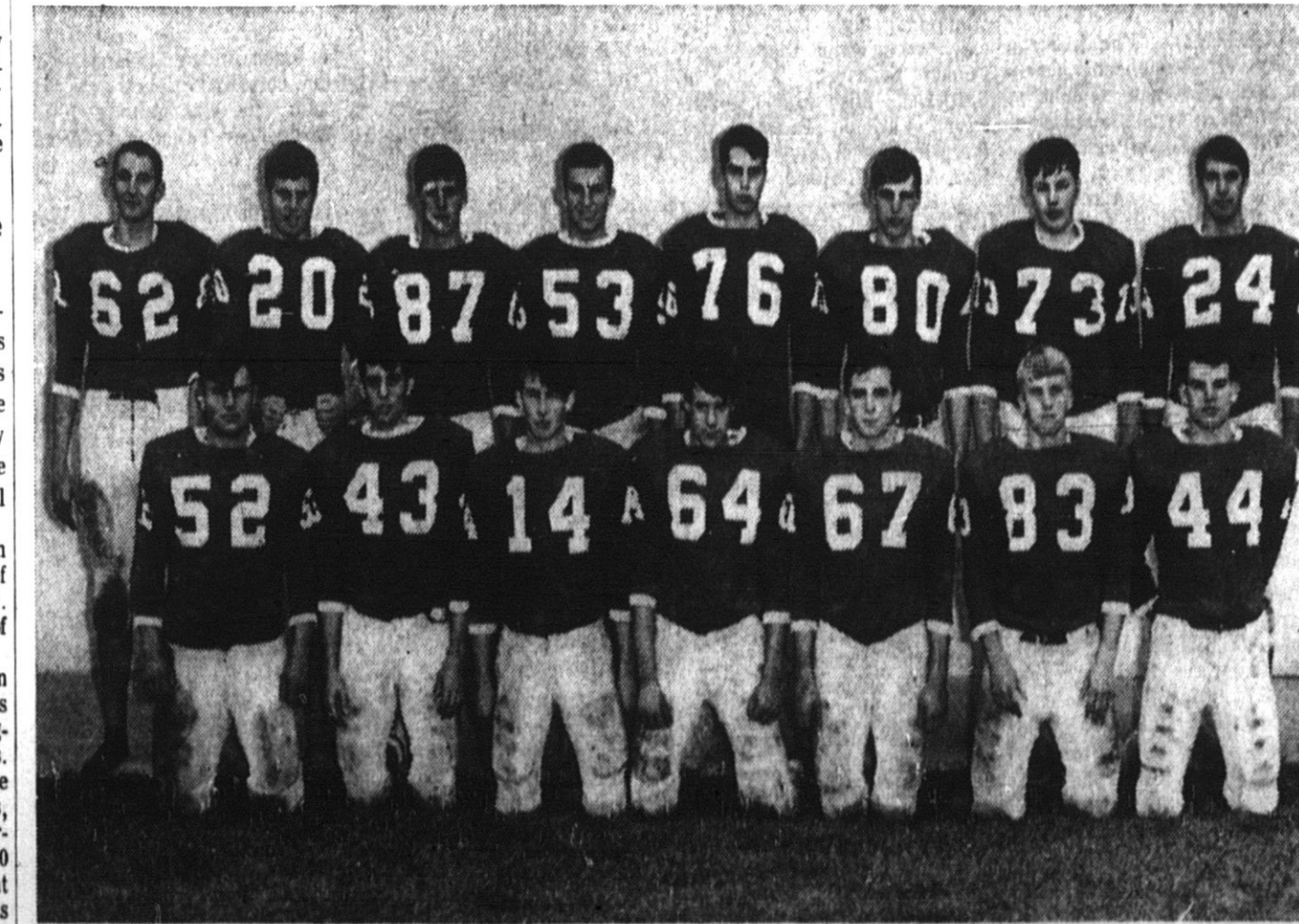

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 13  
God's Truth Cannot  
Be Destroyed  
Jeremiah 36, 20-28, 32  
By C. P. Dame

Today the Bible is criticized by some who are in the church and by others who are outside of the church. Both God and history assert that the Bible is indestructible. This truth we will keep in spite of many attacks.

I. God's Word is inspired. Jeremiah 36 tells about the origin of Jeremiah's prophecies in their written form. God told Jeremiah to take a scroll and write His words on it.

The prophet gave God's words to Baruch, his secretary, who wrote them down. Judah was at that time under the control of Egypt. However, in 605 B. C. Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, defeated the Egyptians at Carchemish and from then on Babylon became the dominant nation and a threat to Judah. Jeremiah saw ahead and said that Judah's only hope was to repent and turn to God for help.

God told Jeremiah to write all that he had told him with the hope that Judah might repent and receive pardon. Baruch wrote down the message and read it to the people "in the Lord's house upon the fast day"—and this took courage. A man named Micaiah heard the message and hurried to the palace and told the princes. By request Baruch read it to the princes who told the king who listened to Jehudi read it.

II. God's Word has been much attacked. The king had a closed mind. He did not give the prophet's message a fair hearing. "And it came to pass, when Jehudi had read three or four leaves, that the king cut it out with a penknife, and cast it in the brasier. And they were not afraid, nor rent their garments, neither the king, nor any of his servants that heard all these words. These hearers were hardened. When several asked the king not to burn the roll he paid no attention to their request. The king rejected God's warning words and eventually he and the nation suffered the consequences.

History shows that when the authority of the Scriptures is denied or questioned the church suffers from weakness. No wonder that the Presbyterian Lay Committee has as its first of five excellent objectives, "to put greater emphasis on the teaching of the Bible as the authoritative word of God in our seminaries and churches." This is necessary and important.

III. God's Word is indestructible. The king burned the roll and tried to capture and perhaps kill the prophet and his secretary but this he could not do for God hid both of them. God told the prophet to take another roll "and write in it all the former words that were in the first roll" which he did. Truth cannot be destroyed—God will take care of that.

Today there is much discussion about the inspiration of the Bible. Note — the theologians and preachers who question the creeds and the authority of the Bible say things which may get into the newspapers but they do not strengthen the faith of people. These new ideas about inspiration, which are taught in some of our Sunday Schools do not edify, they confuse and unsettle. Read the Bible! Meditate upon its truths! Arm yourself with its teachings!

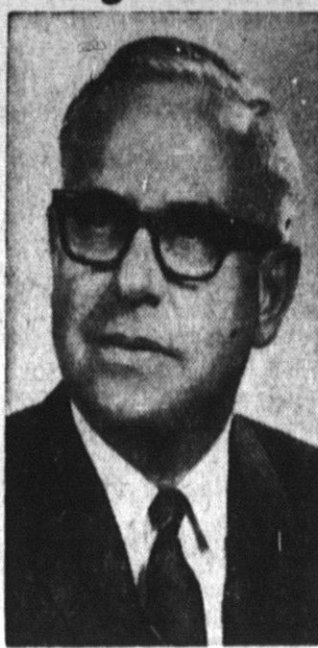

## Dutch Down Mona Shores In VCC Game

MUSKEGON — Holland High moved to within one victory of its finest football record in 37 years by stopping Mona Shores, 12-0, before a chilled gathering of less than 200 persons at suburban Sailor Field Friday night.

The Dutch were stymied by a slippery field and somewhat lackluster play in the first half and found themselves in a scoreless tie at the intermission before taking control of the game in the final two periods.

Quarterback Chip Millard and halfback Randy Rogers each scored a touchdown in the second half, but the slippery ball strayed wide of the goal posts on both of Rogers' extra point attempts. The misses were his fourth and fifth in 17 tries this season.

The win was the fifth against two narrow losses and last week's 7-7 tie with then-second-ranked Muskegon for coach Dave Kempker's Dutch. A Holland victory over Wyoming Godwin next Friday would produce a final 6-2-1 record—tops for Holland High since a 6-1-2 mark in 1929.

The Sailors, now 1-7 for the season, took advantage of the sloppy playing conditions to hold on to the halftime tie, but were clearly outmanned in the second half.

As Kempker put it after the game, "snow is the greatest equalizer." It was just a matter of time until the Dutch could score and Kempker felt the first touchdown was enough to wrap up the game.

Holland's offensive line and the running of Rogers and fullback Dave Dick were credited with giving the Dutch ball control in the second half. Holland ran 40 plays from scrimmage in the second half to 23 for Mona Shores.

The Dutch, perhaps a bit incensed at the 0-0 deadlock at halftime, held the Sailors on the first series of downs in the third quarter, then took over at the Mona Shores 48 and drove for the winning touchdown.

Millard, pretending to hold for Rogers' 24-yard field goal try, picked the ball up from the kicking tee and skirted his right end for five yards and the six points. The play was designed as a pass, but Millard found his receivers covered and barreled into the corner of the end zone for the score.

In the 13-play, 48-yard drive, Rogers and Millard each carried for 17 yards, and Dick for eight yards, while Millard hit Dick with a six-yard pass. The touchdown came on a fourth-down play with 4:46 left in the period.

The Dutch used up more than six minutes with their 12-play, 50-yard scoring drive in the final period. Rogers, Dick and Millard carried for all but four of the yards.

The score was set up by Dick's 17-yard burst in which he overpowered a pair of Sailor linebackers and moved to the Mona Shores 15-yard line. Rogers went around end to the 10 and Millard sneaked to the eight, before Millard threw over Randy Veenhoven in the end zone, bringing up a fourth and three situation.

Rogers then powered through right tackle for four yards and the first down, then, on an exact repeat of the previous play, moved the final four yards to score with 5:29 remaining in the game.

The Dutch put down any hopes of a comeback when Mark Slenk's punt from the 40-yard line struck a Mona Shores player at the 10 and bounded to the two where Tom Hermanson was stopped cold by Mark Bonnette. Six plays later, Veenhoven intercepted to give the Dutch possession in the final minute of play.

Dick wound up as the top rusher in the game with 88 yards in 16 carries (5.5 yards per try). Rogers added 74 yards in 19 attempts and Millard successfully utilized the yards in eight rushing efforts.

Hermanson was the top Mona Shores runner with 27 yards in quarterback keeper for 33 carries. His yardage total was hampered somewhat by his being thrown for a total of 16 yards in losses on three plays and being stopped for no gain three more times.

Holland linebacker Ron Brummel suffered a knee injury on the next to last play of the game. Although there was no immediate report on the injury, it is expected that he will miss Holland's final game—against Godwin at 7:45 p.m. in Riverview Park next Friday.

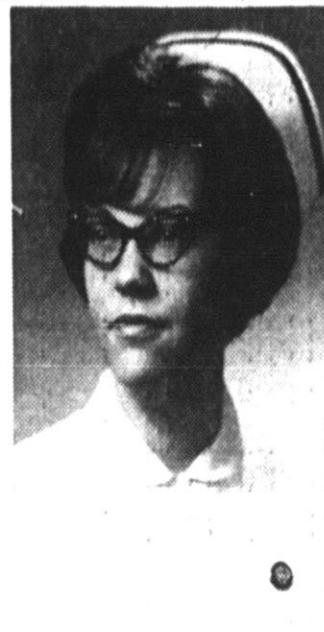

## 18-12 Victory Gives Eagles O-K Crown

HUDSONVILLE — One foot away from victory, the West Ottawa Panthers ended their football season losing 18-12 to the Hudsonville Eagles before 1,386 frigid spectators here Friday night.

The Panthers opened the scoring early in the first quarter and ended it in the final quarter with five minutes of play left. One foot from the end zone as the clock ran out, West Ottawa was unable to call the needed time out to utilize the final seconds of the game.

The losers met defeat in the air, as they have all season, for they completed only one pass to their opponents six, but they outrushed the winners 222 yards to 104 yards. One interception was the key to the game as Bruce Van Klompenberg tallied for Hudsonville on one of quarterback Dan Bauer's passes.

Bauer utilized his entire backfield to move the ball downfield, as the ball was too cold, wet and slippery for the Panthers to attempt a pass. Substantial gains by Greg Dalman, Jerry Klomprens and Steve Tucker placed the ball on the Hudsonville 15 in a second down situation.

Tucker took the ball around the right end to work his way into the end zone for a touchdown, despite being nearly forced out of bounds by the Eagles. The kick for the point after touchdown by Darryle Mitchell failed.

Ace quarterback Denny Kuiper put on a one man show for Hudsonville as he was the key figure in three consecutive first downs for the Eagles, making one on a quarterback sneak, completing a pass to Van Klompenberg for a second, and handing off to Van Klompenberg for the third.

Knocking on the Panthers' door for a touchdown, Kuiper tried three more quarterback sneaks in four plays, the last of which succeeded in scoring around the left end from the Panthers' three, Roger Vander Kuyil's kick for the point after touchdown failed, leaving a 6-8 deadlock to end the first period.

The Eagles opened the second period of play receiving a Pan-

ther punt, but relinquished the ball to the losers on the West Ottawa eight, after fumbling the ball and being penalized for holding.

Receiving a Panther punt, the winners began a drive with six minutes remaining in the half. Kuiper passed to Van Klompenberg, good for a 28 yard gain, bringing the ball to the West Ottawa four-yard line. On two quarterback sneaks, Kuiper brought the ball within one foot of the goal. Attempting to score on a quarterback keeper, he was thrown for a four-yard loss.

Bulldozing through the line, Van Klompenberg scored for the Eagles from the four. Vander Kuyil's kick for the extra point failed, giving Hudsonville a 12-6 advantage.

Playing on a modified ice-skating pond, the Panthers again began a strong drive, trying a host of different plays. Bauer passed to captain Dale Lubbers, bringing the ball to the Hudsonville 45. Tucker carried through the line for an eight-yard gain, and Klomprens went around the end for 11, putting the Panthers in a scoring position.

An incomplete pass to end Mark Steketee put the Panthers in a fourth down situation with 1:00 on the clock. Bauer this time tried a pass to Lubbers in the end zone, but the ball was knocked down by Tom Schweitzer of Hudsonville.

The third quarter was marked by big, unsuccessful drives by both teams. The Panthers and Eagles exchanged punts, penalties and plays, and maintained the 12-6 West Ottawa deficit.

Early in the fourth quarter, Hudsonville received a break when the Panthers were forced to punt on a fourth down with 37 yards to go. Kuiper moved the ball downfield on several successful calls before being forced to punt.

But the over-anxious Panthers tried a quick pass on their second play after receiving the punt, and Hudsonville's Van Klompenberg intercepted Bauer's pass and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. The extra point attempt was unsuccessful, giving the Eagles an 18-6 lead.

The Panthers were determined to overcome their opponents, as they staged a three-minute drive, sparked by Tucker, and concluding with a one-yard shove by Tucker who scored as the second man

through. Klomprens was stopped short on the extra point attempt.

Bauer utilized the final minutes of play well, giving Tucker and Klomprens who moved the ball to Hudsonville's 21 with 10 seconds of play remaining. Tucker then brought the ball down to the Hudsonville one, but left with no timeouts, West Ottawa watched the final seconds tick off the clock.

Hard-driving Tucker, a junior, again paced his pack of Panthers as he rushed 158 of the team's 222 yards rushing, bringing his season total to 983 yards, an average of 123 yards an encounter.

Also playing good ball for the Panthers were juniors Rod Ochsner and Jerry Klomprens. Ochsner broke up several Eagle passes and Klomprens played well offensively and defensively to aid his teammates.

Coach Ron Wetherbee's gridmen finished the season with a 2-4-2 record, while coach Jack Rabine's Eagles wound up unbeaten with a 7-0-1 mark.
