## Hope Tuition Up for New School Year

Tuition for the 1969-70 academic year at Hope College will be \$1,450 treasurer Clarence J. Handlogten announced Tuesday.

The tuition represents an annual increase of \$200 from the 1968-69 academic year. Room and board fees will remain at \$860.

"Inflation has come upon us in staggering proportions," Handlogten noted. "This fact coupled with our commitment to provide educational opportunity for our students equal to the best obtainable anywhere, has placed on us a financial demand that exceeds our present revenues."

The full tuition rate only pays about 80 per cent of the true cost of a Hope College education. Handlogten added. The balance is provided through gifts from alumni and friends of the college, grants and income from endowment.

The new tuition rate was voted by the college's Board of Trustees at its Fall meeting. The Board at the same time approved a substantial increase in aid to students eligible for assistance.

"We are determined that no student will be denied the superior education Hope College affords because of a lack of funds," Handlogten said.

Hope College has always ranked favorably with other liberal arts institutions in tuition, room and board costs. Hope has the lowest costs of any of the 12-member Great Lakes Colleges Association schools during the 1968-69 academic year.

Compared to Hope's \$2,100 costs for the 1968-69 academic year are Oberlin College \$3,080, Kenyon College \$3,000, Antioch College \$2,828, Earlham College, \$2,775, De Pauw University \$2,750, College of Wooster \$2,700, Ohio Wesleyan University \$2,600, Denison University \$2,550, Albion College \$2,600, Wabash College \$2,550 and Kalamazoo College \$2,340.

## Early Birds Hear Talk on Vehicle Check

A slide presentation on periodic vehicle inspection was shown at the monthly Chamber of Commerce Early Bird breakfast Tuesday in Hotel Warm by Mike LePere, executive vice president of the Inter-Industry Highway Safety Foundation of Michigan.

LePere pointed to a federal study in 1966 which recommended among other things inspections and the implied consent act. He said all safety engineers feel that periodic vehicle inspection is essential to a well rounded motor vehicle safety program.

The slide presentation was based on the inspection program in the state of Virginia, explaining specifics of the program, how garages are licensed for the \$1 service required every six months, statistics of fatalities, and the various steps covered in the inspection which usually takes 20 minutes and can be done during a lubrication or maintenance servicing period.

Motor vehicle inspection has been in effect in the state of Virginia for 35 years.

## Allegan Goes Republican Two to One

ALLEGAN — Allegan county voters in 37 precincts plus three counting boards voted the usual 2 to 1 Republican majority in Tuesday's election.

Sheriff Robert Whitcomb led the ticket with 16,086 votes with U. S. Rep. Edward Hutchinson (4th district) a close second with 16,036 votes.

In the Presidential race, Nixon polled 14,796; Humphrey, 7,302, and Wallace, 2,342.

State Sen. James Farnsworth (55th district) received 9,384 votes to 4,289 for his Democratic opponent, Glenn E. Mapes.

State Sen. Edson V. Root polled 6,142 to 2,813 for his Democratic opponent, Ed Nowacki.

Republicans seeking state educational offices received an almost straight 2 to 1 majority, and the county incumbents received a better than 2 to 1 majority, generally running 15,000 to 6,000.

On amendments, Allegan county voted: No. 1, (graduated income tax) 4,302 to 16,705; No. 2 (daylight savings time), 8027 to 14,291; No. 3 (pollution abatement), 13,329 to 10,966; No. 4 (recreational) 9,433 to 11,626; No. 5 (state officers seeking another office), 6,125 to 14,766.

In the supervisor race, Allegan elected three Democrats and 18 Republicans. One incumbent was defeated, Democrat Joseph Bartz unseated by Republican Robert Irwin in Allegan city, 373 to 354.

Democrats named were Harry Beach of Otsego township, Clem Rewa of Dorr township and Michael Dettlinger of Cheshire township.

Republicans (13 of them unopposed) are Frederick Edgerton, Plainwell; Edward Barton, Gunplain; John Boyer and Francis Cronen, Otsego City; Nick Leap, Martin and Watson; John Gurney, Wayland; Ralph Sysma, Wayland and Leighton townships; Oscar Zimmerman, Monterrey and Hopkins; Louis Ter Avest, Allegan township.

Other Republicans elected are Jerry Lohman, Heath, Valley and Manlius; Gerald Immink, Overisel and Salem; Gerald Van Noord, Holland city; Milton Timmerman (present chairman), Laketown and Fillmore; Philip Quade, Saugatuck; Robert E. Drew, Ganges and Clyde and Fennville city; Earl Osman, Casco and Lee.

Like Ottawa county, Allegan supervisors will cast "weighted votes" for the coming term, pending reapportionment.

## Ponstein Tops Van Wyke in Court Race

GRAND HAVEN — A recheck of Ottawa county votes Wednesday revealed that Municipal Judge Jacob Ponstein of Grand Haven was top man in the race for three district judges for the new 58th district which covers Ottawa county.

Ponstein polled an unofficial 21,370 votes to 20,883 for Gerald Van Wyke of Holland. Previously Van Wyke's total was listed at 22,883.

This gives Ponstein an eight-year term and Van Wyke a six-year term. The other winner, John Galien of Holland, received 20,008 votes and will serve a four-year term. A close fourth was George Lievense, Holland attorney, who received 17,471 votes in Ottawa county.

To these totals are added the two Holland city precincts lying in Allegan county, since all of Holland city is included in the new 58th district in Michigan.

Tabulating Tuesday's vote was a massive task for the county clerk's office and others covering the election. The counting boards for absentee ballots in Grand Haven and Spring Lake were slow in reporting returns. The Spring Lake board reported at 5 a.m. and the Grand Haven board at 8:30 a.m.

County Clerk Harris Nieuwsma was alone in his office from 4 to 8 a.m. He went home at 8:30 a.m. for a rest but was called back at 10 a.m. for business in Circuit Court.

## Holland Girl Wins 'Beat Francine' Contest at MSU

LANSING — Michigan State University girl watchers were surprised Thursday by the college version of the Wall Street bounce during a "Beat Francine" contest.

Some 1,000 students jammed a campus square to ogle buxomy coed contestants and were greeted instead by a pair of cows entered as a joke.

The cows were quickly disqualified and two young women — Cathy Depuydt, 19, Holland, and Gay Lynn, 21, Clarkston, — competed in the battle of the bust.

Miss Depuydt was awarded first prize when she stretched the tape to 43½. Miss Lynn measured 38½.

The contest, sponsored by the student newspaper, was inspired by Francine Gottfried, the buxom gal whose strolls to work along New York's Wall Street drew thousands of spectators.

## Ambulance Service End Seen

ALLEGAN — Owners of the Allegan Ambulance Service will discontinue operations Nov. 15 unless government units in the area which they serve can get together on a plan to subsidize the service.

Robert Hiscock, owner of the Allegan-based ambulance firm, said the decision to halt operations at midnight, Friday, Nov. 15, was made "with regrets."

He said he would keep the equipment for 30 days following the shut-down — against the possibility that agreements could be reached by cities and townships in his area — but would dispose of it after this waiting period.

The firm is currently serving the Otsego, Plainwell, Martin and Allegan areas.

Thus far only one contract has been signed by a governmental unit. Watson township having agreed to the subsidization plan some time ago.

The city of Allegan, plus Martin, Monterey and Valley townships have indicated they would go along with the plan if all other units in the area do so.

At the time Hiscock announced his decision to discontinue service Nov. 15 negotiations were still pending with Otsego city and township and the townships of Cheshire and Trowbridge.

The proposed agreement calls for a subsidy of 34 cents per capita per year.

The unit — by — unit approach was tried by the ambulance firm after the county board of supervisors refused to go along with a request for a county-wide subsidy presented by Hiscock at the August meeting of the board.

Under present conditions, Hiscock said, it is economically impossible to continue the service. He said he already has accumulated more than \$5,000 in uncollectable accounts. He emphasized that he had "every desire" to continue the service but added that the present situation left him no alternative.

## Parents Receive Son's Silver Star

Holland Marine Cpl. Daniel Michael Arizmendez who was killed while fighting in Vietnam on May 29, was awarded the Silver Star Medal posthumously.

The presentation was made to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Arizmendez of 160 Reed Ave., Wednesday.

The West Ottawa High School student was honored for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action" while on a search and destroy operation near Da Nang. He was mortally wounded while administering first aid to an injured Marine.

Arizmendez was serving as a fire team leader with Company B, First Battalion, Twenty-Sixth Marines, Third Marine Division in connection with the operation.

The citation reveals: "On May 29, Company B was conducting a search and destroy operation near Da Nang when the Marines suddenly came under a heavy volume of small arms and automatic weapons fire from a large North Vietnamese army force."

Arizmendez "maneuvered his men across the fire-swept terrain and aggressively led his fire team in an assault on the enemy, accounting for four hostile soldiers confirmed killed."

When his advancing platoon came under more automatic weapons fire, Arizmendez fearlessly moved to the North Vietnamese emplacement and

threw hand grenades into the hostile fortification, silencing the fire and allowing the Marines to continue their attack.

Arizmendez ignored enemy rounds and threw smoke grenades to screen his company's movements. He was mortally wounded when he went to assist in treating a wounded comrade.

Arizmendez had evacuated the casualty to a position of relative safety and was wounded while administering first aid to the injured Marine.

Arizmendez had enlisted with the Marine Corps on Nov. 18, 1965, and had been serving in his second tour of duty in Vietnam.

## Burglaries Solved With Five Arrests

GRAND HAVEN — Emanuel Ruiz, 24, Gary Davidson, 19, and Ernest Atwater, 19, all of Grand Rapids, waived examination in Grand Haven Municipal Court Wednesday on charges of breaking and entering, following a series of arrests by Ottawa sheriff's officers which cleared up several burglaries.

The three were released on their own recognizance to appear in Circuit Court Nov. 13.

Michael Atwater, 19, also of Grand Rapids, paid \$40 fine and \$150 costs after pleading guilty to receiving stolen goods.

A 16-year-old Tallmadge township youth was referred to Ottawa Probate Court on a burglary charge.

Sheriff's officers said the arrests solved burglaries at an implement company in Eastmanville, a tavern in Wright township, a service station and sporting goods shop in Marne and several break-ins in Grandville. Loot covered tires, tools, cigars, cigarettes, camp stoves, fishing equipment, meat, beer and \$12 in change, officers said.

## Republican Incumbents Reelected

GOP Plurality Was Better Than 2½-1 In Ottawa County

GRAND HAVEN — All Republican incumbents in Ottawa county were returned to office in Tuesday's general election which attracted the heaviest local vote in history. The Republican plurality in traditionally Republican Ottawa county was better than 2½ to 1. Total vote exceeded 49,000.

In the county's 61 precincts plus 10 counting boards for absentee ballots, Nivon received 33,356; Humphrey 12,259, and Wallace, 3,409. These succeeding figures differ slightly from totals on the county chart in today's Sentinel which lacks two counting districts for Grand Haven city and Spring Lake.

Final reports came in after 6 a.m. but the Sentinel closed shop at 4:30 a.m.

## Holland Man Is Killed In Two-Car Accident

A Holland man was killed and a Benton Harbor couple was injured Thursday in a two-car accident that occurred at 4:20 p.m. at Eighth St. and US-31.

Orlie Adrian Bishop, 72, of 522 North Shore Dr., one of the drivers, was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. Dr. Jerome Dykstra, medical examiner, said he received neck injuries.

The other driver, Marquis D. East, 55, of 375 Montezuma Rd., Benton Harbor, was admitted to Holland Hospital for treatment of multiple bruises and was reported in good condition today.

East's wife, Mary Lou, 35, was also reported in good condition at the hospital Friday. She is being treated for a fractured right ankle and rib fractures.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who are investigating said East was northbound on US-31 when Bishop, eastbound on Eighth St., allegedly ran a red light into the path of the East car.

The Bishop car was struck

broadside, deputies said, and the impact threw Bishop out of his car which rolled over him. The front end of the car driven by East was damaged. Impact on the right side of the Bishop car totally damaged it.

Firemen were called to the scene to wash down gasoline that had spilled from the vehicles.

Bishop's death is the 31st traffic fatality in Ottawa county this year.

Bishop had worked at The Holland Evening Sentinel as advertising manager for 36 years, retiring in June of 1966. He was a graduate of Albion College and was a veteran of World War I. He was a member of Hope Reformed Church.

Surviving are the wife, Gladys; two daughters, Mrs. Fred (Barbara) Miranda of Baltimore, Md., and Mrs. Frank (Marcia) Bronson of Holland; six grandchildren; his mother, Mrs. Louise Bishop of Hastings; three brothers, Lewis Bishop of Cass City, Richard Bishop of Hastings and Frederick Bishop of Traverse City; three sisters, Mrs. Alva Miller of Hastings, Mrs. Hilda Zerbel of Hastings and Miss Margaret Bishop of Hastings; one brother-in-law, Ralph Richardson of Nashville, Mich.

## Davenport Keeps Growing Carter Tells Rotarians

Davenport College, like most institutions of higher learning, has growing pains and it cannot keep pace with the demands of business and industry for qualified graduates.

This point was brought out for Holland Rotary Club members Thursday noon by Gene Carter, director of development for the two-year college in Grand Rapids.

"We do place hundreds of graduates in business positions every year," Carter said. "But there are hundreds more positions we cannot fill, and all indications are that this upward trend of the demand for young people of executive caliber will continue."

While it is best known as a business college offering two-year courses to equip students for immediate employment, Davenport is seeing more members of each graduating class go on to complete their four-year studies at colleges such as Ferris State and Central Michigan.

Enrollment at Davenport now totals nearly 1,400, including 500 night students. At the present rate of growth the total is expected to reach 2,000 in ten years. Carter said a financial aid program is available for students who have all the requirements for higher learning except money.

Carter said the corporate structure of Davenport College has been changed to a non-profit basis, and that student tuition is its only source of operating revenue. He said the college needs the support of business and industry if it is to continue its mission of service.

## Two Late Passes Head 13-6 Victory

Holland ran into a "spunky" bunch from Grandville here Friday night before a small crowd but managed to escape with a 13-6 football victory thanks to two fourth quarter touchdown passes by Max Glupker.

The win assured Holland of a tie for the VCC championship. Holland's first football championship in history.

Holland felt the absence of running back Gary Lound and Tom Riemersma as the Dutch dominated the first 18 minutes of play only to be held at the Bulldog 6, 21, and 14 yard lines on three consecutive drives.

The opportunities were made possible by three short punts by Mark Bishop which, in his defense, were hindered by a strong westerly wind.

Lacking the power running of Lound, Holland relied on the passing of Glupker but the Bulldog defense stopped the Dutch in these early clutch situations.

Grandville did not gain a first down until the 7:00 mark of the second quarter.

However, this first down sparked the Bulldogs to a 58-yard touchdown drive that required 13 plays with the score coming on a nine yard run by Bishop with 2:09 remaining in the half. The conversion failed and the Bulldogs led 6-0.

This was the score at half-time as Holland had let three golden opportunities slip through its grasp.

Grandville on the other hand had taken advantage of their only opportunity to score. The Bulldogs were led in the first half by John Way who gained 62 of Grandville's total of 88 yards.

The third quarter was played almost entirely in the middle of the field as neither team could mount any kind of a scoring threat.

On the second play of the final quarter Bishop went back to punt from the Holland 47. The snap from center sailed over his head and with 11:05 left in the game and a championship hanging in the balance Holland received the break they needed and the ball at the Grandville 25.

On first down Jim Leenhouts gained five yards but the next two plays failed to gain yardage and it appeared the Bulldogs would hold again.

But on fourth and five Glupker hit Fritz Steininger on a slant in pattern for 10 yards and a first down.

Three plays later on third and four from the Grandville 6 Glupker again hit Steininger for the tying touchdown.

With 8:48 showing on the clock Bernie Rosendahl's conversion would give the Dutch a 7-6 lead. Rosendahl never got a chance as the snap from center sailed over Paul Overbeek's head, and Holland looked like it might have to settle for a tie.

On the ensuing kick-off Grandville began a drive from their own 17 that carried to the Grandville 47. The Bulldogs made two first downs in the drive, both on fourth down plays, but were stopped on another fourth down attempt with 2:47 remaining.

Glupker attempted three straight passes that fell incomplete and on fourth and ten from the Grandville 47 Glupker passed to Larry Lamb on what assistant coach Ray Backus labeled a "throw and pray" pass.

The ball was knocked into the air by Terry McCarty of Grandville right into the waiting arms of Lamb who sprinted the final fifteen yards to Holland's first football championship in history.

The play closely resembled East Grand Rapids winning touchdown against Holland only last week.

Holland coach Dave Kempker remarked after the game, "I've seen four plays like that in 13 years and that's the first time it has been in our favor." Ah yes, another first!

Rosendahl converted follow-

ing the score and the Dutch led 13-6 with 2:17 left in the game. Upon receiving the kickoff Grandville was faced with a third and ten situation. Tom De Witt went back to pass and was hit viciously by Dave Gosselar causing a loose ball which was picked up by Way who fumbled and recovered only to be swarmed upon on his own six yard line, thwarting any Grandville hopes of playing the spoiler.

Kempker noted after the game, "It's good to be part of an outfit at a school like this that finally wins a football championship. This club has overcome a lot of things. I've never had so many injuries at one spot (running back). It's these kids that have played two years without much game action and stuck with us that helped us to our first championship."

On the game itself Kempker added, "Our defense did a good job, basically. We're just happy we won."

Kempker had noted earlier in the week, "our defense is going to have to do the job, no question about it." This was in obvious reference to the backfield problem the Dutch faced.

Holland finished the league schedule with a 5-1 record and are now 5-3 for the season.

The Dutch will conclude the season Friday at home when they entertain Godwin.

## Local Phone Base Area Will Be Enlarged

The Michigan Public Service Commission has authorized Michigan Bell Telephone Co. to enlarge the base rate area of its Holland exchange.

The company plans to add 2.6 square miles adjacent to the present base rate area, which will bring 24 customers into the flat rate calling area where urban telephone service will be available without mileage charges.

Because of the elimination or reduction of rural zone charges, a savings of \$3,669 annually will be realized by existing customers.

In the proposed base rate area addition, the elimination of rural zone charges will result in monthly savings of \$1.50 for 132 one-party business or residence customers, and \$1.25 for 79 two-party residence customers. There are 26 rural residence customers whose service will be upgraded to two-party flat rate service without any increase in basic rates. The monthly rate for rural residence and two-party flat rate residence service is the same in the Holland exchange.

In the outlying rural area, changes in rural zones reduce monthly rates for five customers; \$3 each for 2 one-party business customers, \$1.50 for 1 one-party residence customers and 75 cents each for 2 two-party residence customers.

The base rate area revision is effective immediately.

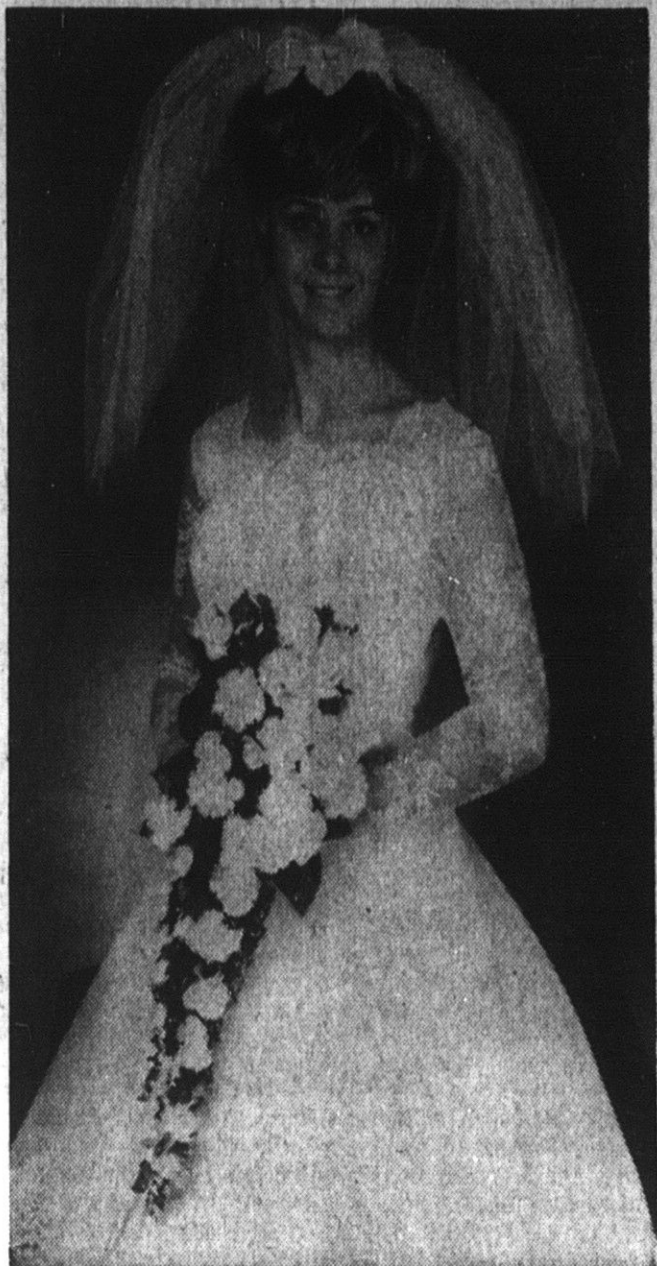

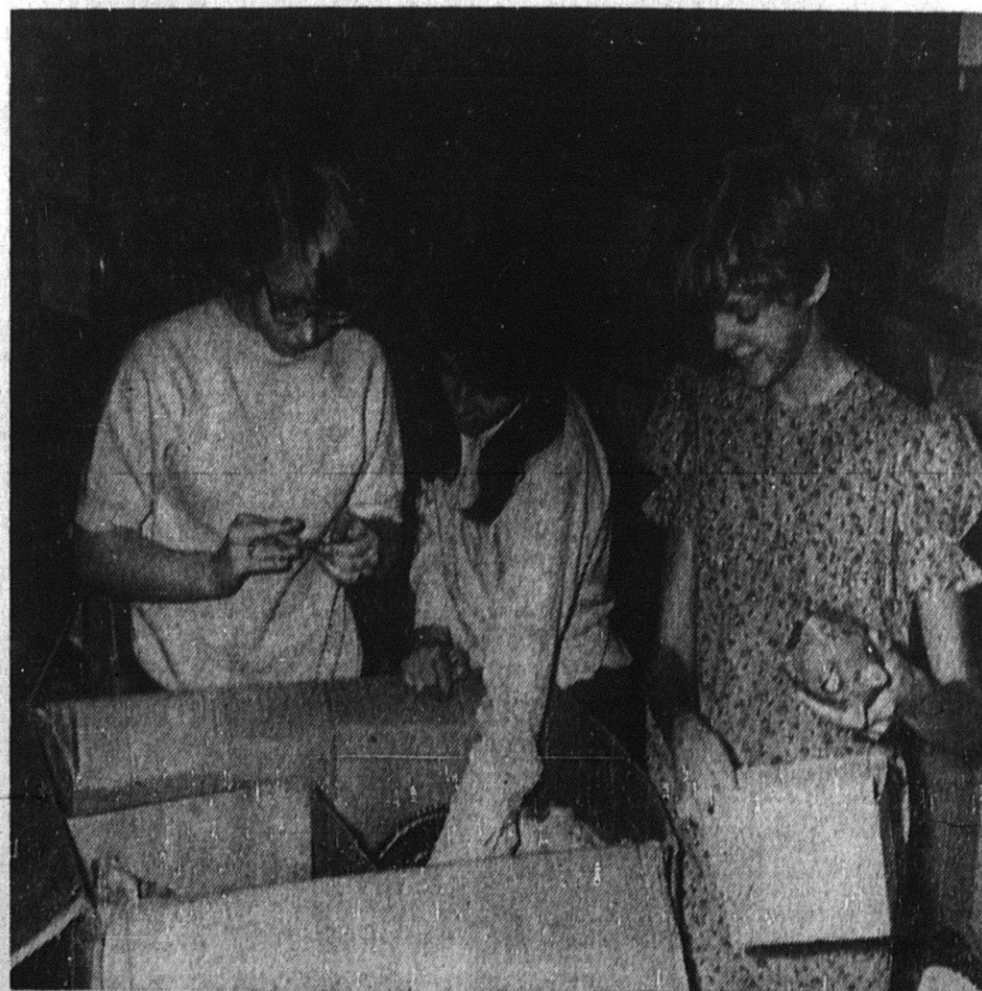

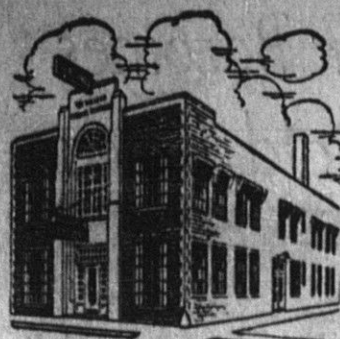

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## SCIENTIFIC TOY TEST

From New York comes word that a lie detector was used to assess children's reactions to a toy expected to be "big" in the Christmas market. Less Scientific methods just do not suffice, it seems, when a firm is deciding whether to invest heavily in producing and marketing a new plaything with a hefty price tag.

In the instance cited above, groups of children ranging from four to nine were shown a filmed program which included a commercial for the toy in question. Each one held a device for recording their likes and dislikes, while the other hand was plugged into gadgets for measuring involuntary responses—in short, what is commonly called a lie detector.

But the likes-and-dislikes record and the lie detector were not all. In addition, the studio was bugged and secretly televised so that observers could watch the children and hear their comments.

From it all emerged a corporate decision to go all-out with a certain new space toy which executives feel sure will be "among the top half dozen toys of the year." Probably their elaborate means of undergirding this view can be justified, considering the cost factors involved. All the same, it is vaguely disquieting to think that even kids' reactions to toys are subjected to the cold eye of science.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 10  
Christians, Live Expectantly  
II Peter 1:3-11; 3:9-11

By C. P. Dame  
In this series there is but one lesson from II Peter. The two epistles of Peter are called, "Epistles of Hope." Both were written to the converts scattered throughout Asia Minor. II Peter was written about 67 A. D. Its main theme is knowledge — spiritual wisdom. The converts to whom this epistle was sent were troubled by false teachers. We too are plagued by false teachers and so Peter's warnings are for us also. The call to live expectantly is timely.

I. God has bestowed divine resources upon Christians. God gives newness of life through the Holy Spirit and gives the means whereby believers can nurture this life. God's "precious and very great promises" nurture the new life. By the knowledge of these promises, by claiming them, by thinking about them and understanding them, Christians become more Christlike and escape "the corruption that is in the world through lust." The Lord's promises have a threefold purpose—they reveal an ideal, they kindle an ambition and they inspire hope. They indeed are precious!

II. God expects believers to grow. Two words note — the word "add" and the word "diligence." In the "Ladder of Virtue" Peter mentions faith first. No one can be a Christian without faith which is a gift of God and which expresses itself in good works.

After faith comes virtue, that is moral courage, which we much need in this day of moral decline. Knowledge comes next, that is spiritual wisdom, the understanding needed to live the Christian life, and then temperance, that is self-control, and then patience, the ability to endure trials and troubles. Godliness is a reverential feeling in regard to God comes next, and then brotherly kindness, that is affection for fellow Christians.

The absence and neglect of these virtues tend to spiritual blindness and shortsightedness which indicates that the cleansing from old sins has been forgotten. On the other hand growing Christians are active and energetic and bear fruit. Christians may either increase knowledge or lose it, they may either be sure or unsure of their salvation; therefore the call to "give diligence to make your calling and election sure" is always in order. Let us not be so busy about the temporal that we forget the eternal!

III. The Lord will return. We do not know when. In the days of Peter some were looking then for his return while some scoffed. God has a way of reckoning time that differs from us. The Lord's delay in coming again is purposeful, for it gives unbelievers an opportunity to repent. The Lord is not willing that "any should perish but that all should come to repentance." The possibility to perish is real.

The Lord will suddenly come. He will come with judgment. In the Bible fire stands for purification. This earth will be renovated, cleansed, and then there will be a new earth in which righteousness will dwell. Sin and evil are temporary. In view of the Lord's return what are we to do? Read the following please! "Seeing that ye look for these things, give diligence that ye may be found in peace, without spot and blame."

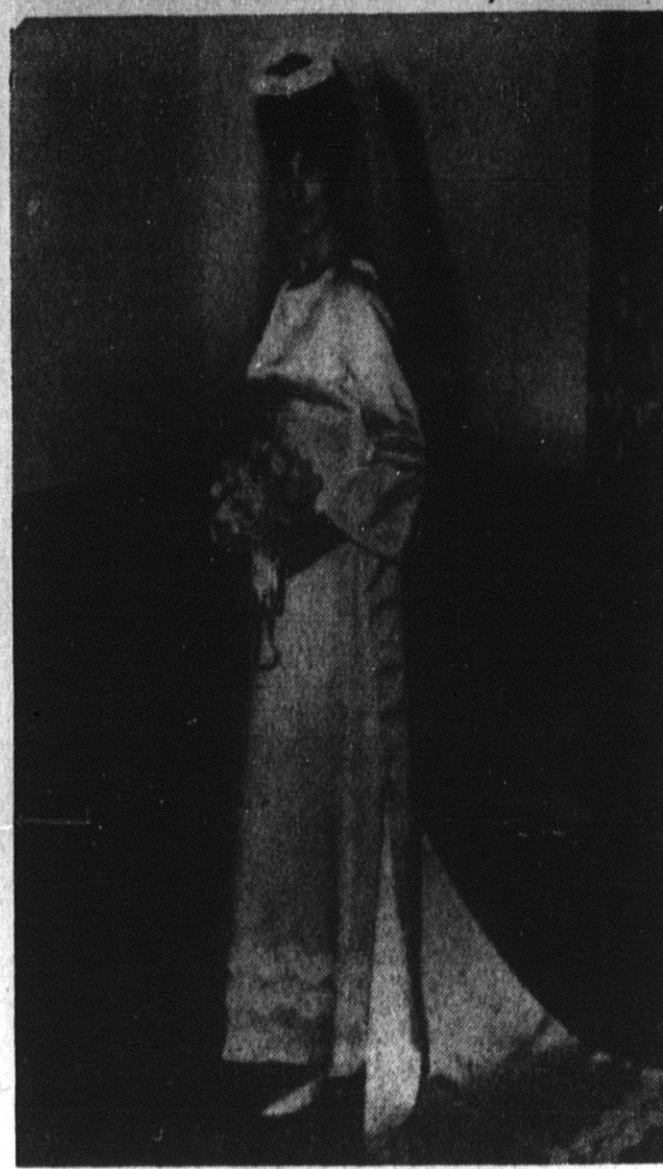

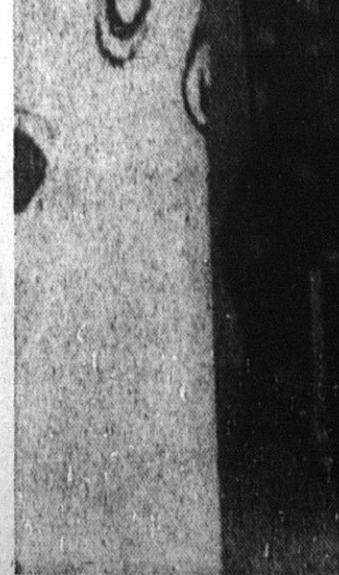

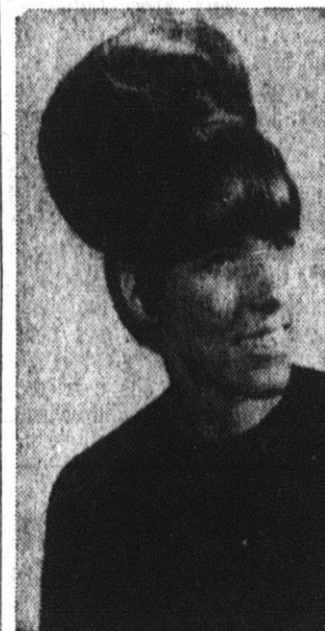

## Capital Has Five Faces, Mrs. Tufty Tells Club

Speaking on "Inside Washington," Esther Van Wagoner Tufty, well known columnist and correspondent for many Michigan newspapers in the nation's capital, told the Women's Literary Club Tuesday that Washington has five faces — and that's going to be the title of her book if she ever gets time to write it.

The first face, she said, is the political face and this is the one people are most conscious of.

The second is the military face where one can look to the five-sided Pentagon (the central military core of the free world) and feel its influence consciously whether the subject be space or Vietnam.

The third face is Washington, the International capital of the world, a place all diplomats wish to be sent even though Washington is regarded as a hardship post because of summer heat, plus high cost of living.

For the fourth face, she said people tend to forget that Washington itself is a city with all the city problems like high taxes and garbage collection, plus the fact that the population is 80 per cent Negro.

For the fifth face, she said Washington is a College town, the center for five universities and two immediately outside. "This is truly a great face," she said. "Young people see our government in action and it's a great experience. Besides, it brings in many foreign students they can view the scene first hand."

As a political writer, Mrs. Tufty who has been in Washington 33 years regards the President of the United States as the No. 1 news source and regards his news conferences as the most productive of news. She explained the early conferences of Franklin Roosevelt in his office with reporters standing, the later conferences of Harry Truman (used to rough and tumble politics), the gatherings of President Eisenhower who was the first to bring in radio and learned to like it, President Kennedy who designed a brand new auditorium for televised conferences, and the present conferences of President Johnson back in the East Room of the White House, where all reporters are happy to be.

Mrs. Tufty devoted considerable time to her work as a war correspondent for World War II, Korea and Vietnam, and the United States foreign policy closely associated with the war effort.

Briefed by the foreign policy adviser to the President, Mrs. Tufty said the foreign policy is four-fold: (1) stop aggression; (2) help underdeveloped countries; (3) assist foreign countries in regions such as southeast Asia, areas in Africa, etc., (4) the enemy.

Of the latter which she characterized as Communist Russia, she said there is greater communication with Russia and growing cultural exchange — something all to the good since continuing communication is preferable to war.

She spoke of doing a favor for a Korean girl in obtaining credentials to the Women's Press Club and of her opportunity to visit Korea recently as an honored guest of a top publisher — and her visit to Vietnam as a war correspondent. She described Korea's comeback after the war of the early 50's, its judicious use of American aid and its improved educational system. She said Korea is providing more fighting men proportionately in Vietnam than the United States.

She described the Vietnam war as an odd war, one with fighting everywhere, but she said the Americans there un-

derstand the problems much better than the Americans at home, and the overseas fighters are likely to regard with contempt the stories of draft card burnings and college riots. She spoke of an American dietitian who figured a way to get a hot meal a day to the fighting men — a great morale booster. She interviewed many wounded men and their stories, she said, were thrilling in motivation.

"Vietnam can hardly be compared with Korea although there are some parallels," she said. "The Vietnam war has been going on for 20 years in a hot, dusty climate, but right now I feel encouraged about Vietnam. It's not easy and will take a long time. I'm really more concerned about the Middle East with its centuries - old problems. I'm even encouraged over our progress in communications with Russia. We've accomplished many things, and with God's help, we'll win."

## Dutchmen Finish 3rd In MIAA Race

ALBION — Albion demonstrated why they are the second best team in the MIAA here Saturday by drubbing Hope College's football team, 45-0.

The defeat was Hope's worst since the second game of the 1962 season when Valparaiso, Ind., crushed the Flying Dutchmen 48-0.

Albion's victory in the final league game for both teams earned the Britons a second place finish while Hope tied for third with Olivet.

No one could foresee what was to come by observing the first quarter.

Hope garnered eight first downs in the quarter and sustained a drive from their own 12-yard line to the Britons 20 only to be stopped on fourth down.

Albion, after being stopped cold on three series, then covered 80 yards in two plays, a 31-yard run by Jim Bell and a 49-yard touchdown burst by Sam Trippett with 0:02 left in the quarter. Bill Schuller converted to give Albion a 7-0 lead.

Through the final three quarters of play Albion completely dominated the game. Hope, which had moved the ball so well in the first quarter, advanced beyond their own 39-yard line only once in the remainder of the game.

One factor for this was an Albion domination of the kicking game. Schuller's punts continually kept Hope deep in their own territory.

Hope's regular punter and co-captain, Gary Frens, didn't suit up for the game because of a knee injury.

Albion scored their second touchdown at 7:03 of the second period when Craig Cossey sprinted 20 yards following a 17-yard gain by Trippett. Schuller again converted to up Albion's margin to 14-0.

Hope was forced to punt after failing to move the ball and Havenman's punt was partially blocked by Tom Mikols resulting in a three-yard kick to the Hope 20.

Albion couldn't penetrate the Hope defense but Schuller came in and booted a 41-yard field goal to give the Britons a 17-0 lead.

Late in the quarter Albion regained possession of the ball in their own territory (49-yard line) for the first time in the quarter and promptly drove the 51 yards in three plays with Trippett scoring his second touchdown on a two-yard plunge which followed a 48-yard burst, also by Trippett. Schuller again converted and Albion had put the game away by halftime, 24-0.

After a scoreless third period Albion added a touchdown by Bell at 10:16 of the final quarter and following Schuller's conversion the Britons had upped the margin to 31-0.

The second string got into the act when Jim Lear threw a 73-yard touchdown pass to Mike Walters with 0:43 left in the game. Jim Cook relieved Schuller by kicking the extra point.

Hope received the kickoff and was forced to punt. Rick Bensingier fielded the ball on his own 47 and returned the punt 47 yards to the Hope six-yard line with 0:06 showing on the clock.

With 0:01 left Lear hit Lee Porterfield for the score and Schuller again demonstrated his kicking prowess by dropping the extra point through the goal posts.

Hope did set a couple individual records in the defeat. Junior end Bill Bekkering caught four passes bringing his total for the season to 33 breaking the old record of 31 set by Jon Schoon in 1962.

The man who throws all those passes to Bekkering, sophomore Groy Kaper, completed 9 of 16 passes bringing his total completions for the year to 71 breaking Ron Schipper's 1951 mark of 70.

Coach Russ De Vette's Flying Dutchmen, now 4-4 for the year, will conclude the season Saturday against Ashland.

Ashland held an 18 game winning streak before being defeated by Heidelberg this year. They are 6-2 on the season.

Incidentally, the final league standings were exactly as the coaches predicted at the pre-season MIAA Press Day.

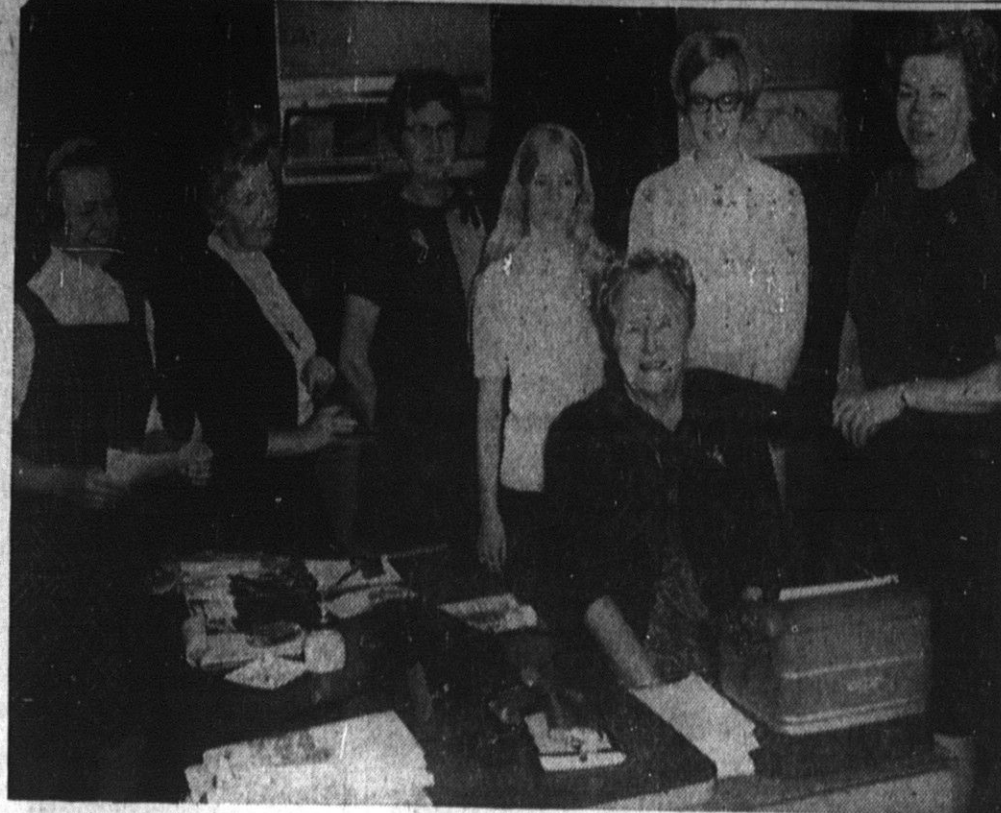

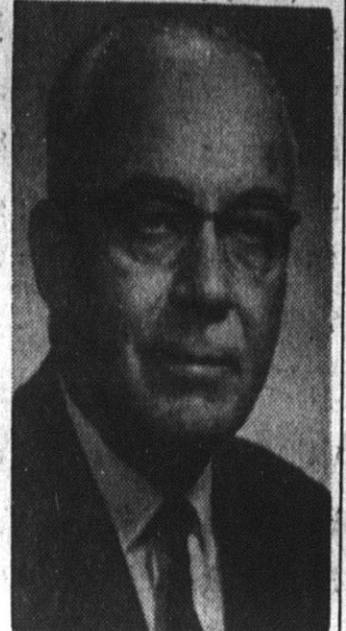

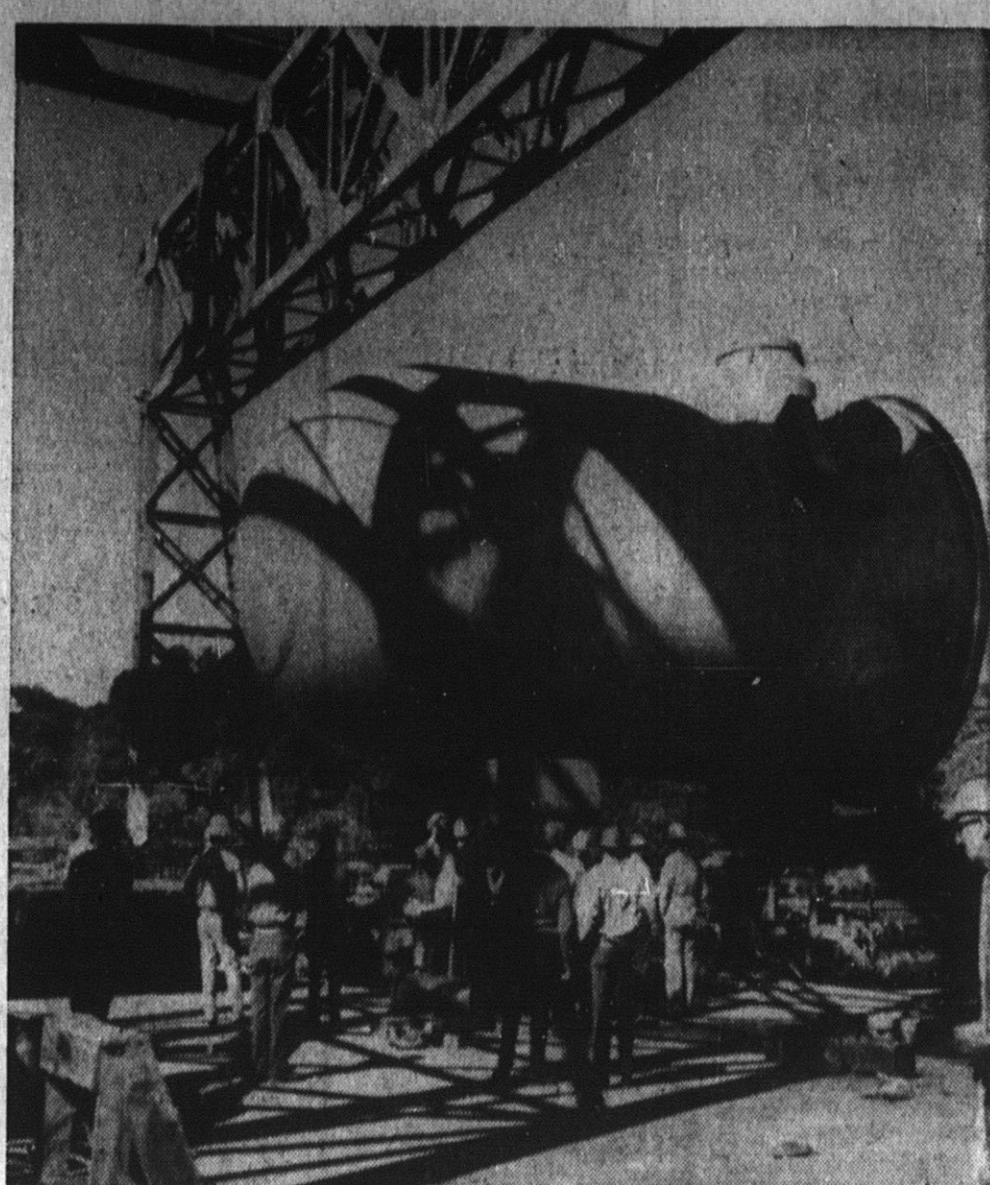

## GRANDSTANDING . . Rick Bruggers

It was a quiet, serene November Sunday afternoon on the campus of Hope College. Outside of a handful of men who were enjoying a game of touch football the campus was secluded.

But if one were to notice there was one man doing something besides catching up on his sleep from the night before or watching the afternoon Lions come amongst a crowd of cheering frat brothers.

Rick Bruggers runs.

He runs so well that he held the Hope record in four races — the half mile (1:56.1), mile (4:12.9), two mile (9:32.2) and the four mile (20:04).

So well that he has lost only one dual cross country meet in two years, and so well that he was undefeated in dual track meets last season.

What is so unusual about this? After all running stars, like baseball, basketball, and football stars, come along all the time.

At Saginaw Arthur Hill High School Rick was noted for his golfing ability and admittedly was not even interested in track and cross country.

After arriving at Hope he became a member of the basketball team and another sport he had never competed in.

Hope College Athletic Director Gordon Brewer remembers distinctly the birth of Rick Bruggers, the runner.

"His track experience began in a half kidding, half serious way when Russ (basketball coach Russ De Vette) told the members of the basketball team that they would have to play football or run cross country as part of basketball conditioning."

De Vette did set up a conditioning program and Brewer recalls Rick ran the mile in just over five minutes in his first clocking.

So, in his sophomore year at Hope College, Brewer, who is also the track coach, admitted Rick "caught by attention."

That spring Rick was asked to come out for track and Brewer remembered "distinctly" the first time trial Rick ran that spring.

"It was a cold day in March and Rick, Doug (Formsma) and Rich Frank all ran within two seconds of each other."

Brewer realized that that he had something going and the running of Formsma and Rick, who never witnessed a track meet before he participated, were to be a major part of a Hope track dynasty that has seen the Flying Dutchmen win or share track championships the past three years.

Brewer, despite everything Bruggers has already achieved, thinks, "Rick's brightest moments are still ahead of him."

What does Rick think the future holds for him. He quips, "if the draft gets me I'll run for the army. If Tracy Smith can do it I can!"

His present cross country coach Barry Werkman is a bit more emphatic.

"He wants to be the best and improve as much as he can. I think basically he takes running seriously. It's partly a natural thing but it is also in combination with hard work. He deserves a lot of credit for how far and how fast he's come. One of his major objectives is being an All-American runner. That's what he's pointing for right now."

Rick will have his chance Nov. 16 at the NCAA small college finals.

First comes the conference meet which will be held Nov. 5 at Olivet. Rick already holds course records at Hope, Albion, Kalamazoo and Alma but he

especially wants to win at Olivet.

Although being named to the ALL-MIAA team last year Rick placed very low in the conference meet. The reason was rather simple. With approximately one month left in the season Rick incurred shin splints which, after the conclusion of the season, were diagnosed as a fractured tibia.

It was during this period that Rick suffered his only dual meet cross country defeat and the injury also avoided him from participating in the NCAA meet last year.

Track holds "by far" the greatest thrill Rick has experienced since his running career began.

Last spring Rick competed in the NCAA College Division national track finals at California State College in Hayward, Calif.

Rick finished eighth in the 1500 meter run, especially satisfying since he qualified by defeating Phil Kaminsky of Ohio Wesleyan University. Kaminsky had defeated Rick twice earlier in the year.

Rick gives much credit for his success to Doug Formsma who Rick inevitably ran second to in his sophomore year in track. Doug and Rick paced the entire league in the mile and two mile runs.

Things were different this spring as Rick went undefeated in dual meet competition in both the mile and two mile and capped championships in both races at the league Field Day.

Noting the difference between cross country and track Rick remarked, "cross country is harder work. You run a lot of different places and longer distances."

Reflecting on the past he noted, "It hasn't come easy. It's been a lot of work although it comes easier for me than many other people so I guess there's some natural ability."

"It's enjoyable when there isn't a lot of pressure. I'd miss it, I don't know how much."

"It's been great. I loved it." And Rick still has time to improve, to succeed.

Have all those extra hours of running, including the 300 miles Rick ran this summer, paid off. Well, why don't you ask Rick Bruggers who, Tuesday, set a new course record of 20:14 at Olivet in winning the MIAA conference meet and being honored as the most valuable runner in the league. Now it's on to the NCAA meet in Wheaton.

As Werkman says, "It'll be a long time before another comes along like Rick. Maybe never."

## Palisades Plant Nears Completion

SOUTH HAVEN — More than 925 tons of nuclear equipment arrived in South Haven from the Chattanooga Plant of Combustion Engineering Oct. 18 on an 1,130 mile barge trip to Consumers Power Company's Palisades Plant, the first utility generating station employing a C-E pressurized water reactor.

The components, consisting of the reactor vessel and the first of two steam generators, will be installed at the 710 mw plant located on the shore of Lake Michigan, near South Haven. Construction is now about 50 per cent complete at the plant, scheduled for commercial operation in May, 1970.

When the barge reached Joliet, Ill., it was ballasted by flooding compartments in order to clear the bridges spanning the sanitary and ship canal during passage through Chicago. Clearance at one of the bridges is less than 18 inches.

On completion of the 15-day trip, which included navigating portions of the Tennessee, Mississippi, Ohio and Illinois rivers, the barge berthed at a specially-dredged slip for unloading and moving the components into the reactor building. Dredging of the slip extended 200 feet into the lake to accommodate the tow boat and barge. The unloading was completed last week.

A second shipment containing the reactor vessel head and the second steam generator left C-E's Chattanooga River dock this week. The pressurizer and associated primary piping is being shipped overland to the plant site.

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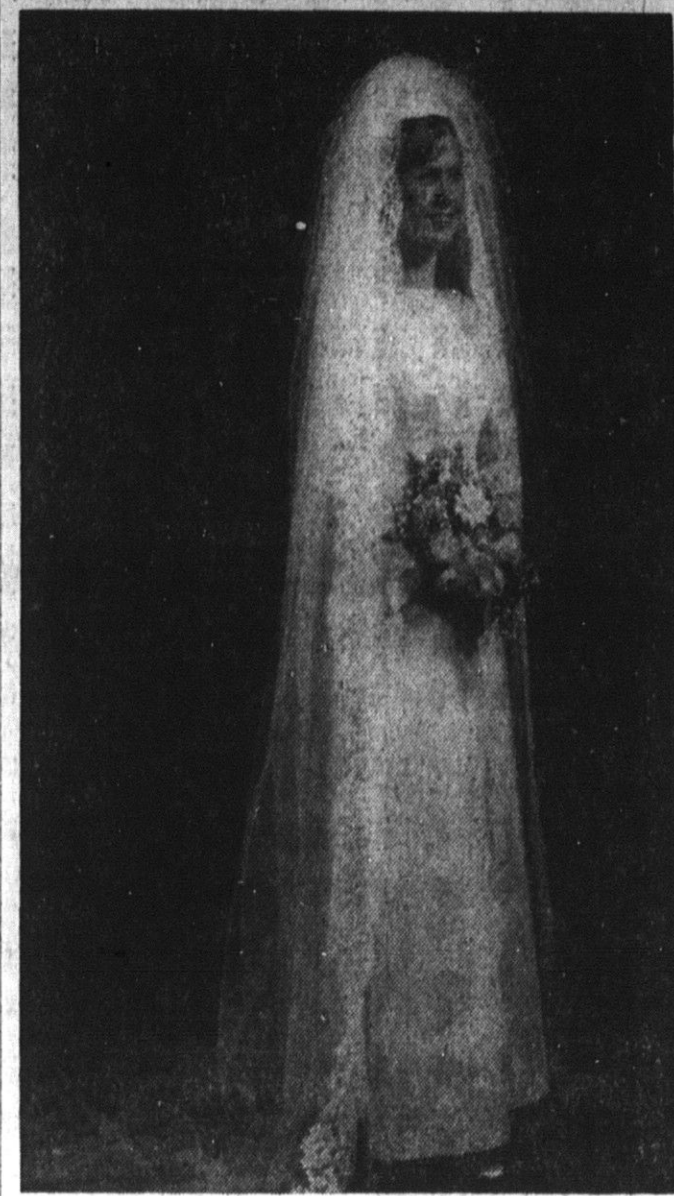
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## Miss Susan Bares Wed To Thomas Bural Phelps

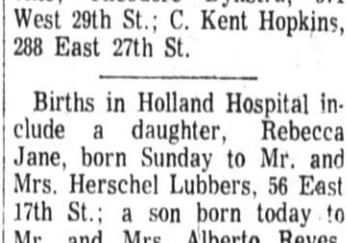

## Traffic Control Study Conducted For Zeeland

ZEELAND — A full-scale study of Zeeland's traffic problems, together with recommended solutions, is being conducted in the city as a public service by the Automobile Club of Michigan, Arthur Gibson, director of the Auto Club's traffic engineering department announces.

The study, which began Oct. 28 is aimed at reducing traffic congestion and accidents and required two weeks of on-the-spot field work from a traffic engineering research team. An intensive study of traffic and accident records will also be made.

The city of Zeeland requested the study because of growing concern over changing traffic patterns.

Entire cost of the survey will be borne by Auto Club as a civic contribution.

Besides the study of police accident records, the AAA-research team will measure traffic volumes and movements and

pinpoint hazardous or potentially hazardous intersections or areas.
