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Chuck Knowles Wins State Open

BATTLE CREEK — The course was at its longest and the scores soared Sunday, but Chuck Knowles was able to put it all together on the last few holes to win the 50th Michigan Open Golf championship in a sudden-death playoff at Bedford Valley Country Club.

Until the 15th hole of the final round, the 29-year-old pro from the Holland Country Club appeared out of the money. But he birdied three of the last four holes, ended in a tie with Cass Jawor of Dearborn Heights and won the \$1,000 first-place money on the first sudden-death hole with a par.

But even the tie for first spot was three strokes above par—291—over the course which

Then, on the first sudden death hole, Knowles got par while Jawor trapped his approach shot, came out short and then missed a 25-foot putt for a bogey.

"I was just trying to finish well," Knowles said. "I wasn't discouraged after the 77—I didn't play that bad. It's just a great golf course."

Jawor admitted "I wasn't even thinking of him until the 18th hole. I was thinking of Gene Bone."

With the course its full 7,020 yards for its first time in the three-day tourney, only one golfer was able to shoot under 70—Tom Rosely, the 1964 champ from Belmont who came in with a four-under 68 to tie the course record but finished in a tie for fourth spot at 294.

Plan New Fall Programs At YMCA Club

Several new programs will be offered this fall, reported Duane H. Perry, Executive Director. There will be an emphasis on a physical fitness orientation and conditioning program for business men. A special Ladies Day Out program is being considered which would include short instructional courses in homemaking. A physical fitness course will also be offered. Several youth groups will be formed also which will include instructional courses in beginning swim for tots and younger youth. Perry stated more specific information will be available.

The Board approved, at a previous meeting, YMCA membership will be a requirement for participating in all specific programs starting in September. A special membership will be available for the rocket football program.

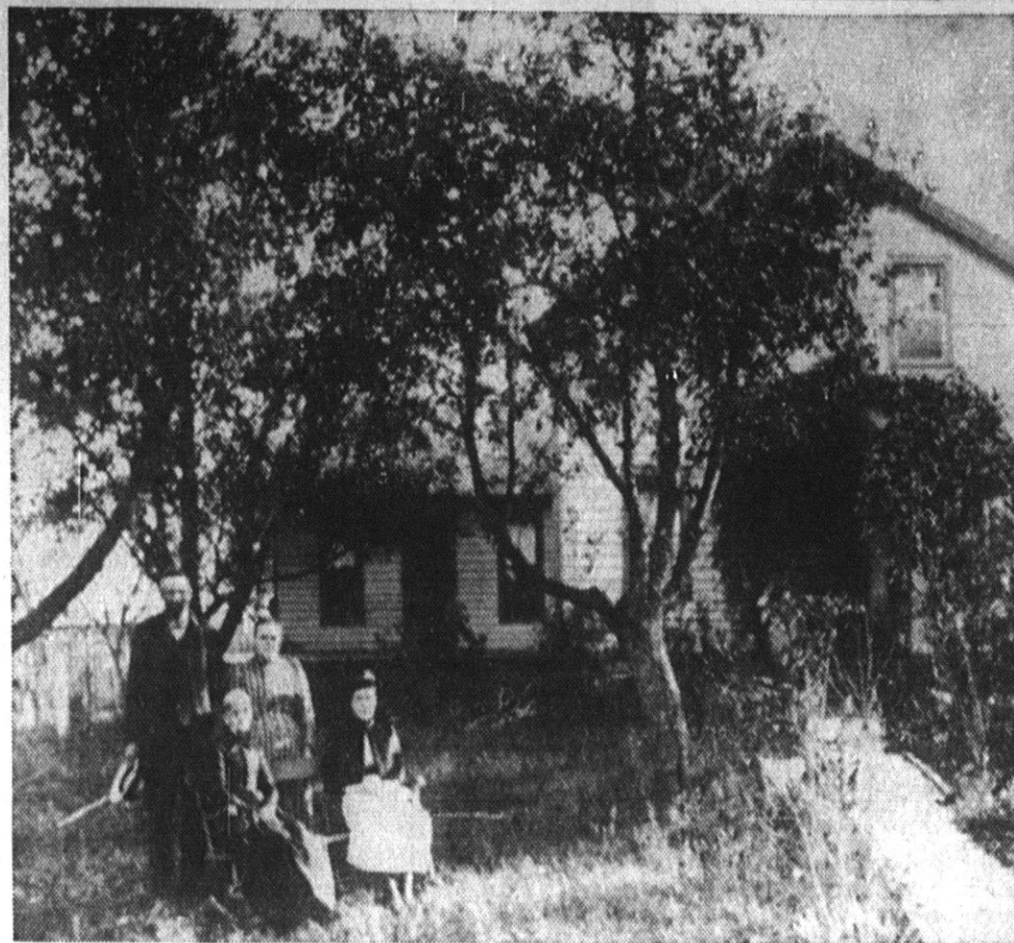
The injured horse named "Up To Date" is owned by Cindy Laird of Battle Creek.

Deputies said the trailer tipped over on the west side of the road and "Up To Date" suffered a possible broken back.

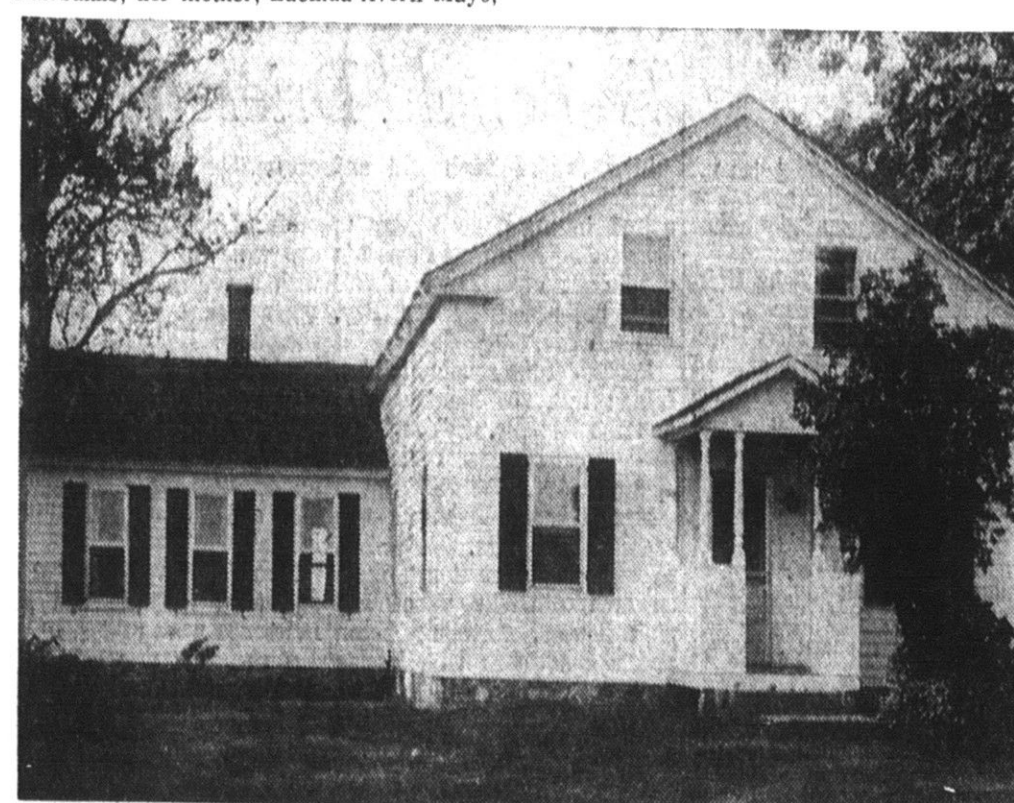
Deputies said both horses were returned home by the owner. They were to appear in the Castle Park Horse Show being held today near Holland.

State Historical Marker Set for Old Wing Mission

A Michigan Historic Marker on the site of Old Wing Mission, the oldest building in this area, will be dedicated Saturday at 2:30 p.m. on the site on East 40th St. a half mile east of 120th Ave.

This home was built by Isaac Fairbanks in 1844-45 for the Rev. George N. Smith sent here by a Congregationalist mission society to evangelize the Ottawa-Chippewa Indians in the vicinity of what is now Lake Macatawa. Fairbanks, a U.S. agricultural agent to the Indians, later acquired the home and his descendants lived there most of the ensuing time.

Arrangements for the marker were made by the Michigan Historical Commission and financed by the Fairbanks family. The property is owned by Andrew Vinstra who lives next door to Old Wing Mission. It was Vinstra who restored the old house keeping the interior much as it was in the 1840's but adding closets and central heating.

It was at this home that Dr. A. C. Van Raalte and six members of his company arrived early in 1847 to investigate a settlement for his band of Dutch followers.

At the ceremonies Saturday,

Mrs. Ralph Gunn of Holland, a granddaughter of Isaac Fairbanks, will unveil the marker, and Dr. William Welmers whose wife, the former Beatrice Fairbanks is a great granddaughter of Isaac Fairbanks, will talk briefly of the Fairbanks family. Dr. Welmers who is professor of African languages at UCLA in Los Angeles, served as chairman of the Old Wing Marker committee.

Willard C. Wichers, president of the Michigan Historical Commission, will represent the commission at the ceremony. The invocation will be given by the Rev. N. A. Rozeboom of Ebenezer Reformed Church and the benediction will be given by the Rev. John Krus of Niekerk Christian Reformed Church. John Tien will speak on the history of Fillmore township. There will be a presentation of colors and music.

As Isaac Fairbanks built it, Old Wing Mission was a square frame structure with two stories and a full basement. The foundation was field stone and the beams hand-hewn logs. On the first floor was a large room which served as kitchen and parlor, plus a small den or bedroom. There were four bedrooms on the second floor.

In 1866, a three-room one-story wing was added to the east, and in about 1903, a smaller addition to the west. At some time, a porch was added to the front but this was later removed, and the house today is closer to its original appearance than was a few decades ago.

In Holland, 40th St. becomes 147th Ave. outside the city limits. Official address of Old Wing Mission is 5298 147th Ave.

Petition Opposes Rezoning

SAUGATUCK — A petition bearing names of 155 property owners opposing rezoning a 20-acre site on Blue Star Highway from commercial to industrial-manufacturing was submitted to the Saugatuck Township Zoning Board of Appeals Tuesday night. The parcel includes the former Saugatuck Fruit Exchange.

More than 75 attended the meeting of the appeal board conducted by Howard Temple, chairman. The petition asks the board to deny a request from R. L. Peterson for variations in rezoning the parcel. Peterson reportedly has sold his River Queen Boat Works to U. S. Industries.

The petition also asks the appeal board to delay any decision on rezoning until the Planning Commission makes a study of the entire area and submits its recommendations.

The petition was circulated by Charles Lethen, Kenneth Timm, Jack Schmidt and Lovell Kelly. Serving with Temple on the appeal board are Ben Lohman and Victor Egelkraut.

Letter Made Sailor 'Stop and Think'

HONOLULU, Hawaii — A 17-year-old Michigan sailor who decided to desert 22 fellow servicemen claiming anti-war sanctuary in a Honolulu church said Friday his escapade began with a drinking spree and a girl.

Seaman Apprentice Arthur D. Parker of Holland, Mich., left the Church of the Crossroads Thursday and turned himself in to military authorities. They confined him to the Navy Correctional Center at Pearl Harbor.

Parker said his troubles began when he met a young girl last Friday morning after drinking in Waikiki. He said the girl promised love and relief from the military and talked him into joining anti-war servicemen who are living in the church to show their displeasure with the Vietnam war.

Later, Parker said, he received a letter from his grandparents and his girlfriend which changed his mind.

"It made me think about the good times before and how I wanted to go back sometime," Parker said. "My parents had said if I stayed I would be a man without a country and that made me stop and think."

He left the church after a talk with an Army chaplain. But two other Michigan men—Army Spec. 4 Daniel Overstreet of Garden City and Army Pvt. Matthew Biggerstaff of Westland—still are in the church. Should they remain away from duty for 30 days, the military will list them as deserters.

Kandu, Inc. Gets Grant Of \$33,000

GRAND HAVEN — Kandu Industries, Inc., a United Fund agency of Greater Holland and the tri-cities area, will receive \$33,514 on a one-year matching grant, it was announced today by the Social and Rehabilitation Agency, a department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Locally, Kandu is responsible for the additional 20 per cent or \$8,379 for a total of \$41,893. Kandu's portion was made possible by the Loutit Foundation grant of July 1, 1962.

The money will be used to remodel the present workshop at 12 North First St., according to Board Chairman Ronald Seaver and Director Robert Dillenback. Such improvements will allow more room for potential clients and set the stage for establishing a rehabilitation workshop improvement grant for equipment and staff.

Kandu will develop intensified and more complete vocational evaluation, work adjustment, training and placement programs. It also plans to establish a facility which is not only extremely functional for clients but esthetically appealing.

Kandu was incorporated in 1966 by the Haven Foundation of Ottawa county and the Ottawa-Allegan Cerebral Palsy Association. It is the only multiple disability workshop and adult activity center in Ottawa county.

Initial workshop services began with one staff member and 10 clients housed in a building of 1,500 square feet. Today 21 clients are served on a daily basis and the staff numbers four in a building of 10,000 square feet.

The grant was made possible through cooperation and assistance of the Facilities Development section of the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation which is a division of the Michigan Department of Education. Working on the grant were Claude Whitehead, Charles W. Foster, W. Richard Bufkin and their staff. Additional assistance was received from the district office in Grand Rapids from V. E. Beld and Ted Huismen.

William Hoffmeyer who heads United Fund and Richard Hansen, county Red Cross chairman, reiterated the policy of "single asking" for all agencies in the annual drive in October, but added that the Red Cross would be happy to forward gifts to the national Red Cross headquarters for the special appeal.

Grand Haven tri-cities has been assigned a quota of \$2,767.31, Zeeland, \$258.69, and Coopersville, \$273.69.

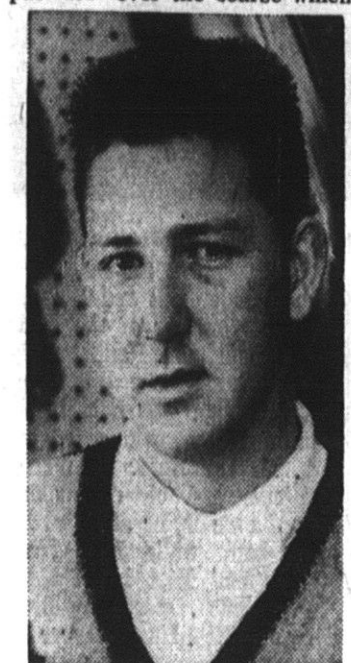

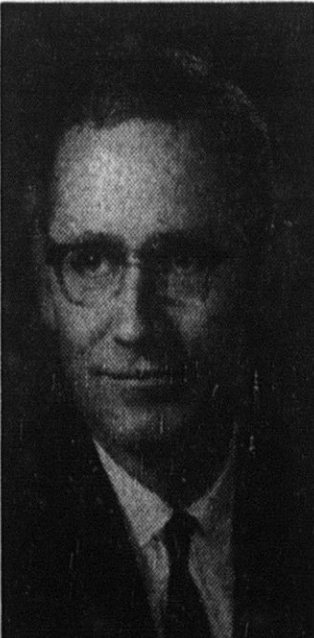

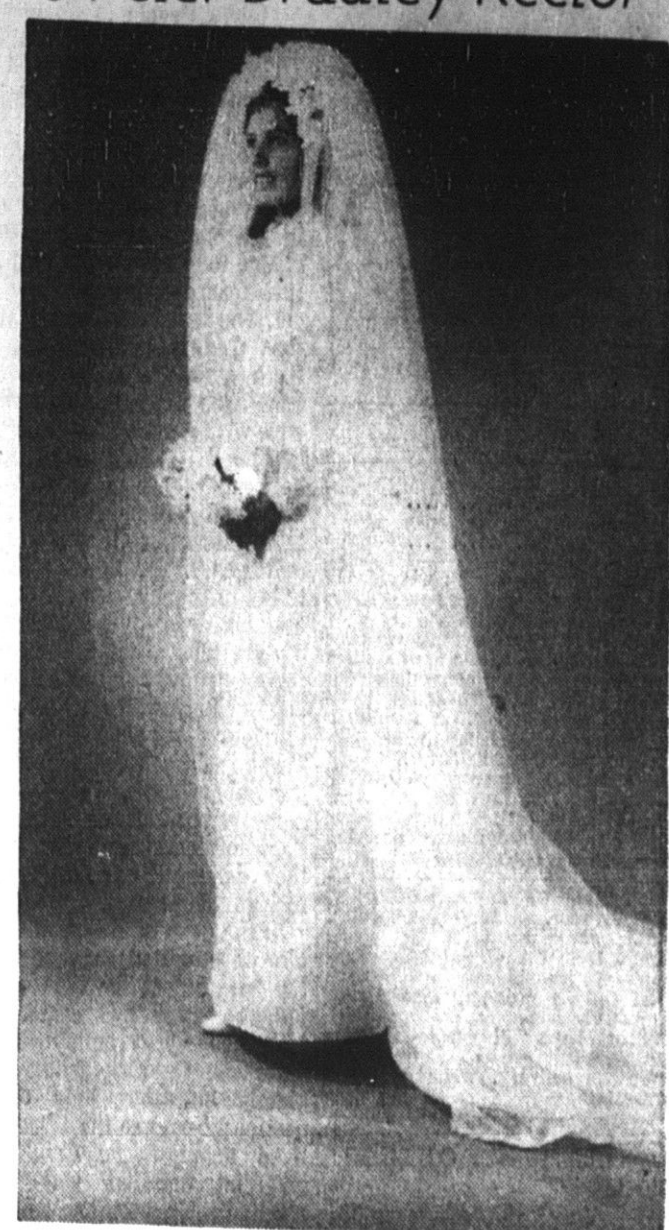

bittersweet delustered satin designed with empire waist and leg-of-mutton sleeves trimmed with deep avocado braid.

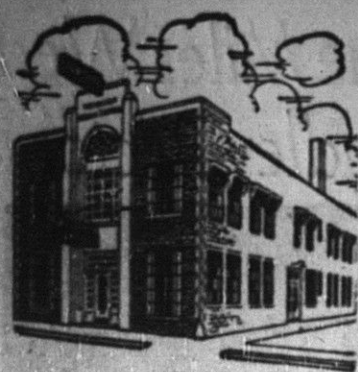

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THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE VOTE

Results of the voting on the Community College propositions last Tuesday indicate that this idea may have to wait a while before it gets to be a practical reality.

Sentiment in Holland was quite evenly divided. With a total vote of some 4,500, the proposition to establish a Community College district carried by 15 votes and the proposition to finance such an institution by a maximum of 2 mills lost by 54 votes.

Saugatuck with some 300 votes passed both propositions almost 2 to 1. West Ottawa with over 1,000 votes gave the district issue a plurality of 33 votes and the millage a margin of 2 votes. Allegan with some 700 votes favored the district by 40 votes and the millage by a single vote. Districts to the north and east voted down both issues, some by as much as 4 to 1. A good share of these people feel their needs can be served by Junior colleges in Muskegon or Grand Rapids, to say nothing of the availability of Hope College, Grand Valley State College, Calvin College, Kalamazoo College and Western Michigan University.

It should be born in mind that none of these latter colleges accomplishes what the vocational college intends to do and that there is a significant segment of youth who need the kind of college that has been proposed.

This should not be the last vote on this proposition. The electorate should have another opportunity to express itself after the needs for such training becomes more apparent in the skilled trades and vocational enterprises.

Of course, money is important. Perhaps in the meantime we should study all ways to reduce costs on all levels and let's think of using our school buildings 12 months of the year.

Van Sloatens To Go on Tour

Mr. and Mrs. Marion Van Sloaten of West Olive will be among the group of 35 Michigan agricultural delegates and their wives who will leave Tuesday for visits with their counterparts in Europe and Russia.

The first stop for the international People to People Agricultural Goodwill tour will be Brussels, Belgium. Visits to Belgian and Dutch farm operations reclaimed from the sea will be followed by a flight to Moscow and nearly a week in Russia.

The tour will be headed by John Calkins of East Lansing, chief deputy director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Other lands visited will be Germany, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and Spain. The group will be hosted abroad by agricultural leaders and will spend time in the countryside, probing foreign farm operations and exchanging information on occupations.

International goodwill coupled with a better understanding of problems and interests of people in other lands is the aim of the tour.

The group will return Sept. 16.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 31
God's People in Confusion
Judges 2:16-19; 6:11-14; 8:33-35
By C. P. Dame

Centuries ago confusion reigned in Israel in the time of the Judges. Today confusion dominates in many parts of the world and there is plenty of it in the Christian Church. When people turn away from God confusion surely comes.

I. The Book of Judges teaches that God is patient. This one truth stands out. We do not know who wrote the book which covers the period between 1225 to 1050 B. C. This is the period between the conquest of the country by Joshua and the establishment of the monarchy under Saul. The Book of Judges tells about the deeds of judges, some of whom were outstanding leaders while others were minor characters. These judges were more than judicial arbiters. Usually they came to positions of power at a time of national crisis when they delivered the nation from foreign oppressors.

In the days of Joshua the people were united in conquering the land but in the time of the judges apathy had come. The Israelites were commanded to drive out the Canaanites completely but they only did a partial job and so the Israelites lived amongst the Canaanites and intermarried and often adopted their ways and religion. The Canaanites worshipped many idols, but two were popular, Baal, the male deity and Ashtaroth the female deity, both gods of fertility, the gods whom the farmers worshipped, a type of worship which was marked by lust, sensuality and prostitution. God demanded holiness. This worship revealed disloyalty and sinfulness.

As long as Joshua and the elders that served and outlived him lived the people remained loyal to God but the new generation that came along did not know first hand all that God had done for Israel and so they followed pagan ways. Four words describe the years—apostasy, oppression, repentance and deliverance. Trouble turned the people to God who then sent them a deliverer. After deliverance the same procedure followed.

II. The lesson tells about how God called Gideon who delivered the nation from the oppression of the Midianites. Gideon was a farmer. He was a discouraged man. God's angel called him "a mighty man of valour" but he did not show it—he had potentialities which came to the fore. He became a real leader under the direction of God.

Gideon obeyed God who told him to send home twenty-two thousand men and then God told him to test the ten thousand and to arm the three hundred in an unusual manner. The words, "And they stood every man in his own place, round about the camp" note and observe what followed—"and all the host ran and cried and fled"—the small dedicated group won the victory. When will some church leaders wake up and realize that God does not depend on numbers and organizational unity to win victories? God works through consecrated people.

Did the people remember God's help and the helper he sent? No, for as soon as Gideon died the people turned again to Baal. The church today needs strong, able, consecrated leaders who will lead forgetful and fickle people to God.

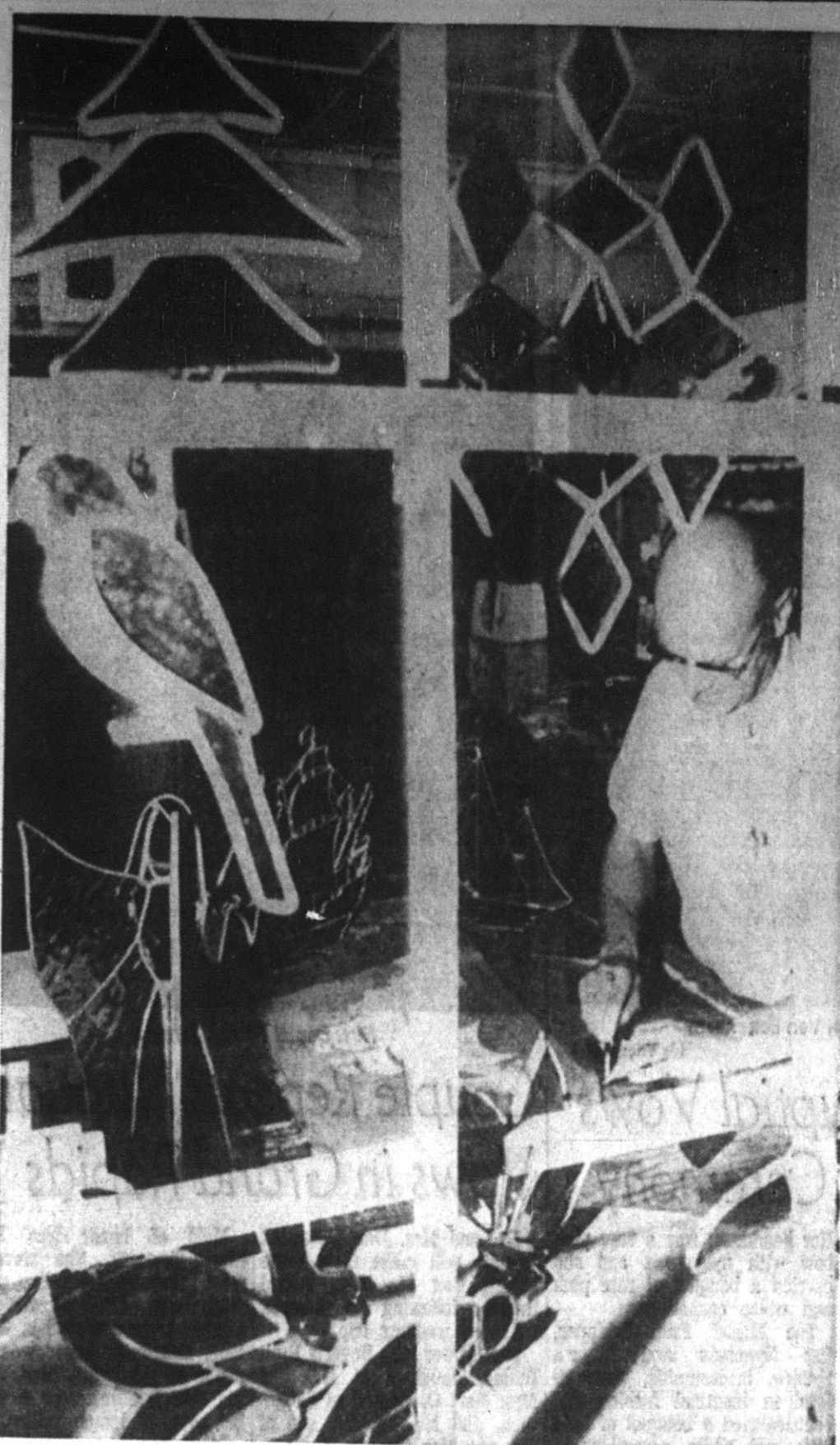

Zeeland Craftsman Mixes Old and New in Art Form

Both the old and the new find relevance in the work of Zeeland artist John Vander Burgh.

Vander Burgh combines the rich tradition of stained glass work and Biblical subjects with a strictly 20th century semi-abstract style.

The result has given Vander Burgh a respected reputation. Born in the Hague in 1916, Vander Burgh studied for five years at the Royal Academy before being apprenticed to his uncle. From World War II to 1951 his career was interrupted by such tasks as tracing Jewish concentration camp victims for the Red Cross.

By 1951 he was free to come to Zeeland where he resumed his art career working for Grand Rapids Art Glass Co., and bought a house at 134 South Centennial. The year 1957 saw the advent of his own studio in Zeeland where he now works at his two specialties: stained glass windows and delightful 'sun catchers'.

His windows are a tribute to a man willing to combine the finest of the past and the present. His medium, stained glass, dates from the Middle Ages while his religious themes are as old as man.

However, his interpretation and style are contemporary. In the Pentecostal theme, one often used by Vander Burgh, bold colors, sweeping lines and generalized forms carry the message of triumph and power rather than a strictly representational version of the event.

His art attacks both the viewers mind and his senses to create a total experience.

The method of creating such a window is both tedious and delicate.

In his work Vander Burgh attempts to match his style with the setting for his work. If a church were of a more traditional design his window would be representational. His own preference is for the semi-abstract style.

Cluttered from floor to ceiling in his studio are drawings, projects, completed and future plans. Many are in the modern style but all attest to the vigor and creativity of a man whose goal is to provoke the viewer to a deep response to the subject portrayed.

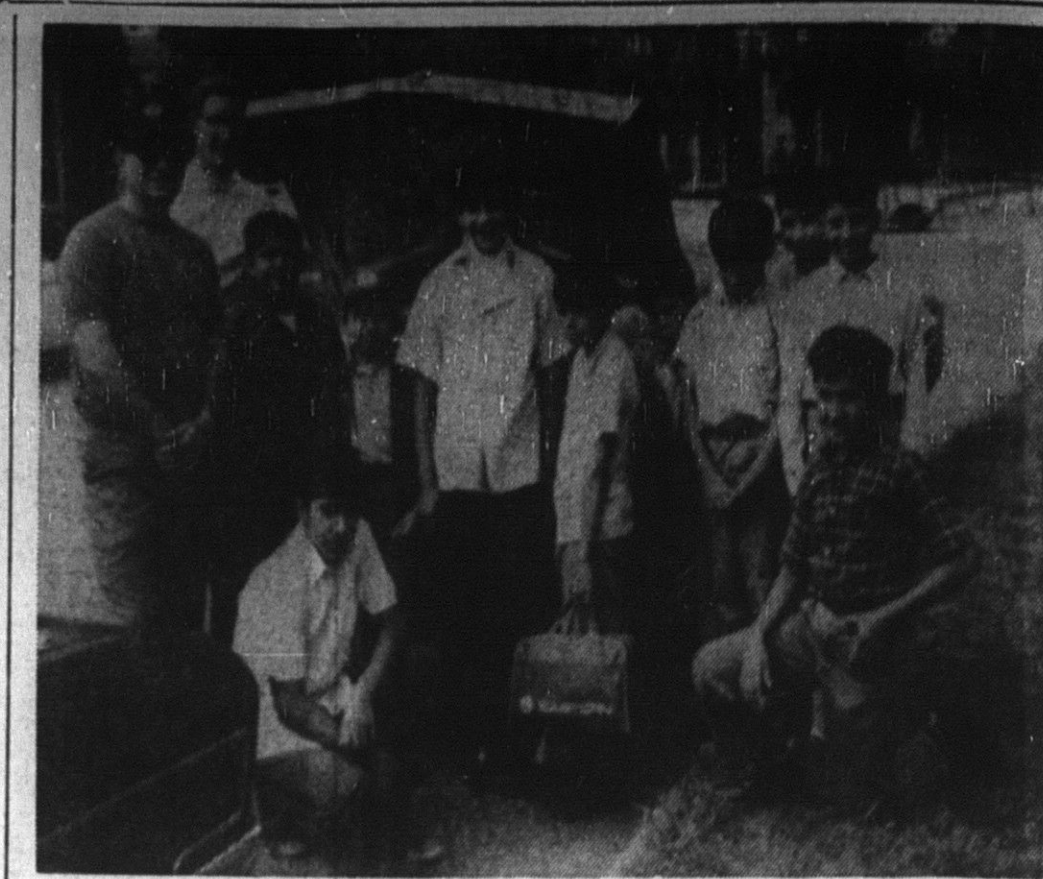

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Allegan Fair Opens On Sept. 6

Allegan — Countdown has started for the 117th consecutive Allegan County Fair which will open at Riverside Park, Allegan, on Saturday, Sept. 6, for eight days.

Fair President Weldon Rumery is already calling the 1969 edition of the annual exposition "the best ever."

"With any kind of break in the weather," Rumery said, "we'll be topping all previous attendance records."

That means more than 130,000 Michigan residents—and many from nearby states as well—will be passing through Riverside Park's east and west gates during the 8 day event. The fair has exceeded 100,000 attendance marks in most years since its 1952 centennial, with 134,000 its all-time record. This mark was set in 1967, first of the 8-day fairs.

Another factor responsible for boosting attendance was the fair's free grandstand policy which has been in effect for five years. Fair patrons pay only once, at the main gates, all grandstand attractions are free, day and night, throughout the fair.

Fair officials are counting on an impressive line-up or different grandstand events to help set new records this year.

Five completely different evening shows are scheduled. Fair officials are expecting to draw top crowds with a musical revue featuring Dean Martin's Gold-diggers. The 12 talented girls are seen regularly on television on "Dean Martin presents the Goldiggers" as well as his own show during the regular TV season. The girls will be making their only appearance on an outdoor stage in Michigan at the Allegan fair, Friday and Saturday nights, Sept. 12-13. Two shows have been scheduled both nights at 7 and 9 p.m.

Considering the fact that talent for the fair is signed up nearly nine months in advance of the fair, officials also are congratulating themselves for their choice of headliners for their third annual country and western music festival, Thursday night, Sept. 11.

Way back in December they signed Sonny James and his Country Gentlemen to share the stage with other top country and western stars at the big musical show. Since signing to appear at Allegan, James has scored with one top recording after another, including the runaway hit, "Running Bear."

The fair opens Saturday, Sept. 6, with a special teen-day program. Free grandstand events include an afternoon-long "battle of the bands," the annual Harvest Queen final—at which Allegan county's next representative in the Miss Michigan pageant will be selected; followed up by a pop concert featuring the New World Singers and "The Camel Drivers." A free dance is scheduled after the concert.

Sunday is billed as "family fun day." No special events are scheduled and admission is free at the gate.

Monday will see the opening of six afternoon's of top-ranked harness racing on the fair's fast, half-mile track. Speed Secretary John Campbell said the oval has never been in better condition. An increase in purses—from \$28,000 to \$34,000 is expected to attract a record number of entries. Post time is 1:15 p.m. each day.

Monday evening will feature two complete "demolition derbies" in front of the grandstand. Drivers will be competing for cash and trophies as they fight for survival.

Tuesday and Wednesday, Hubert Castle will return with his ring International Circus. The circus has been a regular fair feature for several years, but the acts and attractions are always new. Matinee and evening performances are scheduled both days at 5 and 7 p.m.

Tuesday and Friday have again been set aside as children's days, with special events scheduled on Tuesday and reduced midway prices in effect both days until 6 p.m.

Thursday will be another big day featuring the annual "Mayors' and Village Presidents' Day" parades in front of the grandstand at 4 and 7 p.m.

Letters Provide Personal Glimpse of Europe, Tour

Seeing Europe through the eyes of Miss Nancy Walcott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Walcott, 335 Maple Ave., who spent the summer with the Vienna Summer School group from Hope College, is a delightful and amusing experience.

In a series of letters written to various members of her family, Miss Walcott describes herself first as a "lonesome traveler" on board ship "closer to England but still in middle of Atlantic" and goes on to paint colorful word pictures of the interesting and historic sights she sees.

She tells of flying to New York City on the first leg of her journey and of seeing "toy ore boats and miniature islands on the blue below" of Lake Erie and of identifying the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor. She also remarked that it "seemed to take almost as long to go by taxi to the hotel as it took to fly all the way to New York."

The days spent sailing to England included classes in German and travel forums in which a panel "answers questions on what the guidebooks don't tell." One discussion involved "not mistaking Italian men and their motives" and another was on the historical Dracula, whom Miss Walcott came to describe as "worse than Ivan the Terrible and his favorite trick was impaling people on stakes."

Upon arrival in Oxford, England, the members of the group heard a lecture on "Oxford and the Origins of the English University" which was "good but a bit too long" and were taken on a walking tour of Oxford which included dining halls in the student-professor quadrangle that looked like "something out of Charles Dickens' Oliver Twist."

Also on the itinerary were a visit to Bodleian Library which contains rare first editions of Shakespeare, Milton and others; a visit to Stratford-on-Avon, the birthplace of William Shakespeare; a brief stop at Anne Hathaway's cottage; seeing a production of "The Merry Wives of Windsor;" a trip to Blenheim Palace, ancestral home of Sir Winston Churchill; a visit to the burial place of the English statesman; and fish and chips at the Old Tudor House Restaurant.

After a bus ride to the London Airport via the memorials to John F. Kennedy and the Magna Charta and past Windsor Castle, the group left by plane for Copenhagen.

Incidentally, Miss Walcott observed that weather in England is as unpredictable as that in Michigan!

Upon arrival in the Danish capital, Miss Walcott took a 2½-hour tour of the city, took pictures of the Little Mermaid and set out with several others to explore Tivoli, the amusement center of Copenhagen.

A ferry trip took the group from Denmark to Malmö, Sweden, where Miss Walcott toured the city, stopped at the Princess Margaret Memorial Gardens and the King Karl Restaurant where she discovered she likes Swedish pancakes which are stuffed with a white sauce-like filling with pieces of hard boiled egg and shrimp.

Afternoon activities included a trip to Lund, Sweden, and a visit to a restored 12th century cathedral after which the group returned to the ferry to Malmö for the journey back to Copenhagen to prepare to leave for Berlin, Germany, via Hamburg.

Upon landing in Berlin, Miss Walcott and some friends visited their hotel and freshened up in time to walk to the opera in evening clothes to see Mozart's "Magic Flute."

A tour of West Berlin included a capsule history of the buildings and memorials to resistance workers and a visit to a modern Catholic church which had been built to resemble in many respects a concentration

camp as a memorial to Catholics who died during the war. The group also saw the Olympic stadium built originally for use in 1936.

The stop in Berlin also included a visit with the mayor, Karl Schütz, who answered questions and exchanged gifts with the group.

Although a visit to East Berlin was not organized by the school and had to be undertaken individually by each member of the group, Miss Walcott with several others set out to explore the Communist city.

At Checkpoint Charley, the group checked in at the allied station which was "not necessary but a good precaution — if you are not out by midnight, they check to find out where you are."

In order to enter East Berlin, the members of the group had to declare all money, cameras, etc., they were taking into the city. Following a close scrutiny of each student and his passport, members had to exchange at least five marks of West Berlin currency for East Berlin currency which they were not allowed to bring back to the western city. As a result, each student had to spend at least five marks in East Berlin.

After a final passport check at the gate to East Berlin, the students were allowed entry.

Miss Walcott noted that in East Berlin bombed-out churches and buildings still lie in ruins while in West Berlin only one church was left as it was at the end of the war as a memorial.

The students wandered through the city, visiting a museum and going through a modern section where a great deal of construction was underway. After leaving Berlin, the students returned to Checkpoint Charley where they met an American GI from South Haven who knew two members of the group.

From Berlin the students left for Bonn where they held a lecture and question-and-answer period with Bruce van Voorst, a Hope College graduate who is presently Newsweek bureau chief for Bonn and "all of East and West Berlin," whose remarks and insights Miss Walcott found much more informative than those of the official representative from Inter Nations.

The Bonn trip included watching a rain storm on the Rhine River and a trip to the Bundeshaus during a question-and-answer period.

The stay in Vienna included a visit to Schonbrunn Palace, "which in itself could contain half of Holland," the Kaiser's apartments in the winter palace, the Schatzkammer, summer palace or imperial treasury which contains the original crown of Charlemagne, and the imperial tombs.

At this point Miss Walcott remarked on the fact that over 300 years of kaisers' bodies are buried in the imperial tomb, the hearts are in the Augustine Church and the entrails are in St. Stephen's Cathedral.

Among other things the group saw the Roman ruins built by Maria Theresa and the Viennese Zoo, the Spanish Riding School and a Greek windmill.

A tour of the university included a trip through the library which was built in the last century and has not changed since its construction. It is still furnished with old fashioned stacks against the wall and long tables.

In her last letter Miss Walcott tells of a side trip to Budapest, Hungary, which proved interesting with buildings still showing signs of battle from World War II and very few new houses. The atmosphere was much freer than that of East Berlin but Hungarian and Russian soldiers were still much in evidence.

The three-hour tour of the Communist city included church-

es, Roman ruins and a monument entitled "Liberty" which stands on a hill overlooking the city — with a statue of a Russian soldier at its foot.

The guide on the tour was interesting but "politically reliable" and didn't believe in the Iron Curtain because she had never seen it. The "curtain" does exist, however, Miss Walcott explained, as a barbed wire fence between Austria and Hungary guarded by watch towers, armed guards and Russian soldiers hiding in the forests about three miles from the border.

The students returned from Budapest in time to see the American astronauts land on the moon but missed the telecast because of a misunderstanding of the time schedule. And there the armchair tour of Europe ends!

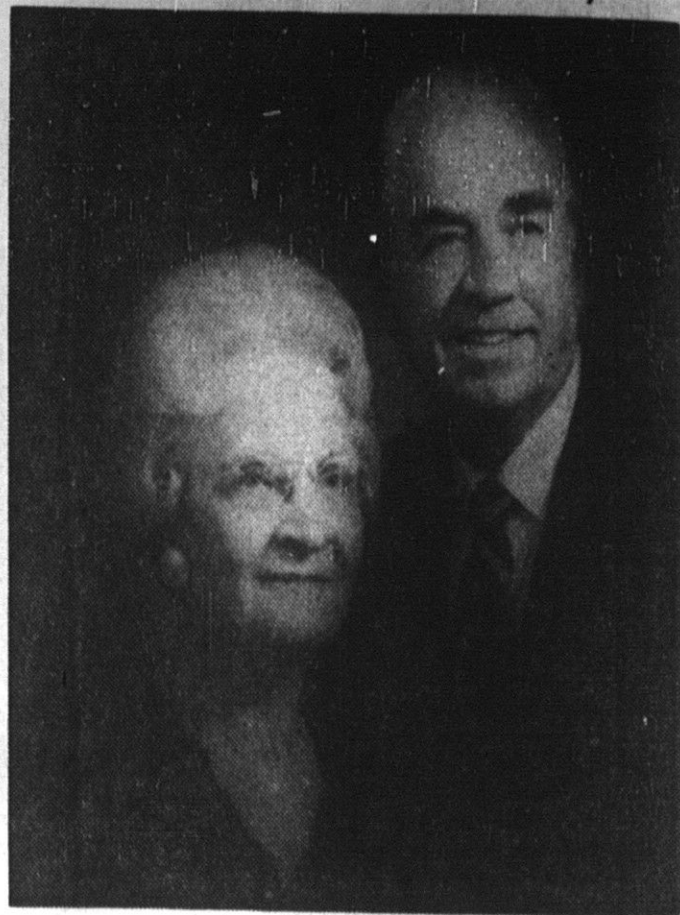

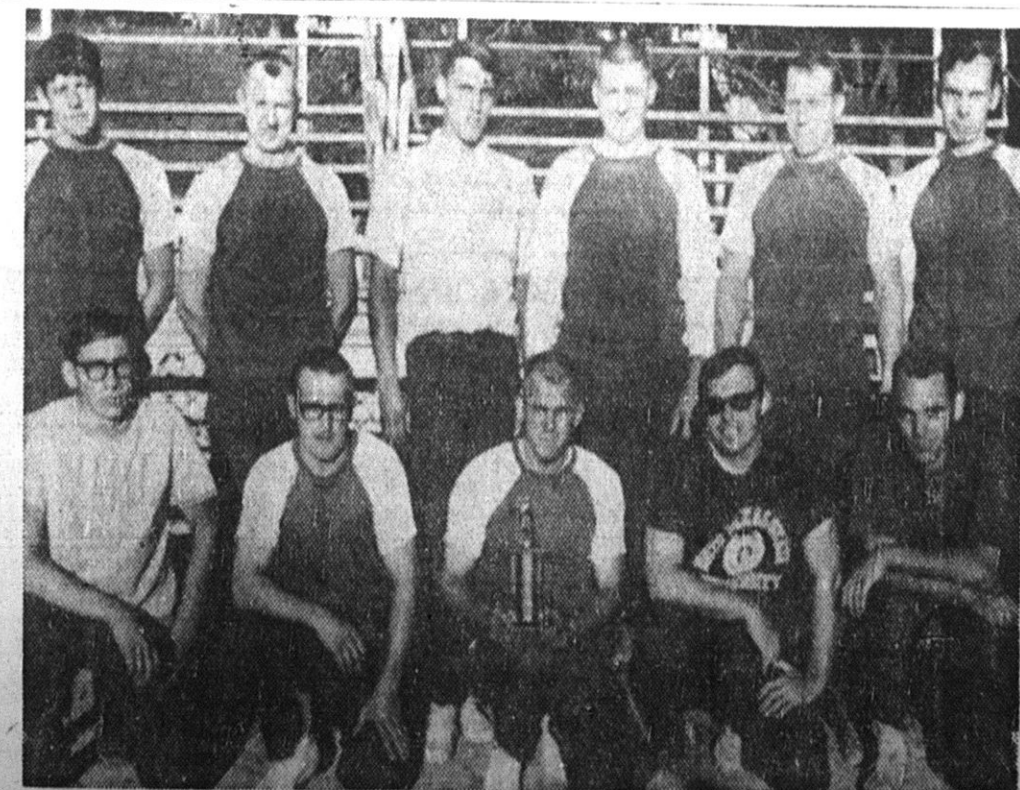
Excellent lighting and a well designed duplex studio apartment set by Geoffrey D. Fishburn provided the framework for a production which moved extremely well.

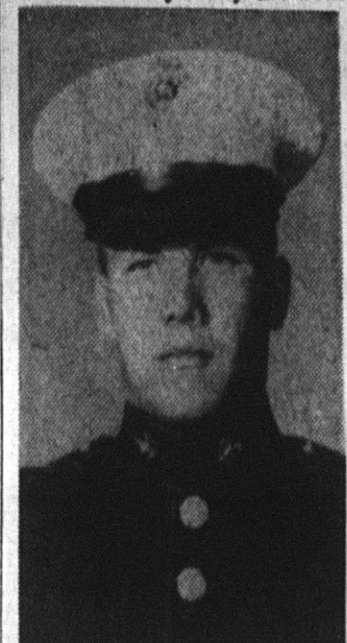

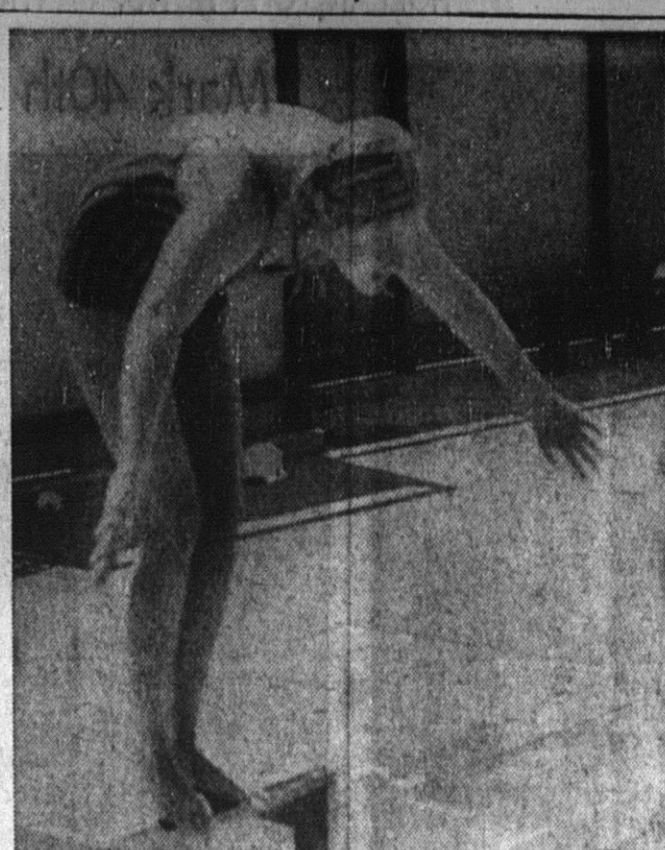

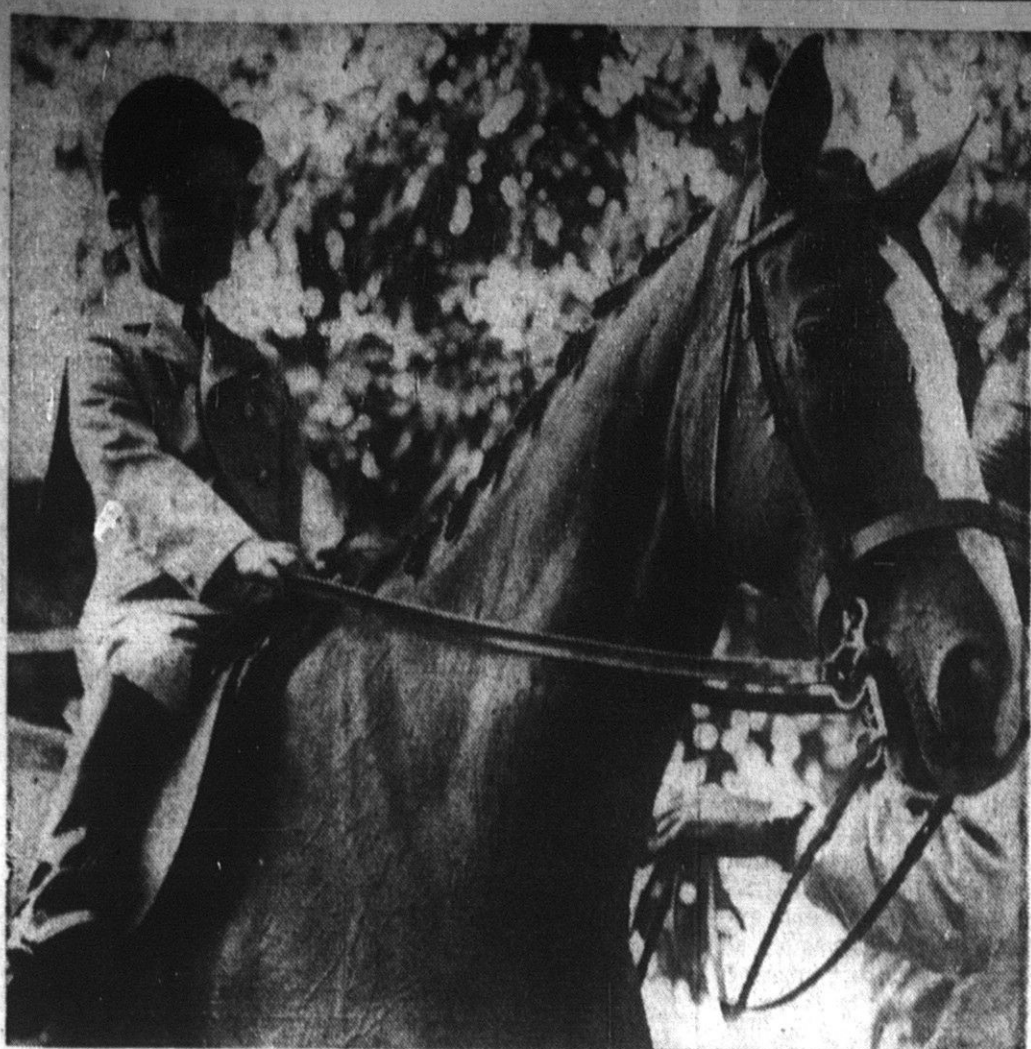

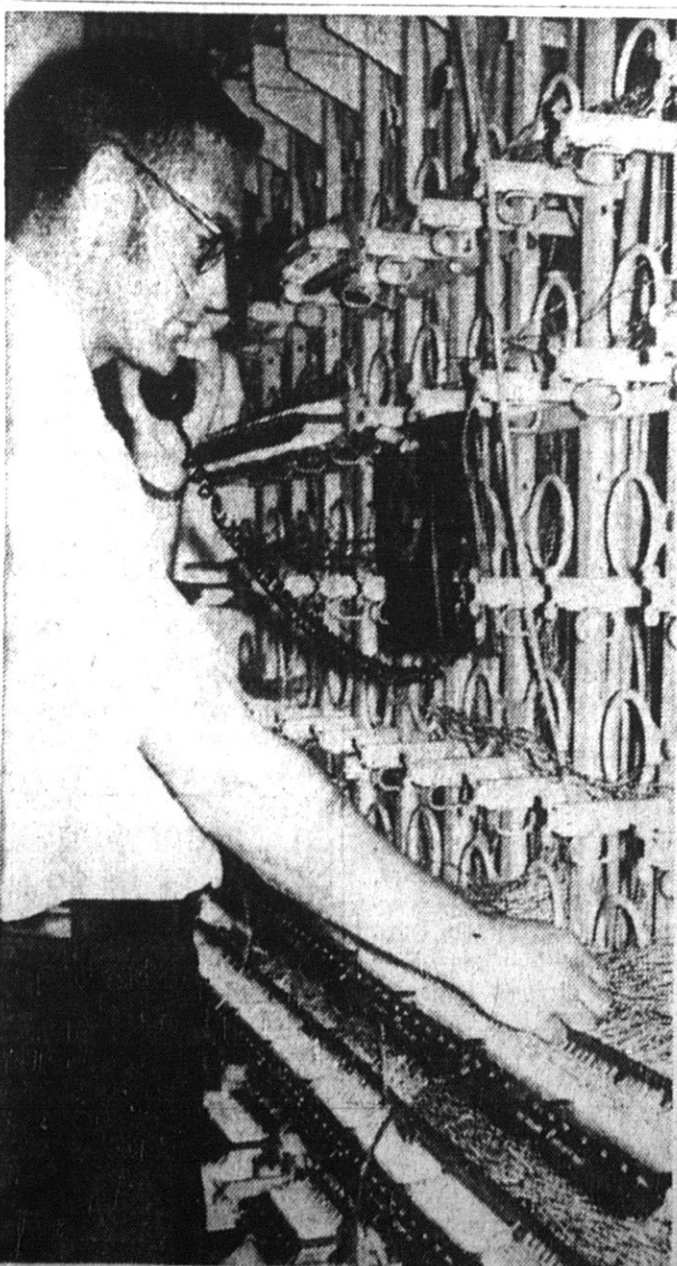

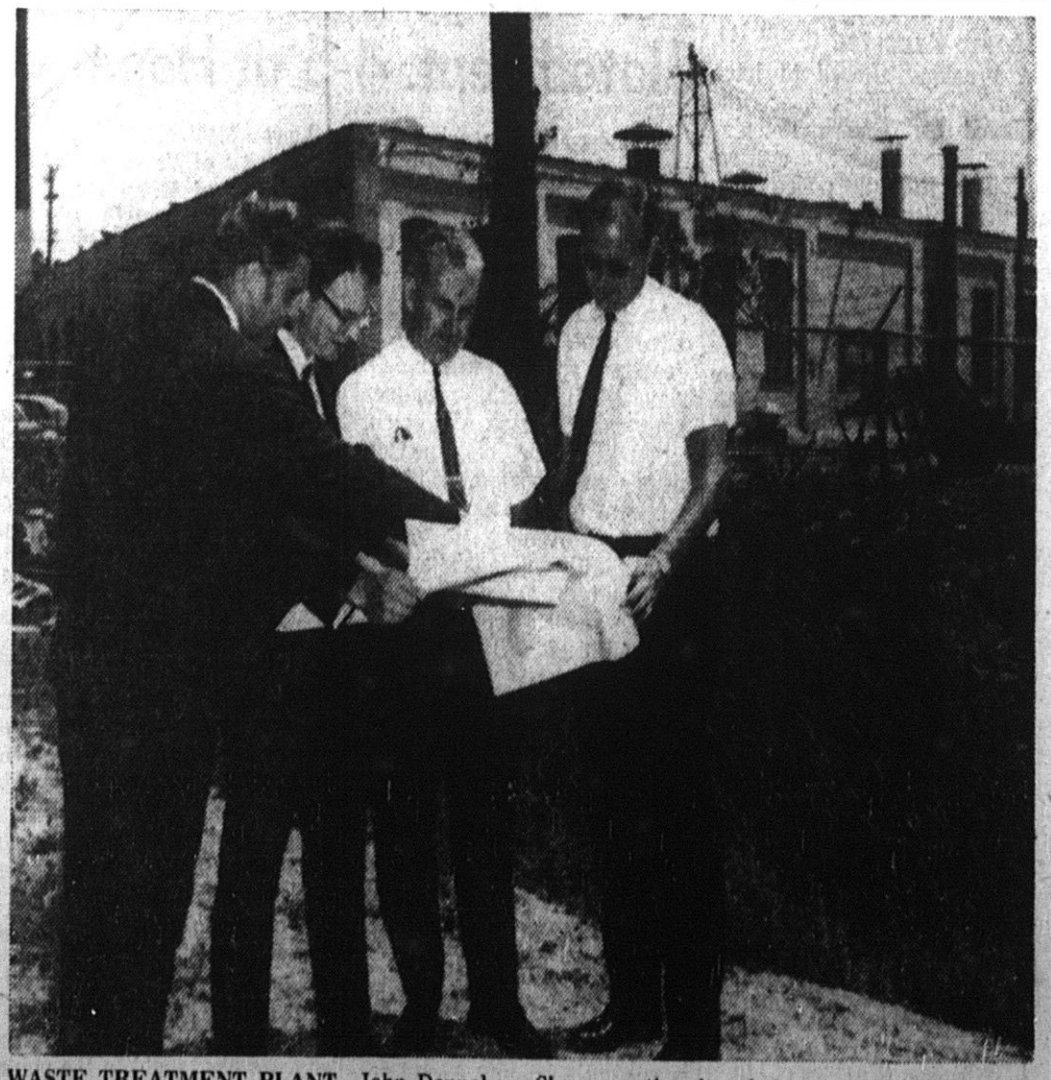

Coach Ron Weatherbee of West Ottawa High School is beginning his ninth season as head football coach of the Panthers. Weatherbee is a former graduate of Zeeland High and Hope College.

Mike DeVree, a starting tackle from last year's team along with right tackle, Buzz Haltenhoff seem to have the inside track for starting berths this year. Others fighting for jobs are letterwinner, Dan Brand, Mike Allen, Joe Nawn, Dave MacQueen and Mike Clark, a transfer student from Decatur.

MacQueen is the biggest boy on the team at 225 pounds. Frank Silva and Jon Dittmar two letterwinners from last year's squad are battling it out for starting guard positions on this year's squad with Larry Schutte, Tim Empson, Bob Vandenberg, Tony Dekker and Joel Glupker. Vandenberg is a letterwinner.

The backfield seems to be one of the strongest positions on the team as Les Zimmermaand a starting tailback has been switched to quarterback and according to Weatherbee, "has looked good."

Holland Center Provides Activities for Youngsters

"What do Holland kids need?" That was the question. The answer, thought many: a service-center. And the seed was planted for what is now known as The Good Samaritan Center (Centro 1 Buen Samaritano).

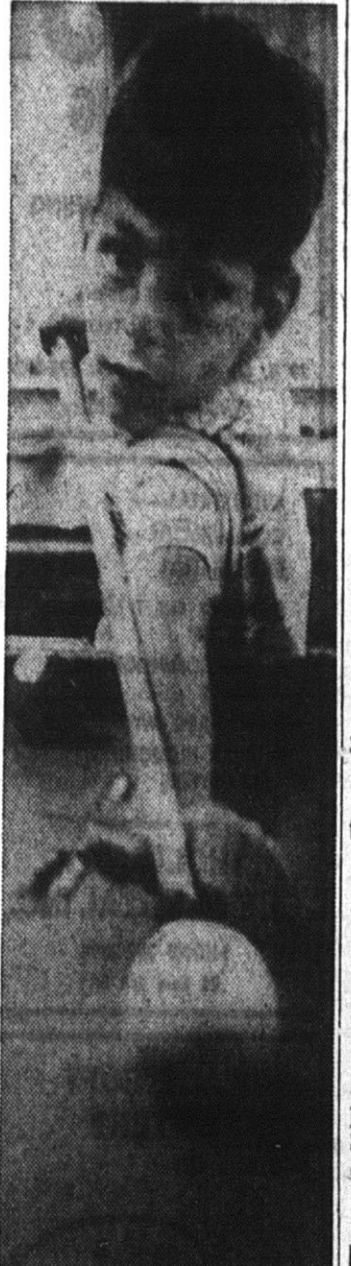
The requirements were great—a place for the center, equipment for educational and recreational programs, a staff and financial assistance. But an inter-denominational, evangelical effort set out to meet these needs.

Use of the building on the corner of 15th St. and Central Avenue was granted by the Holland Christian School system, equipment was donated by individuals who also volunteered their time to staff the center, and the Missions Classis of the Christian Reformed Church provided a director for the program, Ralph Kickert.

With basic needs met, the center opened this spring with recreational programs for children and the community and classes for adults. A summer afternoon finds youngsters playing pool, ping-pong or games in the recreation room or chatting with friends or one of the volunteer staff. Or for Tuesday visitors there is an arts and Crafts class.

Director Kickert sees the tutorial program as one of the greatest successes in the short history of the center. When Mrs. Gerald Van Wyk, director of public schools' summer reading program, shared with Kickert the needs of 40 youngsters who were unable to be enrolled in the summer school program, the plan for volunteer tutors began to develop.

Some 28 children now receive tutorial help in reading from adults, college and high school volunteers, who work with the children on a one to one basis. In an effort to show the children that reading is fun, many of the tutors have taken their students to Herrick Public

Library where they participate in reading programs.

While the summer program is fairly unstructured, with the opening of school in the fall the program will become more structured. After school activities will begin at about 3:30 each afternoon and run until about 5. Storytime, arts and crafts classes and movies as well as recreational activities will highlight the program for the younger set.

Some of the basic programs will include sewing and knitting classes, English classes, remedial reading, counseling, information and referral service, distribution of Christian literature, the Big Brother and Big Sister Program and family help.

The first sewing class, started in May for women who were assisted in sewing skills by volunteers on a one-to-one basis, now work to make "ditty bags" for the Red Cross. There first project was that of making dresses.

A class in homemaking will be given this fall, taught by volunteers who will have attended classes of instruction led by a home economist from Michigan State University.

Hobby classes will make up a major part of the children's classes this fall in the building that once housed the Holland Christian Junior High School.

Director Kickert holds a master's degree in Christian education from Western Theological Seminary and has worked with the Y.M.C.A. program, has directed the Eastern Avenue Community Center of Grand Rapids, has counseled at Custer Job Corps Center and has worked with the Holland City Mission.

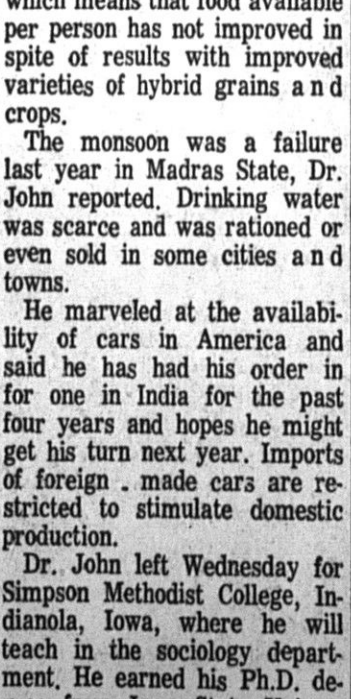

July 1969 Session

The Board of Supervisors met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, July 14, 1969 at 1:30 p.m. and was called to order by the Chairman, Mr. William L. Kennedy.

Mr. Lawrence Vredevoogd pronounced the invocation.

The Minutes of the June 25, 1969 meeting were read.

Mr. Lamb moved that the minutes be approved as read which motion carried.

Mr. Michael Duffy of Hilton Frost Co. presented the survey for office equipment owned by Ottawa County. He stated that 30 per cent of the equipment was purchased between 1969 and 1964, 24 per cent between 1964 and 1959, and 1959 and older, 37 per cent.

Mr. De Pree moved that the report be turned over to the Building and Grounds Committee for further study and to report back to the Board with recommendations which motion carried.

Mr. Glenn Timmer, Civil Defense Director presented his Depts. report. Mr. DeKock moved that the report be received and filed which motion carried.

A Representative of the Michigan Gas Utilities Corp. appeared and stated that the individual space heaters, water heater, pool heater and the pipeline would be installed at Camp Pottawatomie for the sum of \$5,375.

As the new addition to the County Bldg. is almost complete, Mr. Geerlings moved that the Improvement Committee prepare open house arrangements which motion carried.

A letter was read from the Michigan Townships Association asking for membership dues in the sum of \$75.

Mr. Vander Laan moved that the dues be paid and \$75 be transferred from the Contingent fund to the Bd. of Supervisors budget.

Mr. De Pree moved as a substitute motion that the matter be referred to the Ways & Means Committee to study this request further and report back to the Board which motion carried.

Letters were read from Governor Milliken, State Senator Byker and State Representative Farnsworth thanking the Board for sending Resolutions regarding the Boards stand on certain issues.

Mr. Vander Laan moved that the letters be received and filed which motion carried.

Letters were read from Raymond Vander Laan, Edward Langeland and C. J. Yntema, Funeral Directors in Ottawa County advising the Board that after August 31, 1969 they would discontinue their Ambulance Service.

A letter was read from Ronald Baker, Engineer - Manager of the County Road Commission regarding a fence along the South boundary of Tunnel Park, he stated that their position has been that they fence property to keep people out and not in and that perhaps this obligation if it is serious concern to the residents, should be theirs.

Mr. Schuitema moved that the study for the replacement of radar equipment in the Sheriff's Dept. be considered in the 1970 budget which motion carried.

Mr. Schipper reported on the West Michigan Park problem—they do not feel that they can improve on the 8 points as presented in Mr. Wells letter. The Road Commission

has referred this to their Attorney. Mr. Schipper moved that the report be received and filed which motion carried.

Mr. Ball reported on the Dental Program and moved that the matter be referred to the Health Committee to study and meet with private dentists to see if they can be handled on a contractual basis and also the feasibility of an expanded dental program and to report back to the Board which motion carried.

Mr. Ball stated that Dr. Schaffenaar, former Health Director, has presented his Committee a bill for services in the sum of \$499.96 which the County obligated to pay because of a contract agreement. There is a surplus in the salary budget in the Health Dept. Budget.

Mr. Ball moved that the bill be paid.

Mr. Schipper moved as a substitute motion that the matter be referred to the Prosecuting Attorney meeting with the Health Committee and to report back in the August session which motion carried.

Mr. Vander Laan stated that his Committee is not ready to report on the hiring of a Health Director. A report was presented by Mr. Schmidt, Chr. of the Ways & Means Committee. After making a comparison with 5 other Counties of comparable size as Ottawa County, This Committee recommended that the Present remuneration for County Supervisors remain the same.

Mr. Schmidt moved that the report be adopted which motion carried.

Mr. Schipper moved that the matter of determining who should be on the Lake Macatawa Inter Municipality Committee and the matter of dues be tabled until the August session which motion carried.

Mr. Wade reported that no Ordinance is necessary if there is a Main lock and sign indicating opening and closing time of the Park lot, if there is no chain then an ordinance is necessary, the Committee will report back in the August session.

Mr. Wade stated that he had one bid for draperies in the new addition to the County Bldg.

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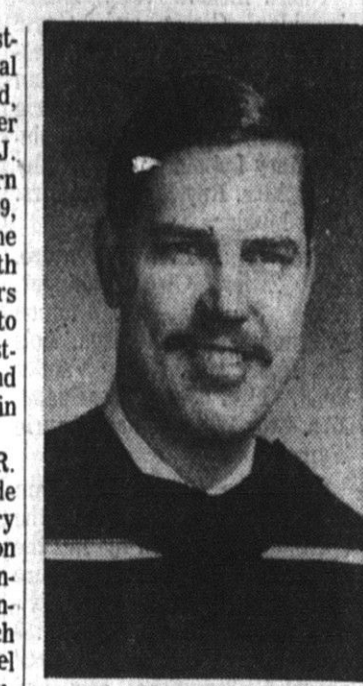
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
