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Youth Given 2-10 Years In Shooting

GRAND HAVEN — Terry Hamilton, 21, Muskegon, charged with assault with intent to do great bodily harm, less than murder, was sentenced to two to 10 years in Southern Michigan Prison when he appeared in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday.

He was arrested by state police and Grand Haven police following the shooting of Pamela Shereton, 19, of Grand Haven, near her home on Grand Ave. early Sept. 4. She was shot in the cheek and drove to North Ottawa Community Hospital, where she recovered. Hamilton was given 32 days credit for time served in jail and Judge Raymond L. Smith recommended the minimum sentence. "For such a serious offense," the judge said, "you must be convinced this is not a harsh sentence. For some reason I can't explain I feel you have learned a lesson."

He told Hamilton he has given an extremely lame excuse for firing the gun. The judge said he had no excuse for having a gun, for following Miss Shereton in her car and for leaving the girl in the car after the shooting.

Tim Francis Boynton, 35, Grand Rapids, charged on two counts of breaking and entering occupied dwellings in Jenison, was sentenced to five to 15 years in prison, with no recommendation by the court. Boynton and three others were arrested Oct. 2 by sheriff's officers after a series of thefts in several parts of the county. Alvin Roomsburg, 42, Grand Rapids, pleaded guilty Monday of aiding Boynton and will be sentenced Nov. 22.

Larry Ritsema, 32, of 219 West 19th St., Holland, charged with larceny by conversion, must pay fine and costs of \$200, and Patricia Ruth Murray, 20, Grand Rapids, charged with simple larceny, was placed on probation for a year and must pay costs of \$50.

Six other persons were arraigned before Judge Smith Monday. Roger Lee Westerhof, 34, of 5 South River Ave., Holland, pleaded guilty to drunk driving, second offense, and will be sentenced Dec. 13.

Theodore Turic, 18, of 141495 James St., Holland, pleaded innocent to indecent exposure. Mildred Kindle, 23, Muskegon Heights, pleaded innocent to larceny from a building, and Era Ann Hardy, 22, Muskegon Heights, pleaded innocent to stealing a credit card.

Regina Gale Key, 22, of 75 East Ninth St., Holland, pleaded guilty to uttering and publishing a bad check, and Wilfred Rios of Holland pleaded guilty to disposing of LSD. They will be sentenced Nov. 22.

Hope Opens Basketball Drills With 7 Veterans

Hope College and the MIAA officially opened basketball drills this week.

Coach Russ DeVette, who is in his 19th season as head mentor at Hope has seven returning lettermen back from last year's club that ended the season 13-9 overall and 7-5 in the league.

Seniors Dan Shinabarger of Holland and Marty Snoop of Wyoming and junior Tom Wolters of Fennville form the nucleus around which DeVette hopes to build a challenger to MIAA co-champions Calvin and Olivet.

Shinabarger and Snoop are co-captains of the 1971-72 squad and DeVette expects each mem-

ber of the veteran trio "to be better than they've been before." He added, "they've been working hard."

Shinabarger, record-breaking scorer and all-MIAA guard, has been Hope's top scorer for the past two seasons and No. 2 in the league to Alma's graduated Charles Hudson both years.

Snoop, a 6'4" forward was second to Shinabarger in scoring and second to Wolters in rebounding last season.

Other returning lettermen are 6'3" junior Dave Harmelink, burly 6'4" senior Jack Hankamp and junior football players Doug Smith and Doug Edema, who will get off to a late start because of the length of the football season.

Smith, an all-MIAA defensive back, appears the best bet to start beside Shinabarger at guard after he makes the conversion from the gridiron to the hard court.

The key to Hope's title chances, according to DeVette, is finding a forward, "who can rebound with the bigger forwards in our league."

Among the candidates for the job are sometime starter Harmelink, Hankamp, Edema and sophomores Gordon Vander Slice and Tim Graham, up from last year's freshmen team.

Area freshmen candidates include Holland's Greg Slenk, Grand Haven's Glenn Pfeiffer, Kentwood's Tom Johnson, Spring Lake's Jim Nienhouse, plus Paul Miller of Washington, D.C.

Hope's 22-game schedule includes games against Grand Valley State College and Aquinas College, the usual home-and-away series with league members Adrian, Alma, Albion, Kalamazoo, Olivet and Calvin, plus non-league games with Earlham, Concordia, Spring Arbor, Trinity Christian and Lake Forest.

Miller Heads Hope Drive In Zeeland

Jack Miller, executive vice-president of the Howard Miller Clock Co., will head the 1971 Hope College community campaign in Zeeland.

The campaign will be launched Nov. 16 at a kickoff breakfast in Phelps Hall on the Hope campus.

The drive is part of a concerted effort of leading businessmen and industrialists in western Michigan to raise \$100,000 to support the capital development and special educational programs of the college.

Miller indicated that part of his willingness to accept this responsibility is the deep belief which he possesses in Christian higher education and the necessity to maintain a dual system of public and private education in America.

Dr. William Vander Lugt, chancellor of Hope College, noted that the college community has maintained over the years an especially warm relationship with Zeeland. Two of the largest gifts in the history of Hope College have come from residents of Zeeland — the gift of John Van Zoeren of the Van Zoeren Library in 1961 and the gift of Jack and Richard DeWitt for the recently completed student and cultural center.

Insurance Program Reviewed

A review of the Holland School District insurance plan at the monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night revealed that school property, real and personal, is listed at \$10,696,622.

Dale Van Lente and David Lake, listed as agent of record for the Holland Insurance Agency, said the fire insurance is figured on a replacement cost basis at no coinsurance penalty provided yearly revisions are made.

And because of low crime and vandalism in Holland, the local insurance is figured on a discount rate, Van Lente said. He added that insurance covers camera equipment, musical instruments, cars and buses, comprehensive, personal injuries and certain blanket policies. He said basic rates are set up by the Michigan Inspection Bureau. Fees are shared with local agents and the balance goes into a special fund to benefit the community.

Certain recommendations were made, and the board will review options and suggestions and consider updating appraisals.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman said the Holland Council for Inter-School Cooperation is being revived and an organizational meeting has been scheduled at 2:30 p.m. Thursday in Voorhees lounge. Lamont Dirke is the current chairman. The council was founded about 10 years ago for schools in the community. Besides the Holland public schools are the Holland Christian Schools, Hope College, St. Francis and Seventh Day Adventist. Aim of the council is to study problems of mutual concern to all schools and share ideas.

On recommendation of the personnel committee, the board approved hiring a coach for senior high girls' interscholastic basketball on both varsity and junior varsity levels. The recommendation came from Ken Bauman, athletic director.

A report on driver education for the summer of 1971 revealed a total enrollment of 585 of whom 564 successfully completed the course and 21 failed to pass minimum requirements. The 1972 calendar calls for three sessions of four weeks each: June 12 to July 7; July 10 to Aug. 4; and Aug. 7 to Sept. 1.

The board approved a contract for Lynda Dethmers, a 1971 Hope College graduate, as an elementary teacher.

Don Rohlick, HEA president, commended the Holland Evening Sentinel and others for cooperation during National Education Week which featured pictures and articles and classroom visitations.

West Ottawa Quartet Named To Honors Choir

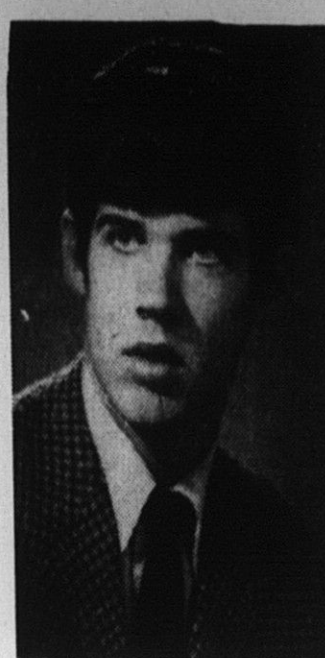

The purchaser receives a numbered stake which identifies the contestant during the blooming season next May. Sales are limited to city residents.

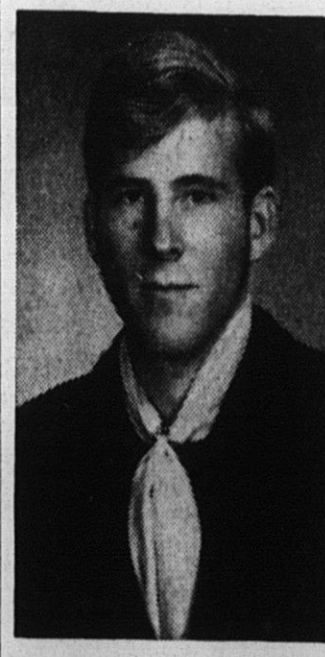

School Budget Set At \$4.8 Million

A 1971-72 budget for Holland school district calling for just under \$5 million was adopted at the monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in the high school library.

Board Treasurer Charles L. Bradford Jr., who presented the budget, said some items of the budget are not entirely clear, particularly phase II of President Nixon's wage freeze, but that generally the budget is figured on the conservative side.

Board President James O. Lamb said budgets are usually adopted in May or June but the last few years state aid was not determined until August or September, thus delaying action.

Total estimated revenues list \$4,896,569.51, or \$368,637.07 more than was collected last year. Estimated balance June 30, 1972, will be \$127,057.98.

Included in the revenues: from current taxes, \$3,382,512.14 (based on 26.045 mills on state equalized valuations; state aid, \$1,254,952; delinquent taxes, \$40,000; co-op reimbursement, \$31,500; tuition, \$8,000; vocational education reimbursement, \$30,000; interest on investments, \$40,000; drivers ed, \$19,260; special ed (intermediate), \$50,000.

Total estimated expenditures of \$4,769,511.53 include \$3,442,053.13 as grand total for instruction.

The instruction breakdown lists: elementary instruction, \$1,635,887.68; junior high instruction, \$867,727.76; junior high extra pay and athletic expense, \$13,428.40; senior high instruction, \$887,376.09; senior high extra pay for special duties, \$29,453.50; extra pay for department chairman, \$8,179.80.

Other items under expenditures list: special education, \$306,338.40; administration, \$161,330; health services, \$11,500; pupil transportation, \$67,970; plant operation, \$455,155; plant maintenance, \$94,557; fixed charges, \$140,350; capital outlay, \$78,000; community services, \$5,058; tuition to other districts, \$7,200.

A copy of the budget is on file at the administrative office. Monday's meeting was in the nature of a public hearing, but there were no questions or comments from the audience.

President Lamb presided at the meeting which lasted just over one hour. All members were present except John Weeber, Mrs. Katherine MacKenzie gave the invocation.

Collection Of Essays Are Published

Dr. Charles A. Huttar, chairman of the English department at Hope College has published a collection of 20 original essays on literature and the Christian faith entitled "Imagination and the Spirit."

Gathered as a tribute to Prof. Clyde Kilby of Wheaton (Ill.) College in honor of his approaching retirement, the 500-page volume was formally presented Oct. 21 at a literature conference at Wheaton.

Contributors include professional colleagues of Kilby, and former students. Among them are such widely known authors as Chad Walsh and Calvin D. Linton in the United States, and Owen Barfield, A.M. Hadfield, and Walter Hooper in England.

Several of the essays are on C. S. Lewis, the Oxford Christian apologist who has been one of Kilby's chief scholarly interests. One piece on Lewis' "Narnia" stories for children presents drawings by Lewis and other previously unpublished manuscript material.

The essay on Charles Williams' poetry is by Mrs. Hadfield, who worked with Williams before and during World War II.

Other contributions center around contemporary writers such as Bernard Malamud, Flannery O'Connor, and Howard Nemerov.

Studies of older writers in the "Christian tradition" range from Chaucer and medieval lyrics to Wordsworth and Coleridge.

Building Activity Up In Holland

Holland city experienced a busy month in building activity during October when 87 building permits were issued for a total of \$1,404,941. The greater share of the total was accounted for in an industrial permit for Lear-Siegler Home division.

According to the monthly report compiled by Building Inspector Jack Langefeldt, there were nine houses including a duplex for \$188,817; two residential accessory, \$10,600; 27 residential alterations, \$31,330; four residential accessory, \$5,050; seven commercial, \$80,500; one industrial, \$1,081,159; two swimming pools, \$7,000; four fences, \$495; seven signs and eight demolitions.

Saugatuck Studies Joint Police Force

SAUGATUCK — A proposed Saugatuck-Douglas police department was ordered to undergo further study Monday by the Saugatuck Village Council.

In unanimous actions the council voted to refer the issue to the police committee for study of a regional police force with Saugatuck, Douglas and Saugatuck township.

The Douglas Village Council last week approved a joint Douglas-Saugatuck police force. Under the proposed plan, Douglas police would patrol both villages for 12 out of every 36 hours while Saugatuck would patrol 24 out of 36 hours. At present each department covers its own village.

GVSC Sewer System Now Too Small

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa county may soon have its first public spray irrigation system to dispose of sewage, it was reported at the November meeting of the Board of Commissioners Monday.

Roger Zeeff of the county sanitation and water utilities department, a part of the road commission, reported to the board that the present lagoon system installed 10 years ago at Allendale for Grand Valley State College has received its capacity.

With big increases in enrollment expected at the college and with the growth of the area near the college, in Allendale and Georgetown townships, a larger system is needed. The county has one private spray irrigation system in operation, at the Bil-Mar turkey farm in Borculo.

The operation must be expanded to meet the needs up to 1981, Zeeff told the board, and state and federal funds are being sought to finance 75 per cent of the cost. The estimated cost to be underwritten by the county board is \$243,500. This will be paid for by revenue and the sewer rates in the area will be doubled, according to Zeeff.

The college board endorses the project and the concept of the plan has been approved by the road commission, the county's planning committee and the drainage and sanitation committee.

The system now covers only eight acres, including lagoons, and a total of 140 acres would be needed near the lagoons. The material would be sprayed over the area to fertilize farmland and the land would be rented out to farmers.

Zeeff explained that he sought approval of the concept of the plan from the board Monday and later will ask for the full faith and credit of the county when it seeks to buy bonds to finance the work.

The board adjourned at 3 p.m. to the large conference room to see motion pictures of the operation of the sludge operations in the Chicago area. The planning committee, headed by Thomas De Pree, commissioner from Holland, reported that 10 county officials visited Springfield, Ill., and other Illinois areas, where sewage sludge from metropolitan Chicago is shipped by rail in tank cars to farm areas and pumped on farmland.

Richard Anderson of SEMCO, the Soil Enrichment Materials Corp. of Chicago, will be brought to Ottawa county soon to investigate conditions in the county and ascertain whether the shipment of such sludge "trains" would be practical in this area.

The Ottawa officials spent two days on the tour in a rented bus and visited Springfield, where a disposal unit is located, and the Chicago sanitary district stockpile of sludge at Cuba, Ill.

The planning committee also reported on a meeting it held with other committees Monday morning to discuss the facilities and space needs study for county operations, especially in the fast-growing Jenison area.

The board authorized a needs study as part of the 1972 county planning program. Facilities are needed in the more heavily populated sections of the county for the mental health and the health departments, and the social welfare department. De Pree said that intense work will be initiated in January with a completion date and study report scheduled for midyear 1972.

Residents of the county near Grand Rapids have claimed that facilities and buildings are adequate for public services in the population centers at Holland and Zeeland and at Grand Haven and Spring Lake but little has been done in Georgetown.

"This study," De Pree said, "is designed to determine which services, if any, may be required in the immediate or distant future for the east Ottawa area and to evaluate these needs in terms of overall county service needs and efficiencies."

Philip Hillaire Speaks To Reading Teachers

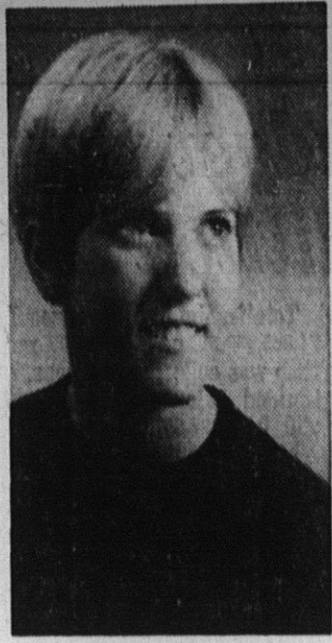
Area teachers attended a slide-lecture and dinner meeting sponsored Monday evening at Phelps Hall by the Ottawa county chapter of the International Reading Association.

Philip Hillaire, reading consultant for Oakland county, was featured.

Mr. Hillaire, who has traveled extensively in England, titled his presentation "Lessons from Great Britain for Promoting Language Development" and preceded the formal talk with slides showing scenes in and around London.

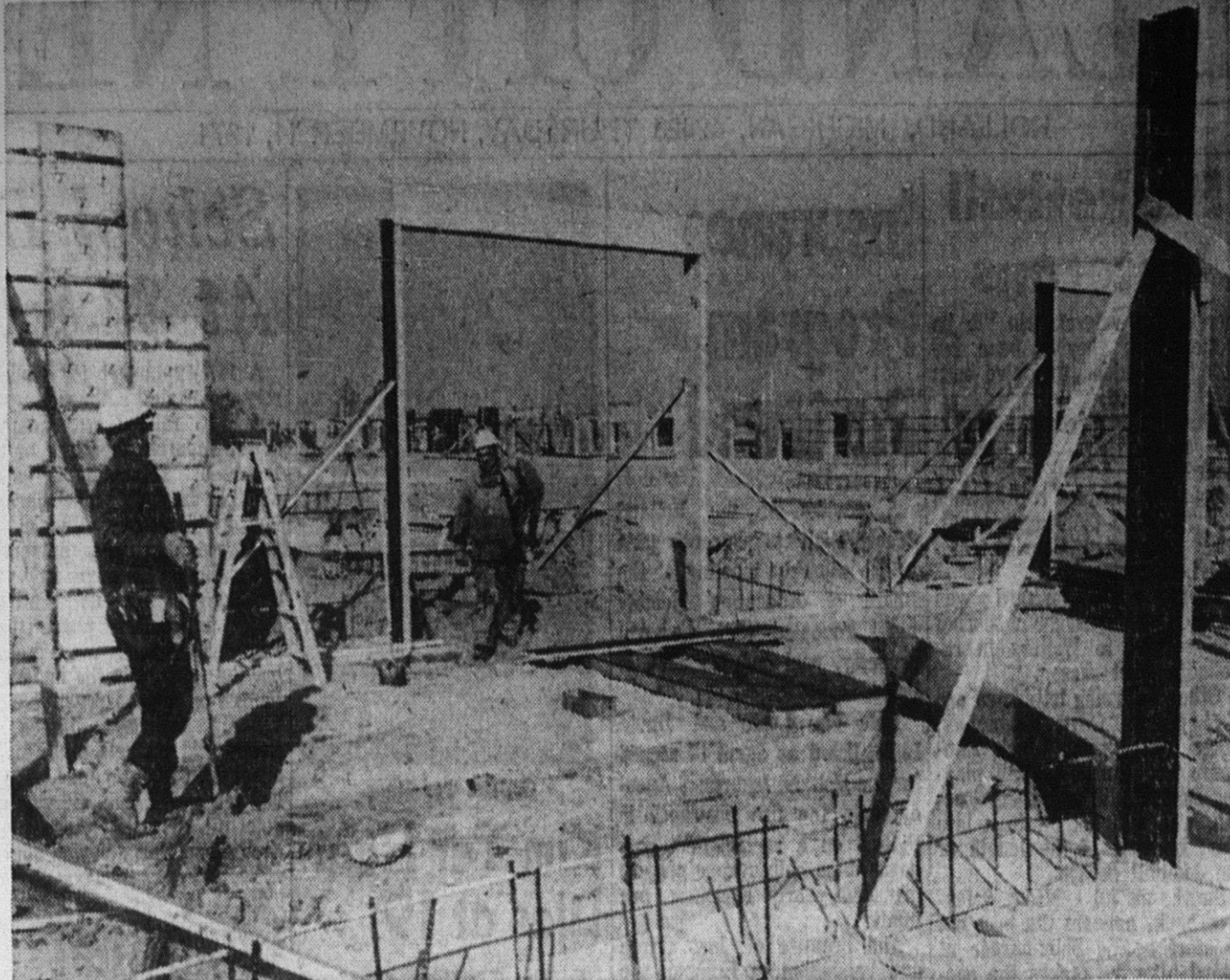
Jacob Garvelink Dies at Age 80

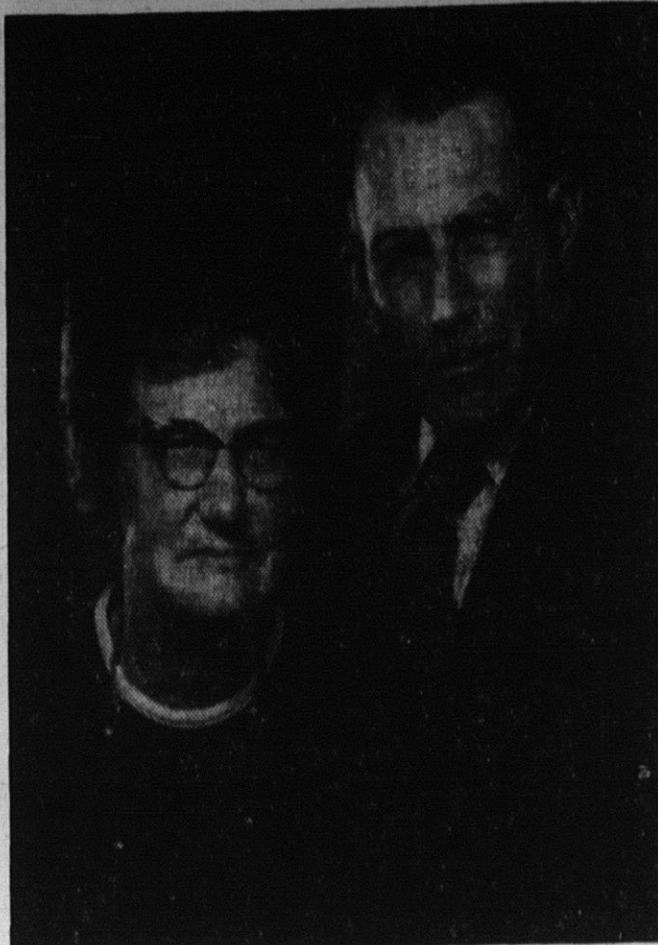

Questers Hear Talk on History Of Snuff Boxes

Mrs. Stanley Curtis reviewed the history of snuff boxes at a meeting of the Eta Phi chapter of Questers Monday in the home of Mrs. William Bradford.

Mrs. Curtis said people carried snuff in all kinds of decorative boxes in the latter half of the 1700's and the early 1800's, much as people today carry a pack of cigarettes in containers. Ancient medics including Hippocrates prescribed the inhaling of smoke or chewing of roots. When Columbus arrived on his first long voyage Oct. 12, 1492, he threw away the tobacco leaves the Indians presented to him, not knowing they were the most precious gift the Indians could bring.

Snuff played a social role for about 300 years, starting with medicinal purposes and evolving into a fashionable practice until replaced by smoking. Snuff taking declined rapidly around 1837 in the time of Queen Victoria.

Mrs. Curtis displayed many snuff boxes, snuff bottles, perfume bottles and tobacco boxes, some of them in her family for many years. Most are silver but a few are of pewter.

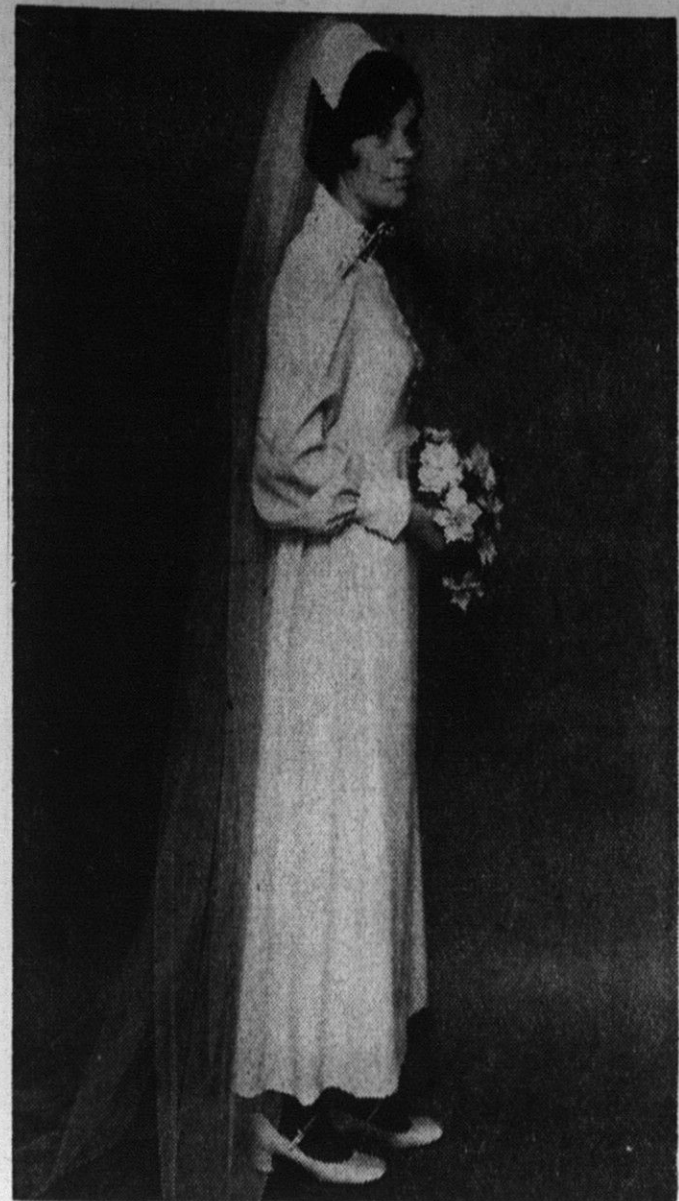

Smith, service officer for Chapter 14, will assist any veteran who needs service work done.

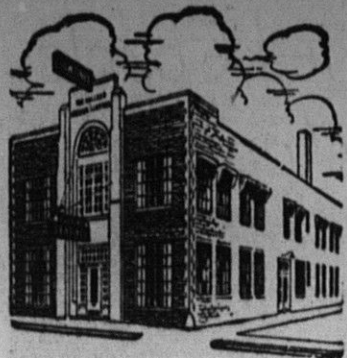

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 14
God Establishes Moral Order
Romans 2:12-16; Galatians 6:7-9
By C. P. Dame

We hear and read much about law and order for there is a great amount of lawlessness in our world. We have more lawlessness in spite of more education. God established the moral order and expects us to be obedient to His law for our own good.

I. We are all sinners and hence God holds us responsible. The lesson text is composed of a passage from Romans and from Galatians. In Romans 1. Paul portrays the pagan world which was without the Bible. However, God revealed Himself in His creation but the people did not pay any attention to this visible revelation and failed to thank God and hence the wrath of God abideth on them. They had a conscience and a sense of right and wrong, but lived as they pleased, not living up to the knowledge which they had. Most people live that way now.

The Gentile world and the Jewish people all broke God's laws and hence were guilty. God is holy, man is sinful and responsible to God.

II. We reap what we sow. "Make no mistake about this: God is not to be fooled; a man reaps what he sows" (N.E.B.). Every generation has people in it who think they can fool God. Usually they learn it is impossible. Unfortunately one generation will not learn from another and so blunders are made which could have been avoided.

Paul mentions two kinds of sowers. Some sow to the flesh, that is to their lower natures, and they reap corruption, and some sow to the Spirit putting the spiritual things first in life. God's spiritual laws are just as reliable as His natural laws. The farmer who sows wheat will not reap corn. Those who sow, guided by the Holy Spirit, will see the fruit of the Spirit in their lives—"love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance"—the virtues which add to life.

What we sow today, will eventually yield a harvest. Parents do well to remember this fact. Young people who now sow, will reap a harvest. What kind will it be? We all face choices. At times the idea comes to the fore that it does not matter what we do and this tends to bring weariness. Helpful therefore are the words, "And let us not be weary in well-doing."

There are several reasons why well-doing becomes tiresome. The promise of the Lord encourages—"for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." Jesus set a fine example. Instead of yielding to the desires of the flesh or the pressures of the times, follow the example of Jesus Christ.

Adrian Ties Alma For MIAA Title

Lady Luck was with Adrian College all the way Saturday, as they were completely outplayed by Hope College but still wound up with a share of the MIAA football crown with Alma College.

The Bulldogs won by a slim 15-13 decision but you would never know it if you were one of the 2,400 fans on hand at Riverview Park because the Dutchmen dominated the contest from the outset to the end but fell short because of mistakes.

Hope rushed for 201 yards and passed for additional 97 yards against the MIAA's top defensive club while the Bulldogs managed only 57 yards on the ground and would you believe it, nothing in the passing department.

With one game to go, Hope has already broken its single-season team total offensive record set in 1958 by a Dutchmen team that won eight of nine games.

Hope's 298 yards Saturday gives the Dutchmen 2,782 total yards compared to the old mark of 2,734.

In fact, the contest was so one-sided that Adrian didn't pick up any first downs until late in the third period and ended up with only three for the day compared to 16 for the Dutchmen. One of Adrian's first downs came on a penalty.

But Adrian capitalized on Hope's miscues to take the triumph on the windy and cold afternoon.

"We never got a break and those mistakes killed us," said Coach Ray Smith.

Indeed they did as the Dutchmen fumbled the pigskin six times and lost four of them while Adrian only bobbled one time and didn't lose the ball at all.

Hope's usual fine punter Doug Smith had a rough time trying to kick into the 30 mph wind that was blowing from the east which gave Adrian good field position throughout most of the game but it didn't make any difference the majority of the time, as Hope's defense was equal to the task.

Adrian took over inside Hope's 50 four times in the first period on two poor punts against the wind and two fumbles.

However Hope's tough defense led by its great middle guard Ted Rycenga, tackles Dave Gosselaar and Jim Flanigan, ends, Craig Schrottenboer, Ted Albrecht and Jeff Stewart and linebackers Doug Nelson and Mark Bolthouse were stopping everything coming their way without any trouble.

When Adrian quarterback Scott Montgomery did try to pass, he was either stopped by the hard charging line or by the Hope secondary which consisted of Jim Courter, Jim Wojcicki, Smith and Bob Lamer. Lamer sustained a sprained ankle and missed the second half. He was replaced by Jim Bosscher.

Adrian tackle Ray Hellowell, who stood only 5'8", but weighed 215, picked up Greg Voss' fumble in mid-air and ran 47 yards for the game's first score with 11:04 to play in the second quarter. Christ Malechikos ran the PAT to make the score 8-0.

Voss managed to break his and Hope's single season rushing mark in the first half on the drive that the Dutchmen scored six points.

Big Albrecht hauled in Jon Constant's eight-yard strike to put the Dutchmen on the scoreboard. Many observers were surprised when Smith decided to go for one instead of two points on the conversion. As it turned out, the kick never got underway, as the snap from center was high.

Hope's touchdown which came with only 1:04 to play in the half cut Adrian's lead to 8-6.

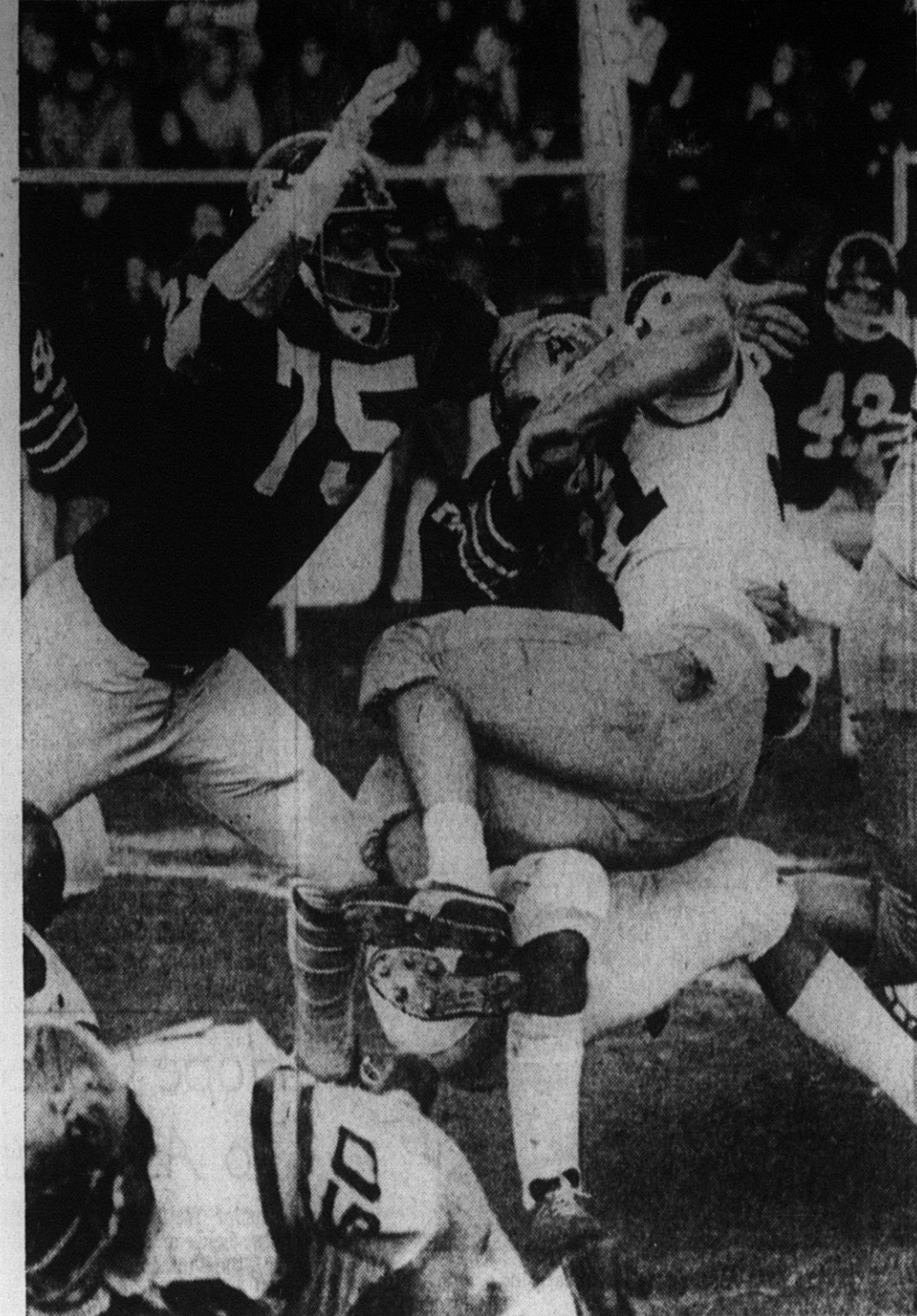
The Dutchmen totaled 198 yards at the half and held Adrian to only 14. The Bulldogs went into the clash by allowing only 198 yards for an entire contest and Hope had already mustered that amount in the first half of action.

A minus four-yard punt by Smith gave Adrian the ball on Hope's five late in the third period when it looked like Coach Bill Davis' gridders made a big mistake by deciding to kick off to start the quarter.

As it turned out Jon Eva plunged in from the one to up Adrian's margin to 15-6 when Pat Wolven kicked the extra point with 1:53 to play.

J. Constant's nifty run on a keeper play resulted in a Hope TD early in the fourth period. Constant swept to his right and out-ran the Adrian secondary to complete a 37-yard jaunt. Mike Hinga's kick cut the deficit to 15-13.

Even though Voss was held to only 67 yards on the ground in 27 carries he busted his own mark by 12 yards with one game to go in the season. In his behalf he was playing the game with a badly bruised left hand that was stepped on during Hope's game with Alma a

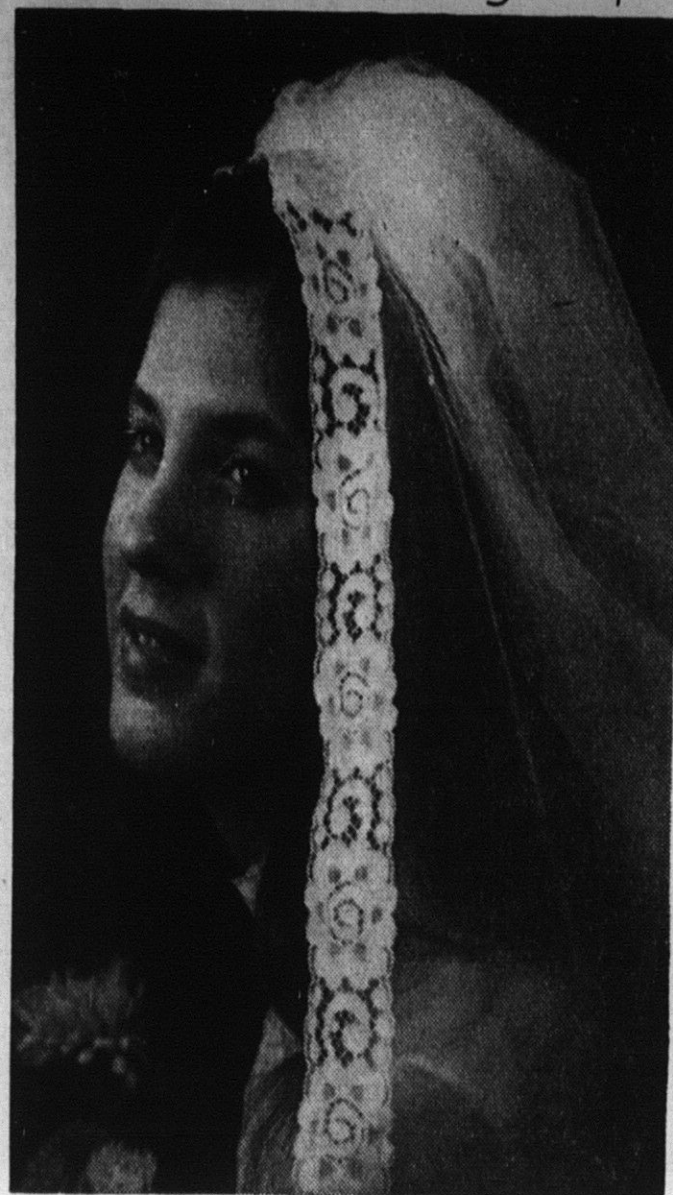

Smokey the Bear says "only you can prevent forest fires." But the Holland Dutch came up with two firebugs (Terry Marlink and Larry Horn) to suffocate the Forest Hills Rangers, 28-18 Friday evening at Riverview Park.

Marlink, who has been taking a back seat to star running back Randy Kuipers all season didn't have to take a back seat Friday to anyone, as he rushed for 162 yards in only nine attempts for a fantastic 18 yards average every time he carried the ball.

The 5'8" Horn, who had been having trouble throwing over his taller opponents didn't have that problem Friday, as he completed three of six passes for 52 yards and two touchdowns and did a fine job of directing the team.

R. Kuipers long punt return set up his touchdown and Holland's third of the night from the five with 4:48 to play in the second stanza. Horn passed to a driving Marlink for the extra points to give the Dutch a 22-6 halftime advantage.

Horn completed his second TD pass of the evening to Brian Ritterby to close out the scoring at 28-18 in the third quarter.

While warming up before the start of the game, Ritterby smacked hard into Kempker while running out for a pass which caused Holland's coach to say, "I haven't been hit that hard since I quit playing football in college."

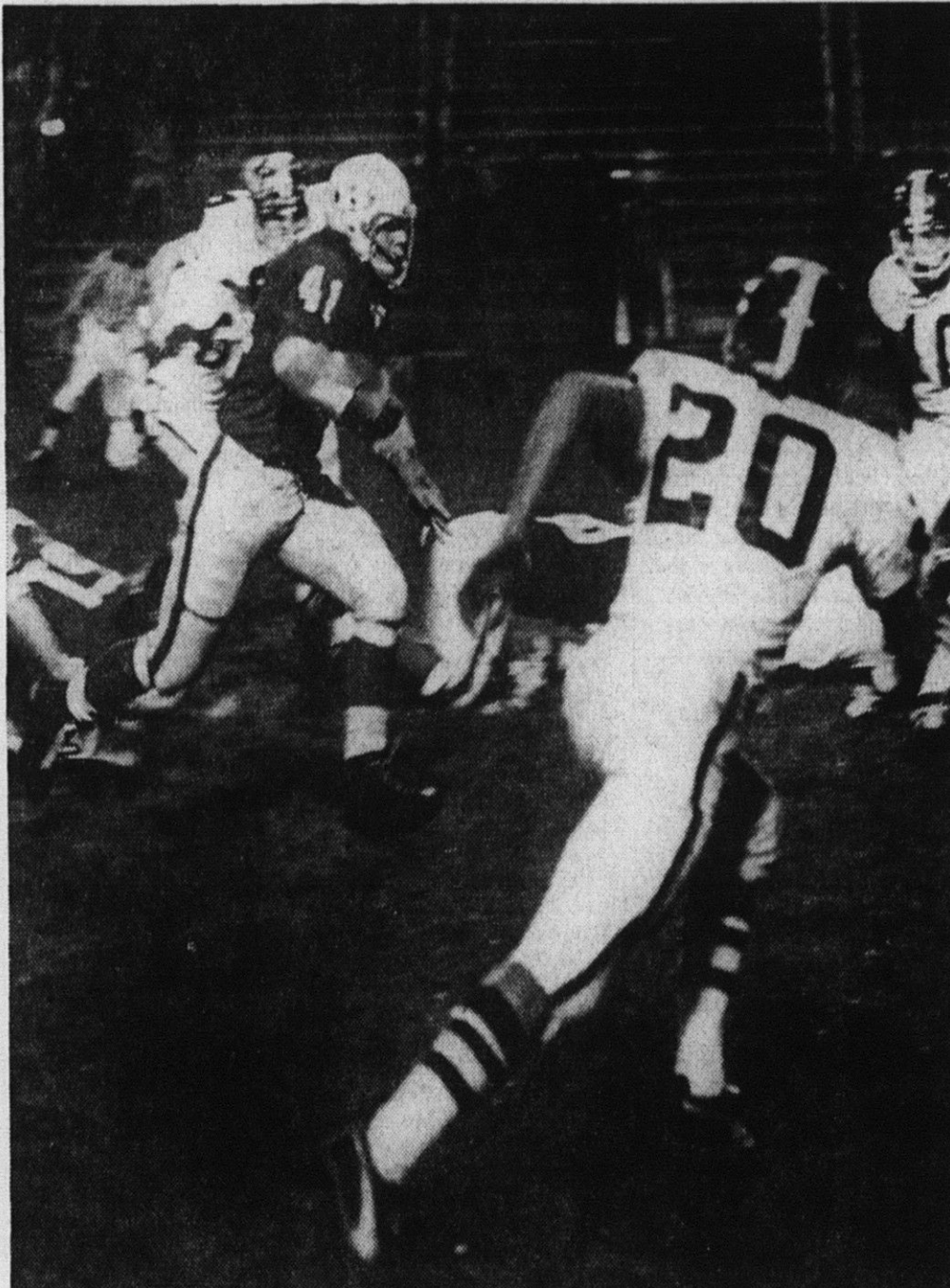
Simpson came up with a sparkling interception to halt one of the Rangers scoring drives while Marlink was running the counter play to perfection all night.

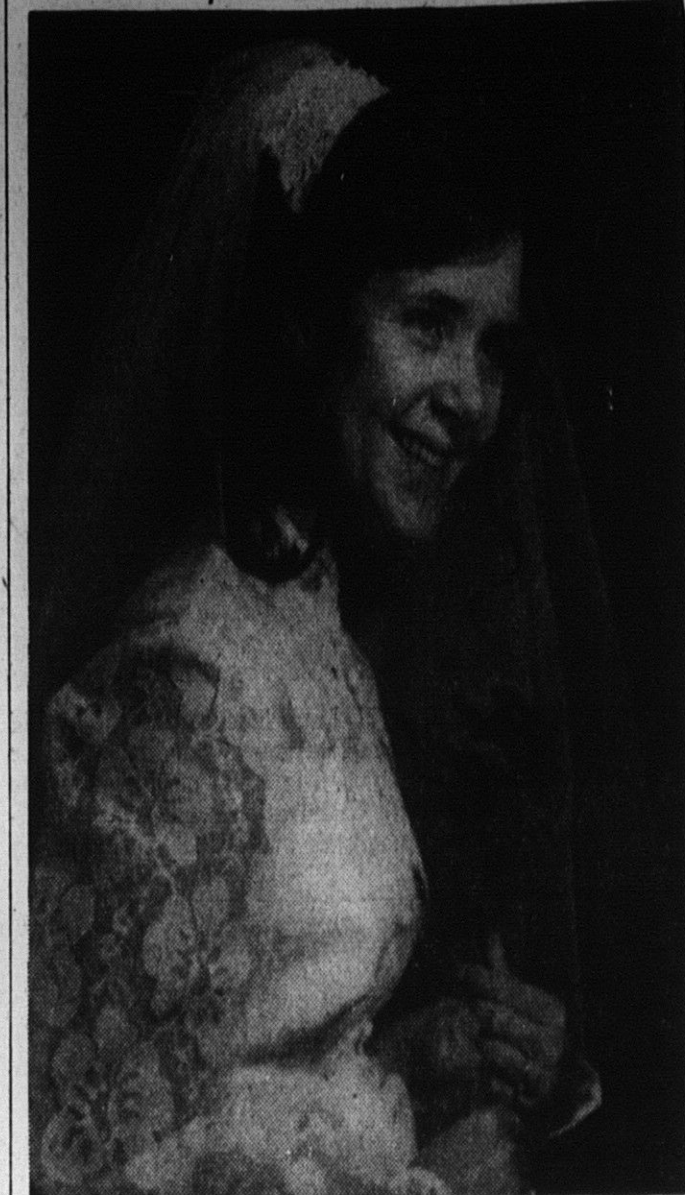

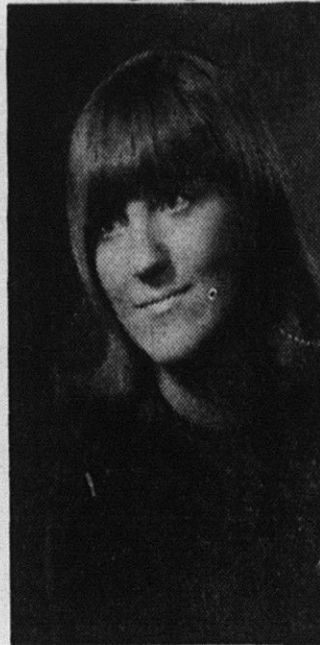

Hudzik Probes Citizen Right To Bear Arms

EAST LANSING — Dr. John Hudzik of Michigan State University, formerly of Holland, says the right of an individual to pack a gun pales in the light of historical analysis.

Probing the subject in his recently completed doctoral thesis on gun control legislation, Dr. Hudzik says history is rife with precedent for controlling the arms held by citizens, and that the second amendment pertains only to militiamen who, at the time the Constitution was written, were expected to provide their own weapons if called to action.

Beginning with English Common Law, Hudzik says between the signing of the Magna Charta in 1215 and the Glorious Revolution of 1689, English district of standing armies made it a "duty" of the subject to be available for militia service, and quoted Blackstone that "no man should take up arms, but with a view to defend his country and its laws."

In colonial America, guns afforded protection from Indians and put meat on the table. They were taken for granted, and were never a political issue prior to the Revolutionary era.

Hudzik says the first battles of the Revolutionary War at Lexington and Concord were fought not because the British were attempting to disarm individual citizens, but because they were trying to seize arms belonging to the Massachusetts militia.

Judicial interpretation of the second amendment has been scarce, Hudzik continues, and it was not until 1939 that the Supreme Court squarely met the issue of federal regulation of firearms. Hudzik concedes that the issue of arms regulation is complicated, but points to a weight of historical evidence that the individual's right to bear arms has often been restricted to protect the peace of society.

Hope College Donor Clinic Yields 195 Pints of Blood

The Ottawa county chapter of the American Red Cross collected 195 pints of blood at a special donor clinic Thursday on the campus of Hope College.

It was the second clinic on college campuses this week in Ottawa county. The previous day 150 pints were collected at Grand Valley State College and 34 students were in line when

physicians had to leave at 6 p.m.

The contribution of college students to the county blood program has improved the "deficit" situation immeasurably, according to Bruce M. Raymond who coordinates the county blood program. He said it costs the Red Cross \$18,000 a year to operate the county program with proceeds coming mainly from United Fund campaigns.

If county residents in hospitals were to pay the \$45 per pint charged in University Hospital in Ann Arbor, it would cost over \$100,000 which is more than the total budget of the county Red Cross.

The county quota in 1970 was 4,458 units and the policy of the Lansing Regional Blood Bank which services Ottawa county is that counties are eliminated from the program if less than 80 per cent is collected. Last year, the county was 20 units short of the 80 per cent quota and this was made up early this year.

The local blood bank has been in operation some 20 years. It was fostered by Dr. O. van der Velde who served as its medical director for many years. Dr. Vern Boersma currently is medical director.

Students in the 18-21 age bracket no longer are required to get parental permission to give blood.

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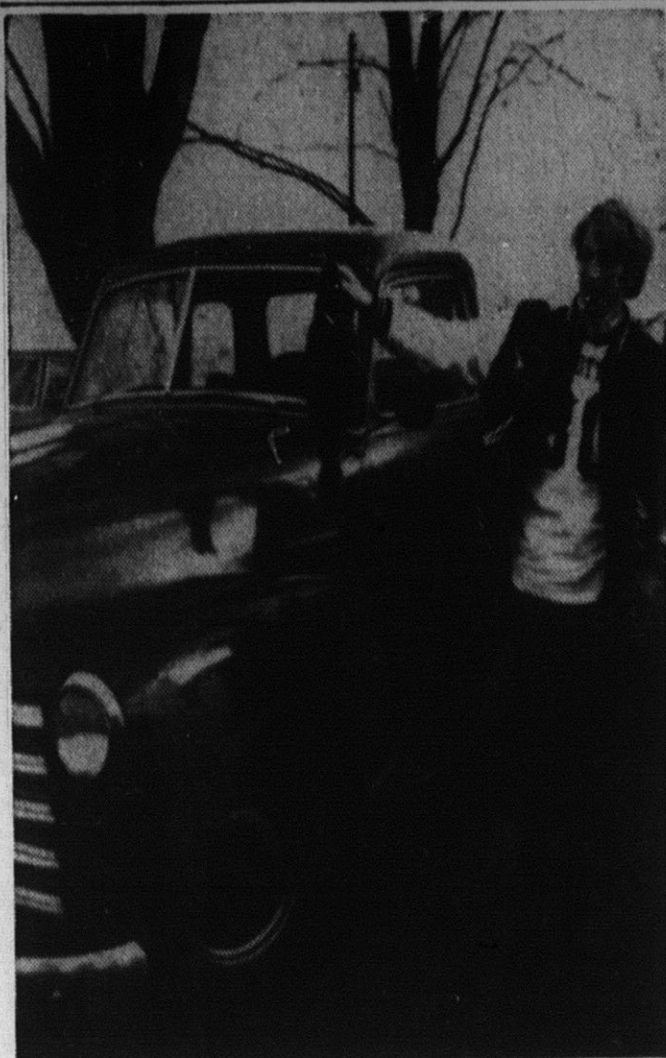

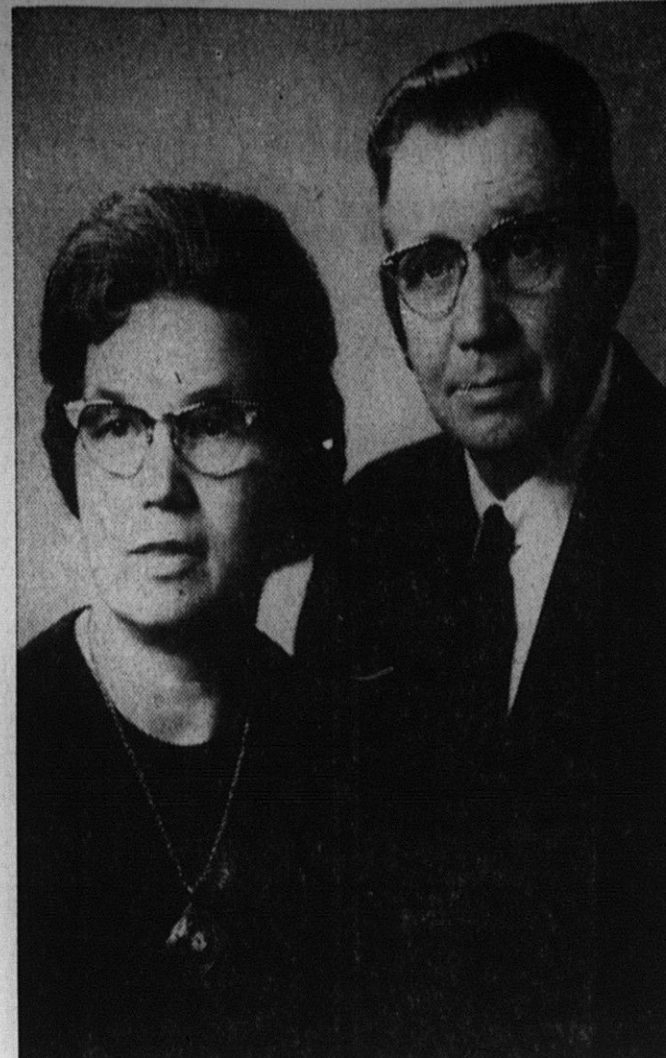
A two-yard TD run by Randy Kraker, who also ran the PAT put icing on the cake with time running out.

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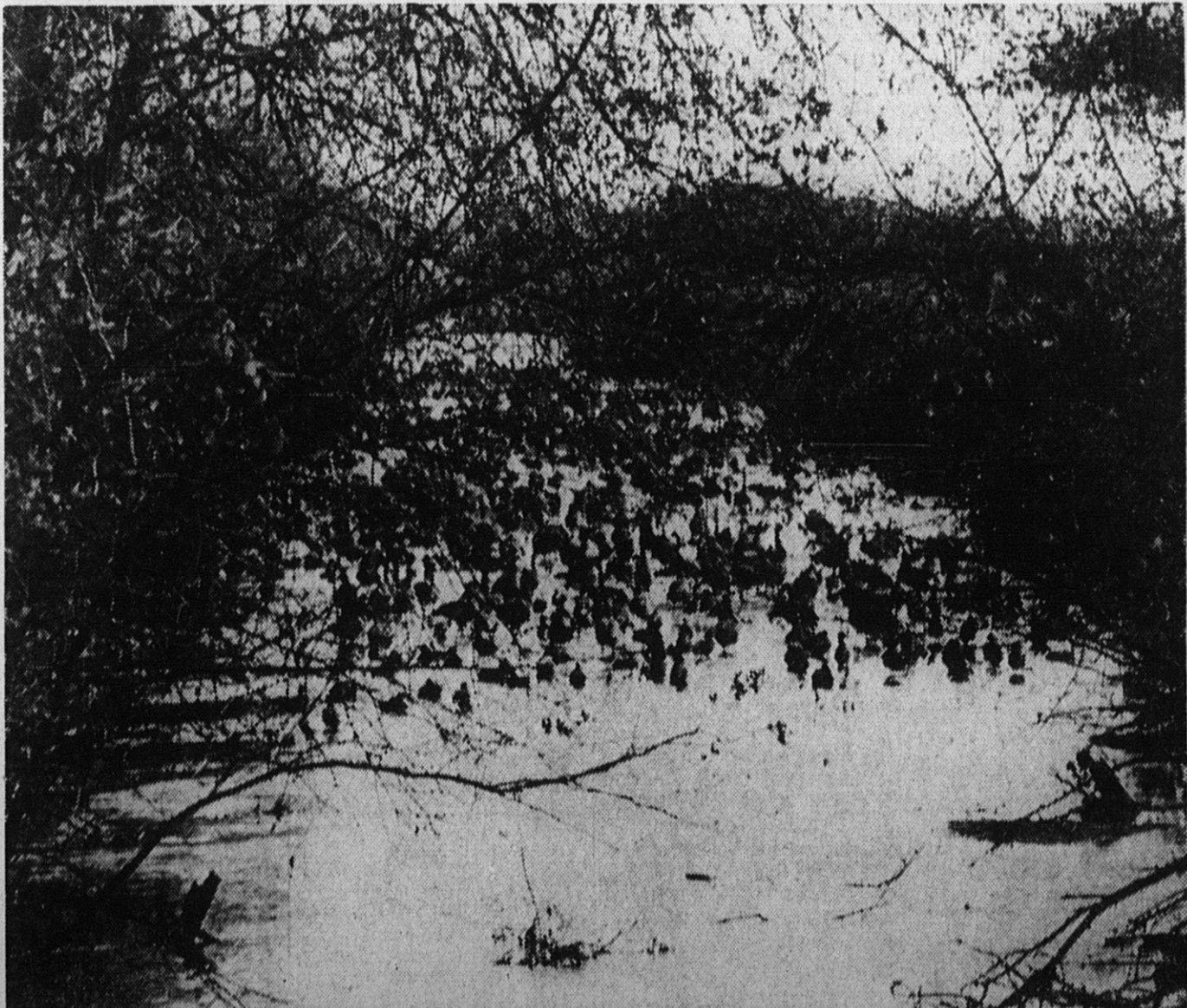
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REFUGE FOR GEESE — Thousands of Canada geese find the North Branch of the Black River in the State Game area south of Fennville a peaceful place to spend the winter months. Wildlife Biologist Charles Friley in charge of the game area said about 12,000 birds were in the game area this year, most of whom would spend the winter before returning to the Hudsons Bay area in the spring. For some 30 years, the Todd Farm and the Swan Creek highbanks have

been used by the birds during the winter migration. The peak numbers of birds generally is reached by the middle of November as some birds continue south. At the highbanks, a system of preregistered hunting was started this year, allowing only 58 hunting parties at one time. Hunting in selected areas of the Todd Farm is open to unlimited hunting parties. The geese began arriving September 19 and will leave by the end of April, joining others on the flight north.
