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Construction Code Gets Approval

Two public hearings and final action on a new construction code with revised fee schedules occupied City Council a full half hour at its meeting Thursday night. Because three weeks had elapsed since the last meeting, the agenda was lengthy.

One hearing was on construction of some 400 feet of water main in East 16th St. east of Fairbanks Ave. to service the Vern Tuls property. It evoked no objections and was promptly adopted.

The other hearing was on rezoning property between 30th and 32nd Sts., running from Ottawa to Plasmans Ave. for the Birchwood Manor Nursing Home. It was approved after some discussion on density use and assurances that future construction would comply with city regulations on holding tanks or whatever would be required.

Up for second reading and adoption was a new construction code updating the present 1965 BOCA code, and revised fees regarded as minor but including a \$25 fee for applications before the building board of appeals. Since the two ordinances on the construction code were declared emergency ordinances, they are effective immediately.

Mrs. Harold Miller, 987 South Shore Dr., appealed for bicycle paths both for safety and as a partial answer to the energy crisis. She said such paths were needed not only on South Shore Dr. but in many other areas. At the close of the meeting, Mayor Lou Hallacy assured her that Council has had many study sessions on bicycle paths, that they are expensive, and that he hoped plans would be worked out.

Myoor Hallacy appointed Linda Klungle and Gordon Vander Bie to the Human Relations Commission to fill vacancies which will expire in 1975.

As a Council appointment, Gerald W. Haworth was named to the Building Authority.

On suggestion of Councilman Al Kleis Jr., the possibility of a flasher signal at the C and O crossing on East 16th St. near the cemetery was referred to the city manager.

Council approved eliminating parking on the north side of 40th St. from Waverly Rd. to the east city limits. The recommendation had been tabled from the last meeting.

The oath of office of Jerald H. Redaker as a member of the Hospital Board was filed.

A note of thanks was read from Virginia Klomparsen for her liquor license transfer.

A letter from John Boersma suggesting a two-hour parking limit on the east side of Columbia Ave. south of 24th St. was referred to the city manager.

A communication from Tulip Time requesting an ordinance or whatever action is necessary to prevent the sale of objectionable merchandise during Tulip Time was referred to the city manager for study and report. The communication also requested an ordinance requiring posting of prices for temporary food service operations during Tulip Time.

A letter from the Manpower coordinator of Ottawa county regarding participation of the city in the Emergency Employment Act, EEA summer programs, CEP program and CETA program was accepted as information.

A letter from Antonio Flores submitting his resignation from the Human Relations Commission was accepted with regret.

Council approved bids on three trucks (1) Elhart Pontiac, street department, \$2,188.47 with trade in; (2) De Nooyer, park department, \$3,907.28; United Motor Sales, cemetery department, \$6,327.45.

Council approved a bid of Kolean and Van Dis of \$20,846 to remodel areas in City Hall. A bid of Harold Langejans was allowed by the city attorney to be withdrawn in writing before the contract was let because of errors.

Certifications were confirmed for Councilman Beelen, Windmill Island toll booth repair, \$148.02, and Councilman Vandepoel, Superior Sport Store, recreation department, \$256.57.

An application from Woodland Partners to rezone approximately 72 acres at the southeast corner of Eighth St. and Country Club Rd. to combination A-1 A-2 and A-3 residential zoning was referred to the Planning Commission for recommendation.

For Community Development

City Seeks Federal Housing Monies

The City of Holland is taking steps to obtain federal funds for proposed community development and housing activities and held a preliminary public meeting Wednesday in Council Chambers.

Few interested citizens attended but Jan Meinel, coordinating the project for the city, said additional public hearings would be held and she urged citizens who had ideas on how to spend the money to provide better housing or community development to contact the City Manager's office.

Under terms of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Congress authorized up to \$8.4 billion through fiscal 1977 for such programs. Of that amount only \$45 million becomes available to cities in Michigan with fewer than 50,000 residents, such as Holland.

But Councilman John Bloemendaal pointed out that because Holland had not sought previous federal housing assistance, its application this time might be in a lower category.

Much of the \$328 million allocated for Michigan is set aside for "hold harmless" or "entitlement" amounts for cities and townships who have used other federal funding.

City officials are to attend workshops and seminars on the program in the coming weeks to learn more information about the act, its requirements and types of programs available for funding.

Briefly the program would provide funds to acquire property which is blighted, appropriate for rehabilitation or conservation or preservation, for public works or other public purposes.

Funds could also be used to build or install public works, to enforce codes, to demolish or remove buildings, special projects to remove material and architectural barriers restricting mobility of elderly or handicapped persons to owners for losses of rental in holding units for relocation of persons, certain social services, and planning.

The city is to prepare a three-year community development plan with its application for funds and formulate a one-year program which includes the activities to be undertaken to meet the community development needs and the estimated cost.

The applicant must provide satisfactory assurances the program will be conducted in conformity with applicable civil rights laws and that citizens have had adequate opportunity to take part in the development of the application.

The city hopes to submit its initial application by January 1 after proper public hearing and response from citizens.

Urge Citizens To Use Caution In Entry Requests

Holland police Friday urged residents, and especially elderly citizens living alone, not to let strangers into their homes to use the telephone.

A number of such incidents have been reported in Holland during the past few weeks where subjects have gained entry to the homes to use the telephone and cash and wallets have been missing.

Five Injured As Two Autos Roll From Icy Bridge

Icy conditions on an overpass along westbound US-31 at Washington Ave. were blamed for separate roll-over accidents this morning in which five persons were reported injured. All were taken to Holland Hospital.

Police said a car operated by Patrick Coyle, 19, of Grand Haven, went out of control on the bridge and struck a guard rail on the left side and rolled down the 40-foot embankment, rolling over.

He was treated in Holland Hospital for a fractured nose and released.

At 6:42 a.m. a car operated by Diane Timmer, 20, of Grand Rapids, went out of control on the same bridge and rolled down the same embankment. Three of the four passengers in her car were trapped in the wreckage of the vehicle until rescued by Holland Police and the fire department's rescue squad.

Injured were Virginia Timmer, 49, Laura Ver Merres, 20, a fractured arm; Dolores Estburg, 44, bruises, and Brenda Quirk, 21, scalp lacerations.

Juveniles Accused

Two juvenile boys were responsible for Sunday's break-in at E. E. Fell Junior High school where about \$20 in cash was reported missing, Holland police said today. The two were being referred to probate court.

Site Set For Recreation

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Tuesday paved the way for recreational uses of the 300 acre county-owned landfill site at 160th Ave. and Riley St. in Park township.

Commissioners adopted a license agreement allowing the township to develop the unused portions of the site for recreational facilities for the general public.

A three-member committee will be named to oversee the development including representatives of the West Ottawa Soil Conservation District, the Ottawa County Road Commission and the recreation committee of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners.

Jay Van Wieren, Park township supervisor, said work would begin immediately on developing a trail for cross country skiing along the outside perimeter of the property.

The existing landfill is toward the center of the 300 acre site and would not be developed until the landfill operations were ended, perhaps in 15 or 20 years.

Van Wieren said a path 8 to 10 feet wide would be cleared in a meandering circle around the landfill site and the work was expected to be completed in 30 days.

Parking will be provided off Riley St. about 1,000 feet west of 160th Ave. The area would be posted against hunting, Van Wieren added.

Further plans for developing the area would be submitted to the County Commissioners next year.

Set at 8 Per Cent With No Discount

Boost in Electric Rates Effective on July 1, 1975

City Council Thursday night substantially approved the request of the Board of Public Works for an increase in electric rates, but set the effective date July 1, 1975, instead of the original request for Nov. 1, 1974. And instead of the requested 13 per cent increase and a reduction in the 10 per cent discount to 5 per cent, Council amended the increase to a specific 8 per cent across all classes of customers and eliminated the 10 per cent discount.

In a communication to Council, the Board of Public Works reaffirmed its needs of a 13 per cent rate increase with a decrease of 5 per cent in discount, based on full study and repeated review of needs during the next 10 years. It pointed out

that these rates are substantially below Consumers Power Co. rates, and requested approval at the earliest possible time.

Council's resolution, presented by Councilman John Bloemendaal, referred to no less than eight meetings on the subject, a special management audit and a review of this audit.

The date was changed in order to give ample notice to senior citizens, others on fixed incomes and businesses, to budget for these higher rates.

The resolution stated that the rate increase does not revise the joint resolution in effect between Council and BPW on paying the city 5 1/2 per cent of all annual retail, commercial and industrial sales, the agreement

To Meet Rising Coal Costs

BPW Sees More Rate Hikes Coming

Citing the skyrocketing cost of coal, Board of Public Works president Charles Cooper Monday said the eight per cent rate hike approved by City Council effective July 1 may not be enough and another rate request may be necessary before July.

Cooper told the BPW meeting that the rate hike in July coupled with one that went into effect during the summer would yield an additional \$1.5 million but the cost of coal has gone up \$1 million already this year.

"Council left us a little stranded by delaying the increase until July 1," Cooper said. "We'll now have to go back for a new rate hike before the July 1 increase is effective."

The board had asked the new rates be effective November 1.

Cooper directed the BPW staff to come up with projections to show operating costs for the next fiscal year but added it was unknown at this time how much to budget for coal costs. He urged a complete study into the cost matter be prepared for Council.

BPW General Manager Ronald L. Rainson said the cost of coal for 1972-73 season was \$1,510,000. The following year the cost of coal rose to \$1,567,000 and so far this year it has cost \$2,407,000 with projections as high as \$3,178,000 before the season is over.

The board authorized Rainson and Cooper or another member of the board to begin in-person negotiations with coal companies for a supply of coal during the next shipping season.

In other action the board approved the position of a staff engineer - supervisor and recommended a salary range of \$16,000 to \$20,000 to the city's personnel committee for study. The board approved the concept of hiring an engineering firm with Park Township and developers of Carousal Mountain to study possibilities of bringing municipal water to the

Contracts Approved For Facility

Contracts were formally approved for the new High School athletic site and the projected schedule of completion was examined by members of the Holland Board of Education which met in regular session Monday night in Lincoln School.

The board gave formal approval to the contracts with Buitendorp and Associates and Elzinga and Volkers for the architectural and construction management work on the high school athletic site.

The board was informed that the topographical and meets and bounds survey is complete and based on that information and on a meeting with the athletic staff and high school principal, Buitendorp is putting together a proposal for the actual facilities to be constructed.

Buitendorp has also prepared a proposal showing the estimated dollars involved in varying conduit in the athletic site so that a future lighting could be installed with a minimum disruption of the actual site.

Preliminary drawings are expected to be approved sometime during November or December and bidding on the plans by Feb. 20. Construction which is expected to take 31 weeks will be completed by Aug. 1.

In other business the board accepted designations effective Dec. 20 from Elizabeth S. Meyer, second grade, Harrington School and JoAnn Pattison, first grade, Longfellow School and Gilda Holvick, fifth grade teacher at Longfellow School effective Jan. 24.

A request to authorize transfer of \$1,719.50 from the general fund to complete payment of the Board's share for the magic square at Washington School was also approved.

Correspondence was also received and acknowledged from Latin Americans United for Progress who commended the board for work in the bilingual areas of education and also a letter from 15 Jefferson School parents who requested an examination into class sizes at Jefferson School.

A slide program presented by Ivan Compagner, principal at Lincoln School, and Mrs. Rachel Calderon, director of bilingual and bicultural center, was shown to the board and approximately 40 members of the audience, many of whom were teachers and aides at Lincoln.

The slide program noted significant progress in the Holland area in the bilingual-multicultural approach being utilized in the schools.

GE to Trim 300 From Work Force

General Electric, faced with a continued softening of business, plans to lay off an additional 300 hourly production workers in Holland Friday. It is in addition to the 130 laid off a week ago.

A GE spokesman said the lay off Friday would affect the entire plant and would bring the hourly production work force to about 500 in addition to the 200 salaried employees.

The spokesman said GE was optimistic that the market for refrigeration and air conditioning equipment would increase next year and the employees could be hired back.

GE's peak employment reached 900 about a year ago, the spokesman said.

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At least five persons, including four children, escaped injuries early today when a mattress in a residence at 131 West 17th St. caught fire. Firemen said the alarm was reported at 2:26 a.m. today at the residence of Betty Pamame. They said a light fixture fell onto the mattress and started it on fire. Fire damage was confined to the mattress. Some smoke damage was reported. Estimates of the loss were not available.

Board Waits To Change Government

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Tuesday decided to let the new board decide whether to change the form of county government despite an appeal by commission chairman William Winstrom that a decision be made in December.

J. Nyhof Poel, one of the three out-going commissioners, reported on an organizational analysis committee and said the five-member committee was deadlocked on recommendations for either a manager or county controller. One member declined to vote and break the tie.

The committee voted four to one to present its report and recommendations at the January meeting.

Winstrom, also leaving the board in December, urged the committee to prepare its report and recommendations for the December meeting but commissioner Kenneth Northouse asked Winstrom how he could ignore the decision of the committee to delay the report until January.

Commissioners received a report from the Citizens Research Council in August on reorganization of the county government.

Poel said three sub-committees were functioning to locate space, to determine specifications for the new position and to select necessary equipment.

Commissioners voted nine to two to pay \$27,268 reported as due the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission for work on four surveys still under way.

Commissioners Vander Laan and Eunice Bareham voted against the payment because they claimed no progress reports had been received from the regional commission in several months.

The surveys in progress include a comprehensive plan, flood plan zoning, human resources and a shoreline study. A resolution urging the state to adopt legislation similar to Oregon's bottle bill to control disposable beverage containers was adopted by commissioners. Copies are to be sent to the governor and area state senators and representatives.

Commissioners authorized a three year lease for a building in the Coopersville area to extend county governmental services at a cost of \$400 a month including utilities except telephone.

The county board recommended granting two positions for the Ottawa Association for Retarded Children and Adults to be paid with federal manpower funds.

Electrical Code Discussed By Local Contractors

A discussion regarding the new Michigan Construction Code in relation to the Holland Electric Code was held Monday with Holland electrical contractors and the Electric Panel participating.

Cities in Michigan which have an approved inspector and ordinance for licensing and code systems are allowed to maintain their existing systems and to operate separately from the state. The majority of Holland's code rules are in harmony with the state and national electric codes.

Recently, the panel met with the local Industrial Council Task Force committee to plan an educational program for employees interested in improving their electrical knowledge.

Thoughts expressed indicated that local electricians would much prefer to have the construction code administered at the local level in preference to state administration.

The local panel includes Ron Van Slooten, Milton Skeetee, Jay Van Loo, Harold De Fouw and Peter Van Putten.

GRAND RAPIDS — Football 1974 has been a splendid season for West Ottawa Panther fans to cheer about. It ended Friday night at Grand Rapids Christian with the Panthers shutting out the Eagles 13-0, and goes down in the record books as the BEST SEASON EVER for West Ottawa.

This was a determined Panther team that glowed with enthusiasm and team work and our hats go off to them and Coach Deb Nolan and his coaching staff who ended with a great 6-2-1 record. The Panthers did it in a tough league as the OK Red Division has got to be the toughest in the area, evident in the fact it has won the last 13 contests with Grand Rapids City league foes.

Tubergen, although having some excellent blocking, always gave it that second effort that gave him the extra yards. Jamie Bloemendaal who was Tubergen's chief blocker, got hurt throwing a block in the third period, re-injuring an ankle that has bothered him the last few weeks.

The Panthers scored in the first quarter with 1:11 on the clock as Jack Murdock faked into the line, then stepped back and hit Dave Beckman in the end zone on a nice pass. Sam Angell kicked the extra point giving West Ottawa a 7-0 lead.

It was a defensive contest from here on until the final period when again Murdock hit Joe Doornewerf on a six-yard pass play. The Panthers were unsuccessful on a two point after TD play, but 13 points was all they needed. Matt Johnson put the game on ice for West Ottawa when he intercepted an Eagle pass near the end.

Defensively, the Panthers looked like "ole Blue" itself, not hard to understand as coach Nolan played college football at the U-M who seem to put a special emphasis in that department. Offensively the Panthers had a strong year scoring 213 points in all to 74 for its opponents. Another record was set by senior Ken Hamstra in the punting department. He had the longest punt, 60 yards against Grandville and when the record books are closed this season there could be more that this fine Panther team compiled.

Any way you look at it, it's been an absolute great year for this Panther team and not enough can be said about the seniors who played their last game.

ROCKFORD — West Ottawa's girls' swimming team tied Grandville for third place in the O-K Conference meet, net Saturday with 139 points apiece.

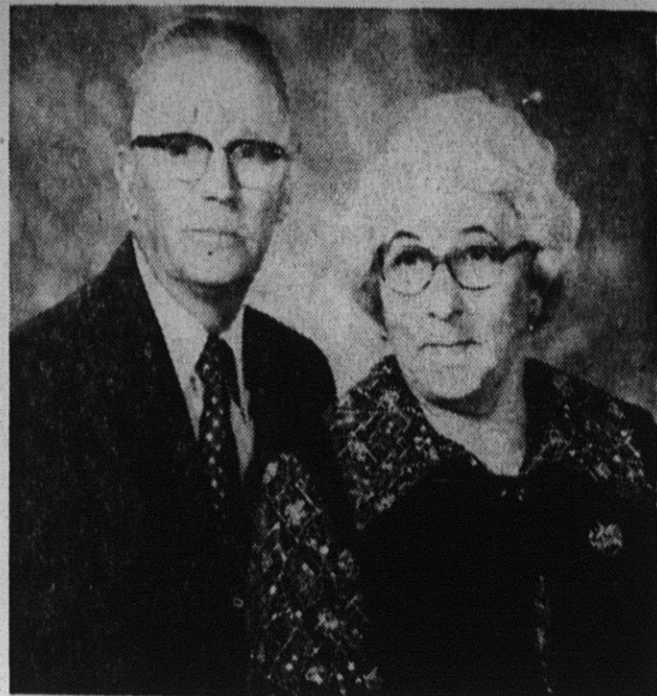

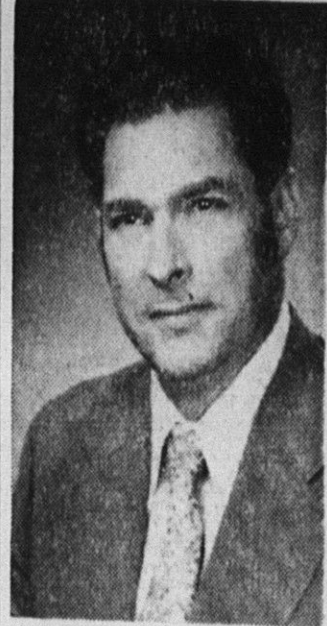

He and his wife, Faye, and two daughters will move to Holland.



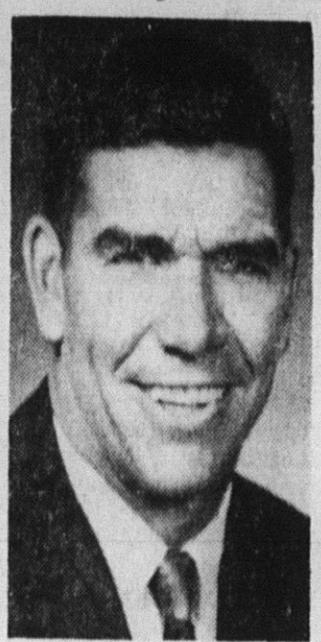

Hope Had Great Season While most of the sport fans in Michigan are still chirping over Michigan State University's stunning upset of top ranked Ohio State University, one cannot forget the great football season that Hope College had.

Some of the glamor of Hope's 8-1 season was lost when the Flying Dutchmen were beaten by Olivet College for the MIAA

... no intentions of leaving championship. But most sport observers felt that if the two teams would play another nine games, Coach Ray Smith's crew would come out ahead in each clash.

"It's very hard to say if we were better this year than last," stated Smith Monday. "We're very happy with our season. We did something that only two other clubs in history did, win eight of nine games."

The 1958 and 1959 Dutchmen units mustered the same overall mark as the 1974 club but most people that we talk to, thought this year's club was the best.

In sounding like a broken record, we asked Smith for the third time straight year if he might be leaving for another job. Like in the two other cases, his answer was no.

"Where would I go and who would want me," Smith modestly projected. "I would never leave just for more money. It would have to be something better than I have here and we (family) have enjoyed our relationship at Hope College and Holland."

In Smith's five years at Hope, his clubs have won 30 games, lost 14 and tied one. In the last three seasons, the Dutchmen have won 22 times, dropped five and tied one tilt for a blistering .814 percentage.

Under Smith the Dutchmen have turned from one of the weak sisters in the MIAA to one of the top small college powers in the country.

It's just unfortunate that Olivet won the MIAA championship. But Smith isn't feeling sorry for himself, as he's already looking forward to next year's tilt with Doug Kay's Comets.

The 1974 football season ended officially Saturday but already Smith is thinking about next year's club, as he took down all the names off the board of the seniors.

The Dutchmen were a young club this year, losing only two senior defensive regulars and four on offense and will be a

young but experienced one in 1975 as well.

At the beginning of the season Smith thought that Grand Valley State Colleges was probably a little better than his Dutchmen. But Smith had a change of heart Monday as he commented, "I think we're a little better now."

It would be an ideal match if the two teams could get together again but it will probably never happen, as the two schools have a difference of philosophy.

Smith sighed, "you can only get so good in the MIAA and Grand Valley is looking in another direction. "We could probably play with them for a couple of years but after that, it might be different."

A lot of Hope College fans and we included would love to see the Dutchmen and the MIAA participate in the NCAA Division III playoffs later this month.

Hope would naturally be a good representative, as would Olivet. But before the league schools could get an invitation, the MIAA would have to okay playoffs, as of now, they don't.

One of the big problems in playing in a bowl, is that an MIAA team would be idle for three weeks and that's just too long of a period for a club to stay sharp, according to Smith.

Hope College's sister school Central College of Iowa, has a good shot at being nominated for a playoff bowl and wouldn't it be great if both schools would collide on the gridiron in the coming years?

The rest lies in the hands of the MIAA institutions. What do you say fellas?

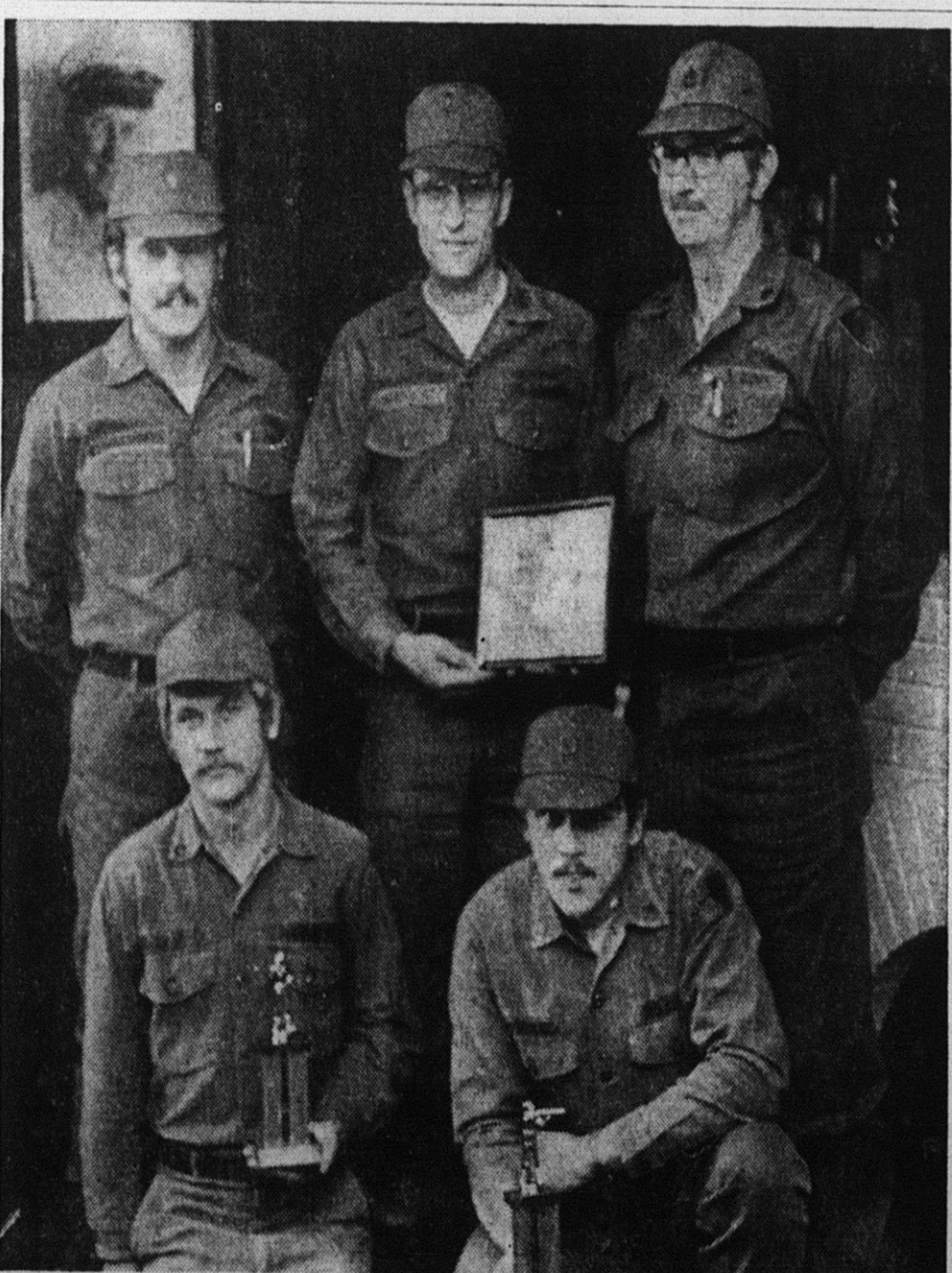

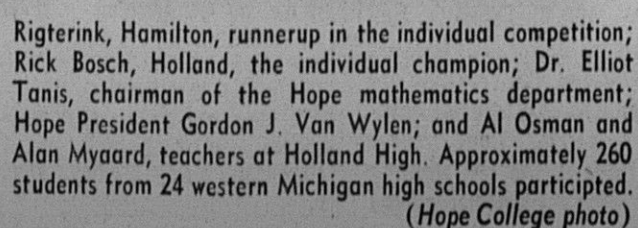

Mayor Names Charter Exploratory Committee

Mayor Lou Hallacy appointed a nine-member Charter Revision Exploratory Committee at a meeting of City Council Thursday night. The meeting was changed from Wednesday because of election pressures.

Named to the committee are former Mayor L.W. Lamb Jr. as chairman, Vernon D. Ten Cate, Helena Winter, Mary Lou Rohlick, David John, Patrick Thompson, David Vander Kooi, Jessie Dalman and Thelma Castaneda.

The committee will be of a year's duration studying revisions of the charter adopted in the early 1950's. Vernon Ten Cate was chairman at that time. Since that time, Holland has more than quadrupled in size.

Council also approved a \$1,000 appropriation for contingencies. The committee's function is one of exploration only. Should a Charter Study Commission be recommended, a public vote would be called.

In other business, a city manager progress report on the Central Ave. sanitary sewer under construction revealed that some residences on Central Ave. are served by other than the Central Ave. sewer and sewer leads are being installed at a cost of \$5,000. It was also noted that at least six badly deteriorated water services are being replaced by the Board of Public Works.

Council approved a request for water service at 821 Lincoln Ave. subject to certain conditions listed by the Board of Public Works.

Transfer of a liquor license for Redder's Party Store was approved after reviews by department heads revealed no objections.

A traffic signal agreement with the State Highway Department pertaining to left turn lanes on US-31 bypass at Eighth, 16th and 32nd Sts. was tabled until the next meeting.

A communication from the Liquor Control Commission informed Council that Alfred and Charlene Von Ins have amended the request for transfer of classification of their B-Hotel license and now request a class C license. It was referred to the city manager.

A letter from the Holland Area Historical Advisory Committee offered suggestions for a bicentennial celebration.

First year mentor Ray Backus directed the Dutch to a 3-6 record. Wins came over Muskegon Heights, Benton Harbor and Grand Rapids Christian.

The Sailors of Coach Jason Loving finished the season with their second best record ever at 7-2. Their only losses were at the hands of Muskegon Catholic, the top rated Class B team in the state and a fine Traverse City eleven.

Holland was out of the game before they knew it, as Jeff McConnell fell on a Dutch fumble on the 33 of the Dutch at the outset of the tilt.

On the first Mona Shores play from scrimmage quarterback Rick Dolack threw a pretty 33-yard scoring pass to Tim Parker. Wayne Porter added the first of three extra point kicks for the Sailors.

Speedy Mona back Dan Garzelloni broke the single season rushing school mark by scampering 52 yards into Holland's end zone moments later in the first quarter.

After the TD, one of Holland's favorite sports fans, Sal Perez cracked, "The Sailors are like the NFL St. Louis Cardinals, as they have the big play of offense."

Mona had excellent field condition a few minutes later. Dolack, a fine signal caller and the son of Dick Dolack, well known NFL official, capped the drive by scooting six yards for a touchdown. The TD came early in the second period.

When Holland did try to pass, quarterback Dan Bartlett and Todd De Young were sacked for long losses. Backus even went to a shotgun offense on one occasion in the second stanza.

The first and only Holland pass completion came with 3:09 to play in the second quarter.

The Sailors added their fourth touchdown in the fog covered field with only six seconds left in the half, as Dolack found Garzelloni in the end zone for a three-yard touchdown pass.

The fog was so bad that sport writers and broadcasters alike kept yelling, "who scored, did they score, what yard line are they on and etc."

Garzelloni showed great balance and power by jaunting 30 yards for Mona's final TD in the third quarter.

It looked like the Sailors might score again as Holland coughed up another fumble on the ensuing kickoff with Mona covering on the Dutch 24.

Brian Bouwens fine defensive effort on a fourth and 11 situation prevented the Sailors from adding to their already commanding lead.

Loving used his bench throughout the entire fourth quarter and even had his starting center playing quarterback on the final three series.

Rugged Doug Bazan made the decision look sick, as he picked off Bob Bengston's pass and dashed down the sidelines into Sailors territory.

Behind the fine passing of Bartlett, the Dutch moved in for the score. Bartlett connected on two tosses to Bazan and one apiece to Dennis Lawson and Chuck Modders.

Modders closed out his career by making a nice grab of a Bartlett aerial for a six-yard scoring toss with 1:20 left in the game. The PAT pass was intercepted.

Backus said after the game the same thing he stated earlier in the week, that the Sailors were the "best" team his club had faced during the regular season. Backus thought that GR West Catholic was the "best" team the Dutch meet all year.

He also pointed out that he was pleased to see his club not fall apart in the second half after being down by 26 points at the intermission.

The official Dolack said he would be working the big game in Oakland Sunday between the Detroit Lions and Raiders. If the Lions play like Dick's son did against the Dutch, Detroit just might upend the mighty Raiders.

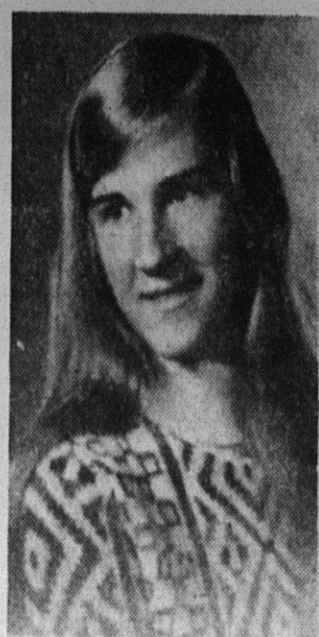

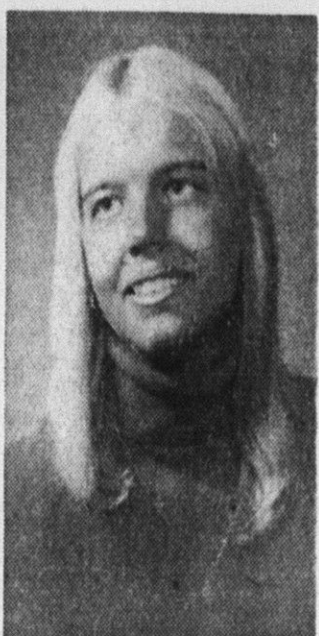

Lehmann went 25 yards for the next GVSC touchdown and Kerry Rasikas ran one yard for the final six-pointer.

The win was Grand Valley's third without a loss against MIAA opponents. It was also the final meeting between a Laker and MIAA foe.

Coach Jim Harkema remarked, "We don't have any more easy games. It may happen but we aren't looking for any."

GVSC closes its season at Hillsdale Saturday.

School Board Okays New Budget

An also \$7 million budget was approved unanimously Monday night by the Holland Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting.

Precisely, the general operating budget for the Holland public schools listed a balance as of July 1, 1974 at \$443,398. Income was expected to be \$6,921,302 and expenditures for the 1974-75 school year were listed as \$6,814,928 with an anticipated balance on June 30, 1975 of \$549,772.

The Holland School district is approximately one year ahead of most school districts in the state with utilization of a programmed budget which will be required by July 1, 1975 to construct budgets and accounting systems based on the programmed budgeting model.

The major responsibility for the program budget, Lee Van Aelst, assistant superintendent of business, noted, rests with the principals, program directors, and department heads who must also administer the programs. Individual administrators must evaluate programs, determine the dollars needed, and finally justify these dollars before the budget is approved by the Board of Education.

Revenues in the budget show a total of \$6,921,302 from local revenue, \$4,701,304; intermediate revenue, \$91,500; state revenue, \$1,584,000; federal revenue, \$435,998 and government transfers, \$108,500.

Expenditures list basic instruction, \$3,566,902; added costs instruction, \$1,147,153; community education instruction, \$67,160; supporting services, \$1,984,713; community services, \$37,000 and government transactions, (unemployment compensation) \$12,000 for a total of \$6,814,928.

Van Aelst explained that the half million dollar balance at the end of the school year is based on a three year projection which indicates that expenses will increase at a rate of approximately 7 to 7 1/2 per cent. During the same period of time, the school district expects valuation will increase at a rate of only 6 per cent.

Other reasons for maintaining cash reserves, Van Aelst said, include the fact that basic state aid per pupil allowance will be decreasing this year and next year as it has in the past, the somewhat unsure future of state aid funding as it may be affected by the elimination of sales tax on food and prescription drugs or as it may be affected by moving away from the current state aid bill.

The school district also has multi-year contracts with portions of the staff, most for only two years and has no way of forecasting what exactly will be the result of negotiations in the third year.

Actual increase in the school district's operating costs will be 7.67 per cent but also reflected in the new type of budget are a 1.82 per cent increase in accounts not previously included in the general fund and 1.25 per cent in encumbered funds. New programs and program additions (new state and federal monies which completely cover the costs of newly added programs) have also increased the budget 7.31 per cent.

The city attorney was directed to prepare a formal agreement.

According to a legal interpretation, a township may designate selected persons to administer certain work and this may include city employees.

In practice, local building officials will function in the township much as in the city, but final determination is done by the township board. Real advantages as seen in such a cooperative venture in orderly planning.

Low bid of High-Low Electric Co. of \$1,984 for improvements to the lighting system at Van Tongeren Field at Third and Pine plus \$460 for moving two poles was approved, the funds coming from revenue sharing.

Transfer of \$4,400 from the Windmill Island contingency fund was approved as follows: \$400 to the vehicle maintenance account, \$1,734 to capital outlay, \$506.24 to buildings and grounds and \$1,759.76 to the capital outlay account.

Claims against the city from Mrs. Robert Rininger, 146th Ave., Maggie Stool, 112 Vander Veen Ave., Francisco Cuevas, 249 West 14th St., and Debra De La Cruz, 1 South River Ave., were referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Council approved sufficient funds of revenue sharing to undercoat the aerial tower truck and a pumper truck for the fire department.

Tabled until next meeting were three city manager recommendations on traffic safety: no parking on the east side of Harrison between 27th and 28th Sts., no parking on the south side of 30th St. for 64 feet east of Van Raalte Ave., and a stop sign at 24th and Azalea.

Mayor Lou Hallacy commended Holland citizens for the fine turnout at the polls Tuesday. Nearly 70 per cent of the registered vote responded, a far higher percentage than the national average. He also expressed satisfaction over passage of the Dial-A-Ride proposition which overwhelmingly carried, 6,566 to 2,283.

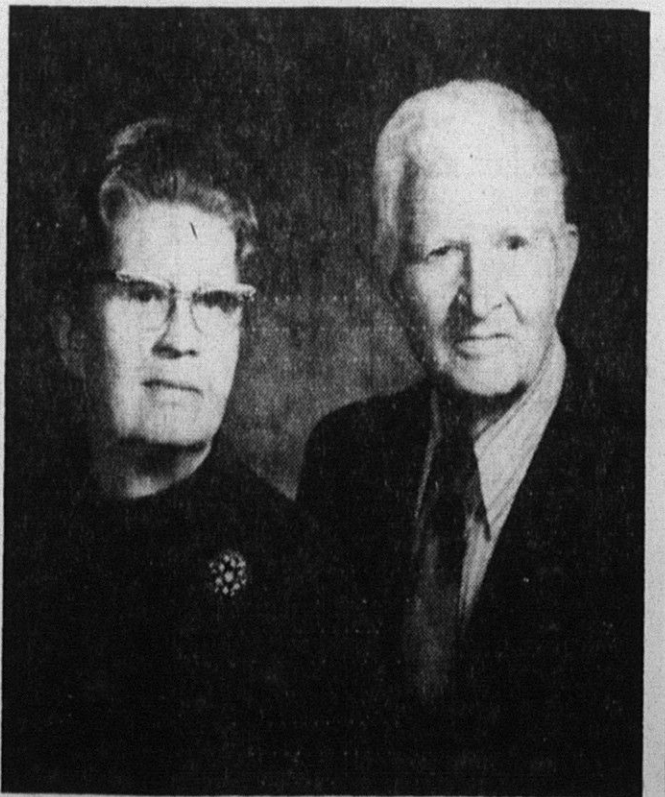

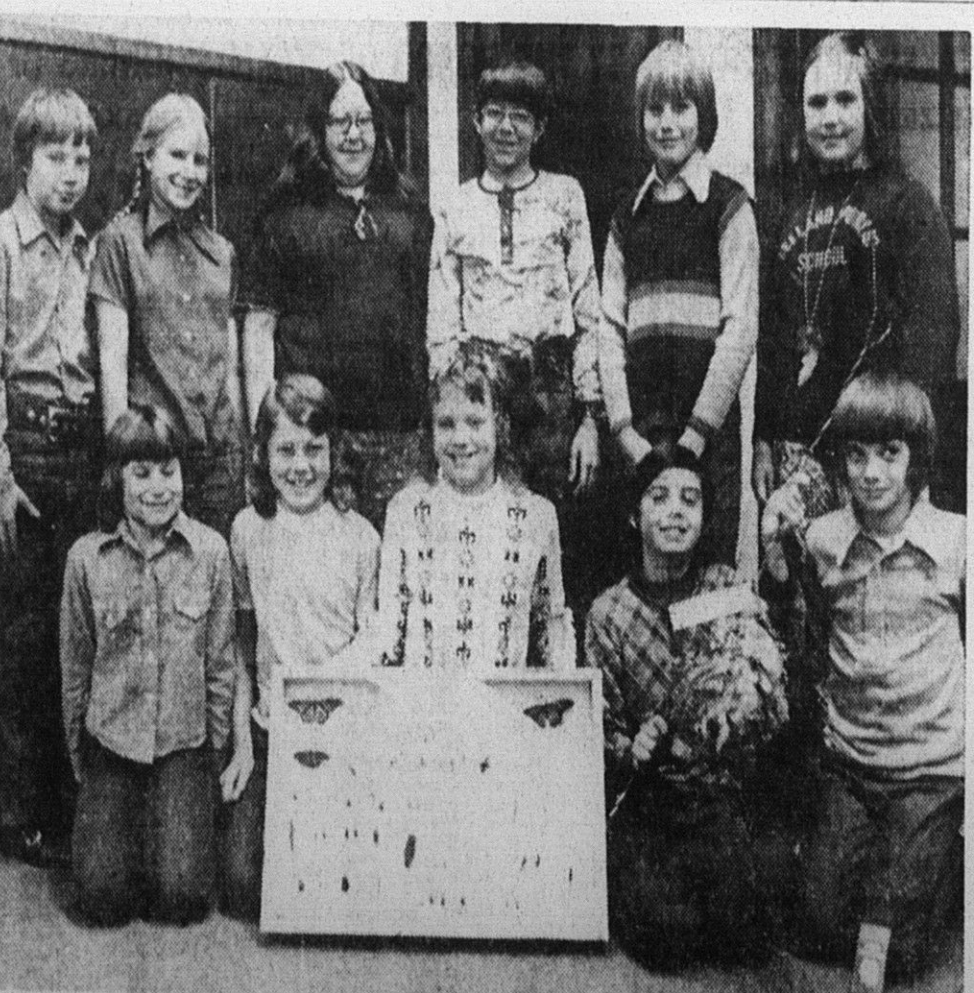
