"My first real interest in photography came when I was a freshman at Thornton High School in Harvey, Ill., said Tom, a native of Riverdale, Ill. "I took pictures for four years for the Thorntonite, the school newspaper, and was newspaper and yearbook photographer at Thornton Junior College.

"The tuition at Hope College cannot be increased for the next year without changing significantly and substantially the character of Hope College as we have known it for a century."

This resolution was announced Friday by the Hope College Board of Trustees, holding their Fall meeting on the campus, Nov. 5-6. The Board aspires to make a Hope College education more accessible to would-be students.

The funds will be sought through gifts from alumni, churches and friends of the college. Despite a needed increase of \$150,000-\$200,000 for operating expenses next year, tuition will remain at \$950 per student.

October Cool And A Bit Dry

October was cooler and dryer than usual, according to Lynn P. Wheaton, weather observer for Holland.

The month started out rainy and blustery with snow flurries around Oct. 5 and 6, but ended on a note of the usual beautiful October weather which coincides with the color season. And the colors turned out beautifully too, erasing earlier fears that previous droughts had doomed the colors this year.

Average temperature was 47.6 degrees or 4.7 degrees below normal. The last half of the month was considerably more pleasant with temperatures in the upper 50's and 60's. Maximum was 74 on Oct. 16 and the minimum was 24 on Oct. 11.

Rainfall totaled 2.15 inches or .86 inch below normal for October. Nearly all the rain fell during the first full week of October. The remainder of the month was exceedingly dry, leaving the fallen leaves dry and crackly and just spoiling for fires on Halloween. The maximum was 65 on Halloween providing a setting almost too agreeable for mischief prone tricksters.

Maximum was 74, compared with 82 in 1963, 83 in 1962, 80 in 1961 and 77 in 1960. Minimum was 24, compared with 27 in 1963, 26 in 1962, 31 in 1961 and 21 in 1960.

Average maximum was 58.1, compared with 71.4 in 1963, 63.7 in 1962, 63.6 in 1961 and 61.6 in 1960. Average minimum was 37.1, compared with 42.1 in 1963, 46 in 1962, 34.1 in 1961 and 40.9 in 1960. Average temperature was 47.6, compared with 56.8 in 1963, 54.8 in 1962, 54.3 in 1961 and 52.6 in 1960.

Precipitation totaled 2.15 inches, compared with 1.86 inches in 1963, 3.23 inches in 1962, 2.58 inches in 1961 and 1.96 inches in 1960.

Precipitation fell on 12 days, compared with 7 days in 1963, 16 days in 1962, 16 days in 1961 and 14 days in 1960. Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was 1.23 inches (Oct. 9), compared with .89 inch in 1963, .50 inch in 1962, .44 inch in 1961 and .57 inch in 1960.

There was no measurable snow in October. In 1962 the October snow measured 7 inches, the greatest depth being 4 inches and the most snow falling in a 24-hour period 3 inches. There were traces of snow in 1960.

Dick Milliman Takes New Post; Quits Romney

LANSING — Richard Milliman, press secretary for Gov. George Romney, resigned Wednesday to become editor and publisher of the Mount Pleasant Times-News.

Milliman, who joined Romney's staff in June, 1962, will also become vice president for public affairs of Mid-State Broadcasting Corp., which recently purchased the Mount Pleasant newspaper.

Milliman said the reason for his move was "a desire to be more available to my growing family, plus a challenging opportunity to return to the newspaper business."

He formerly worked on newspapers in Coldwater, Holland and Lansing and was executive assistant to Lansing Mayor Willard I. Bowerman before joining the governor's staff.

J.J. Riemersma Succumbs at 75

J. J. (Jock) Riemersma, 75, long-time principal of Holland High School until his retirement in 1957, died at 4 p.m. Tuesday in University Hospital in Ann Arbor where he was taken Saturday after a week's stay in Holland Hospital. He had been ill since September.

A dedicated educator and civic servant, Riemersma was born in Rochester, N. Y., son of the Rev. and Mrs. John Riemersma. He attended high school in Sioux Center, Ia., and graduated from Hope College in 1914. He took a year of graduate work at the University of Michigan and returned to Holland to teach mathematics in the high school in 1915 and 1916.

During World War I, he joined the U. S. Engineers and spent two years in France, receiving a commission of lieutenant in the Coast Artillery. He spent five months in the Army of Occupation in Germany, and while overseas was offered the position of principal of the local high school. He returned home in 1919 to assume those duties. The same year he married Madeline Van Putten.

He took graduate work at the University of Michigan, the University of Wisconsin, the University of Chicago and the University of Colorado. He received a master's degree in secondary education in 1927 from the University of Michigan.

Although he retired in 1957 as principal, he remained on the school staff until 1959 serving as director of student teaching for junior and senior high schools and as curriculum coordinator.

During his administrative career, he served as president of MEA districts 9 and 13, as president of the Michigan High School Principals Association, and served two terms on the board of directors of the Michigan State High School Athletic Association.

As a member of Hope Church, he served on the consistory for 38 years, vice president of the consistory for 12 years, taught Sunday School many years and also served as Sunday School superintendent. He served as a member of the Board of North American Missions of the Reformed Church in America for 11 years.

He was a member of the Century Club, past president of the Exchange Club, member of the Social Progress Club and a member of the Tulip Time board which he also served as president. He was active in Tulip Time festivals since their inception in the late 1920's and for years served as marshal of the big Saturday parade of bands doing an immense amount of organizational work. He also helped plan Memorial Day parades for many years.

He headed bond drives during World War II and always filled responsible assignments for such community work as the Community Chest.

John J. Hoeve Succumbs at 94

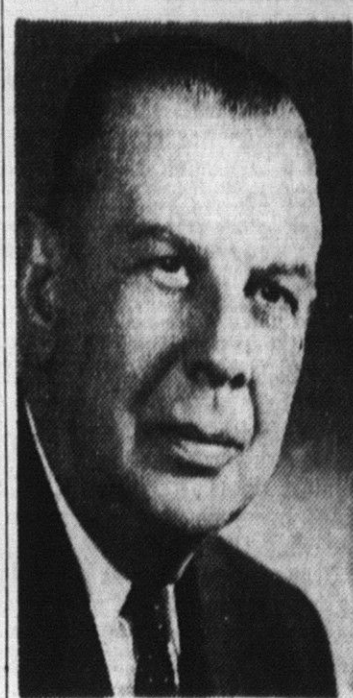

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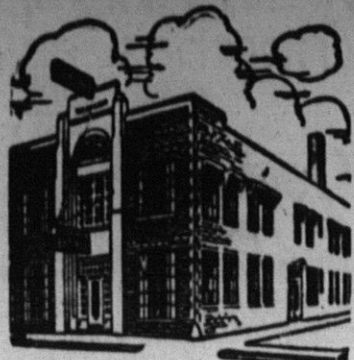
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J. J. RIEMERSMA

A lifetime of service to this community is the contribution of J. J. Riemersma, former principal of Holland High School, who died Tuesday at 75 after devoting 42 years to public education in Holland interrupted only by military service to his country and a year of graduate study.

The impact of a single individual on a community is hard to measure, but "Jock" Riemersma certainly left his mark on this community — a shining mark enshrined in the hearts of thousands of students who learned usually years later the value of his lessons of integrity and civic responsibility.

Those who had experienced the firm hand of discipline during his 36 years as high school principal have long been vocal in their appreciation of this dedicated educator who adapted the teaching of moral and spiritual values to a changing curriculum.

Slow and deliberate rather than breezy, this dark, handsome man could reduce the brash trouble-maker into a solemn repentant lad in a moment, and many a person now in high places recalls invaluable lessons learned under circumstances not recognizable at the time as lessons.

A man who gave unstintingly of himself, Riemersma's contributions to the religious and civic life of the community are legion. They ranged from years of devoted service in Hope Church to professional education circles, to such service groups as the Exchange Club and American Legion, to such civic endeavor as Community Chest, Tulip Time, bond drives, etc.

His contribution to education was his greatest achievement. This was summed up on one occasion by the late E. E. Fell, school superintendent, who stated:

"Mr. Riemersma is a discerning student of educational literature and a keen observer of educational practice which he carefully and ably evaluates in the light of student needs. His philosophy of life and education is one and inseparable. He believes that Christian character, discipline, culture, dependable scholarship and good citizenship constitute the minimum preparation for life and the foundation for further education. He is a strong tower as an educator, citizen and Christian leader."

"Jock" Riemersma as he was known to thousands of people in the community will be missed. We have lost another valuable public servant.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 15
An Approved Workman
2 Timothy 2:8-15; 3:14-17
By C. P. Dame

Two owners of stores spoke recently about their clerks. The one complained much about their inefficiency, while the other one said he was going to leave the store for a week and knew that the clerks would take good care of the store. Some Christians are faithfully serving the Lord and some are lax. The Lord needs faithful and trained workers.

I. To remember Jesus Christ is inspirational. Paul told Timothy, the young preacher, to remember Jesus Christ who was of the seed of David and who had risen from the dead. How essential it is for us all to remember Christ. Paul calls attention to the humanity of Christ—He is of the seed of David. Besides he writes of the deity of Christ for He rose from the dead. The heart of the preaching of the early church was the death and the resurrection of Jesus from the dead—His physical resurrection. The apostles knew of no other. Today the liberal preachers talk about a spiritual resurrection.

To Paul the gospel was so valuable that he was willing to suffer for it. He suffered "as an evil doer," a criminal. How little we even inconvenience ourselves for the Lord today! Perhaps we have lost sight of Paul's motive. He was sure that his suffering contributed to the salvation Christ wrought. The gospel would mean more to us if we would do more for it.

II. Christ rewards His workers. The words, "It is a faithful saying" are found in I Tim. 1:15 and in I Tim. 4:5 and in our lesson text. "For if we be dead with Him. We shall also live with Him"—this is a faithful saying. Most people think only of the present, the future gets no attention. People with faith think of another world and this fits them to endure hardships for Christ in this world. However, those who deny Jesus now, He will deny in the future. Only a person who has confessed Christ can deny Him. The person who denies Christ breaks his relationship with Christ.

Paul urged Timothy to "avoid disputing about words, which does no good" but usually does much hurt. Instead of disputing study "to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed rightly dividing the word of truth."

III. The Bible fits Christians for service. Timothy, and many of us, were brought up and trained in a godly home. His mother taught him the Bible. The Bible makes people wise unto salvation. It also tells us what is Christian and what is not Christian. Most useful is this Book for reproof, for it seeks to correct our faults, and we all have them. The Bible tests our theories and notions and shows us what is right. The Bible trains Christians for service. The more a Christian knows about the Bible and believes it the more fit he is to serve. Let us all do our best to be excellent workers for Jesus Christ.

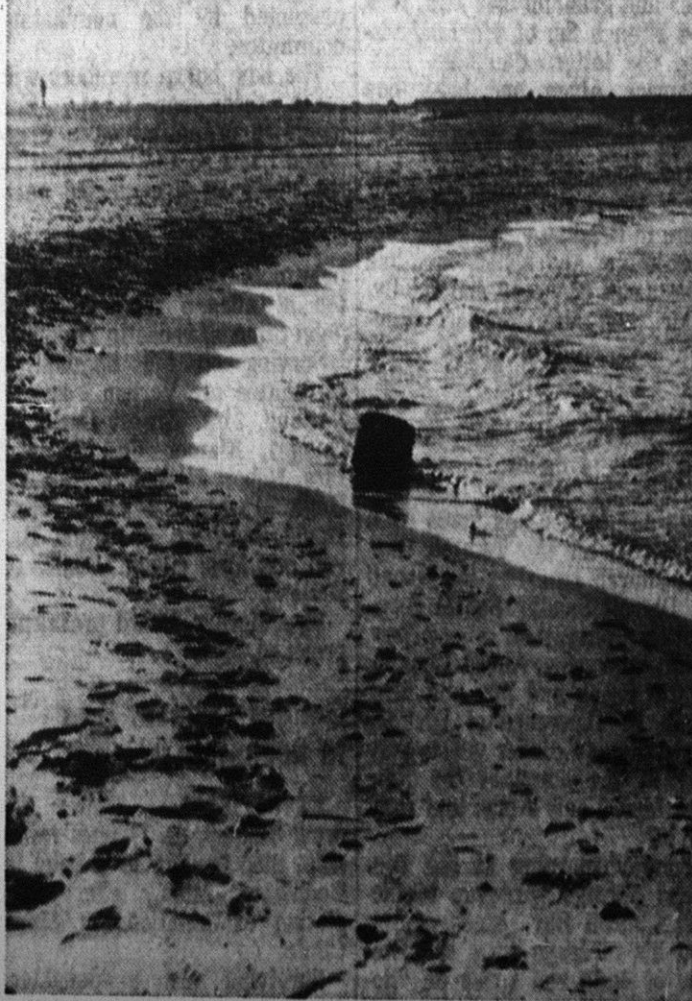

Dutch Take 20-0 Victory In Finale

Bursting through a dreary Saturday afternoon was a silver lined cloud carrying Hope College's football team to a 20-0 upset win over Ohio Northern before 1,900 fans in Riverview Park.

It was a great climax to what had been a frustrating season. The Flying Dutchmen had lost six games in seven starts, including the last three, and had made many costly mistakes.

But on Saturday everything went right and the Mom and Dad's Day crowd went home with a smile on their lips.

Hope's defensive effort was superb and served as a reward to the Hope staff which had worked diligently this season, confident the club could carry out the job.

And they did. It was defensive alertness that set up the three Hope touchdowns and it was also strong defense that prevented the big Ohio Northern team from crossing the goal. Northern brought a 6-2 record into the game.

Two Holland freshmen defenders figured prominently in the touchdowns and an ex-Holland resident set up the third.

Paul Wassenaar, playing defensive end, blocked an Ohio Northern punt on the Polar Bears 16 in the first quarter. Five plays later Hudsonville freshman Keith Abel cracked three yards off tackle to score with 2:54 left. Steve Wessling's kick failed.

Paul Bast, Grand Rapids senior who prepped at Holland, recovered an Ohio Northern fumble on the Hope 38 late in the third quarter. Three plays later Harlan Hyink hit Zeeland end Rog Kroodsma, who was alone on the 20, and he dashed alone into the end zone with 1:52 left. The scoring play covered 37 yards. Kroodsma converted.

Tom Pelon, another Holland freshman, intercepted a pass on the Ohio Northern 25 with 1:17 left in the game. He ran to the 17. With five seconds remaining Hyink sneaked the final yard. Kroodsma converted.

Three times the Hope defenders rose up and stopped Northern deep in Hope territory. After a 49-yard pass completion late in the first half, Northern moved to the Hope 14 but Terry Carlson intercepted a pass in the end zone.

In the third quarter, the Polar Bears got to the seven where a fourth down Wassenaar tackle ended the drive. A 34-yard pass play had put Northern on the Hope 14.

Early in the final period, Northern got to the 13, aided by two 15-yard face mask penalties and a 16-yard pass, but this time Gary Holvick stunted on fourth down and dropped the passer back on the Hope 48.

Hope held the losers to 68 yards rushing while gaining 166. Abel led Hope with 96 yards in 20 tries and Jim Bekkering had 51 in 16. Northern passed for 164 yards including nine of 21 but Hope intercepted three.

"Our defense was real tough," Coach Russ De Vette said, "and we were able to get better balance." "We were able to handle the left side pressure," De Vette said, "with Pelson, Max Schipper and Holvick." Northern was trying to move its ground game on this side.

He was especially pleased with the linebacking of Kroodsma, Tom Cousineau, who also intercepted a pass, and Carlson. Wassenaar was "tough," line coach Gord Brewer noted and he complimented senior John Stam for his blocking and offensive play. Stam, injured all season, was playing his first game and played the entire game on offense.

Vern Plagenhoef, Holland freshman, bruised a cartilage in his knee early in the game. Hope closed with a 2-6 record.

Three more touchdowns crossed in the first quarter.

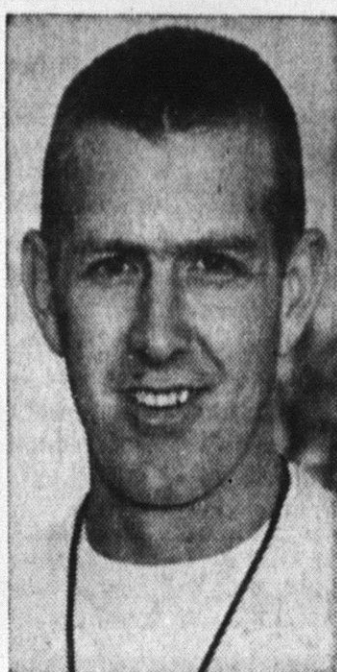
Jordan scored his first touchdown of the game on a 75-yard punt return. He scored his second on a 41-yard pass play from quarterback Green.

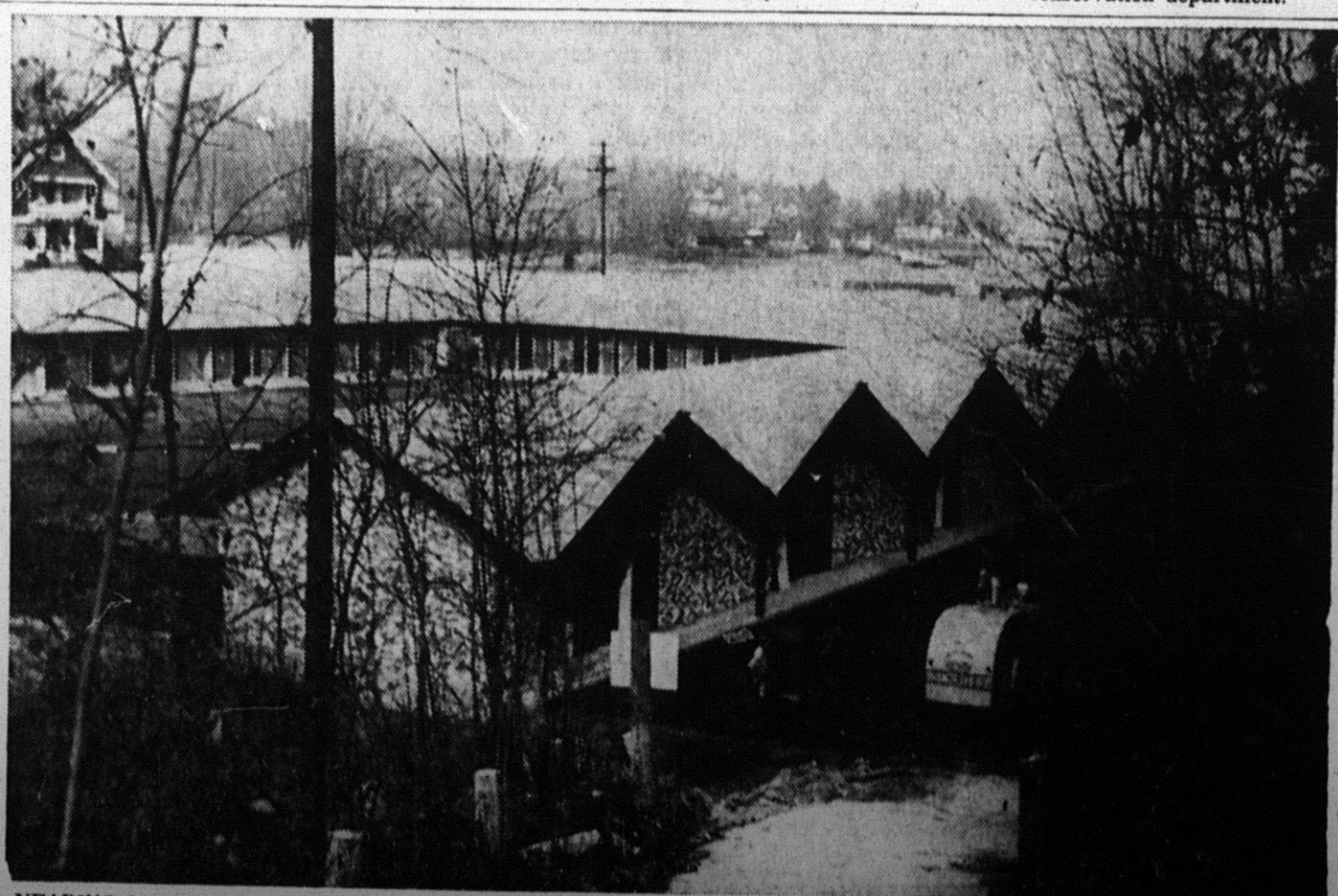

If you attended high school before World War I there is a good chance that you studied German, for as late as 1915 28 per cent of the total high school enrollment in the United States received instruction in that language.

The war, however, dealt a

mortal blow not only to German but to all modern foreign languages. In the United States, even as late as 1949, instruction in French, German and Spanish combined accounted for only fourteen per cent of the high school enrollment.

A decade later, when this country was the leader of the West in a time of constant international crisis, 56.4 per cent of all public high schools of grades 9 - 12 did not offer instruction in any modern foreign language. And of those schools which did, only a small percentage provided a third and fourth year of the same language. Moreover, even with this lamentable nation-wide situation in the teaching of foreign languages, Michigan, to state a specific example, in 1961 ranked only twenty-sixth.

The advent of the Sputniks and the passing of the National Defense Education Act have had salutary effects on language enrollments and teaching in the United States, but the picture as a whole is still a dismal one, for Americans remain essentially linguistically illiterate. For instance, many high schools do not even offer a modern foreign language and of those which do, few provide four full years of instruction in the same language; the programs are frequently not sufficiently intensive; and many teachers are inadequately prepared to teach effectively the language as a means of oral communication.

Holland is in a more advantageous position than some communities in Michigan in regard to modern foreign language instruction. Holland High School offers three years of French and four years of German and Spanish. West Ottawa offers two years of French, German and Russian and three years of Spanish. It is true that some of the teachers are called upon to instruct too many sections, but both schools fortunately have language laboratories. At Hope College instruction is offered in all of the languages mentioned above. Several of the teachers are native speakers of their language and every member of the modern language staff has traveled abroad. We have had a language laboratory since 1955 — one of the first laboratories in Michigan — and instruction in the languages follows the intensive aural-oral method.

Despite the fact that the Holland area is more language-minded than other Michigan areas, the present lack of foreign language instruction in the grades because of a shortage of funds is deplorable. Language instruction in the grades offers a realistic solution to our linguistic isolation. Languages should be learned by the young. Ideally, our school systems should provide the opportunity for language study commencing at the age of ten and certainly not later than the beginning of junior high school. The instruction should be by teachers competent in the language, and such training should be rigorous and the content progressively more difficult. Classes should meet five days per week for at least the first four years, and instruction should be provided through the twelfth grade.

As parents and citizens we can

play an important role in creating a favorable atmosphere for the mastery of this very important discipline. We can promote the interest in foreign language study among our own children and other members of the community. We can advocate the strengthening of existing language programs in the curriculum of our schools, and we can support the improvement of the total educational program with our tax dollars. A step forward for Holland would be the reinstatement of the foreign language program in the elementary schools so admirably begun a decade ago by Dr. Ellert and Mrs. Klomparsen.

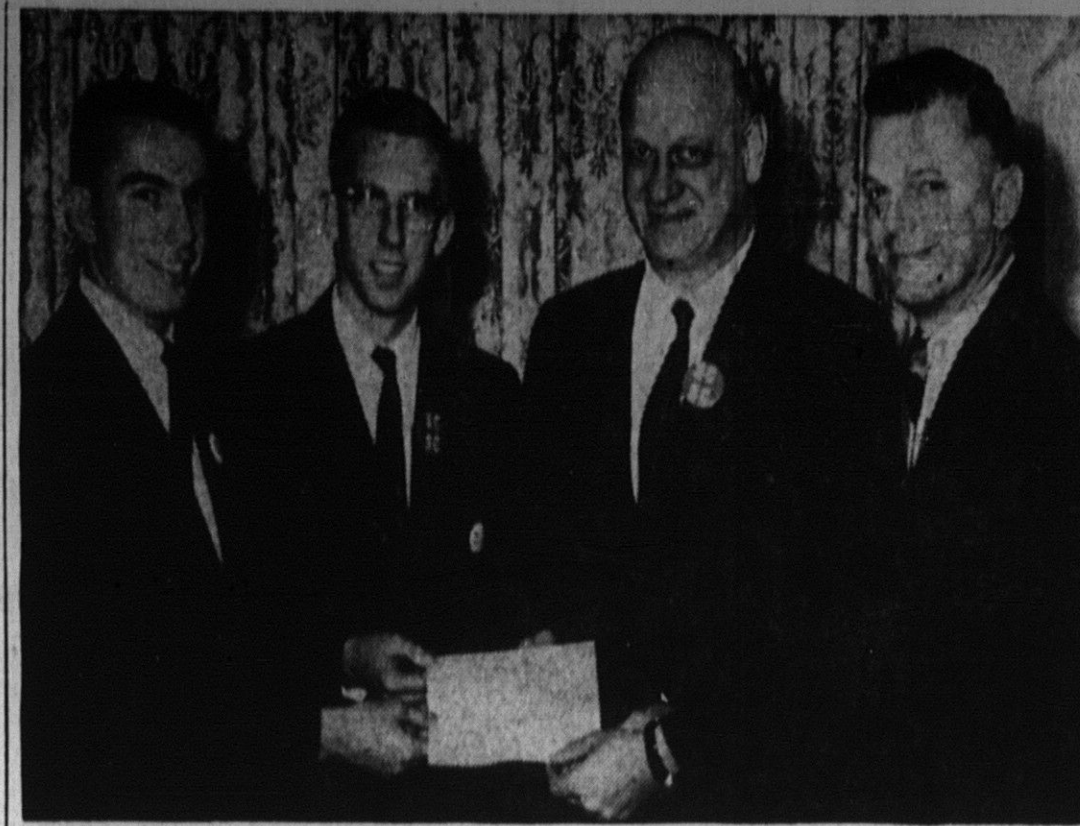

Lida Rogers Is Praised In Editorial

The late Lida Rogers, who started Holland's Tulip Festival 35 years ago, is lauded in an editorial in the November issue of Motor News, official magazine of the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Titled "You can make your town world-famous," the editorial points out that while her name may not mean much to the average Michigander today, what she did for Holland and tourists will have a lasting mark.

The editorial recalls the role played by Miss Rogers, a high school biology teacher, in suggesting an annual celebration to commemorate a flower. Since 85 per cent of the city's population was Dutch, the tulip was a logical choice. The result was the first Tulip Festival in May, 1929.

World-wide acclaim for Holland followed with thousands of tourists attracted annually to the western Michigan city.

Pointing out that Miss Rogers is an excellent example, "We'll bet there are a hundred simple workable ideas for each community in Michigan which could produce similar results," the editorial concludes.

School Co-op Training Reviewed

Functions of the cooperative training program in Holland were reviewed at a monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in the library of Holland High School.

Currently, 159 students from three high schools are in the program listing 96 of Holland High, 53 of West Ottawa and 10 of Holland Christian. The latter are all "pinkies" at Holland Hospital.

The program was explained by Donald Gebrard, business coordinator; Myles Runk, coordinator of trade and industry, and Robert Clark, coordinator of distributive education which takes in not only retailing but jobs handling all goods from the manufacturer to the consumer.

Placing the student in the right job at the right time under the right circumstances makes a happy employee, co-op leaders said. The program is mainly for seniors, although there are some exceptions for juniors. The program is expected to become even larger next semester with an estimated enrollment of 175.

The coordinators pointed to possibilities of an area cooperative program which would also take in Zeeland. Zeeland already has made surveys and such a program is expected to be organized there, separately or area wise.

Some 45 per cent of co-op students go on to college, particularly those in nursing training or in such positions as those offered at the Sentinel.

Distributive education has the largest dropout, perhaps due to the widely scattered opportunities and the limited preliminary training, if any. In most cases, the serious co-op student is still working in the same place a year after he starts his work, except in those cases where he goes on to college and even then, some maintain part-time jobs with the employers who hired them for co-op training.

Considerable coordination within the program is done with equipment at the various schools. For instance, two West Ottawa boys are taking machine shop training at Holland High and one Holland High boy is taking carpenter training at West Ottawa and is one of 12 students engaged in building a ranch home. In the spring, Ag students at West Ottawa expect to put in the lawn. The co-op project may even extend to the home ec classes on draperies, etc.

Studies are under way for an auto mechanics shop at West Ottawa. Such facilities would not be duplicated at Holland High, nor would the present equipment in electricity and electronics, certain machines and some printing equipment at Holland High be duplicated at West Ottawa.

In other business, the board was informed that the parent-teacher conferences at E. E. Fell Junior High School attracted an average attendance of 77.2 per cent. These conferences were Oct. 29 and 30, and Nov. 2 and 3 with an evening session Nov. 5. The program currently is being evaluated.

Secretary Harry Frissel reported receipt of \$128,830 from the county treasurer in state aid, representing one-sixth of the total for the year.

Continuing the study on school policies, the board briefly discussed a chapter on building service employees, workmen's compensation, etc.

President Harvey Buter presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and 10 minutes. Albert Schaafsma gave the invocation. William Gargano was absent.

Creativity in Arranging Described by Mrs. Riester

With a charming manner and a vividness of spirit showing through her artistic conception of flower arranging, Mrs. Dorothy Riester, landscape consultant and designer of Cazenovia, N.Y., challenged Holland Garden Club members and guests at a meeting at the Woman's Literary Club on Thursday afternoon. She approached her subject, "A Few Materials. Many Designs" from a creative and imaginative viewpoint.

The speaker said "creativity is a very elusive subject, to create the arranger takes known things and reorganizes them in different light to stimulate and to create an entirely new thing." Each creation will be a known thing plus the object desired; each creation will be different because the things experienced in the maker's background will be an influence known only to that person.

"There are several tools which we use in creating visual art," continued Mrs. Riester, "the first of which is our eyes or our perception." The artist must stimulate the eye to motion to really see the composition. The second tool is light which can be used in many ways — to create the idea of depth, for comparison and for creative emphasis as the beam of light used in many Gothic cathedrals. Light is a prerequisite to seeing because without it there is no dark or light object or color to see."

The object used to work with is the third tool in creativity and Mrs. Riester used a container to demonstrate how the shape and texture affects what you are striving for. The other factor in using the chosen object is the feel or life of the object as the arranger responds to it.

The last tool is the space the arranger chooses to work with and how she uses it. Each time you arrange your space is different and she demonstrated how an enclosed space with two curving branches makes you conscious of the prescribed space and how by using a curved branch and a straight stem space within was completely different as was the motion. By adding one white flower the conception was again changed and the theory of a focal point was graphically shown.

The speaker encouraged arrangers to use the accidental for ideas even to the bubbles in your dishpan, to arrange in a wider scope rather than within the four walls of your home and most important of all to remember that your creation does not have to be wildly different, it

is just a simple little twist of putting things together to create a new experience.

Mrs. William C. Vandenberg, Jr. presided at the meeting. She welcomed members and guests and announced that the Christmas Workshop, "December Designer" will be held on Dec. 3 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Civic Center and that there will be no admission fee this year. Mrs. Paul McIlwain, flower arranging chairman, introduced the speaker.

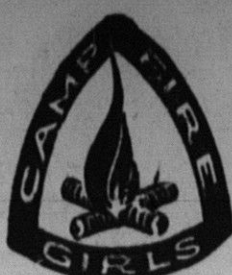

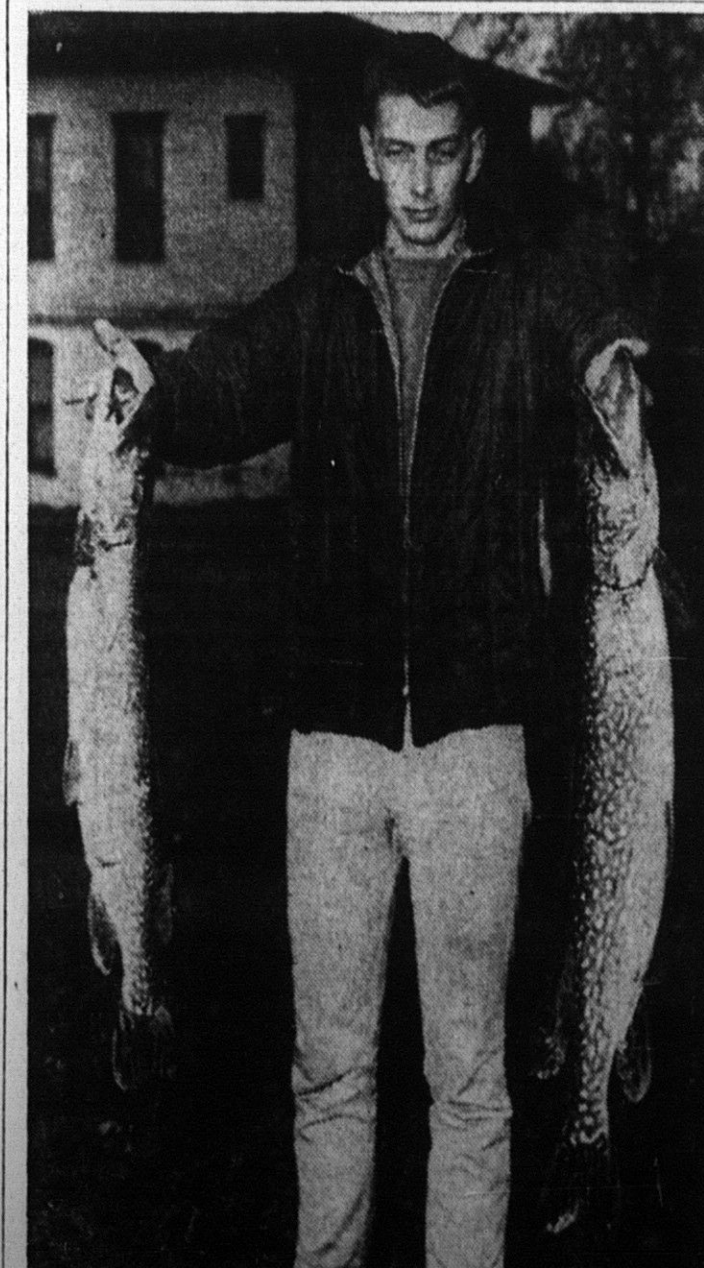

The chapter meets every Monday at 8 p.m. on the third floor of the Hansen Building. Men interested in barbershop singing are welcome to attend.

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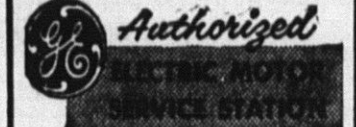
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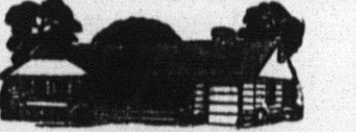


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
