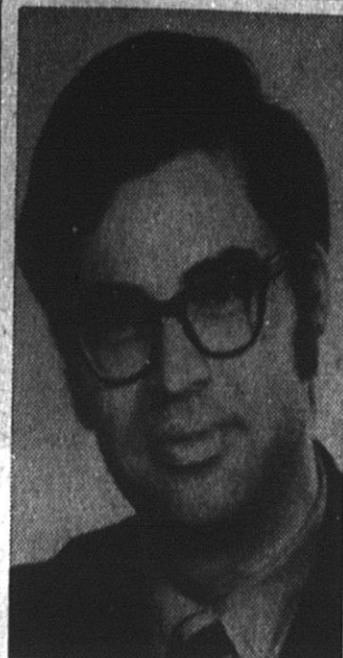

School Bus Millage Vote Coming Soon

A transportation millage proposition is expected to be presented to Holland school district voters soon, a transportation study committee headed by Dr. James Prins, informed the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night in Holland High Library.

The amount of the millage will be determined by the board within 30 days, Dr. Prins added. Serving with him on the study committee were Mrs. Katherine Mackenzie, Charles Bradford and John Keuning.

The committee worked with Supt. Donald L. Ihrman and Buildings and Grounds Supt. Edward Prins, and also sent authorities to Lansing to check on current laws governing school transportation.

No action was taken on aligning with the Ottawa Intermediate School District in sharing data processing services with the Muskegon Intermediate Areas School District. The vote was 3-3 with John Weeber, James Lamb and James Prins dissenting. Favoring the measure were Mrs. Mackenzie, Charles Bradford and John Keuning. Robert Gosselar was absent. The matter may be considered again later.

The school administration was authorized to prepare a proposal to be submitted to the Michigan Department of Education on providing a bilingual program the second semester in three kindergartens in Lincoln, Washington and Federal Schools. Curriculum Director Gardner Wieringa said the local district has a relatively large Spanish American population and many children entering kindergarten have limited skills in English. The proposal tentatively calls for employing and training 2 1/2 full-time or five half-time bilingual paraprofessionals to assist kindergarten teachers in the three schools. They would teach Spanish to the English speaking children as well as teaching English to the Spanish speaking children.

Supt. Ihrman said the Department of Education has approved Holland's 1970-71 application for reading centers and will provide \$60,965 for this service.

Ottawa Intermediate Supt. Roger Troupe in a communication commended Holland teachers for assisting in the recent deaf and hard-of-hearing conference, and also expressed his pleasure at seeing and hearing the Holland Madrigals perform.

Building and Grounds Chairman John Weeber thanked all persons assisting in the cleanup of water-logged Junior High Oct. 31 after a two-inch water pipe ruptured. He mentioned the custodians, clerks, teachers, professional cleaning establishments and board members in the mopping up operations. He said another leak four or five days later was less serious and said a number of pipes has been replaced.

He also said the Citizens Advisory Committee has recommended two new junior high buildings of 900 students each in the east and west sections of the city and recommended that committees be named for buildings, sites, finances, curriculum study, public information and facility use.

Board President James O. Lamb said the board would study the University of Michigan report on the junior high situation and prescribe some areas of study before he will appoint the committees.

No action was taken on an offer from Donald Greengood for the property at 78 West 15th St. for \$15,800.

Mrs. Mackenzie said the committee on the evaluation of teachers has met to study such evaluation and concluded such action is not the duty of the board but of the administration, and the work is being done satisfactorily by principals at the present time. She said, however, that the committee would be meeting again and would be re-studying the University of Michigan report as well as studying evaluation in districts of similar size. Serving with Mrs. Mackenzie on the committee are Robert Gosselar, Dr. Prins and John Weeber.

The board approved the appointment of Mrs. Marcia De Young as elementary physical education teacher and Mrs. Kendra Rose in special education. Both are Hope College graduates.

The meeting lasted an hour and 40 minutes. The invocation was given by Charles Bradford.

Draft Initial Plans For Police Station

Will Build On Present 8th St. Site

New District Court
Will Be Nearby But
No Final Site Chosen

Plans for Holland's new police station to be erected on the present site on West Eighth St. were unveiled at a press conference today in Mayor Nelson Bosman's office in City Hall.

Plans call for a building approximately 112 by 100 feet costing about \$605,000 complete, although some alternates may reduce this figure. Estimated cost of the building only is \$439,700.

It would replace an old structure in service for many years. This building was "modernized" in a WPA project in the 1930's when a brick facade was added.

City Manager William L. Bopf said property has been acquired amounting to just over one acre to house not only the police building but a new district court for Ottawa county. The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners has approved the site but has made no decision on where the court building will be placed. One plan calls for placing the building immediately to the north and having a Seventh St. entrance. Another places it on Eighth St. to the east on the present parking lot. County leaders also are considering placing a branch sheriff's office in the new court building. An underground tunnel would connect the court building with the police building.

Plans drafted by the architectural firm of Kammeraad, Stroop and Vander Leek, call for a building one floor and basement incorporating the latest in communications and security measures. It would have enclosed parking for 16 police cars in the basement level, and ample reception area, offices, a celloblock for 12, and other areas for police functions.

Among alternates under consideration are an underground shooting gallery, and a second floor shell.

The police area of the existing building will remain in use during the construction of the new building. The fire section would be demolished to make room for the new structure which will cover the area of the present fire building and property now occupied by two homes to the west.

Bopf said the city has acquired three houses on Seventh St. and is negotiating for a fourth. This would allow adequate space for both structures and parking for some 70 vehicles.

Bopf said Holland's share in the new complex would probably be financed through Holland's new building authority which is holding its first meeting tonight. Financing likely would be a 20-year revenue bond issue calling for \$50,000 to \$60,000 to be paid each year on principle and interest.

The Council committee on planning consisted of Lou Halacy, chairman, Elmer Wissink and Robert Dykstra, assisted by Bopf, Lt. Ernest Bear and former Police Chief Les Van Beveren.

Mayor Bosman said the county committee studying the court building has planned a meeting with architects next Monday. Lawrence A. Wade of Holland is a member of this committee.

Bopf said the detective bureau which currently occupies space on the second floor over the fire station likely will be moved to one of the existing houses during construction. The West Eighth St. fire company recently moved to modern new quarters in the industrial park area, financed through the city's capital improvement fund, mostly financed by profits of the city light plant.

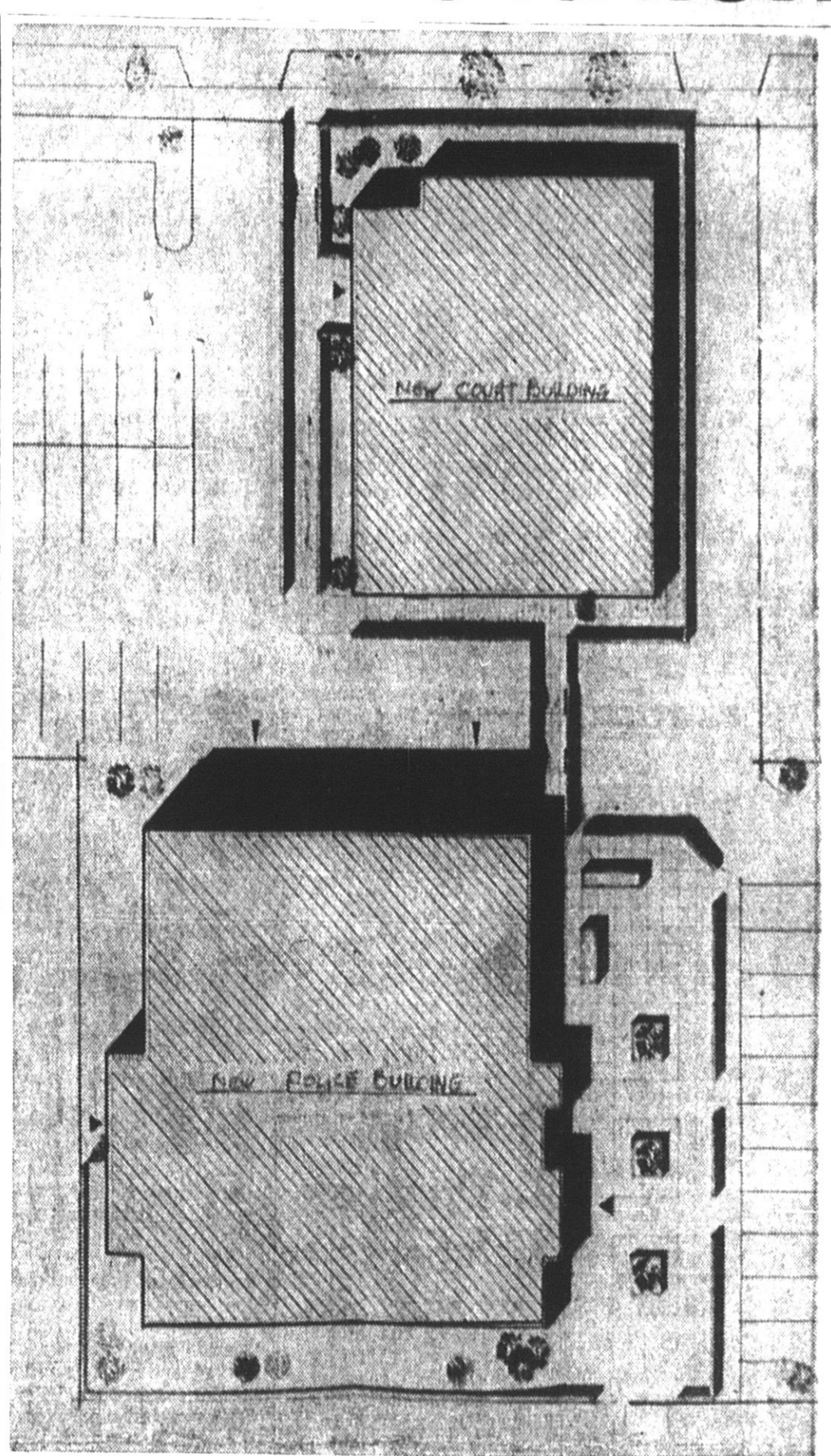
Three Unusual Films Set at Herrick Library

W. N. Shappee Killed in Crash

William N. Shappee, 37, of 14111 Ridgewood Drive, returning home from a bowling event in Grand Haven where he worked, was fatally injured at 12:01 a.m. today when the car he was driving went out of control along 136th Ave., hit a cement culvert and overturned.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the impact ripped the engine from the car and tossed the motor 33 feet from where the car came to rest. Shappee, alone in the vehicle, was found in the wreckage.

Deputies said the auto skidded sideways about 250 feet before striking three mailboxes and the culvert in the driveway of a home at 4241 136th Ave., three-tenths of a mile north of Quincy St.

Shappee was dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. He suffered a broken neck and compound fractures of the upper left leg, deputies said.

Shappee, father of two children, is the 27th traffic fatality this year in Ottawa county. It compares with 35 deaths recorded on this date in 1969.

Shappee was employed by Gardner-Denver Co. in Grand Haven and was a member of the firm's bowling team. A Korean War veteran, Shappee was past Grand Knight of council 2975, Knights of Columbus in Grand Haven, serving a second term as second vice chairman of the Ottawa County Red Cross and was a member of the Holiday Squares square dance club.

Probe Cause Of Early Morning Blaze In Office

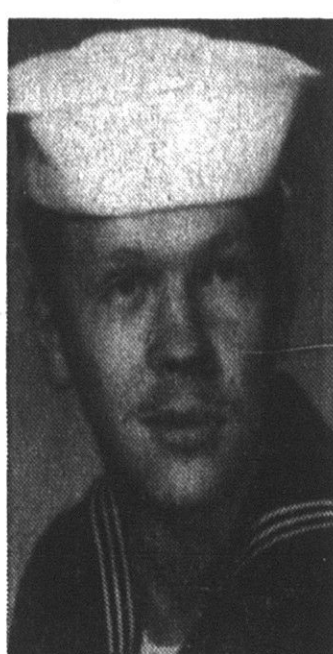

Plan Test Of CD Sirens

The Ottawa County Civil Defense plans a test of sirens in the county Friday, Nov. 27 at 11 a.m.

Certainly there is some wisdom in the suggestion that this is the time for a while that Detroit will place itself at the mercy of the mechanical monster. Sander Levin perhaps had the right idea when he said that the Pony Express would be more efficient and reliable than the newfangled voting machine.

It is generally accepted that large cities know how to do complicated things better than small towns, and we suspect that Detroit thought it could show the country how voting really should be done. But it seems now that the electronic process was assigned a job it was unable to fulfill.

The people of Detroit may go back to voting just like us little towns, and the results may be more satisfactory all round. Automation will no doubt still be around and improvement in the next two years could change the program.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 15, 1970
Growing Through Giving
Romans 12: 1-8
By C. P. Dame

Many good causes make appeals today. They all need money. It is fine to respond to worthwhile causes and to give money and ourselves to them. God calls upon us to yield ourselves wholly to Him since He has shown His mercy to us.

I. Dedication makes for meaningful living. "I beseech you therefore, my brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." In chapters 1 to 12 Paul sets forth Christian doctrines, from 12 to 16 he deals with practical problems. Knowledge should be followed by deeds. The word "family" refers to God's redeemed household, members of it are brethren and all have experienced the mercies of God. The Jewish Christians before their conversion had offered unwilling animals as sacrifices, now they and all should willingly yield themselves as sacrifices to God, wholly and thankfully.

Surrendered living involves living distinctly different from the world. Instead of being conformed to the world they were to be "transformed by the renewing of the mind"—which means the whole inner self. When that inner change happens it expresses itself in outward living according to the will of God.

II. Self-appraisal is beneficial. Some people think too little of themselves, others too much. People do not all have an equal amount of gifts and abilities. Those who have, should thankfully use what they have received in the service of God with humility. Paul likens the church to the human body. Each member makes it contribution to the welfare of the body. Every Christian should use all his resources in His service. What would happen in a congregation if every member would serve the Lord with all his powers?

III. God's gifts vary. Paul mentions several in the text. There is prophecy, which may mean foretelling or forthtelling, teaching and preaching. The art of ministering, being helpful to others, is always beneficial. The church always needs teachers who appeal to minds and there is a place for those who exhort, and thus arouse the consciences of people and quicken their feelings so that action may follow.

All should be done with simplicity in a cheerful manner. Those who have authority should use it wisely and with diligence. Those who lead should take their responsibility seriously and all who show mercy to the undeserving should do so with cheer.

We all can give something, most of us more than we do now. God gave His Son who gave His life for us. Let us examine ourselves and set a higher goal for ourselves. And then aim for it with zest.

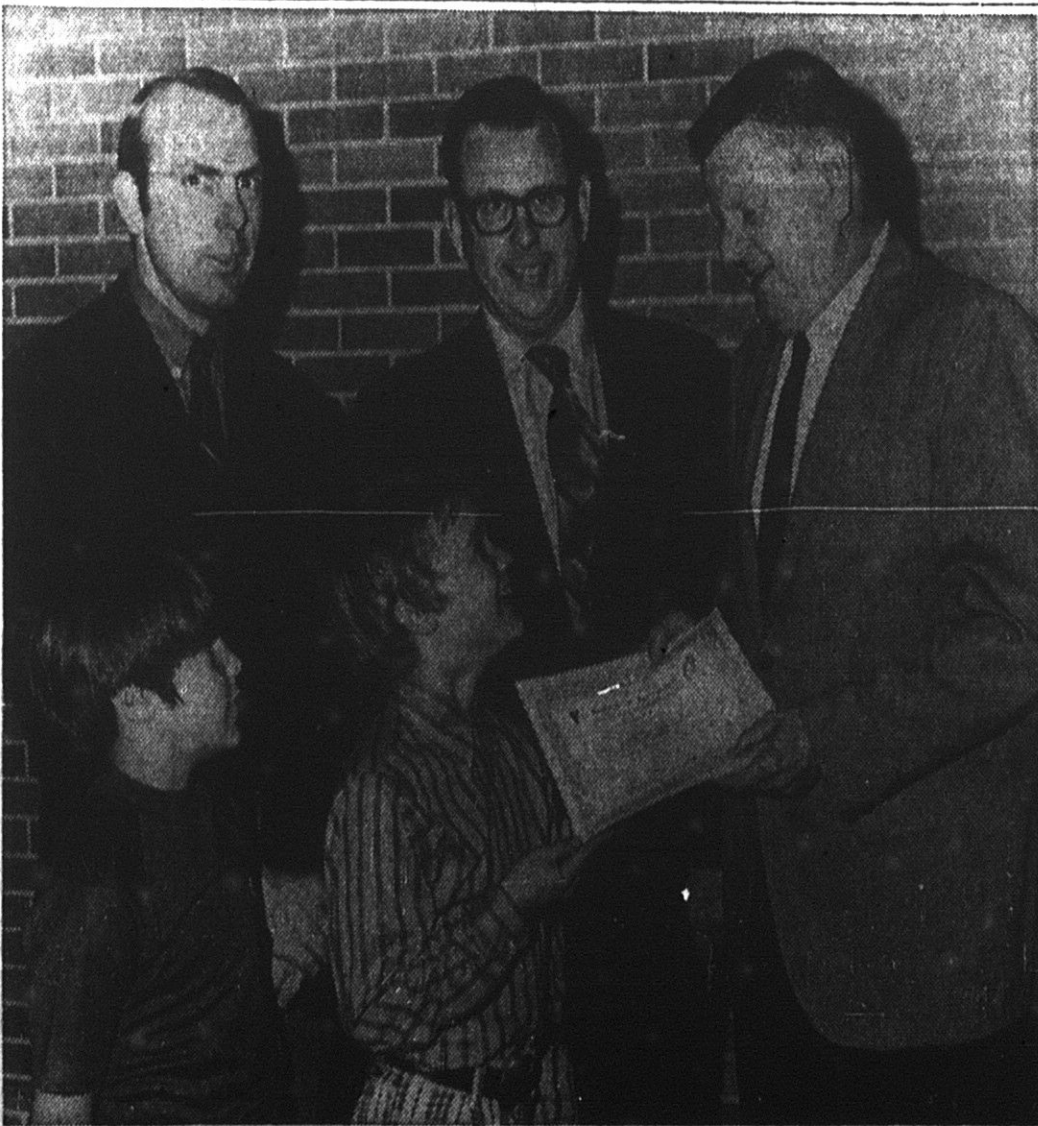

Now is the time for high school seniors to apply for admission to M.S.U. and for scholarships. The schools do have the applications — "Application for Admission and Financial Aid." Form No. 9 must be completed if the student is interested in financial aid. Form No. 14 must be completed if the student wants to be considered for the 4-H scholarship. Any senior who has been active in the 4-H program is eligible to apply for a 4-H scholarship. Applications are also available at the 4-H Office. 4-H scholarships are available only for Michigan State University.

There are several 4-H training meetings coming up very shortly. A 4-H Creative Arts leader's workshop will be held on Thursday and Friday, Nov. 12 and 13 at Camp Kett. This workshop is designed to help leaders with creative arts in such areas as Black Printing, Puppetry, Creative Music, Crayons, Macrame and Wire Sculpture.

Also on Nov. 12 and 13 a Home Design leader's workshop will be held at Camp Kett. This is designed around color in the home. On Friday and Saturday, Dec. 11 and 12 a workshop for 4-H teen leaders in the horse project will be held. We already have six teen leaders who are planning to attend this workshop. 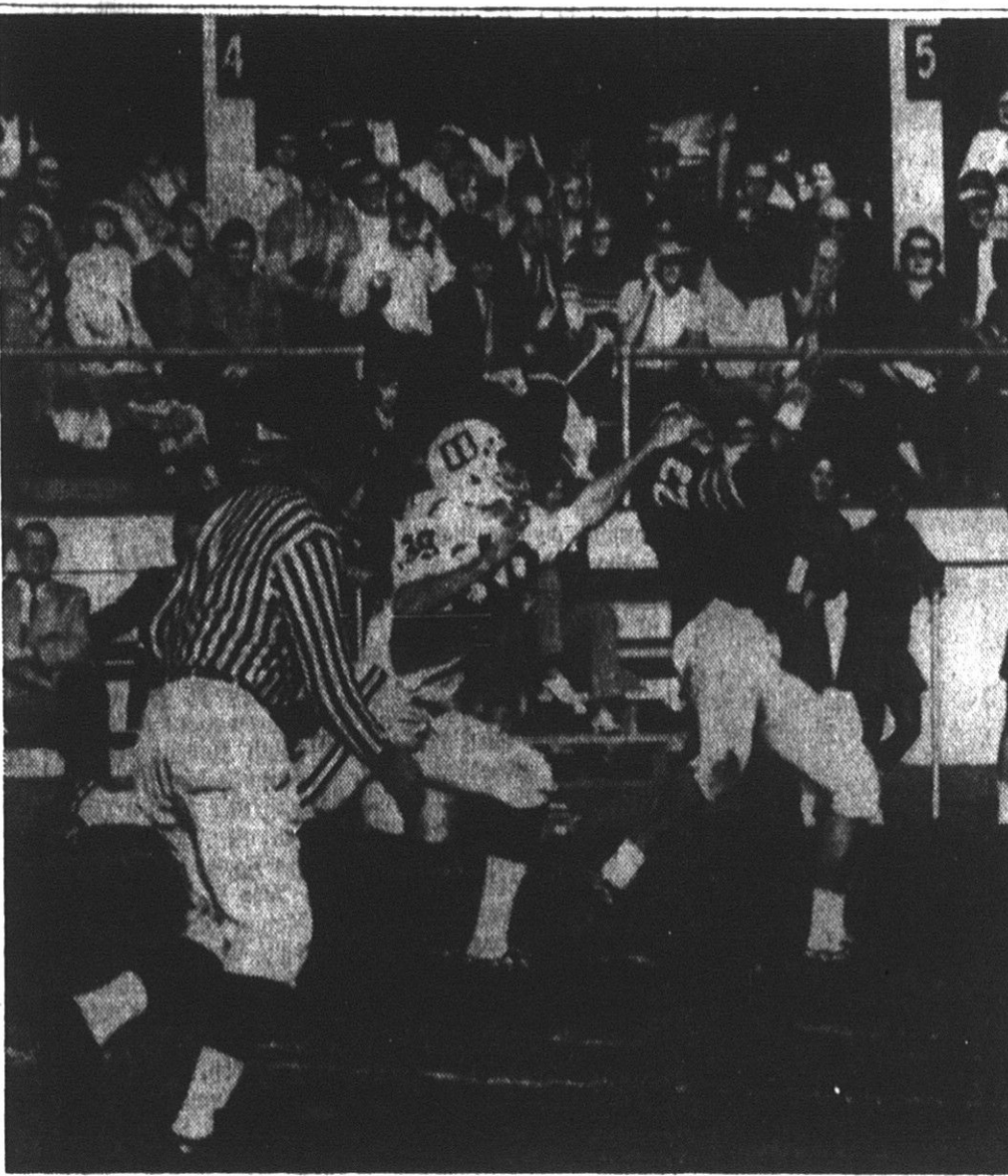

Greg Voss Rushes For 1,079 Yards

Greg Voss became the first Hope College football player and only the eighth in Michigan history to rush for 1,000 yards or more in a single season Saturday at Riverview Park as he led the Flying Dutchmen to their first winning season since 1963.

The sensational freshman gained 149 yards in 31 carries to run his season ending total to 1,079 as Hope closed its season with a thrilling 26-18 victory over Taylor University on Parents Day before 3,733 fans on a beautiful day for football.

The amazing thing about Voss's feat was he didn't play in Hope's first game against Defiance and played in only three plays in Hope's second encounter with Franklin.

Ron Johnson, the ex-Michigan halfback is the all-time single season rushing leader in the state with a 1,391 total and Voss would have probably broken his record too, if he had played in nine games instead of seven plus three plays of another.

Hope's fine quarterback Groy Kaper closed out his outstanding career by flipping three touchdown passes and connecting on 19 of 26 passes for 281 yards. As one observer in the press box said, "Kaper was really threading the needle" and that he was, as he was putting the ball right on the money, as was Taylor's junior quarterback Mike McKinley who completed 22 of 40 passes for 270 yards. Even though McKinley is a junior, it's his first year of playing collegiate football and one must wonder how good he would have been if he had played in his first two years of college.

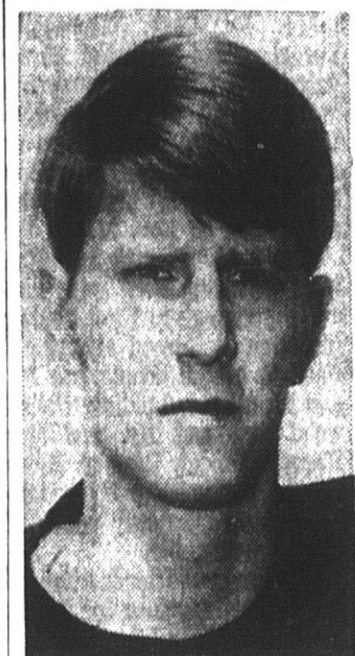
A 55-yard screen pass, run play from Kaper to co-captain Bob Haveman of Fremont set up Hope's first score in the opening quarter. Two plays later Kaper connected for his first TD pass of the day, an 11-yard strike to Barry Brugger who was all alone in the end zone. The kick failed as Hope took a 6-0 lead.

Ted Albrecht, Hope's 6'4" 204 defensive end set up his teams next touchdown by recovering McKinley's fumble deep in Hope territory.

A roughing the kicker penalty on Bob Lamer aided the Dutchmen march for their second touchdown as Kaper hit

Bob's brother Jim for an 18-yard toss and Mike Hinga added the PAT to put Hope up by a 13-0 score in the opening stanza.

The next time Hope got the

ball in the second period, Voss skirted 34-yards to the Trojans 18 but Taylor stopped the Dutchmen on a fourth and one situation at the nine as Hinga's field goal never got underway as holder Jon Constant had a hard time in handling the snap from center.

Co-captain Karl Nadolsky of Hope intercepted a Trojan pass but on the following series Kaper returned the favor by doing the same thing.

A defensive pass interference call aided in Hope's next drive for its third touchdown as the Dutchmen marched downfield behind the smooth arm of Kaper to take a 20-0 lead at the half.

Bob Lamer ran six yards for Hope's third TD with 21 seconds to play in the half behind some solid blocking up front by center Chris Hahn and company.

Eric Turner of Taylor booted a 19-yard field goal at the outset of the third quarter to cut Hope's margin to 20-3.

Larry Dillon scored Taylor's first touchdown moments later from the one-yard line of Hope on a fourth and goal situation as the Trojans were determined to get back into the game.

The Dutchmen failed to score in the third period but with 3:03 to play in the game, Kaper hit Jim Lamer for his third TD pass of the afternoon to the delight of Hope's fans as Hope closed out its scoring for the year with 26 points.

Gene Fadel dashed 46 yards on a draw play with only 23 seconds left in the game for Taylor and Brad Gerlach ran

in the conversion against Hope's reserves to close out the scoring at 26-18 in favor of the mighty Dutchmen.

For Hope, it was its first winning season since 1963 when they also finished with a 5-4 record under Russ DeVette. Taylor slips to a 6-3 mark with one game to go.

"I'm proud of everyone on our team and I can't say enough about the way they performed for us this year," concluded a happy Smith.

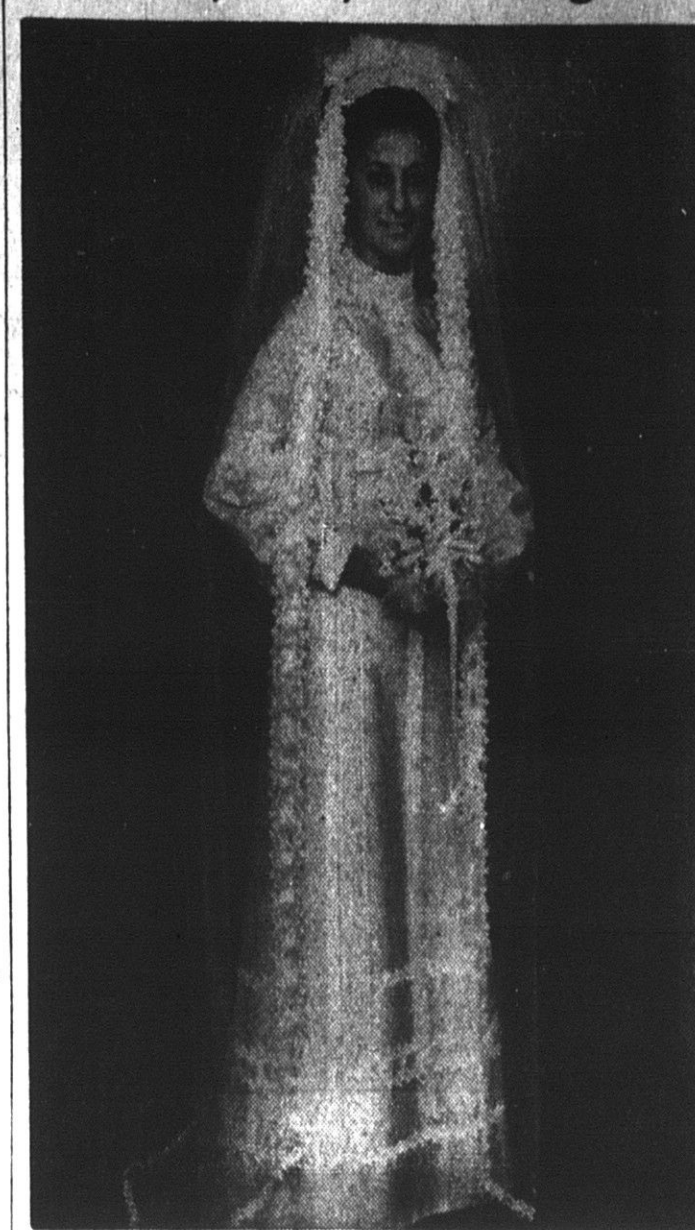

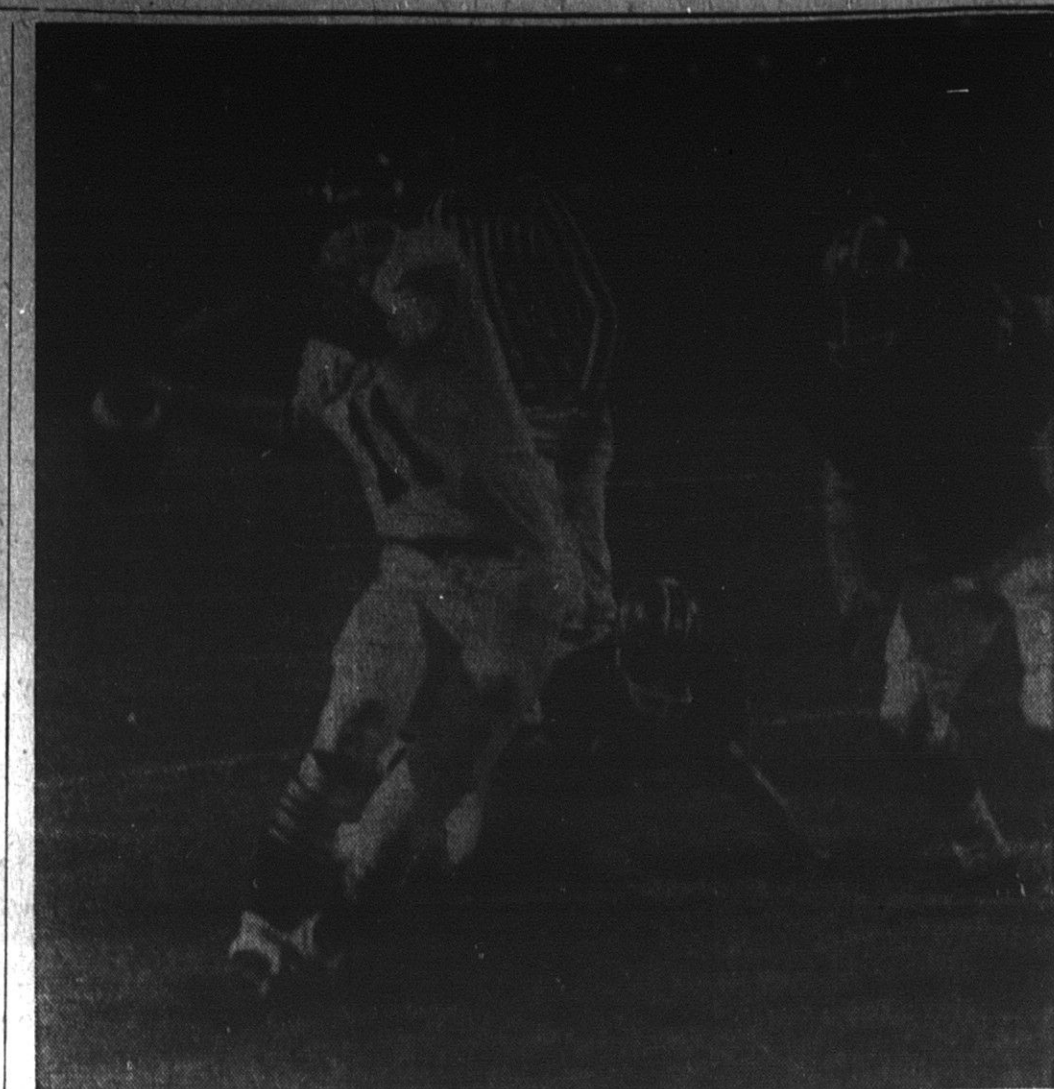

Van Tongeren who is a senior showed his worth Friday by knocking down quarterback Charlie Arnsen's pass and then intercepting it and setting up his and Holland's third TD and also blocked a punt deep in Sailor territory.

Van Tongeren who plays the upback position in Coach Dave Kempker's offense bulled his way for 61-yards rushing in 11 carries to finish second behind tailback Randy Kuipers 71 total on 13 attempts but when the Dutch needed the tough yards, it was Holland's senior that got the call most of the time.

Mona Shores took the opening kickoff and marched right down deep into Holland territory but behind a fearsome defensive rush by Doug Morse, Dave Yskes and Bill Wolters, the Dutch pushed the Sailors back to their 42-yard line.

The Sailors picked up three first downs on their opening drive and were able to only add more over the next two periods against the rugged Dutch defense.

Holland took over on its own 36 and promptly marched 64 yards in 12 plays to score its first TD on a 10-yard quarterback sneak by Tim Matchinsky who fooled everyone in the stands by his daring call. Matchinsky passed to Kuipers for the two points as the Dutch enjoyed their 8-0 margin.

With Assistant Coach Clyde Line calling down some of the plays from the pressbox, Holland marched in for its second touchdown on the following series by going 89-yards in 15 plays with Matchinsky once again scoring on a sneak from the two.

Holland's backs were getting fine blocking from the offensive line consisting of center Ron Wadsworth, guards Dave Yskes and Terry Smith and tackles Wolters and Morse as the Dutch were employing the type of ball control that Kempker loves to see.

Van Tongeren came up with the crowd pleasing play of the night by knocking down Charlie Arnsen's attempted pass and in an almost diving motion, picked off the high spinning pigskin and raced to the three yard line of the Sailors with time running out in the half.

On the following play, Van Tongeren busted over for the score behind blocks thrown by Yskes and Morse. Matchinsky found Steve Ver Beek in the end zone for two more points to give the Dutch a 22-0 lead at the intermission.

Holland's defense was at its best in the third period as the Sailors were lucky to gain over one yard against the fired up Dutch who were determined to notch their fifth win of the year.

Early in the fourth period Holland added its final touchdown on a 35-yard pass, run play from Matchinsky to Ver Beek.

Kempker went to his bench after the score and it looked like Holland's reserves were going to hold the Sailors scoreless but with only :59 seconds left to play, offensive end Joel Coston was put in at fullback and the solid Coston barreled his way 24-yards for the TD on a fourth and nine situation. Stan Mantheis' kick closed out the scoring at 28-7.

"We were happy to get everything in the game and I thought that Van Tongeren played a fine game for us," said Kempker.

The Dutch now 5-3 for the season, will close out their season next Friday by hosting Godwin at Riverview Park.

Working in a relaxed but deft manner, she added anecdotes about her collection of materials and containers as she described each arrangement.

For Thanksgiving, an orange ceramic, pumpkin-shaped container was used to hold a gourd, hedgeapple and spray of dyed oats. Driftwood, surrounded by a variety of gourds, and a scale, balanced with fruit and nuts, were effective decorations, and for the children's table, a "turkey" centerpiece, using an orange straw container, one Bird of Paradise bloom for the head, sansevieria leaves for the tail and a body of varied colored pompon mums.

For the period between Thanksgiving and Christmas, a ceramic deerhead, displayed with fall foliage, nuts and pinecones, could later be used as the center for a wreath, while candle rings of cones and nuts lend themselves to a simple change of candle colors. A tall, wooden balustrade was draped in a Hogarth curve with glycerized spiral eucalyptus, antiqued artificial grapes, rose hips, nuts and bittersweet berries, topped by an orange candle.

These same balustrades and table legs used during the Christmas season adorned with sprays of greens, cones, pods, red ribbon and candles. A Mexican papier-mache shepherd, with a yellow print cloak, added a dimension to the traditional red and green of Christmas, as Mrs. Christensen complemented the figure with glycerized holly sprays, yellow pompon mums and a pussy willow "crook" set on a black lacquered two-tiered base.

A variety of angels were shown, ranging from tiny Swiss straw ones and handmade starched muslin ones to a gold-sprayed coconut fibre one made in Hawaii, with which coffee tree foliage, native to Hawaii, and red carnations were arranged on a wood slat base.

A hand-crafted glass angel incorporating a container on either side of its skirt, into which Mrs. Christensen simply placed two bunches of air fern, "for the gal who doesn't like to make arrangements," brought

applause from the audience, but the obvious crowd-pleaser was an arrangement of green fern, coffee foliage, red carnations and white starburst mums on an antique pewter candle mold, offset by two red tapers.

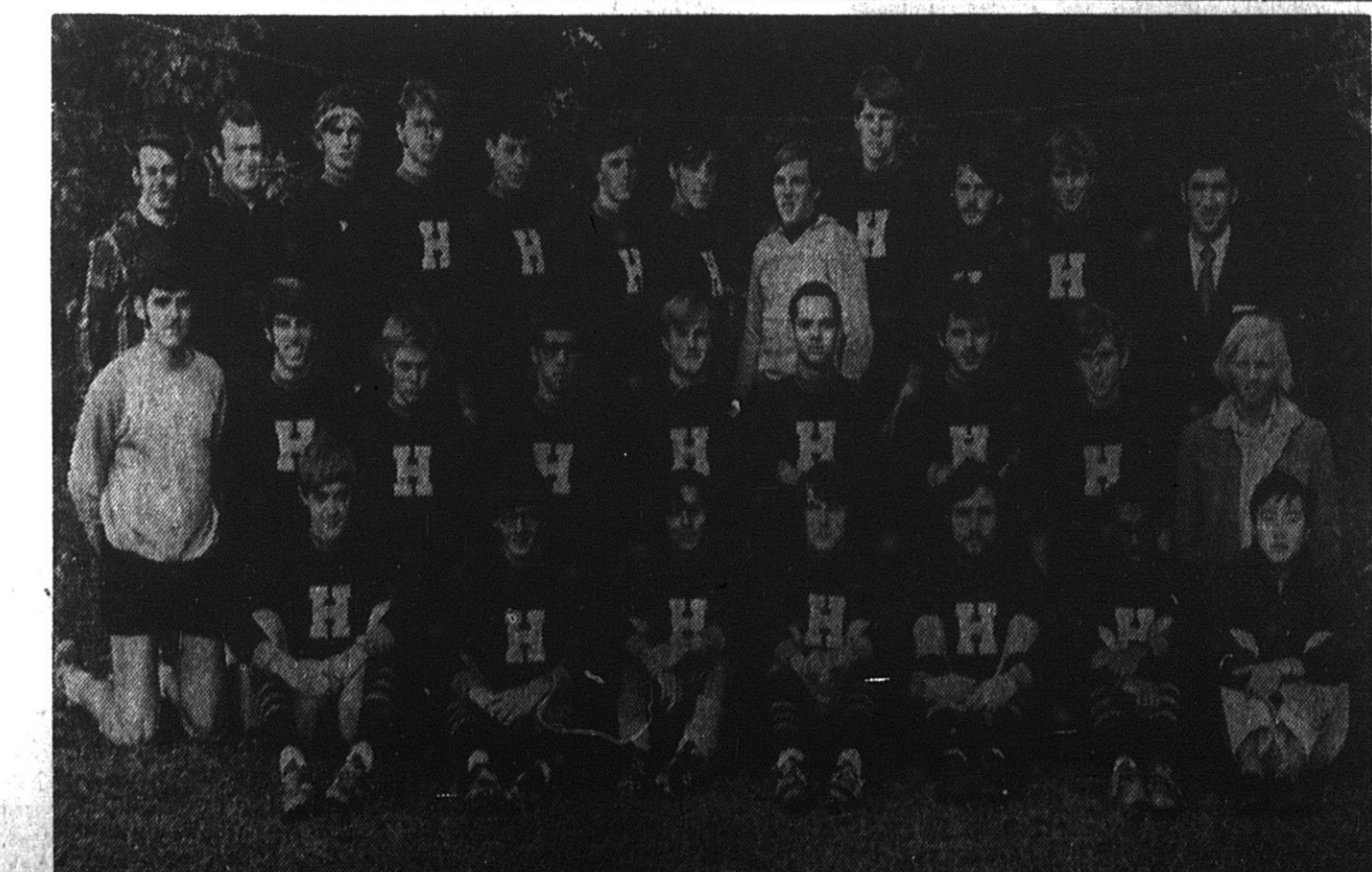

Wars have been fought for a single gem, long before 1 A.D. At that date it was specified how many jewels one might wear. The 18th century "lady" wore rings on her toes. There were many superstitions about jewels. Billions of years ago when molten earth began to solidify, a fine grained rock cooled to form the crystal minerals we know as gem stones.

Of the many gems only a few qualify as precious. They are the diamond, emerald, sapphire and ruby. The diamond is the hardest material known to man. One diamond may be worth millions of dollars even though its composition is near to that of coal.

In 1867 a tiny pebble was found in a place to be known as Kimberly, the most famous diamond mine. In 1899 Rothschilds bought the Kimberly mine for 25 million dollars. Ninety-five per cent of all diamonds are found in the Belgian Congo.

In China the jade is a most precious stone. In ancient times only the finest wife was allowed to wear jade. Amber was the earliest gem used for personal adornment. Men used gems as a favor to the Gods.

Imitation gems, as distinguished from synthetic gems have been made since earliest times. Immense quantities of these paste gems are made in France and elsewhere to be used in cheap jewelry.

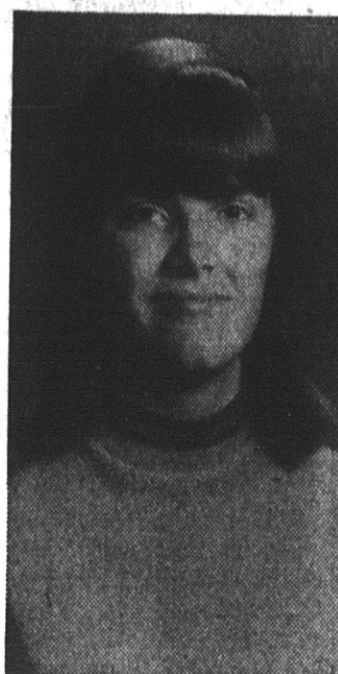

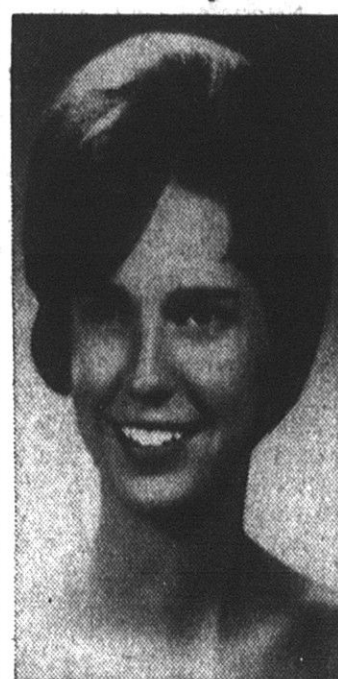
