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Local Court Processes Many Cases

A large number of court cases, most of them concerning traffic, were processed in recent days in Holland Municipal Court.

Changes Designed In Traffic System

A new traffic signal system is being installed on North River Ave. at the Howard and Douglas Ave. intersections, and the Ottawa County Road Commission is seeking the cooperation and caution of all motorists during the installation work which may be completed by Wednesday night, weather permitting.

Following a detailed traffic survey last summer, the Road Commission contracted with the Holland Board of Public Works for the installation.

The new plan which is in accordance with the Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control devices has two major changes.

The traffic control at the Douglas Ave. intersection will have a delayed left turn movement on River Ave. in both directions. The center lane will have its own traffic signal (not an arrow) and will operate separately from the signal on the

through and right lanes. At no time will both lights be green. Both will be red for east-west traffic.

At the Howard Ave. intersection, southbound traffic on River Ave. will not be allowed a left turn onto Howard.

Ronald Bakker, engineer-manager of the Ottawa County Road Commission, asked motorists to use strict caution since BPW employees would be using bucket lifts (cherry pickers) from trucks at the intersections.

On Tuesday evening Holland scrimmaged Grand Rapids East Christian in Grand Rapids.

Resignation Of Teacher Is Accepted

The West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night reluctantly accepted the resignation of Miss Beatrice Smith who has been with the system for 12 years as a teacher and administrator.

She currently is principal of Glerum and Ventura schools and director of special education, and beginning Dec. 4 she will be teaching fifth grade in the Zeeland school system.

A second semester contract for Ellen Vanden Belt was approved. She will teach in elementary grade at Lakewood school.

The board accepted a tentative budget for the 1967-68 school year and discussed several items. Further discussion on the budget is scheduled for the December meeting.

Board Member Neil Kalkman asked about paving the parking lots at the junior-senior high school, pointing out that the lots are in poor condition most of the year and dirt is constantly tracked into the school.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said bids taken three years ago indicated the improvement would cost at least \$21,000. Such funds were not included in the original bond issue for the high school and the item by law cannot be included in the general budget but could be financed by a special vote or by including the item in the next building bond question.

The buildings and grounds committee will study a request of the West Ottawa Soil Conservation district for the school district to trade 50 acres of leased land in return for other leased land. The school district has six parcels of land. The committee will study all six and report back at the next meeting.

The board approved purchase of stock supplies listing some 300 items at a cost of \$8,760.40.

A letter from Holland Christian High School thanked the board for its "expression of gratitude and warm hearts" at the dedication of the new Christian High School. The board discussed the fine and growing relationships between the two systems.

High School Principal Duane Hooker and Junior High Principal Ed Roberts discussed recent break-ins and vandalism at the school and the board reiterated its stand in supporting principals in whatever action they take. The board also was grateful for the work of Detective John Hemple for concluding the recent cases speedily.

The transportation committee was empowered to review transportation wages and submit recommendations.

Sheriff Bernard Gysen said that boating courses are now being given in E.E. Fell Junior High and Harrington Schools in Holland and St. Mary's School in Spring Lake with 159 students enrolled for the seven lesson courses.

Those passing the course will receive boating certificates from Sheriff Gysen.

Dutch to Face Ottawa Hills

Holland High's basketball team opens the season at home this Friday in a non-conference game with Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills at 7:45 p.m. in the Holland High fieldhouse.

Coach Don Piersma noted that the Dutch "have all the ingredients for another successful year. We lost four of our starting five which will naturally hurt, the mainstay of last year's squad, Dan Shinabarger, is back to lead a long list of fine reserves."

Shinabarger was the leading scorer in the Valley-Coast conference.

"We are happy with the progress of our pivot men which should strengthen our middle play. With the added height we expect good fast-break basketball," Piersma added.

Yule Decorations Will Be Lighted In Zeeland Friday

Zeeland Buys Kole Property

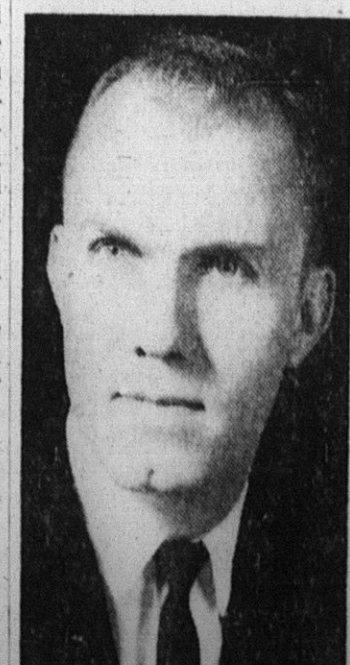

A good share of Holland residents will go to church Thursday to express thanks for bountiful blessings on Thanksgiving Day.

Church attendance and thank offerings have been a part of Holland's Thanksgiving Day traditions since the colony was founded in 1847.

The holiday dates back more than 300 years. It was in 1621 that Gov. William J. Bradford of Plymouth, Mass., proclaimed the first Thanksgiving Day. William J. Bradford of Holland is a direct descendant of the Plymouth governor.

In Holland, all business ceases for the holiday and local schools have a two-day vacation. A good number of schools had special assemblies today celebrating the Thanksgiving traditions.

Since Holland primarily is a family town, family gatherings around the festive board will be the rule of the day Thursday and the turkey is king.

Although variations and other choices are permissible, the usual menu calls for roast turkey and stuffing, giblet gravy, cranberry sauce and pumpkin or mince pie, plus such secondary dishes as squash, white or sweet potatoes, assorted relishes and rolls or biscuits.

Persons celebrating Thanksgiving Day away from home are urged to use caution in driving, particularly if predicted snowfalls materialize.

Mural of Alabama Will Be in Chicago Museum

The mural that brought charm to the ship, Alabama, for many years is being purchased by the Chicago Historical Society.

It is the mural's destiny to hang in the Museum of Natural History in Chicago as a monument to the Alabama.

Presently, employees of the Chicago, Duluth and Georgian Bay Line Transit Co. are varnishing and renovating the 10'6" wide by 6'10" high mural in the warehouse at the Montello Park docks.

The state of Alabama donated the mural in the year 1910 when the ship made her maiden voyage from Chicago to Grand Haven and Muskegon.

In 1960 when the ship was being dismantled the mural was removed to Albert Goodrich's summer home on Mackinac Island. It was not until a year ago that the mural was brought back to Holland to be renovated. Workers have been renovating the mural in their spare time during the past six months.

The mural itself is constructed of inlaid mahogany wood. Inlaid into the wood are beautiful "mothers of pearl." At the base of the mural inscribed in block letters is the word "ALABAMA."

The Alabama was designed for year-round operation on the cross-lake route from Chicago to Grand Haven and Muskegon. For this reason much care was given to her bow structure since ice-breaking would be an important part of her winter duties.

The workers of the Chicago, Duluth and Georgian Bay Line said that the Alabama had a somewhat stubby appearance, due to her great height. This feature tended to give the impression that she was clumsy. The workers said just the opposite was true. They said that the Alabama was extremely a good steamer in rough weather and thoroughly dependable in every way.

"The mural depicts the sturdiness and splendor of the Alabama. Goodrich needed a ship to combat the Lake Michigan ice. This meant that she had to have unusual ice-breaking ability. To be able to operate profitably in the fall, winter and spring, when the passenger load was at a low ebb, she had to have substantial cargo capacity. All of these facts and many more had been carefully studied and considered," workers said.

The Alabama was 272 feet long, 40 feet high and had a cargo capacity of 2,500 tons.

In 1946 the Alabama, owned by the Chicago, Duluth and Georgian Bay Line, was retired to a berth on Lake Macatawa near Holland. Gradually she deteriorated and in 1961 she was dismantled and cut down. At this time the mural was removed to Goodrich's summer home and the Alabama was sold to a construction company.

The Alabama now serves as a construction barge in the Saginaw Bay area.

surrounded by snapdragons, French mums and ferns.

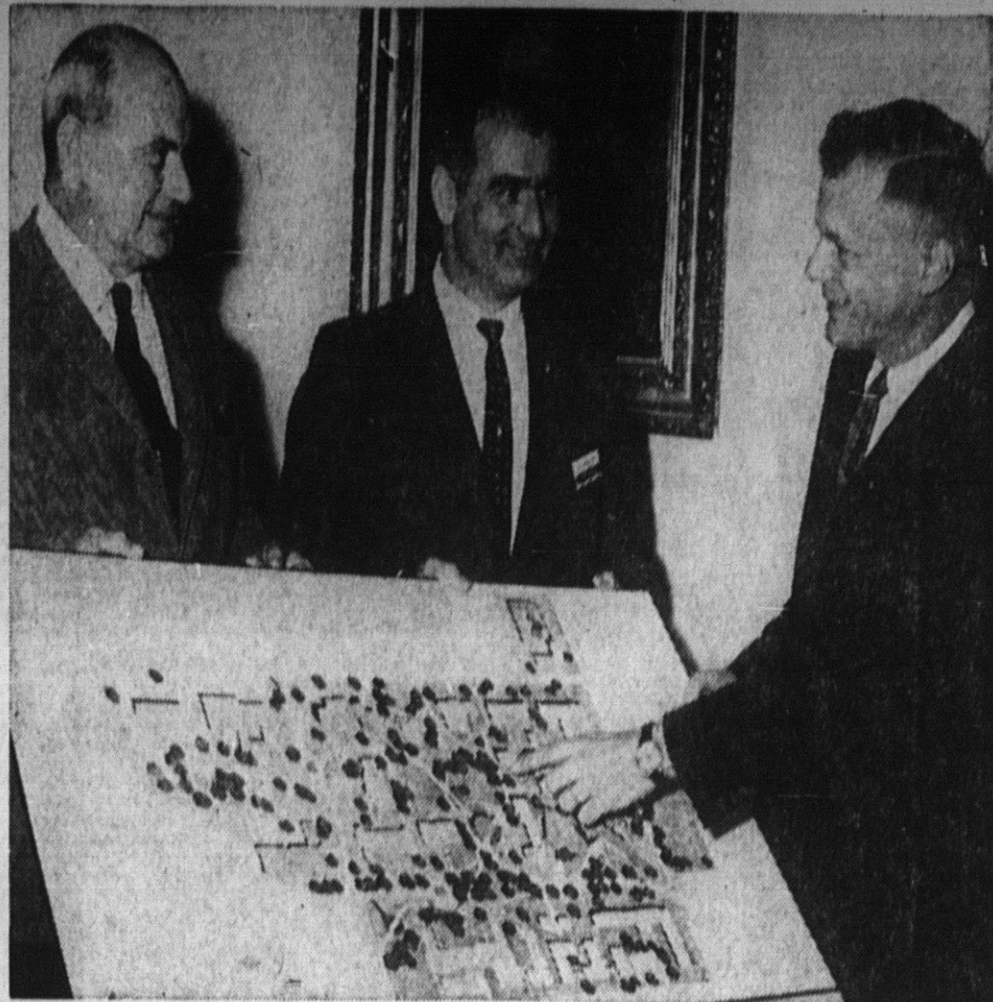

Terry Buter Compiles Fine Mark at Jackson

JACKSON — Terry Buter was an excellent all-around athlete while attending Zeeland High School but there was never any genuine doubt about where he would wind up in professional sports.

The 22-year-old Holland resident, came from a family with deep roots in harness racing. His grandfather, Nick Brouwer, owned, trained and drove standardbreds while his father, Glen, was content to see his colors in action without ever throwing a leg up in a sulky.

But Buter wanted the excitement of competitive driving and perhaps the same thrills — and even more — that he found in baseball, football and basketball.

Buter, who has been driving since he was 17, last two on the pari-mutual circuit, is in his first season at Jackson Harness Raceway but the way the railbirds chant his name you'd think he had been around for a decade.

There have been some outstanding graduates of Jackson's all-weather half-mile — George Sholty, circa 1956, Bob Farrington, class of 1960, and Joe Marsh, Jr., 1962 — but even these harness greats didn't capture the imagination of the public in their first season here like Buter has done.

Buter has picked up 41 checks in 66 races with 15 wins, 16 seconds and 10 thirds. And the young man with the boy-next-door looks doesn't give any indication of slowing up before the Dec. 9 finale rolls around.

Despite his youth, Buter reacted like an old pro in two meetings with Ervin Waldo's highly-regarded Knoxon, who earlier in the year hit a two-minute mile at Vernon Downs.

The first came here Oct. 14, 10 days after Idona's Faith had posted his fastest mile of the year at Hazel Park in 2:04. Buter put the Holland speedster on the lead and kept Knoxon parked out every inch of the way. After three quarters of a mile, the Waldo ace gave way and Idona's Faith had enough left to hold off Vesta's Boy Len by a length in 2:06 1/5. The time still stands as the fastest of the meeting, one which has had a rarity of fast tracks.

The duo came back on Oct. 21 and the script had little variation. Waldo again had Knoxon on the outside but in this trip the tough son of Knox Hanover got the lead shortly after the

half mile and again on the final bend.

Buter was an icicle at the reins. He brought Idona's Faith on again and took command at mid-stretch and it was Vesta's Boy Len now offering the late challenge. This time it was all for naught as the brown gelding had Buter two and one half lengths in front of Vesta's Boy Len at the wire.

Buter again flashed his reinsmanship last Saturday in the featured Michigander Invitational but this time it wasn't Knoxon as the principal threat. Waldo elected to leave his charge in the barn but Idona's Faith had to come from off the pace to get all the money.

Paul Minge's Waterbug out of Franklin, Ohio, was in the lead at the top of the stretch as Buter closes with Idona's Faith. With less than a sixteenth to go, the pair were racing as a team. Neither pacer would relent but in the final stride Idona's Faith got his head up for the margin of victory.

Idona's Faith got home in 2:09 over a good track to win for the sixth time this year. Right now there are less than five weeks left in the current meeting but the Holland sidewheeler has the inside track on the pacing division title and nobody's going to argue that Buter is the young man who put him there.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 26
God's Purpose in Discipline
Hosea 2:13-14, 18-23
By C. P. Dame

As we read our newspapers and note the lawlessness and rioting and vandalism that goes on, we realize that the need for discipline is urgent. It is needed in the homes of the nation. God, who commands discipline, practices discipline. He did this in the past and does so at the present time.

I. God disciplines His people in love. Hosea knew what it means for a husband to live with a faithless wife. God had called Israel to be a holy nation, living for Him. But Israel, like a faithless wife, "went after her lovers, and forgot me, saith the Lord." This meant that Israel forsook a holy God for corrupt idols, exchanged high ideals for base ideas, the noble for the lowly. The story of this nation's apostasy is in the Bible for our edification. Follow not Israel's example. And note this—the nation, the family, the individual who forgets God turns to idolatry. By nature man is religious—even the modern man! The nation is full of idols. The worshipers are many.

God said that He would punish the nation that worshipped Baalim—the plural for Baal, the god of fertility. God's people observed the great feasts held in honor of Baal. Jeroboam had instituted them. These coincided with the special feast days which had been set apart for the worship of God. On those days the women dressed up most gaily in order to get attention.

As God thought of His faithless people He said, "And I will visit upon her"—punish her, but He also said, "I will allure her"—words which suggest wooing. The sinning nation presented to God.

II. God delights to bless. Verse 18 tells about a covenant with the animal kingdom, and about peace between nations. Three times the word "betroth" is used in verses 19 and 20. Hosea brings in the marriage relation again and again. God will pay for His restored wife, Israel "with righteousness, justice, leal love, tender mercies, faithfulness" and the bride's wedding gift will be the knowledge of God.

The prophet also calls attention to the connection between the spiritual and material blessings of life. The idolaters believed Baal gave them good harvests. They were mistaken, God gave them.

Again the prophet refers to his three children to describe Israel's relationship with God. In time to come Jezreel would be called not the valley of blood but a valley of plenty, and the people on whom God intended to show no mercy would experience it, and the people who did not belong to Him would become His beloved people and the wayward would become loyal again.

III. God seeks to bring about a sinner's restoration. The prophet foretold the coming exile to Babylon where they would miss the temple and its services. After their return the people never again yielded to the temptation to worship idols of wood and stone. God disciplined Israel—He still disciplines His people.

"This year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added which are of so extraordinary a nature that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God."

"I do, therefore, invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States (note the proclamation came in the midst of the Civil War) . . . to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens."

History does not always repeat. This year Thanksgiving falls on next to the last Thursday.

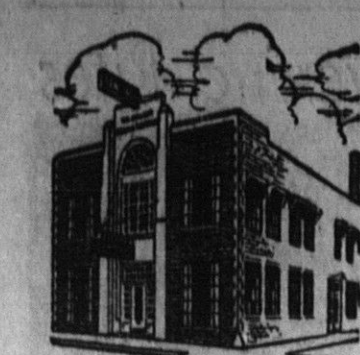

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ORIGIN OF THANKSGIVING

In 1621, Governor William Bradford of the Plymouth Massachusetts colony proclaimed the first Thanksgiving Day. The Pilgrims were entreated not only to give thanks to God for a bountiful harvest but for being alive after a period of suffering and privation. Perhaps in passing, in this atomic age, in listing the things for which we should be thankful, there is a parallel in the response of the little boy, who upon being asked what he wanted to be when he grew up, responded: "Alive!"

In 1789, George Washington proclaimed a national holiday of Thanksgiving. But it remained for President Abraham Lincoln to issue the 1st proclamation of a national holiday as we know it today. He did so in the concluding period of the Civil War, in 1863. He did so as a direct result of the urging of Sara Josepha Hale, editor of Godey's Lady's Book, who had campaigned tirelessly toward this end for a period of 20 years.

A portion of that first Thanksgiving proclamation illustrates both the felicity of phrase and his devout nature, and is as applicable and pertinent today as when he issued it:

"This year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added which are of so extraordinary a nature that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God."

"I do, therefore, invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States (note the proclamation came in the midst of the Civil War) . . . to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens."

History does not always repeat. This year Thanksgiving falls on next to the last Thursday.

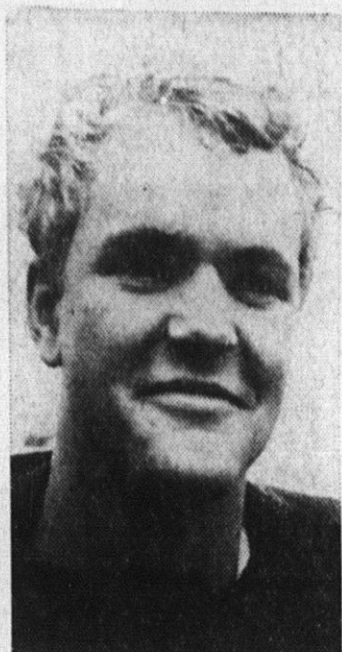

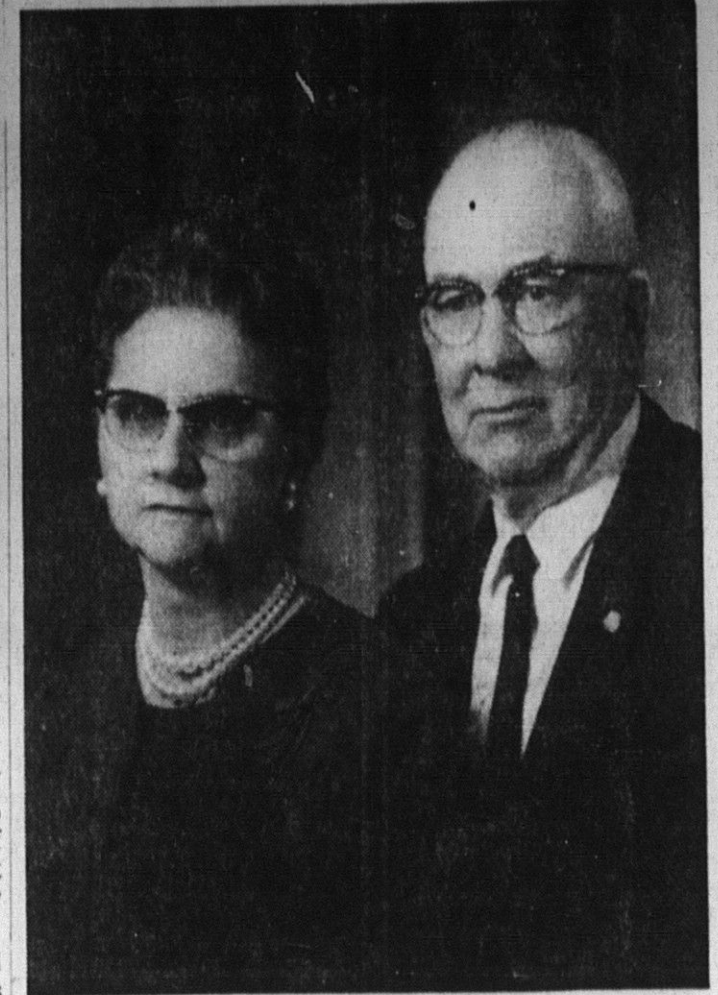

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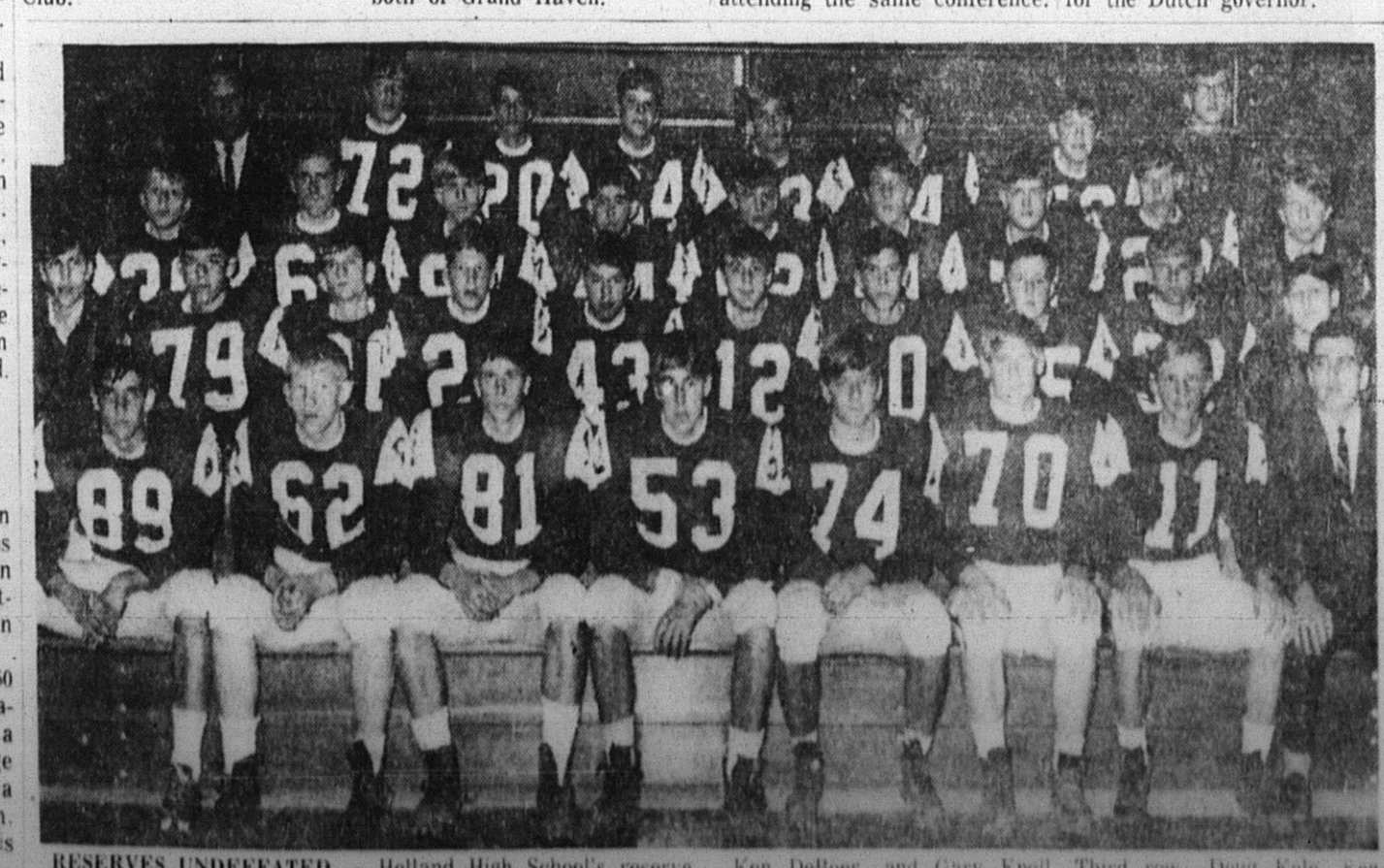
