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Frantic Rescue Tries End in Two Drownings

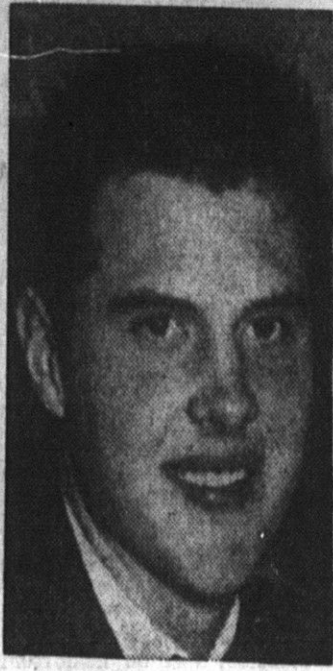
A nightmarish chain of events triggered when three boys were pulled by the current in Lake Michigan at Holland State Park Sunday afternoon ended in the tragic drowning of one of the boys and one of the men who attempted to save him.

The search continues today for the bodies of William Foerster, 29, of 99 West 26th St., and Mark Anthony Heys, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Lee Heys of Grandville.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said Mark was swimming in Lake Michigan at Holland State Park with his brothers, Randy Allen, 10, and Ricky Lee, 8, when a large wave took them under as they neared the east end of the north pier. The strong current swept them into deeper water.

Mrs. Heys saw her three sons swept by the wave and called for help.

James Talbot, 21, of Rolling Meadows, Ill., went to the rescue as did G. F. Merrick of Dayton, Ohio, and Foerster. Deputies said Talbot was

able to grab Mark and started the pier. He was about five feet from the pier when a large wave hit and took both Talbot and Mark under.

Mark was pulled from Talbot's grasp by the force of the

water and not seen again.

Mrs. Foerster told deputies she saw her husband reach for a boy and the child was swept away by a wave. She said another wave broke over her husband and she didn't see him again.

Talbot's girl friend, Joyce Vander Jagt, 20, of Grand Rapids, saw Talbot and Mark go down and went to their aid. She found Talbot in an unconscious condition and pulled him to shore where she applied artificial respiration. He was taken to Holland Hospital and reported in good condition today.

Merrick went to the aid of Randy and brought him close to the pier but lost his hold on the boy when swept by a wave. The boy was knocked away from Merrick and then rescued by Ottawa Reserve Deputy Harold Van Slooten who was standing on the pier. Van Slooten reached in the water and pulled Randy on to the pier.

Merrick was then swept out from the pier and was losing his strength when picked up by an

unidentified man in a rubber raft.

Max Cole of Jenison brought Ricky to shore. Both Ricky and Randy were reported in good condition when they reached safety.

Deputies and the Coast Guard immediately began a search for both victims; however, the search was called off at 6:15 p.m. Sunday because of heavy waters.

Dragging operations resumed at 6:30 a.m. Monday only to be halted shortly after because of the high winds and waves. Coast Guardsmen reported waves between six and eight feet high Monday. Dragging resumed Wednesday.

Their deaths brings the toll to eight drownings in Ottawa county this year as compared to six last year. Four of the drownings this year were off the pier at Holland State Park.

Foerster, a commercial salesman for Sears at Grand Rapids, is survived by his wife, Diane, and two children, Deanne, 6, and Beth Ann, 7.

School Bus Vote Is Slated Oct. 21

At a special meeting this morning, the Holland Board of Education scheduled a transportation millage election calling for 2 mills for 3 years to coincide with the special election slated Oct. 21 for annexing a strip of property between the US-31 bypass and Waverly Rd. to Holland city.

The action was taken today because Friday marked the end of the 20-day appeal period for challenging the legality of merging the Harrington and Federal school districts into the Holland district in a reorganization of putting all areas into K-12 districts. The appeal would have had to be filed with the Michigan Court of Appeals.

Coast Guard Offers Small Boat Course

For boatowners, who would like a review of the practical side of small boat handling, a one evening course is being offered by the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary at the North River Branch of the Peoples Bank on Tuesday at 7:15 p.m.

Although the classroom session will only be two hours, most of the subjects important to the safety of small boats will be covered. The merits and uses of the various types of life saving devices will be developed, along with demonstrations of correct usage. An explanation of the importance of hull design for operating in rough waters will be explained and included in this subject will be blackboard illustrations of the ways in which flare, sheer and freeboard are incorporated to accomplish certain purposes in bow and entry design.

Associated with hull seaworthy characteristics are the limitations of load and power. Such limits are usually found on the capacity plates attached to small boats manufactured in recent years. A formula will be worked out for boat owners to use in computing a safe passenger load on a runabout or fishing craft where no plate has been attached and a graph will be available to indicate recommended maximum engine power rating for typical small boats.

Another phase of the session will involve interpretation of weather warning flags displayed at most Coast Guard stations and a few yacht clubs or marinas. This will be supplemented by descriptions of the more common foul weather signs or conditions. Many of these are observable hours in advance of the actual rough water conditions which might result. Practical rules will be given for helping small boat skippers ride out rough seas or high winds if they become caught in them unexpectedly.

The final part of the class agenda will cover a review of both the safety equipment required by state and federal law, and additional items recommended by the auxiliary.

Dr. George Buskirk, training officer for the local flotilla of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary will be in charge of the evening's program assisted by T. G. Shelby, an instructor in this field for many years. Registration for the class will begin at 7:15 p.m. and is open to wives and family members over 12 years of age. There is no charge.

Thus, the board is fulfilling its commitment made three years ago to call a special election when the reorganization of the district is completed. Earlier, the board had to cancel plans for levying 1½ mills for three years for transportation because of pending reorganization litigation. Rising costs and larger enrollments mostly account for the difference.

The program as set by the board today calls for providing transportation to all public and non-public elementary students living more than a mile from the school they attend and all secondary students beyond 1½ miles. This would involve in excess of 3,000 boys and girls. The relocation of Christian High School is a factor in the program, making a larger number eligible for the services.

The election was scheduled in conjunction with the annexation election to cut expenses. All of Holland city and Holland township are involved in the annexation election. This leaves only Harrington district to be added. Holland township also is voting on a franchise issue for Consumers Power Co.

If the transportation millage carries, Supt. Donald Ihman said millage would not be levied until 1970. He said the present transportation program will be continued until a full program could be implemented.

Local officials have been assured by the election division of the Secretary of State's office in Lansing that the annexation election has been approved for Oct. 21. The property in question lies between the bypass and Waverly Rd. running from Eighth to 16th Sts.

Ottawa County Deputies Investigate Breakin

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies are investigating a breakin at the Delbert Soderberg residence at 4024 Lakeshore Dr. which occurred sometime between 8 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Four guns and about \$2 in change were taken, deputies said.

Soderberg discovered the window on a door had been broken providing access to reach in and unlock the door when he returned from work Wednesday afternoon.

Dirksen Spoke Here in 1949

It was 20 years ago that Sen. Everett McKinley Dirksen visited Holland. He died Sunday at age 73.

On June 8, 1949, he was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree at the 84th annual commencement of Hope College.

As principal speaker, he delivered a stirring commencement address in which he explored the emphasis on material security and the morbid attitude of gloom which pervaded present-day thinking.

"All things are possible to him that believeth," he said, "and this can well be the answer to the futility, frustration and fear which color the times."

A surprise feature of the commencement was a surprise presentation of an honorary bachelor of arts degree to Jack Schouten, for 30 years the college's "grand old man of sports."

Allendale, Friberg Have Work Cut Out

ALLENDALE — Coach Bill Friberg of Allendale High School has his work cut out for him this year as he will be coaching a school that has never played football before.

Before coming to Allendale, Friberg was the head backfield coach at Coopersville. Friberg's assistant this year is Ken Pierce.

Allendale will be playing all of its games away this season and according to Friberg, "the toughest team on its schedule will be Hudson."

This year's team is composed of freshmen and sophomores only and Allendale will be playing two freshmen teams with the remaining games slated against varsity competition.

"We hope to get the boys to work together this year but we realize we have a lot of work to do but I am really pleased with the 35 boys which turned out for practice, this consists of over 60 per cent of the boys in school," said Friberg.

The starting team is composed of Tom Stellard and Gary Knoper at the ends; Jim Vanderploeg and Dan Jackson at tackles; Dave Stanton and Jerry Bussis at guards and Wayne Dyke at center.

Expected to start at quarterback is John Scholten with John Herrick, Rod Bosker and Bernie Rotman rounding out the backfield.

"Rotman will probably be our best runner with Vanderploeg looking the best so far among the linemen. He's really got a forearm," Friberg continued.

Close Saugatuck Schools After Storm Warnings

SAUGATUCK — Saugatuck schools were closed Monday because of storm warnings just before classes were to have opened.

Supt. of Schools Don Oyler ordered the closing after local Defense officials put out a storm alert in Allegan County.

Water spouts were sighted off the Lake Michigan shore near South Haven, according to Allegan County Deputies. But the Grand Rapids weather bureau said most of them were dissipated.

The Grand Rapids weather bureau said showers and squalls occurred along the shoreline.

Consumers Asks Special Election For Franchise

Consumers Power Co. Thursday asked the Holland Township board for an electric franchise, subject to approval by township voters in a special election Oct. 21.

The company's representatives told the board that the franchise is the same as that granted the company by more than 1,000 other Michigan communities, and that it is not exclusive and will not affect areas of the township already supplied with power from other sources.

Gordon L. Carson, Grand Rapids division manager for the company, said the Holland township areas served by Consumers Power are growing steadily and that he foresees additional investment in the area by the company.

"It is a standard procedure for us to obtain formal permission to conduct a business where we serve," he said, "and in particular we prefer a franchise operation where growing customer needs indicate a growing investment on our part."

Consumers Power has 1,450 customers in the township at present.

He pointed out also that rates are not set in a franchise, but with the approval of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

The company will pay the cost of the special election.

Police Department Has New Community Relations Unit

Holland Police Department's new police-community relations unit is functioning with a wide range of interests and activities under the direction of Officer Leland R. Somers.

Somers, a recent graduate of the School of General Studies at Grand Valley College, heads the bureau whose main thrust is to serve the community through education and information and open channels of communication with all elements of the community regardless of their views.

Officer Somers notes and is concerned with the changes which are taking place in American life and the problems that are arising as a result of rapidly changing patterns of social interaction.

Somers brings to the position a broad academic background in the fields of sociology, philosophy and the study of people through their languages, in addition to a great deal of research in the area of police-community relations over the years.

Among the services of the police community relations bureau are handling information concerning agencies dealing with child welfare from the city, county, state and federal governments, and handling information concerning facilities and programs for the rehabilitation of ex-convicts and juvenile delinquents.

The bureau will also handle information concerning city and county service agencies, public and private, which deal with personal and family problems.

The police-community relations officer is also interested in providing assistance to new families, especially those of minority groups.

Somers will also co-ordinate the department's speakers bureau and handle seminars for educational institutions on "The Police and the Community in the 20th Century."

The bureau will also assist any youth group in any way possible, Somers said, and it will also be involved in research and development within the police department.

\$3.7 Million Budget Set For Public Schools

A 1969-70 budget of \$3,796,558.32 for operating Holland public schools was adopted by the Board of Education Monday night.

This represents an increase of approximately 10 per cent over last year's budget of \$3,401,443.52, according to Board President James O. Lamb.

The budget as presented represented months of study with constant revisions on revenues and expenditures.

Estimated revenues for the year are listed at \$3,802,636.06 which would leave an estimated balance June 30, 1970, of only \$6,077.74. With such a small margin, Lamb pointed to the need of maintaining strict budget control and said the board would be very critical of any areas that exceed budget figures since the board is determined not to end the year with a deficit.

Last year's estimated revenue was listed at \$3,479,078.99, expenditures at \$3,401,443.52, with an estimated balance of \$77,635.47.

In presenting the budget, Board Treasurer Charles Bradford said it is evident that shortly after the first of the new year Holland must look to additional revenues to finance its budget the following year.

Supervisors Okay Dentist For County

GRAND HAVEN — After an appeal by Dr. William Cresson of Grand Haven and Dr. J. A. Lubbers of Holland, both dentists, the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors Monday voted to hire a full time county dentist to succeed Dr. Clifford Norcross who retired Jan. 1.

A basic starting salary of \$15,000 was approved with provision for \$16,000 in 1970. A dental assistant already has been hired. The vote to hire a dentist was 17 to 13.

The two dentists said a county-wide program of education in dental hygiene is a critical need. Dr. Lubbers said there are 7,000 indigent children in the county suffering from lack of proper dental care. The State Department of Health will assist in the education program.

Since Dr. Norcross left the county staff, only emergency care has been given.

The board appointed Supervisor Robert Visscher of Holland to the Ottawa County Mental Health Service Board succeeding the Rev. Milton Doornbos of Hudsonville who has moved from the county. There are 12 members on this board serving four-year terms. Visscher's term will expire Dec. 31, 1972.

The board adopted a resolution supporting a statewide campaign of education against litter, presented by Don Williams of Holland, member of the legislative committee. Copies will be sent to state legislators.

Also approved was expenditure of \$4,000 for a preliminary study of a pollution abatement program in cooperation with state agencies. This resolution was presented by the planning committee headed by Tom De Pree of Holland. The program was explained by Roderick Dittmer of the Muskegon Planning Commission.

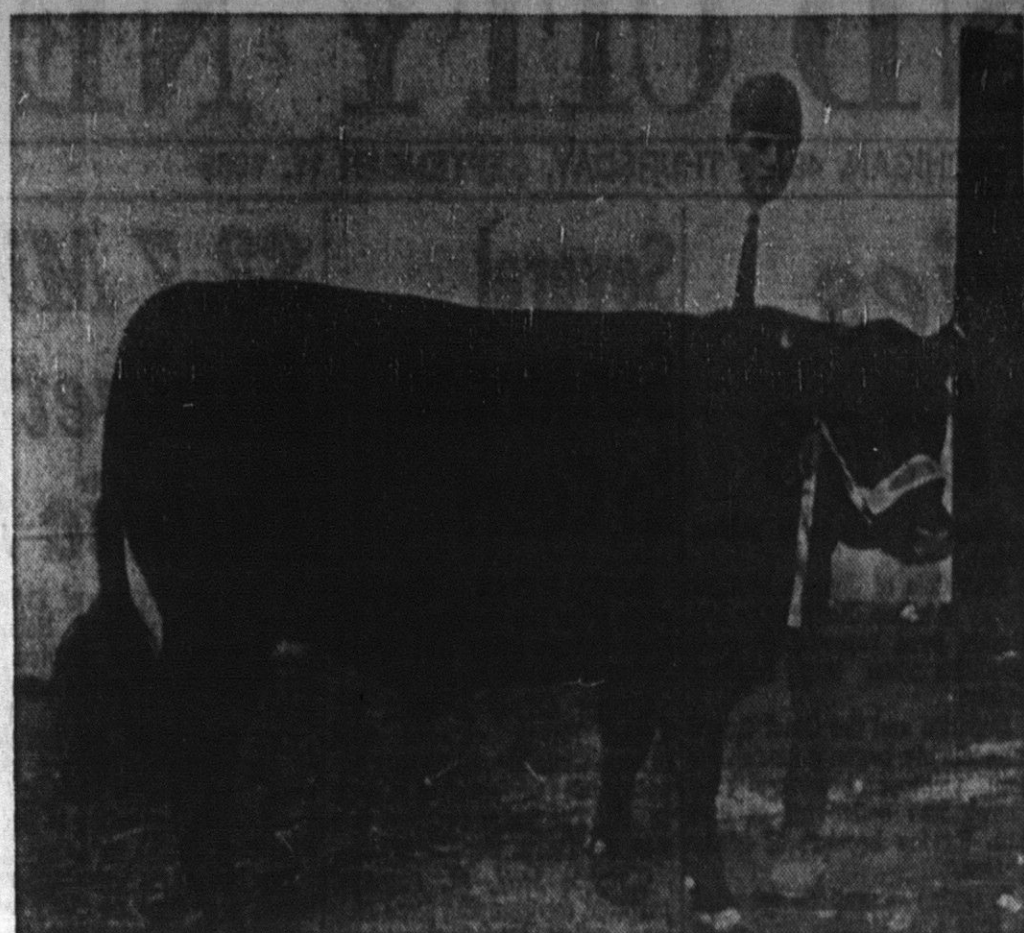

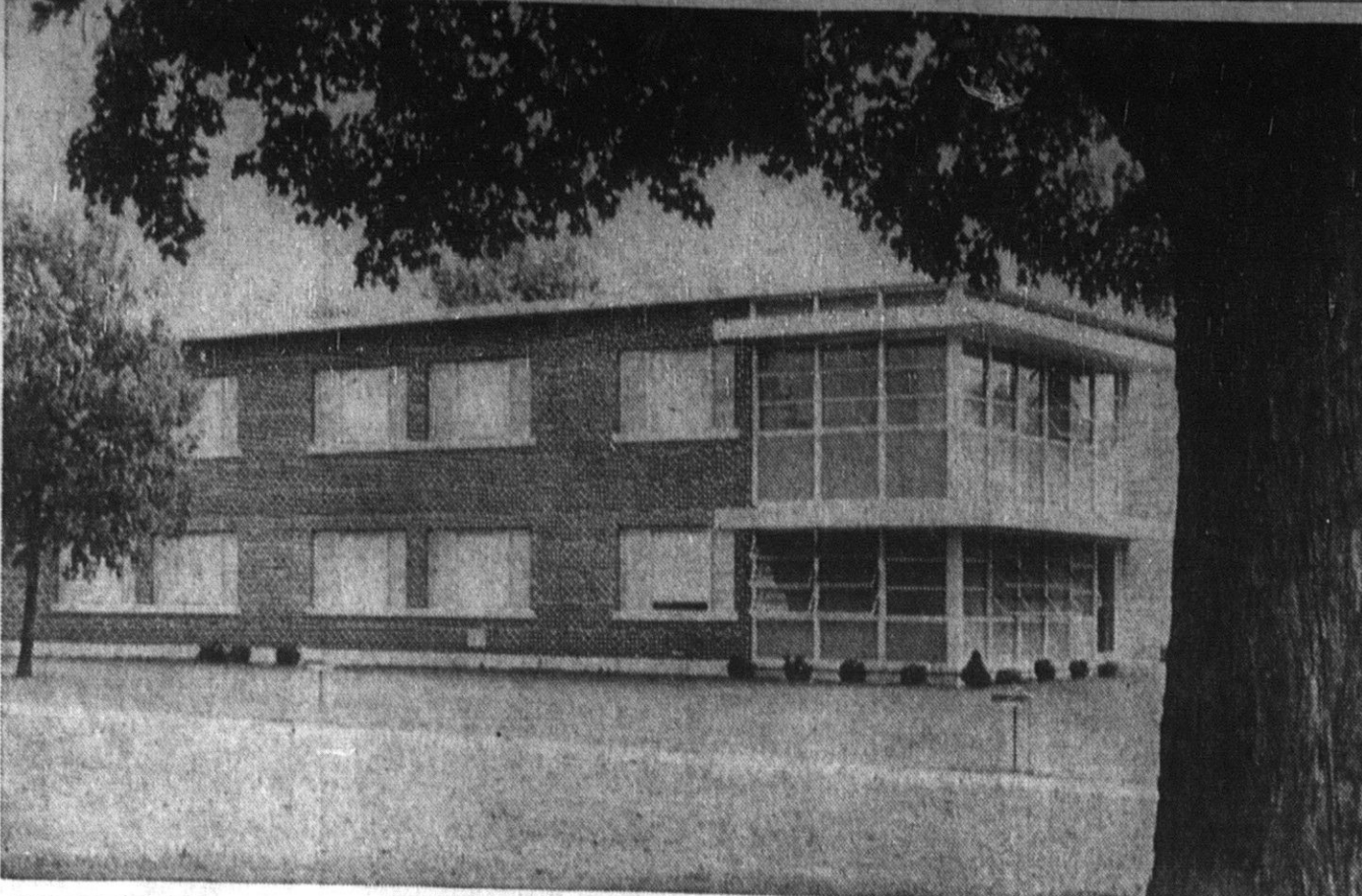

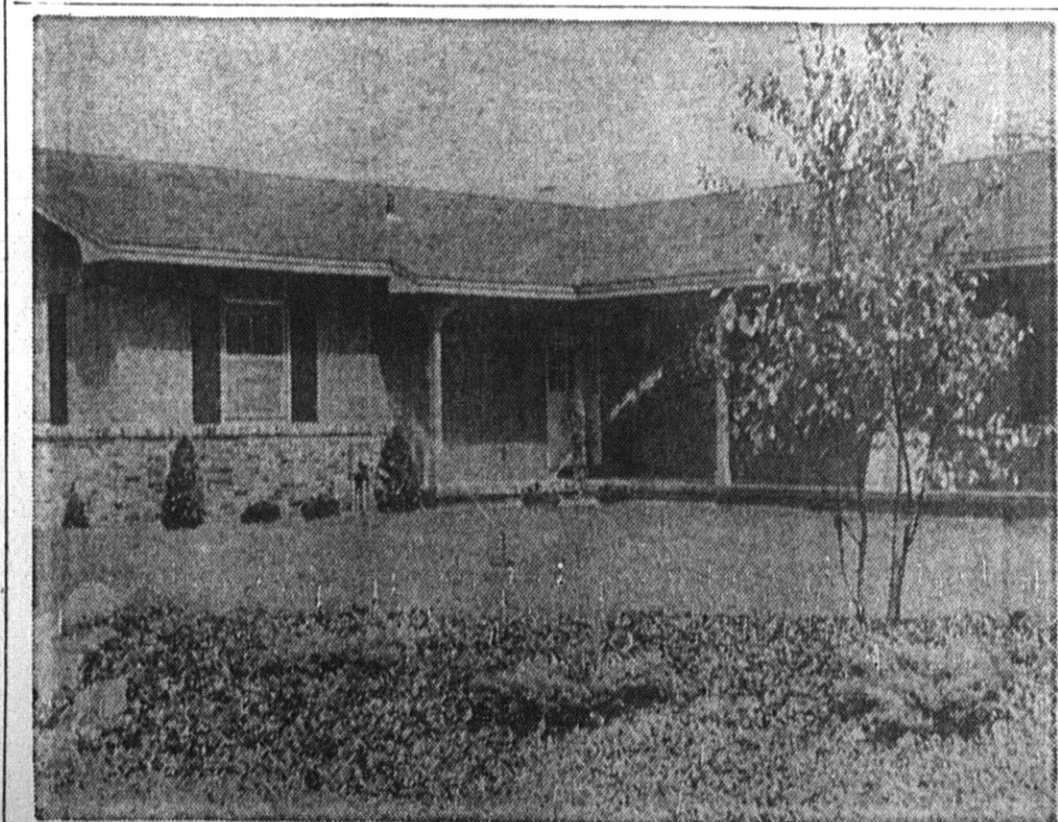

Six More Teachers Are Hired

Contracts for six new teachers were approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night, resulting in a full and complete staff except for a school social worker.

Among the newest group are four elementary teachers, Barbara Brown, a 1969 graduate of Michigan State University; Mrs. Susan Farmer, a 1968 graduate of Hope College with one year's experience; Mrs. Karen Plekes, a 1963 graduate of Western Michigan University with eight years' experience, and Mrs. Sue Shufelt, a 1963 graduate of Union University of Jackson, Tenn., with three years' teaching experience.

Others are Mrs. Elizabeth Blackmore, a 1961 graduate of Western Michigan University with eight years' experience, as an elementary specialist in music, and Barbara Fleming, a 1966 graduate of Wayne State University with three years' experience who will teach high school Spanish.

The board approved criteria for an adult education program for Holland public schools as drafted by John Dyksterhouse, coordinator for adult education, High School Principal Fred S. Bertsch and Thomas Carey, director of guidance.

As outlined by Dyksterhouse, individuals over 16 but under 20 may be admitted to the program to work toward obtaining high school diplomas. Under the program, 32 credits will be required for graduation. Required units are the equivalent of one semester of government, six semesters of English, two semesters of science and two semesters of U.S. history.

The new program also allows credit for some correspondence courses provided special permission is obtained from the principal and the courses not exceed eight credits.

In reporting on reaching agreement with teachers on a master contract for 1969-70, Board President James O. Lamb pointed to mutual agreement and understanding in many areas which affect citizens of the community and pupils in the school and to keep this understanding, he suggested the HEA representatives and board representatives meet the fourth Monday of each month to discuss mutual problems aimed toward better education and communications, not negotiation roadblocks.

Later in the evening, HEA President Roger D. Plagenhoef said the HEA views the 1967-70 master agreement as a document exemplifying the typical negotiator's perspective of compromise. He said, "Both the association and the board achieved certain goals. A variety of school problems were discussed and mutual agreement was reached on many issues."

Plagenhoef said perhaps the No. 1 deficiency of this contract concerns the lack of provisions for an adequate pupil-teacher ratio, particularly in junior high school. He added that the general negotiating atmosphere reflected a marked improvement over two years ago and he expressed the hope that this more amicable relationship can be continued.

Since the October meeting of the board coincides with an open house for parents in the high school, the board meeting will be held in the administration offices on 16th St.

President Lamb called attention to the fact that Ray Cary of WHTC who has been covering school board meetings is leaving for a new assignment in Virginia and he wished him well in his new work. Cary introduced Dave Arendshorst, a staff announcer, who is taking over as news director.

Lamb also sought to clarify what he felt was a misunderstanding on school transportation millage for which the board is calling a special election Oct. 21 on 2 mills for 3 years. While the program would provide transportation within certain limits for public and non-public pupils, he emphasized that the program provides such transportation for children living outside the Holland district.

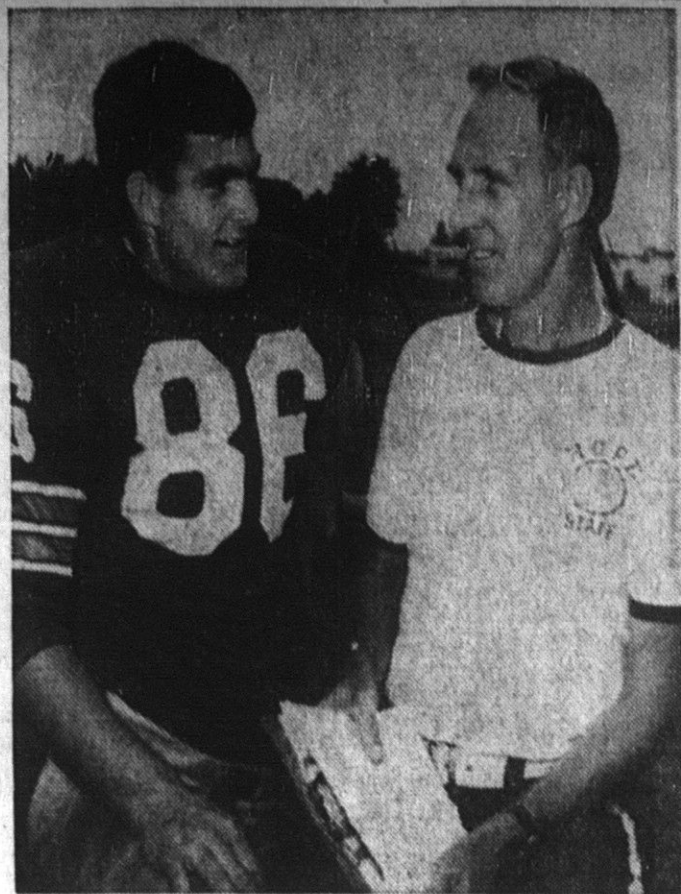

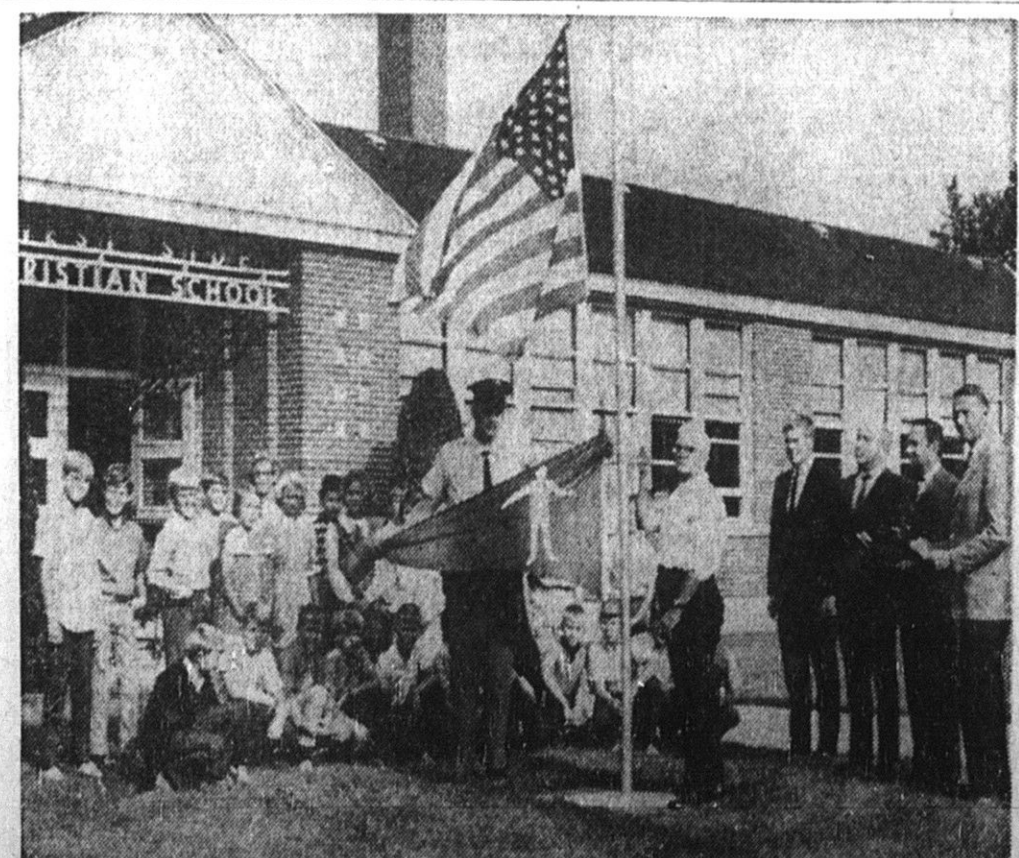
