Police Find Driver Of Wanted Car

Holland police said the driver of a car sought in a hit and run accident at 17th St. and River Ave. at 12:20 a.m. Tuesday reported to the police station this afternoon.

Officers had launched a search for a red car, believed a 1966 model, involved in the collision with two other cars that injured one person.

Officers said the driver of the missing car was Oscar Villanue, 22, of 158 1/2 East 16th St. He reported to the police station after making contact with his insurance company.

Injured in the crash was Agnes Jean Spencer, 18, of 669 Lincoln Ave., a passenger in the car driven by Irene Anita Spencer, 55, of the same address.

Witnesses told police the red car was traveling west on 17th St. at an excessive speed and ran a red flashing warning signal, hitting the Spencer car in the left front. It continued through the intersection and struck the left front of a second car operated by David Lynn Steenwyk, 21, of route 3, Holland.

The Spencer auto was southbound on River while the Steenwyk car was stopped eastbound on 17th St. waiting for traffic.

Damage to the two other cars was estimated at \$1,500. Police said the wanted car should show considerable damage.

Car Slams Into Abutment Tossing Driver from Seat

Wolbers was taken to Butterworth hospital in Grand Rapids for x-rays and treatment.

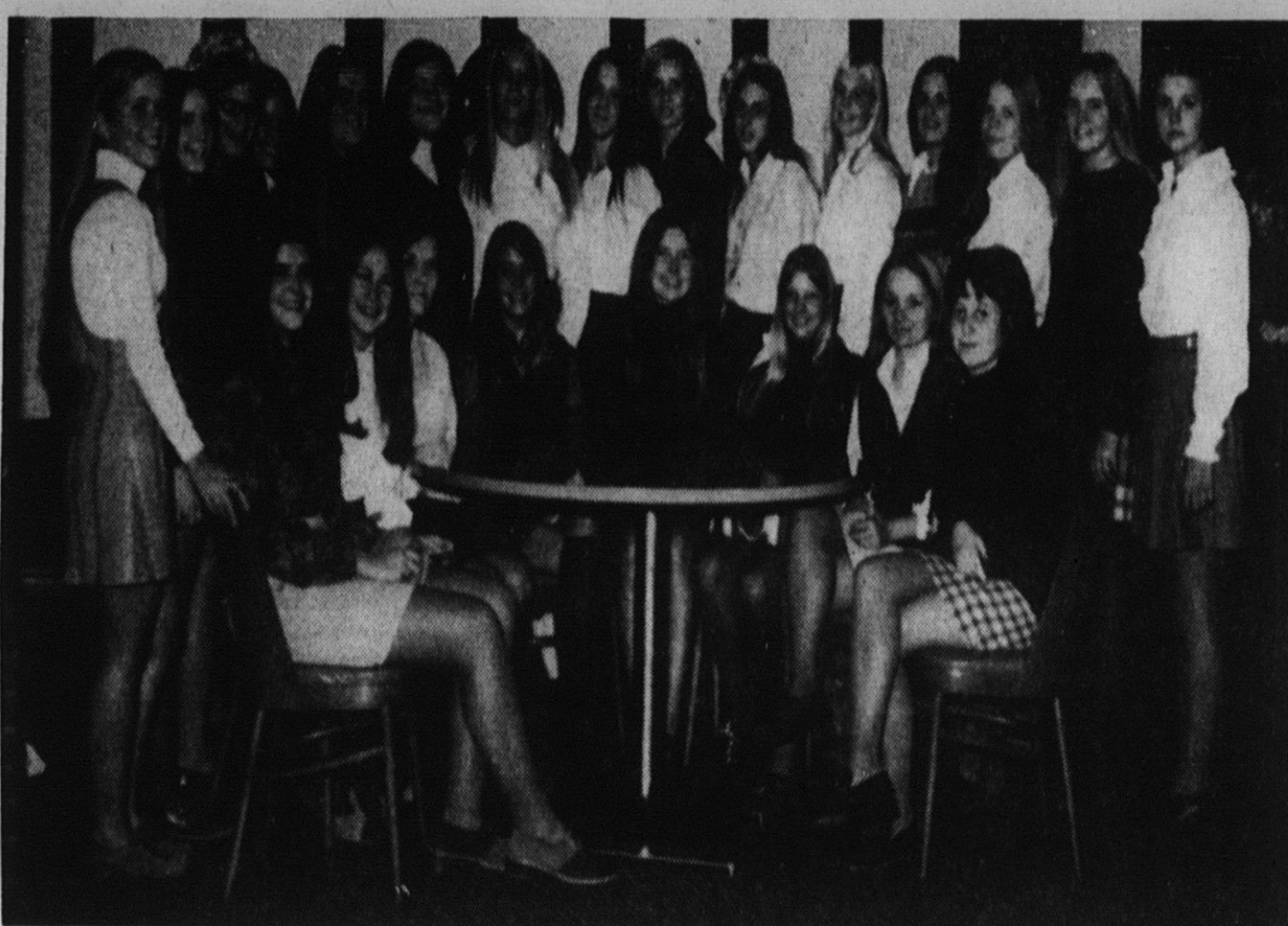

ZEELAND — Further plans for Zeeland's celebration of its 125th anniversary July 16-22, 1972, were outlined at a monthly meeting of the committee Thursday night in City Hall.

Mrs. Edna De Pree, who has accepted chairmanship of Historical Day on Wednesday, and her committee are working on plans for a possible parade, a VIP dinner with descendants of pioneers as guests and possibly a Parade of Barbershop Quartets at night.

Serving with Mrs. De Pree are Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Van Koeveing, Mr. and Mrs. Kelly Yntema, and Mr. and Mrs. George Meengs. Bob Vollink is working on plans for a beard growing contest and Al Schreur is working on quartets. Information on descendants of early settlers should be forwarded to Mrs. De Pree.

Dick Machiele is serving as chairman of Agricultural Day on Thursday. He has completed plans for a crop of wheat in some area north of Zeeland, to be harvested, cradled, combined and threshed with an old-time steam threshing machine on Agricultural Day. It will be hauled with wagons and teams of horses.

Other Agricultural Day plans call for a display of oldtime farm tools, and persons willing to display such equipment should get in touch with Machiele. Under consideration is a milking contest with invitations to mayors of nearby cities. A chicken barbecue will be staged in late afternoon, followed by a historical variety program with local talent and choral groups in the evening. Marvin Ritsema is lining up choral groups.

James Hoffman is serving as chairman of the grand finale on Saturday calling for a parade in the afternoon and an evening show with outside talent, climaxed by fireworks. Bill Gruppen reported many commitments for floats by local business and industry.

Dick Timmer, in charge of concessions, is lining up carnival entertainment for five days, Tuesday through Saturday, assisted by Lloyd De Kock and Ben Vennema. They are also arranging for booths. Anniversary Chairman Don Vos and Al Schreur are looking into possibilities of a Country and Western show for evening entertainment.

Attending the meeting were Chairman Vos, vice chairman Al Gustafson, and the steering committee consisting of Al Schreur, Frank Hoogland, Bill Gruppen, Mart Hieftje, James Lampen and Vern De Vries.

Collide While Turning

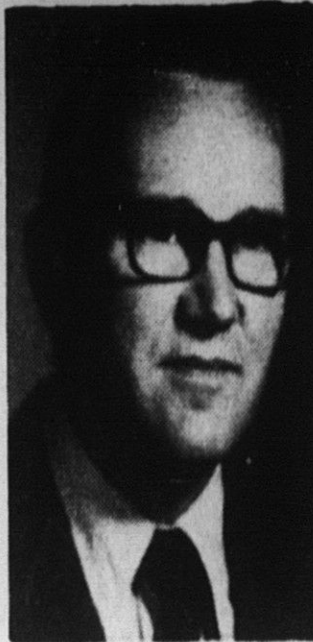

Eggebeen New Coach At Christian

Athletic Director Clare Pott of Holland Christian announced today that Don Eggebeen, chemistry and geometry teacher, has been named the new wrestling coach.

Eggebeen, who has never coached wrestling, takes over for Rudy Hulst, who directed the Maroons to a 1-11 record in only their second season of wrestling last year.

The 43-year-old Eggebeen is a 1946 graduate of North High School in Sheboygan, Wis. where he was a teammate of Elmer Ribbens, basketball coach of the Maroons.

While attending Calvin College, Eggebeen was a roommate of Ribbens.

He graduated from Calvin in 1950 and received his Masters from Texas A&M in 1967. Eggebeen coached basketball and baseball at McBain Christian from 1950-58 and also coached at a junior high school in California before accepting a position at Christian in the fall of 1967.

Bob Berghorst, a junior at Grand Valley State College and named wrestling mentor a graduate of Zeeland, will assist Eggebeen this winter.

CHAMPS donated the school a new wrestling mat, according to Eggebeen.

"We have 26 fellows out for the team and our main goal is to narrow the gap from last year," Eggebeen said. Christian will be wrestling during an assembly at Allegan on Tuesday, Nov. 30 in the season opener.

Killed; 3 Others Injured

Two members of a West Ottawa High School play cast were killed and three others injured in a single car crash along Lakewood Blvd. at 160th Ave. at 1:42 a.m. today.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies at mid morning declined to release additional information or names pending notification of next of kin. Holland Hospital also declined to release information or names of the injured.

Other sources identified the victims as Micheal James Troost, 16, and his sister, Julia Kay Troost, 15, children of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Troost of 14754 Quincy St.

Injured and taken to Holland Hospital were John Beem, 16, of 15856 Riley St.; Dave Walker, 15, of 146 170th Ave., and Cheryl Streur, 16, of 75 Scotts Dr.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies said Beem was driving the car.

Miss Streur was said suffering a fractured leg while Walker suffered chest injuries.

The Troosts were said dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. Deputies did say the car was westbound on Lakewood Blvd. and ran off the left side of the road, striking a tree head on. The tree was 14 feet off the edge of the roadway.

All five were among the cast of the West Ottawa Theatre's production "Flowers for Algernon" which had been presented Friday night at the school cafeteria.

The five were said returning home from a pizza party hosted by the parents of one of the cast members. The driver of the car was not learned.

Deputies said the father of the Troosts was hunting in the Baldwin area.

Micheal, a West Ottawa junior, had attended Pine Creek elementary school and West Ottawa Junior High. He was a baptized member of Rose Park Reformed Church.

Julia was a sophomore at West Ottawa and was a baptized member of the Rose Park Reformed Church.

Survivors include the parents, four sisters, Mrs. Lavern (Barbara) Kleeves, Mrs. Herman (Mary Anne) Perez, Mrs. Larry (Diana) Hop, all of Holland, and Joyce at home; two brothers, Keith and Rodney, both of Holland, and paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Troost of Holland.

Note in Can Links Two Families in Friendship

ALLEGAN—Because two teenage Allegan boys had some time to kill on a western vacation trip five years ago, a warm friendship now exists between a Michigan family and a family in Wyoming.

Dennis Misner, now 20, and his brother Dave, 16, were waiting for their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Misner, route 1, Allegan, to fix an early morning breakfast at a roadside park on the Shoshone River near Yellowstone Park in Wyoming when they decided it would be fun to write notes, place them in 35 mm film containers, and toss them into the river.

Both wrote their names, ages and addresses on slips of paper, sealed them in film canisters, and sent them floating down the Shoshone.

After an extended trip in their pickup camper throughout the northwest, the Misners returned to their home on Pike Lake, never giving another thought to the little film cans floating on the river somewhere in northwestern Wyoming.

But in February of this year, four years and eight months later, Dennis received a letter from Barbara Merchant, of Cody, Wyo.

Barbara, 19, told of finding Dennis' note while fishing with an older brother, Joe, on the reservoir at Buffalo Bill Dam, downstream from Yellowstone Park. Although the can was battered and dented from its long journey, the note inside was still dry and legible.

Barbara's letter in February marked the beginning of a warm friendship between the Merchants in Wyoming and the Misners in Allegan.

After Barbara and Dennis exchanged letters for a while, Mrs. Misner and Mrs. Merchant, a widow, began writing to each other.

Through their correspondence, both families learned they shared a love for hunting, fishing and outdoor life in general. As a result, Mrs. Merchant invited the Misners to spend their August vacation in Wyoming.

The death in July of Mrs. Misner's brother-in-law, Fran Slack in Oregon, meant an early trip west for her. Mrs. Misner called Mrs. Merchant from Oregon to tell of the changed plans. Mrs. Merchant suggested the Misners come to Wyoming for the October deer season.

The early part of October found the two families assembling the necessary gear for camping and hunting in the mountains. By the second day of the season, all five members of the party with hunting licenses (Barbara and her brother, Joe Merchant, and Dave, Dennis and Ray Misner) had each shot their deer. After spending five days in the mountains, they returned to Cody where the Misners spent the remainder of their three-week vacation.

Historic Relics Of Indians Told By Researcher

Mrs. Donald Ike addressed the Elizabeth Schuyler Hamilton Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution at the November meeting held Thursday evening at the John La Barge home. She displayed and discussed prehistoric and historic Indian relics that she has found.

Mrs. Ike, who holds a BS in anthropology, considers herself a combination "digger" and lover of the woods. She spoke about the Indian campground in Clinton County on property owned for generations by her family and untouched until two years ago.

She lived on the farm all her life and the fact that Indian items were continually being found made her think there was more. The area is on the Big Maple River, a tributary of the Grand River. At present, only a small section has been excavated. Dr. Richard Flanders, Chairman, Department of Anthropology, Grand Valley State College, Allendale, has aided her with this project.

She explained that a potential area is first surveyed and divided into 10-foot squares. One square at a time is excavated. The "finds" are brushed, washed, weighed, mapped on a graph and given a number. There is actually more paper work than excavating.

One layer of sod at a time is removed and screened. The last debris of the Indians is found first. In this case, it is pottery remains of the Woodland Indians. So far, Mrs. Ike has gone down 12 inches, sometimes finding only one piece of pottery a day.

Patterns of Indian migration are being established through this work. Pieces of pottery and arrowheads representing Indians from many sections of the country have been found there. This cross-culture can be explained by the site location on a river which was a major means of travel.

Among the many items displayed by Mrs. Ike were a beaded ceremonial purse, utilitarian and ceremonial points, pieces of pottery with varied designs, knives, ax heads and varied tools, indicating what great craftsmen the Indians were.

Mrs. Ike believes that knowledge of the extensive and complex culture of his ancestors will give today's Indian a sense of pride.

Capacity House Cheers Hungarian Symphony

A highly attentive audience was profuse in its applause at a concert by the Budapest Symphony Orchestra Saturday night in Civic Center, rising for a standing ovation following a concert in which Mozart and Mendelssohn compositions were highlighted.

Conductor Gyorgy Lehel maintained excellent control of the large orchestra, producing a soul-satisfying mood in the capacity house. The orchestra occupied the front third of the auditorium floor, backed by a sound shell, resulting in excellent balance in an auditorium designed for a multiplicity of uses.

Particularly well received was the guest pianist, 20-year-old Dezzo Ranki in Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 17 in G major. The Mozart concerto was a happy selection with its rippling melodic score, backed by an orchestra with main emphasis on strings.

Fine strings also were dominant in the orchestra's rendition of the Mendelssohn Symphony No. 4 (Italian), with Conductor Lehel virtually playing on the heartstrings of the appreciative audience.

But the orchestra also demonstrated its percussive qualities particularly in its closing ballet fragments from Maurice Ravel's "Daphnis and Chloe" playing the entire spectrum from delicate strings to bombastic drums. These contrasts also were demonstrated in a spirited encore.

The program started out with a fine Hungarian touch in Dances from Galanta by the contemporary composer, Zoltan Kodaly (1882-1967).

Conductor Lehel was highly pleased with the Holland audience, particularly since Holland is one of the smallest cities the orchestra has in its first American tour of 24 concerts from New York to Kansas. The orchestra schedule included a concert Sunday afternoon in Cleveland, Ohio, and one tonight in Charlottesville, Va. It will present a concert in Carnegie Hall in New York City Wednesday and in Kennedy Center in Washington next Friday.

The orchestra travels with its own Steinway for the pianist. The next concert of the Holland Concert Association will be the Nikolais Dance Theatre Tuesday, Dec. 7, at Civic Center at 8:15 p.m.

For members interested in reciprocal privileges, the Canadian Opera Co. is appearing earlier in Muskegon than is scheduled. The company will ap-

pear Friday, Jan. 7, at 8:15 p.m. instead of Sunday, Jan. 9, at 2 p.m. The opera, "Orpheus in the Underworld" by Offenbach, will be presented in Muskegon Central Campus auditorium.

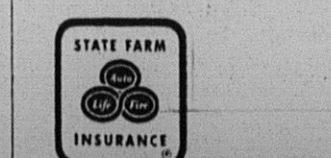

"A miracle" sings Motel, the tailor, as he is about to realize his heart's desire and marry Tzeitel, oldest daughter of Teyve, the dairyman in "Fiddler on the Roof."

And right before the eyes of those who filled the Zeeland High Cafeteria for the first night of the Zeeland Drama Club's production of the Broadway hit, another minor miracle happens as the room becomes for a couple of swiftly passing hours, Anatevka, a tiny Jewish village in Czarist Russia.

With the special magic of fresh young voices and sympathetic imagination, Tom Veenendall, director - producer; Chuck Canaan, vocal director, and Dan Ritsema, instrumental director, have drawn from their actors, singers and musicians the kind of performances that make all the effort and uncertainty flow into a satisfying whole.

This demanding show has a story to tell that is compounded of faith and skepticism, joy and sadness, life and death, done by children of an affluent time and a blessed land, with uncanny sureness.

Chris Van Hoven as Teyve and Lili Taylor as Golde, his wife, give outstanding performances, singly and together.

The three older daughters, who find their own fates without the help of Yente, the matchmaker; Bev Vanden Bosch as Tzeitel, Sue Wiersma as Hodel and Robin Wybenga as Chava, are excellent, as are Jeff Boes, Bill Kraak and Dave Heuvelhorst as Motel, the tailor, Perchik, the young student radical and Fyedka, a Russian,

the girls' successful suitors.

But also well cast are the colorful minor characters, Connie Ozinga as the non-stop talker, Yente, and also the ghost of Golde's mother, Grandma Tzeitel; Gilbert Mast as the gentle rabbi, and Don Vanden Heuvel as Mendel, his handsome son, Jim Barry as Lazar Wolf, the butcher, Ken Kraak as Mordcha, the innkeeper; Andrea Barry as the tall ghost of Fruma - Sarah, Lazar Wolf's dead wife; Jim Hoyt as a sympathetic Russian constable; Bill Flester as Avraham, the book-seller; Terry Harrison as Nachum, the beggar; Jan Wybenga as Debbie Volkers as Teyve's youngest daughters and Debbie Vander Velde, as the mother of Motel.

Present in every scene, a kind of Jewish leprechaun, is the silent Fiddler, pantomimed by Lynne Flester, symbol of the unquenchable spirit of the villagers.

The litting score gets full justice from the orchestra, chorus and young soloists, from the rollicking "To Life," to Hodel's touching farewell to her village, "Anatevka."

A revolving set, use of scrim in the Sabbath and dream sequences keep the entire cast and crew on their toes to achieve the rapid scene changes, and all seemed to go quite smoothly on opening night.

Wisely, there are no curtain calls for the production, the refugees have left Anatevka and to call them back would break the Fiddler's spell.

There are three more presentations slated, tonight and next Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m.

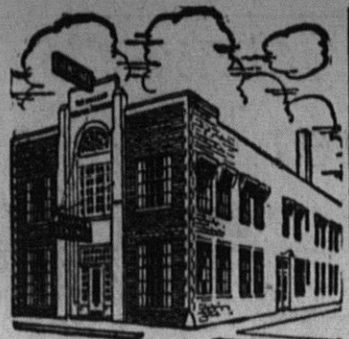

Prices are low and you can save money by buying larger birds in the 16 to 20-pound class. Large birds have more meat in proportion to the amount of bone. You can buy a large turkey, saw it in half and freeze half for Christmas or later.

Mrs. Morley says roasting half a turkey is hardly different from a whole one, and you will have fewer leftovers. Stuffing can be held in the cavity with a sheet of foil.

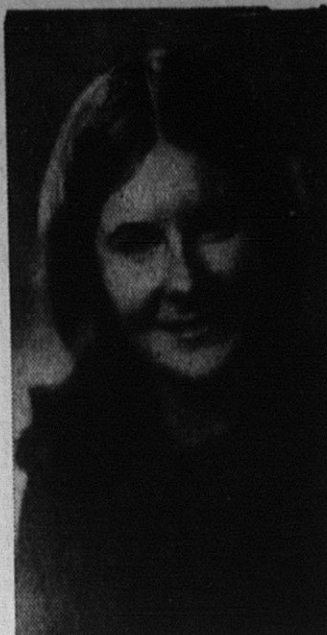

Hope Given \$19,000 For Research

A Frederick Cottrell Science Grant of nearly \$19,000 has been given to Hope College by the Research Corporation to support the work of Dr. Michael P. Doyle in the area of new synthetic methods.

Dr. Doyle is an associate professor of chemistry and has been on the Hope staff since 1968.

The funds from the grant will be used by Dr. Doyle not only to involve undergraduates in current work in chemistry but, also to train a postdoctorate student in both research and teaching. Most existing training programs for a person with a doctorate degree involve only further research experience. "There are few formal programs in existence in which a person can be trained in both teaching and research," said Dr. Doyle. "It is hoped that this new and unique program will not only better qualify a post - doctorate student for an academic career but also serve as a model for future programs."

The Research Corporation was created in 1912 by Frederick Cottrell, the inventor of many antipollution devices even now used, for the advancement of science.

"The grant in support of the research of Dr. Doyle, together with several other awards given by Research Corporation in recent years, is further recognition of the quality of existing programs at Hope College," said Chancellor William Vander Lugt.

The research that will be supported concerns new ways to prepare chemicals. Already two students working with Dr. Doyle, Dale Kooistra, a senior from Wyoming, Mich. and Donald DeBruyn, a junior from Zeeland, have discovered simple methods to prepare alcohols and ethers. The ether synthesis appears to be one of the most convenient and general methods known. Other synthetic methods are presently being investigated by Steve Zonnebelt, a junior from Holland.

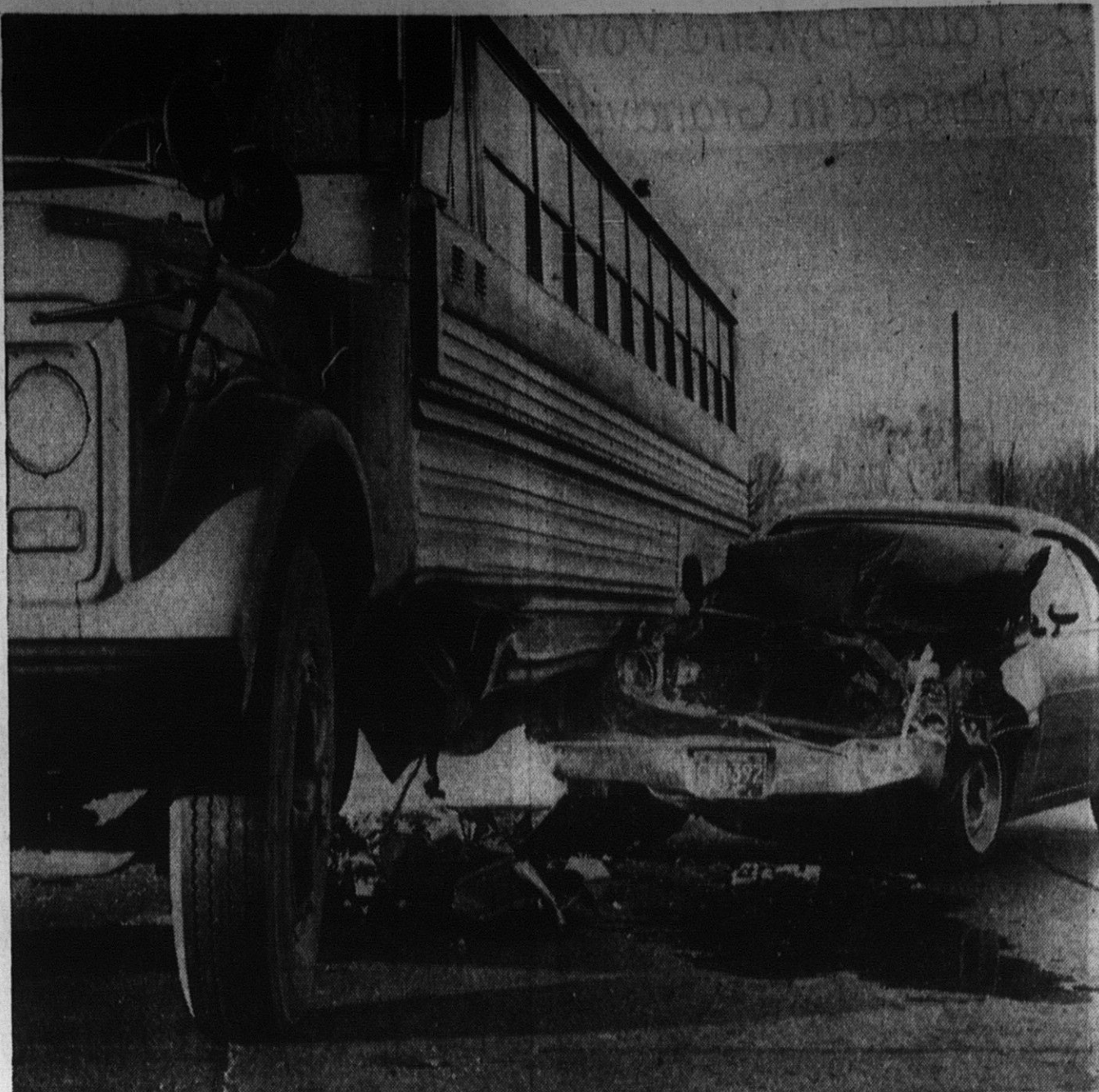

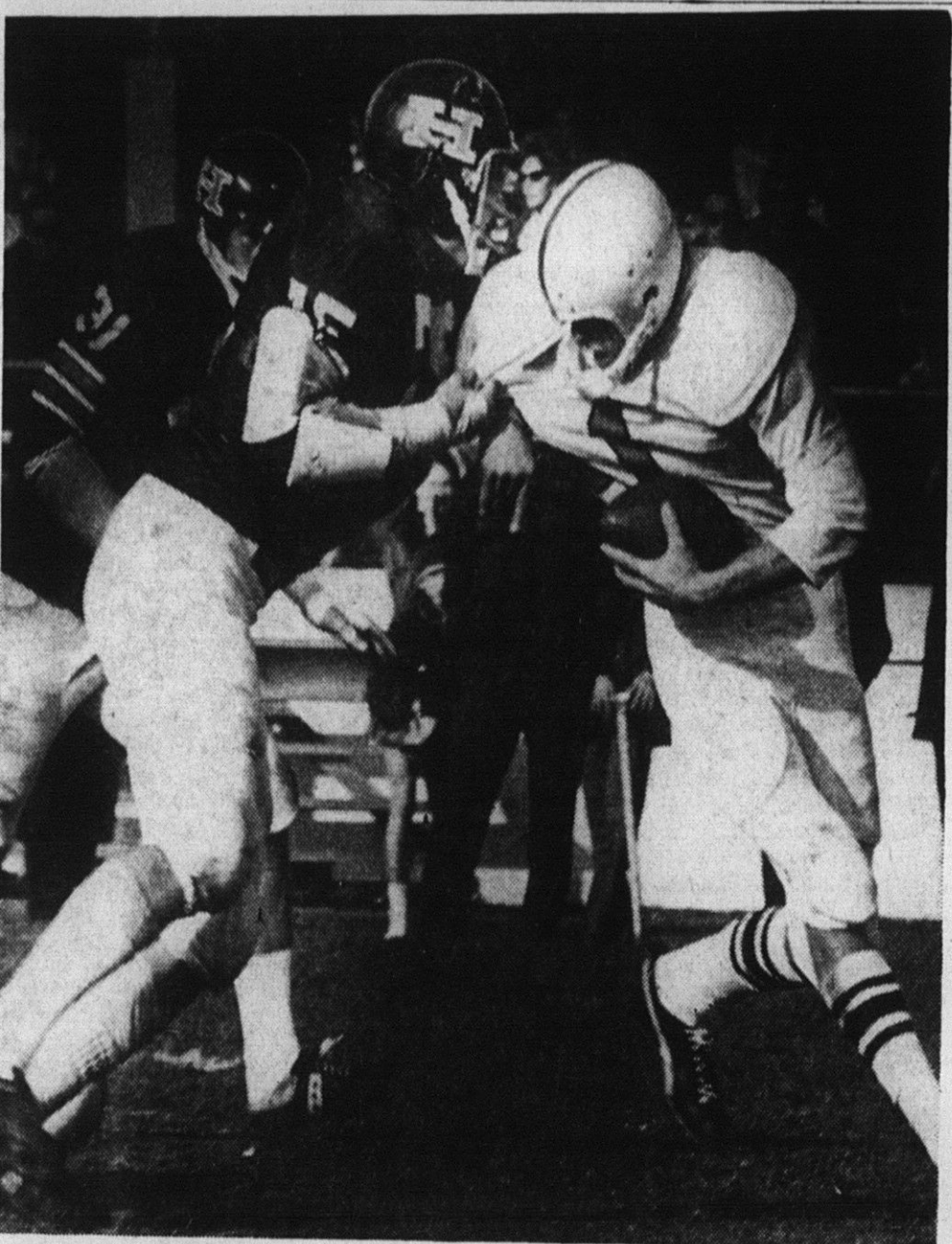

NOSE Tips

From an all-star high school quarterback to the MVP in the MIAA at middle guard.

That's the rags to riches story of Hope College's outstanding middle guard Ted Rycenga of Spring Lake, who became the first Flying Dutchmen lineman, to ever win the most valuable player award outright.

It's hard to imagine that Rycenga was a quarterback in high school and never even hit a sled until he came to Hope in the fall of 1967. But it's true.

"I never knew what it was like to be a lineman until I came to Hope and now that I had the opportunity to chase quarterbacks, I found out that it's more fun to hit than to be hit," said Hope's rugged defender.

Coach Russ DeVette, who was head coach at the time, explains some of the rags to riches story. "We had Gary Frens and Groy Koper at quarterback and we found out right off the bat that Ted liked to hit and that's how he got his big start in the pit."

Rycenga, better known as T.R. to his teammates, started his freshmen season as a defensive end.

"I tried to copy the style of big Ben Davidson of Oakland," he stated. "That's the main reason I grew my mustache."

Davidson, like Rycenga, is a huge in height (6'5") but outweighs Hope's star by 40 pounds.

"Sure I would love to play pro football and I wouldn't even care if it was in Canada, as long as I got the chance to make it," Rycenga said.

Rycenga admits that weight is against him but he could easily put on 30 pounds without any trouble and could become the first Hope gridders to ever make the big time.

"There is no doubt in my mind that Rycenga could have performed at any larger school in the country," stated Coach Ray Smith. "He's definitely the best lineman I ever coached in my nine years."

DeVette, who has been around even longer added, "if there was a better defensive lineman ever

at Hope, I can't recall it."

Both Smith and DeVette said that Rycenga was the leader of the team and that the players looked up to him.

T. R. had so many outstanding games but the ones that we remember best were against Albion and Lakeland College last year when he literally destroyed the opposing center and quarterback.

Smith thinks that Rycenga might have a shot at the pros but says Ted's speed is his drawback. "If Ted can put on some weight and retain his speed, at that weight he would have a good chance of making it," Smith said.

The only other Hope gridders to share the league's MVP award as lineman was Larry TerMolen in 1958.

Rycenga felt bad after the key loss to Alma and when Coach Phil Brooks of the Scots reported that his huge center Doug Nikkila move Rycenga at will, it made matters worse.

"What made that quarterback sneak so successful wasn't Ted's fault at all because he was slanting and our linebacker got knocked out of the hole which resulted in good yardage for the Scots," recalled Smith.

Rycenga played linebacker for the first time in his career most of that game and was credited with a game high 13 tackles.

As far as we were concerned, Brooks statement was the most misleading of the year. It just didn't happen that way.

Rycenga played defensive end his freshman year and made all-MIAA for the first time as a sophomore at tackle before Smith switched him to his natural position over the center.

"I love to look the center right in the eye when I'm playing over him and I honestly feel that our center Chris Hahn was a better one than the huge Nikkila."

T.R. quarterbacked the Lakers to the Seaway League football championship in 1966. "We finished the year with a perfect 9-0 mark but were never rated," he replied. "We even beat Zeeland that year."

Hope College seems to be tra-

dition for the Rycenga family. Ted's father Ted Sr. played fullback for Hope in the late 40s. In fact, Ted Jr. was born while his dad was still going to school.

"My sister and mother and almost all of our family went to Hope," T.R. says proudly.

When asked if he was sorry that he didn't go to a bigger school he said, "No. I really can't say that because Hope has been real good to me."

Rycenga, who will graduate in June with a degree in political science and a minor in physical education, would like to coach someday.

He was a student teacher at his hometown last spring. "I taught the first grade and really enjoyed myself," he said.

T.R. admits that his biggest fan is his pretty wife, Polly, who he married recently. "Polly is the most understanding wife that a guy could have and I'm just lucky to have a gal that loves football as much as I do."

Being an old college center, we can honestly say that we would much rather have a guy hanging over our head like the 290-pound Nikkila than a Mr. Ted Rycenga.

It seemed from the press box that at times Rycenga would grab the ball carrier before he even got the pigskin from the quarterback.

A center is helpless against a guy like Ted, who has good pursuit and can either roll you over or run around you with equal effectiveness.

Rycenga is a three-time all-league performer and their may never be another like to come to Hope in quite a while.

Like Coach Smith said, "it's going to be strange not to see No. 75 racing up and down the field."

The opposing players that had to look up at his 6'5" frame are glad to see him leave but he's going to be missed by everyone at Hope College.

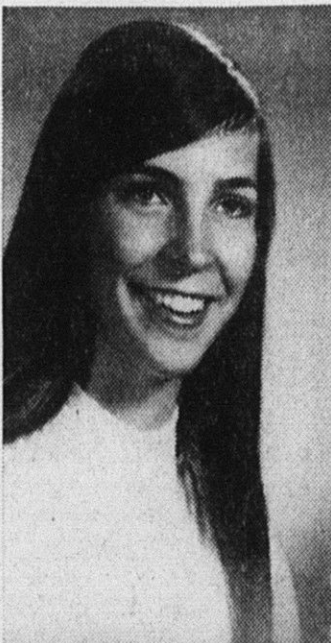

The total so far is nearly \$2,000 more than the entire amount received last year.

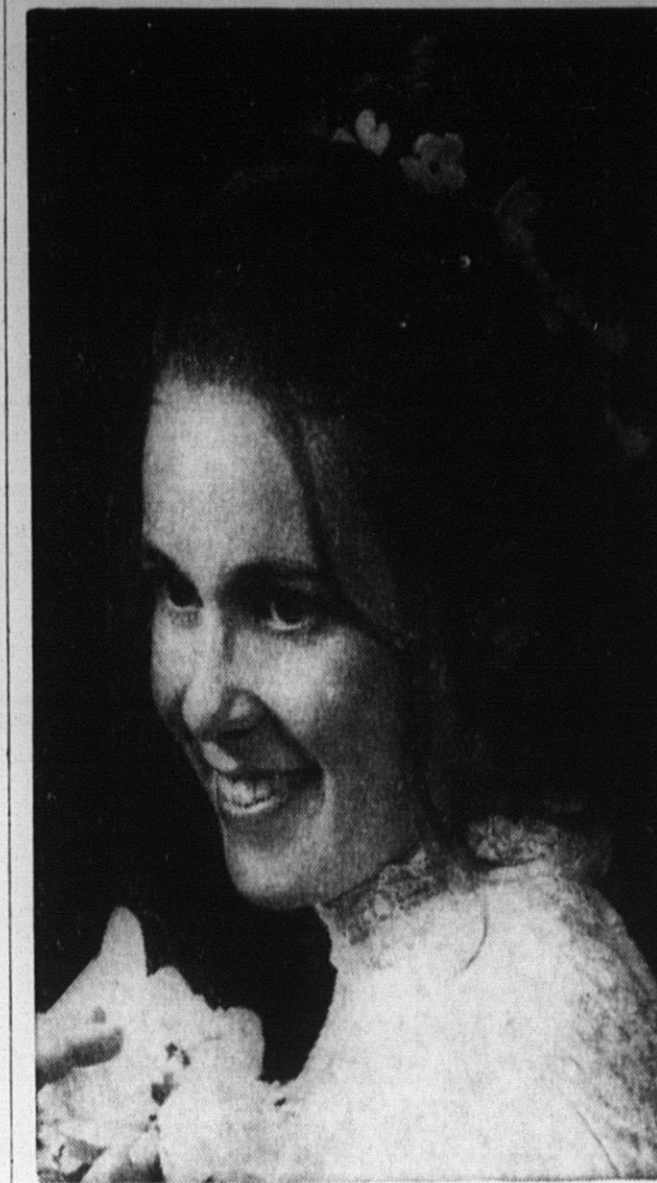

Consumer All-Important To Economy, Martin Says

James A. Martin J.D., Professor of Law at the University of Michigan opened his talk Thursday in Durfee Hall to the American Association of University Women and their guests by telling them the consumer is all-important in the economy. Without the consumer the economy would fold. He added the words of advice "Let the buyer beware" are not very practical.

It is extremely difficult for one to know what he is buying unless he knows a great deal about chemistry and engineering. Since most consumers are not chemists or engineers they need protection and help to buy wisely.

Martin listed some of the areas where the consumer faces problems when he goes out to make a purchase. The first of these is advertising. Often the product for sale may be a good product but the technique used to sell it isn't healthy. Children are especially vulnerable to the emotional appeal used in advertising. Some advertising is deceptive and some misleading in that it is truthful as far as it goes but it doesn't tell the whole story.

The second problem area for the consumer is defective parts and insufficient services. Many stores are not organized to take care of minor breakdowns and complaints that occur from time to time. This type of problem can become very irritating to the consumer.

The third problem area for the consumer is buying on credit. The poor suffer the brunt of this problem. They need credit the most and have the hardest time getting it. Often they must resort to paying exorbitant rates or even going to loan sharks.

In the ghetto the poor pay up to 200 per cent more for merchandise than non-ghetto consumers. Contrary to what many people believe the ghetto merchant is not making more profits. His rent and insurance rates are much higher and more people fail to keep up their payments. Presently there is no consumer solution for these people until a solution to poverty is found.

For most consumers the future does have some bright spots. Up until now the traditional remedy to a problem would be to sue. However, going to court is not satisfactory in most cases. Lawyers are expensive so people let things go. The small claims court isn't the answer either. Lawyers are not allowed and many people do not feel qualified to handle their own cases, the speaker said.

Some solutions might be courts in shopping areas with impartial judges or mediation panels set up by industry. Another possibility would be to use "class action" — a group sharing a common complaint would appeal or sue a company or industry. If many people were over charged on a service a rate reduction would help give back the money they were entitled to have, Prof. Martin said.

The Federal government is also interested in protecting the consumer. In its present state the Federal Trade Commission is too slow to be effective. The Senate is working to give it more power and a quicker process rate. The House is working on a Federal Consumer Protection Act. It will coordinate all of the consumer interests. Private citizens can band together and form groups such as Nader's Raiders.

Industries can help the consumer by making pricing clearer. The unit pricing system is an example of this. Educational campaigns to educate the public is good business for both the consumer and industry. The better one feels he is being treated the more responsive he will be to the service or product.

Born in Chicago, he had lived in Pullman for the past 30 years, coming from Chicago. He was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church, Allegan.

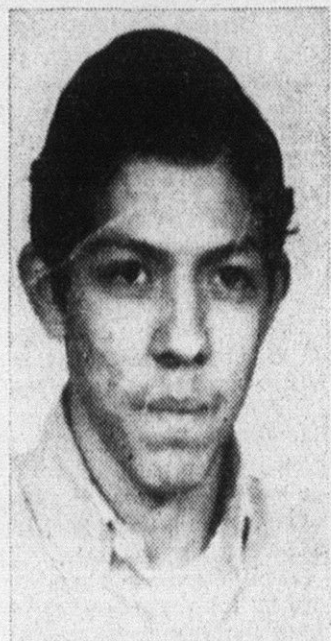
His only survivors are a niece and three nephews.
